WEBB TO HEAR PETITION FROM FRUIT RAISERS

S. C. Producers Seek Injunction Against North Carolina's \$50 License Tax

Asheville, July 23.—(AP)—Judge E. Yates Webb today signed a federal injunction order temporarily restraining the State of North Carolina from collecting a \$50 tax levied against persons who sell produce in this state and who do not maintain a permanent place or business in North Carolina.

Asheville, July 23.—(AP)—Judge E. Yates Webb, of the Federal District court, agreed to hear a petition from South Carolina fruit and produce growers for an injunction against North Carolina's \$50 license tax today after attorneys for the farmers had informed him a delay would mean a substantial loss on their peach crop.

The judge's action was taken after Attorney General Dennis G. Brummitt had consented to waive the state's return to the farmers' injunction petition in order to allow the hearing to be held. The case had originally been set for Saturday.

Attorneys for the farmers talked to Mr. Brummitt by long distance telephone to Raleigh. The situation was explained to him and he consented to the hearing today.

The hearing will not begin until Mr. Brummitt's telephone agreement is confirmed by wire. Judge Webb was engaged in another case this morning and tentatively fixed 1 p. m. for the beginning of the tax hearing.

Judge Webb will have the power to order a temporary injunction without hearing the state's return, under the agreement. A permanent injunction could be ordered only by a three-judge court as the tax petition attacks the constitutionality of the North Carolina law.

The statute provides for payment of a \$50 tax on each and every truck which carries, fruits, fish or produce are sold in this state by persons who do not maintain a permanent place of business.

Farmers in border counties of South Carolina have protested the act.

Final Rites Held for Jesse Gay, Sr.

Farmville, July 21.—Funeral rites for Jesse Gay Sr., age 78 years, were held from the home on Grimmerburg street this afternoon at 4:00 o'clock, services being conducted by Rev. A. C. D. of Ayden, a former rector of the local Episcopal Church, assisted by Rev. J. Q. Beckwith, the present rector. Final Masonic honors were accorded Mr. Gay, who was among the pioneers of the Farmville lodge, and the oldest member. Interment was made in Forest Hill cemetery.

He had been critically ill for three weeks, and his death which occurred at 4:00 Monday morning was not unexpected. Ill health had forced him several years before to give up his occupation as a prominent farmer of this county, and move here. Of a kindly, charitable, and genial nature, it has been said that he never had an enemy throughout his life.

Mr. Gay was born in South Carolina but came to this section at an early age after the War Between the States, with his mother, a native of Eastern Carolina, following the death of his father in a northern prison, after being taken prisoner at Port Fisher by the federal army. He was married in 1879 to Miss Laura Pender, who preceded him to the grave by eleven years. He was the last member of his immediate family of several brothers and sisters.

Surviving are five daughters, Mrs. Boyd Parker and Mrs. A. A. Stewart of Wilmington; Mrs. J. A. Burnett of Baltimore; Misses Lizzie and Sue Gay of Farmville; a son, Walter C. Gay, and a foster son, Arthur D. Gay, also of Farmville, and several grandchildren.

Pope Discusses Conflict Between Church and State

Vatican City, July 23.—(AP)—Conflicts between the church and state in Italy, Spain, Mexico and Lithuania were discussed today by Pope Pius with twenty cardinals of the Curia summoned hurriedly to a meeting which took on the importance of a special consistory.

The session in the Vatican library, lasted nearly three hours and was conducted in the greatest secrecy. When it was over no statement was issued.

It was believed in some quarters that the cardinals had been called into conference because of recent conflicting interests. Such a basis of been acting independently without consulting the cardinals.

ONE KILLED BY ASSASSINS

Six Others Injured As To Bombs and Bullets Are Directed At Chinese Nationalists

Shanghai, July 23.—(AP)—Two bombs and a fusillade of bullets directed at V. Soong, finance minister and vice-chairman of the Nationalist government, missed their mark here today but fatally injured Soong's secretary Tang Yu-Loh.

Six other Chinese were injured, some of them apparently by Soong's bodyguard in answering the fire of the unidentified assassins.

The attack was launched just after Soong and his party arrived by train from Nanking. The bombs failed to explode when thrown, but one of them later was discharged when picked up by a soldier. He was possibly fatally wounded. A Cantonese student was arrested later in connection with the incident.

Tang Yu-Loh was 32 years old and was married recently. He formerly was a student at both Harvard and Yale universities.

Soong, a pillar of the much harassed Nationalist government, was entering an automobile when the group attacked. Two bullets struck Tang Yu-Loh, who was near Soong.

The shots threw a large crowd into an uproar. The density of the crowd prevented police from firing at the assassins. Officers fired several volleys into the air in a vain attempt to halt them. They escaped in the confusion. Tang was rushed to a hospital where he died.

Only 37 years old, Soong is a graduate of Harvard University and one of the leading financiers of China. He is a member of a wealthy family in the far eastern republic. He is a brother of Mme. Sun Yat-Sen, widow of the founder of the republic, and a brother-in-law of Chiang Kai-Shek, head of the Nationalist government.

Man Runs Amuck With Shotgun, Slaying Four

Mercer, Penna., July 23.—(AP)—Mano Demofant, 46, ran amuck with a shot gun at the number 2 mine of the Sharon Coal and Limestone Company near here today, killing four persons and wounding four others before he was captured by George Masters, manager of the Union Supply Company.

Demofant killed his wife, 42, his sister-in-law, Miss Sarchette, 45, Mrs. Frank Yekela, and another person who was not immediately identified. Masters ducked Demofant in a lake "to cool him off" after capturing him, then turned him over to a deputy sheriff.

FOUR INDICTED IN SLAYINGS

Three officers are held for recent killing near Wilmington. Wilmington, July 23.—(AP)—Three deputy sheriffs and a county officer were indicted for manslaughter by the New Hanover county grand jury today in connection with the deaths March 15 of Lupo Roberts, mail truck driver, and W. P. Starling, deputy sheriff.

Named in the indictments were A. B. Crews, E. J. Hale and L. M. Massey, sheriff's deputies; and Porter Davis, a county officer.

Roberts and Starling were slain in an exchange of shots that followed when the former drove his truck into a barricade five county officers had erected on the Smith Creek bridge here in an attempt to catch an alleged run runner.

The indictments were returned by a new grand jury that succeeded a similar body that refused several months ago to take action against the deputies.

Two young women, Dorothy Pittman and Mary Moore, said to have witnessed the shooting, testified in the new investigation. Judge Garland E. Midyette, before the indictments were returned, charged the grand jury at the request of its foreman with the law in the case. The jurist instructed that body to return a true bill whenever a person is killed by a deadly weapon and allow him to be tried by a jury.

Discover New Method Of Isolating Bacteria

Chicago, Ill., July 23.—(AP)—The discovery of a new method of isolating bacteria which heretofore have remained invisible, announced by Dr. Arthur I. Kendall, professor of bacteriology at Northwestern University, was hailed today by his colleagues as an important victory in the fight of science against disease.

Some of Dr. Kendall's associates described the discovery, revealed by Dr. Kendall in a lecture last night, as the most important victory in the isolation of bacteria since the discovery of Louis Pasteur. They said it probably would open the way for a more thorough and exact knowledge of such diseases as influenza, rheumatism, infantile paralysis and sleeping sickness.

Although the scientist's experiments have thus far been limited, he postulated in the summary of his lecture, that a majority, if not all known bacteria, were subject to the new method of isolation.

ONE KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT NEAR BETHEL

Another Seriously Injured As Machine Plunges Over Ten Foot Fill

A man was killed and another injured when the automobile in which they were riding plunged over a ten-foot fill on the Greenville-Bethel highway about a mile from Bethel, this morning at 4 o'clock.

The dead is Valda Jones, 22, of Burgaw, S. C., and the injured is Jack Murray, of Greenville, who suffered a fractured shoulder and broken collar bone.

Buddy Bucklin, of Greenville, driver of the car escaped uninjured, and was exonerated by a coroner's jury within a short time after the accident.

The accident occurred near Grindle creek canal as the party was headed from Greenville to Bethel. Bucklin was said to have reached over to awaken his two companions, who had fallen asleep sometime before, and lost control of the car. The machine plunged off the fill and landed in the marshland ten feet below. Bucklin and Jones were buried beneath the car and Murray was hurled several feet away. The car was said to have been going at a low rate of speed and was not badly damaged.

Jones was said to have been killed instantly. Bucklin told officers he dug from under the wreckage and ran down the road in direction of Greenville to obtain help.

Murray was rushed to the local hospital for medical aid, but was later removed to his home in the cotton mill district. Jones' body was being held at the Williams' Funeral Parlor awaiting arrival of relatives from South Carolina.

The three men reside in the cotton mill district. Jones had been here about three weeks, having come from Burgaw, S. C., where his relatives reside.

SIX MINERS HURT TODAY

Blast Damages Garage, in Which Men Were Sleeping, At Pennsylvania Mine

Pittsburgh, July 23.—(AP)—An explosion damaged a garage in which six non-union miners were sleeping and injured the men, one of them probably seriously, at the Wildwood mine of the Butler Consolidated Coal Company early today.

The mine was the scene of rioting between striking miners and deputy sheriffs in which one man was killed July 22. The explosion this morning was believed to have been caused by a mob.

Fearing repetition of Tuesday's attack, when they were fired upon from ambush, 300 miners of the Standard Mining Company at McKinleyville, W. Va., have refused to return to the pit. Efforts were being made today to resume operations.

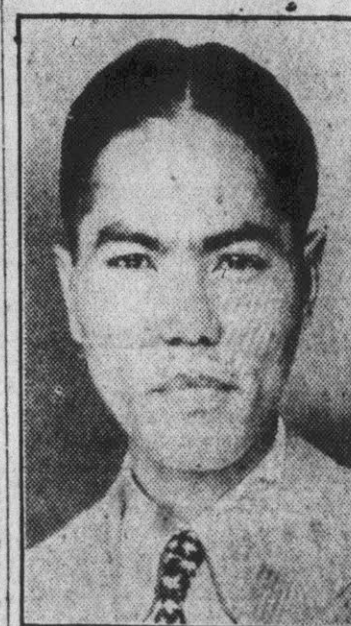
Fifty-eight of the 76 miners arrested after the shooting were released by Brooke county authorities yesterday. Eighteen others were held in \$2,500 bond each, charged with violation of the Redmann act, (inciting to riot).

Meanwhile the West Virginia buminous regions had another flare of disorder to investigate. More than a score of shots were fired yesterday at miners leaving the Ward mine of the Kelly's Creek CClary Company. None was hurt.

State police said about 15 men leaving the mine in coal cars for the bottom of an incline to catch a train home, were fired upon from a grove nearby. Troopers stationed on guard at the plant returned the fire.

Amid the jeering of pickets and with state police, deputies and local guards protecting them, a large group of miners returned to work yesterday at the Cedar Grove mine of the Carnegie Coal Company near Washington, Pa.

REORGANIZE ROAD PATROL

Six Division Headquarters Established in Highway Maintenance Division

Raleigh, July 23.—(AP)—A complete reorganization of the State Highway Patrol was effected today by the State Highway Commission. Six division headquarters, one in each highway maintenance division and one at Raleigh, were set up.

Lieutenants of the divisions and the headquarters of each will be R. H. Beck at Marion; W. J. Croom at Raleigh; T. A. Early at Winston-Salem; L. R. Fisher at Charlotte; L. A. Kankinson at Fayetteville; Lester Jones at Greenville.

It was announced that Lieut. W. E. Vernon, now located at Charlotte in charge of highway patrol headquarters there, will be transferred to the new highway prison department at his own request. Vernon had protested against being demoted from his present position to that of sergeant.

Before adjourning its meeting the commission agreed to hold meetings twice monthly, on the first and third Wednesdays, for the next several months.

Erection of a permanent convict camp to accommodate 100 prisoners at Marion was authorized by the commission. The camp will cost about \$20,000.

The commission took under consideration the application of the town of Newton that the legislature assume for the state a judgment of \$7,500 obtained against the town for the accidental death of a man on a bridge in the town.

Provisional Plans

Call for Secretary Stimson and Secretary Mellon to Proceed to Berlin Tonight With Chancellor Bruening to Look Over Conditions in Germany; Situation Looks Bad to Member German Delegation, But Stimson, MacDonald and Laval Appear Highly Pleased With Developments

Washington, July 23.—(AP)—President Hoover said today the London conference had "laid sound foundations for the establishment of stability in Germany."

The program adopted by the conference he said, supplements the suspension of inter-governmental debts already in effect.

"The combined effect," he added, "should enable the German people with their resources, industry and courage, to overcome the temporary difficulties and restore their credit."

At the same time the President forwarded telegrams of congratulations to Secretaries Stimson and Mellon, who conducted the American negotiations in London.

The President said: "The London conference has laid sound foundations for the establishment of stability in Germany."

"The major problem is one of effecting primarily the banking and credit conditions and can best be solved by the voluntary cooperation of the bankers of the world rather than by governments with their conflicting interests. Such a basis of cooperation is assured."

"The program supplements the suspension of inter-governmental debts already in effect. The combined effect should enable the German people with their resources, industry and courage, to overcome the temporary difficulties and restore their credit."

"The program contributes to expediate recovery from world wide depression through, the overcoming of the most important elements in the crisis affecting central Europe."

"The world is indebted to Premiers MacDonald, Laval, Bruening, to Messrs. Stimson, Mellon, Grandi, Francqui and other governmental representatives in this conference. The conference has demonstrated a fine spirit of conciliation and consideration among nations that will have lasting benefits in establishment of stability."

London, July 23.—(AP)—The seven power conference on relief to Germany was concluded at 12:36 a. m. today (7:26 a. m. EST) today.

The German delegates looking very grave, were the first to leave the foreign office after the concluding session of the conference.

Provisional plans call for Secretary of State Stimson and Secretary of the Treasury Mellon to proceed to Berlin tonight with Chancellor Bruening and Foreign Minister Curtius, the German representatives of the conference.

Prime Minister MacDonald and Foreign Secretary Henderson of Great Britain probably will go to Berlin Monday.

The prime minister said, "We are very well pleased. An agreement among seven powers is not easy to get, but it has been reached and it will be of greatest importance in helping Germany."

Chancellor Bruening hurried out of the foreign office, pausing only long enough to say that he had to leave right away. He appeared unusually grave.

Bruening and Curtius are to have a private talk tonight with Secretaries Stimson and Mellon, who will be their guests at dinner. It was explained that the conversations to be held in Berlin with Mr. MacDonald and Foreign Secretary Henderson will be postponed until Monday because Dr. Bruening wants to show the American representatives conditions in Germany first.

"It looks very bad," one of the financial experts with the German delegation said, "help in the form of cash is not forthcoming, and the chancellor's position will be very difficult when he returns to Berlin. I wonder if Mr. Stimson will see things in a different light when he gets to Germany."

Mr. Stimson himself told a correspondent as he left the foreign office that he was "not optimistic."

(Continued from page one) office that he was "thoroughly satisfied." Dino Grandi, the Italian foreign minister, said "I am very happy over the result." A official announcement at the close of the session said the governments represented are ready to co-operate as far as lies within their power to restore confidence in Germany.

It was understood unofficially that agreement had been reached on some points regarding extension of aid to Germany. Premier Laval of France, in one of the speeches which wound up the conference, congratulated the delegates on their frankness and spirit of co-operation, with particular compliments for the assistance given by Mr. Stimson and Mr. Mellon.

"I am very well satisfied with the result of this meeting," he said. Chancellor Bruening in his speech expressed appreciation for these efforts to aid his country, and thanked the Americans especially. Mr. Stimson emphasized the significance of the Franco-German conversations at Paris last week and described the negotiations in which he played so important a part as great event which would re-establish world confidence.

London, July 23.—(AP)—An official communique issued at the close of the seven-power conference on relief for Germany today said:

"The international conference has concluded its labors. The following declaration was adopted: "The recent excessive withdrawals of capital from Germany have created an acute financial crisis. These withdrawals have been caused by a lack of confidence which is not justified by the economic and budgetary situation of the country."

"In order to insure maintenance of the financial stability of Germany, which is essential in the interests of the entire world, the governments represented at the conference are ready to co-operate so far as lies within their power to restore confidence."

"The governments represented are ready to recommend for the consideration of the financial institutions in their respective countries the following proposals for relieving the immediate situation:

"First, that the Central Bank credit of \$100,000,000 recently granted to the Reichsbank under the auspices of the Bank for International Settlements be renewed at maturity for a period of three months."

"Second, that concerted measures should be taken by the financial

institutions in the several countries with a view to maintaining the volume of credits they already have extended to Germany.

"Third, that the Bank for International Settlements should be invited to set up without delay a committee of representatives nominated by the governments of the Central Bank interested to inquire into the immediate further credit needs of Germany and to study the possibilities of converting a portion of the short term credits into long term."

"The conference noted with interest a communication from Dr. Bruening relative to the joint guaranty recently placed by German industry at the disposal of the Gold Discount Bank.

"The conference is of the opinion that a guarantee of this description should make it possible to provide a sound basis for resumption of the normal operations of international credit."

"The conference considers that if these measures are carried thru they will form a basis for more permanent action to follow."

The communique was signed by Ramsey MacDonald as president of the conference.

The conference announcement was followed by issuance of this statement from the British foreign office: "The conference also decided that the committee of experts (the Young plan experts assembled to dovetail that instrument with the Hoover memorandum) should proceed with elaboration of detailed measures required for giving effect to President Hoover's proposal for a one-year suspension of inter-governmental debts."

Reports Feature Today's Session of N. C. Editors

Morehead City, July 23.—(AP)—The annual president's address by J. W. Noell of the Roxboro Courier, and reports of important standing committees were on today's program of the annual meeting of the North Carolina Press Association.

Tonight the journalists will hear E. B. Jeffers, former publisher of the Greensboro Daily News and now chairman of the State Highway

Commission, discuss the work of his state department.

The convention opened last night with an address by Dr. Frank Graham, president of the University of North Carolina, on the relation of educational opportunities to business conditions in the state.

"Educational opportunities," he said, "are of such a nature that they should not go up and down with the ups and down of the business cycle. A falling off in revenue should not cause the citizens of a commonwealth to cut down on the essential intellectual and spiritual needs of the children of the people."

Four Held for Bank Robbery At Charlotte

Charlotte, July 23.—(AP)—The trial of three robbers who Tuesday took \$2,700 from the Bank of Dallas led today to Charlotte where detectives held four men in connection with a series of recent safe robberies.

The four in jail at Charlotte were R. B. Hayes, John Gregory, C. M. Sherrill, and Cecil Godfrey, all of Charlotte.

Inspector Frank N. Littlejohn, of the detective bureau said his department had evidence definitely connecting the four with three recent safe crackings here, a \$360 robbery at Durham, and possibly with the breaking of a safe in a real estate office at Statesville and a bottling plant at Wilmington.

Littlejohn said a Charlotte man, held incommunicado, had been tentatively identified as one of the three who robbed the Bank of Dallas. He declined to say whether the man was one of the four held for the other robberies, although reports from Gastonia had it Hayes and Gregory might be involved in the bank job.

Three men, arrested at Spartanburg for questioning about the Dal-

las robbery, were released yesterday when A. J. Mauney, cashier of the bank, said they were not the guilty persons.

Mauney was beaten by the robbers after they had held him up and taken his money. He was expected in Charlotte today to view the suspect, or suspects, held here.

To Ask Forfeiture of Lea Bond If He Fails to Appear

Asheville, July 23.—(AP)—Solicitor Zeb V. Nettles, he has announced, will demand the \$10,000 appearance bond of Col. Luke Lea, of Nashville, Tenn., to be forfeited, if the Tennessean does not appear here Monday to answer charges of state bank law violations.

Solicitor Nettles made this announcement yesterday after, he said, he had been informed that Colonel Lea was under summons to appear in Federal court at Knoxville August 1 on charges of national bank law violations.

Gen. Albert L. Cox, of Raleigh, attorney for Lea, expressed doubt whether Colonel Lea could appear in court at both places, since his trial here is expected to consume several days.

General Cox conferred here yesterday with other attorneys for the Tennessean and said the conference

would be continued today in an effort to find a solution of the problem.

Colonel Lea, Luke Lea, Jr., and E. P. Charlet, an associate, are charged together with two Asheville bankers with conspiracy to defraud the closed Central Bank and Trust Company here of more than \$1,000,000.

Spanish Political Situation Becomes More Tense Today

Madrid, July 23.—(AP)—With Seville under martial law as the result of disorders in which 17 persons were killed, the tenseness of Spain's political situation increased today as the nation looked forward to a change in government next week.

It was predicted that when the assembly is formally constituted on Monday or Tuesday, the cabinet would choose Alcala Zamora as president—he now holds that post provisionally—and that he would summon either Manuel Azana, present war minister, or Alejandro Lerroux, foreign minister, to the premiership.

The seriousness of the situation in Seville was made clear when martial law was pronounced only half an hour after Miguel Maura, minister of the interior, announced

he would oppose calling in the military authorities.

The proclamation declaring martial law set forth that troops would fire on the slightest warning and that therefore residents had best keep off the streets and out of balconies. Resistance to the military will result in immediate court martial. The troops were ordered to use heavy artillery to destroy houses from which sniping has been going on.

Find Body of Aged Man in Catawba

Charlotte, July 23.—(AP)—The body of an aged white man, taken from the Catawba river near here, was held today in a local mortuary while authorities sought to determine his identity.

Coroner Z. A. Havis said the man apparently about 60 years of age, had been dead several days when the body was found.

The man was five feet six inches tall, weighed approximately 130 pounds and wore a white shirt and black trousers.

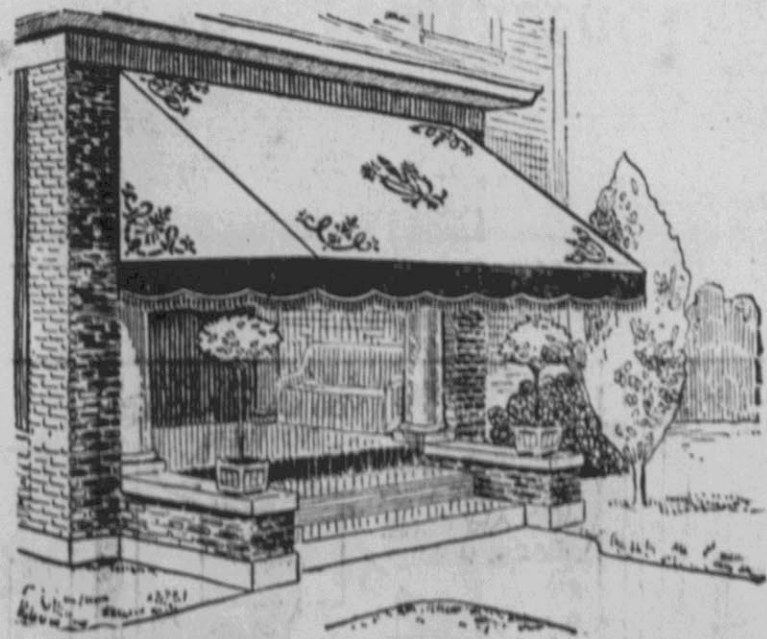

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A WISE CHANGE.

A movement is on foot to change the local Merchants Association into a Chamber of Commerce, and as we see it, such a change should be put into effect. As a matter of fact, it would be a change in name only, since the organization for years has been carrying on Chamber of Commerce work as well as that purely of interest to the retail merchants, but as a Merchants' Association it has received practically all of its support from the merchants instead of from the city as a whole, as would be the case were it officially changed to a Chamber of Commerce. The record of this association is one of achievement for our city as a whole and every business and professional man as well as the majority of the property owners of our city are indebted to it for what it has accomplished, and certainly if such work is to be continued by the organization its support should come from all rather than from the retail merchants alone. Apparently the attitude of a large number of our citizens has been that it was strictly a merchants' organization but since it has been doing all phases of work for the interest of our entire city the organization should be changed officially so that the support of all could be expected and depended upon for the carrying on of this important work.

ABOUT TOWN

The best news Greenville people have heard in sometime is contained in announcement of the opening of the State Bank & Trust Company, Saturday morning at 9 o'clock.

the movement in this county to bring about a wide-spread conservation of food crops during the year. This is especially noticeable in the score or more canneries being operated in homes of growers in different sections of the county, and the first of which was put on display in windows of the Merchants Association the first of the week.

Through the home canning plants the women of the farms are going to store up a considerable amount of fruits and vegetables and their families will be able to live comfortably during the winter. Everybody that can should take advantage of the conservation movement and show the outside world they are not going to be among the people who plead hard times in the future.

Albert Osborne, director of the Westbrook swimming pool, supervised recreation center for children during the summer months, has denied rumors that chemicals are used in the pool for people suffering from athletic feet.

He asserted that no chemicals of any kind were used in the water and that the pool was inspected twice daily to see that it was kept free from pollution.

It is not known how the rumor began circulation, but people should be careful how they disseminate false reports of this kind. The swimming pool was opened by a group of prominent business men simply for the purpose of furnishing adequate recreation for children during the hot summer and they have seen to it that every safeguard is thrown around the youngsters while in the pool.

Thousands of children have patronized the pool during the few weeks since it opened and have found genuine enjoyment in the cooling plunges during the excessive hot weather.

The public should do everything in their power to promote interest in the recreation center, and should also help promoters refute such erroneous reports as that so widely circulated the last two days.

Business conditions are beginning to improve in Greenville and Pitt county and next month should witness even a more pronounced improvement in the opinion of those closely affiliated with the business and financial life of the community.

Trade, according to some of the business firms, has held up remarkably well in view of the widespread depression reported from all parts of the nation, and while some firms have suffered extensively, they should be able to get back on their feet when the tobacco market opens and millions of dollars are released to farmers of eastern Carolina.

With general crop conditions about the best in years there is no reason why people should not be able to lay aside sufficient food to carry them through the winter. If they will only heed the warning to conserve and put it into actual practice they have nothing to fear from the wolf that howled around many homes of the poor last year.

SHARKEY AND WALKER FIGHT TO DRAW WINNY

Brooklyn, N. Y., July 23.—(AP)—The official decision says Jack Sharkey didn't lose, but on lion-hearted little Mickey Walker fight today showers all the acclaim and golden promises that go to a newcomer sealing the heavyweights heights.

In the very heart of the heavy-weight picture is the rugged, grinning, battle-scarred face of the shifty fellow from Eumson, N. J., welterweight and middleweight title-holder in his time, now at least as good as Sharkey because two learned judges and a referee compromised on a draw after fifteen rounds of hurly-burly battle in Ebbet field last night.

Certainly Mickey turned in the most surprising upset of many a fight season as he harassed the big sailorman through the rough and tumble battle that revealed Sharkey in another of his disappointing struggles and gave a crowd of 32,000 a chance to boo and exult in his discomfiture.

There was no questioning whom the crowd that almost filled the National league ball yard thought had won but the arbiters arrived at the compromise decision by every

possible route left open to them.

Referee Arthur Donovan, for instance, thought the bulldog courage of the eternal aggressiveness of the little fellow who gave Sharkey an advantage of 30 pounds in height and reach, entitled Mickey to the decision. Judge George Kelly voted Sharkey the award apparently on the basis of his right hand punching that gashed Walker's left eyelid in the fifth round and opened it wide in the closing session. Judge Charles F. Mathison chose the middle course and called it a draw while the Associated Press score sheet counted up the same way, with seven rounds for Walker, seven for Sharkey and one even.

But regardless of the futility of the decision, as futile as the battling itself honors for the evening swept into the lap of Walker, the 160-1-2 pounder who dared tackle Sharkey, weighing 198-1-2, out-bulldozed and out-punched him for ten rounds, and slipped back only when the embattled sailor faltered fiercely to try and save the day in the last four rounds.

Sharkey boxed slowly, cautiously, and looked ridiculous at times valiantly holding on to the little fellow who hardly came up to his chin. He fought me f his uninspired battles; his expressin rarely changing from a bored, uninterested look. Sharkey was "winging" right hand passes through most of the early rounds, missing oftener than he landed, content to let the little man force the fight and win the honors away from him. He explained afterward that he hurt the knuckles of his left hand in the first round and could not hook with that hand thereafter.

But regardless of Sharkey's inefficiency and lack of spark, Walker amazed the critics with his dogged,

firing tactics, his ability to take the big sailor's best punches when they did land, and the determined left hand socking to the body that at times had a lot to do with Sharkey's holding.

When the nominations open for the champion hard luck player of the 1931 baseball season, Remy Kremer of the Pittsburgh Pirates is in line for a good many votes.

He has been pitchin' a fairly good brand of ball, but the Pirates seldom have backed him up and as a result he is far down the National league list with only six victories against 12 defeats. So far he has pitched 100 innings and allowed 164 hits. Yesterday he suffered another setback to make it four defeats in his last five starts, three of them by one run margins. He pitched eight shutout innings against Brooklyn in the second game of yesterday's doubleheader but lost a 3-2 decision to Freddy Heimach in one bad inning, the second, when three hits and a bad throw by Traynor gave the Robins all their runs.

Pittsburgh won the first game 10-6 when the Brooklyn defense went to pieces in the sixth inning just as Joe Shaute hit a wild streak. The Pirates scored six runs on only one hit.

The Chicago Cubs furnished the real feature for the National league yesterday as they edged out Boston 5 to 4 in an eleven inning clash and climber back to third place in the standing.

John McGraw came back to the New York Giants' bench and promptly saw his team drop to fourth through a 4-3 defeat at the hands of the Cincinnati Reds.

Philadelphia and St. Louis were rained out.

With the American league race looking more and more like a cut and dried affair, the New York Yankees stepped out to grab a share of the limelight. The Yanks got only an even break with Detroit, losing the first game 3-2 as George Uhle held them to six hits and winning the second 9-5. But Babe Ruth clouted two homers and Lou Gehrig one and Ben Chapman stole his 37th base, all in the second game.

Philadelphia's Athletics increased their margin to nine full games with their ninth straight triumph. The A's landed on Mel Harder in the seventh to beat Cleveland 7-3 as Rube Walberg turned in his 14th victory of the season while Washington took a beating from the St. Louis Browns.

Deep in the second division, the Chicago White Sox and Boston Red Sox put on a good private scrap, dividing a double bill. Boston took the first game 3 to 2 while Chicago pounded out a 9 to 3 triumph in the second clash.

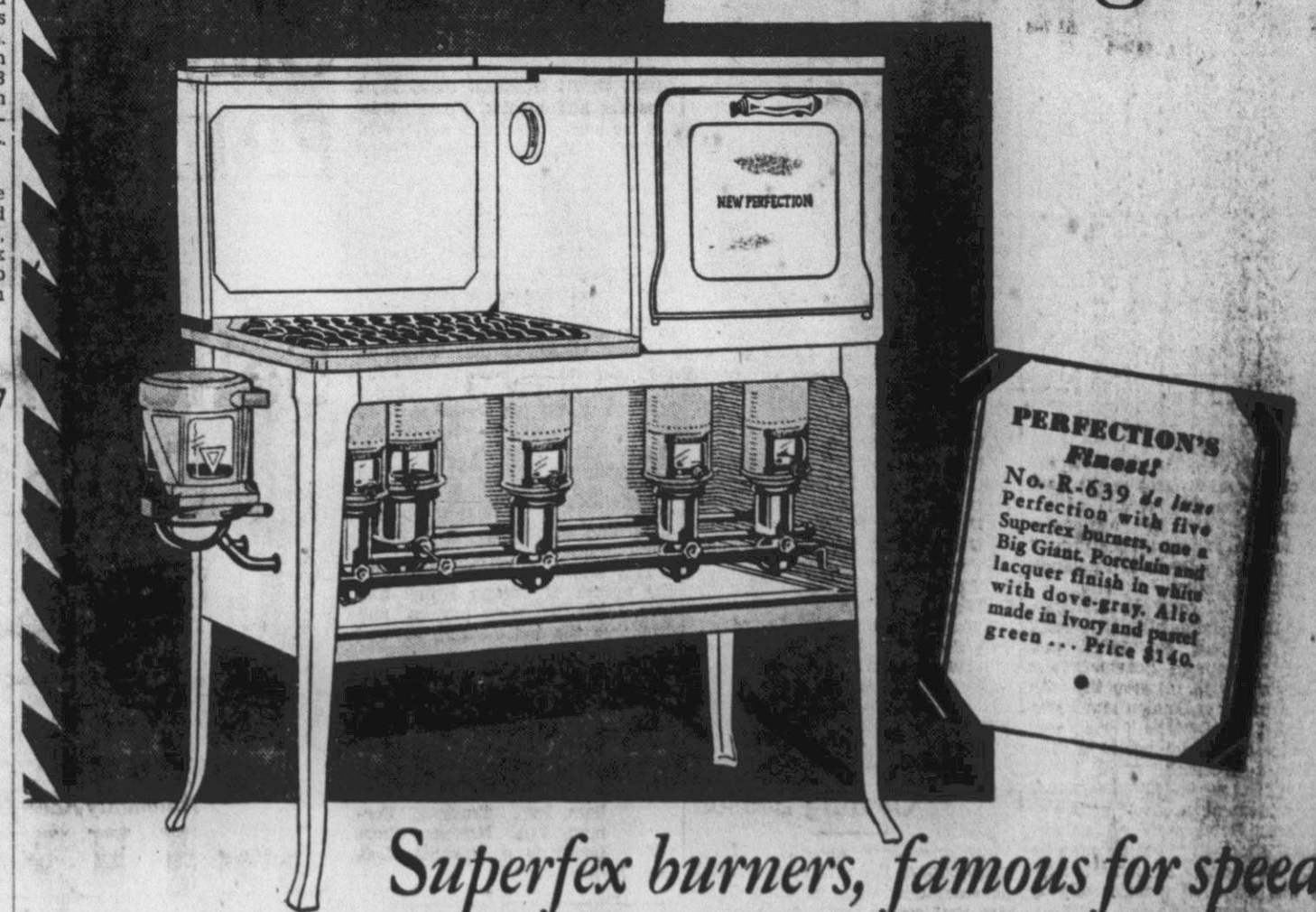

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 23.—(AP)—Whatever cheer Wall Street might have extracted from the results of the seven-power London conference was counterbalanced by the prompt increase in the Bank of England's discount rate today.

The financial markets, therefore, were left at a standstill. The stock market again all but faded out. Rather pronounced heaviness was shown for a time, in sympathy with lower closings in London and Paris but losses were partially recovered by early afternoon when a few specialties recorded small gains. Trading was so dull, however, that price movements were of little significance. Bonds were marked by further weakness of the German issue. In foreign exchanges, sterling was lifted only moderately by the higher bank rate.

Wall Street was not unprepared for the increase in the Bank of England rate, in fact was somewhat surprised when the rate was not increased a week ago.

This development was nonetheless somewhat depressing. It represented the first important reversal of the downward tendency in money rates which had been in progress since the stock market crash of late 1929.

Statements issued at the close of the conference, hinting that a basis might soon be found for further aid to Germany were mildly reassuring to Wall Street, although opinion generally leaned to the view that the conference had left the situation fundamentally unchanged with measures toward permanent rectification yet to be taken.

The European situation is still too menacing for Wall Street to turn its full attention to domestic news, but the financial community has been considerably encouraged by the second quarter earnings statements thus far appearing.
