GANG LEADER IS PRISONER IN HOSPITAL

Gus Winkler, Robber and Kidnapper, Comes to Grief in Wreck in Michigan

St. Joseph, Mich., Aug. 7.—(AP)—Gus Winkler, pal of Fred Burke, notorious killer and member of a gang accused of many killings, bank robberies and kidnappings in mid-western states, was a prisoner in a hospital today, badly injured. Officers from various cities were already here enroute in an effort to identify him with various crimes. Winkler came to grief in the same community in which Burke was sentenced. His car overturned on a highway near here last Wednesday. Winkler's skull was fractured, and a companion, identified by cards in his pockets as John B. Moran, suspected of an airplane theft in St. Louis, suffered a broken jaw.

Efforts to link Moran, who gave the name of John Glyatts of Mobile, Ala., with the Burke-Winkler gang were being made. He is also under guard at the hospital. Burke was captured a few months ago near St. Joseph, Mo., and was sentenced to life imprisonment in the Michigan branch prison at Marquette for slaying Patrolman Charles Skelly of St. Joseph, when the officer sought to arrest him for a minor traffic accident.

Winkler, whose gang is accused of obtaining bank robbery loot and ransom money totalling several million dollars, was identified, Sheriff Fred J. Cutler said, as a result of a ruse. Winkler had given the name of Jerry Kral, an airplane pilot of Chicago, but the sheriff said he got the impression from a photograph that "Kral" was Winkler and told the injured man it was useless for him to do any bluffing as his finger prints had been identified. The bluff worked. Winkler admitted his identity.

Included among the crimes of which Winkler and his associates are accused are the machine gun killings of seven Chicago "Bugs" Moran gangsters in Chicago in 1929; the gang execution of Frankie Dale in New York; the slaying of the three men in a Detroit apartment house in 1927; the killing of a policeman in a \$200,000 mail theft in Toledo; the death of an officer in a Louisville, Ky., bank robbery in 1925; various kidnappings; and the \$250,000 robbery of the Lincoln, Neb. National Bank and Trust Company last September.

County Attorney Max Towle of Lincoln was expected here and will seek to extradite Winkler to Lincoln. A warrant has already been issued there. George Timine, a Toledo, Ohio, policeman was already here to question the prisoner about the slaying of the Toledo officer, while Chicago police sought to connect him with a bank robbery at Plano, Illinois.

Officer Timine was unable to identify Winkler as the man wanted for the Toledo slaying. Winkler, conscious despite his fractured skull and jaw, was able to talk to the officers today. He said he had not "pulled a job with Fred Burke" for 12 years, and blamed "ill luck" in being linked with Burke upon a photograph once taken of the two together. Since then, he said, each of them was hunted every time the other was suspected of a crime.

While the chief interest rested in the capture of Winkler and the claims of other states upon him, efforts were made to ascertain the identity of Moran, supposedly a St. Louis gangster who gave the name of John Glyatts when arrested. He said Mobile, Ala., was his home and after Mobile authorities were notified a telegram was received here from Mrs. Katherine Glyatts of Mobile asking that word of her son's condition be forwarded.

In Moran's pockets were found an airplane pilot's license No. 18318, issued last Dec. 16 with the name Jerry J. Kral, and bearing his photograph.

Health Crowns Go To Catawba and Davidson Counties

Raleigh, Aug. 7.—(AP)—George Howard Moore, Jr., Catawba county, and Annie Ruth Raper, Davidson county, are the new health "king and queen" of 26,000 North Carolina 4-H club boys and girls. They were crowned last night at the health pageant of the annual 4-H short course at N. C. State college.

The queen is a 17-year-old brown-eyed brunette, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Draper, of Welcome. She weighs 127 pounds and is five feet seven inches tall. She scored 96.5 per cent in the finals. Young Moore, a dark-eyed chap, is 19 years old, weighs 151 pounds and is five feet seven inches tall, scoring 95.4 per cent. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. George H. Moore, of Newton.

Farm Board Considers German Offer To Buy Cotton From America

All Other Interests Put Aside As Body Gives Attention to Opportunity to Dispose of Stabilization Surpluses Acquired in Efforts to Boost American Prices; No Indication When Decision Will Be Reached Owing to Opposition From South

Washington, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The Farm Board today put aside all other interests to consider the German offer to buy cotton—its first opportunity to dispose of some of the stabilization surpluses acquired in efforts to bolster American prices. There were no indications when a decision would be reached in view of southern protests and price considerations. Some detailed conversations may be necessary to iron out these difficulties.

A loss of many millions was in prospect if the German proposal for the purchase of 800,000 bales with an option of 200,000 more is accepted. The Cotton Stabilization Corporation paid an average of \$85 a bale for the 1,300,000 bales taken from the 1929 surplus. The price for 600,000 bales would total \$51,000,000. The German offer is said to include a price range of between \$30,000,000 and \$40,000,000.

Disposal of 600,000 bales now would mean removal of almost half of the surplus which cotton traders have contended constitutes a depressing influence on the nation's cotton markets.

BATTERY TO GO TO CAMP

Local Military Unit to Leave Sunday for Fort Bragg for 15 Days Training

Battery A, local unit of 113th Field Artillery, North Carolina National Guards will leave Sunday for Fort Bragg, where they will spend fifteen days in intensive training.

The battery will leave on a special train Sunday about the noon hour and upon arrival at camp will join batteries from several other towns which make up the regiment. Friendly rivalry exists between the outfits in all fields of activities, and the men were looking forward to the period of training with much interest.

Training will consist of blackboard firing of six inch howitzers and actual firing in the field. The entire regiment will go into the field and make camp and put into practice the training secured at home stations.

Battery A was organized five years ago and at this time has reached a high state of efficiency. It has passed all tests in a very creditable way and the record is a matter of pride to the citizenship as well as to the officers.

The unit is comprised of 65 enlisted men and four officers. The men represent virtually every section of the county, making the unit county-wide in its representation.

In connection with the battery, Captain Ramsey Campbell, of U. S. Army, is stationed in Greenville as instructor. Sergeant Leamy, his assistant, is also located here.

In addition to its military activities, the unit takes a prominent place from a financial viewpoint. The battery spends \$16,000 annually in the city and community, and virtually every branch of business is affected by the payroll.

Officers of the company are: J. C. Lanier, captain; J. H. Waldrop, first lieutenant; C. W. Porter and W. S. Tyson, second lieutenants.

Both officers and men have extended to relatives and friends an invitation to visit them at camp and in that way get some idea of the way summer encampments are conducted.

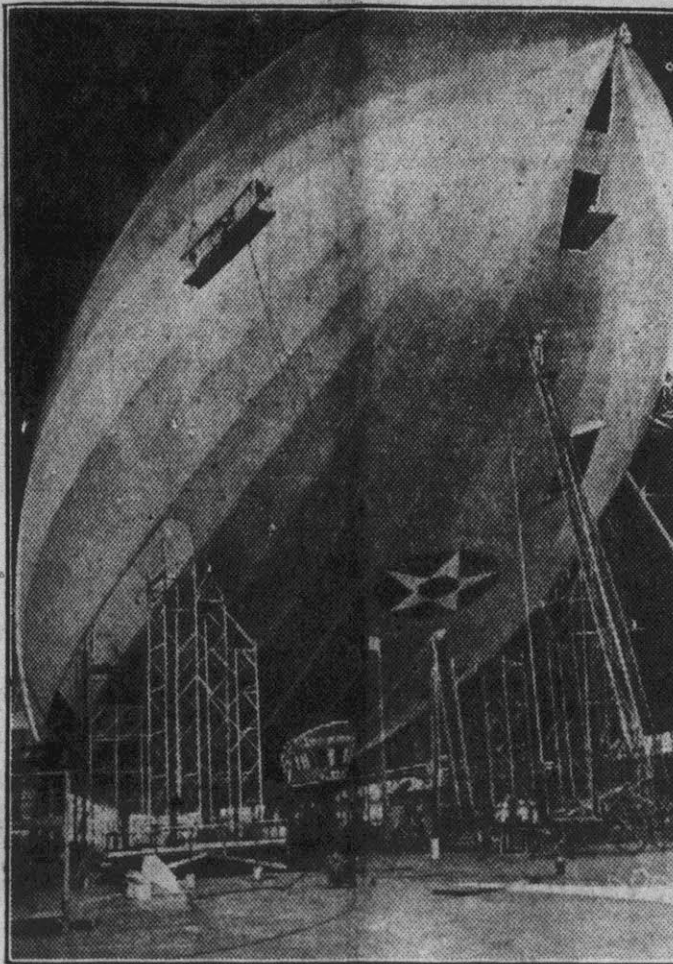
Prices Drop On Border Markets

Lower prices ruled on the North Carolina border belt tobacco markets today as the poorer grades showed the average down on many floors.

Clarkson was one of the few markets where the price average ranged higher than yesterday. Approximately 26,000 pounds were sold there at an average of 8.50 cents a pound as compared with yesterday's average of 7.43 for 15,678 pounds.

Official reports from Whiteville showed sales aggregating 74,046 pounds at an average of 5.60. Chadbourne reported an extremely light break with prices on a level with those paid yesterday. Lumberton leaf was selling at around 8 cents. The price yesterday was 8.47. An Official report for the first three days of the season issued at Fair Bluff, showed an average of 6.60 for 114,956 pounds sold there.

URGES SENSE FOR BEAUTY

Atty.-Gen. Brummitt Addresses Graduates of Wake Forest Summer School

Wake Forest, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Urging the graduate to "seek the sources of a more satisfying content," Dennis G. Brummitt of Raleigh, attorney general, told the graduating class of the Wake Forest college summer school today to call to their aid "a sense of beauty and the glamour of romance."

Twenty-three students were awarded degrees. For the first time in the history of the college summer school degrees were given women three daughters of Wake Forest professors winning them.

Mr. Brummitt discussed the "older, but better values" as he outlined to the graduating class that the world has been made over by the "power age" in which "the machine has opened new and vast fields of labor to the industry of the worker" and yet leaves 6,000,000 out of employment, thus producing poverty instead of prosperity in a land of plenty.

The graduates were asked to appraise the world in which they live. They were urged to go beside the gurgling waters of a brook, listen to the bird talk; forget the roadhouse, the card party and social engagement. You will get a better philosophy of life than the rush and hurry of the daily grind have brought you," Mr. Brummitt said.

"No civilization," he continued, "has been harsher to a generation than we are to the present younger one. Somehow, something must be supplied to compensate for their easy engrossment in other and lower attractions now that there is no longer the necessity for pioneering and the machine has destroyed the necessity and joy of craftsmanship."

Aldermen Adopt Part Of City's Budget At Lengthy Session Here

School Budget Not Considered Owing to Fact That State Allotments Have Not Been Made; Tax Rate to Be Decided On Later; Tentative General Expense Fund Budget Adopted Providing Cuts in Virtually Every Department of Government

This business of dealing with budgets isn't what it is cracked up to be, and nobody knows it better than members of the Board of Aldermen who wrestled with the general expense budget until about one o'clock last night and then recessed until some future early date. It was one of the longest sessions the aldermen have sat through in years, but when it was over they had the consolation of knowing they had virtually completed a part of the budget and cleared the way for consideration of the remainder. The school budget was not taken up owing to the fact that the State has not yet completed allotments to the various cities and counties of the state and it will be impossible for the aldermen to arrive at any definite decision until this has been done. Fixing of the tax rate was also left until a forthcoming meeting.

The budget tentatively adopted last night provides for appreciable reductions in almost every branch of government. Salaries of all city employees were reduced and appropriations were hewed down wherever hewing was possible. It was probably one of the most widespread paring down of expenses the city has experienced in years, but it is not expected to bring about any impairment of administration of government.

The total amount of the budget, covering only the general expense fund, was estimated at \$73,800.58. Tacked on to this was provision for payment of \$10,000 borrowed money and an overdraft of \$9,031.25 deficits resulting from poor tax collections last year. The budget covering this phase of operation last year was \$86,702.23.

Besides adoption of the budget the aldermen considered numbers of matters affecting a wide range of activities of the community.

During the reading of reports of the various city departments, Alderman Boyd expressed his appreciation of the complete report of police and city court activities presented by Mayor R. C. Flanagan and Chief of Police George Clark. He declared the report was the most informative ever submitted and recommended it be read.

TEXAS WILL CLOSE WELLS

Operators Vote to Follow the Oil Well Movement Started in Oklahoma

Tyler, Tex., Aug. 7.—(AP)—Oklahoma's oil shutdown movement has penetrated to the heart of the East Texas oil fields and won the endorsement of 37 of 60 operators in the area.

The 37 operators voted at a meeting here yesterday to voluntarily shut down their wells and asked that a mass meeting be held here August 14, at which time the order would be officially declared. East Texas operators offering oil to Oklahoma refineries while national guardsmen patrolled that state's producing areas were denounced. They were charged with "nullifying the efforts" of Governor W. H. Murray, who is seeking by martial law, to increase the prices for crude oil from a top of 50 cents to a minimum of \$1.

By resolution the operators expressed admiration for Gov. Murray and eulogized his "masterful and courageous" action in handling the oil situation in Oklahoma. "It is regrettable indeed that the fine character of leadership and courage has not been shown in Texas," the resolution said. A copy went to the Oklahoma chief executive's office.

On account of the embryonic form of the shutdown movement, observers said they could not immediately estimate the number of wells and percentage of production affected.

PLANE SEIZED BY JAPANESE

Pangborn and Herndon Run Into Difficulties Upon Arrival At City of Tokyo

Tokyo, Aug. 7.—(AP)—International complications arose today over the landing here of Clyde Pangborn and Hugh Herndon, Jr., American airmen, and a flight of three United States naval aviators over Japanese fortifications.

The problem created by the landing of Pangborn and Herndon without permit and the subsequent discovery of a camera in their airplane was discussed by officials of the home, foreign, navy, war, and communications departments of the Japanese government.

Some officials were reported to favor leniency toward the American airmen, while others thought some form of punishment should be administered in view of a recent incident involving three United States navy fliers from the fleet off Chefoo.

Darien newspapers asserted the American navy airmen flew over the Kwangtung fortifications and took photographs. The newspapers stated the American admiral offered an explanation to the Japanese consul at Tsingtau that the fliers, who had been cruising, had become lost.

The Japanese, the newspaper said, did not consider the explanation sufficient and the American consul at Darien was reported to have asked Washington for instructions regarding the incident.

Tokyo, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Clyde Pangborn and Hugh Herndon, Jr., made plans today for a non-stop flight to Seattle despite the fact their big red monoplane was under lock and key at the Ministry of Communications hangar at Tachikawa Airfield near here.

"We are undecided yet as to when we will take off," Pangborn said, "but we may wait here until the arrival of Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh. However, we may start next week."

Pangborn said he based his statement on the assumption that their difficulties with the Japanese Aviation Bureau resulting from their failure to obtain a permit to land in Japan soon would be straightened out. This belief was shared by officials of the Ministry of Communications.

A moving picture camera was at the bottom of the fliers' trouble. When Pangborn and Herndon took off from Khabarovsk, Siberia, they had no permit to land in Japan. The American embassy here filed application for a permit in their behalf.

Japanese authorities announced they would consider the circumstances and not be technical. Discovery of the camera in the plane on the fliers' arrival here, however, gave the situation a serious aspect, especially in view of the fact Pangborn and Herndon were said to have flown over fortified areas.

The fliers arrived at Tachikawa at 6:18 p. m. yesterday, just an hour after the landing of Amy Johnson, British girl flier, from London. Miss Johnson and a mechanic, C. B. Humphries, made the flight from England in easy stages.

FIGURES PLAY LEADING ROLE IN LEA TRIAL

Former Central Bank Bookkeeper Returns to Stand to Identify Bank Records

Asheville, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Figure after figure relating to transactions between Col. Luke Lea, Tennessee publisher, and the Central Bank and Trust Company here, were entered in court records today as trial of the \$1,300,000 fraud case entered its eleventh day.

N. Y. Payne, Central bank bookkeeper, returned to the witness stand and began identifying ledger entries and cashiers checks totalling hundreds of thousands of dollars which state attorneys said were related to one count of less indictment, which alleges gigantic "kiting" operations.

Wallace B. Davis, president of the bank before it failed last fall; Luke Lea, Jr., and E. P. Charlet, the latter two officials of the elder Lea's publishing company, are co-defendants.

The bill of indictment charges two distinct offenses—conspiracy to defraud the central bank and with the actual misapplication of approximately \$1,300,000 to Colonel Lea's benefit.

Payne today told of the issuance October 22, 1930, of \$110,000 worth of Central bank cashier's checks made payable in blank.

The state had tried to trace this issue to Colonel Lea by previous witnesses and today Payne said the Tennessee name late was inserted as payee.

D. L. M. Battle, who testified earlier in the week, had partially identified the issue of checks, eight in number, as having been delivered by him to Luke Lea, Jr., in Nashville.

The state introduced one cashier's check for \$10,000 drawn payable to Colonel Lea, and endorsed by Luke Lea, Jr. This was dated October 25, but was entered on the bank books as issued October 27.

Its relation to the case was not explained. Battle said he took to Colonel Lea, October 30, totaling \$326,000. Of these, five totaling \$80,000, were made payable to Lea; two, for \$32,000, were payable to the Memphis Commercial Appeal; one, for \$35,000, was payable to the Hermitage National Bank; three, for \$40,000, payable to the Liberty Bank and Trust Company of Nashville; two, for \$50,000, payable to the Bank of Tennessee; and two, for \$50,000, were payable to Caldwell & Company.

Battle had testified he did not deliver, but brought back to Asheville, the checks payable to the Bank of Tennessee and Caldwell & Company.

He said he left a check for \$50,000 with another Central bank employee in Nashville but did not deliver it himself and does not know whether it was ever delivered.

This \$50,000 check is one of the trial's mysteries. Battle said J. Charles Bradford, former cashier of the Central Bank, instructed him not to deliver it to Colonel Lea unless it was specifically requested and then to pretend the check had been mislaid while he telephoned back to the bank for further instructions.

Cramer Lands At Reykjavik On His Way to Copenhagen

Reykjavik, Iceland Aug. 7.—(AP)—Parker Cramer, American flier, landed here early this morning from Angmagssalik, Greenland, on his way to Copenhagen to map a trans-Arctic air mail route from the United States.

Cramer refueled his airplane and awaited weather reports from the Faroe Islands, planning to continue his journey today.

After moving his plane into the harbor for refueling and having a short sleep, Cramer related the experiences of his unnamed flight, news of which first became known when he landed in Greenland.

"I left Detroit nine days ago," he told the Associated Press, "and experienced good weather all the way except for one bad day at Hudson's Bay. I arrived at Khatulnburg, on the west coast of Greenland Tuesday and on Wednesday crossed the Greenland ice-cap to Angmagssalik in five hours, flying at an altitude of 9,000 feet. The glorious views over the sun illuminated snow fields will certainly be a great tourist attraction in the future."

After a good breakfast Cramer awaited weather reports from the Faroe Islands. The weather here was excellent, being calm and clear. It is about 450 miles from Reykjavik to the Faroe Islands.

Raleigh and asked for an inter-

Wilmington, Aug. 7.—(AP)—A
stock company to operate ships be-
tween Wilmington and northern
ports and to extend cheap trans-
portation service to the interior of
North Carolina had been launched
here today.

Stockholders in the new enter-

boat line, which is expected to

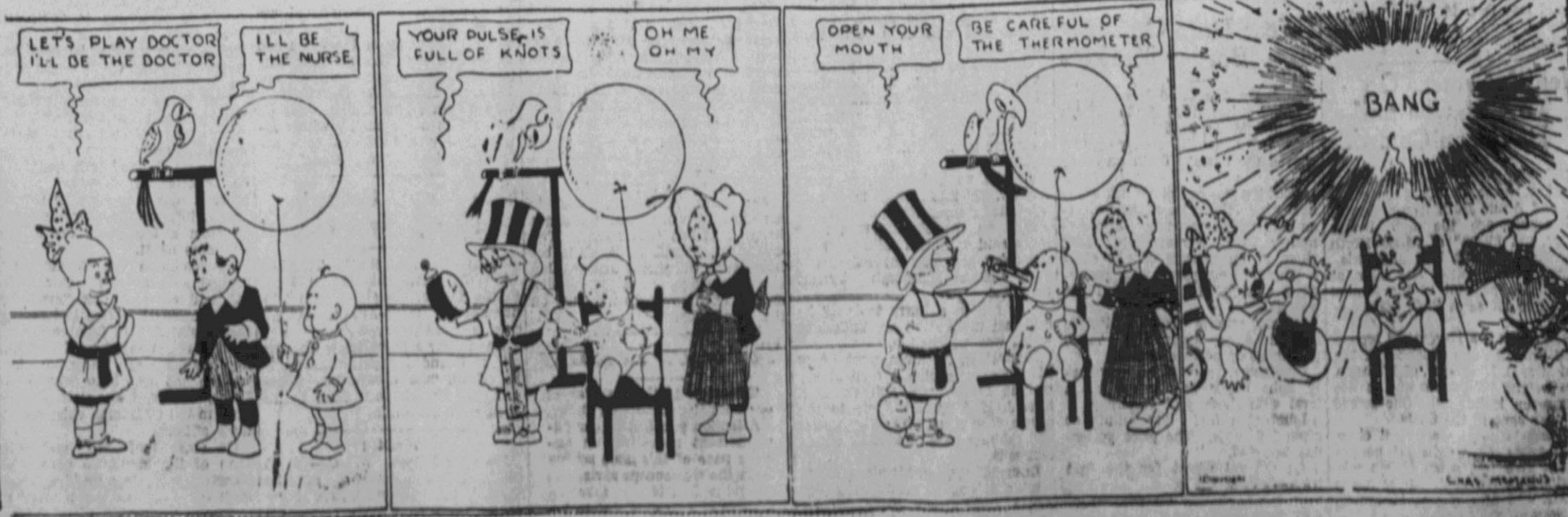

New Navy Airship to Make Flight In About 3 Weeks

Akron, Ohio, Aug. 7.—(AP)—When Mrs. Herbert Hoover, wife of the President, christens the new dirigible Akron tomorrow the ship will be "air born" or floated, corresponding to the launching of an ocean vessel, but the task of actual flight is expected to come in about three weeks.

Actual flight will require all the knowledge of lighter-than-air craft that has been accumulated since 1783 when the Montgolfier brothers in France sent the first balloon aloft in the village of Annonay.

It is no small task to guide a structure longer than a 50-story skyscraper and higher than an 11-story building against capricious wind currents and sudden changes in temperature. For this reason Lt. Commander Charles E. Rosendahl, who will be captain of the dirigible

and his officers are here busily engaged training the crew to the work of the ship.

Tow well the contractor has performed the task of construction is something for the naval board of inspection to decide. Five trial flights of the ship are planned, the last one of 48 hours duration. According to David S. Ingalls, assistant secretary of the navy for aeronautics, the ship must be in the air at least 75 hours before the navy accepts it.

The ship must be tested for speed; it must go through altitude trials; tests must be made upon the rapidity with which it can be on speed and slow down; her lift will be measured; interior ventilation and pressure equalization studied; fuel consumption determined; and internal strains and deflections observed.

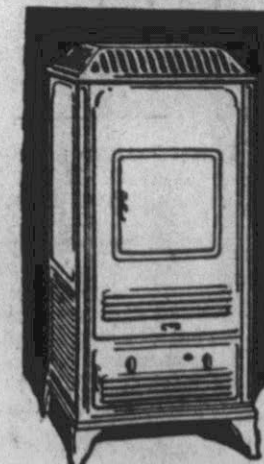

STOCK MARKET

critic senators, include demands that if any stabilization cotton is sold an equal amount be purchased from the current crop to replace it. They are strenuously opposed to supplying markets with surplus cotton in competition with cotton raised this year.

Chairman Stone said yesterday that he did not favor replacement of the cotton.

The New Orleans cotton exchange is reported to have wired President Hoover opposing the proposed sale. Senator Harris of Georgia also has filed a number of protests with the chief executive. In view of these protests, the board may consider it advisable to consult with the President before reaching a final conclusion.

The board continued today to withhold information as to the exact terms of the German proposal. A protest was also received by the Agriculture Department from the Havre cotton exchange of France against the proposed cotton sale. The protest was forwarded by the department to the Farm Board.

So far as is known, this is the first foreign protest received. Carl Williams, cotton member of the board, said yesterday no foreign governments had entered objections on the grounds of dumping.

The Havre cotton exchange is a firm of importers and dealers buying and selling on the world market.

BEES FACING THREAT FROM QUEEN CITY

Charlotte, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The Charlotte Bees faced a dangerous threat today as the Greensboro nine came to the Queen City for a three-game week-end stand.

One of two things must happen. The long winning streak of the Pats will be broken, or the league-leading Hornets will get a big jolt in their spread-eagle drive toward the pennant.

For the last week and a half, the Pats have mowed a wide swath through the old cigarette circle. They smashed out seven runs in the sixth inning last night on the home lot to down Winston, 9 to 6, for their tenth win in a row.

Murder Trial Nearing Close

Greensboro, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The murder trial of Mrs. Leona Wuensch, who claims that L. L. Krippner harrassed her until she lost reason and shot him to death at her home, today neared the jury stage.

After the defendant had taken the stand to give her version of the shooting, the defense announced little additional evidence remained to be presented and the case probably would reach the jury today.

Mrs. Wuensch, 41-year-old native of Austria-Hungary said Krippner had forced his attentions upon her and used threats to prevent her telling her husband.

Worry together with after effects of an injury to the head suffered in childhood so unbalanced her reason she said, until one night she took a pistol and went out on the porch with the intention of killing herself. She decided instead, she testified, to kill Krippner and shot him as he appeared at the edge of the porch.

Expert testimony was introduced to support Mrs. Wuensch's claim that she was temporarily insane when she fatally wounded Krippner.

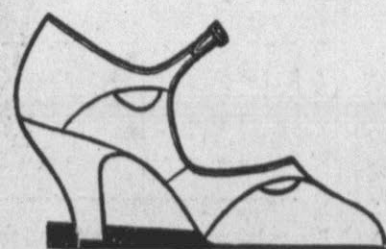

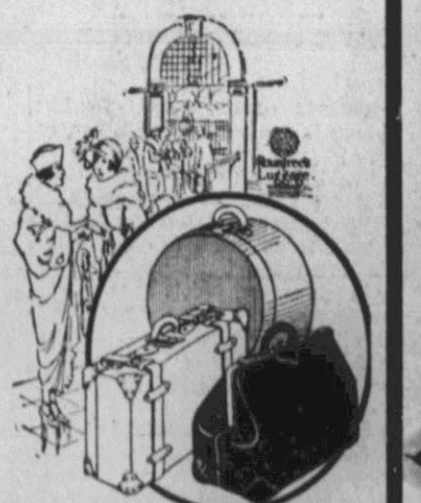
