LINDBERGH FORCED DOWN BY HEAVY FOG

Famous Flier and Wife Land on Sewall Peninsula, 75 Miles From Nome.

Seattle, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The Nome radio station established contact today with the Lindbergh plane down on the northern coast of Seward peninsula, about 100 miles from Nome, and advised a landing on the Snake river at Nome, the naval radio station at Bremerton was informed.

"I hear you O. K. Do you want information? Sea landing unsafe. River landing O. K." the Nome station radioed the Lindbergh plane. The message was picked up by naval radio stations in Alaska and relayed to Bremerton by Cordova, Alaska at 8:45 a. m.

Previously the naval radio stations had heard the Nome station advise Barrow "I can't get her at all."

Nome, Alaska, Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh landed on the north coast of the Seward Peninsula about 11 p. m. last night (8 a. m. EST today) after leaving Point Barrow at 11:53 p. m. EST.

Messages received here did not give the exact location of the landing place but indicated it was somewhere on Kotzebue sound, hence the flying couple fell short of Nome, their immediate destination, about 75 miles. Nome is on the south coast of the Seward Peninsula.

Advices said the Lindberghs planned to come here in the daylight. Contact was made with the Lindbergh ship at about 10 p. m. and the radio station here was asked by Mrs. Lindbergh to have flares and bonfires ready on the beach for a landing around midnight.

The landing evidently was made with heavy fog enveloped the district over which they were flying, causing the famous pair to change their plans.

The Lindberghs left Point Barrow last night after weather reports there indicated clearing skies and the end of rain which had been falling for two days.

About two hours after they left Point Barrow on the 523 mile hop to this town, fog began to settle here.

Although first information did not give the cause of the landing, it was believed here that the fog had extended up the coast and they came down rather than risk coming into a heavier bank later.

Within an hour after the Flying Colonel lifted his trim ship from the jagged nose Point Barrow, leaving behind the most northerly point on their tour to the Orient, he was reported passing over the coast guard cutter Northland at Wainwright, 80 miles southwest of Point Barrow.

At about the same time Mrs. Lindbergh messaged from the plane that all was "o.k."

TWO ARRESTED FOR SLAYING

Alleged Rum-Runners Held in Connection With Death of Coast Guardsman

Raleigh, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Sheriff R. B. Lane of Craven county was expected to arrive in Raleigh between 3 and 4 o'clock this afternoon to question two alleged rum-runners held on a "blanket charge" of murder in connection with the slaying of John F. Peel, 38-year-old Pamlico coast guardsman.

The sheriff said he planned to leave New Bern at about noon and drive to Raleigh. He expects to take Lawrence Gatlin, 35, member of a well-known Raleigh family, and Richard Eubanks, also of Raleigh, back to New Bern with him.

Claude Scott, whom Sheriff Lane also asked local officers to arrest in connection with the case, had not been apprehended today though he was reported to have been seen in Durham county yesterday. The sheriff described the three men as rum-runners operating out of New Bern.

Raleigh, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Two alleged rum-runners were held today on a blanket charge of murder while another was sought on the same charge in connection with the midnight slaying of John F. Peel, 38-year-old Pamlico coast guardsman.

Lawrence Gatlin, 35, said to be a member of a prominent Raleigh family, and Richard Eubanks, 41, also of Raleigh, were arrested here yesterday at the request of Sheriff R. B. Lane of Craven county.

Sheriff Lane also asked that Claude Scott be arrested but local officers last night had been unable to locate him. Sheriff Lane described the three as rum-runners.

He said he would come here today to return Gatlin and Eubank to New Bern where Mary Cannon, 22-year-old girl, held as a material witness, will attempt to identify them as two of three men she said were involved in the slaying.

Peel was killed about midnight last Friday while he was riding on the Morehead highway, near New Bern, with Miss Cannon, who lives in New Bern.

The girl said a man Peel picked up at a filling station shot him when he refused to stop the car for her and the stranger to get out. She said two other men she and Peel had seen at the filling station then drove up in an automobile and the stranger rode off with them.

Sheriff Lane last night told Raleigh officers he did not believe Alen "Devil" Oglesby of Durham, arrested and taken to New Bern, was involved in the slaying.

The Cannon girl was unable positively to identify Oglesby, although she said "He looks like the man," who shot Peel.

JOIN FIGHT FOR HIGHER OIL PRICES

Texas and Kansas Signify Intention To Join Oklahoma Price Crusade.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Two neighboring oil states, Texas and Kansas, today had joined Gov. William H. Murray of Oklahoma in his ultimatum to refiners that the price of crude petroleum must rise.

Forty-eight hours after the defeat of the state administration oil emergency legislative program in the senate here, Gov. Ross S. Sterling issued a statement which was generally construed to mean he would join Oklahoma in its week-old martial law shutdown movement if the legislature did not vote oil relief he considered necessary at its special session. The special session is to close tomorrow.

In Kansas, purchasers of oil had been given notice by the Public Service Commission a hearing would be ordered to determine the nature and extent of a shutdown order for the state unless the price was advanced this week to at least 60 cents a barrel.

Governor Murray demanded a \$1 minimum. The mid-continent oil field top price is 52 cents.

HOPE WANES FOR FLIERS

Searchers Fail To Find Any Trace of Cramer and Radio Operator

Copenhagen, Denmark, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Parker Cramer, American airman, and his radio operator, lost since Sunday on a flight between the Shetland Islands and Copenhagen, still were missing today and hope for their safety waned.

Danish authorities were of the opinion they might have come down to a forced landing on the waves and been blown out to sea by a storm which has been raging over the North Sea for several days. The regular air mail service over that stretch has been suspended because of the weather.

Captain Riis Larsen, Arctic flier, said they might have been forced to the south by the storm and drifted out to open sea where it would be difficult to locate them. The waer was reported to be choppy, and the wind high.

A squadron of Danish seaplanes, aided by several vessels, searched the Kattegat from the southern tip of Norway to Copenhagen yesterday and another flotilla of Norwegian planes scanned the Skagerrak Sea from Oslo to the north, but no clues were found.

Cramer and Oliver Paquette left Detroit, Mich., several weeks ago without announcing their destination and flew across Canada to Greenland to chart an air mail route from America to Europe.

Hopping to the Faroe Islands and the Shetland Islands, they left for Copenhagen Sunday morning and were last heard from that afternoon.

Bergen, Norway, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Hopes of finding the American fliers, Cramer and Paquette, faded today when three naval seaplanes returned from several hours search of the southwest coastline without sighting the missing plane.

EXPORTERS OF COAL OPPOSE HIGHER RATES

Join National Grange In Fight on 15 Percent Increase in Freight Rates.

Washington, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Coal exporters today joined western state regulatory commissions and the National Grange in opposition to the railroads' proposal for a 15 per cent increase in the freight rates.

William T. Coe, Consolidation Coal Company, New York City; Charles W. Hendley, of Baltimore, and A. C. Davis, foreign manager of the Berwind-White Coal Mining Company of New York City, told the commission a rate raise would destroy the coal export trade.

The opposition of six middle western state regulatory commissions and the grange was given at a resumption of the rate increase hearings yesterday.

Besides the three individual coal exporters, Arthur Hale, representing the Coal Exporters Association of the United States, requested the commission not to grant higher rates on coal shipped to tidewater for export overseas and to the West Indies.

Hale said the exporters believed the export trade would be ruined and railroad revenues reduced by rates were advanced his company a rate raise. He testified if freight would be compelled to discontinue the sale of coal abroad. The company's chief competitors in Germany and Poland have already been aided by railroad rates, he said.

Hendley said increased rates would eliminate his company from foreign business and destroy a trade built up through many years. Similar testimony was given by Davies who said his company would have to obtain its coal from abroad, if freight rates in this country were advanced.

LAUNCH DRIVE FOR MEMBERS

Committee Named To Canvass For Members in Proposed Commerce Chamber

A committee to canvass for members in the proposed chamber of commerce for this city was appointed at a meeting at the court house here last night.

It is composed of the following: Herbert ReBarker, J. B. James, Dr. Tom Watson, Alfred Schultz, E. G. Flanagan, J. S. Picklen, Guy V. Smith, Rev. E. L. Hillman, Claude Gaskins, W. S. Brown and Mr. Carraway.

Another committee composed of Dr. R. H. Wright, S. T. White and Dr. Tom Watson was named to meet with members of the membership committee one day this week and fully outline the canvass.

Due to the thunderstorm during the early part of the evening, only a small crowd attended the gathering last night, but the few who braved the elements exhibited much interest in the project and declared the proposed chamber of commerce absolutely essential to the future welfare of the city.

Dr. R. H. Wright served as chairman and asked S. T. White to act as chairman of the committee of three to meet with the regular membership committee.

As soon as the membership campaign has been completed, organization will be perfected and the chamber will begin functioning immediately, according to present plans.

CUBA IN GRIP OF MARTIAL LAW

Strict Censorship Prevails as Government Attempts to Put Down Revolution.

Havana, Aug. 11.—(AP)—All Cuba was in the grip of martial law today and strict censorship prevailed as the government struggled to put down a revolutionary movement which was spreading throughout the island.

President Gerardo Machado, acting on authority granted him by Congress, suspended constitutional privileges in all the provinces, signing a decree which recognized that the situation was serious.

"Political elements hostile to the government, in accord with enemies of the present social system," he said, "have lent greater activity to their campaign against the public peace, realizing in various sections of rebellion of armed forces in a frank revolutionary attitude."

A clash between government troops and rebels was reported to be imminent in the Guanabacoa section on the outskirts of Havana where the Loyalists had surrounded a band of insurgents and were preparing to attack.

Nine revolutionists and one rural guard officer were believed to have been killed and six others wounded in a sharp engagement in Guanabacoa last night. Another skirmish took place at San Nicolas where federal forces captured five prisoners and wounded one.

Former President Mario G. Menocal, with two of his aides, was reported to have landed on the north coast of Oriente province, long a hotbed of intrigue, with the intention of assuming leadership of the insurgent forces. He has been sought by the government since the movement started Sunday.

A manifesto, purporting to come from Menocal, was distributed in Havana. It called on all Cubans to join in striking "one blow of strength, magnitude and swiftness" to unseat the Machado regime, which was denounced in scathing terms.

Probe Bombing of Miner's Residence

Wheeling, W. Va., Aug. 11.—(AP)—The bombing of another miner's home was under investigation of West Virginia authorities today.

An explosion wrecked the front of the home of Charles Hricolak, an employee of the Constanza Coal Company at Warwood, last night.

Hricolak, his wife and two children and two boarders were asleep at the time. Mr. Hricolak and one of the boarders suffered minor injuries.

Hricolak joined the bituminous coal strikers several weeks ago, but returned to work recently, police said.

FOUR PERSONS KILLED AND CAR SET FIRE

Bodies of Victims Found in Burned Automobile in Michigan Today.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Bodies of four persons, all believed to have been slain, were found burned in an automobile on a road near Willis early today.

The victims were tentatively identified as Thomas Wheatley 16, of near Detroit; Harry Lore, also about 16, of Ypsilanti; Vivian Gould and Anna Harris.

Miss Gould and Miss Harris, both of Cleveland, were visiting at the Lore home in Ypsilanti.

The bodies were identified by Harry Wheatley, father of Thomas, who recognized two keys found in the car as belonging to his son. He also identified a belt buckle worn by Lore.

The car belong to Mr. Wheatley. The boys left home Monday night to attend a dance in Ypsilanti, Wheatley said. It was not determined where they had met the two girls.

State police said they believed the young people were slain and then the automobile set afire.

The officers were working on a theory that the young people were victims of robbers.

A farmer discovered the automobile. The four bodies were in the rear seat. The officers said their position indicated that they were placed there after the victims were either killed or mortally wounded.

A farmer living near the scene reported hearing an automobile speed past his home a half hour before the bodies were found.

Deputies said that automobile tire tracks nearby indicated that a second automobile had been driven to the scene.

Miss Gould and Miss Harris had been visiting in Ypsilanti for two or three days. The former was 15 years old and the latter 17.

The officers learned that young Wheatley had called at Lore's home about 7 o'clock last night and that the two boys and girls left a few minutes later, saying they were going to a moving picture show. The girls were said to be Lore's cousins.

The mother of the Lore boy who is an employee in a Ypsilanti garment factory, said she brought the girls back from Cleveland last Saturday.

A search of the ground near the burned automobile revealed a woman's slipper which was purchased in a Cleveland department store, and a watch belonging to one of the boys. The watch had stopped at 5:06 a. m.

W. C. FAUCETTE PASSES AWAY

Former County Commissioner Dies at Home Near Grimesland; Burial Tomorrow.

William C. Faucette, 56, former county commissioner and prominent planter, died last night at 11 o'clock at his home near Grimesland. Funeral services will be conducted at the home tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock by Rev. Stephen Gardner, of Washington, immediately following which the funeral cortege will leave for Lebanon church, Durham county, for the final rites and interment.

Mr. Faucette was born in Hillsboro, Orange county, April 18, 1863. He had been making his home in this county the last 31 years.

He was married twice. The first time to Miss Louise Grist, of Beaufort county, and the second time to Miss Nellie Whitley, of Washington, both of whom preceded him to the grave.

For many years he was a member of the Primitive Baptist church, was an active member of the Masonic order, had served the county in the capacity as county commissioner and was prominently identified with the progress of his community and county.

He is survived by a daughter, Miss Louise Faucette, of Philadelphia; a sister, Mrs. G. S. Essick, of Philadelphia; five brothers, Clarence, of Canada, Edward, Holt, Walter and James of this county.

OWENS STICKS TO TESTIMONY IN LEA TRIAL

Three Others Give Testimony Regarding Letters Received By Defunct Bank.

Asheville, Aug. 11.—(AP)—S. G. Owens, former collections teller for the Central Bank & Trust Company here, who took the stand last Friday in the bank fraud trial involving Col. Luke Lea of Tennessee, and three others, resumed testifying today as the trial entered its fourteenth day.

He was cross-examined by Giles L. Evans for Lea and R. B. Williams for Wallace B. Davis, former president of the defunct bank, another defendant. Others indicted are Luke Lea Jr., and E. P. Christ of Nashville.

Evans and Williams sought to show Owens' lack of familiarity with letters which passed between Lea and Davis about which he testified yesterday. Owens insisted he had not testified about anything with which he was not familiar.

The defendants are charged with conspiring to defraud the Central bank of approximately \$1,300,000. Owens was dismissed after spending a total of 12 hours on the stand. He was followed by L. L. Lance, a runner for the bank, who told of the bank's method of handling out-going mail.

Lance said on cross-examination that Davis was absent from the bank for days at a time and that during those periods the other bank officers could have handled his mail without Davis ever seeing it.

M. D. Johnson, former assistant cashier of the Liberty Bank and Trust Company, Nashville, followed Lance to the stand.

Johnson took with him a stack of records of the Nashville bank. Johnson produced the original records of Colonel Lea's transactions with the Liberty bank, also ledger sheets of the bank's accounts with the Central here.

The Lea-Liberty-Central transactions also figure in indictments returned against the elder Lea and four others by a Tennessee grand jury. They allege a conspiracy to defraud the Liberty bank of \$150,000.

Johnson said on September 23, 1930, Lea brought him \$200,000 worth of the Central bank's certificates of deposit payable to and endorsed by R. B. Moseley.

The Liberty Bank discounted the certificates, Johnson said, and credited the proceeds to Lea's account.

He identified a series of certificates issued by the Central September 23 and which have figured prominently in the trial as being the same as those discounted for Lea in Nashville, and produced the Liberty Bank's deposit slips showing completion of the transaction.

Johnson said Lea paid the money over to the Liberty Bank on his indebtedness to it.

Notes paid by Lea with the \$200,000, Johnson said, were: One of Luke Lea, Sr. for \$14,000; one of Clarence Saunders for \$5,000; one of Central Properties for \$12,280; one of West End Utilities for \$10,000; one of National Investment Trust, Inc. for \$6,000; two of Luke Lea, Jr. for \$17,000; and one of the Tennessee Publishing Company for \$11,604.

All of these notes make up the \$200,000 which Johnson said Lea borrowed from the Central Bank in 1930, and which he testified yesterday by S. G. Owens, former collections teller at the bank.

Another issue of Central certificates dated September 27 later was substituted for \$50,000 worth of the \$200,000, Johnson said.

Johnson said a large portion of the Liberty Bank's account with the Central was through deposits by Colonel Lea.

Ask Police to Help Enforce Sanitary Law Ayden, Bethel

In an effort to improve public health conditions, the Department of Health yesterday morning called on the chiefs of police of the towns of Ayden and Bethel to help in the enforcement of state sanitary laws.

The step was taken with a view of bringing about a general improvement of the sanitary condition of the two communities, it was said.

The county has been without a sanitary officer since the state official completed his work here last winter, and the work of preserving sanitation in the towns has been left entirely in the hands of members of the police department.

The police have a legal right to enforce general sanitary laws, it was stated this morning, and hope was expressed they would aid in the movement to improve health conditions of their respective localities.

Train Hits Auto, Seven Are Dead

Chicago, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Seven people were killed last night when a Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific passenger train demolished an automobile at a suburban railroad crossing.

The dead: Bruno Woods, 23; his wife, Helen, 22, and their six-months old child, David, all of Chicago.

James J. Rutowski, 29; his wife, Martha, 29, and of Mrs. Woods; their children, Henry, 16, and Dolores, 7, all of Milwaukee.

Submarine Nautilus Adrift In Arctic Seas

Tromsø, Norway, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The submarine Nautilus in which Sir Hubert Wilkins set out to reach the North Pole under the ice, today was reported a drift in the Arctic seas with engine trouble.

The report said the mechanical difficulty was of a nature which could not be repaired by the crew. The trouble developed soon after the submarine left Tromsø yesterday for Spitzbergen.

There was no way of knowing here what the trouble was, but the crew was reported to have worked all night attempting repairs. As the Nautilus has no anchor suitable for use in these waters, she drifted with the current while the crew worked.

Germany Celebrates Founding of Republic

Berlin, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Germany, confident that her financial and political troubles had been solved, celebrated today the twelfth anniversary of the founding of the republic.

ABOUT TOWN

Operation of the Westbrook
swimming pool has brought about a
decided reduction of crime among
the juvenile element of the city, in
the opinion of men closely in touch
with the situation.

The swimming pool has provided
a place of entertainment for
youngsters and something to occupy
their minds has kept them from
committing minor criminal offenses.
Last summer several youths were
brought before juvenile court on
charges of larceny. This summer
not a single case has been record-
ed, and authorities believe the
swimming pool has been the cause
of the change.

Supervised recreation is something
the city has needed for years, and
now it has been started the group
of business men who sponsored it
should see that it is continued each
year.

The decreased violations of the
law is worth the price alone.

It is the legal right of policemen
to enforce State sanitary laws and
members of the Board of Health
have called on the police heads of
Ayden and Bethel to see that the
law is complied with.

The action was taken to bring
about improvement in sanitary con-
ditions of the two communities, and
if the police give the desired co-
operation it should not be long be-
fore conditions are improved to no
little extent.

Officers should be unusually dili-
gent in the enforcement of these
kind of laws during the summer
months because this is the season
of the year when uncleanliness
results in illness.

Pitt county has had no whole
time health officers the last sev-
eral months and unless the police
aid the health department in car-
rying out its program of sanitation
it will be a matter of impossi-
bility to prevent a spread of sick-
ness.

Persons who pledged their sup-
port to the chamber of commerce
movement here should not fail to
live up to the promise.

Greenville is in need of boosting
and the best way this can be ac-
complished is through a chamber
of commerce.

By letting the outside world know
more about the resources and pos-
sibilities of the territory the next
several years should witness growth
both from the standpoint of popu-
lation and industry.

The city has virtually doubled
in size the last ten years and if
representatives of the various lines
of industry would only put their
shoulders to the wheel they should
be able to chalk up a record as
good, even if not better, during the
next ten years.

Now that cotton has hit the to-
boggan people of this community
who have taken part in the cam-
paign to conserve things produced
at home should be glad they had
vision enough to take advantage
of the plan.

Honduran Flier Unreported After Mysterious Takeoff

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 11.—(AP)—
Captain Lisandro Garay,
Honduran flier, who hopped off
Sunday afternoon on a non-
stop flight from Brooklyn to
Tegucigalpa, Honduras, was
picked up this morning at 10
o'clock by the Steamship Cleco
20 miles east of Cape Lookout,

Charge of "Liar" Causes Near Fight In Ga. Legislature

Atlanta, Aug. 11.—(AP)—A
House committee hearing on a bill
sponsors said would lessen negro
influence in Georgia Republican
politics yesterday culminated in a
near-physical encounter between
a Democratic legislator and Geo-
gia's Republican national com-
mitteeman-elect over a charge of
"liar."

The bill finally adressed 8 to 7,
would require election of political
party officials in primaries instead
of under a convention system. Few
negroes, speakers explained, are
qualified as voters in the state and
the proposed law would decrease
the negro power accordingly.

The clash came when Rep. J. T.
Sisk of Elbert county said: "Every
poor office in northeast Georgia
has been sold and paid for."
"Not now," Committeeman-elect
James W. Arnold returned.
"You know," Sisk continued,
"that the postoffice I referred to
was sold and you are the man who
blocked the man who was recom-
mended by the Republicans."

"You're a liar," Arnold shot
back.

Sisk made for Arnold with a
chair in his hands but friends in-
tervened. Arnold apologized later
and Sisk said he planned to settle
the bill outside. Sponsors of the
bill, which has already passed the
Senate, said the fight would be
carried to the floor of the House
on a minority report.

After the meeting yesterday
Congressman Robert Ramo of the
fifth Georgia district said he
had been informed federal em-
ployees are being used by "patron-
age bosses of Georgia" to fight the
bill and that he may demand an
investigation if the activities con-
tinue.

Proposal For Price Fixing To Be Laid Before President

Washington, Aug. 11.—(AP)—A proposal for government price fixing on staple products during the present economic depression is to be laid before President Hoover and other government officials by Senator Nye.

The North Dakota Republican believes the government "must engage in a program of price fixing for two or three years while we are getting our bearings and building up again." He also recommended a debt holiday for the farmers, suggesting the federal government postpone collection on its intermediate credit bank loans.

Urging the government to "take some positive step in aiding our situation" he said prices should be fixed on such commodities as cotton, wheat, dairy products, beef, potatoes, pork and wool. He noted congressional approval would be necessary and did not suggest any prices for the commodities named.

The drought condition in his state Nye said, had not been exaggerated and added that the wheat crop would be about one-fifth of normal production.

Make Infantile Paralysis Test Among Monkeys

Washington, Aug. 11.—(AP)—An artificially produced epidemic of infantile paralysis among a troop of monkeys, at the National Institute of Health may lead to curing the disease in humans.

If a method can be found to cure or prevent the disease in monkeys, scientists of the institute explain, the chances are excellent for curing or preventing it in human beings and for ending outbreaks such as the one existing in New York City. The institute is part of the United States Public Health Service.

Monkeys are used in the institute's experimental epidemic because they react to an infantile paralysis infection nearly the same as humans. Experimental vaccine are given to healthy monkeys to see if they will prevent the animal from contracting the disease.

Monkeys that have the paralysis are treated with new serums which the experimenters hope hold the secret of the cure they seek.

Blood of adults, who have developed immunity through having the disease in a mild form and blood of recovered infantile paralysis patients is used in making serums. Stronger serums are needed for more successful treatment, the institute holds and attempts are being made to develop these in various animals.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Aug. 11.—(AP)—With the rail shares on the verge of breaking to a new average low level for the bear movement, constructive interests came to the rescue in today's stock market and drove shorts to cover.

The share market recovered briskly, after a further sag in the morning, concentrated in the rails. The upturn interrupted an almost steady sag enduring for more than a week and was the most vigorous since the middle of July.

Early losses, largely ranging from 1 to 3 points, were mostly cancelled and net advances of about 2 to 4 points recorded in such issues as American Telephone, American Can, American Tobacco B, Consolidated Gas, New York Central, U. S. Steel, Southern Pacific, Sears Roebuck, Eastman, Case, Union Pacific, International Business Machines and Allied Chemical.

The reduction of the Reichsbank's discount rate to 10 from 15 per cent while confidence forecast yesterday, provided further evidence of the easing of the European financial crisis. The Bank of England was believed to have obtained a fair portion of the day's offerings of South African gold in the London market, although more than half had already been taken in advance for French account.

The upturn in the market took the speculative fraternity by surprise, and hasty efforts to find a cause resulted in the bringing out of numerous outworn rumors, such as the old story that important bullish news was coming from Washington. One financial news ticker reported that the rumor had been revived on the exchange floor that an important development toward modification of prohibition was in prospect.

Volcano, Storms And Quakes Claim Damage in Japan

Tokyo, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Japan suffered greatly from the elements today and yesterday. There were five known dead, scores injured, thousands of buildings destroyed or damaged and many fishing boats missing.

The known deaths and damage resulted from a typhoon that swept the islands of Miyako and Ishigaki in the Loo Choo, south of Japan. Two eruptions of the volcano Azama, near Karuizawa, shivered the surrounding country with ashes and small stones.

Citizens ran into the streets at Hamamatsu, Shizuoka prefecture, about 100 miles southwest of Tokyo, when an earthquake shook the city shortly before midnight.

The town was in darkness for hours, but no damage was done other than the breaking of electric lines.

The quake also was felt at Yokohama, only a few miles from

Tokyo, and at Osaka, Nagoya, Atami and Shimizu. Authorities estimated 2,000 buildings were destroyed and 3,000 homes damaged by the typhoon on Miyako island.

At Ishigaki hundreds of houses were destroyed or damaged and eight motor fishing vessels sank.

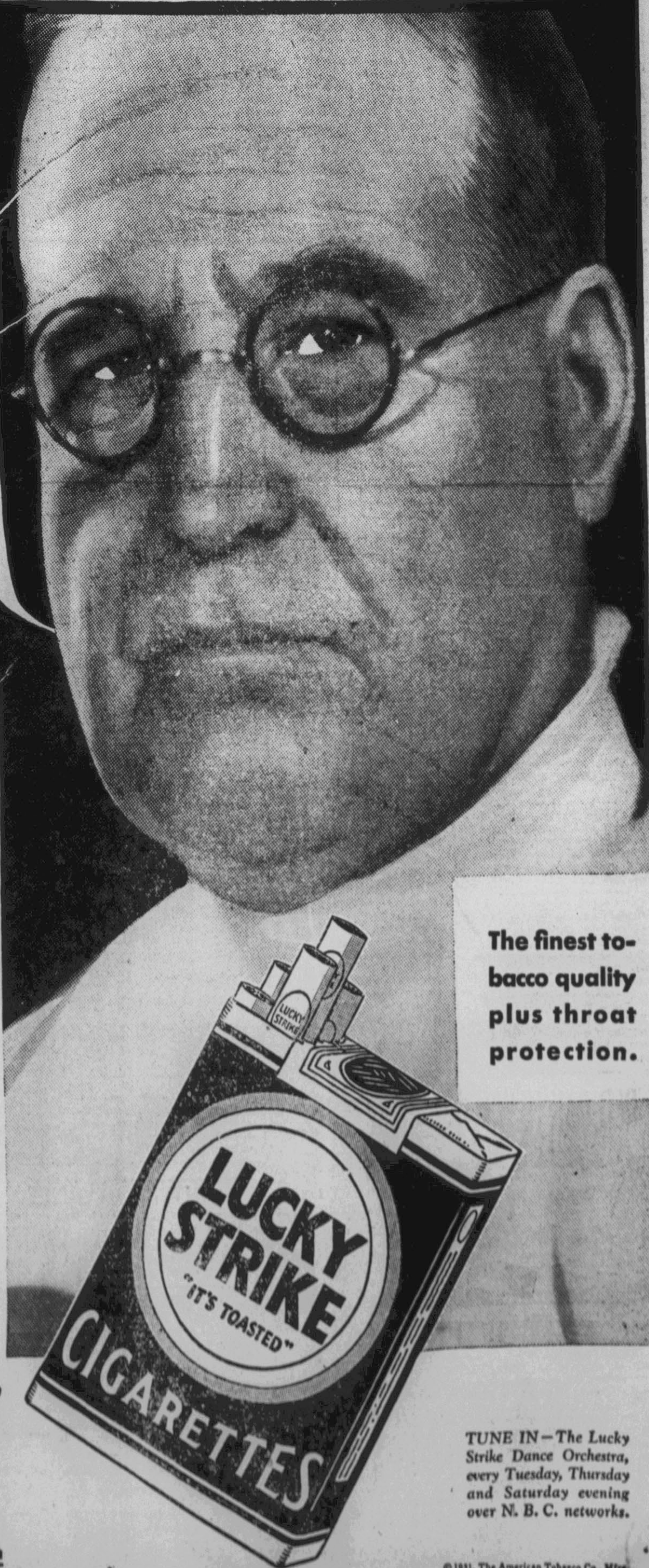
