BAILEY GIVES FORMULA FOR AGRICULTURE

Senator Addresses 2,500 Growers at Annual Field Day at Swannanoa.

Mountain Test Farm, Swannanoa, N. C., Aug. 20.—(AP)—Four "formulas of procedure" were offered for better farming conditions by Sen. Josiah Bailey, of Raleigh, in addressing 2,500 agriculturists at the annual farmers' field day here today.

Briefly Senator Bailey summarized his quadrangular platform for farmers as:

1. We must learn to think agriculturally or in terms of the welfare of the farmer.
2. We must pursue an international policy in building foreign trade.
3. We must reduce the costs of government.
4. We must build for the future and go forward with optimism.

Senator Bailey was introduced by William A. Graham, North Carolina commissioner of agriculture, as "a fine scholar with a knowledge of the farmer's needs throughout North Carolina." D. Reeves Noland, of Haywood county, a member of the State Board of Agriculture presided at the session this morning.

Senator Bailey prefaced his address with the declaration that many in the audience that crowded the new auditorium would live to see the day when there was a demand for all farm products throughout America.

"The sudden decline in prices of farm products below the pre-war standard," Senator Bailey said, "is calculated to throw our people into panic and to induce desperate measures. But we must keep our heads cool and our hearts true. It does not rain always. There will be a better day. We may delay its coming by ill-considered measures. We may hasten the coming by wise and sound procedure. I do not presume to offer a full remedy, but I suggest certain formulas of procedure."

"Many of us will live to see the day when there will be need for every bushel of grain and every pound of cotton. Low prices are temporary. The tide has always returned. We are not at the end of things; we are at the beginning. It was said of old—'where there is no vision, the people perish.' Let us not lose our vision of a higher and nobler civilization. Let us avoid all the counsels of desperation and of darkness."

The afternoon section of the program was to be devoted to various sports of contests to be participated in by the men women and children gathered here from the mountain counties.

BIG ADVANCE FOR COTTON

Farm Board to Pay Growers One Cent Less than Prevailing Prices.

Washington, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The Farm Board has solved one of its cotton problems.

It has decided that farmer members of cotton cooperative which have board approval will receive advances on cotton cooperatively marketed, of one cent less than the prevailing price at the point of delivery.

The arrangement was arrived at yesterday after conferences between directors of the American Cotton Cooperative Association and Farm Board members.

If the price of cotton should be 6 cents a pound, growers will receive an advance of 5 cents. If the staple falls or rises, the ratio will be preserved.

Advances made last year were about 90 per cent of the market price and the A. C. C. A. still holds most of the 2,100,000 bales which it handled for its members.

Primary financing for loans this year will be through commercial and intermediate credit banks. The board will insure second loans.

Carl Williams of Oklahoma, board member for cotton, said no accurate estimate of the funds needed to finance the advances could be made. He added the belief that at least 3,000,000 bales would be handled by the cooperatives this year and that under present conditions cooperatives affiliated with the association would show a substantial increase in membership.

Administration Silent On Proposals Advanced For Relief Of Germany

Washington, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Administration silence still cloaked today reactions of the Washington government to suggested solutions of Germany's economic plight put forward by the Wiggins committee of international bankers.

High officials doubted that any immediate occasion for a policy declaration by the Hoover administration would arise. While the Wiggins report will be studied closely, it was intimated that it has already disclosed ramifications even beyond the question of revision of inter-governmental debts which attracted first attention.

The Wiggins committee has injected the question of private German debts sharply into discussion of the world depression remedies. Up to now relation of Germany to the world-wide economic crisis

has been dealt with in international conferences and negotiations only from the aspect of inter-governmental debts, reparations due from Germany and war debts due the United States.

Whether the report of the Wiggins committee foreshadows some definite efforts to work out a method of scaling down all of these German commitments, both public and private, or is to be taken merely as an advisory warning from the bankers, is not known in Washington. Comment on the committee report made in Basel was refused in governmental quarters.

No official even privately would attempt to unravel the meaning of the suggestion of the Wiggins committee conclusions that the

LINDBERGH'S FOG-BOUND

Flier and Wife Forced to Spend Another Night Afloat off Kotoi Island.

Nemuro, Japan, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Foggy weather forced Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh to abandon hope of resuming their flight to Nemuro today and they prepared to spend another night afloat off Kotoi Island, the "Black Hole" of the Kurile Archipelago.

Messages to Onihishi wireless station here from the steamer Shimushiro Maru said the vessel toward the Lindberghs pontooned monoplane to a more sheltered cove of the island than that in which it landed last yesterday upon being forced down a second time in the attempted flight from Petrovsk Kamchatka, to Nemuro. Changing breezes prompted the moving of the plane.

There also, were indications from messages picked up by Ochilishi wireless station here, that motor trouble had developed again in the plane, increasing the Lindberghs' difficulties.

How serious the motor trouble might be was not explained, but the messages indicated the Lindberghs had planned to taxi their pontooned plane to Huroton bay, Shimushiro Island, 15 miles southwest of Kotoi, for better harborage, pending resumption of their flight to Nemuro, but that they then discovered the engine was not running properly.

Fogbound and afloat in the tricky currents of Kotoi all day the Lindberghs experienced a break in the monotony during the morning when the Shimushiro Maru, a government ship arrived alongside in response to orders from government officials and took the fliers aboard.

Colonel and Mrs. Lindbergh were questioned by the captain of the ship about the forced landing at Kotoi. Although Japan has rigid laws prohibiting flight over its territory without permission, the significance of the questioning was not explained.

Before leaving Petrovsk Lindbergh anticipated possible trouble in the Kuriles and asked the Japanese government, through the American embassy in Tokyo, for an emergency landing permit. This was granted. Hence it was believed. (Continued on page three)

MAN HELD IN LIQUOR CASE

S. M. Harrell of Beaufort County Arrested with Six Gallons of Whiskey.

S. M. Harrell, of Beaufort county, has been released by county officers under \$200 bond for his appearance in County court here September 8 to answer a charge of violating the prohibition law.

Harrell was arrested on the Greenville-Washington highway, about five miles from Greenville yesterday afternoon with six gallons of liquor in his automobile.

GIBARA TAKEN BY FEDERALS

Cuban Government is Victorious in First Engagement With Rebels.

Havana, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Victorious in the first important battle of the revolution, government forces troops, airplanes and a gunboat joined forces today to drive the rebels from northern Oriente province.

The federals successfully completed a three-day siege of Gibara on the northern coast of Oriente yesterday, official sources said, and surrounded their enemies on the outskirts of the town. The number of casualties was not announced but newspapers estimated that between 200 and 300 men were killed and wounded.

A million rounds of ammunition, 57 machine guns, and 800 rifles were said to have been captured by the government. The fleeing insurgents took refuge in a railway tunnel and their capture was reported to be imminent. A number of their leaders were believed to have been slain.

Learner that an expeditionary force had landed at Gibara the government dispatched a number of planes and the gunboat Patria to the scene. The fliers were said to have dropped between 900 and 1,000 bombs on the rebel forces and the Patria bombarded the harbor.

Rural guard forces from Holguin advanced on the town and were met by machine gun fire. Supported by troops and coast guard artillery from Oriente and Santa Clara, the loyalists attacked Gibara and aided by an encirclement from sea and air dislodged their adversaries after severe fighting.

At the same time, President Gerardo Machado was directing his men in stamping out the insurrection in Santa Clara province.

Train loads of troops have left Havana for that section in recent days but little is heard of their movements. Two thousand armed insurgents are reported to be scattered about the province, deploying for an engagement with the loyalists.

Reports that an uprising was likely at Manzanillo an important city on the south coast of Oriente, brought the government new worries. Nearby Bayamo also was under attack by a strong insurgent center and a movement of soldiers in that direction is expected.

Oppositionist headquarters here circulated bulletins warning women and children to keep off the streets but the city remained quiet. (Continued on page four)

HOLD YOUTHS FOR ROBBERY

Four Negro Boys Jailed Here for Epidemic of Robberies Last Several Days.

With confinement of four negro youths in the county jail today, police believed they had definitely broken up the mild epidemic of robberies and attempted robberies reported in the business district the last several days.

The boys, ranging from 12 to 15 years of age, were transferred from the city to the county jail this morning and will face trial next Saturday morning.

They are Clifton Williams, Richard Brady James Little and William White.

Police described Williams as the ringleader of the band that successfully entered two places of business and from one of them obtained about \$11 in cash.

Williams, who recently escaped from a reformatory where he had been sent to serve time for minor crimes, will be returned immediately to complete his sentence, officers said.

Williams was alleged to have entered White's Store on Dickinson avenue last Thursday night and obtained about \$11 in cash. Entrance was made by breaking through the transom at the rear of the building and lifting the bar from the door. James Brady is being held in connection with the robbery.

Little and Williams are alleged to have entered Flanagan Buggy Company but nothing was missed following a check-up. They were believed to have been after money, and failing to find any, removed their operations to other quarters.

Although each of the youths declared he was not connected with the robberies, officers stated they had a fairly strong case against them and expected conviction when the case comes up for hearing.

HOOVER NAMES OHIOAN TO AID RELIEF DRIVE

Fred Croxton Selected as Assistant Director of Unemployment Committee.

Washington, Aug. 20.—(AP)—President Hoover today selected Fred C. Croxton of Columbus, O., as assistant director of the reorganized unemployment relief committee headed by Walter S. Gifford, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company. Gifford was named by Mr. Hoover yesterday to command a new national organization to mobilize and direct unemployment relief next winter with the support of the whole force of the administration.

The new relief chief today accepted an invitation from the President to spend the week-end at the Rapidan camp and go over the entire unemployment situation. In requesting Gifford to assume the relief responsibility President Hoover assured him that "the whole force of the administration" would be at his disposal.

"I am asking you to do this," the President wrote, "because of my long acquaintance with you have done in similar fields and it is my desire that you should use your judgment as to the type of organization you set up and its methods of work."

Gifford is president of the Charity Organization Society of New York and has been in close touch with the unemployment situation through the statistical organization of his company. He has conferred with President Hoover on two occasions within the past month.

Headquarters for the new organization will be established in Washington. The President's emergency unemployment committee of which Col. Arthur Woods was chairman will be merged with it.

Gifford's organization will be given hundreds of relief suggestions received in recent weeks at the White House and by the emergency committee.

Among them will be one made by Carl Williams, Farm Board member, who recommended that community chest organizations purchase from the board some of its surplus wheat and distributed it to the needy in the form of bread.

A committee from the United States Chamber of Commerce also will have a report on the subject of unemployment relief ready for the President by September 1. It is under the chairmanship of Henry Harriman of Boston, and has been working for weeks.

Guaranteed employment for a given number of workers for a specified time is being considered by the chamber committee and a committee appointed by the National Electric Light Association.

Chief of Police is Indicted for Murder

Lumberton, Aug. 20.—(AP)—H. C. Betha, chief of police of St. Paul's today was under indictment for murder for killing E. J. Dean here last April 11.

The new grand jury returned a true bill against him after the previous grand jury had twice refused to indict him.

The officer shot Dean when, he said, the latter apparently was drawing a pistol after threatening him. A coroner's jury found at the time the killing was in self-defense. Betha said Dean was a leader of the lawless element in a talk with him at the time of the St. Paul's and he had gone to have shooting.

Solicitor McNeill said the case would not be tried at the present term of court.

May Ask Legislature To Aid Cotton Farmer

Goldsboro, Aug. 21.—(AP)—State Senator Hugh Dortch said today if a survey among farmers reveals sufficient interest in the proposal, he will ask Governor Gardner to call a special session of the Legislature to consider legislation to aid the cotton farmer.

Dortch's plan includes an act prohibition planting of cotton for two years and an appeal to the federal government to subsidize cotton planters during that period.

"I am discussing the idea with a number of large planters," said Dortch. "If it meets with the ap-

Ten Thousand Chinese Perish In Flood Water

Shanghai, Aug. 20.—(AP)—A death toll estimated at 10,000 persons in the important Lu Ho river towns of Tschow, Nanking and Fushun was reported today by Kuo Min, official Nationalist government news agency.

Only the northern part of Szechwan province was reported to have escaped the in-

undations of the Yangtze river and its tributaries while in the central and southern areas, thousands were reported to have perished.

In Chengtu, the provincial capital, the streets were turned into rivers and several hundred were believed to have perished in Chungking. Many villages were reported obliterated overnight.

Cotton Mather, President of Mather's Stores, Inc., in Georgia and Florida Cancels orders with High Point Manufacturers for Over \$30,000 Worth of Furniture; Declines to buy More N. C. Products Until State Repurchase License Tag it Forced One of His Trucks to Buy.

Raleigh, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The North Carolina Highway Commission today forwarded a new ordinance setting forth this state's position on reciprocity to officials of Georgia, Kentucky and South Carolina in an effort to end a "truck tag" war which has been in progress since last week.

E. B. Jeffers, chairman of the State Highway Commission, said that Capt. Charles D. Farmer of the Highway Patrol had been instructed to notify his men to stop all "retaliatory" arrests until state involved have been given an opportunity to answer North Carolina's proposal.

Captain Farmer said his men would receive their instructions today.

Under the new ordinance all out-of-state automobile operators will be exempt from licensing them in North Carolina if they are licensed in the state in which the operator is a bona fide resident and if driving regulations of North Carolina are adhered to.

Trucks operated by the owner of his duly authorized agent for the purpose of transporting goods or wares actually the property of the truck owner will likewise be exempted if they make only occasional trips into this state. For the purpose of definition "occasional trip" was taken to be not more than 30 trips in one calendar year. General state regulations must be obeyed.

Motor vehicles used for transporting commodities produced, manufactured or distributed by a regularly established business within a radius of 75 miles of said place of business will be entitled to immunity regardless of the number of trips.

No immunities will be granted to motor vehicles of any description operated for hire except for the purpose of discharging passengers or freight in this state.

No immunities will be granted trucks or freight carrying vehicles carrying an auxiliary gasoline tank and thereby allowing the owner to evade payment of the North Carolina gasoline tax.

The immunities prescribed will be granted only to those states extending like immunities to North Carolina but 10 days notice must be given before any change is made.

High Point, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Cotton Mather, president of Mather's Stores, Inc., in Georgia and Florida, today struck a major blow for Georgia in North Carolina's "truck tag" war with the Cracker state by cancelling orders with manufacturers here for over \$30,000 worth of furniture.

Mather said he would buy no more North Carolina goods until this state repurchased a license tag it forced one of his truck drivers to buy.

The exact sum which Mather, operator of 17 stores demands be refunded is \$39.50. His driver was arrested at Gaston's last Saturday and fined \$13.50 and forced to buy a license tag costing \$26.

Orders with 15 furniture manufacturers here were cancelled by Mather. At the recent furniture exposition here he placed orders for \$30,000 worth of goods and furniture men here said he placed other orders direct with the manufacturers which were also cancelled.

A letter was sent to all the manufacturers setting forth Mather's position. He said:

"Until the Republic of North Carolina recognizes our Georgia or Florida license and until you are able to sell the license forwarded to you for the price and premium paid, plus the expense involved, there will be no further orders from any of our stores."

The letter said he was sending the North Carolina license plate to the furniture exposition building here.

LEA TO OFFER NO EVIDENCE

Judge Barnhill Overrules Renewed Motions for Non-Suit at Asheville.

Asheville, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The defense in the trial of Col. Luke Lea, Nashville, Tenn., publisher, and three others charged with conspiring to defraud the Central Bank and Trust Company here of \$1,300,000, today announced it would not offer any evidence and rested its case.

The defense's decision was announced when court was convened shortly before 11:30 a. m.

A conference of attorneys and Judge M. V. Barnhill delayed the opening of court.

Judge Barnhill overruled renewed motions for non-suit with respect to each defendant, but announced he might change or modify his decision later.

On trial with Lea are his son, Luke Lea, Jr., E. P. Charlet, of Nashville, a business associate and Wallace B. Davis, who was president of the bank. The Central Bank and Trust Company failed last November.

Judge Barnhill announced the defense would have seven hours for argument and the state five and one-half.

The defense was given the opening argument and Judge Barnhill allowed it 30 minutes after his announcement to prepare itself. Judge Barnhill said he expected the attorneys to conclude their arguments Saturday and that he would charge the jury Monday.

CITY IS MADE TEST CENTER

New Insurance Men of East Must Stand Examinations Here Twice Monthly.

W. W. Lee, president of the Greenville Insurance Exchange, announced today that Greenville had been selected by the North Carolina Insurance Department as one of eight cities where all new insurance agents will have to stand examinations before entering this field of business.

Legislation requiring examination of all prospective agents was passed at the last session of the General Assembly and since that time the State Insurance Department has been outlining plans to make it effective.

Mr. Lee stated that practically all agents east of Raleigh will have to come to Greenville for examination. He said examinations would be held twice a month in the assembly room of the Merchants Association on Evans street. Examinations will be conducted by Mr. Warren representing the State Insurance Department.

The creation of Greenville as an examination center will be instrumental in bringing scores of men and women here each month, and will have a tendency of producing increased efficiency in the insurance field, it was said.

NEGRO TO DIE FOR MURDER

Ben Goldstein Confesses Killing Another Negro in Chatham County.

Raleigh, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Ben Goldstein, Chatham county negro, will be electrocuted at state's prison tomorrow for the murder of John Headen, another Chatham county negro.

Goldstein has confessed killing Headen.

His confession was made to his attorneys after they had launched a move to obtain executive clemency for their client.

Appearing before Tyre Taylor executive counsel the condemned man's counsel and other interested parties pleaded that he did not have a "fair trial and received assurance that the case would be investigated. Going then to the prison the party was astounded when Goldstein replied to a casual question as to his guilt that he was guilty. Previously he had maintained that he was innocent.

The killing of Headen was the result of a quarrel between Goldstein and Headen. Goldstein sought to kill Headen at Goldstein's home but could not find a shell for a shot gun. He then followed Headen to a schoolhouse and shot him down wounding him. That night he found out where Headen was and shot him to death through a window.

He appealed to the Supreme court but a new trial was denied.

A new trial was denied. "Pap" Perkins, formerly a Raleigh policeman and the man credited with slaying "Slim" Anderson bandit, who invaded Raleigh's business section in 1925, will hang at the gallows tomorrow when Goldstein dies.

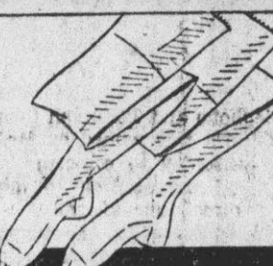

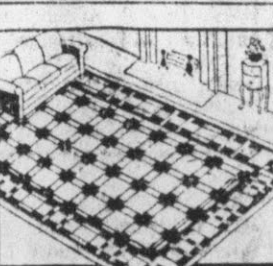

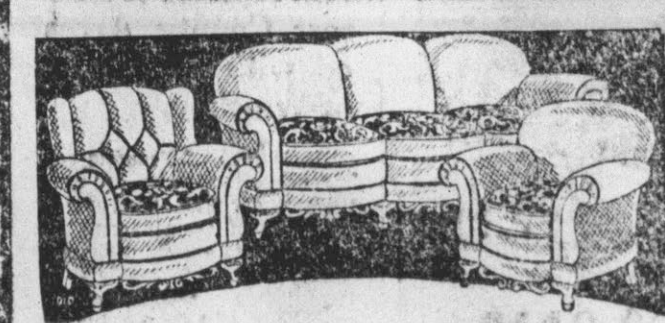

I. C. C. Orders Revision of Freight Rates on Florida Vegetables

Washington, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission today ordered revision downward of freight rates on potatoes, and other vegetables from Florida to destinations throughout the United States.

Florida vegetables move extensively throughout the country although approximately two-thirds go to eastern points.

The commission in its opinion included a tabulation showing the movement over the Seaboard Airline and Atlantic Coast Line from September 1, 1928, to July 31, 1929, of 31,256 cars of vegetables.

Of these 21,390 carloads went to the east; 1,424 to the Carolinas and Virginia; 1,556 to southeastern points and 6,886 to the Ohio river and beyond. Figures for traffic carried by the Southern Railway which obtains a substantial movement at Jacksonville were not available.

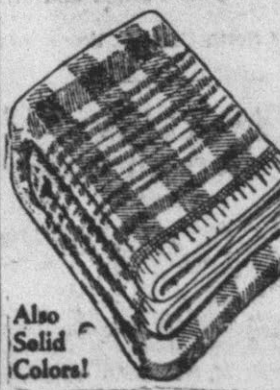

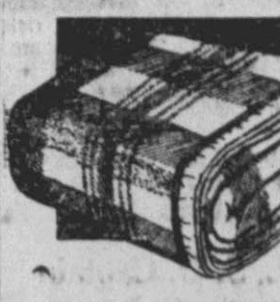

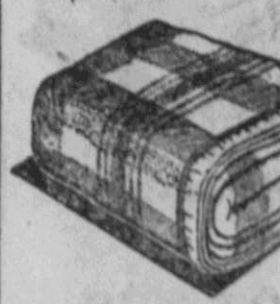

GROVE WINS HIS PLACE IN HALL OF FAME

For some time, Lefty Grove, star southpaw of the Philadelphia Athletics, has been hanging around the portals of baseball's hall of fame, pressing some strong claims to ownership of one of the niches. He gained official recognition for a place in the hall yesterday when he recorded his sixteenth consecutive victory by beating the Chicago White Sox, 4 to 2.

This triumph, which gave Grove a record so far of 25 games won and only two lost, equalled the American league record. Smokey Joe Wood, of the Boston Red Sox, and Walter Johnson of Washington were the previous American league pitchers to win 16 straight games, both of them doing it in 1912. The major league mark is 19 straight.

Grove has done some great work in winning those 16 games, being relieved only once, and pitching 13 full contests. Twice he went in as a relief pitcher and was credited with winning. He had something of a scare yesterday when a couple of his and an error gave Chicago two runs but he bode down and ended the game. Altogether Lefty allowed seven hits, three by Carl Reynolds, and fanned five while the A's were piling up an early lead off Red Faber.

Just by way of keeping pace in equalling records, Earl Averill tied Cleveland's all-time home run hitting mark by clouting his 25th and 26th homers of the season in the first half of a doubleheader with Washington.

Eddie Morgan, who added another homer in the same game yesterday, set the mark last season. The Indians won both games from the Senators by scores of 10 to 5 and 10 to 2, leaving Washington 13 games behind the Athletics.

Irving Burns of the St. Louis Browns pulled off another unique feat to hand the New York Yankees a 7 to 3 setback. With the score tied in the seventh and the bases full, Burns clouted a triple then stole home to provide the margin of victory.

Boston and Detroit staged a slugfest which netted the Red Sox sixth place in the standing as they won out 9 to 8.

The New York Giants gained the

day's National league honors and once more took possession of second place in the standing. They came through in the ninth inning with two runs to down the Cincinnati Reds 6 to 5.

Meanwhile, the Chicago Cubs could get no better than an even break with Brooklyn. Home runs by Guyler and Barton spelled a good pitching performance by Cy Young in the first game and gave Chicago a 4 to 1 victory. Dazzy Vance did not pitch quite so well in the second game, but there were no homers and the Robins rallied behind him for four runs in the sixth and won 5 to 3.

The league leading St. Louis Cardinals and the lowly Phillies split another twin bill. Don Hurst's hitting and Ray Berge's pitching combined to win the first game for Philadelphia 3 to 2, but the Cards slammed Frank Watt for five runs in the first inning of the second clash and won, 8 to 4.

The Durham-Raleigh game was rained out in the Bull city. Raleigh and Greensboro, chief aspirants to the top position held by Charlotte, have had their last shots at the Hornets club until one of them goes against the Bees in the post-season series.

JACK DEMPSEY DISPLAYS OLD TIME ABILITY

Reno, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Four years absence from the boxing ring apparently has not impaired the shugging prowess of Jack Dempsey, former world heavyweight champion.

The Manassas Mauler, boxing at 190 pounds, last night began a series of exhibitions which may end in an attempt to regain the heavyweight crown, with a knockout of Jack Beasley, Oakland Cal.

After flooring his 185-pound opponent for counts of eight and nine early in the second round, Dempsey landed a short left that ended, before the halfway mark, a scheduled 4-round bout.

A series of lefts and rights to the body had Beasley in distress before the second round was hardly underway. The sun bronzed Dempsey was breathing easily at the finish.

Twisting, turning, weaving and rolling, Jack was much the same Dempsey as when he met Willard, Firpo and all the others. Beasley never laid a glove on him after the first round.

Jack plainly was nervous when he entered the ring accompanied by "Jerry and Greek" Lavadis who trained him for all of his championship battles. But he quickly got over his "stage fright."

Dempsey mauled Beasley around a bit in the first round but seemed content for the most part to get back into fighting swing. Beasley landed three straight lefts to the face.

The former champion was to have boxed two rounds with Tony Fuentes, Mexican heavyweight but that bout was called off, assertedly because Fuentes had two broken ribs.

A tour through the Northwest is scheduled to begin August 24 in Portland, Ore. Later Dempsey plans exhibitions in the Midwest and east.

Often a flinx has pursued no-hit heroes, notable among them being Charley Robertson who was never a consistent winner after twirling a perfect game against Detroit in 1922.

Walter Johnson the Washington manager, thinks it will be a tonic for Burke, giving the southpaw, the confidence he has lacked. After the game Johnson told newspapermen:

"Burke has been too cautious and afraid to waste balls. When he found the Red Sox missed those third strikes he gained confidence and threw the last pitch over as if it was the first. It's the best thing in the world for a young fellow to pitch a game like that. He knows now he can cut loose."

Veatch's 'Good Turn'

When Earl Webb, the Red Sox slugger, took the third strike for the last out against Burke, there was some suggestion he was doing the youthful flinger a good turn. It reminded Washington experts of the time that Ted Lyons, the great White Sox right-hander, needed only to retire the last Senator in the ninth to enter the hall of fame.

So that no sentiment would be involved, Bucky Harris, then piloting Washington, sent Bobby Veatch in as a pinch-hitter. Bobby punched single to right that took the honors right out of Lyons' grasp.

One of the oldest "perfect" games on record was credited to Ernie Shore of the old Red Sox after considerable argument. Babe Ruth

started the game, against Washington in 1917, but was ejected for squawking after issuing a pass to the first batsman, Ray Morgan. Shore then went in without warming up. Morgan was out, trying to steal, and Shore retired the next 26 batsmen in order.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Aug. 20.—(AP)—For the third successive session, bulls were able to make substantial progress during the morning in today's stock market, only to stall in a mire of liquidation around midday.

Public apathy, and a soggy bond market, have made forward progress difficult. Constructive interests, however, have been encouraged by the developments in the petroleum situation, and the absence of important liquidation on declines.

The midday setback today was less severe than those recently encountered, and the major portion of the early advance was retained. Leading commodity markets also maintained a better tone, in sympathy with Liverpool.

Selling converged upon tobacco shares, and losses of a point or two appeared in American Tobacco and Liggett & Myers common and class B stocks, and Reynolds B.

During the morning, advances of 1 to 3 points appeared throughout much of the list.

The down turn in the tobacco shares was regarded in some brokerage circles as reflecting bear selling, and shifting to other groups, on the theory that the improvement in the tobacco industry since the increase in wholesale prices had been more than discounted by the market, and that the outlook was a little less rosy with the government about to investigate the price jump, competition increasing, and states imposing new taxes.
