CITY OF BELIZE REPORTED DESTROYED BY STORM

TWO FRENCH PLANES BEGIN NON-STOP HOP TO JAPANESE CAPITAL

AFTER RECORD OF AMERICANS

Hyphen II and Question Mark on Trail of 5,000 Mile Mark Set By Boardman and Polando, American Fliers, Who Flew From New York to Istanbul in July; None of the Fliers Would Commit Themselves on Itinerary.

Le Bourget, France, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Word from Dusseldorf today said the trans-Atlantic airplane, Question Mark, in which Paul Codos and Henry Robida started from here this morning on a flight toward Tokyo had been forced down near that city.

Details of the landing were not immediately available.

The message said the plane Hyphen II, which took off a few minutes ahead of the Question Mark to fly over the same route, was still going well.

Paris, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Two French airplanes, one of them a veteran of the trans-Atlantic voyage, left Le Bourget airfield at dawn today in direction of Tokyo, seeking to wrest the non-stop distance from America and matching speed with each other.

One was the Hyphen II manned by Joseph Le Brix, Marcel Doré and René Meslin, who crashed in Siberia several months ago with the original Hyphen on a similar venture. The other was the Question Mark, owned by Major Dieudonné Soste, which was carrying Paul Codos and Sgt. Henry Robida.

Both crews were on the trail of the 5,000-mile record set by Russell Bardsley and John Polando, American fliers, who flew from New York to Istanbul without a stop in July. Codos and Maurice Belonte previously held the record with a dash of 4,912 miles into Manchuria.

The planes took off within the pace of six minutes. The Hyphen II got off the ground at 5:09 a. m. Greenwich Time (12:09 a. m. EST), reaching the entire length of the way for its start.

The Question Mark followed at 5:15 and got into the air half way down the runway, opposite where Minister of Air Dumesnil and Codos were standing.

The Hyphen II carried 2,112 gallons of fuel and the Question Mark 1,373 gallons, but the latter is 12 miles an hour faster and has enough for 52 hours of normal flying. Both are powerful and equipped for long-distance navigation.

If one or the other team succeeds in reaching a point about 160 miles beyond Tsitsikar, Siberia, it was calculated the American record would be broken. If both get that far they will fight it out for the honor of establishing a new mark.

To Force Officials To Work a Month Without Salary

Atlanta, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Mayor James L. Key today prepared to force salaried city officials and employees to work a month without pay, in aid of relief of the city's financial crisis.

If they refuse the voluntary donation of 30 days' pay he has asked, he said yesterday, he will use veto power to make them work without compensation during December.

The mayor said he would veto any action of council which would cause a 12-month allocation of salaries and if his veto were overridden he would refuse to sign salary checks.

Gandhi Almost Mobbed By Admirers In France

Marseilles, France, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The Mahatma M. K. Gandhi pleading for non-violence as never before, came to Marseilles for the first time in 15 years today and was almost mobbed by his admirers and questioners.

Only a handful of Indian students showed up to meet the steamship Rajputana, bearing him from Bombay to the second round table conference in London, but hundreds of newspapermen were on hand. They surged around Gandhi's frail body until he became fearful and fled.

Marseilles, France, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The following conversation ensued today when Miss Madeline Slade, daughter of an English admiral, was questioned by French customs inspectors:

Q. Are you Miss Slade?
A. No, Miss Slade died six years ago. I am Mirabehn, disciple of Mahatma Gandhi.

Q. Are you a British subject?
A. No, I am nobody's subject except Mahatma Gandhi's, whom I regard as my father.

The inspectors looked puzzled but after eyeing her white nun-like garb, shaved head and sandals, they passed her through the gates.

STATE TO AID UNEMPLOYED

Unemployment Conference to Be Held At Raleigh September 18

Raleigh, Sept. 11.—(AP)—North Carolina moved today to give relief to its needy and unemployed persons who may be sorely distressed this winter because of the economic depression.

Nineteen business leaders representing every section of the state have been summoned by Gov. O. M. Gardner to meet here September 18 to make plans for relief work.

Other conferences will follow from time to time, the chief executive said, but in no case will more than a score be called to one meeting in order that the session will not be unwieldy.

Stuart Cramer, of Crumpton, a member of the Federal Commission of Unemployment, and William C. Hunt, of the American Red Cross, Washington, D. C., were among those invited to the first meeting.

Lawrence Gatling and Richard Eubanks of Raleigh, tried with Thompson on charges of being accessories after the fact, were acquitted.

Judge N. A. Sinclair delayed passing of sentence temporarily.

NAVY TO AID STORM AREA

President Hoover Moves to Co-operate With Red Cross in Relief of Suffering

Washington, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The Navy Department, at the request of President Hoover, moved today to cooperate with the Red Cross in providing medical stores and other aid for hurricane sufferers at Belize, British Honduras.

Plans were formed immediately for dispatching planes carrying medical supplies from the Canal Zone and sending ships to the stricken city.

The mine sweeper Swan was at Trujillo, Honduras, only a few hours run from Belize, when the hurricane struck and was the first to Belize. It will provide facilities for radio communication and render such relief as possible. A gunboat of the special service squadron also is expected to be sent from the Canal Zone.

A number of Marine Corps planes are at Managua, Nicaragua, considerably closer than the Canal Zone, and they are also expected to be sent to carry medical supplies.

TROOPS USED IN CHURCH ROW

Soldiers Patrol the Street of Jonesboro, Ark., After Division of Church Members

Jonesboro, Ark., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Troops today patrolled the streets of this little northeast Arkansas town in the interests of law and order as a result of a division among members of its First Baptist church.

The center of the controversy was the Rev. Joe Jeffers, a 33-year-old evangelist, slight of stature and bespectacled, who charged the pastor of the First Baptist church, Dr. D. H. Heard, with unbecoming conduct while he occupied a charge at Big Springs, Texas.

Wednesday night the evangelist led a throng of 500 men to the jail here to demand release of George Cox Jr., arrested after a fight at the First Baptist church where a "vindication" service for Dr. Heard was held and charges against him denied.

Cox was released and a hearing was scheduled for yesterday.

While waiting for the hearing the evangelist and his followers asked permission to hold a prayer on the lawn of the city hall and it was finally granted. Jeffers, however, included in his prayer a supplication for a bolt of lightning to strike Mayor Boaler who had denied the assemblage permission to hold a meeting at the city hall.

CITY SCHOOLS SEARCH SOUND OPEN MONDAY FOR YACHTMAN

Entire System to Have One Less Teacher Than During the Past Year

The Greenville city schools will open for the 1931-32 session on Monday, Sept. 14. All new pupils have already been registered and all grades 7 to 11 have already been assigned to buildings and classes. The schools will open this year with one less teacher than they did last year, one teacher being dropped out of the high school. The old Model school on Catonch street, will not be used this year. There were only five groups of children in that building last year and this year those groups will be taken care of in the new training school and the Third street school. These buildings have sufficient empty space to take care of these children. The parents and children are asked to remember the following instructions:

1. The children who were in the second grade at the old Model school last year will report to the Training school Monday morning.

2. The children who were in the fifth grade at the old Model school last year will report to the Training school Monday morning.

3. The children who were in the sixth grade of the old Model school last year will report to the Training school and Third street school, going to the building nearest their homes.

4. The children who were in the sixth grade of the West Greenville school last year will report to the Third street school.

5. The children who were in the sixth grade of the Third street school will report to the buildings which they attended last year.

If a family has moved during the summer from the vicinity of one building to another, the request for transfer must be made to the superintendent's office.

Miss Frances Norman, who was principal of the Third street school last year will have the sixth grade in the Training school this year. Miss Eva Keeter will be principal of the Third street school in addition to her duties as supervisor of the elementary schools. Miss Frances Wahl becomes principal of the Training school to succeed Miss Cleo Rainwater, who is on a leave of absence.

J. H. Rose, superintendent of schools, will again act as principal of the high school. A complete list of the teachers will be given in this paper tomorrow.

Books are the same as they were last year and may be secured at the book store on Dickinson avenue. The general teachers' meeting for the white teachers will be held Saturday morning at 11 o'clock in the high school library. The general teachers' meeting for colored teachers will be held at the same time.

Recommend One-Third Cotton Cut Two Years

Austin, Texas, Sept. 11.—(AP)—A special House committee of the Texas Legislature charged with drafting a cotton acreage control measure prepared a report this morning, recommending adoption of the Olson bill to restrict acreage in 1932 and 1933 to one-third the cultivated area.

The preliminary draft of the report recommended that all other cotton acreage control bills including the long "no cotton in 1932 bill" sponsored by Governor Huey P. Long, of Louisiana, be tabled.

LEADERS SEEK TAX REVISION

Republicans After Increase to Help the Government Deficit; Democrats Opposed

Washington, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Senator Watson said today after talking with President Hoover that he thought any tax increase or taxation revision at the next session of Congress "would be a great mistake."

The Republican Senate floor leader said he had talked over the taxation question with the President. He expressed opposition to a sales tax such as proposed by Senator Reed Republican, Pennsylvania, yesterday and said that while the treasury might be empty he felt that condition would be better than a demoralization of industry by a mass of tax legislation.

"I don't think we need worry about the treasury as long as Andrew Mellon is at the helm," Watson said.

ABANDON HOPE FOR AVIATORS

Aviation Experts Say There Is Scarcely a Chance of Finding Moyle and Allen

Seattle, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Hope that Don Moyle and C. A. Allen, missing trans-Pacific airmen, would be found alive was virtually abandoned today after numerous reports of planes passing over various sections of the Aleutian Islands and northern Canada failed to yield any trace of them.

Aviation experts and Coast Guard officers said there was scarcely a chance of finding the airmen who took up from Japan Monday on a non-stop flight to Seattle.

"I don't think there's the faintest chance that we'll ever hear anything more about them," said Valentine Gephart, secretary of the Seattle chapter of the National Aeronautic association.

"It's a shame, but it's one of those things which can't be helped as long as insufficiently experienced aviators attempt to make record breaking flights in planes that are not equal to the occasion."

Tokyo, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Fishing vessels, and other craft off the coast of Hokkaido Island and along the Kurile Archipelago, north of here, are pursuing a search for Don Moyle and C. A. Allen, missing California aviators.

Storm Moving Toward Haiti

Washington, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The weather bureau said this morning the West Indian hurricane was moving toward Haiti and probably would pass near the city of Santo Domingo today.

Advisory 10 a. m.: Tropical disturbance now hurricane intensity center passed near San Juan 10 p. m., moving westward over Mona Passage. Will reach eastern end of Haiti today and likely pass near city of Santo Domingo this afternoon or early tonight. Caution advised.

Western Caribbean disturbance has moved west northward over British Honduras and Campeche now centered extreme southern portion of the Gulf of Mexico near Progreso (on the peninsula of Yucatan) with somewhat diminished intensity.

A flash from Tela, Honduras, said the city was destroyed, 150 dead, and half the population homeless. Another message to the Pan American Airways from its Belize Field manager fixed the dead at 200.

The Red Cross at Washington was advised by the manager of the Porto Rican chapter that the hurricane passing over San Juan killed one injured several unroofed 200 houses and damaged numerous business buildings.

San Juan was cut off from communication with the rest of the island.

A second message received by Pan American Airways from Belize said that in addition to the dead several hundred were injured, half of the houses of the city were demolished and that all Radio towers were down.

Several American priests were reported among the dead.

Miami, Fla., Sept. 11.—(AP)—R. I. Dunton, general operations manager for Pan-American Airways here, announced today receipt of unofficial information from Belize, British Honduras, that 200 persons were killed when a tropical storm swept over the city yesterday.

Dunton said Pan-American Airways restored radio communication with its Belize station after being cut off since 1:30 P. M., yesterday.

The message, received from the field manager at Belize, said: "Belize devastated by hurricane. All Pan-American personnel safe but 200 dead in town."

Belize is the capital of British Honduras, with a population of approximately 21,000.

The time the disturbance, apparently of hurricane strength, struck Belize was not determined in early messages. Tropical radio here was unable to contact its Belize station this morning, although last night the Miami station reported communicating with Belize up to 7:30 P. M., the regular time of closing.

Dunton put all available communication facilities to work in an attempt to get further information.

The last weather report from Belize was at 3 P. M., yesterday, when a 47 mile wind was reported. The pilot of a Pan-American plane at San Salvador was ordered to pick up all available medical and other supplies and carry them to Belize. The plane was due at Belize at noon.

The regular Pan-American plane through Belize, Dunton said.

Pan-American's information was brought in on regular radio sets, quickly repaired during the night.

PORTO RICO ALSO SUFFERS

Two Tropical Storms Moving in Opposite Directions Lash British Honduras and Porto Rico and Move Toward Gulf of Mexico and Haiti

Two hurricanes were sweeping the Caribbean today.

One was reported to have killed 150 to 200 at Belize, British Honduras, last night and today menacing the southern part of the Gulf of Mexico.

The other killed at least one at San Juan, Porto Rico, and today was sweeping toward Haiti.

Shortly before noon various weather bureaus on the Atlantic Coast issued warnings locating the San Juan hurricane over Mona Passage and predicting it would pass near Santo Domingo late this afternoon or early tonight.

Government radio facilities at Belize, which is the capital of British Honduras, were put out of order by the storm.

SALES AHEAD OF LAST YEAR

Both Weekly and Season Tobacco Sales Show Slight Gain Over Past Season

Greenville sold more tobacco during the past week than it did during the corresponding period last year, according to the official report of sales made public yesterday afternoon by K. W. Cobb, supervisor of sales.

Weekly reports this season are submitted at the close of sales each Thursday instead of Friday, as in past years.

The market disposed of 2,965,142 pounds of leaf this week for a total sum of \$234,302.42 at an average of \$79.00 per hundred pounds.

For the corresponding period last season 2,533,564 pounds of leaf was handled at an average of \$87.77 per hundred pounds.

For the season, the report indicated that 4,445,974 pounds of tobacco was sold for \$343,100.87 at a general average of \$77.10 per hundred pounds. Up to the same date last season the market had sold 4,240,750 pounds, the report showed.

The market has been disposing of a tremendous quantity of half cent and one cent tobacco that is being passed on some of the other markets. This has had a tendency of holding down the price average despite the fact that prices for the better grades have shown considerable strength since the opening of the market.

Wholesale Check Theft at Farmville

Checks stolen from the check supply of Monk Hobgood and Webb tobacco warehousemen of Farmville, and cashed in different towns of the state, are coming through the mail to the Bank of Farmville for collection. The theft of the checks was discovered this morning and Cashier D. E. Oglesby is soliciting aid of the police department and radio in order to apprehend the thieves.

The checks were light blue in color and the numbers ran from 1865 to and inclusive of 1969. There were 134 checks missing.

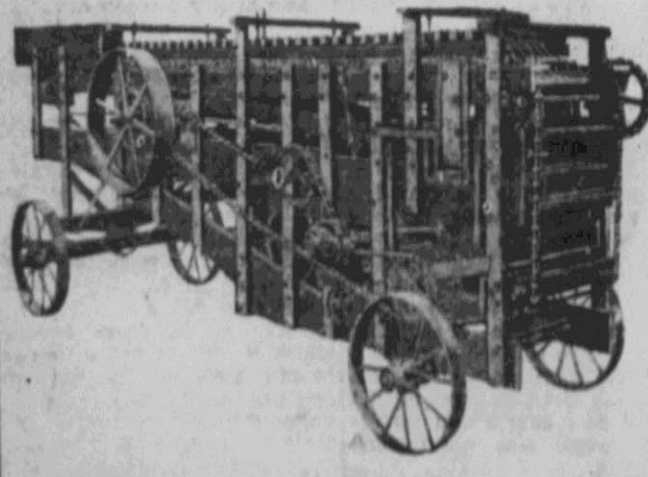

plan for a sales tax of one-half of one per cent upon all commodities sold to the public.

Meanwhile, other staunch Republicans, including Senator Watson of Indiana, the party leader, have asked the administration to resort to new loans next year to await a return to normal conditions before revising the tax system.

Democratic leaders, who have spoken on the subject, oppose tax increases next session. They are advocating instead, that the government pare down the money spent annually in retiring the public debt.

That is the picture today as the new proposals opened debate that will come to a head early in the December session.

Senator Brockhart of Iowa, a Republican independent, led off the discussion with an assault upon Senator Reed's sales tax proposal. He said "I am in favor of increasing the taxes on the incomes of Senator Reed and Secretary Mellon."

While the President and Secretary Mellon are maintaining silence pending further study of the government income in the next few months, the tax revision calls of Senator Reed and Representative Bacharach were regarded significantly in Washington.

Their declarations were believed to forecast a move by the administration to raise additional revenue to meet next year's prospective billion dollar deficit through taxation.

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ABOUT TOWN

The eight-month term of Pitt county schools will begin September 21 and thousands of children who have been enjoying vacation season will turn their attention to the task of improving their minds.

While the passage of the MacLean school law has created indecision in all parts of the state, the schools are going on with their work and will endeavor to do the best they can in the face of the shortage of state appropriations.

In Pitt county, the superintendent of education has said they will make an effort to operate the schools at the highest standard of efficiency, and with this determination evident among members of the faculty also, the schools probably will show progress at the end of the year.

Pitt county people are proud of the splendid record of achievement set by the schools in past years, and will show a greater spirit of co-operation this year, realizing as they must that the system has an uphill battle attempting to overcome the financial stringency incurred through inability of the state to provide the necessary money to operate the schools along established lines. Everybody realizes what a monumental task the teachers have before them and will do all in their power to make the load just a little easier through proper consideration of their effort.

The sales tax, nemesis of business men in this state the last few years, will find its counterpart in a national way if Senator Reed of Pennsylvania has his way about it.

The high ranking Republican of the finance committee has advocated a tax of one-half of one per cent on all commodities.

He said he would retain the present income tax also but would plug up some of the "leaks" which he described as permitting rich capitalists to evade income levies.

The country will not take up with the suggestion for government relief through this plan, but it will be in hearty accord with the effort to "stop" leaks in income taxes.

If there is the slightest chance in the world to bring the capitalists to justice and let them bear their part of the tax, then it should be done. It is unfair to make the majority of people pay, and impose upon them a penalty if they do not, and then permit the rich men to go scott free. It is a sad commentary upon the law enforcement agencies of the country and should be rectified as far as possible.

Senator Reed, in making his proposal also warned against further inroads on the treasury. This suggestion seems to be a wise, and if it could be carried out the deficit he is now talking about should be relieved without having to enact any sales tax to meet the emergency. The country is burdened with enough taxes as it is and another one would be almost unbearable.

It is to be hoped Senator Reed's very close friend, Secretary Mellon, will bring into play some of his financial genius and try to replenish the national treasury without imposing another burden upon an already sorely depressed people.

According to a report sent out by the Pitt County Demonstration Department, women in all sections of the community are canning and stringing, lightening their hearts as they attempt to relieve the economic burden caused by depression of the last two years.

The demonstration agent who visits a majority of the homes each year, asserts the women are using high pressure cookers, some the water bath, and others the open kettle method as they go about the important business of conserving their food supplies for the winter months.

It has been many years since Pitt county has seen such industry in the hundreds of homes in virtually all communities, and if things should come to the worst

these women should be able to feed their families throughout the cold winter months without any trouble.

Conservation of surplus crops in this territory is being conducted upon a more extensive scale than at any time in history, and it speaks great things for the future of the country.

In past years the majority of people have been throwing away the surplus and buying their goods from the stores whenever they needed them, but the time has come when they do not have sufficient money to follow the old and extravagant plan and have gone to work to live at home by their own personal effort.

Singing schools are being conducted in different parts of the county and the people are attempting to forget themselves, the prices of cotton and tobacco, as they let their spirit soar away on the wings of song.

Simpson community is planning for a community sing this fall, and if expectations are fulfilled it will be one of the largest-attended affairs of its kind ever held in that part of the county.

Other areas are also turning their attention to this medium of happiness and instead of finding the people ready to accept their fate the winter will witness a brave and courageous people singing away their blues in such a contagious manner that the entire countryside will reverberate with the sound of their voices lifted in thanksgiving.

PIERCE RESIGNS FROM POLICE DEPARTMENT

Preston Pierce, member of the Greenville police department, who was several days ago appointed as assistant tax collector of Pitt county, has tendered his resignation to

the Board of Aldermen to become effective October 1, when he begins his new duties with the county.

A successor will be named at the next meeting of the board. It was understood today.

Pierce, former chief of police and deputy sheriff, has seen eight years of experience in the sheriff's office and is believed to be well qualified for duties with the tax department. R. L. Barnhill, of Bethel, was appointed collector of taxes and Pierce as his assistant.

PITT COUNTY WOMEN STILL CANNING AND SINGING

All through the county, I find women and girls still canning. Some are using pressure cookers, some the water bath, and a few are still

using the open kettle method. Thousands of jars have been placed on the pantry shelves. Dried foods are found there also. Canning budgets are considered important for the first time. Demand has been created for the sale of canned products, but some orders came too late for this year. The homemakers are interested in having orders placed early for next year in order that they may plant accordingly. Orders may be placed with the home demonstration agent or with individual club members.

The community sings which were numerous during the early part of the year are being continued with good attendance and much interest. Over 100 boys, girls, men and women are often in attendance. The Simpson community has planned

for a "Singing School to be conducted by Rev. Pittman of Ayden, this fall. A singing contest will be held in the near future.

HUGE SHARK CAUGHT BY LOCAL FISHERMEN

A 500-pound shark, described as one of the largest ever landed in Carolina waters, was captured by a party of Greenville fishermen during a fishing trip to Swansboro yesterday. The sea monster was landed after a two-hour battle—a pistol being finally brought into play before the mammal could be subdued.

In addition to the shark, which was about ten feet long, the fishermen caught several hundred pounds of fish native to the waters of the

district.

Composing the fishing party were two ministers and four laymen, as follows: Rev. E. L. Hillman, pastor of Jarvis Memorial M. E. Church here; Rev. J. C. Wooten, Dr. Joe Smith, Dr. J. M. Barrett and Sterling H. Brickell.

The shark was hooked and for nearly two hours the fishermen took turns by twos and threes in holding taut the 90-pound line until the shark was in such a state of exhaustion as to be brought alongside the boat. Seeing the size of the monster, and realizing the danger of trying to land the fish alive, it was decided to shoot him. Several shots were fired into the mammal's head and body before he was finally subdued and then he was

hoisted aboard where the surgeons, out of curiosity born of such an occasion, operated on the shark to ascertain the contents of his stomach. This contained a variety of small fish, crabs and small bones, presumably those of deep sea fish. Capt. Wetherington, of Swansboro, is said to have declared the shark to be one of the largest ever landed in Carolina waters, and it was due to his experience no doubt, that the monster was captured.

A'S AND CARDS WILDCATS DUE INCREASE HOLD FOR CHANGES ON PENNANTS IN LINE UP

It seems to be only a matter of time now before the Philadelphia Athletics and St. Louis Cardinals, leaders of the two major leagues, reach the point where their grips on their 1931 pennants are mathematical certainties.

The mortality among the erstwhile contenders has been heavy in the past week or so and today the Cards have only one possible rival left and the A's two.

The New York Giants kept following the pace set by the National League leaders yesterday, even though they had to put an end to Pittsburgh's recent winning streak to do it, but Brooklyn received its dismissal from the hands of the last place Cincinnati Reds.

With all other rivals long since out of it the Washington Senators and New York Yankees still cling to the faint chance that they will overtake the Athletics although that chance grows slimmer day by day.

Seven games behind, the Giants turned in one of the day's greatest feats as they opened their final tour of the west with a 6 to 1 triumph over Pittsburgh. The Pirates had been going great guns to record eight straight victories.

There was no gain registered by the Giants, however, for the St. Louis Cards won their fifth in a row on their fifth successive good pitching performance. Bill Hallahan, downing the Boston Braves 7 to 3, gave only one hit up to the seventh inning.

This victory alone would have been enough to end Brooklyn's chances of taking the pennant, but Cincinnati completed the job by downing the Robins 5 to 1.

Clear out of the race through a nine game losing streak, the Chicago Cubs came back to winning form with a bang. With Pat Malone pitching well and helping his own game with a homer, the Cubs downed the Phillies 17 to 4.

The Athletics and Washington again played just well enough to win a game apiece and hold their places 13 games apart at the head of the American League. They came picked up a half game on the New York Yankees, the other team that has a mathematical chance to win, as the New Yorkers had an off day.

The A's hammered Wallace Herbert of St. Louis for four runs in the first inning then coasted thru to a 5 to 3 triumph.

High Point Loses 20th Straight Game

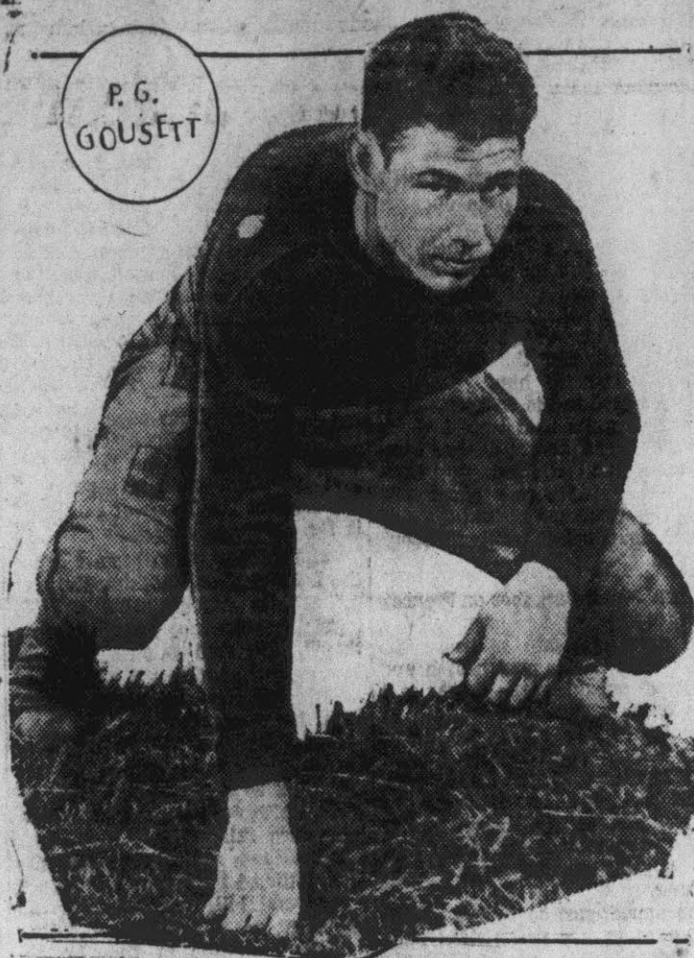

STOCK MARKET

New York, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The stock market was well supported today, despite a morning flurry of large scale liquidation which finally drove such issue as General Motors and General Electric below their bear market lows of June.

An effort to rally the market in the early trading proved premature and the list slumped 1 to 4 points during the forenoon, as stocks were dumped on the market in large blocks.

The market soon dug in its heels however, and managed to recover much of the decline during the early afternoon.

A few issues actually recorded gains of a point or two, including U. S. Steel, American Can, Lows, American Tobacco B, Union Pacific, Alaska Juneau and Homestake Mining.

American Telephone sagged more than 2 points, then all but canceled its loss. Both General Electric and General Motors sagged only about a point, although one block of 10,000 shares of the former was sold. Miscellaneous issues losing 2 to 4 points before the recovery included Allied Chemical, American Water Works, International Harvester, Texas Corp., Procter and Gamble, International Telephone and Eastman. Losses of a point or more appeared throughout the list.

The drop of \$41,800,000 in bankers loans, more than cancelling the small gains of the past three weeks evidently reflected the abandonment of certain speculative efforts to initiate an autumn rally in the market. Call money continued abundant with outside offerings at one per cent.

A feature of the Federal Reserve statement was the further increase of \$57,000,000 in currency in circulation, making a gain of \$98,000,000 in the past fortnight, while this in part reflects holiday requirements, the large gain in the past several weeks is also attributed by bankers to hoarding by a nervous public.

after being blown out of commission as the storm passed over the city.

The government radio station was reported still out of commission at 10 o'clock today.

The hurricane approached the capital yesterday afternoon, gathering force quickly as it neared the city, which is largely built of frame structures on flat ground that edges the usually placid waters of the Gulf of Honduras.

The storm was first reported southeast of Jamaica Monday night, weather bureau reports classifying it as a moderate intensity as it progressed almost due westward, however, it gained force until it apparently became a whirlwind of destruction of death just before it struck the coastal city.

Unofficial reports from steamers some distance away from the center of the storm Wednesday afternoon told of 60 mile an hour winds, although their barometers registered 29.50, a pressure comparatively high for that wind velocity. The center of the storm then was estimated near Swan Island.

Weather reports yesterday morning increasing in intensity and would pass inland south of Belize during the afternoon.

San Juan, Porto Rico, Sept. 11.—(AP)—A hurricane blowing at 100 miles an hour struck this city last night causing considerable minor damage and cutting off communication with the interior of the island.

San Juan service was paralyzed today, electric power plants were cut off of operation and telephones were useless.

The storm struck at 9 P. M., and lasted for two hours. There was great anxiety because it came so close to the anniversary of the big storm of September 13, 1928, which caused \$100,000,000 damage.

But today it appeared that there had been no major damage although buildings were flooded, and trees uprooted, telegraph poles had been blown down and a number of small craft in the harbor had run aground.

The wind came without much previous warning. The weather conditions yesterday afternoon were so good that the steamer Coamo sailed for New York with Governor Roosevelt and more than 200 other passengers aboard.

Shortly before the storm struck the weather bureau issued a warning, and indications at the time that it would be of minor intensity. The bureau's records showed that it was a freak storm which apparently doubled back from the northwest after having passed San Juan earlier.

During a lull in the blow last night F. Eugene Hartwell, head of

the weather bureau, fell from an anemometer tower while he was repairing the instrument. He was in a hospital today with minor injuries.

pleaded for air, telling them he would meet them in groups of five. He went from the deck to a stateroom and there answered numerous questions, always smiling and genial even when the queries appeared foolish to him.

He relented in his decision not to take the regular boat train to Paris because it had no third class compartment and decided to leave with other passengers about 4:30 p. m. He remained aboard the ship several hours before passing through customs.

When Gandhi set foot on France's shores today he had completed a 6,000 mile boat trip to beard the British lion on his own hearth and had spun enough yarn—it was said—to reach around the world.

As he walked down the gangplank in his scant jolcloth, with Miss Madeline Slade, his disciple, at his heels, his lack of attire was a revelation to the blasé French people, who seemed to feel that even a saint should wear more clothing.

The appearance of India's mystical leader in her non-violent fight for independence was made even more grotesque by a nondescript collection of pots, pans and a spinning wheel dangling at his side. He hardly looked the figure upon which it is agreed the fate of the second round table conference depends.

But he soon dissipated whatever prejudice existed against him because of his weird appearance by casting an infectious smile upon those who seemed to regard him as a fanatic. He submitted gracefully to a volley of questions from French journalists, who had difficulty in grasping his quaint biblical English, enunciated in a lisping voice.

The Mahatma looked a bit haggard and anxious for he had lain awake all night in anticipation of

"The people of this state want the Long plan and nothing short of it," Gilbert stated. "May be this legislature does not know that but they'll soon find it out. If it is passed by the legislature and vetoed by the governor, the responsibility is on his shoulders."

An effort also will be made to reduce the acreage clause of the Olsen bill to 25 per cent of the cultivated area for the next two years, legislators said.

The Senate agricultural committee continued its hearings today on the several bills introduced in the upper House. Advocates of cotton acreage limitation of the Senate have agreed on a bill similar to the Olsen bill in the House.

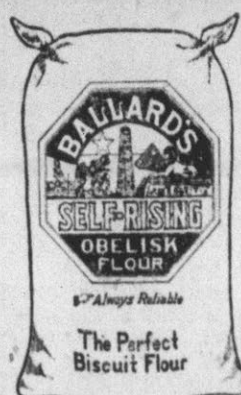

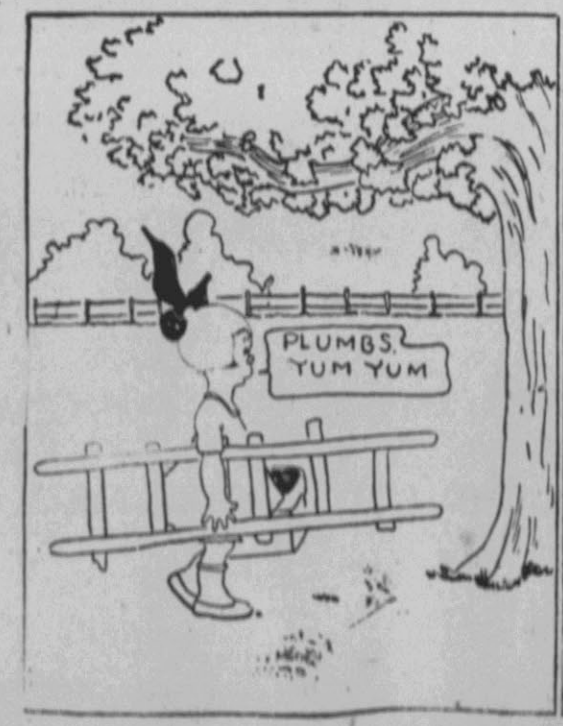
