RAILWAYS ASK FOR MERGER OF EASTERN LINES

Principal Roads Seek Permission to Merge Into Four Great Rail Systems.

Washington, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Principal eastern railroads today asked the Interstate Commerce Commission to permit them to consolidate into four systems.

The plan—presented by the Pennsylvania, the Baltimore and Ohio, the New York Central and the Erie Railroad—materially alters the consolidation plan proposed by the Interstate Commerce Commission in December, 1929.

The commission plan, drawn after lengthy hearings provided five systems in the east.

The four system plan dismembers the northern end of the Washington-Baltimore system, extends the Pennsylvania railroad as far south as Washington, D. C., and Bristol, Tenn.-Va.

Aside from dismemberment of the fifth eastern system, the plan raises a problem for railroad financiers and the commission as to what is to become of the Seaboard Air-Line Railway. The Seaboard, a vital line in the commission plan, has been in receivership since last December.

Today's petition would authorize the roads to consolidate. It informs the commission of the proposed lineup.

The plan represents a compromise on many phases of a problem which has been in negotiation eight years or more. The presidents of the four systems agreed in principle last December, and this agreement was first made public by President Hoover on December 30 last.

The new plan was described as requiring comparatively small expenditures by the petitioning systems. Most of the principal lines involved already are owned by the carriers seeking to incorporate them into one system.

Through assignment of the Winston-Salem South-bound Railway, jointly to the Pennsylvania and the Atlantic Coast Line systems, the Pennsylvania will be enabled to operate its trains as far south as Washington, N. C., south of the terminus of the Winston-Salem South-bound.

The Norfolk and Western, one of the richest railroads in the country, already is controlled by the Pennsylvania, and is allotted to it in the proposed plan. This road operates into Winston-Salem, Durham and Elkhart, N. C., and Bristol, Tenn.-Va.

The transfer of the Monon, operating from Louisville to Chicago to the Baltimore and Ohio, involves negotiations for that road's purchase from the Southern Railway and the Louisville and Nashville, which now own it jointly.

MacDonald Out For Re-Election

London, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Prime Minister MacDonald, again repudiated by his constituents, said today he would run for re-election to Parliament from Seaham Harbor if labor leaders of either official or unofficial organizations invited him to be a candidate.

His decision was viewed as a challenge to the Seaham Harbor labor executive which reiterated its decision to support another candidate last night after he had expressed his reasons for heading the national government and asked for its endorsement.

Under any circumstances he would have a tough battle in his present constituency, it was believed. The Conservative and Liberal candidates polled only 12,000 votes there in the last general election as compared with his 35,163.

Mr. MacDonald visited King George this morning to keep him informed on the latest political developments tending toward a general election the latter part of the month. The cabinet will meet on Monday to prepare a manifesto which is expected to appeal for a "free hand" for the prime minister and his ministry in bridging the nation over its present difficulties.

Draws 15 Years For Killing Wife

Burgaw, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Jose Quirason, 40, who pleaded guilty to second degree murder after killing his wife on the porch of their home near Scotts Hill July 19, today was under a sentence of 15 years in state's prison imposed by Judge Henry A. Grady.

Quirason said he felt his head "go all to pieces" when he read part of a letter from another man to his wife which he had picked up when she dropped it. He immediately grabbed a shotgun and killed her, he said.

J. B. Lewis Passes Away

WOMEN FLIERS TO CONVERGE ON CHARLOTTE

Three Hundred Licensed Pilots to Attend All-Southern Aircraft Pageant.

Charlotte, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Women pilots of the south will fly to Charlotte October 8 for their first meeting.

An organization will probably be formed similar to the Women's National Aeronautical Association, of which Mrs. Clark Stearns, of Coconut Grove, Fla., is president. Of the 300 licensed women pilots in the United States, 40 are southerners. All of these are expected to attend the initial meeting to be held here during the all-southern aircraft pageant, which will last four days and is considered the greatest air event ever held in the south.

Texas has the largest number of women pilots in the south, 21. Seven are scheduled to attend the Charlotte meeting from Missouri, five are coming from Maryland, two each from Virginia, Tennessee and Georgia. North Carolina, South Carolina, Mississippi, Kentucky and Alabama will send one each. Florida has two licensed women pilots. SEEK TO CUT NAVAL COSTS

Adams Hopes to Slice off \$61,000,000 By Keeping a Fifth of Vessels Inactive.

Washington, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Curtailed naval expenditures by keeping inactive one-fifth of the nation's fighting vessels is under consideration by the navy.

This, Secretary Adams describes as one of the many proposals being given thought as the service seeks to cut \$61,000,000 from its estimated \$401,000,000 budget for the next fiscal year at the request of President Hoover.

By rotating the ships in service, including the huge aircraft carriers, Saratoga and Lexington, it has been suggested that many dollars in operation costs could be pared away. In addition, a reduction in both naval and marine corps personnel is under consideration.

Secretary Adams has formally advised his bureau chiefs of President Hoover's demand for curtailment of the budget, and he expects the revised figures to be ready within three weeks.

Making clear that the building program in progress would not be cut, Adams described the necessity for other curtailments as "a very serious matter."

"We have to consider everything in the navy," he added. Indications have been given that plans to construct a sister ship to the new aircraft carrier at a cost of \$2,500,000 might be dismissed. Another suggestion before the officials is that certain shore stations be eliminated.

Police Restore Order in Rioting of Jobless Men

Glasgow, Scotland, Oct. 3.—(AP)—The most vindictive rioting and looting in years, extending intermittently over two nights and a day, came to a climax early today when police swept the streets clear and restored order.

Resuming about 8:30 last night, the battle between jobless men demonstrating against dole reductions and the forces of the law raged for more than six hours. An undetermined number of the rioters and several police were injured and upwards of 100 arrests were made.

The melee began when police charged a body of about 100 men who were holding a manifestation outside the jail in which John McCovern, labor M. P., and L. L. Weatherford, who was arrested last night, were held. Almost simultaneously trouble started in the Galloway, Glasgow Cross and other sections of the city.

Far outnumbered, the police tried on foot and horseback to disperse the mobs. They charged time and again with loaded batons and the rioters replied with hammers, hatchets and makeshift weapons of every description. A variety of missiles thrown from neighboring houses added to the uproar.

CHAMBER ACTS TO BRING END TO DEPRESSION

Planning to Keep Production and Consumption Balanced Favored by Leaders.

Washington, Oct. 3.—(AP)—National planning to keep production and consumption balanced is favored by many business leaders as a preventive of depression.

The idea is embodied in a report, which, a committee of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, headed by Henry I. Harriman of Boston, has given to the chamber's board of directors for approval.

Another committee has told the directors it would "remove a cause of irritation" if Japan, China and other far eastern countries were placed on an immigration quota basis. The discrimination against the Japanese, it said, has handicapped American trade.

The chamber's search for depression preventives and antidotes has had the close attention of President Hoover.

Recommendations it makes to forestall future business slumps will be studied carefully by him, as similar suggestions from other sources have been.

The President has been giving much attention to these proposals for improving economic conditions. Among them have been pleas for an international conference to consider bi-metalism, the latest from Senator Borah of Idaho.

The administration, however, has shown no signs it has been moved by the arguments of the silver supporters and has reiterated confidence in the gold standard.

LEAF PRICES CLIMB HERE

R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company Boosts Prices on Greenville Market.

The R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company played an important part in the general advance of prices on the Greenville tobacco market yesterday.

Prices, which had been slumping conspicuously since the opening of the market the first part of September, were said to have increased approximately 35 per cent under impetus of bidding by Reynolds buyers.

The price increase, while covering the majority of brands, was especially evident on the leafy types of tobacco such as used by the Reynolds Company in the manufacture of their products.

Representatives of R. J. Reynolds stated the first of the season that they required specific types of tobacco and had instructed their buyers to pay good prices for them.

For the first time during the season prices for the leafy grades went as high as fifty cents a pound, and the rise was said to have produced elation among both tobaccoists and planters.

Bidding by Reynolds buyers was said to have been more pronounced than any time of the season, and this also brought about greater competition among other buying interests.

Probe Killing of Rum Maker

Florence, Oct. 3.—(AP)—The shooting in the back and fatal wounding of a 35 year old father of seven children, surprised at a still in the Evergreen section of this county by four officers, was subject of an investigation today by federal and county officers.

The man, Clyde Brewer, a former sawmill employee, said to have moved to this state from North Carolina, was slain yesterday as J. C. Fairley and W. J. Sarrett, federal prohibition agents; W. H. Worrell, magistrate's constable, and L. L. Weatherford, who was arrested last night, were held.

At an inquest, which was adjourned until next week after two witnesses were heard, Rastus Edgerton, 13-year-old negro, said he and Brewer were at the still and ran at the approach of the officers.

Fairley said he and Weatherford had been posted near the still and as the two other officers approached the liquor plant he heard shots and saw Brewer come running toward him. After Brewer had run approximately 60 yards he fell dead.

Flopping Leaf Prices Bound Upward Here

Flopping tobacco prices took a pronounced bound upward on the Greenville tobacco market yesterday and the highest prices of the season were registered, it was announced by K. W. Cobb, supervisor of sales.

For the first time this season prices rose above the fifty-cent mark, and bidding was lively throughout the sale.

The market yesterday sold 979,218 pounds at a general average of \$9.87 per hundred pounds, bringing the season's total sales to 17,989,869 pounds.

NEGRO SLAYER SHOT IN JAIL

Brother Fires on Assault of Dead Sister During Inquiry at Birmingham.

Birmingham, Ala., Oct. 3.—(AP)—A moment after Miss Nell Williams, society girl, re-affirmed identification of a negro and another girl in a mountain holdup, he was shot down in the jail by her brother, Dent Williams.

Today the negro, Willie Peterson, 34, was in a critical condition at a hospital here while city and county officials stood guard with riot guns to prevent possible disorder. More than 100 members of the Birmingham units of the Alabama National Guard were mobilized against an emergency.

Peterson was arrested September 23 when Miss Williams pointed him out on the street as the negro who held up her automobile August 4, shot her and fatally wounded her sister, Augusta, and a friend, Miss Jennie Wood, after keeping them captive several hours on a lonely mountain road.

Miss Williams had reiterated her identification of Peterson at the jail and officers began to question him further, when her 25-year-old brother whipped out a pistol and fired five times. Two of the shots took effect in the negro's chest and one in his left arm.

Williams was arrested on a charge of assault with intent to murder, and later released under \$1,000 bond. Persons present in the jail at the time of the shooting besides Miss Williams and her brother, were her mother and father, Chief of Police Fred H. McDuff, Sheriff J. F. Hawkins, Long and other officers. Before the conference officers searched all persons entering the jail and Sheriff Hawkins said a gun was taken off Dent Williams at that time.

Roderick Biddow, attorney for Williams, said the young man had hidden the second gun in his waist band and that the gun was overlooked by the officers.

Long Hammers on Cotton Plan

Baton Rouge, La., Oct. 3.—(AP)—Again in the midst of a radio campaign in behalf of the Louisiana 1932 cotton holiday plan, Guy P. Long has told Mississippi farmers if their legislature would pass a no-cotton bill there was still hope for other southern states to act similarly.

He spoke last night over station KWKH of Shreveport, asking Mississippians to rally around the holiday movement, denouncing its opponents as "tools of the cotton interests" and scoring Governor Ross Sterling of Texas.

Texas turned down the cotton plan. "It is impossible to win the cotton fight yet if the Mississippi legislature passes the right kind of law," said Governor Long.

"If Mississippi passes the no-cotton law, there will be three states. Then Arkansas will probably come in and maybe Georgia. Then we will be in a position to work on Texas."

Durfey Given 8 to 10 Years

Raleigh, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Carey K. Durfey, former Raleigh broker and executor of a million dollar estate, today faced from 8 to 10 years in state's prison for embezzling \$116,800 from the Florence, P. Tucker estate and other funds from brokerage customers.

Judge Walter L. Small imposed sentence in 11 cases which had been brought against Durfey in Wake Superior court.

S. Wade Marr, former partner of Durfey, was acquitted of collusion when exonerated by Durfey, but faces other charges in connection with the failure of their firm.

PRES. HOOVER CONFERS WITH N. Y. FINANCIER

Economic Situation is Discussed with Baruch at a Breakfast Conference.

Washington, Oct. 3.—(AP)—President Hoover today discussed the European economic situation at a breakfast conference with Bernard Baruch, New York financier.

Baruch has just returned from Europe, where he surveyed the industrial and economic situation.

Aside from the subject, no details of the conference were disclosed at the White House.

Baruch declined to discuss his talk with the President. During the morning, Mr. Hoover also conferred with Secretary of the Interior, but no information was forthcoming as to their topic.

The Secretary of State spent most of yesterday in consultation with Senator Morrow, of New Jersey. Both were delegates to the London naval conference, where they met Premier Laval of France.

Arrangements are now going ahead for the French statesmen's visit with President Hoover here.

Later Baruch said at his hotel that he felt he should not discuss his breakfast conference with the President.

"In courtesy to the President," Baruch said, "I believe that he alone should be allowed to say what subjects we discussed. He asked me to come down as his guest. I was glad to give my views and listen to what he had to say."

SAYS TWO MEN NOT PIRATES

Widow of Drowned Yachtsman Fails to Identify 2 Suspects Held in Florida.

Daytona Beach, Fla., Oct. 3.—(AP)—Dr. Leslie D. Ritchie and his son were released from custody here early today when Mrs. Benjamin P. Collings failed to identify them as the "pirates" who recently boarded the Collings yacht on Long Island Sound, killed her husband and abducted her.

With an attorney, William L. Kelley, the Stamford, Conn., yachtsman's widow arrived here at midnight from New York to view the Ritchies who were arrested two days before.

Only officers and attorneys were present when Mrs. Collings confronted the two prisoners. They stood in a group of twelve men of similar appearance.

She singled them out readily, but she said, it was because she had previously seen pictures of them. As Mrs. Collings shook her head negatively, Dr. Ritchie spoke up. "I am not the man," he said.

"No," Mrs. Collings assented. "Thank you," said Ritchie.

Then William Ritchie, 23-year-old son of the former veterinarian, rushed up to Mrs. Collings and shook her hand emotionally.

A few minutes after Mrs. Collings failed to identify the Ritchies the pair were released from custody. They left the jail with their wives and the 3-year-old daughter of the younger man for their home, located near a wood yard they operate on the outskirts of the city.

The wives of the Ritchies, who, like newspapermen, were barred from the meeting with Mrs. Collings had anxiously awaited them outside the latched door of the room where the hearing was held. Attorneys for the Ritchies announced Mrs. Collings' failure to identify them and told what went on at the brief meeting.

Cotton Issue Still Before Miss. Solons

Jackson, Miss., Oct. 3.—(AP)—The Mississippi legislature, which met in special session Tuesday, is still to act finally upon some measure for relief of the cotton industry.

As the cotton question stood today, the Senate had passed the Roberts-Sillers bill, designed to curtail acreage in 1932 and 1933 to 90 per cent of the 1931 lands in cultivation and the bill had a favorable recommendation from the House committee on agriculture.

The legislature adjourned until Monday and the bill was set as a special order of business in the House of Representatives for Tuesday.

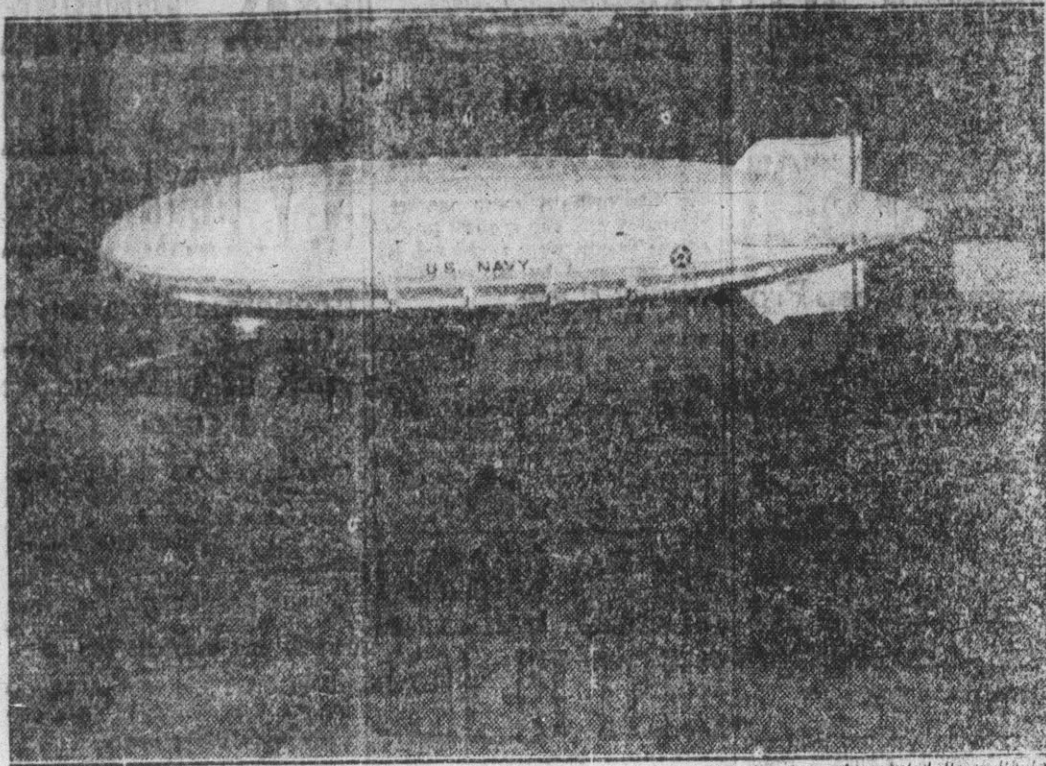

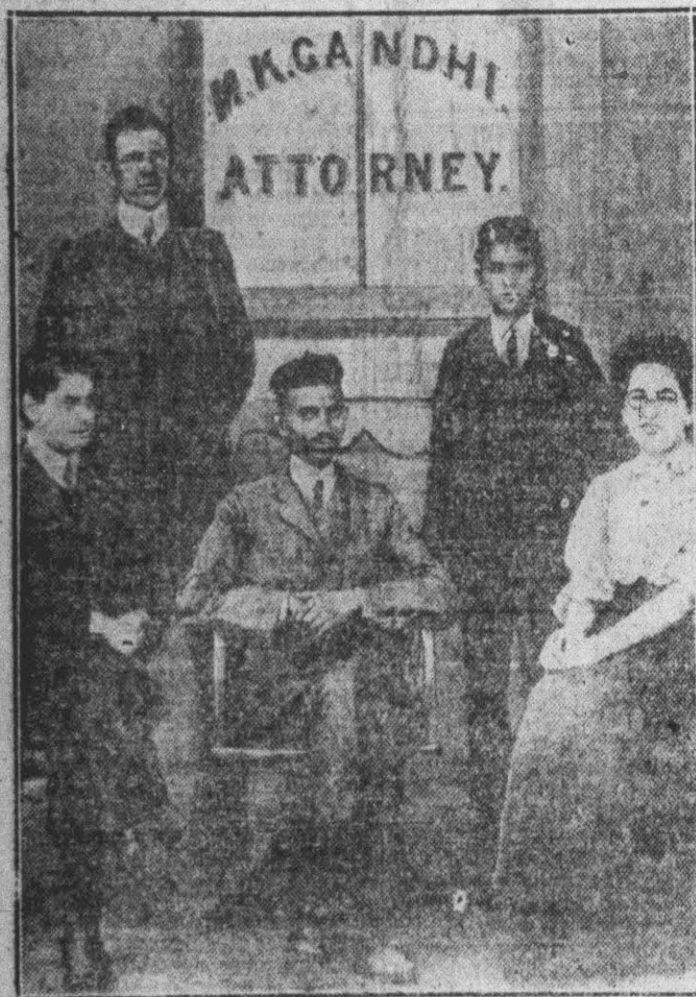

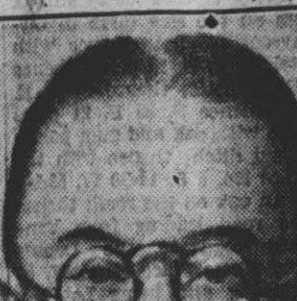

It was easy for the President to boast of the power of his party to continue the prosperity enjoyed by the country when he was elected but it is altogether another proposition to make it an actuality when all the world is clamoring for it.

Everybody will hope the President is going to be able to provide relief, but it is a task too big for one man, or a small group of men to handle on such short notice.

Nobody envies the job the President has taken upon his shoulders and if he is able to find that prosperity bend in the road and then around to it he will be far more capable than the public gives him credit of being.

The Greenville tobacco market is running a hard race with the corresponding season in an attempt to keep ahead of the sales for that period.

The end of sales of this week put the market above the seventeen million pound mark slightly under the same period last year.

However, with the bulk of the crop yet to be sold it is believed the market will forge into a definite lead within the next two weeks and maintain it the remainder of the season.

Due to the price situation, farmers have not been marketing their tobacco as rapidly as in past years when prices were more favorable, but if prices continue to improve the market should be glutted with offerings of the farmers through the Christmas holidays.

Greenville is probably selling more tobacco this season than any other market in the state and when the year closes it would not be surprising to see it in the front ranks.

N. Y. COTTON

New York, Oct. 3.—(AP)—The cotton market opened steady today at an advance of one point to a decline of 2 points, with most months lower under a renewal of southern selling. Traders paid little attention to the higher Liverpool cables but the early offerings were quite readily absorbed by trade buying and covering and early fluctuations were within a narrow range.

By the end of the first half hour December was off to 5.68 and March to 5.87, with the general list showing net declines of about 3 to 6 points. It was reported that at the close yesterday, Liverpool was well below an import parity and the relative strength there was regarded as due partially to a readjustment of the differences and the reaction in sterling.

Liverpool cables reported heavy general buying and covering and said the demand for cotton cloths and yarns had been sustained. Egyptian futures in Alexandria were 88 to 138 points higher. The amount of cotton on shipboard awaiting clearance at the end of the week was estimated at 79,000 bales against 118,000 last year.

STOCK MARKET

New York, Oct. 3.—(AP)—A relapse in stocks was matched by further improvement in bonds today, and as Wall Street feels that a better bond market is vital to recovery elsewhere, the week ended with sentiment somewhat improved.

Stocks were unsettled by a fresh sinking spell in the rail shares, which dropped 2 to 5 points to new lows, dragging down the general list. The turnover was not particularly large, amounting to nearly a million shares, but leading stocks lost ground easily.

The renewed pressure against the rails was coincident with the filing of the four-party eastern consolidation plan with the Interstate Commerce Commission, and presumably indicated that the market had discounted the favorable aspects of the plan well in advance. Wall Street is particularly concerned now over the prospect of higher freight rates.

The market closed virtually at the lowest prices of the day.

There was little in the way of business or financial news to account for the swift reaction in shares, after they had laboriously managed to close higher yesterday, and most observers regarded it as reflecting a further wave of hang-over of liquidation.

Wall Street was keenly interested in the information that the Stock Exchange had issued warning against attributing declines to "bear raids" without some real evidence of bear raiding.

The cotton market continued slowly downward, as it has throughout the week, closing with the moderate losses of 60 to 70 cents a bale.

In foreign exchanges, sterling again reacted, touching \$3.84 then rallying a cent for a net loss of 6 cents. The London market was again dull.
