PROPOSAL OF DEBT HOLIDAY DRAWS FIRE

Farm Leaders Say the Suggestion for Moratorium Will Lack Their Support.

Washington, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Opposition to suggestions for a moratorium on debts owing federal land banks is growing among national farm organizations.

Organized farm leaders say any such proposals placed before Congress will lack their support. They believe the moratorium idea will be defeated if it should be presented.

The low price of wheat and President Hoover's one-year suspension of intergovernmental debts gave rise to talk of suspending farm debts for a similar period of time. In the middle west last June and July the comment was freely heard that if Germany and other foreign nations can be given financial relief, why not hard-pressed farmers.

Chester H. Gray, Washington representative of the American Farm Bureau Federation, said today the sentiment of those of his organization with whom he has discussed the subject is opposed to a moratorium. He emphasized, however, the federation has taken no official action. The federation's annual convention is in December.

Leaders of another nationally-known farm organization have strongly disapproved it and will sponsor opposition at the group's annual convention this fall.

This opposition is based entirely on the belief that a suspension of payments on interest or principal of the more than \$1,000,000,000 outstanding in loans would destroy the integrity of the system, be economically unsound and fail to give any lasting relief to farmers.

President Hoover, in his program for strengthening the nation's financial institutions, intends to ask Congress to provide an additional capitalization of \$50,000,000 for federal land banks. This money, \$5,000,000 for each of the twelve banks, would be used to extend credit to farmers. The administration would not agree to a moratorium.

Hold Funeral For C. L. Tyson

Farmville, N. C., Oct. 17.—Funeral rites for Charles L. Tyson, a well known and highly respected farmer of the Ballard's section, who died at his home on the farm, known as the Dr. Blount place at 2 o'clock Wednesday morning, were held from the home Thursday afternoon and interment was made in the Aiden cemetery. He was 65 years of age. Death resulted from a complication of organic diseases and after an illness of several months.

Mr. Tyson was the son of the late Job Tyson and Jane Parker Tyson. He is survived by his wife, who was formerly Miss Lizzie Willoughby and eight sons and daughters. He was a pioneer farmer of Pitt County, and was at one time a member of the firm of Cannon and Tyson in Aiden, but retired from business several years ago.

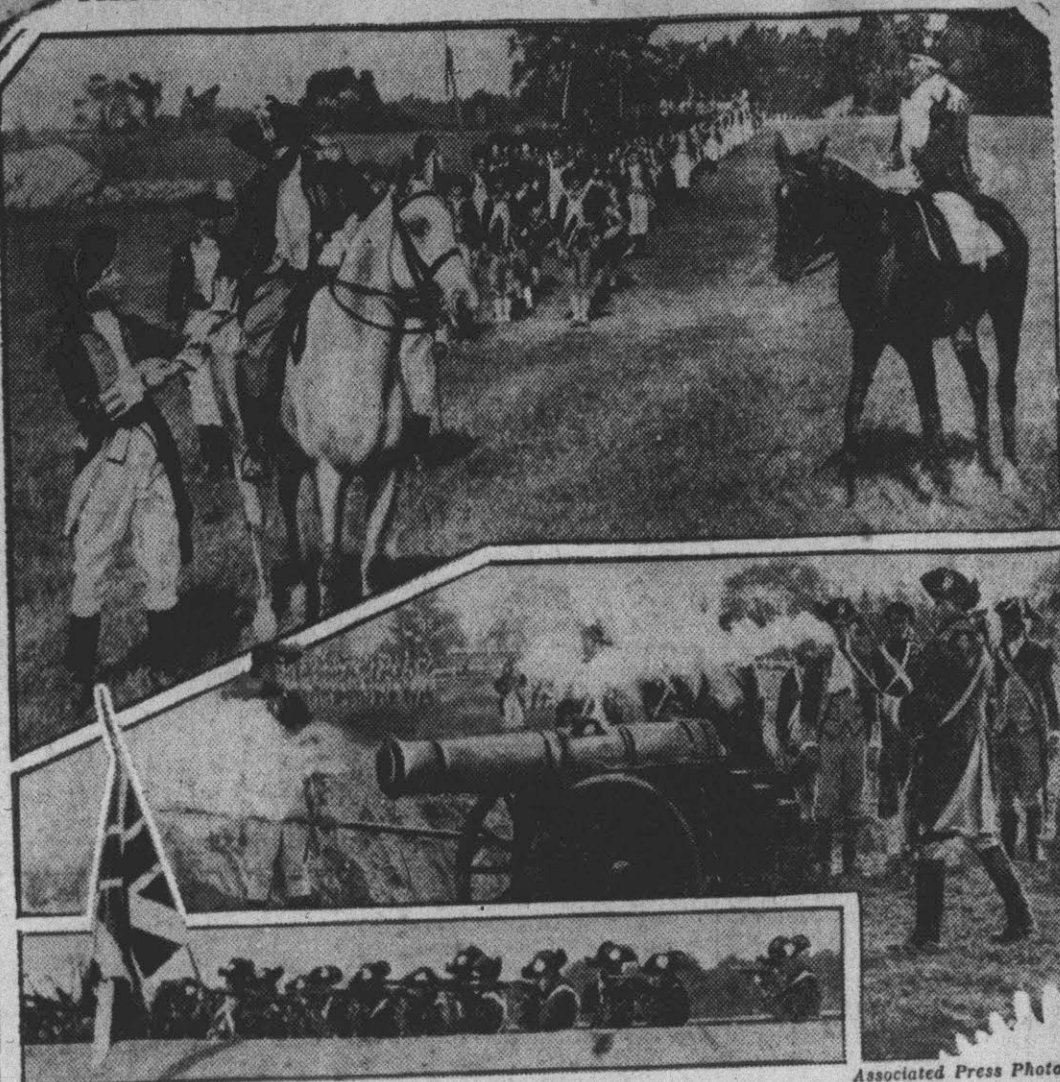
'Rote' Governor Visits Farmville

Farmville, N. The Wilson executive urged the Kiwanians to use their influence toward setting higher standards for their boys and girls, so that their lives might count for improvement of civilization.

He said the Scouts were faithful in the performance of their duty as organization members, but could not be expected to carry on through life without inspiration derived from the community.

Former Banker Faces Several Criminal Cases

Hendersonville, Oct. 17.—(AP)—F. S. Wetmur, former vice-president and director of the defunct First Bank and Trust Company here, today faced six criminal charges contained in a bill of indictment returned by the Henderson County grand jury.

Four of the counts pertain to one transaction, in which Wetmur is alleged to have abstracted \$3,958 from the bank for the benefit of Wetmur Motor Company, of which he was president. Besides the abstraction, the indictment charges misapplication of the bank's funds, making a loan to an insolvent company and permitting the bank to make a loan to an insolvent company.

Another count charges an illegal loan of \$4,500 to the motor company, and the sixth charges violation of the banking laws in permitting this loan.

The former banker has not been arrested, it being understood he is visiting relatives in the middle west.

PREPARE FOR RELIEF DRIVE

State-Wide Campaign in Behalf of the Poor to Begin Last Week of Month.

Raleigh, Oct. 17.—(AP)—A state-wide campaign to organize relief work for this winter will be conducted the last week in this month, the Governor's council on unemployment relief announced following an executive session held here.

The purpose of the drive will be to provide relief agencies in communities not now so served, and to arrange for co-operation among all such agencies in the state.

Field agents named to aid in this work were Miss Lois Doser, of the state welfare department, L. T. Mallard, of the department of labor, and Miss Janita McDougal, of the department of education.

Plans for the week's drive are to be completed at a meeting with Governor Gardner next week, R. W. Henninger, secretary of the council, announced. Besides Mr. Henninger, those attending the meeting yesterday were Dean I. O. Schaub, of N. C. State college; Mrs. W. T. Bost, state commissioner of welfare; Frank Grist, commissioner of labor; T. E. Brown, of the department of education, and E. B. Jeffers, chairman of the state highway commission.

State Fair to Close Today

Raleigh, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Today will mark the close of North Carolina's 1931 State fair, supervised this year by the state department of agriculture, with indications that the attendance will go above figures set at any of the previous three fairs operated by the state.

Prizes for the exhibitions will be awarded today. Experts have classified the livestock exhibits this year as the greatest ever held in the state and competition has been keen in that field.

Yesterday was "school day" at the fair. Bus load after bus load of students from many parts of the state arrived during the program, and were admitted free to the exposition.

EDISON HEART GROWS WEAKER

Dr. Howe Increases Frequency of Bulletins as Noted Inventor Nears End.

West Orange, N. J., Oct. 17.—(AP)—The strong heart of Thomas A. Edison was weakening today, as indicated by a pulse which his doctors described as "poor."

Dr. Hubert S. Howe, who for the first time remained all night with his patient, issued his first bulletin at 9:30 a. m. today, an hour earlier than had been his custom. He indicated that from now on he would probably issue a bulletin every three hours.

"Mr. Edison has remained all night," the first bulletin read, "in a condition which has all the appearance of normal sleep. He is breathing quietly and easily. His pulse," (Continued on page three)

NAVAL SLASH FACES STORM

Curtailed Budget Estimate Expected to Meet Rough Weather in Congress.

Washington, Oct. 17.—(AP)—The navy's curtailed budget estimate clipping millions from projected expenditures, probably is headed straight for rough weather.

An enormous proportion of the savings suggested by Adams and his admirals comes from shore activities, employing many men, supplying trade to many communities. Members of Congress normally set up a great clamor any time that kind of cut is proposed around their home towns.

Pitt county won a signal victory at Raleigh yesterday when the Board of Assessment dismissed appeals from local assessments of property brought by fifty-one taxpayers of the county.

The decision brings to an end a long drawn out controversy over the assessment program announced by county officials during the summer months, the Board of Assessment being the final authority to which such appeals may be carried.

ASKS CAPONE CONVICTION

The District Attorney Pleads with Jury to Convict Gangster in Tax Evasion Case.

Federal Building, Chicago, Oct. 17.—(AP)—A commanding general taking up the cudgils of battle himself, United States District Attorney George E. Q. Johnson, pleaded with a federal jury today to convict Al Capone for evading income taxes and rid the city of his "sinister influence."

"His counsel suggested that this man is a modern Robin Hood," said the gray-haired prosecutor, speaking slowly and emphatically. "Did this Robin Hood buy thousands of dollars worth of diamond belt buckles for the unemployed? Did this Robin Hood buy thousands of dollars worth of meat to feed the poor and hungry? Were those \$27 shirts to protect the men who sleep beneath the city's streets?"

Johnson said he was "a little bewildered" by the defense's attempt to "place a halo of mystery and romance" around the head of the gang leader. And he resented, the prosecutor said, the defense's statement that the government, at the end of a "frivolous" prosecution, would try to "con" a verdict of conviction.

The prosecutor referred to Capone's method of keeping his name out of all records possible and handling currency almost exclusively.

But even the "master mind" attempting to commit the perfect income tax crime, slipped. He cashed one of those \$2,500 gambling house checks. Again the "master mind" slipped up. He went to Florida, far away from here, and cashed checks from Jack Guzik.

"When they asked him who Jack Guzik was, he replied, 'he's my financial secretary,' and 'he's my business associate.' That was his worst slip."

The defense attorneys talked four hours before in final arguments. But they did not in any way explain the \$77,000 worth of money orders Capone received in Florida. Those checks came from Chicago, the Lexington hotel, where men using assumed names surrounded the defendant.

Manteo Sets Peace Record

Manteo, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Chief of Police D. S. Brickhouse says he and the lawyers in the county with Judge W. F. Baum might as well destroy the jail, turn the courthouse into an office building and rent the court room for a dance hall.

In three weeks there have been no warrants served, no court has been held and a longer time the jail has been empty.

Theatres to Aid in Relief Work

Pinehurst, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Coming activities of the North and South Carolina Theatre Owners Association should result in over \$50,000 for unemployment relief, C. W. Picquet, president of the association, says.

FORMER JUDGE AGAIN IN JAIL

Walter Brock is Remanded to Prison Following Failure to Produce Bond.

Winston-Salem, N. C., Oct. 17.—(AP)—Walter E. Brock, former Superior court judge, was remanded to jail here today when he failed to provide \$300 bond following his arrest on charges of giving three worthless checks totaling \$44.

The former judge was arraigned in court here today and faced with the charges on which he was arrested at Raleigh some time ago.

He gave bond at Raleigh for his appearance to answer the charges here but he failed to appear and a capias was issued. Several days ago his case was called and he again failed to appear.

Warrants for him and his bondsman, C. J. Broadway of Greensboro, were issued and yesterday Broadway brought Brock into court.

Brock was arrested by Greensboro city detectives. He appeared in court and his case was continued. He was unable to give \$300 bond and last night was placed in (Continued on page three)

HOOVER SEEKS BIG SAVINGS

President Again Asks for Rigid Economy in Operation of the Government.

Washington, Oct. 17.—(AP)—President Hoover plans to lay before Congress a 1933 budget stripped of every "cent consonant with the obligations of the government."

In an effort to bring expenditures and revenues into closer relationship he has demanded that every principal government officer revise downward estimates for the next fiscal year. Meritorious and unmeritorious projects alike are to be shelved.

He has also asked the aid of public opinion in support of "drastic economies."

Standing before a group of newspapermen gathered for his regular press conference Hoover said: "In times when the income of the people is reduced and when taxes or loans may stifle economic recovery there is only one course of sound fiscal policy, and that is to reduce the expenditures of the government to the last cent consonant with the obligations of the government."

Before him, the President has the statement of the treasury showing a deficit for the first three months of the present fiscal year since July 1 totaling \$502,106,600. This is approximately \$485,000,000 more than it was for the same period of last year, when the twelve months deficiency amounted to nearly a billion dollars.

Departing from his prepared statement, the President injected a belief that improved conditions were in the offing. He said it was difficult to estimate now for expenditures to be made after next July 1, when better times could be expected.

Many had believed that Mr. Hoover would discuss at his conference the recent and much-discussed slash in the navy's budget estimate. But he gave it but passing attention as he said similar cuts were being studied in every governmental department. No conclusions are to be reached finally until the budget goes to Congress.

MORE STRIFE IN LOUISIANA

Political Comedy Increases with Another Claimant for Office.

New Orleans, La., Oct. 17.—(AP)—The cast of what Governor and Senator-elect Huey P. Long called Louisiana's "political comedy" is growing more extensive and more confused.

Involved in the hand-made executive turmoil today were three claimants to the job of governor, three to that of lieutenant-governor and two to that of senator. The latest bidder for a political position was the new senatorial aspirant.

The leader in the gubernatorial insurrection, Dr. Paul N. Cyr, was in New Orleans today to confer with his attorney on the ouster suit he said he would file for the governor's job.

Early this week, Cyr, who was elected lieutenant-governor when Long became governor, voluntarily took the oath of the office of governor and demanded that Long turn over the executive chair to him. He said Long's election to the United States Senate vacated the governorship.

The governor had other ideas about the matter and refused, declaring, at the same time, that Cyr, through his action, had vacated the office of lieutenant-governor. Alvin King, president pro tem of the Senate, took the lieutenant-governor's oath and Long declared him on and Cyr off the state payroll.

All this started an epidemic of oath taking. William L. Aldrich, unemployed Shreveport man, took the governor's oath declaring, he, too, was going to try to take over the job. L. D. Smith, of Benton, also unemployed, meanwhile proceeded to take the oath of office of lieutenant-governor.

Joseph C. Land, unemployed contractor of Shreveport, added the final touch yesterday by taking the oath of office of United States Senator and declaring that office, to which Long recently was elected, is vacant. Land said that due to the "present depression" he could use the \$10,000 salary of the office.

HEARING HELD HERE TODAY

Commissioners Answer the Complaints Contained in Order Restraining County from Turning Over Books for Collection of 1931 Taxes; Case Centers About Constitutionality of Reduction Provided By Last General Assembly.

Following hearing on an order restraining Pitt county commissioners from turning over books for collection of 1931 taxes, Judge J. Paul Frizzelle, of Snow Hill, stated this afternoon that he would return a decision in the case sometime Monday. Copies of his judgment will be forwarded to this city immediately upon completion.

The hearing involved complaints filed against the County by S. T. Hooker and others claiming valuations excessive and contrary to state law. Judge Frizzelle granted an injunction October 5 restraining the county from delivering tax books to collectors for collection of the 1931 levy.

He said that whatever his decision in the case he desired, it be carried to a higher court as a test case so that some definite decision might be obtained as to the constitutionality of the action of the Legislature.

The hearing was attended by several hundred people from different parts of the county, and affidavits and arguments for the taxpayers were presented by Judge F. M. Wooten, who filed the petition for the restraining order in behalf of Mr. Hooker.

The county's position was presented by J. B. James, who stated that the government had fixed values according to provisions of legislation enacted by the last General Assembly.

A similar action was declared "frivolous" in a ruling handed down by Judge Barnhill in Superior court last year, and the Board of Assessment sitting at Raleigh yesterday rejected appeals from local assessments of property brought by fifty-one taxpayers of the county.

The decision of the assessment board was looked upon as a signal victory for the county in that this is the highest authority to which appeals of this kind may be taken.

Acquire More Land for Park

Asheville, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Acquisition of 414,627 acres of land to be added to two national forests in Western North Carolina has begun, M. A. Mattin, forest supervisor, has announced.

Of the additional land, 145,229 acres are for inclusion in the Pisgah National Forest, while 269,398 are to be added to the Nantahala forest, farther west.

This program of expansion is the largest undertaken in Western North Carolina by the government since 1911. The Pisgah program will involve expenditure of approximately \$700,000, with approximately \$1,400,000 involved in the Nantahala project. In this latter project, 139,000 acres of the additional land lie in South Carolina and Georgia.

Abandon Hope for Jap Ship

San Francisco, Oct. 17.—(AP)—The Japanese freighter Yonan Maru with its crew of between forty and fifty men, was given up for lost today, the only trace of the vessel found by three searching ships in mid-ocean was part of its deck-load of logs.

The liner President Jefferson, on which colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh are returning from the Orient to the United States reached the scene of the Yonan Maru's distress shortly before noon yesterday in response to a series of frantic calls for help, but could not find the ship.

tory.

1,500,000 pounds of tobacco and
had a million pounds left on the
floors of the various warehouses
which was sold next day.

This shows the speed with which
the market is capable of handling
enormous offerings of bright leaf.
Had a similar amount of tobacco
been offered for sale a few years
ago the market would have been
a week recovering from the shock.

Greenville, through extensive im-
provements to factory and ware-
house facilities and buying corps is
in position to offer the best service
of any market in the country. At
this time the market is leading the
world from the standpoint of sales
and prices are as good if not bet-
ter than paid elsewhere.

When service is to be had it may
be found on the floors of the eight
large warehouses here. The opera-
tors years ago set their eyes on
the goal as represented in the lar-
gest tobacco market in the world and
this year finds them standing on
the threshold of realization of the
achievement.

The market led the state average
in prices last season, and stands a
good chance of leading all other
markets from standpoint of volume
with the two million pounds lead
which it holds at this time.

In an effort to provide for the
poor during the winter months, Boy
Scouts made a round of business
and residential districts today col-
lecting clothing which will be dis-
tributed to the poor through the
Welfare Department.

At this time it is impossible to
estimate how much clothing was
collected by the Scouts but it is safe
to say Greenville people, fully aware
of the serious situation confronting
the indigent population, contributed
freely to their cause.

Doubtless there will be other
campaigns waged in this cause be-
tween now and the holiday season,
but it is questionable if enough
food and clothing and fuel will be
provided to prevent acute suffering
among the families of jobless men.

However, the relief campaign un-
doubtedly will be one of the most
extensive in the history of the coun-
ty, and privation will be reduced to
a minimum.

K. T. Futrell, director of the De-
partment of Public Welfare, one of
the best posted men in the county
on conditions prevailing among the
poor, says many children are out of
school at this time because of in-
adequate clothing. He believes the
condition will increase in serious-
ness as the winter advances and
has sent out an urgent plea asking

the people to give to the extent of
their resources to mitigate the suf-
fering as much as possible.

"It brought independence to a nation that has become great among the nations of the earth, and established the principle of democratic government. It sealed for all time the friendship between the peoples of France and America."

Replying Marshal Petain said: "The collaboration between America and France begun in 1780, again established in 1917, had fruitful results not only for our two peoples, but for the whole world. Doubtless it is not yet an end. May it continue henceforth and always in favor of peace."

The great commanders of the armies of France and the United States, spoke from the same platform in the celebration area of the second day of the four day observance of the 150th anniversary of the Battle of Yorktown when the British forces capitulated to French and American arms to end the Revolutionary war and bring independence to the American colonies.

tions council had decided to permit an American representative to participate in discussions over Manchuria created such concern among officials that the war and foreign departments continued activity.

Reno News Agency said the statement of army authorities was made after a meeting at which they voted to uphold Japan's stand. Army authorities, according to the agency, contended that since the government repeatedly had stated the recent difficulties in Manchuria should be settled without the intervention of a third party "it is extremely meddlesome on America's part to concern herself with a serious issue arising from a region where Japan has special

peculiar relations. Such a step would only irritate the sensitive feelings of the Japanese people."

Minister of War Goro Minami called representatives of the Vernacular newspapers to a conference at which he said the Geneva action was "plainly an attempt to drag America into the affair."

Emphasizing Japan's contention that no third party should be brought into the negotiations, he said, "it is quite natural that the league's efforts, amounting to little more than intervention, cannot please Japan."

Minami said American participation in the proceedings was liable "to defeat the very aim of the council as that would only encourage a wrong attitude in China to avoid direct negotiations with Japan and to make use of a third party for her selfish ends."

Washington, Oct. 17.—(AP)—In the face of open resentment by the Japanese minister of war, a representative of the United States is sitting at Geneva with the League of Nations council.

The league's invitation to the United States to help untangle the Manchurian difficulties of China and Japan is described by the Japanese Minister General Minami, as "plainly an attempt to drag America into the affair."

In Tokyo he said league intervention would be "little short of intervention" and would "not please Japan."

The action of the State Department in naming Prentiss Gilbert, American consul at Geneva, as "observer and auditor" followed the council's 13 to 1 vote to admit the United States. Japan alone dissented.

The reference in his first bulletin today to Edison's pulse being poor was considered of significance because it is the inventor's strong heart which has sustained him so long despite the poison which, his weakened system has been unable to eliminate.

All the members of Edison's immediate family were at the home today or within easy call in case of any emergency. Although Dr. Howe spoke in his bulletin of Edison's apparently normal sleep he made it clear in speaking with reporters that this condition was in reality only a continuation of the coma from which the inventor is expected to slip quietly into death.

Dr. Howe's noon bulletin read: "There was very little change in Mr. Edison's condition during the past three hours."

county commissioners were governed by the 1931 statute limiting all net reductions in all counties to ten per cent.

The county was represented by Attorney J. B. James, but Judge P. M. Wooten, who filed fifty of the suits, was not present to press the claims of the taxpayers. The fifty-first suit was filed by S. O. Worthington.

The suits followed in the wake of the meeting of the Board of Commissioners during the summer when they sat as a Board of Equalization to receive reports of the assessors and complaints of taxpayers.

The claims of the taxpayers were presented at the time, but the commissioners declined to reverse their action, contending that they were abiding by the law. The taxpayers immediately appealed to the state board.

State Adopts Supplement for School Funds

Raleigh, Oct. 17.—(AP)—After wandering through a mass of individual community school problems for days, the State Board of Equalization today had adopted a schedule of maximum supplements which, the various districts might apply to school funds provided by the state.

The supplements which augment the state allotment range from 5 to 50 per cent, over and above debt service and capital outlay items, which are paid for entirely from local funds.

The schedule, with some exceptions, applies to all local school funds, whether derived from a county-wide supplement or obtained by special district levy.

Greensboro, which had \$80,000 lopped from its budget by the action, felt the imposition of the schedule more keenly than any other community, but the ruling principally affects 730 rural districts which were allotted aid from the \$1,600,000 state "tax reduction" fund. They are not allowed to apply from local funds, more than five per cent of the state allotment.

In all districts the schedule was made to cover the extended term budgets, rather than the six months budgets, and in all rural districts employing agriculture and home economics teachers whose salaries are paid in part by the state and part by the federal government, these salaries were removed from the local budgets. These steps served to somewhat alleviate the cuts in school funds.
