MACDONALD TALKS OVER NEW PROGRAM

Confers with the King and Cabinet regarding Task of Rehabilitation.

London, Oct. 29.—(AP)—The British national government was back at work today under the direction of Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald, cautioning humility over the results of the election and addressing itself to the sober task of executing the "doctor's mandate" it asked and received from the people.

Backed by an unprecedented majority of more than 500 of the 615 seats of the House of Commons, the Prime Minister began today a series of conferences with King George and with his cabinet to lay the groundwork for the rehabilitation program which is to be presented to Parliament early next month.

The British press, adding its voice to that of Mr. MacDonald and Stanley Baldwin, conservative leader, cautioned the country to remember the victory was a triumph of the national government and not of any party, in spite of the fact that the conservatives will occupy nearly five-sixths of the seats in the new Parliament.

The predominance of conservatives led to the expectation that a demand for a full-blooded protection policy would be the first trouble encountered by MacDonald. He is pledged not to impose protection until it has been fully investigated and scientific legislation has been prepared.

Other measures which are expected to make up a principal part of the new government's program are stabilization of the pound, negotiations for a review of world war debts and correcting the British adverse trade balance.

Besides his conference with the king today the prime minister was to preside over the cabinet meeting which is the first of a series of meetings to be held during the next few days to draft the speech which King George will read from the throne when the new Parliament is opened with full state ceremonial on Nov. 10.

The reconstruction of the cabinet will occupy much of Mr. MacDonald's time between now and then. Although the appointments are in his own hands many consultations will be necessary. The general belief is that the abbreviated emergency cabinet, formed in August, will be considerably enlarged.

Edison Leaves Bulk of Estate to His two Sons

West Orange, N. J., Oct. 29.—(AP)—The will of Thomas A. Edison was filed for probate today, naming as executors of his estate two of his sons, Charles and Theodore.

Virtually his entire estate was left to the same two sons. Explanation was made that there was no provision for the widow because there already had been adequate provision made prior to the inventor's death.

All of his shares of the capital stock of the Thomas A. Edison, Inc., are to be divided equally between Charles and Theodore Edison. The properties grouped under name of Edison Laboratories also are left to the two sons. All of the late inventor's government bonds, railroad bonds and first mortgage bonds in the Edison Portland Cement Co., are left in trust to his six children.

Among other bequests were \$10,000 to William H. Meadowcroft, the late inventor's secretary; \$10,000 to John S. Ott, laboratory associate of the electrical wizard for more than half a century, who died as a result of shock occasioned by the news of Edison's death; and \$8,000 to Fred P. Ott, a brother of the inventor's laboratory assistant.

Condemned Negro Granted Reprieve

Raleigh, Oct. 29.—(AP)—James Smith, Vance county negro under sentence of electrocution, will be granted a reprieve of 30 days, Governor O. Max Gardner announced today.

Smith was convicted of criminal attack on Estelle Cross, Vance county negro woman, and also was convicted of first degree burglary, either of which carries a sentence of electrocution in this state.

The State Supreme court upheld his case and last week reviewed the lower court verdict, automatically sentencing Smith to be electrocuted November 6 unless the governor intervened.

Special Legal Talent Marshalled for Trial of Cannon Next Week

Washington, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Additional legal talent is being marshalled for the defense of Bishop James Cannon, Jr., who faces trial on charges of wilfully violating the Federal corrupt practices law during the 1924 presidential campaign.

Robt. H. McNeill, who will head the defense of the Southern Methodist churchman and Miss Ada L. Cannon, who will be his co-defendant, are expected to arrive in Greenville Saturday afternoon.

Dr. Gasque Will Conduct an Evangelistic Meeting at St. Paul's Episcopal Church.

Dr. G. W. Gasque of Atlanta, Ga., who is coming to Greenville to begin an evangelistic meeting at St. Paul's church on Sunday morning will arrive in Greenville Saturday afternoon.

Dr. Gasque is being accompanied by Charlie Tillman the well known Methodist gospel singer and song writer. Mr. Tillman will lead the singing each day during the meeting; and will sing some of the great spiritual hymns he has composed.

The services will begin Sunday morning at 11:00 o'clock at St. Paul's Episcopal church, and will continue all next week with preaching services twice daily. The congregation of St. Paul's have been preparing for these services and are anxious that all the other churches in the city share with them this meeting.

Three States to Elect Governors on Next Tuesday

(By The Associated Press) Three states—Mississippi, Kentucky and New Jersey—will elect governors at next Tuesday's off-year elections.

In Mississippi where Democratic nomination is equivalent to election the voting will hardly be more than a formality. Mike Conner is the Democratic nominee. He is to take office January 1.

The campaign in Kentucky has been confined for the most part to the administration of the state highway department. Ruby Laffoon, circuit judge, is the Democratic candidate. He favors the present partisan arrangement of the highway commission. Mayor William Harrison of Louisville, heading the Republican ticket, would return the board to its former bi-partisan setup.

New Jersey's contest has been the warmest of the three by far. In that state the governorship is being sought by David Baird Jr., Republican, and Harry Moore, Democrat. Each has campaigned with vigor for several weeks, the issues being numerous but with no particular national significance.

HOLD KILLER UNDER BOND AT RY. MOUNT

Dummy of Dead Man Brought into Preliminary Trial of E. W. Coleman.

Rocky Mount, Oct. 29.—(AP)—A dummy, attired in Tom C. Chappell's clothes, was brought into the court room today as D. W. Coleman, railway detective who killed Chappell last week when he found him leaving his home early in the morning, was given a preliminary hearing and held under \$1,000 bond for Nash county Superior court.

Mrs. J. R. Chappell, of Garrett, Va., mother of the Florence, S. C. man, sobbed brokenly at the sight of the dummy and during the test.

ASKS AMERICA TO CUT TARIFF

Thomas Lamont Also Calls on Germany to Talk Reparations with France.

New York, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Thomas Lamont, of the firm of J. P. Morgan and Company, writing in the Saturday Review of Literature today calls upon Germany to take the initiative for a direct readjustment with France on the reparations problem and upon the United States to "reduce materially" its "tariff barriers."

It is not now a matter for America to urge, said Lamont in referring to the reparations problem. Germany, he said, should not expect President Hoover to save the situation for them.

The financier, who was a member of the committee of experts who drew up the Young plan. The financier advised Germany to stop agitating for revision of the Versailles treaty, expressing the opinion that the French will be found to be no "unreasonable" concerning any revision that may be justified provided it comes about through "orderly processes."

New Evidence Rounded Up In Mrs. Judd Case

Phoenix, Ariz., Oct. 29.—(AP)—and indicating that possibly she had died the story of Winnie Ruth Judd and her accomplice in the slaying of Miss Hedvig Samuelson and Mrs. Agnes Le Roi here two weeks ago was being rounded up by Phoenix authorities today.

Mrs. Judd stated she shot both women the morning of October 17 as the climax of a quarrel over social affairs. She admitted placing the bodies in trunks and sending them to Los Angeles. A street car motorman in Phoenix, Benjamin W. Juremeyer, said yesterday that Mrs. Judd was a passenger on his car the night of October 16, getting off the car near the L. R. Samuelson apartment at 10:15 P. M., and again boarding the car at 11:35 P. M., returning to a point near her own home Mrs. Judd had allegedly remained at the home of her two victims the night of the slayings.

Approve Plans For Credit Body

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 29.—(AP)—Clearing house officials of the sixth Federal Reserve district have approved the plan of a south-wide credit association combination complete subscriptions to the \$500,000 National Credit Corporation suggested by President Hoover. The officials, meeting here yesterday, expressed the opinion such a southern organization would prevent "sacrificing of cotton and other farm products." They approved the plan for the credit pool for the purpose of "improving the economic situation now prevailing."

RAIN HALTS FOREST FIRES IN THE WEST

Flames Continue To Sweep Over Eastern District But Slightly Diminished.

Raleigh, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Forest fires which have been raging in district number 6, the Wilmington area, were under control today but fires in Brunswick and New Hanover counties were raging on. J. S. Holmes, state forester, was advised this morning.

A number of fires which have been burning in Columbus county are being checked, it was reported, but nothing could be done with the flames in the unorganized sections. Sherwood Brockwell, state fire marshal, who inspected the situation in Brunswick county yesterday at the direction of Gov. Gardner, had not returned to Raleigh today.

Kinston, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Virgin pine and cypress growth were attacked by the big forest fire east of White Oak river today as it swept into the section near Great Lake.

Timber valued at thousands of dollars is in the tract. Behind the fire lay a blackened area 10 miles long and about as wide from the village of Stella to the Craven county line.

W. A. HYMAN PASSES AWAY

Funeral to be Conducted from his Late Home This Afternoon at 4:30 o'clock.

William Ashley Hyman, 86, Confederate veteran, died at his home on Read street this morning at 6 o'clock, after illness of two weeks, although he had been in declining health several months. Funeral services will be conducted from his late home this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock and interment will be made in Cherry Hill cemetery. Rev. W. A. Ryan, pastor of Eighth Street Church of Christ, assisted by Rev. D. A. Windham, First Baptist minister, will officiate.

Mr. Hyman was a former sheriff of Pitt county, and at the time of his death held the position as courtier here. At virtually every term of court for the last fifteen years or more, Mr. Hyman was to be found in his accustomed place in the courtroom, and his cry was familiar to thousands of people who attend sessions of the courts from year to year.

He was one of those youths who were called into service during the closing days of the great war between the states, and after the conflict was over returned to this county to resume his duties in public life. He served in Company D, Forty-fourth regiment of North Carolina.

He was one of the few remaining members of the J. Bryan Grimes Camp of the Confederacy who gather here on May 10 each year to honor their war dead and to receive the plaudits of a grateful people.

Mr. Hyman was commander of the camp but was unable to attend the observance last year because of illness. Only one other member was in attendance, but exercises were conducted as usual with graves of the departed heroes being decorated by hundreds of school children.

He was a native of Pitt county, and spent the major part of his life in Greenville. Of amiable and friendly disposition, he was held in the highest esteem by hundreds of people throughout the district.

He is survived by his wife and three daughters, Misses Mary Louise, Margaret Ashley and Helen Virginia Hyman, all of Greenville.

FIVE KILLED ON HIGHWAY

Score of Others Hurt as Truck Runs Into a Ditch Near Town of Marion, Ark.

Memphis, Tenn., Oct. 29.—(AP)—A trailer loaded with cotton pickers went into a ditch near Marion, Ark., early today carrying five persons to their deaths and injuring more than a score of others. Occupants of the truck, residents of Marietta and Curtisville, in Pres. county, Miss., were being moved to the Eason plantation, 35 miles north of Marion, where they were to pick cotton.

The dead: Mrs. Ollie Allen, 23; Alvia Cummings, 7; Horbert Gilmore, 18; Wiley Nichols, 23, and Wiley Nichols Jr., 3-months-old baby.

Mrs. Wiley Nichols, Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Nichols, their four children W. A. Lindley and Gordon Cummings were injured seriously. Among those suffering minor injuries were Mr. and Mrs. Monroe Pace, their daughter, Mr. and Mrs. M. Cummings and their three children, and M. Allen.

Gary Eason, plantation owner, was driving the truck with a trailer attached. About a mile and a half north of Marion the trailer broke loose and careened into a six foot ditch. There were 53 members in the party.

All the household goods of the families was carried on the truck and trailer. Passing motorists took the injured to Marion. The dead were brought to Memphis.

NEGRO KILLER GOES ON TRIAL

Will Moore Charged with Killing White Child and Burning Home.

Greensboro, Oct. 29.—(AP)—In a packed court room and with national guardsmen on duty, Asbury Respus alias Will Moore, 50-year-old negro, went on trial here today on a charge of assaulting Vera Leonard, 9-year-old school girl, killing her and setting her father's home afire to conceal the crime.

Hundreds of would-be spectators, unable to get into the court room, milled around outside. A glass door to the courtroom was broken as the jam surged against it.

The crowd, however, appeared to be drawn more by curiosity than by any intent to do violence to Respus. Many of the spectators were women and there was a considerable number of negroes.

In addition to the guardsmen in the courtroom, others were stationed at strategic points about the court house.

Judge Thomas J. Shaw, veteran Superior court jurist, opened court promptly at 9:30 a. m., and selection of a jury from a special venire drawn from adjoining Forsyth county was begun.

Respus, arrested and accused of the crimes after the little girl's body was found in the ruins of the burned home the morning of Sept. 30, displayed no emotion as the trial began. The girl, daughter of Tom Leonard, a farmer, was at home waiting for a school bus when she was seized, killed and the house set afire about 8:30 a. m. Her parents were at work.

CLINIC ENDS WORK HERE

Over Five Hundred Persons Examined for Tuberculosis in Recent Campaign.

The tubercular clinic which has been conducted at the Pitt County Department of Health the last two and a half weeks was concluded yesterday afternoon, and health workers expressed themselves as highly gratified over the splendid spirit of co-operation exhibited by the public.

The clinic was in charge of Dr. Thornton, representing the extension department of the State Sanatorium. He was assisted by members of the local health department.

Records of the clinic showed today that four hundred and forty-one children of city schools received the tuberculin test, and that fifty-five reacted positively. Parents of the children reacting positively to the skin tests were advised to take them to the State Sanatorium for more complete examination and advice. Fifty-two of the children were given thorough physical examinations.

The records also indicated that a total of 79 adults were examined outright for tuberculosis, but it had not been determined how many, if any, showed positive reaction.

In addition to the clinic, Dr. Thornton used his influence in educating the public as to the best means of fighting tuberculosis. He spoke before several organizations during his stay here, and impressed upon his hearers the fact that tuberculosis may be completely eliminated if combated in time. He also expressed keen appreciation of the spirit of co-operation evidenced in the communities he visited, and especially by persons attending the clinic.

Seek Interstate Road System

MEETING SET FOR RALEIGH

Chief Executives of Virginia, South Carolina and Georgia Asked to Meet at the Capital City as Soon as Convenient to Discuss Situation Confronting Two Principal Crops; Plan To Outline Program for the Future.

Raleigh, Oct. 29.—(AP)—The governors of Virginia, South Carolina and Georgia will confer with Gov. O. Max Gardner of North Carolina on the agricultural situation in the section "as soon as convenient," Governor Gardner announced today. Governor Gardner said he had been in communication with the governors of the three other states, which, together with North Carolina, raise most of the bright leaf tobacco produced in the United States, and said they had "expressed a willingness to meet in conference as soon as convenient."

As what the term "as soon as convenient" meant, the governor said the date for the conference would be set after further communication with the other governors.

The conference will be "for the purpose of discussing the conditions existing in our several states, and undertaking to work out jointly with our agricultural heads the most practical program we can agree upon for our present and future agricultural rehabilitation," a statement by the governor said.

It was agreed as a condition precedent to the conference that attendance upon the meeting did not commit any governor to any definite or particular proposal, the governor said. "Each governor expressed the hope that the executives representing these states having so much in common might be able through a frank and candid discussion of our problems to take some action in leadership of a helpful and constructive advantage to the farmers of our respective states," the governor's statement said.

Several days ago a delegation from the Supply Merchants Association of North Carolina, headed by Senator W. G. Clark of Tarboro, requested the governor to call a conference of the governors of the principal tobacco growing states to consider steps to aid tobacco growers as well as plans to aid growers of cotton, peanuts, and other agricultural products.

The delegation asked that the conference draw up definite plans and that special legislation to carry them into effect be passed. This week Governor Gardner announced that should he find it wise to call a special session of the North Carolina General Assembly at this time he would not neglect the members to consider only acreage curtailment legislation, as had been suggested by Senator Clark.

Minister Held for Performing Illegal Wedding

Jonesboro, Ark., Oct. 29.—(AP)—Rev. Joe Jeffers, an evangelist, whose recent attempts to oust the pastor of the First Baptist church of Jonesboro caused congregational strife that resulted in troops being sent here to preserve order, was arrested today on a charge of performing an illegal marriage ceremony. He furnished \$1,000 bond pending a hearing in municipal court tomorrow.

Authorities claim he married Jess Nance, of Flint, Mich., and Miss Celestine Byrd, of Grubb, Ark., October 15 without possessing ministerial credentials required by Arkansas law for clergymen performing such ceremonies. That offense in this state is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of \$100 to \$500. Governor Parnell sent National Guardsmen and they patrolled the streets until the disturbance subsided.

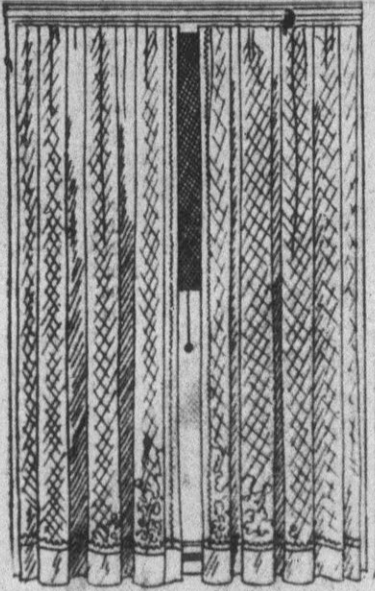

ABOUT TOWN

The courts have struck another blow in behalf of the law-abiding people of the nation through sentencing of Phil D'Andrea, Al Capone's bodyguard, to prison for six months.

D'Andrea walked into the courtroom where Capone was being tried with a pistol in his possession, and was immediately arrested for carrying a concealed weapon.

The fact that one belongs to the less element is no license for rioting, and the action of the court in the case of D'Andrea should have a salutary effect on public opinion.

The government has started a vigorous campaign against the activities of gangsters throughout the nation and means to put an end to the reign of terror which they created in the large cities through a series of ruthless killings.

The conviction of Capone and his bodyguard will do more than anything to bring the gang element to a realization that the government will not tolerate such surreptitious activities and means to punish them to the full extent of the law when apprehended.

The eastern section of the state is in the grip of one of the greatest conflagrations in years. So dire has the situation become in Hanover county that Governor Gardner was requested to send troops to help combat the flames.

Although no disastrous fires have been reported in this immediate section this year, they are roaring surrounding counties and will be in this area if extra caution is not observed by people visiting woods from day to day.

The loss from fire in North Carolina will probably be greater this year than in years because of the devastating sweep of flames in six counties at this time, and there is no way of improving the situation without calling on the fire to handle more carefully in recent months.

With the dry weather prevailing throughout the eastern district it is necessary for careful handling of rifle and cigar stubs by hunters and fishermen, and those who wish to play their part in a reduction of the toll of property taken by fire.

Sammy MacDonald, leader of the United National government, has been swept back into power by an overwhelming vote, indicating that the people of Great Britain are satisfied with the conduct of national affairs than they have been in years.

The old Labor Party, headed by David Lloyd George, another one of the peerless leaders of government in recent years, was completely crushed by the Conservative

victory and is expected to wield very little influence in the new House of Commons.

MacDonald has been an indefatigable worker for the improvement of conditions in his country the last few years, and that the people appreciate what he has accomplished was indicated by the liberal vote accorded his party in the majority of districts.

Prosecutor Thomas J. Pearsall, who had summoned neighbors of Coleman and E. B. Chappell, brother of the slain man, as witnesses with the promise that he would introduce sensational evidence, offered only a police sergeant and a physician as witnesses.

Pearsall said the dummy was introduced to show how Chappell was shot and in an effort to refute any possible claim of self-defense that Coleman might advance.

The police sergeant, George D. Wheeler, related the story of the early morning killing as he said Coleman told it to him. The detective, returning home early in the morning from night duty, knocked at his front door and heard some one leaving by a rear door.

Coleman told him, Wheeler said, that the man who left the house hid under an automobile. He quoted the detective as saying he ordered him to come from under the car and when he advanced with something in his hands started shooting. Chappell was found later to have held his shoes in his hand. He was wearing Mrs. Coleman's ring and had a lock of her hair in his pocket.

The officer said Coleman asserted he did not know who the man was until Mrs. Coleman ran from the house, threw herself upon the dying man and cried:

"You've killed him, you've killed Tom Chappell."

Wheeler, of Chicago, it presented the program to Chairman Gifford late yesterday. The report urges resumption of normal buying by persons who have

jobs and rebukes those uneasy individuals who hide away money which might be mixing freely in trade channels.

Its findings are commended to the country by Gifford as requiring "immediate and thoughtful consideration of all individuals and organizations to the end that so far as possible and they may be promptly translated into action."

He cites the committee as an answer to the insistent demand for appointment of an economic council to determine what could be done to improve business.

Where husbands are making a living, the committee recommends that employment of wives be looked into. It also urges immediate action to give needy "white collar" workers part time employment, at least.

Stella, in Cartaret county, was believed in no danger from the fire or from another fire, eight miles long and several miles wide, east

of the Maysville-Stella road in Onslow county.

Flames continued to rage in the Jones county swamps between Richlands and Comfort and a small fire was burning in Lenoir county.

Damage so far has been limited in addition to the timber to destruction of an abandoned logging railroad, its disused rolling stock, a lumber camp and a dwelling house.

Clouds in the Stella section today brought hopes of rain.

Wilmington, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Several scattered forest fires in this

immediate section were brought under control today.

One in the Castle Hayne district burned over 1,000 acres and destroyed several outbuildings. Another between Kure's Beach and Fort Fisher and a third near Masonboro were halted.

W. L. Northspem, fire warden, was in Columbus county directing the fight against several small blazes there. District forester, O. H. Hearn went to Brunswick county where a big fire is raging beyond control to direct efforts to save valuable forest lands.
