LANDING IS MADE CLOSE TO BRIDGETON

'Tex' Settle and Major Fordney Sleep In Fabric of Balloon While Awaiting Daybreak; Fordney Walks to Farm House and Telephones World of Triumph; Pleased With Outcome of Their Venture

Bridgeton, N. J., Nov. 21.—(AP)—America's first stratosphere balloon joined to rest in the marsh land southwest of Bridgeton at 5:40 yesterday.

As hundreds of persons searched the nine woods, cranberry bogs and cultivated farm in southern New Jersey, Lieut. Commander (Tex) Settle and his aid, Major Chester Fordney spent the night wrapped in the deflated fabric of the balloon while awaiting daybreak.

At 8:44 a. m. Fordney trudged through the marsh land, walking until 9:30, when he reached the farm house of S. Johnson, nine miles southwest of Bridgeton.

"I'm hungry and would like to use your telephone," calmly announced the officer to the farmer.

Then he went to the telephone and notified the world of the balloonists' triumph.

"We had a delightful and untoward trip," Major Fordney said, "except that we came down so fast we had to throw things overboard as fast as we could to lighten the balloon. Although it was a rather rapid landing, neither of us was hurt. We took our bearings, saw we were in marshy ground surrounded by woods and that it would be best to put up for the night. We got out of the gondola, wrapped up in the balloon and slept for the night."

SAYS AMERICA MUST BUY FROM RUSSIANS

New York, Nov. 21.—(AP)—A belief that the United States cannot expect to sell huge quantities of goods to Russia unless it is prepared to buy something in return was expressed today by Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., president of General Motors.

Sloan, declaring he did not believe that "just because we are going to send an ambassador to Russia means that we are going to get hundreds of millions of dollars in business," he said.

"We have learned one lesson in international relationships since the war, and that is that a nation cannot sell unless it buys. In other words, the international balance must be discharged through goods, not exchange."

Sloan discussed Russian recognition informally during an interview. Russia, he said, is in the market for capital goods, which, he added, have lagged behind consumer goods in the general recovery movement.

"If a plan can be worked out whereby Russia can buy our capital goods, it will fit in where we need it most," he said.

Balloon Lands In Jersey

BULLET ENDS LIFE OF RICH N. J. CITIZEN

Shelton Clark Believed to Have Killed Himself After Quarrel With Wife

Paulboro, N. J., Nov. 21.—(AP)—A bullet ended the colorful career of Sheldon A. Clark, wealthy young oil company executive and sportsman after a quarrel with his wife.

Police said today she does not recall what happened to her after he hit her with a billiard cue.

Mrs. Clark, a former actress, is under police guard at a hospital with a severe head injury.

Six stitches were required to close the wound which investigators said was inflicted last night. No charge was preferred against her.

Clark, 35-year-old son of A. Sheldon Clark, of Barrington, Ill., senior vice-president of the Sinclair Refining Company and prominent in Illinois and an industrial and civic leader, met almost instant death from a bullet in his breast while he stood in the billiard room in the basement of his sixteen-room mansion.

A six-year-old son of the Clarks, Sheldon, Jr., playmate, Nichols Lubrano, six, and George Johnson, Paulboro iron worker, who had been hired by Clark for some work on a boat, witnessed the killing.

Mrs. Virginia Nowell, dance promoter, who was jailed here early today for alleged failure to pay an account, after a dance party at the Yum-Yum Inn last night, was released shortly before the noon hour today, after officers said she had made full payment of the bill.

The payment, it was stated, was made by a brother of Mrs. Nowell who came to her rescue after she had spent only a few hours behind county jail bars.

Mrs. Virginia Nowell, of Raleigh, promoter of the Royal Court Ball given here last night under the auspices of the Greenville Cotton Club, was behind county jail bars here today in a charge of failing to pay for the intermission party given at the Yum-Yum Barbecue Inn last night in honor of Miss Edna Taylor, of Washington, and Guy Lombardo, noted orchestra leader who played for the dance.

Mrs. Nowell was taken into custody by Constable Dick King this morning at 3 o'clock on a warrant said to have been sworn out by operators of the Yum Yum Inn.

She was alleged to have fed about 150 persons at the palace and left the place without paying for the layout. The bill was said to have been around \$58.

She was given preliminary hearing before Magistrate Powell shortly afterward and sent to jail in default of bond.

Mrs. Nowell came to Greenville several weeks ago to plan for the dance in honor of Miss Taylor, North Carolina American Legion beauty queen, and during the time she was said to have become indebted to some firms of the city without being able to meet the obligation.

So, when she failed to pay off at the Yum-Yum Inn, the operators immediately began legal action in the hope of recovering.

Mrs. Nowell has been prominent in Raleigh for a number of years, and arrest last night created a mild sensation in various circles.

FEW ARRESTS MADE IN CITY LAST NIGHT

Officers Report Large Dance Crowd Fairly Quiet; 12 Arrests Reported

In spite of the fact that the city was crowded with people from all parts of the state attending the dance here last night, disorders were of a minor nature and only a small number of arrests were made, a check-up of police records showed this morning.

Chief of Police George Clark said his men made only seven arrests during the night and that these involved charges of drunkenness mainly. All of the defendants were ordered to appear at the next session of mayor's court.

Lester Jones, lieutenant of the State Highway patrol, who had several men on duty in tobacco town where the dance was held, said they accounted for only four or five arrests involving charges of driving drunk and minor assault.

In view of the number of people thronging the district where the dance was held and the number of automobiles passing over streets and highways, officers said the situation was considerably better than they anticipated.

ROYAL COURT BALL PROVES 'FLOP' HERE

Lack of Facilities For Handling Crowd Causes Curtailment Of Dance Program

The Royal Court Ball given here last night in honor of Miss Edna Taylor, of Washington, North Carolina American Legion beauty queen, was attended by several thousand people from various parts of the State and the Dixie warehouse, where the affair was held was jammed to capacity throughout the evening.

So large was the crowd that it resolved into nothing more than a jostling sea of humanity with part of the dance scene having to be omitted on account of lack of space.

The Royal Court scene, which was scheduled to have been one of the outstanding features of the scene, was pulled off in a sort of a fashion, police having to open a lane for the dancers, who paraded from one end of the warehouse to another and let it end at that.

Guy Lombardo, considered one of the greatest orchestra leaders of the country, provided music for the occasion, but only those crowded about the stage were able to hear the music. It was the same way to see her, but this privilege was granted only to a few because of their inability to get near enough to see her.

But to those who were fortunate enough to get near enough to see Miss Taylor, she turned out to be what was expected, one of the most beautiful and charming young women in the State.

Probably a thousand couples were on the floor, and while they attempted to dance, they were able only to make a few awkward steps at the time, and then suffer the embarrassment of nearly being catapulted from their feet by the pushing, shoving crowd.

A section of the warehouse was roped off for spectators, and the thousands who paid to look on were out of luck, unless perchance they happened to be among the first arrivals who gained vantage points and held them.

If the dance had worked out according to plans, it probably would have been one of the most spectacular ever held here. But the lack of organization and the shortage of facilities for taking care of the crowd (Continued on page six)

MAN CAUSES HEAVY SALES SENSATION IN ARE EXPECTED BRITISH HOUSE DURING WEEK

J. McGovern, Laborite Interrupts King in Brilliant Parliament Ceremony

London, Nov. 21.—(AP)—A sensation was created in the House of Lords today when just as King George concluding his speech opening the new Parliament, a new Laborite, J. McGovern, cried:

"What about abolition of the Means test and the unemployment cuts?"

"It is a shame while people are starving," McGovern, who it was recalled had been suspended from the House on several occasions for defying speakers' rulings, continued to speak.

King George took no notice of the interruption. The monarch turned and in ceremonial fashion as if nothing had happened, offered his arm to the Queen.

His Majesty had been on the point of doing this when the Laborite's cry, with its barbed Scottish accent, broke through the vaulted peers' chamber.

McGovern's outbreak climaxed Britain's most brilliant hour of ceremony. The king had just finished his speech, "May God's blessings rest on your labors," and moved from the throne.

The Laborite's voice rang out from the crowd of black-coated commoners assembled at the bar of the House of Lords.

The gorgeous assemblage was stupefied.

Peers in their brilliant robes and peeresses in exquisite gowns and tiaras their hands bedecked with diamonds sparkling like stars, foreign ambassadors and diplomats in formal uniforms decorated court officials with beards blazing with decorations—all turned eyes toward the glowering Laborite.

Several members of the House of Commons moved toward McGovern, but nobody interfered. Following custom, the royal procession left the House of Commons.

LINDBERGH'S OFF TO AZORES

Colonel to Stop at Punta Del Gada on Return Trip to the United States

Lisbon, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh, with indication of favorable weather ahead, took off from the Portuguese naval aviation base today and pointed the big plane toward Punta Del Gada in the Azores.

Lindbergh's intentions beyond his flight to the Azores was unknown, but he was known to be considering a return trip to the United States by the way of Bermuda.

The Air Minister, Robert T. G. Caldwell, and several important Americans residents and many aviators and representatives of the British Ambassador, saw the Lindberghs off.

After shaking hands with the spectators, Colonel and Mrs. Lindbergh embarked in a motor boat, but at the last minute hopped back to shore to bid good-bye and clasped hands with a sailor Lindbergh said had helped him.

The plane was refueled and they soared away in an easy take-off, swinging to the southwest in the direction of the historic Belem Tower from which Vasco De Gama embarked on his famous voyage to India.

Market Handled Total of 1,207,595 Pounds of Bright Leaf For Which Farmers Were Paid \$270,665.12; Public Overjoyed With Upturn of Prices; Fairly Heavy Sales Expected Here Until Holidays

Prices continued to climb on the Greenville tobacco market yesterday and the highest price average of the season was hung up, the official report of K. W. Cobb, supervisor of sales, made public this morning, indicated.

The market handled a total of 1,207,595 pounds of tobacco for which farmers received \$270,665.12. The average was \$22.41 per hundred pounds.

The average was nearly a cent higher than the previous last week and carried joy to the hearts of the thousands of growers and warehouse watching the progress of sales.

Although the season is not the heaviest of the season, it was sufficient to keep buying forces busy until the last minute as they worked almost frantically at times in an effort to clean up floors in preparation for resumption of activities this morning.

With fair weather accompanied by warmer temperatures prevailing in this section at this time, it was expected sales would be comparatively heavy the remainder of the week, and in fact, until the holidays.

There was over a million pounds of leaf on the floors of the various warehouses today but indications pointed to completion of work during the late afternoon.

The continued upward swing of prices here has been a source of much joy to the thousands of growers who sell here from day to day as well as the thousands of other depending on the success of the market for a livelihood. The improvement has resulted in better business and has placed considerably more money in circulation than in several years. This has created a better spirit among people in all walks of life with indications that Santa Claus who was rather skimpy with his offerings in recent years may be decidedly more liberal this year.

Cotton Ginning Forges Ahead Of Last Year

Washington, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Cotton of this year's crop ginned prior to November 14 was reported today by the census department to have totalled 11,250,851 bales counting 475,401 round bales as half bales and including 3,318 bales of American-Egyptian.

To that date last year 10,433,684 bales including 474,442 round bales and 5,073 bales of American-Egyptian had been ginned.

The crop this year has been forecast by the Department of Agriculture as 13,100,000 bales as compared with 13,002,000 bales last year. North Carolina reported ginnings of 622,974 bales prior to November 14 this year.

White House Season Opens Soon

By SIGRID ARNE. Washington, D. C.—(AP)—Lights gleaming from the majestic portico of the White House on the evening of November 16 will signal the start of the official social season here.

A string of closed cars will pull up to the steps of the mansion just a few minutes before 8 o'clock, bringing the Cabinet members in top-hats and their wives in formal satin and and furs for the annual Cabinet dinner.

The program this year omits the New Year's Day reception. This event was instituted by Calvin Washington to permit foreign envoys, of whom there were only a few then, to call. Afterward anyone could drop in.

In recent years New Year's Day afternoon, has been thronged with troops through the East room. The quaint friendliness of the custom was lost.

President Dines Out. President Roosevelt will attend only one official function outside the White House—the dinner given by the Vice-President, an affair usually held at the hotel where the Vice-President resides.

Old members of Washington society recall that these Cabinet dinners became so dull that President Theodore Roosevelt decided to shake up matters when his Postmaster-General gave a dinner. The President waited until the affair was well advanced, whereupon he ordered everyone away from the table, and then ordered them to scramble back for new chairs.

The change will be made in the tone of the affairs—"simple, very simple," Mrs. Roosevelt emphasizes.

News correspondents who cover the treasury regularly telegraphed President Roosevelt at Warm Springs protesting the restriction imposed by Morgenthau and asserting in their opinion relations between the treasury and the press had been seriously impaired.

President Makes No Comment, Warm Springs, Ga., Nov. 21.—(AP)—It was stated here today that President Roosevelt had no knowledge for comment upon the action of Secretary Morgenthau in ordering strict control of new releases for the treasury.

Stephen T. —ary, a secretary to the President, asserted that Roosevelt knew nothing of the incident and it was regarded as the business of Morgenthau as acting head of the treasury.

New Firm For Goldboro, Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Four new business firms one of which will be located in Goldboro, were granted certificates of incorporation today.

Hadley Motor Company of Goldboro, which will buy and sell cars and other motor vehicles under contract of \$10,000, with 25,000 stock subscribed by A. H. Hadley and J. A. Wynn of Goldboro, and M. B. Bly of Raleigh.

Dollar Drops New York, Nov. 21.—(AP)—The dollar in terms of the French gold franc was valued today at 60.69 compared with 61.29 yesterday and 71.01 a month ago.

Thanksgiving Proclamation Warm Springs, Nov. 21.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today issued a proclamation naming Thursday November 30 for the regular observance of Thanksgiving day.

In this haven where he won back his own health from an attack of infantile paralysis Mr. Roosevelt wrote out his Thanksgiving day proclamation. He cast aside the usual wherewith of past proclamations to ask "may we on that day in our churches and in our homes give humble thanks for blessings bestowed upon us during the past year by Almighty God."

Huge Profits Made In Stock Pool, Washington, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Senate stock market probes received evidence today that bankers who financed organization of the General Theatres Equipment Corporation in 1929 made paper profits of more than \$4,000,000 in a few weeks by pool operations in holding company stocks.

The evidence showed that while the pools were operating the price of the stock rose from \$20 a share which the bankers paid to more than \$90 within two months. Murray Dodge, former vice-president of the Chase Security Corp., which participated in the financing said the profits were not actually realized. Ferdinand Pecora, committee counsel, charged a contract made by the bankers to withhold a large block of the stock from the market during the operations interested with the law of supply, and demand and made an artificial market.

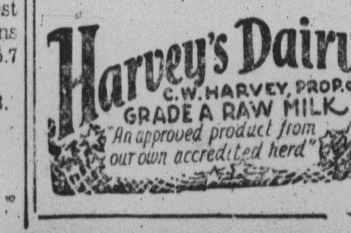
He was then taken to several of the large retyring plants and told how the tobacco was handled after leaving the warehouse floors and gotten in condition for the world market.

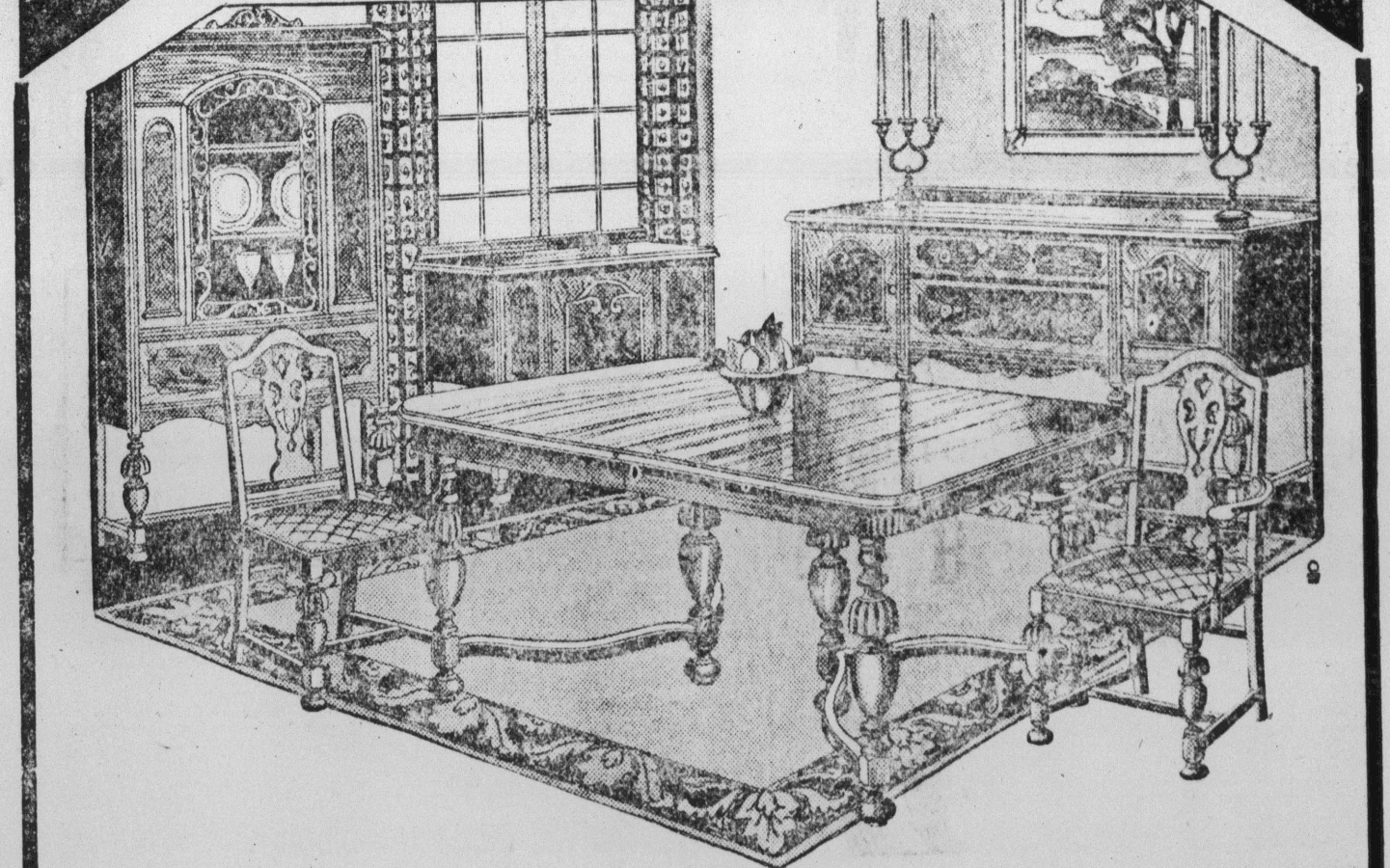
