SCHOLARSHIPS AGAIN OFFERED

Available to Three 4-H Club Members in State

Raleigh, April 19.—Three one-year scholarships to State College have been available to 4-H Club members in past years will be offered again this year, L. R. Harrill, club leader at the college, announced today.

One of the scholarships will be offered to the club boy who grows and produces the best baby beef animal in 1938. Another will be offered to the boy producing the best pig, and the third to the club member growing out the best dairy calf.

Any duly enrolled 4-H Club member will be eligible to compete for these tuitions. To take part in the contests he must keep an accurate record showing the initial weight of the animal, kind and amount of feed, cost and value of feed, cost and value of animal, and weight and sale price or value of animal at termination of contest.

Selecting winners and awarding the scholarships, which are being donated by the North Carolina Division of the National Cottonseed Products Association, will be made under the supervision of the 4-H Department at State College.

The contest is designed to stimulate interest in the production of better calves and pigs on North Carolina farms, Harrill pointed out.

Those taking part will be scored according to the condition of the animal entered, the members participation in club activities, his pro-

ect records, and on his grooming, is unable to be turned over to the 4-H Scholarship Fund, Harrill said.

First Aid Course Will Be Conducted

The four Greenville men, C. W. Willard, J. O. Barber, A. H. Windham and T. A. Bryson, will conduct classes in first aid with an enrollment meeting set for May 2 in the

A program for the course will be worked out after the enrollment. W. A. Darden, vice chairman of the Pitt county chapter, Red Cross, speak on advantages of first aid training at the opening session. Persons undecided on taking the course are invited to attend the meeting before reaching a decision.

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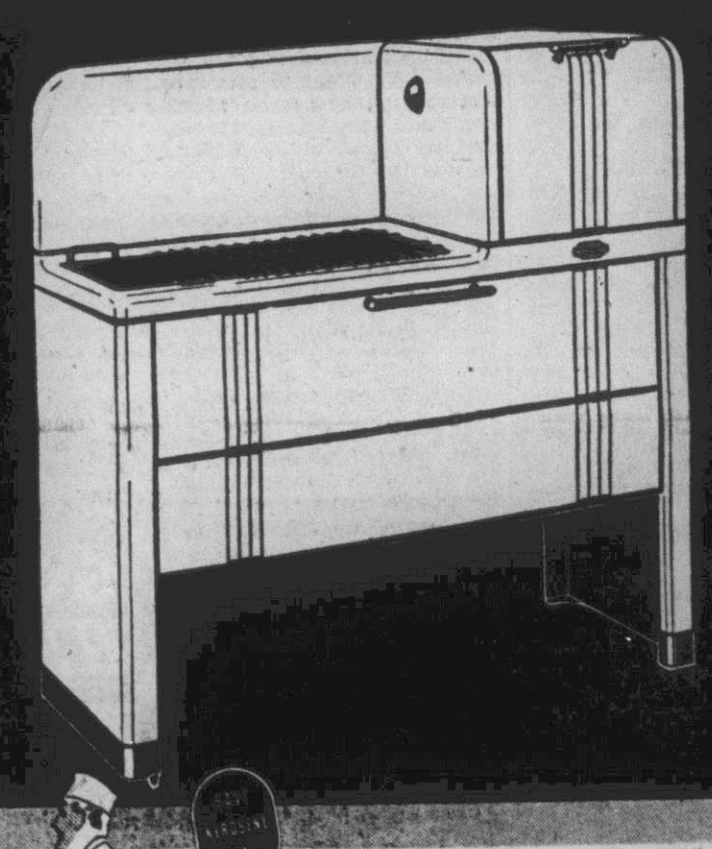

Washington Daybook

Washington—If you gamble and lose, and want your losses deducted from your income tax returns, hark to the tale of Vina Delmar, the story writer, and her husband, Eugene Delmar, also a story writer.

To begin at the beginning the Delmars one New Year's Eve went from their Hollywood home to Agua Caliente, across the Mexican border. At 1 a. m. after the New Year's whistles had blown and all that Eugene sat down to a serious game of chemin-de-fer.

First he lost a bit. Vina was at his elbow. She kept running to the cashier to cash checks to bring him fresh funds. Then he began winning. He pulled ahead \$500. And that, perhaps, was the beginning and the end of the first day. But the game went right on and Eugene went with it and when he quit, on January, he had chalked up a loss of \$1,200, which is a fair to losing loss even to a couple whose earnings some years clock up past the \$50,000 mark.

But in between cashing checks for Eugene, Vina was not idle. She played roulette and she lost \$300. Now arises the hitch.

How It Was Decided

The two submitted separate income tax returns, each claiming half of the \$1,500 loss. The board of tax appeals allowed a tax deduction for the \$1,200 lost by Eugene but denied them the \$300 lost by Vina, claiming that he had played for money but she had played only for fun.

Now why? It is all a matter of intent. Eugene set out to show that he seriously intended to profit at the game.

"The game was a very large game," he told the board. "There were banks going up for as much as \$5,000. And it was a beautiful spot for somebody who understood a little about the game, which I thought I did, to go in there and just knock out about \$10,000. And I tried it, but it didn't work."

"Was the pleasure involved in it a material factor in your decision to get into the game?" he was asked.

"There was no pleasure in that kind of a chemin-de-fer game. That washed me up. I quit."

To prove that he was not greenhorn he explained that he had tried out the game in Paris one time and "spent two years in the army shooting craps." That was during the war.

"I came out of the army, a buck private, with better than \$2,000. If you don't think that is something—"

Well, the board thought it was something plenty, in fact. He submitted in evidence the checks that he and Vina had cashed and was allowed the full \$1,200 deduction. But Vina didn't testify. Eugene merely said that "she played roulette, but very small. She is a very small gambler." The board assumed she was just frolicking around when she lost \$300, and was not serious about winning.

The board itself was not frivolous in the matter. It was long ruled that owners of racing stables can deduct for losses if they prove they seriously intended to make money out of the game. George Widener was allowed deductions, and so was Richard Whitney.

The board is pretty hard on losers at bridge. In most states gambling is illegal, anyway, and that puts such losses in a bad light, for tax purposes. So maybe, after all, you had just as well play for fun and kiss your losses good-bye.

SHORT SHOTS

Raleigh, April 21.—One of the most significant actions of the Sampson county Democratic convention of last week seems to have been generally left out of press reports of the proceedings—if information reaching this bureau is authentic as it appears to be.

It seems that the Sampsonians endorsed a statewide referendum on the prohibition question and only renominated their Representative Enoch Wilson when he promised he'd reverse his stand of 1937 and stand hitched on the dry side of the liquor question. Wilson voted against the referendum proposition in the last General Assembly.

The action is significant in that it indicates that the Drys are really pushing their offensive. Sampson is one of the few Eastern counties in which there is a heavy Republican vote—in fact the G.O.P. in normal times has been accustomed to winning almost all of the county offices and the House seat, but since Roosevelt the Democratic wave has submerged them every two years. It may be that the action of the Sampson Democrats was more political than sincere devotion to the cause of prohibition.

At all events, it means that the wets have lost at least one vote they had last time, for if Wilson should be defeated by the Republican nominee, the county's vote would still be dry.

Speaking of the wet-dry question, it may be that there is no connection with approaching legislative and popular battle, but manufacturers of beer are publishing group advertisements all over the state insisting that their product is an entirely different thing from

Dudley Bagley, state REA head, who is enroute to some big electrical convention way down south, sent his Department Engineer J. M. Grainger an unbelievable mimeographed menu from "Bert Stone's 2211 5th Ave., North, Birmingham, Alabama."

This menu listed a "Special Vegetable Plate—5 Vegetables, 1 order of bread and butter, dessert, coffee or tea." for TEN CENTS; and "Fried Chicken Dinner—with drink and dessert" for the astounding sum of FIFTEEN CENTS.

Mr. Grainger says there must be a catch in it somewhere, but the thing really looks authentic.

Getting back from eating to drinking, or at least to the prohibition question, one noticeable feature of the campaign of the United Dry Forces is that they are not putting Governor Clyde R. Hoey and his views to the fore.

As a matter of fact, a very large percentage of the traditionally dry leaders are extremely bitter against the Governor for his failure to go down the line with them for a state referendum measure in the 1937 General Assembly.

The referendum lost by just two votes on the crucial House roll call and there are many who contend that the Governor could have converted that margin of defeat into a like, or even larger, measure of victory if he had turned on even a little heat.

And as long as we're grne this far with the matter, we may as well finish up along similar lines.

Cutler Moore began talking about compiling law enforcement statistics for the ABC board as far back as January. He's still talking, but so far not even one statistic seems to have materialized. Many predict that Moore will still be talking when the primaries are held, with the same absence of results.

Selection Of Warren As Keynoter Widely Hailed

Raleigh, April 21.—Santa Claus was never more successful in pleasing the children than the powers-that-choose were in tickling all sorts and conditions of politicians with their selection of Lindsay Warren as keynote striker for the coming Democratic State convention, if first reaction and expressions are confirmed on sober second thought.

Your correspondent went here and there among the office holders and so-called powers-behind-the throne yesterday and today and found not a single, solitary voice singing out of harmony with the general paean of praise being raised anent the Warren choosing.

Looking at the thing from all angles, this unanimity of felicitation is entirely in keeping with the political situation. On the face of the record there is only one group in North Carolina which could be expected to take even mild exception to the keynoting of Lindsay Warren—that group is the violent Roosevelt baiting and hating coterie

of Anti-New Dealers who for obviously political reasons haven't yet let themselves be pictured in their true colors in North Carolina.

They (these arch enemies of the President) might hold the Warren record on sticking to the Administration on every question except Wages and Hours legislation something to gag over. Everybody else seems to feel that Gregg Cherry, the Governor and the others who advised hit upon the finest solution possible for a ticklish question.

So far as is known, Congressman Warren has been and still is absolutely and sincerely neutral in the current Senatorial fight between Bob Reynolds and Frank Hancock. He has voted for the President on almost every issue and in many cases has led the President's forces into the fight. Yet he notoriously belongs to the dominantly conservative forces which control North Carolina politics and administration.

TEN PROMISES

To The People of North Carolina:

First, I shall not make my maiden speech in the United States Senate in support of bar rooms for the District of Columbia, nor will my last speech be in advocacy of the establishment of a race track. I will devote my time and energies to the real and definitely serious questions confronting our Nation.

Second, I will not have as my secretary a citizen of Virginia or of any other State except North Carolina. I am not only confident I can, but I am determined to, employ from my native State such people as I need and am allowed. When North Carolina fails to have among its citizenship the brains I require it will then be time for me to come home and retire from public life.

Third, I shall not sell the name and dignity of my Senatorship to anybody or any concern, be it a slick "alien" trading with the War Department or a brand of cigarette which I may or may not smoke. As long as I am your representative the title to that office shall be and remain vested in the people of North Carolina. I shall be your Senator, responsible to you and beyond the touch of any interest, save the interest of the people of our great State.

Fourth, I shall not follow the sensationalism of William Randolph Hearst, arch enemy of President Roosevelt, or any other foe of progressive government. I will get my publicity on the basis of constructive accomplishments or do without publicity.

DiMaggio Ends Holdout; Accepts \$25,000 Salary

Yankees' Holdout To Join Team in New York Saturday

New York, April 21.—(AP)—Back to the New York Yankees when they need him most comes jolting Joe DiMaggio.

The San Francisco outfielder yesterday accepted the club's salary offer of \$25,000 after a holdout siege that would have lasted three months had he waited another day.

DiMaggio ended his holdout with a terse telegram to Business Manager Edward G. Barrow, and last night was speeding to join the club he sparked to American League pennants and world championships in 1936 and 1937. The staggering Yankees need him. They have won only one of three games, and their hitting has been puny.

DiMaggio capitulated to the terms offered by the Yankees, with no promises of a bonus for a good sea-

son. Both Barrow and Colonel Jacob Ruppert, owner of the club, were insistent on this point.

"His salary is \$25,000, no more, no less," said Ruppert, who added he was "very glad that the young man has signed."

DiMaggio, traveling by train, will arrive in New York Saturday morning and will be in uniform for the Yankees' game with the Washington Senators. No one knows whether he is in shape to play, and Manager Joe McCarthy will be "the sole judge of that," Ruppert said. The club will dock him about \$162 a day until he is in shape.

According to reports from the coast, DiMaggio has worked out sporadically with the San Francisco Seals. He told reporters, before leaving his home here "rarin' to go" and excited about "getting back there and rapping that ball again."

The move which ended the holdout was entirely DiMaggio's. The wire to Barrow, which read—"Your terms accepted. Leaving here 3:40

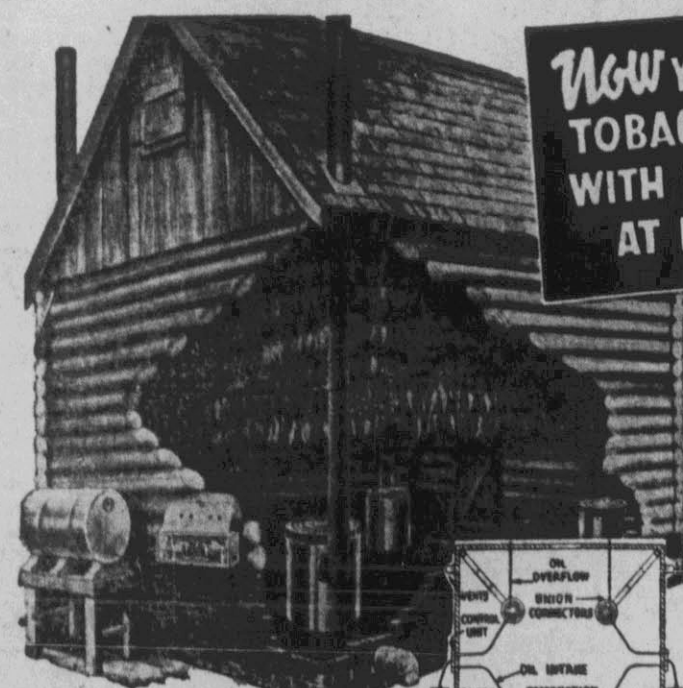
