HINTS TO HOUSEWIVES

To prevent woolen golf hose and sweaters from stretching, fit them over frames after they are laundered. Dry them thoroughly before removing them from the frames.

Flour should be measured at the time it is to be used. If it is allowed to stand it will pack down and accurate measurements will not be possible.

Give your window screens a coat of thin white screen enamel. Doing so will not obstruct vision from the inside, but will make vision from the outside less clear.

Give a crusty top to baked custard. When the custard is half-done sprinkle a thin layer of crumbled cake, macaroon or sugar cookie over the top. Drop the crumbs lightly or they will mix into the custard.

Specially-treated types of drapes may be washed by sponging them generously with warm—not hot—water and soap suds. They should be rinsed in warm water and dried in the sun.

Chopped mint blends with fresh strawberries and diced fresh pineapple. Add two tablespoons of mint for each three cups of fruit. Serve as an appetizer, salad or dessert.

Chill caramels before you remove their paper coverings. If the caramels are warm the papers are apt to stick tenaciously to the candy.

Duke Engineering Exhibit Now Open To General Public

High School Students and Practicing Engineers Especially Invited to View Exhibition

Durham, May 5.—The annual open house exhibition of the Duke university division of engineering is in progress today and tomorrow. The laboratories of the three engineering departments—civil, electrical, and mechanical—are open to

visitors. Students and faculty members are on hand to explain and demonstrate equipment and apparatus during the afternoon and evening.

Among the visitors to the "engineers' show" will be many high school seniors from the surrounding area, who have been given special invitations to attend. Practicing engineers, throughout North Carolina have also been invited to inspect the Duke engineering division during the two-day "open house."

The Duke division of engineering is housed in its own buildings on the Woman's college campus. The

buildings and grounds of the division have recently been renovated and improved, an addition has been made to the mechanical engineering department, and much new equipment has been installed in the laboratories of all departments.

The exhibition is the twelfth annual event of the Duke engineering division. It is sponsored by Delta Epsilon Sigma, local honorary engineering fraternity, which is being assisted by the faculty and the student chapters of the American Society of Civil Engineers, the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, and the American In-

stitute of Electrical Engineers. George Bynum, Winston-Salem senior in charge of arrangements, points out that throughout the exhibition special effort will be made to demonstrate to the layman the practical application of engineering knowledge and principles to everyday activities in other fields as well as to life as a whole.

Convalescents' serums are now available for the prevention and treatment of measles, scarlet fever, whooping cough, mumps and erysipelas, as well as for certain forms of infections caused by the streptococcal germs.

Wide use is now being made of convalescent measles serum to prevent the disease or make it milder. When this serum is given in proper amounts it is effective for these purposes in more than 95 per cent of the measles cases, if the serum is given not later than the fifth day after exposure.

This is a valuable procedure, especially for children under five who have been exposed, for measles is notably dangerous to infants and young children.

Convalescent measles serum is also of value in treating children who are run down or suffering from any other illness.

With children older than five years, it is not generally thought desirable to prevent entirely development of measles. In such instances a small quantity of the convalescent serum may be administered, after exposure, so that a milder attack of the disease may be developed. The mild attack is practically free from accompanying complications and severe reaction. It also confers a lasting, active immunity against subsequent attacks.

Similar use is made of convalescent scarlet fever serum in dealing with scarlet fever.

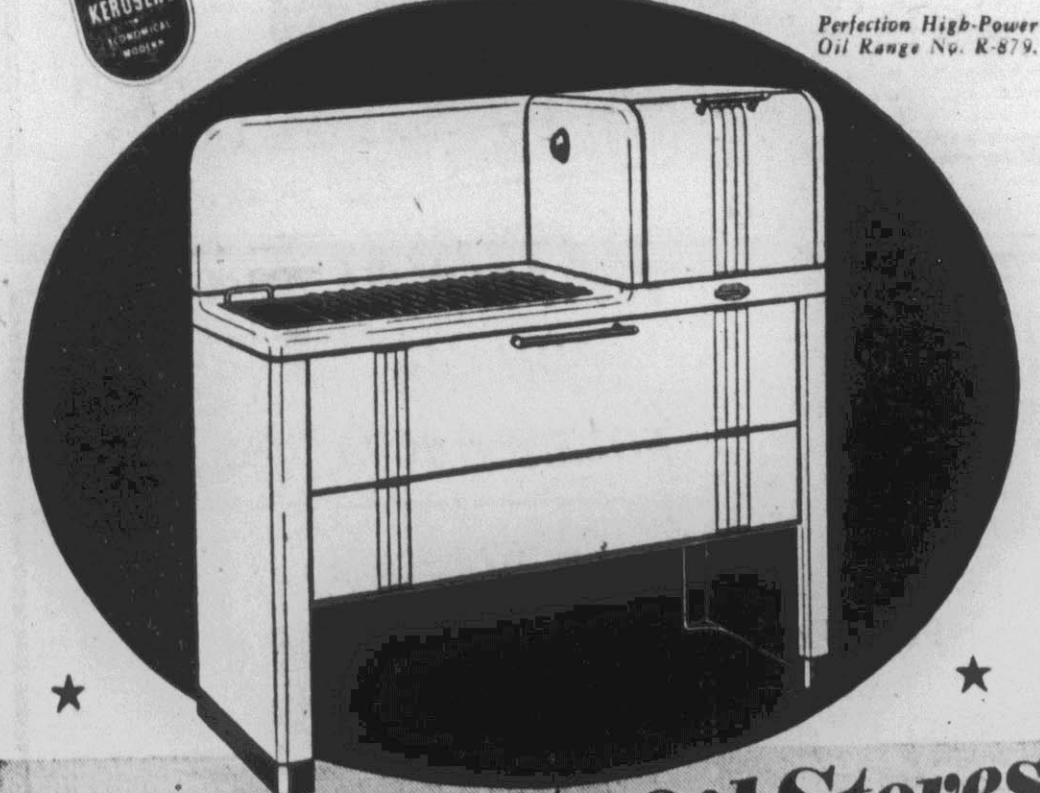

How's Your Health?

POOLS OF BLOOD

The phrase "pools of blood" may suggest horrifying visions to the average person, but modern science "pools blood" for merciful and life-saving ends.

In several metropolitan centers "convalescents' serum laboratories" have been established. At these laboratories blood, taken from the recovering sufferers of a number of diseases, is gathered and stored so that it may later be used in the prevention and treatment of certain infectious diseases.

The principle behind the use of such blood is this: In the blood serum of individuals recovering from certain infectious diseases are "immune bodies" capable of overcoming the disease process. When the convalescents' serum containing these immune bodies is suitably used it enables the sick individual to offer greater resistance to the disease.

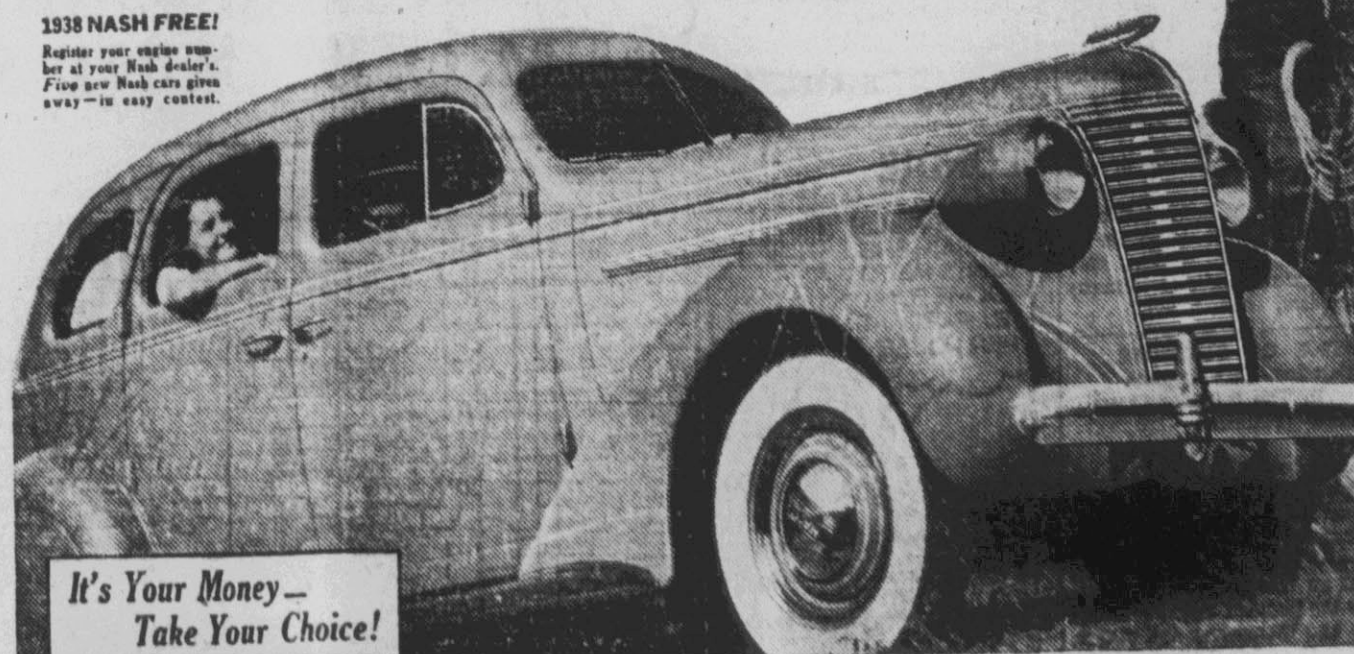

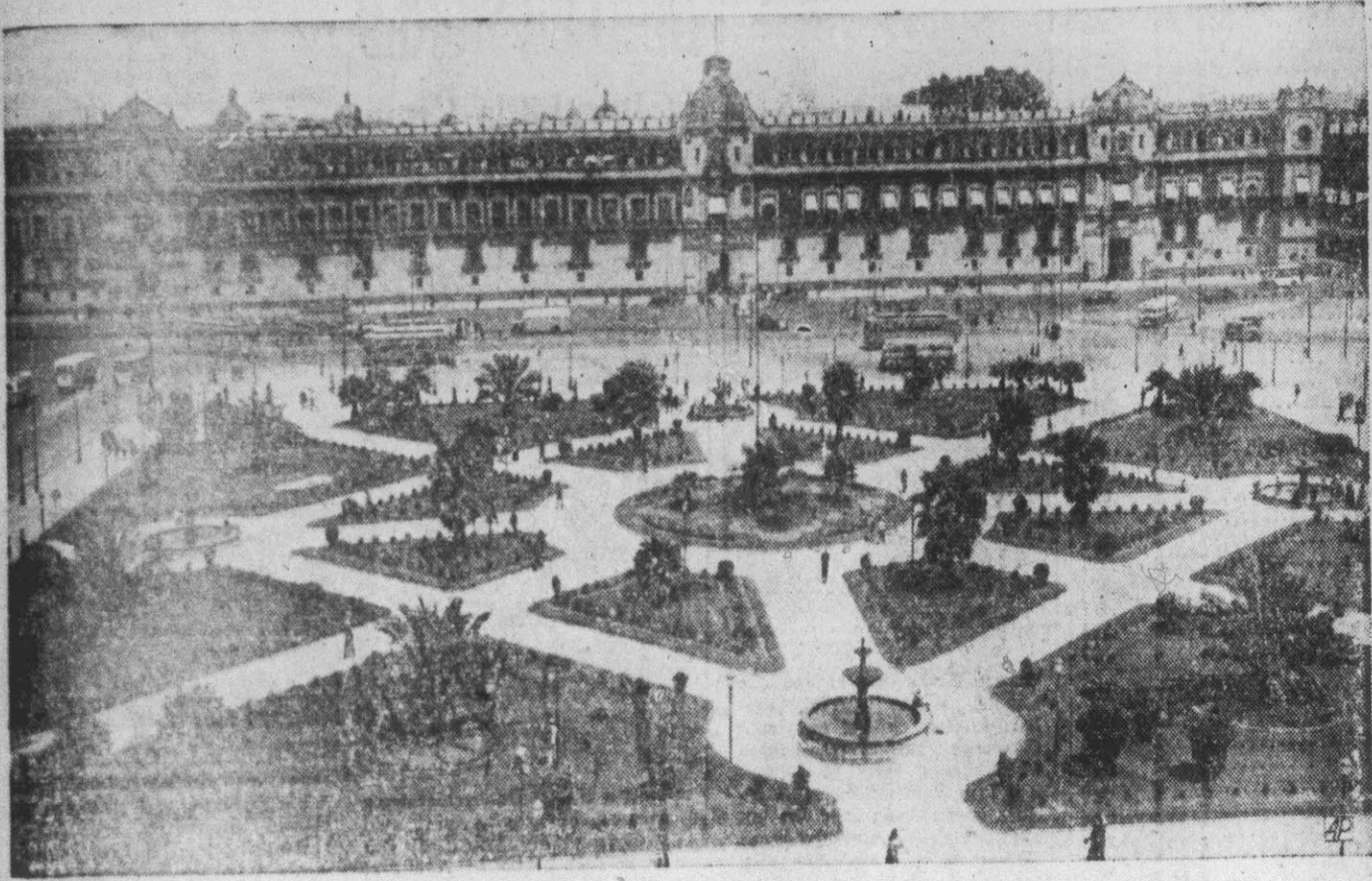
