LARGE VOLUME OF RECORDS IN OUSTER TRIAL

Auditors charge Sheriff Failed Turn Over Court Costs

COURT TO RECESS ALL OF THURSDAY

Introduction of Records into Evidence Tend to Slow Case Against Sheriff

Contentions and counter-contentions of counsel together with introduction of a large volume of records into court continued to slow the progress of the Sheriff Whitehurst ouster hearing here today, with the result that one witness took the stand for just a few minutes and retired without completing his testimony and another witness who followed him on the stand, had not completed his testimony this afternoon.

Judge G. Vernon Cowper, before whom the case is being heard, announced this morning that he would recess for tomorrow to permit counsel and others connected with the case, to attend the Democratic convention in Raleigh. The hearing will be resumed Friday morning.

Testimony presented by auditors this morning charged the sheriff with \$3,059.71 in certain uncollected court costs, and \$177.05 in other court costs and fees not turned over to the county.

Clerk of Court J. P. Harrington, who took the stand yesterday morning continued throughout the day and did not complete his testimony until this morning. His testimony dealt with approximately 200 cases, civil summons and homestead actions in which the prosecution alleges that the sheriff has failed to

Five Arrested For Harboring Karpis

Little Rock, Ark., May 18.—(AP)—The Federal Bureau of Investigation announced today the arrest of five men and two women on charges of harboring Alvin Karpis, former public enemy number one, at Hot Springs, Ark., in 1935.

Three of the men were officials of the Hot Springs police department at the time of the alleged offense.

The men and one of the women were arrested at Hot Springs early today, and the other woman was arrested by federal agents at St. Louis.

Federal agents and U. S. District Attorney Fred Isgrig said the prisoners were:

Herbert Akers, former Hot Springs chief of detectives.

Joseph Wakelin, former chief of police of Hot Springs.

John Stover, manager of the Hot Springs municipal airport.

Morris Loftis, caretaker for a boat landing near Hot Springs.

Mrs. Al Dyer, owner of the boat landing.

The woman arrested in St. Louis, federal agents said, was Connie Morris.

Air Mail Service Provided For Day

Greenville citizens are urged to take advantage of the first air mail service ever afforded this city and persons wishing to send letters via air are requested to have them in the post office by 9 o'clock.

The one-day air mail service is being offered in observance of National Air Mail week. A plane will leave Greenville at 8:30 o'clock, stop in Farmville at 8:30, Greenville at 9:20, Goldsboro at 10, Selma at 10:30 and arrive in Raleigh at 11:20 to make connections with both North and South bound planes.

Greenville post office officials declared it was necessary for all mail to be sent from here via air to be in the office by 9 o'clock.

The plane will land on the Dudley air field across the river.

RAIDS MADE ON LIQUOR STILLS

Two Captured in Pitt and Two in Beaufort this Week

J. M. Ward and J. L. Taylor, Pitt county ABC enforcement officers, today located and destroyed a large still in Beaufort township, making the second cut down in this county this week. In addition the Pitt officers worked with Beaufort officials in destroying two stills in that county.

The still in Beaufort township was located off the old Porter road back of Lewis's sawmill. It was of the steam type with 100-gallon capacity. It was in operation when the officers came upon it, but the attendants heard the men coming and fled. One hundred gallons of whiskey already had been run and 3,000 gallons of beer was found at the site of the plant, which was declared to have been comparatively new.

Yesterday the Pitt officers, working with Beaufort officials, located and destroyed a 100-gallon steam plant in Beaufort county, near the Pitt line. The still was not in operation when found by the officers, but 3,000 gallons of beer was found at the site.

Another still was torn down in Pitt county Monday. Located in Carolina township, it had a 50-gallon capacity. It was not in operation at the time, but 600 gallons of beer was found.

The two Pitt officers and Beaufort officials also destroyed another still in Beaufort county Monday. The plant had a capacity of 100-gallons and had been in operation when the officers came upon it. Fifty gallons of whiskey already had been run. The operators had left the site, however, before the officers arrived.

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Discovery Made Half Mile Off Mint Canyon Road

LINER DECLARED "ALL BURNED UP"

Transport Is Located After Woman Tells of Having Heard the Plane Monday P. M.

Los Angeles, May 18.—(AP)—The sheriff's office received a report from a Mint canyon rancher today that he had sighted the charred wreckage of the missing Lockheed air liner and all nine persons aboard were dead.

The discovery was made by Walter Peterson, 20 miles north of Sagus and one and a half miles off the Mint canyon highway in a rugged area where a two-day search, hampered by fog, had been in progress.

Officials estimated it would take several hours to reach the wreckage and they expected difficulty in bringing the bodies out of the rough Sierra Pelona region, which Peterson described as the scene of a tragic end to a short cut taken by the liner that had yet to be delivered into transport service.

Air search yesterday was balked by a fog that still cloaked the mountain peaks of the region this morning as Peterson came in with his report.

Peterson said the plane "was all burned up." He peered inside the cabin, he said, and counted seven bodies. The two child passengers escaped his notice.

He reached the crash scene about 5:30 a. m. (8:30 a. m. EST), having decided to make a search after a neighbor woman told him last night of hearing an airplane Monday afternoon.

Stroke Is Fatal To Mrs. Crawford

Mrs. Lizzie Allen Crawford, 62, widow of the late P. T. Crawford, died today at 12:30 p. m. at her home on the Greenville-Farmville highway near Ballard's Cross Roads.

Mrs. Crawford suffered a stroke of paralysis the day after her husband's death and has been critically ill since then. Mr. Crawford died in February.

The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock from the home, and will be conducted by Rev. R. F. Pittman, Free Will Baptist minister of Ayden, and Rev. M. A. Woodard, Free Will Baptist minister of Winterville. Burial will follow in Greenwood cemetery at Greenville.

Mrs. Crawford was a member of Piney Grove Free Will Baptist Church and took an active part in church activities as long as her health would permit. She had been a member of this church since girlhood.

She is survived by one sister, Miss Lena Allen, of the home; three brothers, Zeno Allen, George L. Allen, and Heber Allen, all of Greenville, R. F. D. 1.

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PENNSYLVANIA RETURNS SHOW EARLE VICTORY

John L. Lewis' Bid for Political Power Fades

SENATOR GUFFEY SUFFERS DEFEAT

Charles Jones, Earle's Running Mate, Piles Up Large Lead Over Kennedy

Philadelphia, May 18.—(AP)—The Pennsylvania bid for political power by John Lewis and the CIO faded today as returns from primary balloting gave the opposing Democratic state committee slate a sizeable lead.

Returns in the statewide primary gave:

Democratic U. S. Senator—(6,071 of 8,075 districts)—Earle, 611,818; Wilson, 247,940.

Democratic Governor—(6,119 districts)—Jones, 479,962; Kennedy, 385,977; Margiotti, 146,833.

Republican U. S. Senator—(5,918 districts)—Davis, 566,609; Oviatt, 372,905.

Republican Governor—(6,024 districts)—James, 734,937; Pinchot, 331,082.

Apparently turned back with Lewis, on the basis of incomplete returns, was Senator Joseph Guffey, who joined the CIO chief in supporting Thomas Kennedy for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination and Philadelphia's mayor Davis Wilson for the U. S. Senate.

The state New Deal factional struggle, intensified by organized labor's rivalries, was climaxed by the primary-even intervention of National Democratic Chairman James Farley.

Governor George Earle, who rebuffed Farley in the latter's 11th-hour party peace plan, and whose split with Senator Guffey had shaken Pennsylvania's New Deal organization to its foundation, walked away from Wilson.

Charles Jones of Pittsburgh, Earle's running mate for the gubernatorial nomination who Farley proposed to sacrifice for Kennedy, built a lead of more than 90,000 over Kennedy, secretary-treasurer of the United Mine Workers.

Jap Forces Blast Path Into Suchow

Shanghai May 18.—(AP)—Japanese today blasted with artillery a path for tank and infantry assaults on the strategic city of Suchow which they said had been deserted by General Chang Kai-Shek central government troops.

The crack government troops, the Japanese reported, were removed from Suchow before the invaders cut the Lunghai railway and encircled the city.

Fellowships Awarded.

The American Association of University Women has recently announced the award of seven fellowships for advanced study during 1938-1939. This is an award made each year by the national A. A. U. W. to carefully selected women who show great promise in their fields and who have already done much advanced work.

Two of the seven for next year are Southern women, and at least two are natives of foreign countries, one being from Uruguay and one from Germany.

These women will be working on a wide variety of topics—from biography to molecular structure, and from genetics to poetry and the fine arts.

The local branch of the A. A. U. W. has a share in this through its contribution each year to the funds that support the fellowships. This year the Greenville branch contributed around thirty dollars to the Fellowship Fund.

Speak At College Assembly.

The college assembly yesterday heard Marguerite Averett, junior, and Marguerite Curran, sophomore, both of Oxford, discuss the International conference held at Chapel Hill and Duke last week-end.

The conference was addressed by both white and colored speakers on topics of importance to good relations between the races—such matters as medicine and the Negro, the training of colored ministers, and the forming of associate units of the conference in colleges to study race relations, having been discussed.

There is a possibility that such a unit as the one mentioned above may be organized at E. C. T. C.

A bulletin giving a brief biography of five leading Negro educators in North Carolina is now being published.

It will include the founder and first president of Winston-Salem College for Negroes; the president of the Agricultural Negro College at Greensboro; an outstanding teacher in the Raleigh colored schools; the president and founder of the State Normal School for Negroes, who once represented the United States as Minister to Liberia; and the president and founder of the State Normal School for Negroes at Elizabeth City.

East Carolina Teachers College worked with the Elizabeth City institution in the preparation of their material for publication. Miss Sallie Joyner Davis was in charge of the work.

Other colleges and universities helping these institutions prepare their material for the booklet included Salem College, Duke University, Shaw, and State College.

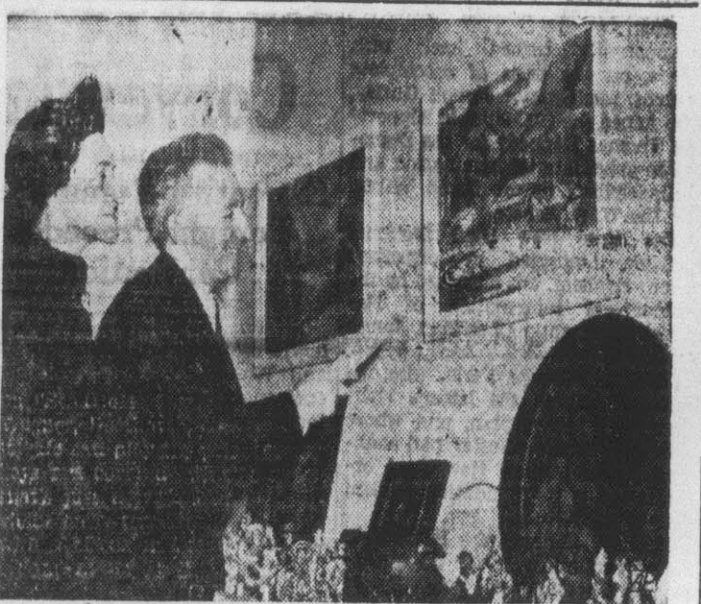

Women In The News

Summertime means playtime to most people, but to Louise A. Boyd it means hardship, and exciting adventure in the Arctic. Miss Boyd, San Francisco and San Rafael heiress, soon is to leave Norway where she has chartered the Veslekari, an old Norwegian seal ship on her sixth expedition to the North.

Miss Boyd already has penetrated further North than any white woman. She is the only foreign woman to have received the Order of Saint Olaf from Norway. That was awarded for her help in the search for Amundsen in 1928. At the same time the French government made her a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor.

Tales of Arctic exploration always had fascinated Miss Boyd. In 1924 when she visited Spitzbergen and first saw an ice pack, she knew what her career would be. Under the auspices of the American Geographical Society she has gone again and again to the hard region of Greenland. A section of that treacherous coast has been named for her by the Danish government.

This year's trip is to be the most dangerous she has attempted. Miss Boyd has planned to work her way from Spitzbergen to Greenland at a higher latitude than any vessel has made the passage.

Four scientists will make the trip with her. The vessel carries a crew of 14. Most of the time on the journey will be spent in an elaborate program of deep sea soundings.

When she is at home in California Louise A. Boyd leads a quiet existence.

Money derived from the Seal sale is for the benefit of Crippled Children. In making the final check it was found that one or two communities were not given an opportunity to share in the campaign because they failed to get stamps to put on sale. However, since this is to be an annual affair a greater effort will be made next year to see that every club and civic organization in the county will have a chance to make the effort worth while and that every section of the county will be covered.

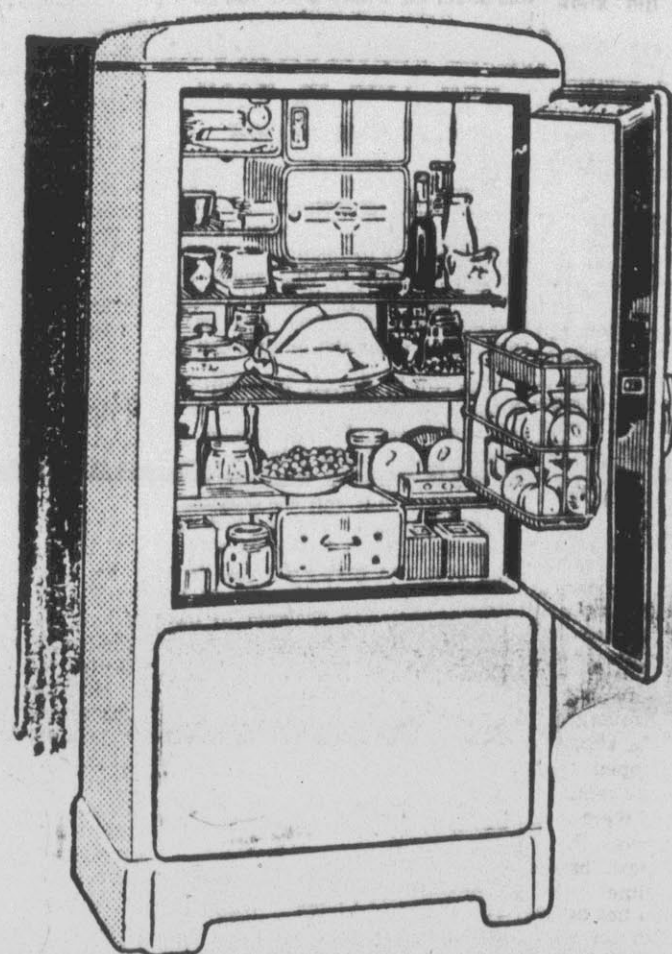

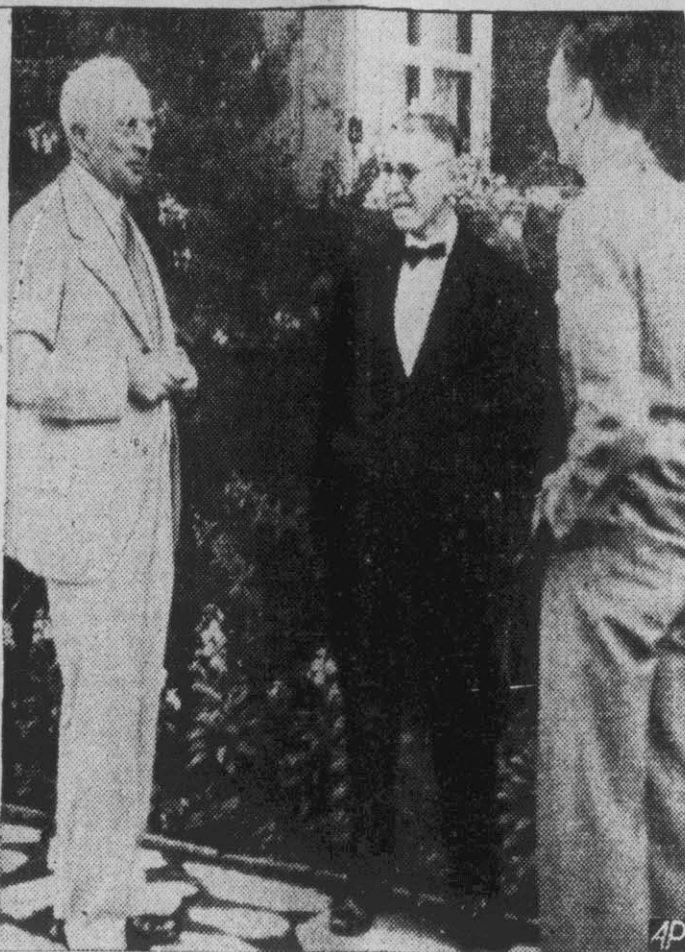
"Okay," Asey said. "I'll see if somethin' can't get started."

Reapportionment Issue Dead Until After 1940 Census

Question Will Not Figure in 1939 General Assembly Despite Rumblings in Guilford County

Reflector Bureau.
Raleigh, May 17.—Despite rumblings in Guilford county, one of the issues which has become a "hardy perennial" in North Carolina will not figure this year either in the legislative campaign or in the 1939 General Assembly.

The old standby which has been ridden into office by many westerners and which has been viewed with alarm enough in the East to start a world-wide panic several times over is Reapportionment—an issue which raised its head when the 1931 legislature tossed its Constitutional obligations into the gutter like a very short cigarette butt and declined to re-allot legislative representation among the 100 counties as the Constitution commanded it should.

Since then each successive General Assembly has flouted the organic law of the land in the same nonchalant manner.

Now the Guilford county Democratic convention has named a committee to consider abrogation of a "gentlemen's agreement" with Rockingham whereby the smaller county gets a Senator every term. Guilford would have four representatives (it now has three) of Reapportionment were honestly applied, while Rockingham, now rejoicing in two members of the House, would have but one.

It's to late for this abrogation, if actually gone through with, to affect the current political situation. It might deprive Rockingham of a Senator in the 1941 session; because it's certainty that nothing drastic will be done in the 1939 General Assembly because the 1940 census will then be too close at hand and it will be practically time to take another sock at the sacred Constitution.

Even the strongest advocates of reapportionment admit there is

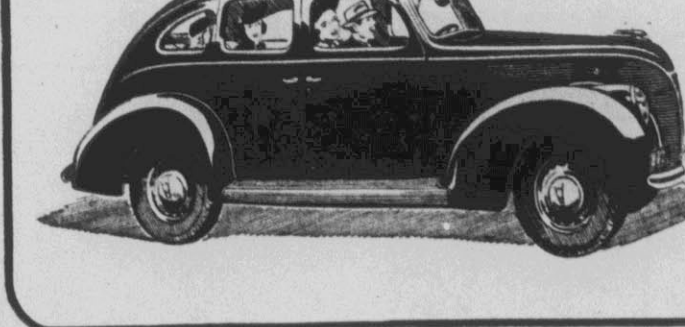

Said one of the chaps: "Who is Frank Hancock's Wake county campaign manager?"

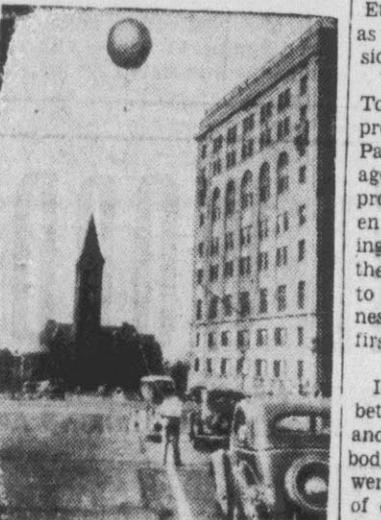

Man About Manhattan

By George Tucker

New York—Since the beginning of the theatrical season Broadway showmen have been battling a transatlantic jinx. At the moment they feel they have conquered it, but if you mention it in a tone above a whisper you are very likely to receive their terrors.

Producers suffering from this jinx are obsessed with the notion that no play that succeeds in London has the ghost of a chance on Broadway. Similarly, a Broadway success, they fear, is doomed to early destruction in Piccadilly. Or at any rate, that was the hallucination before two ocean-crossers disarmed the hoodoo by flourishing on alien soil.

It all began when "George and Margaret," a London success, came a quick cropper over here last Autumn. It had been proclaimed a British model of last year's Pulitzer prize play, "You Can't Take It With You," and its success seemed certain. The British Empire repaid our hostility to "George and Margaret" by rejecting "You Can Take It With You" with even shorter shrift than we accorded their favorite.

Shortly thereafter another of our hits, "Room Service," perished in London. We retaliated by having no part of London's "Time And The Conways." It was at this point that Victor Payne-Jennings, one of London's most prominent showmen, came to New York to produce "Whiteoaks."

Appalled by these transatlantic disasters, he instructed his staff to hush all news relating to the success of his play in London—which was rather difficult, since it was known to be the British capital's oldest hit and, moreover, Ethel Barrymore was announced as the star of the American version.

When the play went to Montreal Toronto and other try-out cities previous to its New York premiere, Payne-Jennings had recurrent agonies. He feared word of its prosperity on tour would strengthen the jinx on it. And when Washington supported it generously, the British producer was reluctant to return from Palm Beach to witness the debacle he was sure the first night would bring.

In the three days intervening between the Washington closing and the New York opening, everybody connected with "Whiteoaks" went about with the dispirited air of one about to lose his head. The jinx rested heavy on them, and nothing could dissuade them from their conviction that their enterprise was a marked failure.

But just before the curtain went up there came a sunbeam from London. It seems that "Idiot's Delight," the Pulitzer prize play of 1936, had scored a resounding success in the British city. The news cheered Payne-Jennings enormously. Certainly, he thought, Americans will preserve this renewed hands-across-the-sea bond.

They did. "Whiteoaks" succeeded, and managers with interests in the two capitals now walk with lighter step. But if you look closely at their hands, you'll notice they keep their fingers crossed.

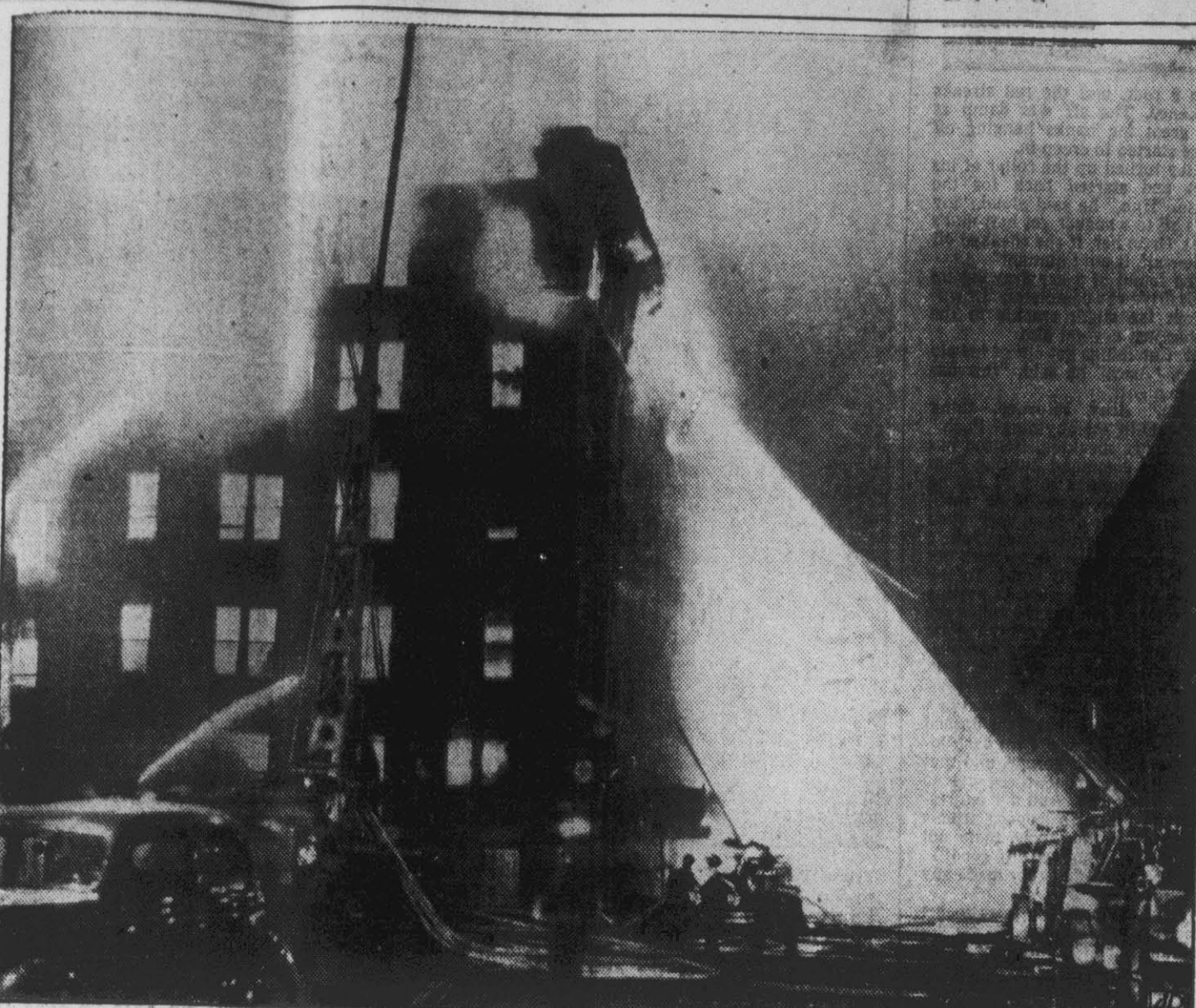

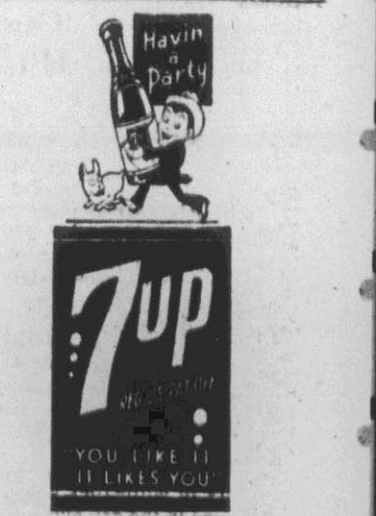

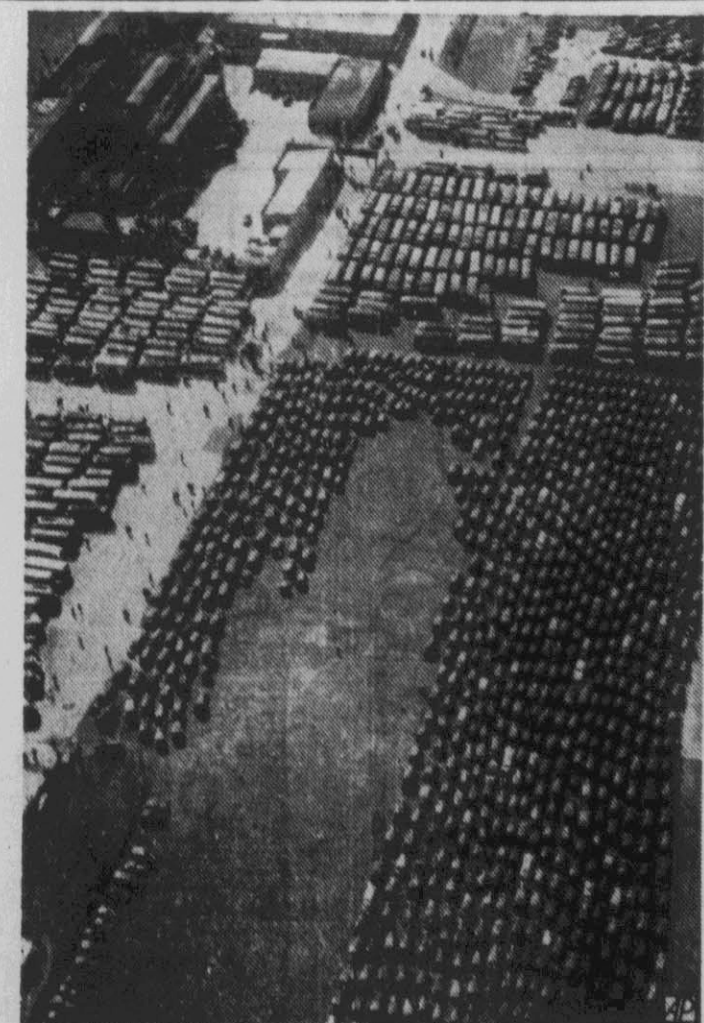

State Foresters Crack Down After Series Of Blazes

Fires Declared Set n Bladen And Columbus Around Saw Mills In Order To Find Scrap Iron

Raleigh, May 17.—Forest fire wardens of North Carolina are cracking down more vigorously than ever since they recently discovered an entirely new wrinkle in reasons for setting fire to wood lands.

The new stunt—setting a fire in order to make it easier to find pieces of junk—hasn't the prime motive for the drive against offenders, but it added vigor to the campaign when discovered.

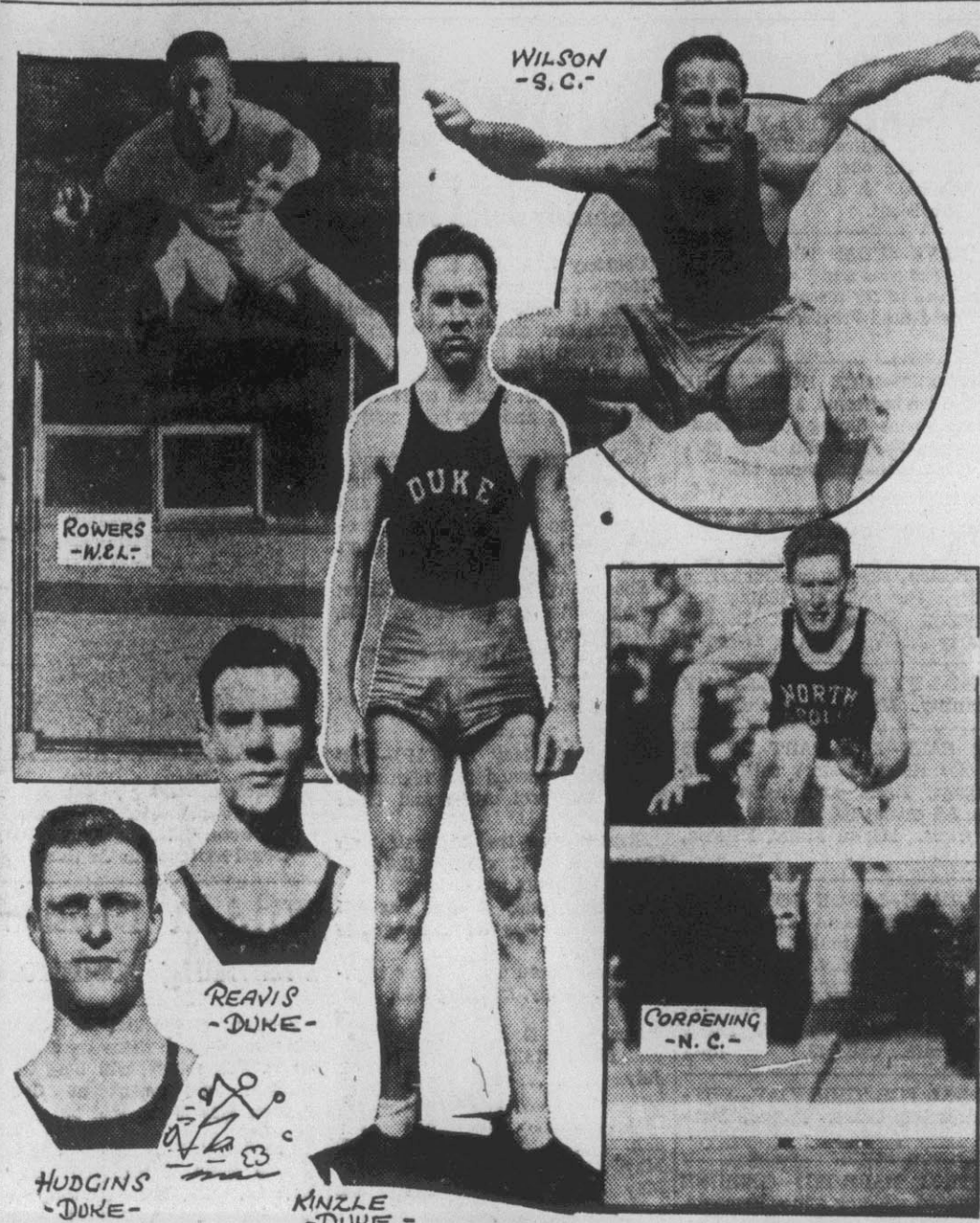
Wardens in Bladen and Columbus recently discovered that a series of fires around abandoned saw mills had been set by a dealer in scrap iron in order to make it easier for him to find pieces of old iron, pipe, etc., usually left around such places, according to W. K. Belcher, in the forest fire prevention division of the Department of Conservation and Development.

Efficient work by the state wardens not only kept the fires to a small area, but also resulted in arrest and conviction of the offender, who was tried in the courts of both counties and is now serving a four months road sentence.

Assistant State Forester W. C. McCormick, in charge of the prevention division, reports that from March 1 through April 14, forest fire wardens made 131 arrests. In addition \$1,195.27 was collected in fines, cost and fire suppression costs. One fine of \$130 was imposed upon the operator of a moonshine whiskey still whose fire got away from him and caused a forest fire.

Although the spring fire season continued through April, the situation was not as bad as in March, with a result that there were only about 700 fires in April against some 1,212 the previous month.

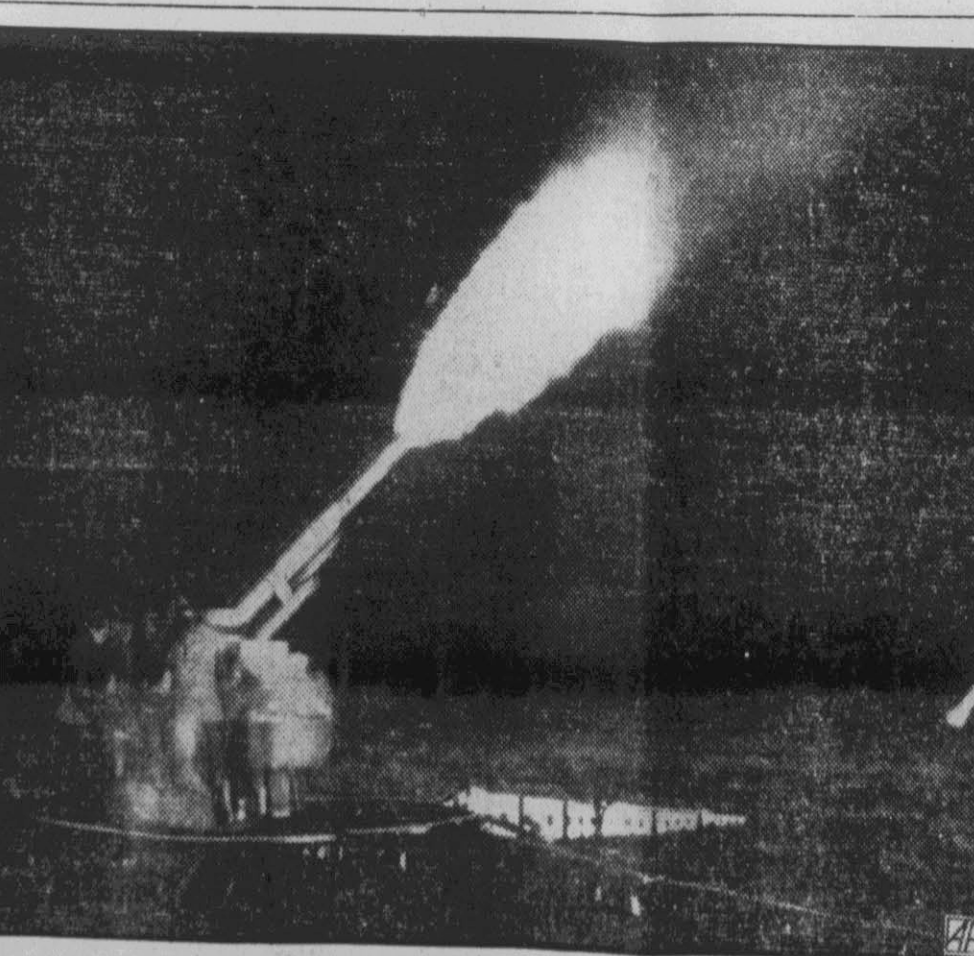
L. R. Harrill, state 4-H club director, announced the winners today.

Miss Bunn, 18, has held the highest offices in her local club and completed projects in food, clothing, room improvement, home beautification and gardening.

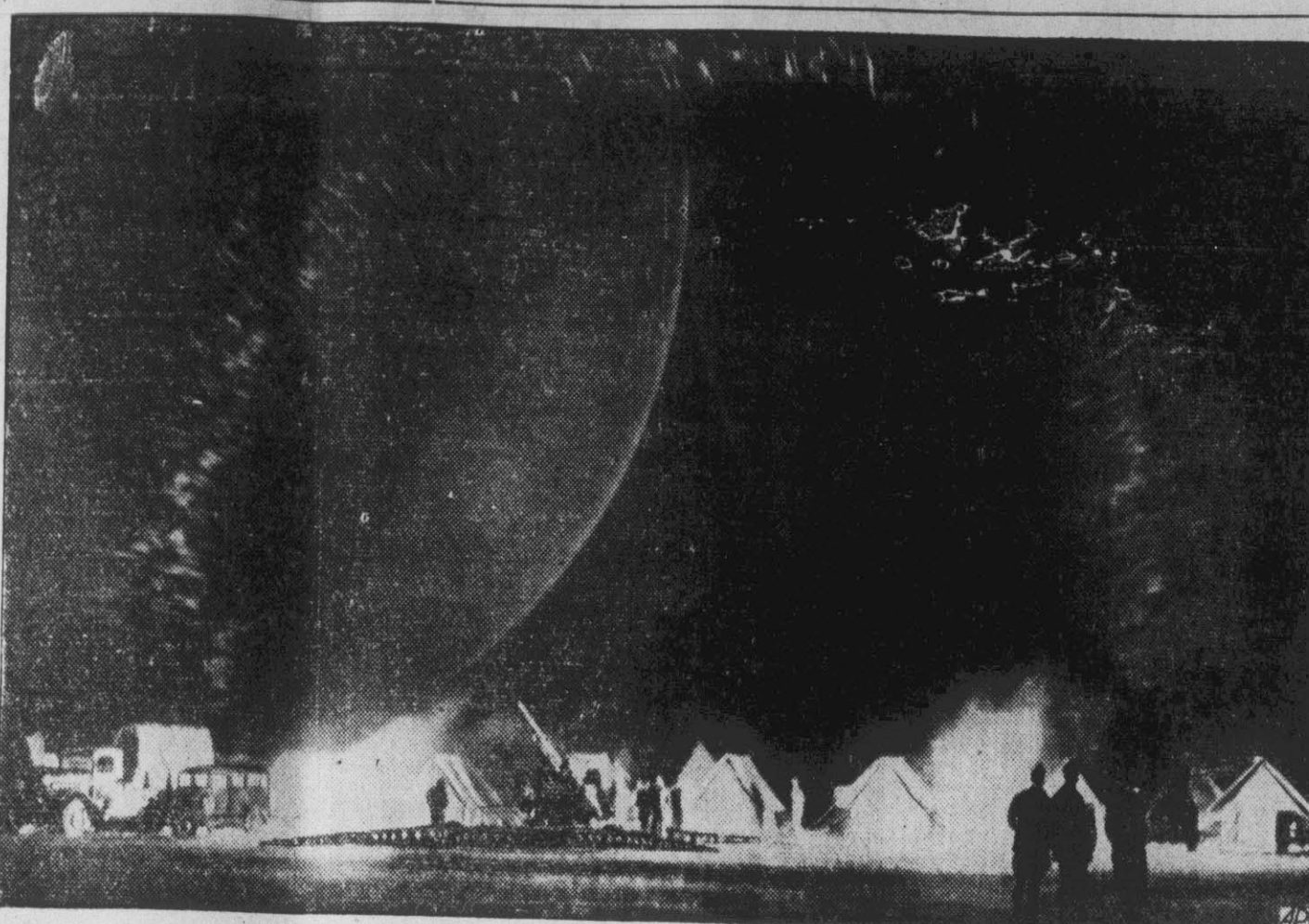

turn over fees to the county. His testimony also dealt with a number of capias issued through his office directed to the sheriff of Pitt county but served by ABC officers. While the witness testified that he could not say exactly how many capias he delivered to the sheriff and how many he turned over to the ABC officers, he did state that some were turned over to the ABC officers at the verbal order of Judge Henry A. Grady, who presided over the January term of court here. There was objection on the part of defense counsel to the admission of this evidence, but the prosecution counsel contended that it hoped to show thereby that a presiding judge found it necessary to order the clerk to deliver the capias to other officers because of the sheriff's failure or refusal to serve the capias.

L. R. Ausbon, one of the accountants who aided in preparation of the audits, was returned to the stand this morning but was relieved when defense demanded certain records from which the audits were purported to have been made, and it was found that these records were not in court. The records pertained to one of the schedules in the audit in which the sheriff is charged with \$3,059.71 uncollected court fines and costs.

F. P. Wall, another of the auditors, took the stand and testified to

certain audits containing six sections in which the sheriff is charged with a total of \$177.05 fees, as follows:

Civil summons and documents, \$100.05; Superior court costs in civil actions, \$35.85; special proceedings, \$32.45; amounts receivable from pending appeals from Justice of the Peace courts, \$2.70; miscellaneous fees from Justice of Peace actions, \$4.00; fees on judgments prior to 1932, \$2.00.

The witness declared that the audits did not attempt to reveal whether or not any of these amounts had ever been received by the sheriff's office but that they had not been paid into the county treasury. On this point defense counsel contended that the sole purpose of the audit was to disclose that the funds had not been paid over to the county indicating that the sheriff had failed in his duty in failure to turn over if he had collected the items or failure in his duty to collect if same had not been collected.

Replying to a question by defense counsel as to whether the audit of jail fees previously testified to by the witness had been made to show only errors against the sheriff and none in his favor, the witness said: "If I had known of any errors in favor of the sheriff, I would have shown them in the audit and credited him with the same." He admitted that the jail fee audit did not include any items to the credit of the sheriff. Asked by defense counsel if he had not previously told the sheriff that he was hired by the Board of County Commissioners to find errors "against" the sheriff, the witness answered, "I can brand such a statement as absolutely false."

The committee adopted a motion by Representative Meade (D-N. Y.) to hear the three witnesses at the "earliest date practicable."

The vote on Meade's motion was unanimous, although Senator Frazier (R-N. D.), said he would prefer that the committee obtained "first

hand information" before calling the officials.

New York, May 17.—(AP)—Financial quarters today said probabilities favored the acceptance by National Power and Light Company, of the offer of TVA and the city of Knoxville to buy properties of its subsidiary, Tennessee Public Service Company.

Last week's "final" offer by the mayor of Knoxville required a "yes or no" answer not later than today, but last night he extended the time limit another 24 hours.

In a last minute shift of plans, the directors of National Power and Light, who met Monday without arriving at a decision, decided to take advantage of the extended time and postponed a meeting scheduled for late today until tomorrow afternoon.

Visiting Minister Continues Services

Rev. J. Lester Lane, Baptist Pastor holding a revival meeting in Memorial Baptist church in this city, preached last night on "The Difficulties of Noah's Walk With God." Using Genesis 6:6-9 as his text, he pointed out that God requires more of Christians living in the 20th Century than He did in Noah's day. Children to be better Christians than their parents. Though living in a much different world from ours, Noah found it difficult to live a good life.

First, Noah lived among people who did not accept God's standards of conduct. Many today excuse their conduct on the basis of the age in which they live, customs and conditions of this day. Many temptations face the man in business to excuse dishonesty. "How in the world am I to live a Christian life in a business world like this?" they

ask. Women face many problems in social life that seem to make it hard to be a Christian today. There is a great danger, the pastor pointed out, of our being conformed to the world's Godless way of life. It is easy to say, "I cannot go against my day." Many are enslaved by public opinion, selling out to popular and current ways of thinking and living. No one is independent who does this. Said Rev. Lane, "God pity the enslaved soul that cannot make his own choices, that can't be independent, but drink with the drinking crowd, gamble with the gambling crowd, go the way of irreligion with the irreligious crowd. Noah met the challenge of God and stood true to God's standards in spite of his surroundings.

Jesus came out of evil, corrupt Nazareth; beauty blooming midst the sordid worldly life of this city. We need today to be true to the best we know as Christians.

In the second place, Rev. Mr. Lane pointed out that another hindrance to Noah's walk with God was his wealth. "All too often in proportion as men rise in rank of wealth, they decline religiously," he

said. In the last place, Noah had an unpleasant task to perform—namely, preaching judgment upon sin to a sinning people. They scorned his message, were liberal minded, wanted to hear of God's love and mercy and grace, when their imperative need was to be warned of their sin. The whole truth of God's Word cannot be preached unless we preach the truth that "the soul that sinneth, it shall surely die," and "The wages of sin is death."

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
