WOULD PLACE OBSERVERS ON CZECH BORDER

Britain Sounds Out Both Germany and Czechoslovakia

DECLARED IDEA STILL INDEFINITE

Germany, However, Understood Not To Be Unfavorable To Suggestion

London, May 26.—(AP)—Great Britain today sounded out both Germany and Czechoslovakia on a plan to send British observers to their troubled border as a means of lessening tension.

Germany was understood to be not unfavorable to the plan.

Authoritative sources disclosed William Strang, head of the Central European department of the Foreign Office, would report on the proposal after visiting British diplomats in Berlin and Prague.

The observer idea was said still to be indefinite. It was assumed, however, it would entail unofficial "umpires" who would give Britain unbiased reports of border incidents and help her in the role of peace-maker.

Meanwhile Prague reported hard-headed military preparation for Czechoslovakia's defense continued without respite.

Troops mobilized for defense of the German frontier remained in the border region. It seemed unlikely that the customary military parade would be held this year on the President's birthday — President Eduard Beneš will be 54 on Saturday — because the men under arms had more pressing assignments.

The high command of the civil air defense issued a reminder to house-holders to test their "black-out" equipment to make sure that they really were prepared for emergency.

Another reminder of the undercurrent of anxiety lest Adolf Hitler, of Germany, try to bring under his domination the nations 3,500,000 German minority, was an announcement that gas masks for public employees could be paid for on the installment plan.

Fletcher Can Say "I Told You So"

Raleigh, May 26.—Major A. L. Fletcher, commissioner of labor, is passing up one of the best chances on record to say "I told you so," as Wilmington authorities prepare to try R. J. Newell, late sponsor of the North Carolina Labor Journal, on false pretense charges.

So far the good Major has restrained the very natural inclination to do a bit of bragging about his keenness in knowing a racket when he sees one. He is just sitting back and holding in the last, long laugh on the fellow who has bilked eminent North Carolina industrialists out of perfectly good dollars for advertisements in his alleged "labor" sheet.

The incident is evidence tending to show there is more than a suspicion of truth in the impression that the so-called "big" men of industry are veritable babes in the woods in the rough and tumble game of politics.

Here's a brief resume of the current episode:

Some months ago Newell came into the state with something of a blare of trumpets. He proposed to publish a "labor" paper which "upholds the principles of the American Federation of Labor," but he wasn't going to sell it to subscribers. He was going to get money to distribute the paper from the big employers.

As soon as he outlined the plan to the Labor Commissioner, Major Fletcher tagged it a racket pure and simple, a scheme to get money out of the employers under the subterfuge of publishing an anti-C.I.O. journal. Newell was warned as were the industrialists, he would likely run afoul of the Wagner Labor Law if organized distribution of this propaganda were conducted.

Nevertheless at least two issues of the so-called paper—a scurrilous rag if there ever was one—were printed before American Federation of Labor officials (whose "principles" he proclaimed he was upholding), caused his arrest in Wilmington on charges of soliciting ads under the pretense that he was to publish an "official" book for the State Federation meetings at Wilmington in August.

So the bottom obviously has fallen out of the Newell scheme, and the employers who advertised in his journal have gained no credit for themselves or their account.

Evidence Against Sheriff Expected Be Completed By End of Today's Session

JUDGE APPROVES BILL OF \$412 FOR AUDITORS

Judge Cowper this afternoon approved payment of \$412.91 by the county to the firm of Williams and Wall, auditors, for additional services in connection with the Whitehurst ouster case, by Frank P. Wall and L. R. Ausbon covering the 11 days the two were here as witnesses in the case.

The bill rendered included \$20 per day for Wall's services, \$15 per day for Ausbon's services, \$51.55 for room and board and \$9.36 traveling expenses, totaling \$445.91. Upon Wall's statement to the effect that his own time was at a special rate of \$20 per day instead of the usual \$25 the judge requested that Ausbon's time be reduced

to \$12 per day and approved the bill after the reduction had been made.

While on the stand earlier in the hearing of the case, Wall had testified that his concern had received \$3,700 from the county for making audits upon a portion of which the case against the sheriff is based.

When the bill was presented this afternoon the question of the county's liability in view of the fact that the case was brought by the commissioners as individual citizens was raised, but Judge Cowper expressed the opinion that apparently it was brought for the public benefit and that the bill would be paid by the county.

Prosecution Plans To Rest Upon Completion of Testimony of D. R. Hollowell, Auditor, Regarded As One of Most Significant Witnesses Put on by Petitioners

Cross examination of D. R. Hollowell, auditor, last and considered most important prosecution witness in the Sheriff Whitehurst ouster proceedings, is scheduled to be completed during this afternoon, indicating that counsel for the petitioners will rest their case before court recesses for the day.

Hollowell began his direct testimony Tuesday morning and his cross examination was begun yesterday afternoon. The witness testified concerning audits of the affairs of the sheriff's office for a period from January 27, 1933, to March 22, 1938 made from the records of the office and for prior periods made from such information as could be obtained from records of the sheriff's bank account. The testimony charged the sheriff with failure to pay over to the county or other persons sums totaling approximately \$1,200 to \$1,300 as disclosed by the sheriff fees or trust fund records and yet the audit revealed an overdraft of \$32.82 in the account. Disbursements of the account, the witness said, revealed diversion of funds to the sheriff's own personal use. Hollowell also testified that covering the sheriff's entire term of office his books and records had been kept in a "careless and negligent" manner and that numerous items of transactions of the office appeared nowhere on the sheriff's records.

The cross examination of the witness dealt with individual items of the audits but the answers made no material change in his direct testimony.

Review of Case
The ouster case, longest hearing on record in this county, got under way before Judge G. Vernon Comper on Monday May 19, when the ouster petition brought by individual members of the County Board of Commissioners and the Sheriff's answer to same were read to the court. The petition charged the sheriff with bribery, failure or refusal to arrest violators of the prohibition laws, warning bootleggers of the presence of Federal enforcement officers in this county, failure or refusal to turn over to the county certain fees of his office that belonged to the county, and maladministration of the affairs of his office.

The sheriff's answer denied the charges of the petition in their entirety and branded them as "malicious and untrue."

To Transfer Naval Fleet To Waters Of Atlantic

Plans Also Include Visit to New York World's Fair

Washington, May 26.—(AP)—The Navy department announced today the entire fleet would be moved from the Pacific to the Atlantic next year for maneuvers and to visit the New York World's fair.

Leaving its Pacific bases early in January, the fleet will be gone probably six months. The visit to New York is scheduled for May.

Confidential fleet problem number 20 will be worked out during February in the West Indies and the Atlantic at least as far south as the equator, the navy said.

The announcement was made without explanation, but naval circles recalled testimony of Admiral William Leahy, chief of operations before congressional committees this year that the anti-Communist alliance between Germany, Italy and Japan "must be taken into consideration by American's sea defense."

Stay Of Sentence Ordered For Teel

J. Frank Harrington, clerk of Pitt County Superior court, today said that he had received an order from the office of the Governor granting a further stay of sentence to Medius Teel, convicted in November, 1937, of operating a house for immoral purposes.

Teel is free under bond final decision on an application for parole. Commissioner of Patroles Edwin Gill had announced that a decision would be forthcoming this month, and the stay of execution was granted pending further study of the application.

Call Off Civil Term In County Next Week

Pitt County officials today called attention to the fact that all cases scheduled to be tried in the civil term of court next week had been postponed and unless jurors are further advised they need not report for duty.

Judge Henry A. Grady was scheduled to have presided over two weeks of civil court starting last Monday. The jurist arrived as scheduled, heard several divorce cases signed a number of judgments and adjourned the session.

POPPY DAY SET FOR SATURDAY

Mrs. D. M. Clark Chairman for Legion Auxiliary

Poppy Day will be observed in Greenville Saturday, when the American Legion Auxiliary will offer the little red emblems for sale in tribute to soldiers who died in the World War.

Headquarters for the sale will be at Hill Horn's drug store.

Mrs. Clark today issued the following statement regarding Poppy Day:

"To America, facing disturbed world conditions and struggles against economic troubles, will come next Saturday a message of assurance and courage. It will come from the men who gave their lives for America when the country was facing a warring enemy 20 years ago.

"The message will be in such simple form that everyone, even the children, can understand. It will come in the form of little red poppies worn on the coat lapels. It will speak of days when Americans were dying for their country and will urge the same spirit of courageous patriotism in facing the dangers of today.

"The poppy is the flower that grew in the shell-churned soil of the battle front in France and Belgium, the only touch of beauty surviving war's destruction and the only floral tribute for the war dead. It became and remained the symbol of the highest patriotic sacrifice. On Poppy Day each year, the American Legion and Auxiliary bring it to us with its eloquent message from the dead.

"Can anyone wear a poppy without feeling a glow of pride in his country? Can anyone see the poppies blooming brightly on hundreds of coats without knowing a surge of confidence in America? Reminded by the poppies, can anyone doubt that the nation capable of such effort and sacrifice twenty years ago, will be victorious over today's difficulties?

"Every American should wear a poppy on Poppy Day and all Americans should catch the poppy's message. The brave little blossoms say: 'Remember the dead, aid the disabled and carry on for America.'"

REPORTS GOOD TOBACCO CROP

Find Excellent Early Stand in Eastern Carolina

Raleigh, May 26.—Excellent stands of unusually early tobacco throughout Eastern North Carolina were reported today by Dr. Luther Shaw, extension plant pathologist at State College.

County agents and farmers have been of the opinion that blue mold, serious disease of tobacco seedlings, was generally advantageous this year in holding back the development of plants in the beds.

Even with the mold, most growers pulled their plants from the beds and set them in the field before the normal date of transplanting, Dr. Shaw declared.

Lack of extremely cold weather last winter and an early spring caused rapid growth of the tobacco seedlings and resulted in large, well-rooted plants by transplanting time.

Dr. Shaw also pointed out that the recent period of cool, rainy weather has stunted cotton over most of the producing area.

Damping-off, or "sore shin" has been more prevalent and more serious this year in cotton fields planted with untreated seed than it has been for several years.

However, the plant pathologist explained that good stands and only a small amount of damping-off were observed in fields planted with treated seed.

In some cases, growers who planted treated seed have poor stands because of early rains which packed the soil to the extent that it was mechanically difficult for the cotton to emerge.

ARMY SECURES BETTER HOLD IN JAP CABINET

Foreign, War and Finance Ministers Resign

GENERAL HEADS WAR DEPARTMENT

Authorities Express Belief Shakeup Will Mean Better Prosecution of China War

Tokyo, May 26.—(AP)—Japan's Foreign, War, and Finance Ministers left the cabinet today in a drastic reorganization by which the army appeared to have won a stronger grip on the government, with the likelihood that there likely now will be made a new and stronger effort to end the China conflict with quick victory.

The departing ministers were Koki Hirota, Foreign Minister, General Gen Sugiyama, war, O. Kaya, finance.

Lieut. General Itagaki, who has been on the China front, becomes War Minister. H. Ikeda becomes Minister of Finance and the new finance minister is General K. Ugaki.

Authorities said the shake-up strengthened the government and expressed belief it would mean more vigorous prosecution of the war in China. It was believed to be the result of settlement of a long-drawn, behind-the-scenes argument as to whether to pursue General Kiang Kai-Shek and his Chinese Government further into the interior in favor of continued pursuit.

Shanghai reported meanwhile Japanese had announced they had established bases for frontal attacks against the important Lung-hai railway cities of Kweihai and Kaifeng.

This was accomplished by complete occupation and the mopping-up of areas a point 33 miles east of Kweihai, and another point 26 miles east of Kaifeng, the Japanese said.

FDR To Decide On Tax Revision Bill

Washington, May 26.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, the White House said today, will announce his action on the tax revision bill at 2 p. m. (EST) tomorrow during the course of his address at the Arthur Dale, West Va., resettlement project.

The Chief Executive has until midnight tomorrow night to make known his decision on whether he has signed or vetoed the bill.

OPEN PROBE OF PLANE CRASH

Federal Board of Inquiry Seeks to Determine Cause

Cleveland, O., May 26.—(AP)—A Federal board of inquiry moved today to determine why a United Airlines transport plane crashed into a wooded ravine within sight of Cleveland airport in a flaming wreckage, a funeral pyre for the 10 persons aboard.

Investigators were especially interested in statements from witnesses that the sleeper-type, all-metal Douglas airliner was airborne before it plunged earthward out of a clear sky.

Secretary of Commerce Roper appointed B. M. Jacobs, assistant director of the Air Commerce Bureau, chairman of the board, assisted by George W. West, chief of the Bureau's enforcement division, and Philip Salzman of Newark, N. J., airlines maintenance inspector.

D. Mulligan, Air Commerce Bureau chief, said at Washington, "the factor about this accident that concerns us is the report that the plane was observed on fire in the air. If this is true the accident probably was caused by power plant failure."

United Airlines President W. A. Patterson said after he and several aides inspected the charred and twisted debris that evidence showed "quite conclusively" that neither engine was functioning at the moment of impact.

THREAT MADE IN NAZI CAMP

Rep. Dies (D.-Tex.) Understood By Reporters to Have Said Member of Congress Had Made Speech Urging Assassination of President, But Later Corrects to Member of Bund

Washington, May 26.—(AP)—Representative Dies (D.-Tex.), advised the House today he had information that a member of the German-American Bund, in a speech at one of the main Nazi camps in this country, had advocated assassination of President Roosevelt.

Reporters in the press gallery understood Dies to say a member of Congress had made the speech and at first Dies confirmed that understanding in reply to a note sent to him on the House floor.

Later, however, he told newsmen he had stated a Bund member had urged assassination. He explained he had misread the note.

The Texan did not name the camp or amplify the charge.

He made it at the start of debate on his resolution to authorize an investigation by a seven-man House committee of the extent, character and objectives of un-American propaganda in the United States.

Dies said he was not an alarmist, but he had had "smoking" information supplied to him about the extent of a Nazi movement in this country.

Meanwhile, David Lilienthal, TVA director, testified before a congressional committee that Arthur E. Morgan, former TVA chairman, tried to "defeat and obstruct the authority" in litigation involving its constitutional. Lilienthal took the stand to answer charges made against him yesterday by Morgan.

Presenting his testimony in a series of prepared statements, Lilienthal said the former chairman's efforts to obstruct the Authority took place in litigation before a special court in Chattanooga.

He added he would give details on the matter and "the conduct of Arthur Morgan in respect to the so-called Berry Marble claim."

Little Cannon Child Is Claimed by Death

William Floyd, four months old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Jesse Cannon of Grimesland, died last night at seven o'clock at Taylor Hospital, Washington. Funeral services were conducted from the home this afternoon at 2:30 by the Rev. F. E. Davis, Methodist minister, and burial followed in the family cemetery near the home.

Besides the parents, five sisters and a brother survive.

EDITOR HURT IN AUTO CRASH

Dr. Douglas Freeman Is Injured; Negro Chauffeur Slain

Fayetteville, May 26.—(AP)—Douglas S. Freeman, 52, editor of the Richmond, Virginia News Leader and Pulitzer prize winning historian, suffered cuts and bruises, his daughter, Mary Plyler 21, was seriously injured and their chauffeur killed in a truck-automobile collision near here today.

Dr. Freeman and Miss Freeman were brought to a Fayetteville hospital after their northbound car and a south-bound truck collided on a slippery highway.

Hospital authorities said Miss Freeman's left leg was broken near the hip and that she was in a semiconscious state, apparently the result of shock and head abrasions.

Rebel Airport In Mexico Bombed

Mexico City, May 26.—(AP)—The Mexican government today said its planes raided and destroyed a Cedralista rebel airport a few hours after War Minister Tamacho had declared rebel planes, some of them flown by United States pilots, had bombed several small towns occupied by loyal Federals.

Bombing ships raised the rebel airport in San Luis Potosi state yesterday, the government's press bureau announced, blasting and firing gasoline tanks and scattering the party guarding the field.

From Tampico came word that a swift plane swooped low over that port and let fall a shower of leaflets propagandizing the cause of General S. Cedillo, the rebel chieftain. Other developments included these and the other a military plane.

Loyalists Losses Estimated at 15,000 in Four Days

Hendaye, France, May 26.—(AP) Swift insurgent reinforcements of the Catalan front threatened today to halt the government's most ambitious offensive in five months.

Insurgent commanders, reporting Government losses estimated as high 15,000 men in four days, said Barcelona troops had abandoned their attack except at Tremp in the center of the 60 mile line.

Here, however, government communications listed two advance positions captured in yesterday's heavy fighting. These were a hermitage and a mountain overlooking the artificial lake and power plant which once supplied electricity to much of Catalonia's war industry.

Alicante, Spain, reports said mean time resources dug steadily in the ruins of Alicante's scattered market place, extricating victims of yesterday's most disastrous single air bombardment of the civil war.

At least 250 persons were killed and 10,000 injured when six huge insurgent bombing planes circled suddenly in the sky and dropped their missiles squarely in the market place where hundreds of women waited to buy food.

The thundering detonations toppled towering masonry into dugouts to which men women and children had crowded for refuge.

Many bodies were tangled and torn to bits.

Our monthly meetings have been most interesting, and have been featured by timely talks or entertainment by the student body. In connection with

this, we wish to extend our appreciation to Miss Davis of the Welfare Department who met with us in January and talked on "Seeing the World as the Child Sees It;" to Miss Naomi Newell of the college faculty who gave us a very complete account of the Book Fair held in New York City; to Miss Jessie Schnopp, of the high school Home Economics department, who was in our last meeting and outlined a vacation program for children; to the local chapter of U. D. C., for the picture of General Robert E. Lee presented our school; to our Mayor, Mr. Blount, who has been in some of our meetings, and to our Superintendent, Mr. Rose, who has ever given us his support and encouragement in our P. T. A. work. Also to the members of the West Greenville faculty, for their splendid cooperation in any project the P. T. A. has endeavored to undertake, and under whose supervision the student body has been able to present the splendid programs as entertainment features in our P. T. A. meetings.

The school is proud to acknowledge that the outstanding project undertaken for the term, is now complete and can be displayed in the way of a library, which would reflect credit on any school. Our welfare committee has rendered unusual service and through the co-operation of Mr. Rose has furnished milk for several months to fifteen children. The student body has also made their usual contribution to welfare purposes in connection with their annual Thanksgiving program. Through the recommendation of P. T. A. glasses have been fitted and supplied for needy cases.

While we have sponsored no definite feature for financial security, we have been supported by free-will offerings made at our regular meetings, and profits derived from magician and dog shows and photographic enterprises.

And now that we have reached the end of another term, we are not discouraged because we have no new auditorium, no new playground equipment and other things we have hoped for, and which are quite necessary. On the contrary, we are greatly encouraged by the fact that the adult population of our town seem to be more interested in child education than at any previous time, and we feel that if any group of adults become sufficiently interested, material equipment will follow; and feeling that we have possibly played a small part in creating this interest in the child-life of our vicinity, is a reward worthy of every effort we have contributed to thirteen years of active organized work.

Talk Of State Insurance On All School Buildings

Raleigh, May 26—Efforts to have the state take over the business of insuring North Carolina school buildings and school property are likely to be revived in the 1939 General Assembly, but even its most enthusiastic backers are not hopeful of success. State Senator Henry Ingram of Randolph, told this bureau's correspondent recently.

Senator Ingram sponsored such a measure in the 1937 Senate, but it was coldly received and never emerged from a committee. The Randolph law maker will not be back in 1939, under a rotation agreement, but he is hopeful another try will be made.

The contention of Senator Ingram and those who agree with him is that the state could save money and that it would be possible to have the state take over these profits.

He pointed out that the insurance companies are making big profits from the insuring of school property and that it would be possible to have the state take over these profits.

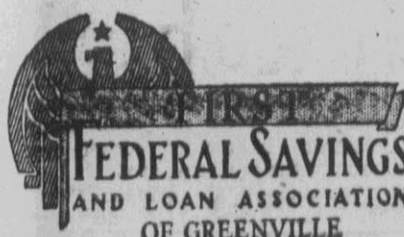

SEES ADVANCE IN HOG PRICES

Market Upturn Predicted by Late Summer Months

Raleigh, May 26—Currently weak hog prices may be strengthened by late summer when an upturn in the market is expected. H. W. Taylor, extension swine specialist at State College, declared today.

However, Taylor said, the advance, which is likely to accompany the usual reduction in late summer marketings, will be limited by the weak consumer demands for meats. Any further declines that may develop in hog prices before the late summer is expected to be only moderate. This expectation is based on the likelihood of only a small seasonal increase in early summer marketings, the small storage stocks of pork and lard now on hand, and the drop in prices since early March.

Farmers are raising a larger number of pigs this year than last, Taylor said. The pig crop this spring probably has been larger than the crop raised during the same period in 1937.

"In view of prospects for relatively large feed supplies," the swine specialist explained, "the present higher than average hog-corn price ratio and the current low level of hog production in many areas probably will cause the 1938 fall pig crop to be considerably higher than that of 1937."

The larger pig crops this year will mean more hogs for marketing next year than in the current year that closes September 30.

In 1937, North Carolina farmers grossed \$22,803,000 from the sale of hogs and hog products, an increase of \$4,000,000 over 1936.

Insists Winborne Has Cooperated In NC REA Program

Bagley Declares Utilities Commissioner Has Approved Every Project Authority Proposed

Raleigh, May 26—Utility Commissioner Stanley Winborne has co-operated fully and cordially in North Carolina's program of rural electrification which has resulted in building approximately 7,700 miles of line and extending electric service to approximately 42,000 customers since organization of the State Rural Electrification Authority in 1933, Dudley Bagley, State REA director said today.

"This authority received splendid and friendly co-operation from Commissioner Winborne at every stage," said Mr. Bagley. "He has been enthusiastically in favor of every step in our program designed to extend rural electrification in North Carolina on a safe and sound basis."

It is the duty of the Utility Commissioner to pass on all applications presented to him for the construction of rural lines, whether built by power companies or by co-operatives. Mr. Bagley said that Commissioner Winborne has given his approval to every project upon which he passed final judgment.

"He has approved every project this authority asked him to approve, and the only project ever considered by him and not approved was the Caldwell county co-operative," said the REA director.

"Even in this case the Commissioner did not decline to approve the project. The application of the

co-operative was withdrawn voluntarily by its sponsors before any final decision was reached," he added.

"With Commissioner Winborne's assistance and co-operation we have put North Carolina in the very forefront of progress in rural electrification. Figures show that this state has made far greater strides than any other Southern state and has been surpassed in total mileage added by only five states in the entire nation," said Mr. Bagley.

The REA director's statement was made as the result of recent charges by Winborne's primary opponent, Paul D. Grady, of Kenly, that the incumbent has been unfriendly to rural electrification. Mr. Grady in his Asheville speech said the commissioner "declined" to approve the Caldwell project.

CENSUS BUREAU REPORTS 20% DECREASE IN AUTO DEATHS

Automobile fatalities in 128 major cities during the first quarter of this year dropped 20% under the 1937 toll for the same period, according to reports made public by Director Wm. L. Austin of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Agriculture.

Deaths from motor vehicle accidents reported by the 128 cities during the first three months numbered 1,978 compared with 2,479 last year. Eleven of the reporting cities have not had a fatality this year caused by an accident within city limits. All but 34 of the cities report reduced fatalities or the same number as the corresponding 1937 period.

Washington Daybook

By Preston Grover

Washington—If you know a Civil war veteran sunning himself on the front porch, persuade him to take you on a 10-day or two-week vacation to Gettysburg—and the govern-ment will pay all expenses.

The offer is open not only to Union veterans but to Confederate veterans as well.

The offer may sound fantastic but a fact is a fact and here is the situation. July 1 to 3 is the 75th anniversary of the battle of Gettysburg, the so-called "highwater mark of the Confederacy." On that mem-orable occasion General Meade out-fought General Lee. (We are ac-cepting our school history on this. We have no dispute with Southern-ers who claim otherwise. And any-way, Meade did so poorly on the pursuit after the battle that even Lincoln had to chide him a bit).

As part of the celebration the government is inviting veterans of both sides to come to Gettysburg from June 29 to July 6. Each is to bring an attendant and the govern-ment provides railroad transportation for both, as well as \$6 a day each for expenses.

The Thinning Banks

A glance at statistics would indi-cate that it may be the last of the very few times Confederate and Union soldiers ever have mingled freely together. The army, which is charge of the party, estimates the average age of the veterans as 94 years. One of the provisions in the invitation is that if a veteran is taken ill on the road a doctor will be paid by the government for car-ting for him.

There are approximately 10,000 surviving veterans, North and South and the army expects 5,000 will at-tend. Any Civil war veteran is eli-gible, whether he served only a few hours in either army or years. To date less than 2,000 have accepted invitations.

Some of the veterans indicate they haven't cooled off much in the past 75 years. One Union veteran said he would come only if he was assured no Confederate flag would be flown.

One cocky old lad of 117 winters said he was chipper and eager and would bring his youngest son, 54, as attendant. His eldest son, 94, is too feeble.

Quiet Reigns There Now

Gettysburg is sacred ground, made so as much by Lincoln's historic speech as by the battle that marked the first real setback of the South-ern forces. At that time the Con-federates had swept far north of Washington and were invading Pennsylvania.

From a military standpoint Gettysburg was a beautiful place for a battle, with the opposing forces ranged on high ground facing each other across a valley that at one place was only a few yards across. The old soldiers who knew Gettysburg will find the place not greatly changed. Some trees have grown, and perhaps some bushes. A cathed-ral quiet about the place impresses even casual tourists.

So elderly are the surviving veter-ans that it seems likely some who come will not live to get back. The army has made preparations to send home those who died these many years after the battle.

Man About Manhattan

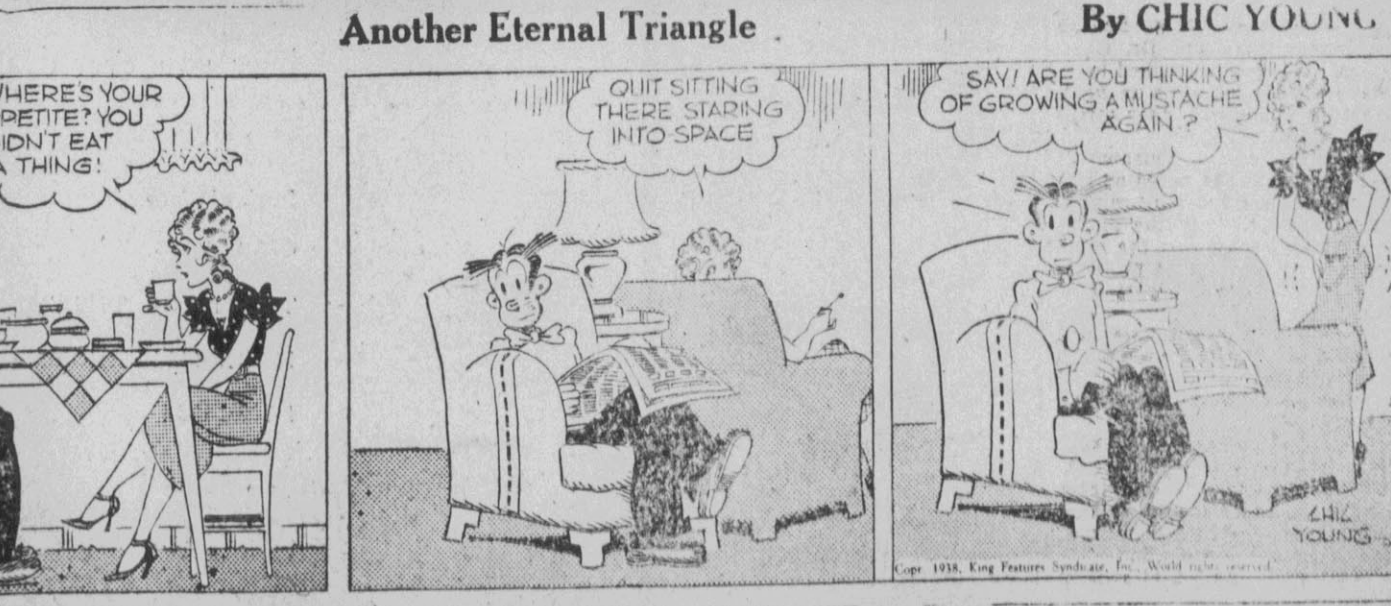

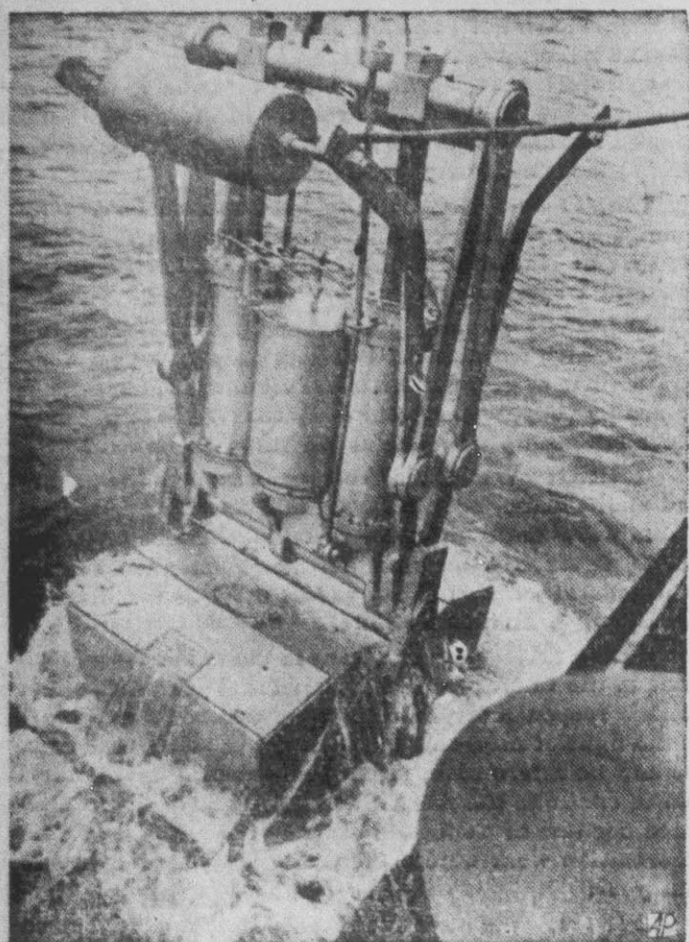

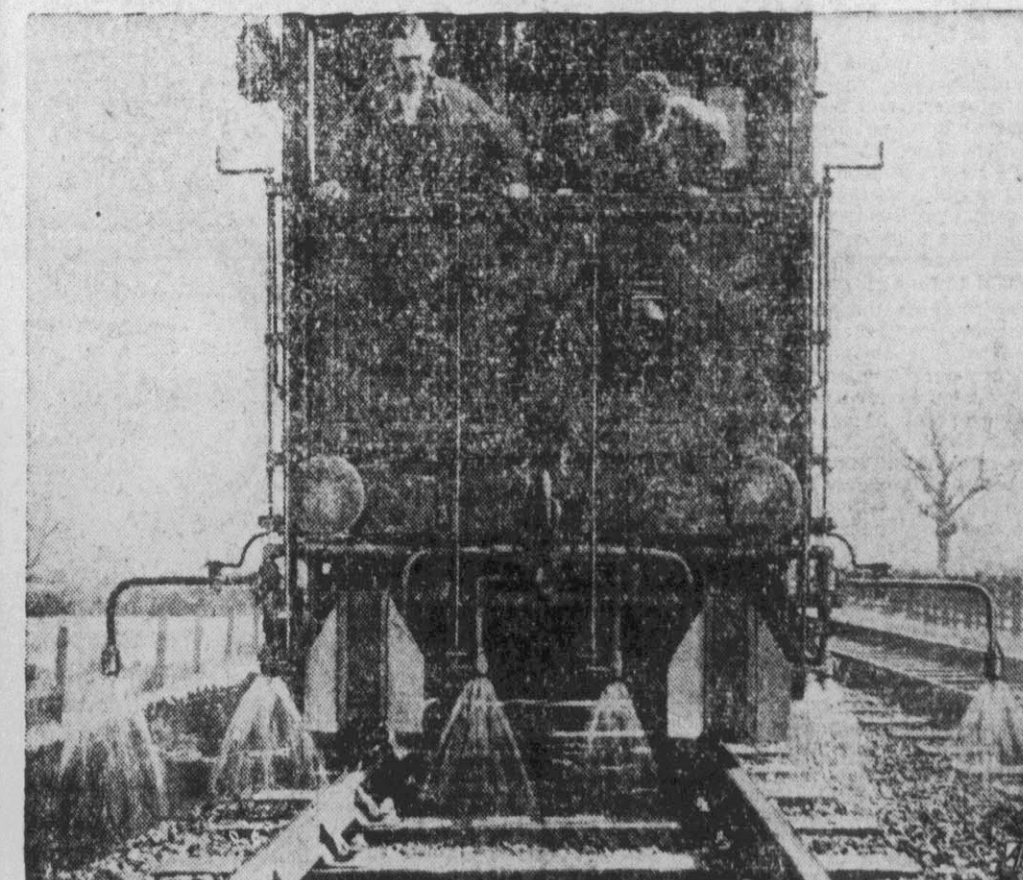

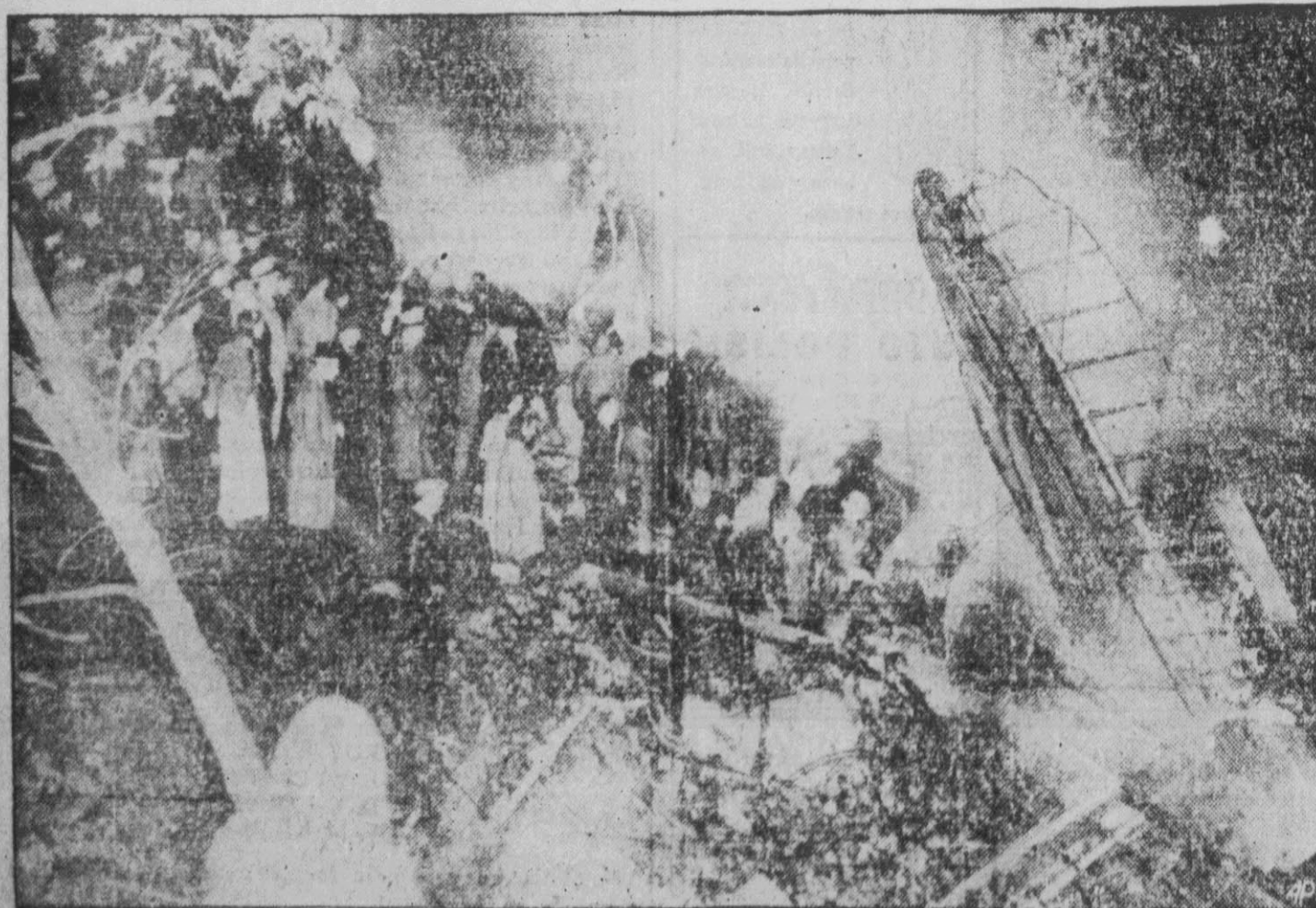

ROSS FAVORED IN TITLE BOUT

To Meet Armstrong In New York Garden Tonight

New York, May 26.—(AP)—The 15-round welter-weight championship fight between Champion Barney Ross and Henry Armstrong today was postponed until tomorrow night because of rain.

New York, May 26.—Two of the greatest fighting men, pound for pound that the ring has produced in at least a decade are primed to settle the first major argument of the 1938 outdoor season.

Unless bad weather beats them to the punch, Barry Ross and Henry Armstrong will give fistie fandom a much awaited thrill, over the fifteen round title distance in Madison Square Garden's big wooden saucer in Long Island City, tomorrow night. If it rains, as the official forecaster suspects the show will go on Friday night.

It theoretically an unprecedented "handicap match," with Ross defending the world's 147-pound, or welterweight, championship against the dusky whirlwind who holds the featherweight title, at 126 pounds, but actually the disparity in weight has been thoroughly minimized.

The agreement between the principals calls for Ross to make 142 pounds and for Armstrong to weigh no less than 136 on the official scales today at noon. When the pair finished light training yesterday, there was no indication either would have difficulty in tipping the beam "inside" the prescribed limitations.

Barney 7-5 Favorite.
Ross, confident, crafty, and apparently in first-class condition, rules the 7-to-5 choice to stop the winning streak of the Negro who has been blasting his way through the ~~best of the best~~ of the best. Notwithstanding some suspicion that he has passed his peak and isn't the dynamic fighter of the days of rivalry with Irish Jimmy McLarin in 1934-35, Ross has a flock of staunch backers. They figure the Chicagoan, ringwise and a sharp puncher, has the antidote for Armstrong's rushing windmill style of fast-throwing.

There's Another Side
They may be right, but there are just as many critics who doubt the ability of Ross to survive 15 rounds of the kind of punishment Homicide Henry usually administers. Armstrong figures to throw three or four punches to every one of his opponents'. The Negro's string of 37 consecutive victories, 35 of them by K. O., sounds more impressive than it actually is. But it emphasizes Armstrong's finishing ability, and can't be entirely discounted.

Ross may, as some of his handlers assert elect to stand and slug it out with the Negro, in which case it may not last long. It is more plausible to expect that Barney will exploit eagier tactics. Armstrong knows only one way to fight—move forward and keep punching. So, Barney should know what to expect. The big question is, whether he knows how to handle it.

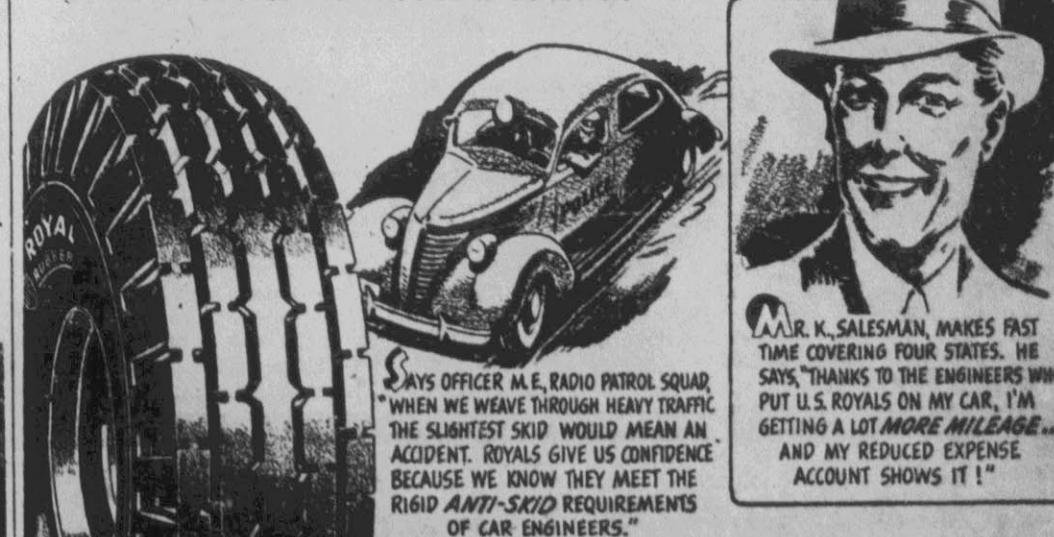

iciously false" and brought by the by the County Commissioners at the instance of the chairman of the A. B. C. Board, for the purpose of embarrassing him (sheriff) and discrediting him before the people of his county.

The first group of witnesses to take the stand were the children and other kin of the late Jesse Smith, whose testimony purported to show that prior to Smith's death in 1932 he had been one of the county's biggest bootleggers and that on several occasions he had paid the sheriff in money and whiskey for tips that Federal enforcement officers were preparing to make raids. Cross examination of these witnesses revealed that they had been visited by undercover agents and urged to testify in the case.

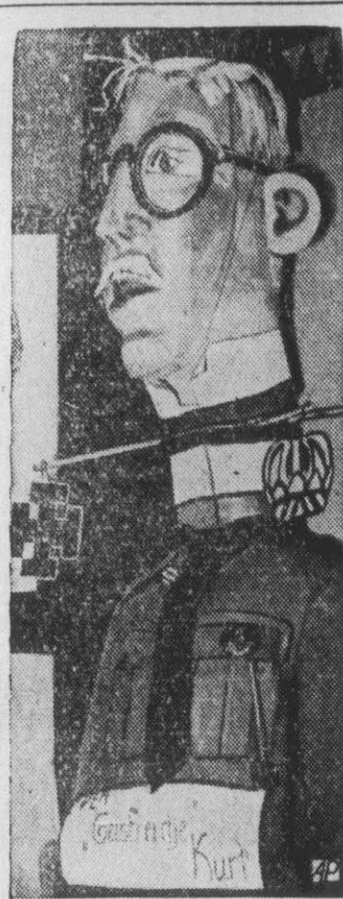
While the testimony of most of the group checked as to the transactions between Smith and the sheriff, cross examination revealed that in no instance could any of the witnesses attach a date nor the season of what year the transactions occurred. Cross examination also brought out that in the case of almost all the witnesses, transportation to Greenville had been provided and their expenses were being taken care of while they remained in the city for the purpose of testifying before the court.
