How's Your Health?

Edited for the New York Academy of Medicine

THE CLEANSING BATH Francis Bacon, fastidious chancellor to Queen Elizabeth, wrote in his "Advancement of Learning": "Cleanliness of body was ever deemed to proceed from a due reverence to God."

John Wesley paraphrased this into: "Cleanliness is indeed next to godliness."

It has been a commonplace thought to many generations. Body cleanliness was certainly a cardinal virtue among the Greeks and Romans. Perhaps Bacon's reaffirmation of the virtues of cleanliness can be explained by the neglect of this virtue in his day.

From the sober scientific view, body cleanliness—more strictly bathing—is more esthetically desirable than necessary as a health measure. Many men, and whole classes or groups of human beings, have been known to remain in good health even though they bathed but rarely.

Washing the hands before eating, and the cleanliness of food are, from the hygienic viewpoint, of superior value. This is not intended to condone the neglect of bathing, but rather to set a proper value upon it.

The cleansing bath is to be distinguished from the tub or shower taken for its heating or cooling effect. The aim of the cleansing bath is to clean the body. Hence it involves the use of warm or hot water, soap and the scrubbing brush or washcloth.

A good way is to soak the body in a tub for 5 to 15 minutes. This softens the horn top layers of the skin. Then soap the body all over, producing a good lather. A bath brush or washcloth (depending on how tough your skin is), may be used vigorously.

The combination of water, soap and vigorous rubbing serves to remove dirt, accumulated secretions and excretions of the skin, and also the about-to-be-discarded horny cells of the skin.

The cleansing bath should be finished with a shower. This is desirable because it washes away the soap and debris, the tub water having become mixed with soap and other elements.

Bath salts and perfumed or medicated soaps contribute nothing to the effectiveness of the cleansing bath. They may cater to one's esthetic sense, but are devoid of other values.

N. Y. Stock Market

New York, June 13.—(AP)—Stock market leaders turned in a losing performance today with industrials yielding fractions to around two points and a few volatile issues more.

As in the past several weeks, volume was conspicuous because of absence. Transfers were in the neighborhood of 350,000 shares, another one of the lowest full-day turnovers in about four years.

Board room analysts derived their principal consolation from the fact that important blocks of stocks refused to come out on the downside. It was recalled that what little activity has appeared in the last month or so has been in rallying periods.

About the only "good" news from the market standpoint was the likelihood Congress would pack up and go home within the next two or three days.

Man About Manhattan

New York—The manager of a downtown night club has hit on a novel plan for keeping his floor shows up to the minute. He is Benito Collada, and instead of bringing in a complete new show, as other night clubs do, he simply changes one act at a time. This gives El Chico a new dash, pep up the other artists on the bill, and permits patrons who frequent the place to have something new every time they drop in for late supper.

Collada is one of those off-to-far-places boys. Sometimes it is to Spain and sometimes it is to Cuba, the Argentine, or Mexico. But he always returns with a load of new talent. His Spanish revues are a melange of flamenco dancers, guitarists, clicking castanets, Latin comedy, and Spanish music.

The current show, under its present plan, requires about three months to change. Once about every three weeks a new star is imported, the latest one being Senorita Gloria Belmonte, Spanish dancer.
