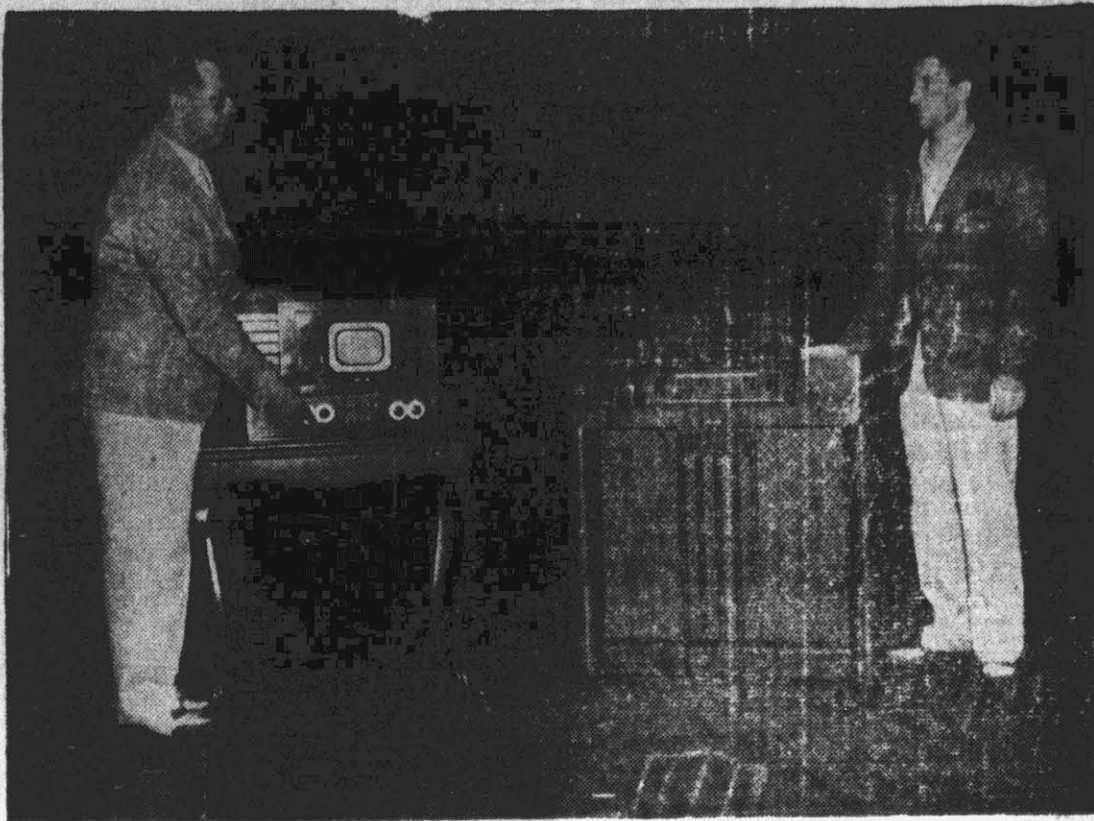
Condition Unchanged.

Christian Science Church.

TALC IS FOUND IN N. C. COUNTY

Seen As Factor In Rehabilitation of Swain

Raleigh, June 26.—Talc, one of North Carolina's too-much-neglected mineral resources, is likely to be a real factor in the rehabilitation of poorer counties such as Swain, if interest recently manifested in it, and other mineral products, is an indication that outside capital is seriously considering investments in the state.

State Geologist H. J. Bryson of the minerals resources division of the Department of Conservation and Development, said today that this interest is keener than ever before. Not only is talc attracting attention from capitalists, but pyrophyllite, scrap mica and several recently discovered deposits of lead and zinc ores are being viewed with appraising eyes, he added.

"The finest deposits of talc to be found in America are in Cherokee and Swain counties," Bryson said. "I was on some of these properties lately with some engineers for a large syndicate and they told me they had never seen anything like it in this country."

In addition to being in demand in the cosmetics industry, high-grade talc is used extensively in the textile and hosiery industry as a lubricant for precision machinery, especially for knitting machines. It is also being used in the ceramic industry as a filler for paints and in the automobile tire industry.

North Carolina pyrophyllite is also in great demand, since this state has the only large commercial deposits in the nation, Bryson said. It is being used more and more in refractory plastics, as well as in the manufacture of fine china, tile and glazed ware—also as a filler in the paint and paper industries.

MILK WITH GRASS ADDED IS NEW VITAMIN WRINKLE

Stillwater, Okla. — (AP) — It's green milk now for vitamins.

The latest in bovine refreshments doesn't come from the cow that way but the color is in grasses that are added.

The grasses are special cereal ones that are grown to an exact height, between six and eight inches, and are clipped just when the vitamin count is supposed to be the highest. They are refrigerated and then mixed with the milk.

The idea was explained by Professor R. B. Thompson of Oklahoma A. and M. College when grass green milk was displayed at the Oklahoma Poultry Improvement Association's convention by a butter firm.

SPENCE SHOWS BEARS A TRICK

Gracie Allen Hits for Circuit With One Aboard

Doe Smith's New Bern Bears used four hurlers and a ninth-inning pinch hitter in an effort to overcome Greenville's lead, but Rube Wilson's proteges wouldn't relinquish their decided advantage and came out on the big end of a 14-8 count.

With so many runs crossing the plate, the game lasted much longer than a game does ordinarily under the regulation distance. Last night's game lasted 151 minutes—two hours, thirty-one minutes to be exact. As the fans walked sleepy-eyed from the ball park, they were convinced that they'd really seen a night of baseball.

New Bern will tangle with Rube Wilson's Greenies here tonight at the Guy Smith stadium. Two other games are also on top this week between the Greenies and the Bears. The Bears play the locals at New Bern on Friday night, and will furnish the opposition in a game here Saturday night, which is "Colored Night" in Greenville.

Greenville started its scoring spree last night with a four-run party in the second inning. When the New Bern players went to bat in this inning they matched two of the locals' men. In the third the Bears staged a five-run party, giving them a 7-4 lead over the locals. Beards was yanked with one out in the third inning and Lefty Lightning Spence took over the hurling duties.

The most thrilling blow of the game came when the fourth inning rolled around. Gracie Allen produced the thriller by hitting for the circuit with one aboard. At least, this was the most thrilling blow for Greenville. The Bruins produced four homers.

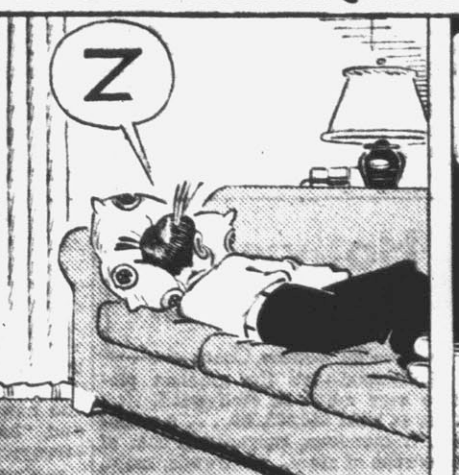
