

Rube Wilson's Left Arm Still Good For Master Pitching

GOOBERS LOSE 8-1 TO LOCALS

Harry Jenkins Hits Another Home Run At Tarboro

Manager Rube Wilson let the spikes on his baseball shoes sink into the moist red soil on the Tarboro mound last night, tightened the muscles of his powerful left arm, and showed his pitching staff something about hurling.

Greenville's skipper clamped down on the Tarboro cellarites and when rain intervened after six innings of play, he had hurled five-hit ball, which produced only one run, while his colleagues had garnered 10 hits and piled up an eight-run advantage.

Rain thwarted a baseball game between the Greenies and Goobers yesterday afternoon, which was supposed to have been the first phase of an afternoon and night double-header.

Greenville was held scoreless for three innings and Tarboro opened with its only run when the game had reached the three-way stage. Then, a two-run party in the fifth and a six-run affair in the sixth was too much for the Goobers.

Allen, Christopher, McCall and Vincent Smith got two hits apiece in Greenville's attack, but Harry Jenkins' homer was the longest blow of the entire game. Peahead Leftman, now used in left field by the Goobers, got two hits in three official turns to pace the losers.

New Bern will play Greenville here tomorrow night in what will be known as "East Carolina Teachers College Night," at which faculty members and students will be guests of the Greenville baseball club. The game will start promptly at 8 o'clock.

One of the biggest boosters of the Greenville tobacco market is the Greenville Kiwanis Club, of which D. C. Moore, Jr., well known in the city's civic life, is president. The

Represented in the Kiwanis Club are persons in practically every branch of business in Greenville. Its members are selected on the basis of civic-mindedness and interest in civic welfare.

Public affairs and activities of the Greenville Kiwanis Club include rendering additional service through support of churches; co-operation in law observance and enforcement; increased assistance in public safety movements; presentation of non-partisan information on public problems; maintenance of the international good-will existing between Canada and the United States, and promotion of cultural and recreational life of leisure.

Objectives of the Greenville club, like those of similar organizations, are: Service to the underprivileged children; vocational guidance; boys and girls work; friendly understanding among all citizens, rural and urban, and intelligent, aggressive and serviceable citizenship.

The Greenville Kiwanis Club was organized in 1921 and a charter was granted October 14 of the same year. Ed Batchelor, J. Frank Harrington, B. W. Moseley, W. E. Hooker and W. H. Woolard are active charter members.

Meetings of the local club are held on alternate Friday night. Two of the biggest events each year are Teachers' Night and Ladies' Night. On Teachers' Night, all teachers of the city school system are entertained. Wives of the Kiwanians are entertained on Ladies' Night.

ROTARY ASSET IN CITY'S LIFE

Only Such Club in the World Owning Its Building

Dr. Carl L. Adams, faculty member at East Carolina Teachers College, is president of the Greenville Rotary Club, which is the only such club in the world owning its own building.

S. G. Wilkerson is vice president and John Proctor, secretary, of the organization, which also offers its club building for other community activities.

Birth of the Rotary Club in Greenville occurred on the night of September 8, 1919, when 22 men assembled in what was then known as the old Farmers Bank Building. At this meeting, C. J. Ellen was elected president and Alex. Blow, secretary-treasurer. These officers set a pace that is still followed by Rotarians today.

Charter for the club was presented on the night of December 16, 1919. The home of the Greenville Rotary Club was dedicated March 21, 1921. Represented at the dedication exercises were Rotarians of Norfolk, Newport News, Portsmouth, Wilson, Goldsboro, New Bern, Kinston, Washington and Raleigh.

When the first Rotary Club was founded, it not only enabled persons to get acquainted with one another, but was also a channel through which thoughtfulness and helpfulness toward each other could be developed. Membership of the Rotary Club was formed on a unique

plan in that an effort was made to have each business and profession in a community represented.

From a small beginning 33 years ago, Rotary has grown to an approximate membership of 171,000 members in 4,004 cities and towns in 75 countries. Started in Chicago, February 23, 1905, by 1010 clubs have been organized with about 1,800 members. It was during this year that the national association was formed.

As evidence of the Rotary spirit existing in Greenville, the membership of the local club has grown to over 30 members. The Greenville Rotary Club organized Rotary clubs in Farmville in 1922, and Ayden in 1924. The official attendance record of both these clubs over a period of several years bespeaks their interest in the great field of Rotary activities.

At all times, members of the Rotary Club make a special effort to advance those ideals that will tend to better the community, of which they are a part. During the embryonic growth of the Rotary Club, an effort was made to have practically every business and professional interest represented. This holds true with the Greenville club.

Rotary's great program has been very firmly lodged in the hearts of the members of the Greenville Rotary Club, and they are still thirsting for services that will enlarge their vision of community needs. When one seeks an explanation for the history of this club he cannot but feel that the entire membership on through these years has practiced that great motto, "Service Above Self."

Man About Manhattan

New York — There is a drug store at 58th and Sixth avenue with a quite satisfactory lunch counter, and frequently I drop in there for a bite when I don't want to take out time for a full meal. The people you see in there are not distinguished. There is nothing wrong with them. They are neither better nor worse dressed than the average crowd collected around the average lunch counter in New York. Next to a bellhop from a nearby hotel may be a grocer's clerk, or a shoe salesman. Next to me the morning may be a scrub-woman, whom I never even realized was there until she spoke.

She said to the clerk back of the counter, "I want a cold roast beef sandwich and a bottle of milk, to go."

If I ever heard a more cultured voice I cannot remember where. When she said this every person at the counter automatically lifted his head and looked at her. The smooth, easy way the words came from her was unbelievable. She spoke again in a few moments when the clerk asked her the usual questions—do you want mustard with this? ... do you want pickle? ... and all of us hung on every word, because she herself was a drudge, her hands knobby and red from years of hard, back-breaking labor.

After she had gone out and after the others were on their way I asked the clerk, whose name is Tommy and who is from Iowa, who she was.

Her name is Mary. She has been a drudge all her life. She can't remember when she wasn't crawling around on her knees scrubbing floors for people. Her mother before her was a drudge, and her grandmother. Her grandmother's name was Mary, for whom she was named.

Mary says her people came to America, as servants, during the Revolution of 1776. Since that time the women of the family have always been servants. She can't remember her father. She remembers a glamorous two weeks she once spent in the White Mountains, just before she was old enough to go to work herself. Her mother was working for some people from New York, and they permitted her to bring Mary along for the last two weeks of her stay there.

That is the only vacation she has ever had. When she was 18 she was married, and when she was 20 she was widowed—her man lost his life in a boiler explosion on a ship before he ever got to France. Their daughter now is 22 years old. She herself is a mother and a widow, and she works for a family in Albany, New York.

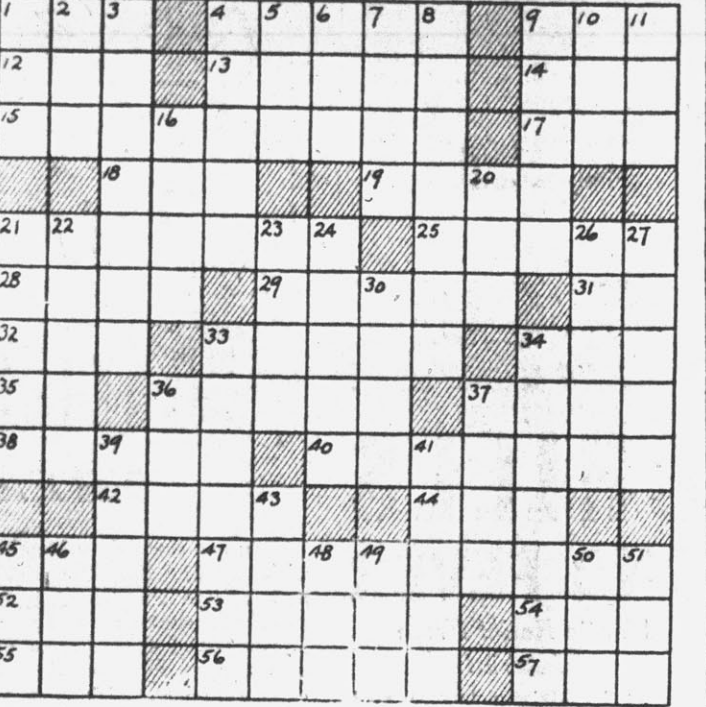
