BAILEY WOULD SANCTION SALE OF U. S. SHIPS

Would Help Problem Created by Neutrality Act

OLDER VESSELS WOULD BE SOLD

Increasing Demand is Seen for Merchant Marine Because of Large Number of Vessels Sunk

Washington, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Chairman Bailey (D.-N.C.) of the Senate Commerce committee, disclosed today that foreign purchases of a portion of the American merchant marine may help solve the problem created by the laying up of American ships under the neutrality act.

Bailey said he could see no objection to the sale to shipping interests in Canada and other nations of the older vessels which have been made idle by the ban on the American ships entering war zones in European waters. He explained he was informed that a number of such offers had been received by ship owners.

"Because of the sinkings that have been taking place in sea warfare there is going to be an increased demand for tonnage," Bailey said. "I think we have a good chance because of this demand to get rid of some of the old ships which the government soon would have had to take in anyway under the terms of the merchant marine act."

Bailey said he thought that possibly 50 of the 88 American flagships affected by the neutrality act were in this latter classification. In addition to sales, Bailey said it might be possible to transfer the registry of non-subsidized ships to other nations where such transfers would not be inimical to the interests of the United States.

Six Are Tried At Afternoon Session

Broughton Announcement Sets Politics Humming

Reflector Bureau. Raleigh, Dec. 13.—The governor's primary of 1940 is now a contest. Formal announcement of James Melville Broughton of Raleigh into the race made two declared and unashamed aspirants. Lieutenant Governor Wilkins P. Horton was first in the lists.

There was no element of surprise whatever in the Broughton broadside except its exact timing. Hereabout it had rather been expected that he would wait until after Santa had made his Christmas rounds, with an announcement on, say New Year's day, or perhaps even the day after Christmas. But as early as yesterday morning it began to be whispered around that he was about to come out in the open.

Finnish Agency Circulates Report that Soviet Union, Irked by Stubborn Resistance, Massing Array of Manpower Nearly Equal to Male Population of Finland

Helsinki, Dec. 13.—(AP)—The Finnish Telegraph agency circulated a report today that Soviet Russia—irked by Finland's persistence—is massing 1,500,000 first-line soldiers for a crushing blow.

This array of manpower—nearly equal to the male population of Finland and perhaps double the number of men now engaged in both sides of the war—would be supported by 1,000 planes, the agency said. The major thrust, according to the agency, is expected in the Karelian Isthmus, where Finns entrenched in the line of fortifications called the Mannerheim line, have fought off Red invaders since the war started 14 days ago.

DAVIES CALLS FOR 3RD TERM

League Group Implies Demand For Expulsion Of Russia From League

Report Adopted after Hours of Wrangling During Which Argentina Threatened to Resign if Soviet Union Remained in League; Members Invited to Aid Finland

Geneva, Dec. 13.—(AP) A 13-nation committee of the League of Nations today adopted a resolution condemning Russia as an aggressor and containing an implied demand that Russia be ousted from the League for invading Finland.

The resolution, which was then submitted to the League assembly which may act on it tonight, incorporated a report drawn up by a subcommittee "inviting" League members to give Finland all possible aid.

The report adopted by the subcommittee after hours of wrangling named Russia an aggressor for her invasion of Finland and "invited" all League members to give Finland all possible aid.

In addition, it suggested that non-member nations, such as the United States, might be asked to join in helping Finland if the League of Nations council desires.

700 BELIEVED LOST IN WRECK OF SOVIET SHIP

Steamer Aground During Blizzard off Jap Island

395 SURVIVORS SAFELY RESCUED

Rest of Crew and Passengers Numbering 1,100 Feared to have Been Drowned or Frozen

Wakkanai, Japan, Dec. 13.—(AP)—More than seven hundred Russians, including women and children, were missing today and believed drowned or frozen to death in the wreck of the Russian steamer Indigirka on the treacherous coast of Hokkaido, Japanese island.

A Japanese ship arrived here with 395 survivors from the crowded Russian fishing service vessel which went aground in a blizzard yesterday on the east coast of Hokkaido.

Survivors, most of whom were suffering from exposure said the ship carried 1,100 persons, including fishermen, their wives and children and a crew of 30.

## College Issues Bulletins.

The two latest issues of the East Carolina Teachers College Bulletin, one just out and one in the late summer, are special numbers—the first being a booklet entitled "The Training School" and the second, one called "The Equipment of the Teacher."

The December number shows the nature of the work in the practice school done by students planning to teach in the elementary grades, suggests the trend toward the use of the laboratory method in the field of teacher training, and indicates the relationship of the training school to "the pupil, the practicing teacher, the college, and the community."

It has a section defining the training school, one explaining the curriculum, one describing the methods used to foster the growth of its children as wholesome individuals and worthy members of a continually expanding society, and one each on the relation of the school to other parts of the college and to other schools.

Charts, drawn by Dr. Dorothy Schyder, of the College Art Faculty last year, and a number of snapshots help present the work being done.

This bulletin was prepared by members of the E. C. T. C. Training school staff.

The bulletin "Equipment of the Teacher" was prepared under the direction of the Publications Committee and is composed of articles by members of the college faculty.

## MARKET SETS NEW RECORD

With the selling season of the Greenville tobacco market now approaching the close, the market has set a new high poundage record which may reach 80 million pounds before the final day's sales next Wednesday. This will be nearly nine million pounds more than has ever been handled on the local market in a single selling season, and taking into consideration the difficulties under which the market operated this season, we feel that congratulations are due all those connected with the market for the manner in which the unusually heavy offerings have been handled.

The market got under way during the last days of August only to take a holiday when the British buying companies withdrew on September 8. The market did not re-open until October 10 and from then on it was just one series of blocked sales after the other until Thanksgiving, when sales began to taper off. All this rush naturally taxed warehouses and factories far beyond their capacities and they did a good job to take care of the situation as well as they did, but there is one man who during that time had more than a man-sized job, and we feel that he is entitled to congratulations for the manner in which he looked after his job, and that man is Bob Rankin, sales supervisor, who had as his assistant Charles Cobb. With a long series of blocked sales the season's official sales card was all but worthless, and it was up to Mr. Rankin and his assistant to see that things kept moving in order that new sales schedules might be worked out from day to day. Working under such conditions and at the same time keeping warehouse operators and patrons of the market as satisfied as possible was certainly a task that required long hours and hard work, and we repeat, Mr. Rankin and Mr. Cobb did this job well.

### BROUGHTON ANNOUNCEMENT SETS POLITICS HUMMING

Taxes: "Taxes in North Carolina are as high as the people can stand. The effort should be toward reduction and not increase."

Sales Tax: "has been a source of much controversy. Even if it should for the present be deemed a necessity, there is the very general hope that it may ultimately be eliminated from our tax system. Exemption—should be continued; and, if possible, extended to all food for home consumption."

Education: "I believe that normal increase in revenues, together with certain economies that can be effected, will enable the next General Assembly to increase teachers' salaries as well as to set up a just and adequate teacher-retirement system."

Highway: "Every dollar of highway funds is needed for highway and road maintenance and construction. Our revenue situation is such that no diversion of highway funds will be likely made during the current biennium. This is gratifying, and such policy should be continued in the future."

Conservation: "Receipts from fishing and hunting licenses should be wholly used for propagation of fish and game—the work of the department of Conservation and Development) should not be restricted."

Agriculture: "Effective aid to the farmer in his marketing problem can be tremendously increased if the marketing bill pending before Congress is passed.—North Carolina farmers must of necessity plan for further diversification."

Crime and Law Enforcement: "We do not enjoy an enviable reputation in respect to crime statistics. These conditions must be improved. Fundamentally we must seek to remove those conditions which tend to breed and foment crime."

Labor: "Neither labor nor capital is proposing in this state any radical program.—We will attempt by legislation, negotiation and arbitration to settle all labor differences in the North Carolina spirit of cooperation and fairness."

Industry: "There is and should be no antagonism between the state and its industries. The relationship is one of mutual cooperation and understanding."  
No factional alliances: "In my campaign I will make no alliances based on any gubernatorial or other campaigns in the past. Nothing could be more unfortunate in my opinion than to perpetuate any such group or factional lines or differences. Our present governor is to be commended for his efforts to harmonize differences within the party. I have not made in connection with

my campaign and will not make commitment with respect to the future candidacy of any person for any state office. Furthermore, if I am elected, I will leave to the people the choice of my successor and will not try to control or influence such choice."

It has been conceded on all sides that his is one of the most formidable candidacies in prospect, and the vigor of his announcement indicates that he is going to live up to all advance notices.

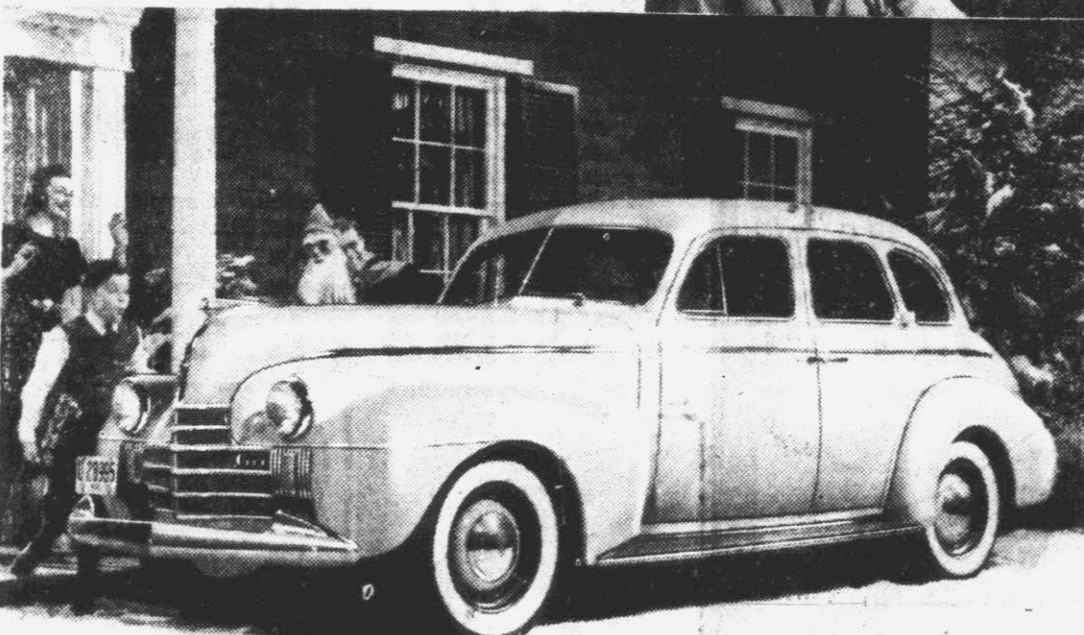
