## EMBARKS UPON TROUBLED SEA

Revenue Department Faced With Oil Truck Rules

Raleigh, Dec. 16.—Commissioner of Revenue A. J. Maxwell, and his Department in particular the Highway Safety Division and the Highway Patrol, have now fairly embarked upon an uncharted and troubled sea as effective date has arrived for enforcing all the rules and regulations recently laid down for trucks and vehicles transporting gasoline and other combustibles on the roads.

In the main truck owners and operators, big and small, have agreed to go along with the Commissioner as far as possible. They do not like the rules; but they have been forced to make a choice between the devil of possible legislative restrictions or prohibitions and the witch of departmental interference. They have chosen the witch, and it now remains only to be seen just how much safety is promoted by the rules and their administration.

The operators are not greatly displeased with requirements for inspections—practically all make them for their own protection; and they can even be brought around to the speed limit of 35 miles an hour; although they think this is more of a nuisance than an aid to safety.

But the real rub comes in the requirements regarding the hours truck drivers can work. And here, too, is where the Department has thrust itself into a twilight zone of regulation where nobody knows anything about who has the power to do what, if anything.

Maxwell has sought the assistance of Commissioner of Labor Shuford and the Shuford department—and he gets as far as the laws and the Shuford interpretations of the laws permit; but nobody yet has been able to come out and say just what the Shuford powers are.

Commissioner of Labor Shuford is positive about one thing—the Maxwell regulations have neither increased nor diminished his powers and duties by even an infinitesimal amount.

"The powers of the Labor Department has not been increased a bit by the Department of Revenue's regulations," said Mr. Shuford. "We can do exactly the same things now as before the regulations and no more. They haven't changed a thing."

Enactment of the regulations, however, has called the Labor department's attention to the fact that it has certain powers and duties it never before thought of. The Shuford forces have in the past concerned themselves only with industrial concerns who operated trucks on the roads. Now the Labor Commissioner has become acutely conscious that whatever trucks are operated in North Carolina and the drivers thereof are subject to the state's 55-hour per week law unless they fall into one of three categories: (1) They are subject to regulations of the Interstate Commerce Commission; (2) they are subject to the State Utilities commission; or (3) their operators do not employ as many as eight persons.

The big difficulty is that nobody knows which trucks are subject to the I. C. C.; though the gasoline transport people say there has been federal court ruling that their trucks are not engaged in interstate commerce when hauling gasoline from storage tanks to points within the state.

It's all very confusing and will take more than Philadelphia lawyer to work out.

## Graveley's Announcement Is Expected This Week

Raleigh, Dec. 18.—The announcement of Lee Graveley, Rocky Mount's most prominent member of the "I Want to Be Governor" club, is anticipated this week.

Dr. Clarence Poe, editor of the Progressive Farmer, and something of a parvenue in the circle of the suspected candidates, will issue a final declaration of intentions about New Year's Day and all indications now are that he will say "Yes."

Wilmington's Mayor Thomas E. Cooper is likely to come through with a characteristically tart and colorful statement along about the same time there's hardly a doubt of the fact that he'll remove the last lingering suspicions of his intentions.

Commissioner of Revenue A. J. Maxwell will wait until after Santa Claus has gone and "after the holidays" will get into the scramble.

Raleigh's Willis Smith has said on at least two occasions that he will announce "about January 15"; but there is some doubt that he can hold off that long, if he is really going to run.

With David Livingstone Ward of New Bern (you probably know him as Libby), somewhere just outside the group picture and ready at a minutes notice to step into it. His face is washed, his shoes shined and his hair brushed so that he will cut the proper figure in it when and if he does.

After all that's been said and done the entries will probably be closed; with all or most of the above gentlemen, together with J. Melville Broughton and Lieutenant Governor Wilkins P. Horton, both already formally declared, running for the top Tar Heel place.

Whereupon Governor Clyde R. Hoey will issue a general "Bless you, my children!" and may the best man win.

None of this is news of a character calculated to take one's breath away by its startling nature—it's just a rather cursory and casual recapitulation of what the Democratic gubernatorial field looks like as the week before Christmas opens.

On the very first item—the Graveley announcement—your correspondent could be wrong; because Rocky Mount Lee has been backing and filling like a kid sitting on the bank of a creek, ready to go swimming but finding the water just a bit too cold every time he sticks a toe in. Graveley's coming out party was once practically definitely set for December 6th and here it is already almost two weeks beyond that date.

As for Poe, it could be that the well known farmer and expert on the ways of agriculture will wind up right where he started; but the chances now appear at least ten to one that he is going to run for governor. Anybody who has systematically read North Carolina's papers for the last few weeks can testify that the proposal to run Poe has received more favorable editorial comment than any other candidate so far projected. And that's not considering the Letters to the Editor in praise of Poe—they could easily be synthetically manufactured evidence of popularity; but endorsements by the editorial writers are free from any such suspicions; and there have been many of these favorable to the Progressive Farmer's big shot.

So it now appears that the real starting gun of the campaign will set at least half a dozen, perhaps more, good Democrats off on the gubernatorial quest. It also appears there will be no "Crown Prince" from the ruling dynasty.

That being so, what a mad, confusing scramble it should be!

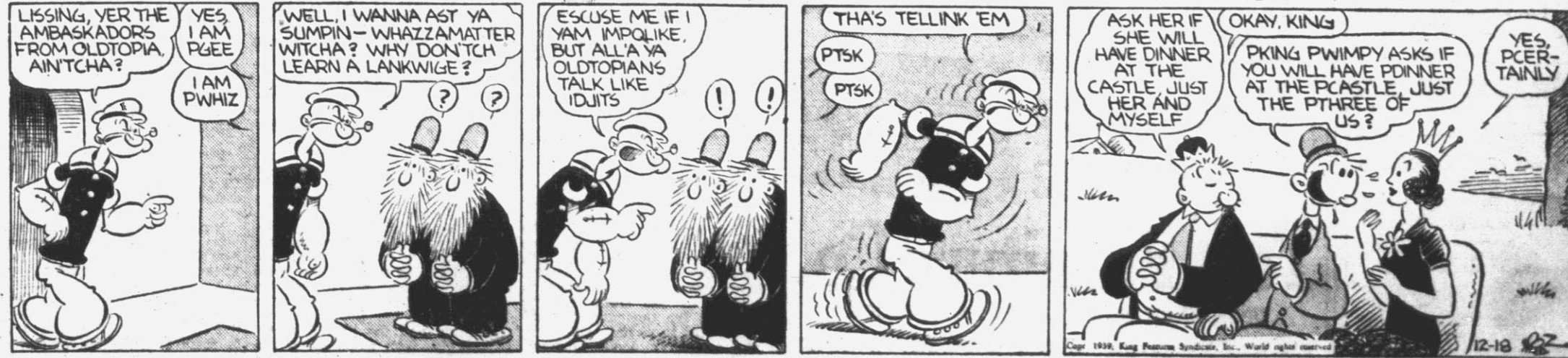
