HOUSE PASSES BILL CARRYING FUND FOR NAVY

Adopts \$52,500,000 Deficiency Bill Without Debate

SLICE MADE IN BUDGET FIGURES

Appropriation For Dies Committee Is Made Without Debate; Grange And Farm Bureau Disagree

Washington, Jan. 25.—(AP)—The House passed with little debate today a \$52,502,600 deficiency appropriation to provide money for naval armaments and for Internal Revenue bureau tax refunds.

The measure was shoved through ahead of the \$1,032,000,000 Treasury-Post Office bill, which the House started debating yesterday, because appropriations committee members said the money was needed immediately.

The bill, passed on a voice vote, contains \$29,000,000 for armor and armor plates for the navy and \$29,300,000 for the Internal Revenue bureau to make refunds on tax collections during the current year.

Immediately after the deficiency measure was passed, the House resumed consideration of the Treasury-Post Office bill, on which a vote late today was possible.

The deficiency bill represented a \$1,882,400 cut in President Roosevelt's budget estimates.

No attempt was made on the floor to write into the deficiency measure a Department of Agriculture request for an additional \$1,400,000 for subsidizing cotton exports.

Without debate, the House approved a \$75,000 appropriation to continue the Dies committee investigation of un-American activities another year.

The President of the Farm Bureau Federation, Edward A. O'Neal, told the House Ways and Means committee that the reciprocal trade program had resulted in no "measurable injury" to farmers. His argument ran squarely into that of L. J. Taber, master of the National Grange, who condemned the program as "international altruism," hurtful to American agriculture.

Negro Tried Here On Murder Charge

Tommy Morgan, Negro, went on trial in Superior court here this morning for the slaying of Nathan Jordan and indications are that it will take a good part of tomorrow morning to complete the case. The state completed the presentation of its evidence just before the lunch recess.

It was the second time the case has been tried, a mistrial having resulted the first time when a jury was unable to agree.

The state charges that Morgan killed Jordan at a filling station dance hall more than a year ago.

Louise Whichard, local Negro woman, was convicted of having illegal liquor in her possession and was given a three-month sentence. The court also ordered the defendant to serve a six months suspended upon condition the defendant not violate any laws for five years. The sentences are to run consecutively.

Richard Ross, colored, pleaded guilty to assault on a female with intent to commit rape and was given a term of from seven to 10 years.

Provides Anomalous Aftermath to Lewis' Statement

Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Forty-seven resolutions supporting a third term for President Roosevelt were introduced today before the United Mine Workers of America convention providing an anomalous aftermath to John L. Lewis' split with the New Deal.

No immediate action was taken by the 2,000 delegates on the resolutions from locals in Ohio, West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Pennsylvania, Alabama, Wyoming and Maryland.

Several resolutions were offered opposing use of United Mine Workers funds for political campaigns. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers and Congress for Industrial Organization, put up about \$500,000 for the 1936 Democratic campaign.

A hope that Lewis "some day would be president of the United States" was expressed in another resolution. The delegates, taking up several hundred of 1,800 resolutions submitted before the session opened, adopted one opposing continuation. (Continued on page six)

The public is invited to visit the telephone office next Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday between the hours of 2 p. m. and 4 p. m. and 7 p. m. and 9 p. m. In addition to the new automatic dial switchboard, the new and most modern long distance switchboard, cable vaults and other telephone equipment regularly in use in this office, the company is bringing some special equipment and displays just for the occasion. There will be a dial demonstration unit which shows in a simple and compact way just how dial calls are handled and just what takes place on each step of these calls as you dial the number. Concentrated Drive Northeast Lake Ladoga Declared To Have Been Repulsed By Finns; British Delegation Declares Help Reaching Finland in Greater Measure Than Believed

Helsinki, Jan. 25.—(AP)—All day and all night Russian attacks concentrated northeast of Lake Ladoga, where the Red army had tried to outflank Karelian isthmus defenses, were repulsed with severe losses to the invaders, the Finnish communiqué reported today.

The Finns described success on all fronts as the leader of a visiting British labor delegation, Sir Walter Citrine, declared help was reaching Finland from Britain in greater measure than commonly believed. Northeast of Lake Ladoga particularly heavy fighting took place near Aittokki last yesterday, the Finns said, resulting in "heavy losses for the enemy."

The Soviet sources "again lost several hundred killed" by the time the attacks were turned back this morning, the Finnish communiqué said, reporting additional success in repulsing enemy thrusts in the far north.

Russian pounding against Finnish defense lines near Kollanajoki "continued at intervals throughout the night," the communiqué said, asserting that three Soviet tanks were destroyed on this front.

On the central front a Soviet blow was ward off and two similar attacks repulsed in the far northern region, where two more tanks were destroyed, the Finns declared.

N. C. HIGHWAYS ARE STILL ICY

Highway Engineer Warns Motorists to Be Careful

Raleigh, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Most of North Carolina's highways had slippery icy coatings early today, Chief Highway Engineer W. Vance Baise warned and extremely dangerous icy spots probably will be found again tonight on highways nearly clear of snow.

Baise said he estimated as a rough guess that Tuesday's state-wide storm had done damage of around \$2,000,000 to highways.

Around 12,000 highway workers, including convicts, labored throughout the day yesterday clearing main roads of snow and sleet, breaking up icy coatings when possible and sanding ice-covered curves, bridges and steep hills where machinery would not remove the bage.

Early this morning the work was resumed and Baise said all main highways were open so far as he knew, except those in Caswell county, where the snow was 30 inches deep and route 107 into the Great Smoky Mountains National Park where there were 24 inches of snow. Word from Virginia was that all main north-south highways were open for travel, "but in extremely dangerous condition."

Baise emphasized that it was impossible to place too much stress on the need for careful driving tonight and early tomorrow.

Local Sea Scouts Take First Place

The members of the Sea Scout Ship No. 2, William Pitt of Greenville, won the honor of being selected the Flag Ship of the East Carolina Council by earning a total of 2,179 points during the past year. The presentation was made to First Mate Sam Dees at the annual meeting of the council held in New Bern. This is the first time that the Sea Scout Ship in East Carolina has been chosen to carry the flag.

The honor entitles the Sea Scouts to take part in the competition for the Regional Flag Ship which covers the four states of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Florida.

OPERATION OF BOARD FLAYED BY AFL CHIEF

Green Assails Administration of Labor Agency

FUNDAMENT'L OF BOARD DEFENDED

Recalls That He Had Described Act as Labor's 'Magna Charta' at Previous Hearings

Washington, Jan. 25.—(AP)—President William Green of the American Federation of Labor accused the Labor board today of "maladministration, bias and applying its own peculiar philosophy."

Appearing before the special house committee investigating the agency, Green asserted: "The American Federation of Labor comes here as a friend and defender of the National Labor Relations act. Our protests are against its administration."

The AFL leader recalled that he described the act as labor's "magna charta" when it was first approved by Congress and said his organization maintained that view now.

"We seek to zealously guard and defend its fundamental provisions," he said.

When he reminded the committee that he previously had testified before both Senate and House Labor committees in favor of a series of amendments, Chairman Smith (D-Va.) asked whether the AFL supported these proposed amendments now.

"We still stand by them," he replied. "We hope they will be favorably acted upon by Congress."

He promised to detail a number of the board's decisions which he said would establish the "bias" of the board.

NEED ENGINES FOR AIRPLANES

Morgenthau Cites Need of Increased Production

Washington, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Secretary Morgenthau said today that the nation's airplane engine production must be increased to meet the potential demand by the army, navy and civil domestic services and by foreign countries.

Morgenthau said that "engine production isn't big enough to take care of the demand."

"I know American airplane manufacturers could handle a little more orders if they could get the engines," he added.

Saying that the potential bottleneck orders but might interfere with future orders, Morgenthau reported that "everybody" was studying means of expanding production.

Need for more engines, he explained, was one of the principal reasons why he and other officials were visiting airplane and engine factories.

A new cold wave besieged the benumbed nation today and no immediate relief was in prospect.

The middle west and Rocky Mountain regions again suffered the brunt of the frigid weather, but few spots on the continent escaped the arctic chill.

Sub-zero temperatures prevailed early today in Iowa, the Dakotas, Indiana, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Minnesota, Missouri and Illinois.

Fresh snow swirled across some eastern states which still felt the paralyzing effect of the season's worst snow storm yesterday.

Deutschland Back Home From Tour Of Raiding

Hitler Announces Germany Planning 'Bigger Ships'

Berlin, Jan. 25.—(AP)—The pocket battleship Deutschland "returned home recently" after warring on merchant shipping in the Atlantic since the start of the war, the German high command announced today.

The communiqué announced: "No special events in the west. 'Air force units carried out reconnaissance flights over France and Britain."

"The armored ship Deutschland which had been conducting mercantile warfare on the Atlantic since the outbreak of war returned home recently."

It was also announced that Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler had ordered the Deutschland renamed Luetzow to reserve the name Deutschland for "a bigger ship."

MARINES HELD FOR VA. DEATH

Arrests Made in Slaying of Washington, N. C. Man

Alexandria, Va., Jan. 25.—(AP)—Alexander J. Stevenson, 28, Philadelphia-born marine private, was formally charged with murder of Sidney M. Little, tobacco salesman and member of a well-to-do Washington, N. C., family, in a warrant issued today by United States Commissioner John W. Monroe, Jr.

The warrant "was given to FBI agents, who left immediately for Quantico, where Stevenson has been held for two days."

The agents took along warrants for the arrest of two other marines as material witnesses in the slaying of Little. The salesman was found slung to death with a fire-pipe grating on a Fort Hunt picnic ground January 7.

Asked if a confession had been obtained from Stevenson, Guy Hotel, in charge of the FBI field office at Washington, D. C., said: "not exactly." He added that the marine had "not denied connection with the killing."

It was expected the marine would be arraigned tomorrow before Monroe. Several days after Little's body was found his light coupe was found near Triangle, Va., with blood stains on the seat, the rear deck and the (Continued on page six)

UNITED ACTION PLEA REFUSED

Foreign Minister Declares Netherlands is Under No Obligation to Depart From Her Policy of Strict Neutrality; Britain Had Sought Cooperation of Smaller Countries

The Hague, Jan. 25.—(AP)—The Netherlands rejected today Britain's recent bid for cooperation of neutrals against Germany.

Closing a foreign affairs session in Parliament, after speakers opposed the plea for "united action" sounded Saturday by Winston Churchill, First Lord of the British Admiralty, the foreign minister said The Netherlands were under no obligation to depart from her policy of strict neutrality.

The foreign minister did not mention Churchill, who said that the safety of small European neutrals depended upon "united action" with the allies.

The foreign minister, however, did say: "From the British side there has come a voice which declared that neutral nations have juridical obligations as members of the League of Nations to go into the war."

"I strongly deny there is a juridical or a moral obligation for the Netherlands to participate in the war."

"Our task is no collaboration with others. That is a positive attitude and a positive policy and, moreover, 'our good right'."

J. C. Worthington Dies At His Home

John Calvin Worthington, 80, died this morning at 11 o'clock at his home six miles from Greenville in the Red Banks community. He had been in failing health for some time.

Funeral service will be held from the late home Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock by Elder J. B. Roberts, Primitive Baptist minister of Farmville. Burial will follow in the J. J. Hardee cemetery near the home.

Mr. Worthington was born in Pitt county May 25, 1858 and spent his entire life in the community in which he died. He was engaged in farming.

He was one of the oldest members of Red Banks Primitive Baptist church. Surviving are one sister, Mrs. Ida Worthington of Grifton and three grandchildren, Annie Ree Thomas Earl and Willie Fay Worthington of the home.

Six Indicted For Burning Vehicles

The Pitt county grand jury yesterday returned true bills against six white men charged with aiding in burning automobiles for the purpose of collecting insurance.

It is doubtful the cases will be tried at this term of court, however. Defendants in one case are Fountain Worthington and L. L. McLawhorn; Fred Roach, Gray Dudley and Heber Stokes are named in another indictment and W. W. Ballenger is the defendant in a third case.

The indictments specifically charge the defendants with "causing to be burned or did aid in the burning of" the vehicles, "with intent to injure or prejudice insurers or creditors, or other persons."

Amsterdam, Jan. 25 (AP)—Twelve passengers and 23 crewmen lost their lives today when the 1,752-ton Norwegian steamer Biarritz struck a mine and sank in 30 seconds in the North sea.

A Norwegian steamer rescued 12 passengers and seven of the crew. The Biarritz went down after a tremendous explosion, which the first officer said, was due to a mine.

SPRULL WILL OPPOSE SCOTT

Bertie Man Expected To Announce On February 1st

Reflector Bureau.
By HENRY AVERILL.
Raleigh, Jan. 25.—The announcement of State Senator C. Wayland Sprull as a candidate for Commissioner of Agriculture is now scheduled to be made formally and with the proper fanfare of publicity trumpets next Thursday, February 1st.

There is a possibility that the exact day may be changed on account of technical difficulties in preparation and distribution of the announcement, but it and next month are definitely slated to arrive simultaneously.

Senator Sprull, in Raleigh on Wednesday, cracked that "Cousin Wayland may not actually be running right now, but he's walking powerful fast and is likely to break into a gallop at any minute."

The Bertie man's announcement is due to be short and without any elaborate enunciation of principles. Sprull will quite likely confine himself to a few broad general expressions of his desire to be a "servant of all the people" and his intention to perform the duties of Commissioner of Agriculture "to the best of his ability and in the interests of the farmers of North Carolina."

He didn't say so, but it's a safe bet that there will not be a word in it about the perennial feud between the Department of Agriculture and the State College Extension Service.

On the other hand there will, probably, be an unusual feature in the Sprull coming-out document—a challenge to incumbent W. Kerr Scott to meet the Bertie Senator (noted for his spread eagle, red-faced oratory) in joint debate in every county of North Carolina.

Chances that the challenge will be accepted seem somewhat slim, in view of the fact that such joint debates are rare in Tar Heel politics, and for the further, and perhaps more important reason, that Commissioner Scott is sure to campaign for reelection on the claim that he speaks with deed rather than with words.

There has been little, if any, doubt that Sprull would run since he said during the 1939 legislature that he would do so; but no such candidacy is ever accepted as certain and sure until a formal announcement is made.

Sprull is expected to draw his strength principally from the East and from elements favoring the Farm Bureau Federation program, while the incumbent will undoubtedly have the unofficial, if not the official, blessings of the North Carolina Grange.

Four years ago Scott was elevated over veteran Will A. Graham quite largely through efforts of the Extension Service; but it is probable

Sprull is said to be playing a complete "hands-off" game with respect to the College - Department feud, feeling that without making any promises or commitments on his part he can secure the support of the college folks unless they get a third man into the race who would be willing to promise them the world with a fence around it.

Chairman Flake Shaw of the Guilford county board of commissioners has been repeatedly mentioned as a possible third entry.

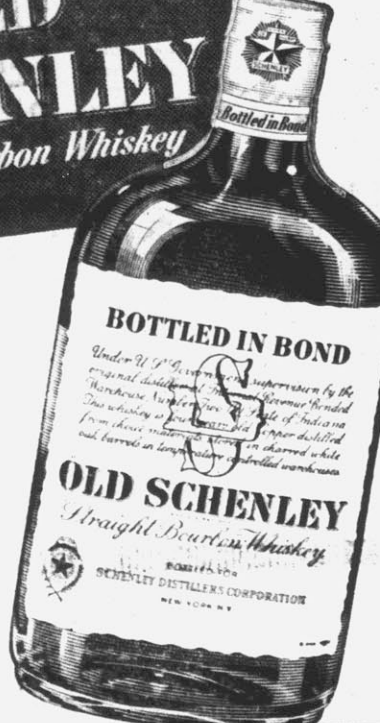

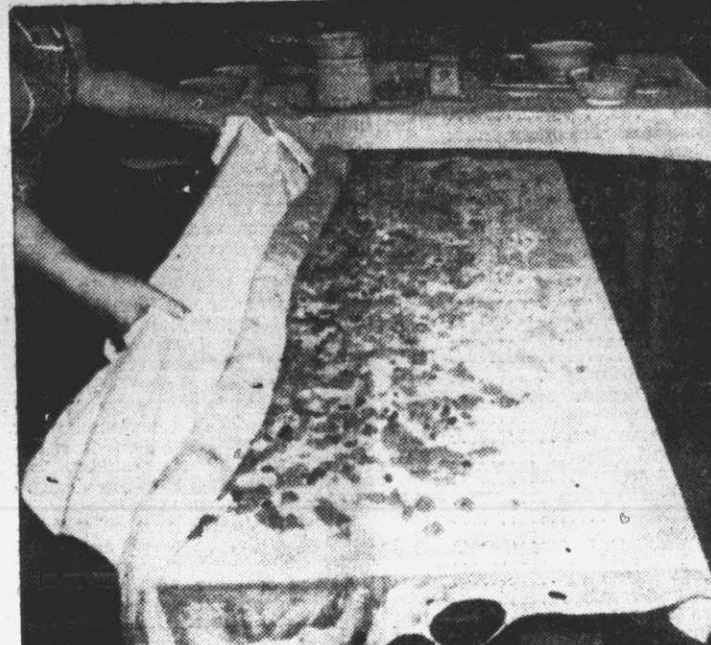

Refugees Chant Yankee Doodle To Mrs. Deutsch's Apfel Strudel



After it's kneaded and rolled, she stretches it with her hands into a gossamer sheet, five feet by three.



Spreading apples, raisins, nutmats, and sugar over two-thirds of the white dough, she rolls it, with the aid of a tablecloth, into a long tube, cuts the tube into sections and bakes them in a hot oven—a half to three-quarters of an hour.

Apfel Strudel Dough
2 cups flour.
1/2 cup lukewarm water.
1 tablespoonful olive oil.
Pinch of salt.
Heap flour on mixing board, making hole in center of mound. To lukewarm water add olive oil, salt and egg. Mix with knife, pour mixture into flour slowly, working it very soft with a knife. Knead dough with hands until smooth, turn out on floured dish. Cover dough with warm dish. Let set at least half an hour.
Prepare a table with clean tablecloth powdered with flour. Put

dough on middle of cloth and roll it carefully with rolling pin. Brush dough with more oil, pull with hands until it is as thin. Cut away thick dough at edges.
West Branch, Ia.—German and Austrian refugees who came to the Scattergood hotel here to escape Nazi persecution gather around the dinner table with comments that might be translated into "Um . . . yumm" when Mrs. Regina Deutsch prepares her famous Apfel Strudel from plenty of good American butter, flour, sugar, eggs and apples. Mrs. Deutsch used to win prizes in strudel competition in Austria with

her recipe. Properly rolled and kneaded, the dough will stretch into an almost gossamer layer, five feet in length, three in width. Have to be careful not to tear it, though. With the filling of apples, sugar, bread crumbs, raisins and chopped nuts spread thinly, and rolled like a jelly roll, they're cut into convenient lengths, baked in a hot oven for half to three-quarters of an hour. Result—a new conception of refugee life.

Apfel Strudel Filling
10 tablespoons butter.
1/2 cup white bread crumbs.
3 pounds apples.

1/2 cup sugar.
1-3 cup raisins.
1-3 cup chopped nuts (almonds best).
Spread filling over two-thirds of the dough's surface, leaving one-third of the surface uncovered at the other edge. Drip melted butter on the uncovered part of the dough and roll the strudel, as you would a jelly roll, toward uncovered third of dough. Brush the strudel with butter, cut into convenient lengths and place them on a greased tray. Bake them in a moderate oven for one-half to three-quarters of an hour.

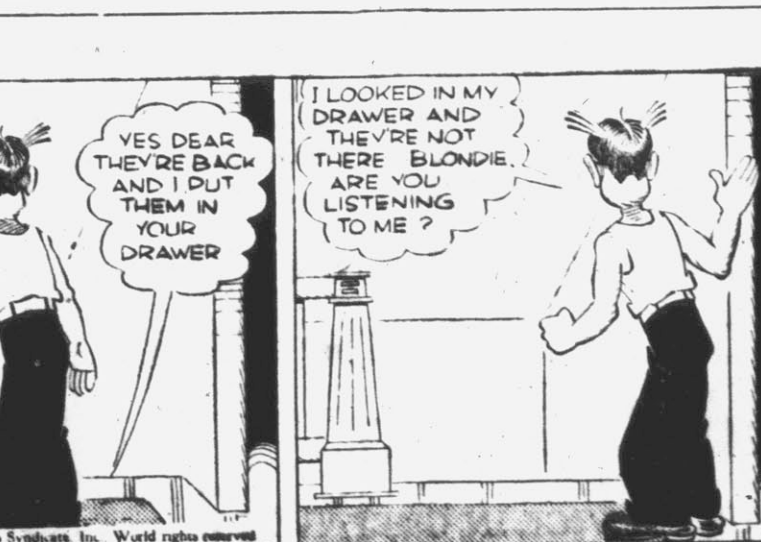

can also be seen in the larger dial switchboard regularly in use here but they are not as easily seen and understood in the regular dial switchboard due to its size and the many and varied routes that calls take through this equipment. In the dial demonstration board the equipment is arranged particularly to show and explain the actions of the mechanism, switches, relays, etc., as they pick out and test one certain telephone number from all the other telephone numbers, and the different actions of these switches go through depending upon the conditions found on the called number such as "busy line," "wrong number," dialed, number not busy, etc.

The automatic dial switchboard which is rendering local telephone service is really a marvelous machine considering the many different things it must do in handling the large number and varying loads of local telephone calls. Come and see this clearly demonstrated and explained.

A "voice mirror" recently developed by the Bell Telephone laboratories will be shown. This device en-

ables visitors to hear how their own voices sound to other people over the telephone. One's voice sounds a little different to others than it does to the person speaking. This is true in ordinary face to face conversation as well as over the telephone.

A "voice scrambler" will also be shown and demonstrated. This is a device to provide secrecy on transoceanic and ship-to-shore telephone conversations.

Other special displays such as reproductions of Alexander Graham Bell's original telephone and his second telephone. One display board shows a modern telephone dismantled to show all of its separate parts. Various kinds of telephone cable, raw materials from which telephones are made, foreign telephone directories, metal that floats in the air and many other interesting things will be shown and explained.

Manager W. W. Aycock, the local telephone employees, and several out of town telephone people will be present to greet guests.
