HOUSE PASSES \$965,772,000 NAVY MEASURE

Bill Adopted Only After Guam Item Eliminated

AMOUNT BELOW FDR SUGGESTION

Still Would Give Navy About \$51,000,000 More Than It Received For Current Fiscal Year

Washington, Feb. 16.—(AP)—The House passed a \$965,772,000 navy appropriations bill, but for the second time in less than a year eliminated funds proposed for developing the Pacific island of Guam.

Although the bill, which now goes to the Senate, carried \$112,699,699 less than President Roosevelt recommended, it still would give the navy about \$51,000,000 more than it received for the current fiscal year—a peacetime record.

It included funds to start work on 19 new combat ships, five auxiliary vessels and 352 additional airplanes, as well as money to carry on construction of 79 warships and auxiliaries already on the ways.

Also in the measure were funds to bring the navy's enlisted strength to 150,000, an increase of 5,000 over the force authorized by the President in his limited emergency proclamation last fall.

Opposition to the \$100,000,000 item included for Guam to start a \$3,000,000 harbor dredging and seawall construction project provided the serious opposition to the huge supply bill. The money was eliminated after fees contended the project constituted the first step toward ultimate fortification of the tiny island—a step they argued would lead possibly to war with Japan.

A score or more members fought the proposal vigorously on the ground that the suggested improvement constituted the first step toward fortification of the tiny island—some 1,500 miles from Tokyo—and this threatened potential trouble with Japan.

Meetings Set By Municipal League

Raleigh, Feb. 16.—Twelve regional meetings so arranged that no municipal official will have to travel more than 45 miles to reach at least one, have been announced by the League Secretary, Patrick Healy, Jr., for the latter part of March.

The meetings, Healy said, will be held jointly by the League with the Association of County Commissioners, in an effort to get the two organizations together on a full legislative program to be presented to the 1941 General Assembly.

As organization neither the Municipal League nor the Commissioners group will officially support or fight any particular candidate for the legislature, but it is an obvious fact that individual municipal officials and county commissioners will help or hurt the candidates who are for or against the program which will be adopted.

The tentative schedule of regional meetings: Durham, March 14; Rocky Mount, March 15; Elizabeth, March 18; New Bern, March 19; Goldsboro, March 20; Fayetteville, March 22; Albemarle, March 25; High Point, March 26; North Wilkesboro, March 27; Lincolnton, March 28; and Asheville, March 29.

Speaks In Favor Of Back To Cotton Move

The "Back to Cotton" campaign was carried to the Snow Hill Rotary Club at its regular session on Wednesday night of this week by Secretary N. G. Bartlett of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce. The speaker emphasized the importance of every farmer using his full cotton allotment for 1940. Greene county, he stated, has an allotment of 3,151 acres of cotton more than she actually planted last year, while she has a reduction in tobacco acreage of 8,855 acres.

"If this full allotment of cotton is planted and boll weevil remedies used, it will go a long way towards filling the gap, economically speaking, that will be caused by the shortage of revenue from tobacco," the speaker stated. The outlook for cotton prices are not so discouraging according to the information given out by the Secretary of the regional organization at this meeting before the Rotary Club of Snow Hill.

Mr. Bartlett was presented by President Doc Hardison, who is familiar with the program of the regional organization since it was organized in Eastern Carolina 18 years ago.

ANOTHER SNOW DUE FOR COAST

Efforts Speeded To Clear Valentine Day Fall

With more snow expected late tomorrow, the North Atlantic seaboard states speeded efforts today to clear away the great St. Valentine's snow—heaviest of the winter and in some sections the heaviest in years. The death toll was more than 60.

Overnight more than 5,000 men and 2,250 pieces of equipment were at work in New York city alone riding streets and sidewalks of drifts and ice.

Milk distribution in New York city returned to normal after some delays.

The Hudson river was frozen solid down to West Point which is 50 miles north of New York city.

The oil tanker Aztec, which called for help at sea Wednesday night, reached port in tow of two tugs.

The heavy snow was blamed for a near tragedy—five women, four men and a baby girl were affected by coal gas fumes in the Washington Heights section of New York. Police said the snow probably closed a fire causing the gas to seep into some of the apartments.

District Poultry Course Arranged

A large delegation from Pitt county is expected to attend the annual one-day district short course in poultry to be held in Washington Tuesday, February 27.

The study will get under way at 9 o'clock and will include talks and demonstrations on the utilization of flocks and equipment, breeding program, better feeding and sanitation as aids in controlling disease, modern methods of marketing poultry, round table discussion of farmer and specialist, autopsying diseased birds, demonstration in grading and packing eggs, inspection of an egg-cleaning machine and inspection of an egg-processing (shell treatment) machine.

First, second and third prizes will be awarded for the best dozens of white and brown eggs each, and first and second prizes will be given to the persons attending the course with the largest and next largest poultry flock.

Foul Run-Around

Kirkville, Mo.—(AP)—Coach Mal Eiken of the Kirkville Teachers reports that fouling has been less frequent on the cage squad since he inaugurated a rule that a player must run a couple of laps around the gym for every time he commits a foul.

Hamilton Declares That Contest Would Provide Showdown On New Deal, Roosevelt and Third Term With Results That All Three Would Be Finished in Republican Victory

Washington, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Republican chairman John Hamilton said today that he welcomed the possibility of President Roosevelt's nomination for a third term, which he predicted would result in a Democratic defeat.

"We would have a clear-cut issue and once and for all we would have a showdown on the New Deal, Franklin Roosevelt and the third term—and we would finish all three," Hamilton told the Republican National Committee, meeting to set the time and place for the party's convention.

Declaring that "all signs point to a Republican victory this year," he said:

"So demoralized and embittered by internecine feuds is the Democratic party that it can not present a common front against us. On the other hand our ranks are closed in a harmonious understanding of the great tasks before us. The morale of our workers in every part of the country is that of men and women who possess knowledge that victory is within their grasp."

"Our party is out of debt. We have available half a dozen or more men—able, trustworthy and humanitarian men—all well qualified to add lustre to the presidential office. We can select out one of them and with righteous principles on our side we are assured of a sweeping victory next November 5."

"Never has there been an administration in Washington," he said, "that so disregarded the plain mandate of the constitution as this one. Never has there been a national leadership that boldly undertook to sabotage the judicial system before the New Deal tried to pack the Supreme court with its partisans; never before 1933 has there been a party in power that has given such ardent sympathy and encouragement to subversive elements seeking the downfall of our American system."

Loan Association Adopts Resolution

The stockholders of the Pitt National Farm Loan Association, in an annual meeting here today, adopted a resolution protesting against the "unnecessary inconvenience" imposed prospective farmer-borrowers who are being directed to transact their business at points outside the county when adequate facilities are available here.

The resolution declared that the Pitt association, with offices in Greenville, is open for business each day during business hours to render service in giving information relative to farm loans and to serve borrowers in Pitt county and to make available to them the benefits of the Farm Credit Administration as contemplated by Congress.

It contended that borrowers in the county are being directed to transact their business relative to such loans in Washington and that to comply with the request proves both inconvenient and expensive to local borrowers.

The resolution provided that protests be made to the Federal Land Bank of Columbia, S. C., the Farm Credit Administration, Congressman Lindsay C. Warren, Sen. J. W. Bailey and Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace.

The meeting was presided over by L. H. Rountree and stockholders were welcomed by Mayor Jack Spain. Others taking part in the program were Robert A. Darr of the Greenville Production Credit Association, T. A. Haigler of Sanford field supervisor of the Federal Land Bank of Columbia, S. C., M. K. Blount, John R. Carroll and F. M. Wooten.

Judge Wooten, secretary-treasurer of the association, submitted his report of business transacted during the past year. It revealed that the association had loans outstanding as of January 1 of \$376,050 and that during the year the organization operated on a total expense of \$488.55. Loans closed in 1939 totaled \$46,400.

ACKNOWLEDGE RUSSIAN GAINS ON MAIN LINE

Finnish Command Admits Frontiers Penetrated

SOVIETS OCCUPY PART OF VILLAGE

Russian Troops Successful in Summa Sector And At Two Outposts in Other Sections

Helsinki, Feb. 16.—(AP)—The Finnish command admitted today that the Russians had penetrated farther into Finland's Mannerheim line positions in the great battle of the Karelian isthmus, but declared that Russian gains had been bought at the price of great losses.

Its acknowledgment of Russian gains in the 16-day-old battle was made in the army's daily communique issued shortly after a Finnish military informant admitted

that the invading Red army had seized at least a part of the village of Summa. Around that village the severest parts of the isthmus battle has been raging.

After already having acknowledged Russian gains on February 13, the Finns in their communique today said:

"East of the Summa sector and at a couple of outposts in a defile between Lake Muolo and the Vuoksi river the enemy succeeded in penetrating our positions."

"Elsewhere attacks were repulsed," said the communique of other isthmus fighting and semi-official advice up to the time of issuance of the communique indicated that the Finnish Mannerheim line, the country's main line of defense, was holding firm.

The line is a deep series of fortifications so arranged that positions can be lost without necessarily incurring a serious break.

Miami, Fla., Feb. 16.—(AP)—Chairman James A. Farley of the Democratic National Committee, said today he would set a date within the next few days for the party's national convention in Chicago.

Tobacco Problems To Be Discussed

A meeting which is expected to prove of much benefit to all tobacco farmers in Pitt county will be held at the Agricultural building at 2 p. m. Wednesday of next week. County Agent R. R. Bennett announced next week.

Mr. Bennett declared that numerous problems faced by tobacco growers would be discussed and urged as many as possible to attend. J. O. Rowell, extension insect specialist; H. R. Garris, plant disease specialist and L. T. Weeks, extension tobacco specialist, will be here for the meeting and will give lectures, illustrated by pictures and lantern slides, on blue mold and other diseases, insects and other problems.

Mr. Garris will outline results of an experiment conducted with regard to the control of blue mold. Farmers will be urged to ask questions regarding insects, both on the tobacco beds and in the fields.

Professor Heads New Cabinet Of Bulgaria

Sofia, Feb. 16.—(AP)—King Boris today swore in a new Bulgarian cabinet headed by Bogdan Philoff, 57-year-old professor who is expected to lessen Bulgaria's economic dependence on Germany.

Philoff became premier after only 15 months in politics. He was education minister in the cabinet of George Kiossevanoff, which resigned yesterday.

TWO EXECUTED AT N. C. PRISON

Negroes Die For Two Crimes in Hoke County

Raleigh, Feb. 16.—(AP)—The state executed two Negroes today for the double crimes of burglary and murder in Hoke county.

Nathaniel Bryant, 19, was executed first followed by William Young, 23. Both lived in High Point at the time of their arrest.

They were convicted of the robbery-murder of Thomas Moore, 24, who worked in a combination store and filling station in Hoke county.

Bryant entered the death chamber at 10:21. The gas started at 10:03 and 12 minutes later he was pronounced dead.

Chaplain L. A. Watts said this morning that Bryant and Young continued to deny any participation in the Hoke county crime. Young, however, admitted that he strangled J. S. Chesser, a death row guard, in a futile escape attempt last December.

Young walked to the gas chamber at 10:21. The gas started two minutes later. He was pronounced dead after 13 minutes.

Little Hope For Certificate Plan

Washington, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Despite a strong endorsement by Secretary Wallace, House farm leaders said today there was little possibility that Congress would approve the certificate plan of providing permanent agricultural subsidies.

Wallace recommended the plan to the House Agriculture committee yesterday, saying that it would produce a more regular income for farmers than fluctuating appropriations and that it appeared far superior to other farm proposals.

Chairman Jones, (D-Tex.), of the committee contended, however, that it could not be applied to corn and hogs—and possibly not to export cotton.

Deceased Man Cousin Of Greenville Woman

John R. Rodgers of Norfolk, who died yesterday, was a first cousin of Mrs. Louis Smith of this city. Both came to this country on the same boat years ago from their homes in England.

Mr. Rodgers, 75, who was prominently connected with the cotton industry, also was president of the Hart cotton mills of Tarboro.

Funeral services will be conducted at 12 o'clock in Norfolk tomorrow.

CAPT. GAINARD NAME CLEARED

Bureau Declines To Consider Union Complaints

Washington, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Commander R. S. Field, director of the Bureau of Marine Inspection and Navigation, refused today to consider complaints filed by the National Maritime union against Capt. Joseph A. Gainard of the S. S. steamship City of Flint.

The complaint alleged that after a German prize crew took possession of the American vessel last October, Gainard failed to communicate with the American consul at Oslo, Norway, and that Gainard failed to sail from Murmansk, Russia, when the Germans temporarily left the ship. Field replied:

"I could not possibly give serious intention to statements made by a mess boy and a cook to the effect that they were not satisfied with the way the captain handled the job. The evidence which you have submitted does not justify the investigation on the part of this bureau."

The City of Flint was seized by the German pocket battleship Deutschland while en route to Manchester, England, before this country's neutrality act restricted such shipping.

Easter Egg Hunt To Be Held Here

The Greenville Merchants Association is planning an Easter egg hunt for children of both the county and city to be held some time during the Easter holidays. Easter Sunday is March 24.

The definite date, hour and place has not been decided upon as yet, such details having been left with a special committee to decide after the holidays to be observed by schools have been announced.

In addition to the egg prizes to be contributed by the different merchants, will be given the youngsters.

The idea, being developed for the entertainment of all children in the city and county, is a new one and is expected to attract a large number of children from all sections of the county, who will be observing a respite from school work and in the holiday spirit.

Sharp Ends Services As News Bureau Head

Raleigh, Feb. 16.—Bill Sharpe, who quit yesterday as head of the State News Bureau of the Department of Conservation and Development, said today he expects to get out the first issue of a weekly tabloid paper in Winston-Salem on March 14.

Sharpe, who was succeeded by Bob Thompson, former secretary to Governor Clyde R. Hoey, left immediately with his family for Winston-Salem. He indicated the first issue of his novel venture will be of about 12,000 copies.

FINNS IN NEED OF MAN POWER

Swedish Premier Declares Finnish Request Declined On Grounds Position In Regard To Assisting Neighbors Still Unchanged; Finland Warns of Unsatisfactory Peace With Reds

Stockholm, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Premier Per Hainson declared today that request by Finland for "transport of Swedish military troops to Finland" had been declined on the ground that Sweden's position in regard to assisting her neighbors unchanged.

Hansson's statement, contained in a communique, was occasioned by reports in the Stockholm press that Finnish government leaders had requested Sweden they must have more help or face the necessity "concluding peace with the Soviet in a manner greatly concerning Sweden."

The communique said: "On various occasions the Swedish government has entertained requests from the Finnish government for proposals concerning deliveries of necessities. These proposals, general in nature, have been declined on the ground that the question of giving injured and invalidated care Sweden also was discussed as well as sending civil workers from Sweden to Finland."

"Steps were taken in these respects. During a visit in Stockholm members of the Finnish government then took up the question of personal military assistance. On Tuesday the Finnish foreign minister had talks about this matter with the Swedish prime minister, the foreign minister and the minister of defense."

"On this occasion the transport of Swedish military troops was requested. From the Swedish side the matter was referred to the cabinet. Swedish principles governing assistance to Finland as declared in the speech of the Swedish prime minister in the Swedish Riksdag, February 17 and which were generally accepted."

"There has been no change in this position."

Brazilians Board German Freighter

Belem, Brazil, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Twelve Brazilian marines boarded the German freighter Konigsberg in Brazilian waters today and Brazilian gunboat Amapa station itself nearby to insure compliance with the Brazilian neutrality law prohibiting operation of ship used for communication with belligerents.

The Konigsberg was boarded by the navy 55 miles from Belem, but Brazilian territorial waters.

Maritime authorities yesterday ordered the vessel to either sail outside territorial waters or to return to Belem, whence she had sailed February 8th. This action was taken when it was discovered the ship had installed radio antenna which made it possible for her to communicate with German warships.

'ANTELOPE' SANK SUBS

London, Feb. 16.—(AP)—The British destroyer which the Admiralty said sank two German submarines on February 9th was officially closed today to have been the Antelope, a 1,350-ton ship built in 1918.

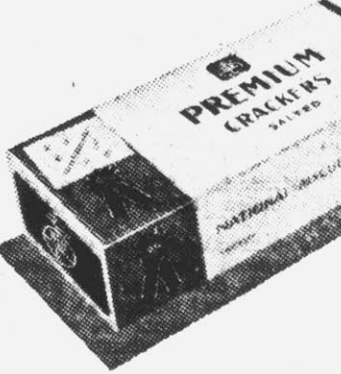

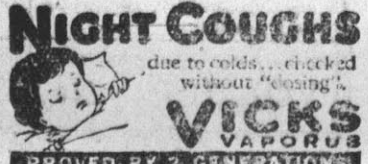

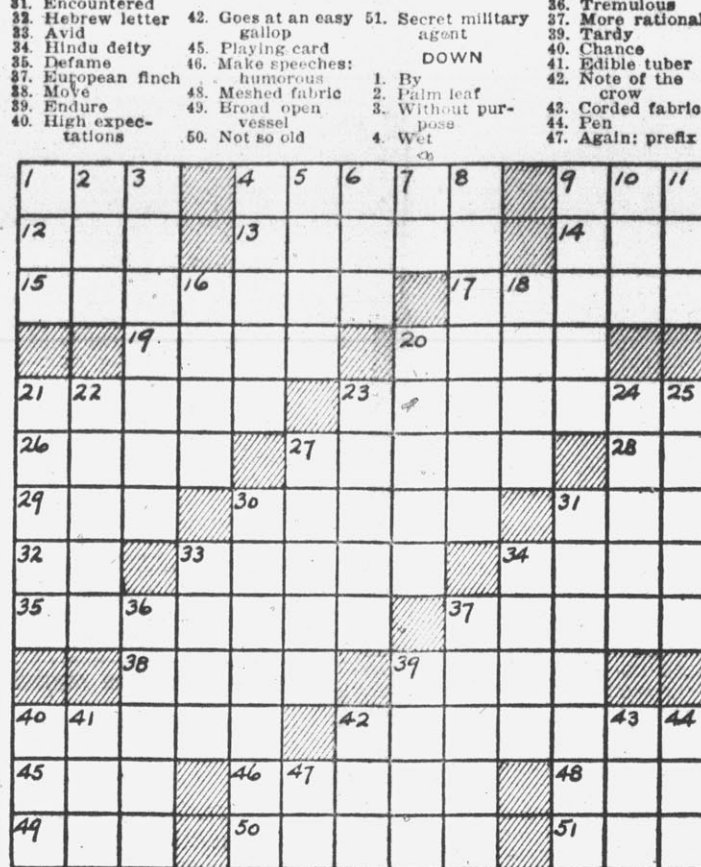
