BRITAIN REPORTS SUCCESSES IN NAVAL BATTLE

FDR PROPOSES WIDE CHANGES IN GOVERNMENT

Reorganization Submitted to T. Branches

BETTER SERVICE MAIN OBJECTIVE

Suggestion Provides For Transfer of Several Agencies From One Department to Another

Washington, April 11.—(AP)—A broad government reorganization plan designed to save \$300,000 annually and produce "more effective service" was submitted to Congress today by President Roosevelt.

Affecting most of the executive departments and several independent agencies, the fourth reorganization plan recommended by Mr. Roosevelt projected these major revisions in the governmental set-up:

1. Putting the Civil Aeronautics authority, now an independent agency, into the Department of Commerce.
2. Along with this change the President ordered abolition of the Air Safety Board, a Civil Aeronautics agency, and merger of its function of investigating airplane accidents into functions of the Civil Aeronautics Board.
3. Shifting the Food and Drug Administration from the Agriculture department to the Federal Security Administration, except for two activities considered closely related to agriculture — involving insecticide and naval stores.
4. Transferring to the Interior department from Agriculture those activities of the Soil Conservation service relating to soil and moisture conservation on lands already under the jurisdiction of the Interior department.

The transfers ordered today will become effective within 60 days, unless both branches of Congress, each by a two-thirds vote, disapprove.

Trevathan Seeks Pitt Board Post

G. E. Trevathan, mayor of Fountain and prominent in farm organization circles, today formally announced his candidacy for the board of county commissioners from the Third District, which embraces Farmville, Fountain, Falkland and Beaver Dam townships.

Mr. Trevathan declared that this was his first entry into politics, other than in his home town, where he has been mayor for the past three years.

Active in the Farm Bureau Federation since the state organization was formed here several years ago, Mr. Trevathan at the present is president of the county organization. He also is a member of the local AAA committee and has served on the county committee.

Mr. Trevathan, who is a farmer, said that he devoted all his spare time to projects which he considered to be for the betterment of Pitt county and its farmers.

Shad Supper Enjoyed By 40 And 8 Members

Last night's plank shad supper and meeting of the Greenville Volunteer of the 40 and 8 were declared a huge success by those who attended.

The entire program was devoted to good fellowship and the banquet, no formal speaking having been arranged.

In addition to most of the local ex-soldiers, 12 members of the Wilson Volunteer were in attendance.

REPORTS MOLD IN SOME AREAS

Tobacco Disease Prevalent in Some Counties

Raleigh, April 11.—Blue mold has already appeared in Robeson, Columbus and Carteret counties, and tobacco growers of the state were warned today by Dr. Luther Shaw, Extension plant pathologist of N. C. State College, to prepare to control the annual invasion of this plant bed disease. "Conditions are almost perfect for a serious attack of blue mold," Dr. Shaw declared.

He explained that tobacco plants are small, because growth is retarded due to cold weather early in the plant bed season, and also, the rainy weather of the past week is conducive to spread of the downy mildew.

Dr. Shaw emphasized that there are three, and only three, blue mold control methods recommended by the State College Extension Service. These are fumigation, or gassing, with either paradichlorobenzene or benzol (benzene), and spraying with a mixture of copper oxide, cottonseed oil, and water.

The paradichlorobenzene is a crystal, which is placed between the regular plant bed cover and a heavier cover which must completely seal the fumes in the plant bed. Benzene, or benzol, is a liquid prep-

Balkans, Meanwhile, Fear Invasion by Germany

Bucharest, April 11.—(AP)—Large numbers of Soviet Russian troop reinforcements were reported today to have been moved into the Odessa region from the north. Odessa, on the Black sea, lies about 25 miles from the Rumania-Bessarabia border.

The reports reaching this capital from the frontier region could not be confirmed on this side of the border.

Russia lost Bessarabia to Rumania in the post-World war territorial changes and has never renounced her claim to it.

The advice pictured the Russian forces as veteran troops, many of whom had fought in Finland.

Meanwhile, the Rumanian government issued a decree that all national defense factories must immediately stop supplies for use in case of general mobilization.

Supplies must be sufficient for 15 days, the decree said.

The government issued a formal denial of what it called "wild reports" that three German bound Danube river freight boats had been sunk by explosions.

A freely expressed fear in the Balkans that Germany might move into Southeastern Europe was heightened by the comment by numerous British and French officials in the Near East that allied forces were unable at present to resist effectively.

NORWAY TAKES BERGEN FROM NAZI INVADERS

Port Said To Have Been Recaptured By Army

TROOPS CALLED FOR RESISTANCE

Norway, Cooperating With British - French Allies, Hastily Fortifies Defense Points

Stockholm, April 11.—(AP)—A radio message from the Norwegian commander at Bergen today reported that seaport had been recaptured from the German invaders.

Reports pouring into Sweden said the Norwegians were blasting bridges to make German advances difficult and cut off German forces already in possession of Norwegian territory.

Norway, ordering her troops to cooperate with the British-French allies, was hastily fortifying every defense point and arming workers, members of rifle clubs and military school pupils to help defend the nation.

The president of the Norwegian Parliament, Carl J. Hambro, announced that Norway's northern forces now are cooperating fully with British sources against the German invasion.

Hambro, who is in Stockholm on an undisclosed mission, made the announcement after communicating with the Norwegian government, which has established headquarters at Elverum, 20 miles from the Swedish frontier.

A German advance eastward from Narvik, Northern Norwegian port, already has been repulsed and Hammar, for a time seat of the government, recaptured, Hambro said.

Hambro added that German forces near Hammar had been isolated, from other contingents, except for communication by air.

Funeral services for J. L. Birley, 85, who died suddenly at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Onan Allen, were conducted Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock by Rev. Gilbert Davis, Christian minister of the Red Oak church at Rev. W. A. Dail, Free Will Baptist minister. Burial was in the Evans cemetery near the home place.

Mr. Birley had been a prominent farmer, but due to his declining health he had retired from his work. He was born, reared and spent his entire life near Greenville.

In 1886 he was married to Miss Amanda Strickland, who died November 9, 1932.

Surviving are three daughters, Mrs. Onan Allen of near Greenville, Mrs. Nannie Moyer of Oak City, and Mrs. W. L. Worthington of near Ayden; 10 grandchildren, 10 great-grandchildren, and a brother W. B. Birley of near House Station.

Active pallbearers were S. Lloyd Tucker, Amos Evans, B. L. Tyson, Johnny May, W. S. May and H. H. May.

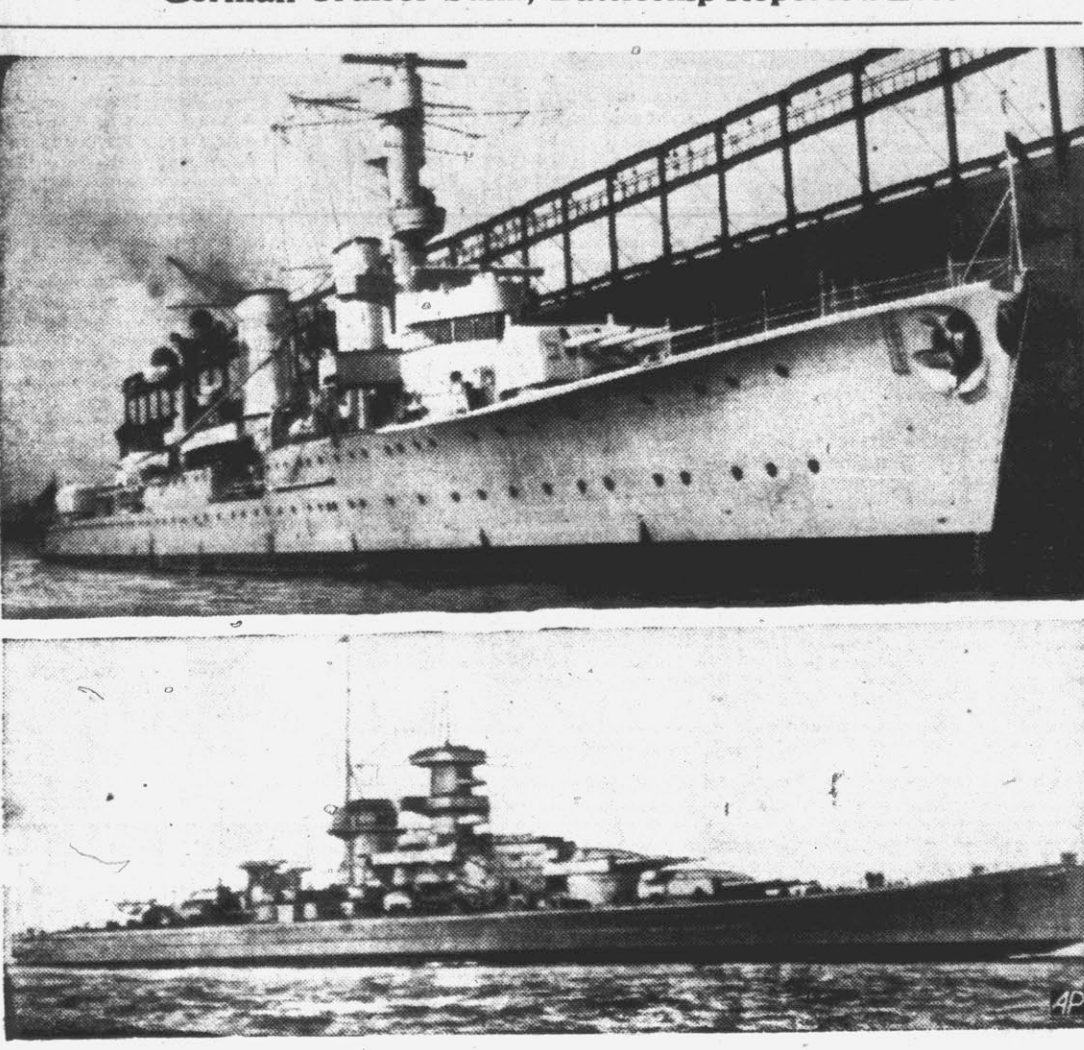
Mr. Page will speak on the general topic of safety, but what particular phase he would deal with had not been announced.

German Cruiser Sunk, Battleship Reported Lost



Nazi authorities in Berlin have admitted the German cruiser Karlsruhe (top) was one of two warships sunk in operations against Norway. The other ill-fated vessel was the Nazi cruiser Bluecher. It was indicated the Karlsruhe went down under Norwegian coastal fire. Meanwhile there were unconfirmed but persistent reports that the 26,000-ton German battleship Gneisenau (below) also was sunk off Norway. The British admiralty did not confirm nor deny the reports.

NAVAL OUTLAY BILL APPROVED

Senate Committee Settles On \$963,797, 478 Fund

Washington, April 11.—(AP)—The Senate appropriations committee stamped approval today on a \$963,797,478 outlay for the navy in the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Large as it was, the sum still was \$123,514,099 under President Roosevelt's budget estimates and \$1,981,960 below the amount previously voted by the House.

Increasing contract authorizations by \$15,000,000, the committee opened the way for the navy to acquire 471 new warplanes during the year to bring its aircraft strength up to 3,028 planes by July 1, 1941.

A move by Senator Lodge (R, Mass.) to force the navy to spend in the next fiscal year all of the \$41,000,000 in appropriations and \$25,000,000 in contract authorization allocated in the bill for aircraft was defeated by a 10 to seven vote.

Lodge's amendment, designed to prevent interference by foreign purchases with navy plane deliveries, was opposed by administration leaders.

The Senate committee failed to restore the \$8,300,000 reduction effected by the House, making only \$1,500,000 available to start work on two new 45,000-ton battleships, but disagreed with the House committee that work on these dreadnaughts should be held up to await developments in the European war.

Funds were made available in the bill to start work on two battleships, an aircraft carrier, two cruisers, eight destroyers, six submarines and several smaller craft. The measure also carried funds to continue the construction of eight battleships, already started, seven cruisers, two aircraft carriers, 42 destroyers, 20 submarines and auxiliary vessels.

Seek Speaker For Local YDC Rally

Hoover Taft, state YDC organizer, and officers of the Pitt county club met in a special session this afternoon to consider plans for the district rally to be held here later this month.

The date has been tentatively set for Friday night of next week, but this may be changed to secure an outstanding speaker for the occasion.

Senator Lee of Oklahoma had been secured to deliver the address, but later wired that he would be unable to accept. The sponsors are encountering difficulty in securing a speaker because senators and representatives are reluctant to leave Washington at the present time.

'Victory Over Britain' Is Celebrated In Berlin

Berlin, April 11.—(AP)—Nazi Germany is steadily tightening her fist of iron on Norway, authorized Germans contended today, and deifying the allies to loosen her hold. "German positions throughout Norway are too thoroughly consolidated," these sources asserted, "that there is not the remotest possibility they could be dislodged by English and French forces."

They pictured a steady stream of German soldiers being transported to the northern kingdom to strengthen the forces landed Tuesday at strategic points.

Authorized sources then made the most categorical denial of reports of an extensive sea battle.

"In only two places did the German air force have encounters with the British fleet," they said, "but reports of a clash of major forces of the navy are wholly unfounded."

"Our transports continued crossing the Skagerrak unimpeded until the Norwegian situation was completely in control."

These sources denied that the Norwegian army had been mobilized, stating that "that would be foolish as under the most favorable circumstances the Norwegians would be outnumbered completely."

Amid German celebration of "victory" over the British in protection of the Nazi foothold in Scandinavia, there appeared a hint that newly occupied bases might be used for bombing attacks on England.

Race Is Complicated By Announcement Of Bryant

Reflector Bureau. By HENRY AVERILL. Raleigh, April 11.—Formal announcement of Durham's Representative Victor S. Bryant that he will again be a candidate for the House this year complicates the race for Speakership no little in itself, and when it is taken in connection with the practical certainty that Libby Ward, Speaker of the 1939 body, will be back again, this contest becomes one of the most interesting and certainly will be one of the hottest in a long time.

In the nature of things Bryant, who last session was nosed out by Ward by just two votes, cannot openly and with his own volition seek the post. In 1939 he contended that Durham is in the East and that he qualified for the East's turn at the Speakership. Wherefore, it would be unseemly for him now to reverse himself and stand openly for the gavel-wielding job in 1941.

On the other hand it is just as certain that Vic's friends will put him into the race—as a dark horse compromise candidate in event of a deadlock, even if not an active aspirant right from the start.

With George Uzzell of Roman, Clarence Stone of Rockingham, Jim Vogler of Mecklenburg, and probably Odus Mull of Cleveland, in the race a deadlock could easily develop. Ward enters the picture because he is certain to fight any Bryant candidacy tooth and nail and to the bitter end. There was no love lost between Libby and Vic, even before the Speakership caucus and afterward it was worse. Libby always pays off—and that goes for his enemies as well as his friends; so there's a great fight brewing.

Bill Penner, whose withdrawal from the race last time elected Ward, will also be back. It now seems sure, and he, too, can be counted on to fight any Bryant bid. It may develop into a decidedly fine fight.

Invasion By Nazi Forces Branded As Big Mistake

Winston Churchill declares that Great Britain's losses have been suffered by Germany as result of Emperor as Great as Napoleon's Entry of Spain; Norwegian Ports Regained

London, April 11.—(AP)—The pounding guns of Britain's men of war and bombs bursting from swarming warplanes have crippled the German fleet and sent allies on the road "to victory in a world cause", Winston Churchill told the House of Commons today.

The first lord of the admiralty put German sea losses at about vessels—four of them cruisers—added to Britain's sorrow with news of the loss of the destroyers Gloworm and Gurkha.

London, April 11.—(AP)—Winston Churchill today told the House of Commons "great losses have been suffered by the German navy" in continuing air and naval battles launched by Germany's invasion of Norway.

"We have greatly gained by what has occurred in Scandinavia, a northern waters in the strategic and military sense," he said.

"Hitler has made as great a strategic and political error as Napoleon when he invaded Spain."

Churchill said that "we have recaptured Norwegian ports."

He told the House of Commons that the Norwegians "in their war and mountainous country" should be able to maintain "vigorous and prolonged resistance" against German invaders.

"If the Norwegian government had not been so very strict and were in enforcing her neutrality against us," he said "it would have been very easy to give them timely and more support than now possible."

He charged that the German invasion had been "long and elaborate preparation."

Britain is occupying Denmark, Faroe islands, midway between Shetland islands and Iceland.

He said the Faroes would be handed back to Denmark when it is liberated from the "foul thug" into which she had plunged by German aggression."

He announced that the destroyer Gloworm, apparently had been sunk Monday morning off the Norwegian coast in a battle with German warships.

A very heavy bomb fell on battleship Rodney, but her commander said "resisted it."

He said the cruiser Aurora attacked unsuccessfully five times while the destroyer Gurkha, accompanying her, was hard hit.

"The destroyer Zuku sank a German U-boat off the Orkneys," first lord disclosed.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE BEHIND FARMERS

The action of the local Chamber of Commerce in getting behind a move for better farming in this county is an indication of the realization that what helps Pitt County generally is a help to Greenville and what helps Greenville is a help to the entire county.

The movements launched by the Agriculture Committee of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday are for better cotton production per acre in this county and for the propagation of better seed for farm crops. With curtailed tobacco acreage in this section there must be incomes to supplement that received from tobacco and better farming methods are one way to assure this additional income.

It is not enough for a farmer to just plant his allotted cotton acreage and expect it to bring him a good price. He must follow through with proper cultivation including poisoning to prevent the boll weevil from destroying his crop.

The seed propagation program is starting on a small scale this year with certified seed corn being allotted to picked farmers who agree to follow agriculture department instructions in growing it this year. It is hoped by the sponsors that in this way there will be produced a good amount of fine seed corn in this county this year to supply other farmers next year who are interested in better production.

The corn program is to be followed by other seed programs which in time could make this county one of the seed producing areas for this and other nearby states.

The Chamber of Commerce acted wisely in showing this interest in the farming industry in this county and if the farmers show a like cooperative interest, Pitt County should be starting on the road to solving some of its farm problems.

The gassing treatment should be started when blue mold first is noted in the community. Extension Circular No. 229 gives full details on all three control methods, and the publication is free upon request to the Agricultural Editor at State College, Raleigh.

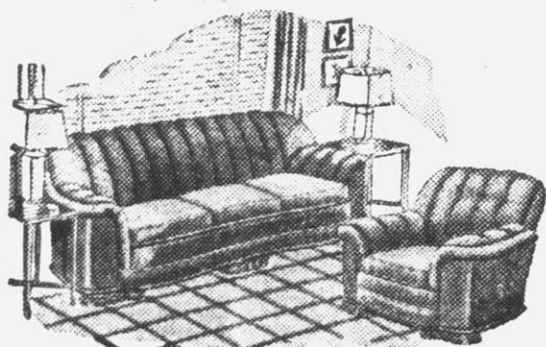
