HOUSE ACTION
TO COME SOON
ON LABOR ACT

Way Cleared for Early Consideration of Measure

MOVE COMES ON NINE-ONE VOTE

Changes Proposed By Labor Committee And Special Group To Be Considered on House Floor

Washington, April 19.—(AP)—The House Rules Committee unexpectedly cleared the way today for the House to take up soon legislation to amend the Wagner act.

Procedure which the committee approved, nine to one, would permit the House to consider both the set of four amendments approved by the House Labor committee and the more sweeping changes put forward by the Smith committee—the independent House group headed by Rep. Smith (D-Va.) which recently investigated the Labor board.

The Rules committee said this procedure would permit "wide open" debate on the entire question of Wagner act changes.

The Labor committee's amendment would increase the Labor board from three to five members, protect craft unions, permit employers to petition the Labor board for a collective bargaining election and insure for at least one year the valid operation of a legal employer-employee contract.

A majority of the Smith committee would create a new National Labor board, separate its judicial and administrative functions and remove much of the board's current procedure.

Two Are Fined On Traffic Violation

Only five cases were tried in this morning's session of Municipal Recorder's court, two of the defendants being charged with parking passenger cars in space reserved for trucks.

The two convicted of the traffic law violation, W. W. Ballenger and E. P. Lloyd, were ordered to pay \$5 to be applied on the costs of court.

Maggie Hines, Negro woman charged with illegal possession of whiskey for the purpose of sale, was found guilty only of illegal possession. She was given a 30-day sentence, to be suspended upon payment of \$5 and court costs.

Mack Dickens, Negro, was acquitted of a charge of assault on a female and the prosecuting witness, Alma Artis, was ordered to pay one-half of the costs.

Gilmer Dixon, white man, was convicted of driving while drunk and was given a 90-day sentence, suspended upon payment of a \$50 fine and costs. His driving license was ordered revoked for 12 months, the revocation to start at the expiration of a 12-months suspension imposed in Green county recently on a similar charge.

Fate Of Cottens In Hands Of Jury

Raleigh, April 19.—(AP)—Thirteen men heard Judge Clawson L. Williams instruct them for nearly four hours today, then retired to consider the fate of Woodrow Cotten and his young wife, Margaret Herndon Cotten, charged with the murder of Mrs. Mary Lee Herndon, mother of Mrs. Cotten.

Judge Williams told the jurors they could return any one of five verdicts: 1—Convict Cotten and Mrs. Cotten of first degree murder; 2—Convict both of second degree murder; 3—Convict either of first degree murder and acquit the other; 4—Convict either of second degree murder and acquit the other; 5—Acquit both.

Uncover Plot

Bei ade, April 19.—(AP)—Discovery of a plot to overthrow the government of Premier Dragisa Cvetkovic was reported today in quarters close to the government, following an announcement that former Premier Milan Stoyadinovic would be interned in a mountain fastness under heavy guard.

These sources indicated that success of the plot had hinged on entry of German troops into Yugoslavia.

Stoyadinovic was taken into custody after a police raid on his home disclosed documents linking him with Nazi "fifth column" activities in Yugoslavia.

"Hands Off" Doctrine For East Indies



Through a statement issued by Secretary of State Hull, the United States has proclaimed to the world a "hands off" policy for Netherlands East Indies. Meanwhile British and French forces in the Far East were prepared to oppose any chance that Japan might attempt to seize the islands. This map shows the relative positions of the Netherlands East Indies (horizontal shading) and Japan and the territory occupied or dominated by the Japanese (oblique shading). Between Japan's empire and the Netherlands' islands are the Philippine Islands under protection of the United States. The island of Guam, tiny American outpost, is 1,500 miles from Tokyo and the same distance from U. S. air and naval bases at Manila. In the event Japan decided to try to take the Netherlands islands, it would face trouble from British and French bases, notably Britain's new "Gibraltar" at Singapore (lower left).

Nazi Official Asserts Germany Behind Hitler

Says British Efforts To Bring About A Split Stupid

Berlin, April 19.—(AP)—British efforts to bring about a split between Adolf Hitler and the German people is "the most stupid phase" of British war politics, propaganda Minister Paul Goebbels said tonight in a radio address on the eve of Hitler's 51st birthday.

Goebbels asserted that in the unity that exists between the Fuehrer and the German people lies the Reich's greatest strength. "The German people laugh at such efforts," Goebbels said.

He added that the British contention that Hitlerism is the main issue of the war, is completely discounted by the German people, which realizes that the existence of the Reich is at stake in that defeat now would mean a disastrous peace.

Greenville Scouts Attend Camporee

Approximately 2,000 boys will pitch their tents at the fifth annual East Carolina council camporee, which began at Kinston on noon today and will continue through 10 o'clock Sunday morning. A large number of Greenville Scouts are attending the annual event.

The purpose of the camporee is to enable the Scouts to put their knowledge into practice by competing for the coveted blue ribbon for over 900 of a possible 1,000 points. Other awards are the red and white ribbons which will be awarded after church on Sunday.

All day Saturday boys will compete in various events, such as first aid, knot-tying, fire-building and numerous other first and second class events.

Elaborate entertainment is being planned by Kinston business and professional men who will serve as judges.

At the last camporee, which was operated on a patrol basis, Greenville made a splendid showing, winning five trophies. The Tiger patrol of Troop 33 is the only patrol in Greenville and one of the few patrols that won blue ribbons at the last two camporees. This year Greenville will send 12 patrols and several scouts who will assist the judges.

Executive John J. Sigwald of Wilson will be in charge of the affair. George W. Thomason, former assistant executive will assist Mr. Sigwald.

Nazis Claim To Be Steadily Strengthening Hold on Norway By Consolidating Positions; Allied Seacraft Reported Sunk; Norwegian Minister Ordered From Berlin

Berlin, April 19.—(AP)—Steady advances in Norway by constantly reinforced German troops and new blows against the British navy were reported to the nation today on the eve of its celebration of Adolf Hitler's 51st birthday.

Officially reported successes included: At sea — three allied submarines were destroyed in the Skaggrak and Kattegat and a submarine was sunk and British warships and transports hit in a German air attack North of German-occupied Narvik in far Northern Norway. A Norwegian torpedo boat was destroyed.

On land — positions are being consolidated in far-flung sectors in Norway, ranging from the region near Oslo to Narvik.

In the diplomatic field — Germany ordered the Norwegian minister to Berlin to leave the German capital today, an action tantamount to breaking off diplomatic relations with the Royal Norwegian government.

In the Narvik sector, North of which British have landed forces, the Germans reported their own land forces had occupied the island of Flato and were tightening their hold on the iron ore between Narvik and the Swedish border.

The high command enlarged upon an earlier report that a British cruiser had been torpedoed North of the Shetlands.

Concludes Cases On Slot Machines

Several slot machine cases were removed from the Superior court docket today when L. B. McCormick, co-defendant in each, tendered a plea of guilty and was fined \$250 and taxed with the costs.

No evidence was presented against the defendants, but Mr. McCormick took the stand and related that after the Flanagan act came into law he withdrew all machines covered by the act, but that after the last General Assembly modified the act he placed such machines as he believed to be legal in public places.

He also declared that he placed the machines only after conferring with members of the attorney general's office.

An order was signed instructing the sheriff to confiscate and destroy the machines.

The Grand Jury, completed its work, submitted its report and adjourned at today's session. The usual report stated that county offices and institutions had been visited and all found to be in good shape.

A committee was appointed to look into guardianships in the county and to make a report when the grand jury reconvenes next week.

One-Third of Convicts Attend Prison Schools

Raleigh, April 19.—One out of every three North Carolina convicts takes advantage of the chance offered him to go to school during his term of confinement.

As an outstanding result of this willingness, even eagerness, to learn 315 illiterate prisoners have been taught to read and write within the past year.

Even more would have learned at least the rudiments of the "three R's" if the opportunity had been open to them, it is shown by figures given your reporter by J. Loy Sox, educational director of the prison division.

During the current school year, the Six figures show, 34 schools were conducted in as many convict camps over the state, the prison division working in close cooperation with the statewide WPA adult education program, which furnished 60 teachers to instruct the 1,447 prisoners who enrolled in the schools.

EXPENDITURES OF CAMPAIGN TO BE PROBED

Sen. Gillette of Senate Committee Calls Meeting

MAY INVOLVE SEVERAL STATES

Capitol Politicians Meanwhile Express Interest In Hoey's Support of Secretary Hull

Washington, April 19.—(AP)—The Senate Campaign investigating committee today ordered an investigation of complaints that "excessive sums of money" were being spent in behalf of some aspirants for the presidency.

Senator Gillette (D-Iowa), committee chairman, said that the complaints had been received "from apparently reliable sources."

He declined to name the candidates or the party involved, but said that thus far charges affected only one party.

The committee approved a motion instructing Gillette to assign investigators to study complaints, the source of which was not disclosed.

"I have not yet acted," Gillette told reporters, "but I will act."

Gillette said the group would consider complaints that large sums of money had been spent in several states. He added that some charges had been received from Nebraska, but because they contained such inadequate information he had asked for "specifications and particulars."

Another complaint, which the committee would consider, he said, charged "improper use of patronage and official influence in Missouri. The committee would decide, he said, whether this complaint warranted the dispatch of a subcommittee to Missouri for hearings.

Capitol politicians meanwhile were interested in the announcement of Governor Clyde R. Hoey of North Carolina that he favored Secretary of State Hull for president.

Hoey said at Raleigh, N. C., he had very good reasons to believe that North Carolina would support Hull and expressed the hope that North Carolina's 26 votes in the Democratic Convention would go to the cabinet member.

Hull has kept aloof from the pre-convention presidential campaign and is reported to have urged friends not to press his name for the nomination.

Churchill Praises Hardy's Survivors

London, April 19.—(AP)—Winston Churchill told the survivors of the destroyer Hardy tonight that they were "the vanguard of the armies which we and our French allies will use during the summer to purge and cleanse the soil of the Vikings, the soil of Norway, from the filthy pollution of Nazi tyranny."

The first lot of the Admiralty spoke at a welcome to about 100 men of the Hardy, back from Narvik, where their ship was grounded in the first battle of that far northern Norwegian port on April 10.

The Hardy's crew, which landed near Narvik when the rest of the British flotilla withdrew after the combat and maintained themselves against German occupation of the port, later were rescued by other British warships and were returned to England.

HULL SAYS HE'S NO CANDIDATE

Secretary of State Emphatic In Latest Statement

Washington, April 19.—(AP)—Secretary Hull, whose name often has figured in speculation over possible democratic presidential nominees, said today he was not a candidate for anything.

The secretary told reporters emphatically that he had no political aspirations.

He spoke after his attention was called to the fact that Governor Clyde R. Hoey of North Carolina yesterday endorsed him for the nomination.

The secretary of state said he had requested persons interested in any phase of the matter not to say anything or do anything contrary to the position he had assumed, which he previously had described as no political aspirations and in no sense a candidate.

Parents - Teachers Adopt Resolution

High Point, April 19.—(AP)—A retirement system for school employees, the addition of a 12th year to the school curriculum and the raising of the compulsory education age limit to 16 years was advocated today among resolutions passed by the State Parent-Teachers Association Congress in the final session of its 21st annual convention.

Dr. Clyde Erwin, state superintendent of public instruction, urged better teaching training, adequate salaries for teachers, mental hygiene programs for parents and teachers and expansion of vocational education.

Dr. Erwin said that the entire program of education can be extended as the WPA adult education program expands over the state, or should this program be curtailed he hopes that the state will eventually make available funds to conduct the schools.

Courses in the prison schools are either elementary or vocational, no emphasis whatever being placed on the "frills and furbelows" of education. By far the big majority of classes are in grades up to the seventh, though there are a few.

puts Netherlands On Military Rule

The Hague, April 19.—(AP)—Martial law was proclaimed throughout The Netherlands by royal decree today.

The decree, effective immediately, was issued after Premier Dorek Jan de Geer had announced in a broadcast to the homeland and overseas colonies that such a step was being taken to "anchor more solidly" the government's position in the face of external and internal dangers.

BRITISH SHIP DAMAGED
London, April 19.—(AP)—Damaging of the 1,400-ton destroyer Eclipse in a German bombing attack was disclosed today with the announcement the vessel had reached her base.

FULL DETAILS NOT REVEALED

Foes Reported, However, To Have Come To Grips In Phase of War That May Decide Outcome of European Strife; German Forces Increased Daily; Netherlands To Resist Interference

(By The Associated Press)

The land forces of Great Britain and Germany today finally appeared to have come to grips in Norway, opening up a phase of combat which probably will decide the fate of Scandinavia and perhaps with it the outcome of the European war.

A Norwegian government official in London estimated that 2,000 German troops were being flown daily to Norway; other sources estimated 60,000 German soldiers now had reached the kingdom. There were no estimates of the British soldiers.

With the war swirling around The Netherlands, Prime Minister Dorek Jan de Geer told his nation that martial law, already in effect in considerable areas, would be extended to the whole country and proclaimed that it would resist with arms any attempt of outside powers to extend protective help to it.

"We ourselves are perfectly able as well as determined to protect our neutrality," he said.

The Tommies, the British war office announced, who had landed in Norway and joined forces with Norwegian troops were reported today to have clashed with the German army at Namsos on the Atlantic coast, 100 miles north of the key city of Trondheim from which the Germans apparently had been rushed to halt their enemy.

The report said that the Germans had been repulsed.

The usual military secrecy hid the size of the opposing forces.

The meeting has been going on for the past 10 nights, and the attendance and interest has been good. The male quartet, will sing again tonight, and there will also be congregational singing led by James Ray Pittman. The public is invited to the service.

Confidence Voted In French Premier

Paris, April 19.—(AP)—The Chamber of Deputies tonight gave the government of Premier Paul Reynaud a unanimous vote of confidence.

The vote, 504 to 0, came in a public session immediately after a secret debate on general government policies and the conduct of the war.

It was the second vote of confidence for Reynaud's cabinet, which took office on March 21. It contrasted sharply with the first vote on March 22, in which there was only a one-vote majority.

Raleigh, April 19.—Babe Ruth, when baseball's brightest star, always liked to knock off from his job to play with a bunch of kids in a pasture; and there is now in the operatic firmament at least one shining light who must have something the same rollicking ideas of a good time.

Norman Cordon, who has sung a mighty mean Mephistopheles in many Metropolitan mainfines, is going to enact that same role here May 4 when the Raleigh Little Theater group produces "Faust" in the Needham Broughton auditorium.

It will be the very first time in operatic history, as far as the Raleigh sponsors have been able to determine, that a noted professional opera star has volunteered his service to sing along with an amateur cast in a full-length opera.

Mr. Cordon is a native Tar Heel and as soon as he heard that the local Little Theater folks were planning to present "Faust" he offered

to sing his favorite role. Miss Wilburta Horn of the St. Mary's music faculty is singing Marguerite and Thomas Edwards of the Elon College musical faculty will be Faust. Many of Raleigh's best known singers will be cast in principal parts and in the chorus (which will number 62).

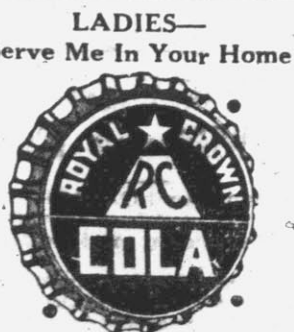

HANGING ROCK 4-H CONTESTS PARK IS OPEN WILL BE HELD

Visitors Allowed Although Project Incomplete

Reflector Bureau.

By HENRY AVERILL
Raleigh, April 19.—Although indications are that Hanging Rock State park in Surry county will not be formally opened to the public this summer, Thomas W. Morse, superintendent of state parks, said today that persons who want to hike along its trails or view the scenery will be permitted to do so.

Formal opening will be delayed because provisions haven't yet been made for an entry road. As a result plans for a formal opening cannot be made until definite steps for completing such a road have been taken.

Practically all the recreational facilities of the park have already been completed, including the artificial lake with sand beach and a large, modern bath house built of native stone. Several miles of roads and trails have also been built within the park, some parking areas have been completed.

Some picnic areas, too, are finished, but the state parks bureau does not plan to encourage use of them until after formal opening of the area, because, Morse said, proper supervision cannot yet be given.

"We shall be glad to have visitors drive through the park on the roads that have been finished and to have them hike along the trails up to the top of the rock—from which there is a splendid view," said Morse. "We wish we were in position to open the park this summer."

Development work is being continued by the park bureau with assistance of a CCC camp located within the park.

Two National Events Announced By State Leader

Raleigh, April 18.—Two national 4-H achievement contests for high-ranking club members of North Carolina were announced today by L. R. Harrill, 4-H club leader of the State College Extension Service. Hereafter this state has not submitted a record in the competition for the president's trophy and the Moses trophy. This year Harrill is anxious that Tar Heel club boys and girls compete against members from other states.

The President's trophy is based on the following score card: the club member's achievement record as shown by record books, or blanks approved by both county and state leaders in charge of club work; a competitive record, listing participation in public demonstrations, judging of health activities, and the making and entering of exhibits.

The use of improved practices as shown by better extension methods used in 4-H club projects; the increase in size of projects, as well as the income; a record of organization, leadership, and initiative; and the club member's own story of project achievement.

The Moses trophy for 4-H leadership will be awarded to the club member scoring highest on the basis of the following: a record of member's club work as shown by record books; a program of his club for the current year; participation in demonstrations and contests; and a story of how the community has been helped by 4-H leadership.

This trophy also calls for an accounting of the development of leadership qualities as shown by the club contestant's record of acting as leader of a club, securing new members, assisting other members, and similar activities.

Washington—The Navy building
press room is one of the busiest
spots in the capital these days

tor, which "on first glance is disap-
pointing because of the inadequacy
of the likeness and of the detailed
forms in the legs and hands, and
the extreme emaciation of the fig-
ure"—undoubtedly would be all
right when these points were de-
veloped.

With this doubtful enthusiasm,
although they said complimentary
things about the possibilities of Mr.
Lawrie's completed statue when it
is set up in the Memorial in the
Tidal Basin, the commission recom-
mended Mr. Lawrie's design award-
ed funds for an additional "revised
sketch model."

From its inception the Jefferson
Memorial has been bumping into
difficulties. The original proposal to
place it in the Tidal Basin, which is
flanked by the Lincoln Memorial
and the Washington monument,

mous cherry trees.

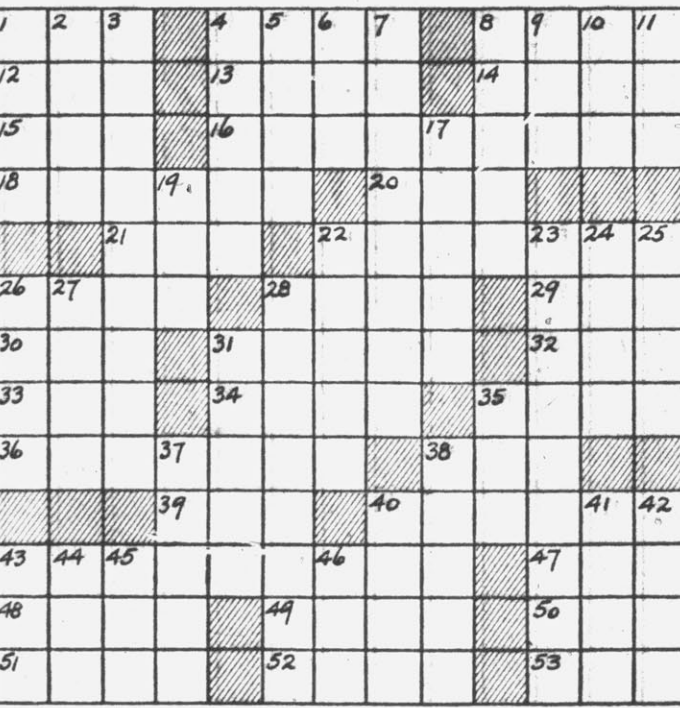
The White House was picketed by

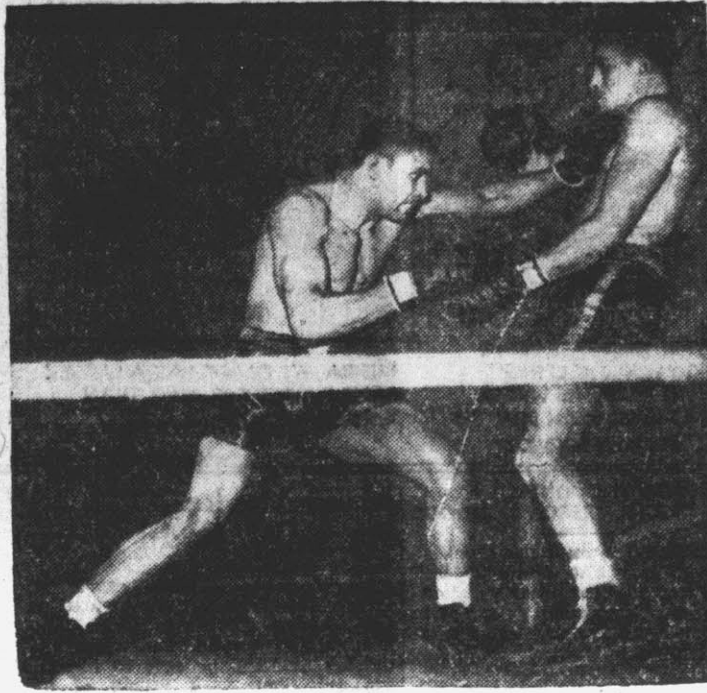

rolled prisoners who desire to take typewriting or some other vocational subject in which a qualified teacher is available they are always allowed to do so.

The entire program is in line with the ardent desire of Mr. Sox and other prison heads to do everything possible toward rehabilitation of the prisoners. From Superintendent of Prisons Oscar Pitts on down, the entire prison staff is placing special emphasis on work of this nature.

Mr. Sox said that cooperation of the WPA adult education leaders has been splendid. He also lauded the fine cooperation of all the camp superintendents where schools have been started.

These superintendents, he said, are doing everything possible to encourage enrollment of the prisoners and to enable them to attend as many classes as possible during the school year.

Plans are being made to extend the system, particularly in the field of vocational instruction, as rapidly and as widely as possible, with the ultimate aim of making school available to every convict serving a term of length enough to justify enrolling him.

Mr. Sox admits that progress along this line is necessarily slow, but is hopeful that in time the objective can be fully attained.
