

MORE THAN 200 DIE IN NEGRO DANCE HALL FIRE

Fear Of Swedish Invasion By Germany Increased By Nazi Troop Embarkations

FORCES LEAVE BALTIC PORTS

Soldiers And Munitions Said To Be Sailing From Harbors Far East Of Routes Normally Used For Transport To Norway; Allies Draft Plans To Counteract Any Invasion

(By The Associated Press) Growing fears of a German invasion of Sweden were expressed today in Paris, where German troops with munitions were reported officially to be embarking at German Baltic ports opposite Sweden.

A French War Ministry spokesman issued the statement and called the embarkations an "evident menace" to Sweden.

He said the Germans were leaving harbors far east of the routes for transport to Norway. The Allied Supreme War Council, meeting in Paris yesterday, drafted plans to counteract any German invasion of Sweden.

DNB, official German news agency, meanwhile, listed 57 British naval units as having been put out of action—29 by sinking or fire—since the beginning of the Scandinavian campaign.

This was an answer to official figures in London acknowledging British losses of only 18 warships, including submarines, for the whole war so far.

The British government informed the House of Commons it had received concrete proposals for a trade agreement recognizing Britain's paramount objective of encircling Germany in an airtight blockade.

Great Britain announced that her bombing planes had attacked five German air bases regarded as "available to the enemy" for use in the invasion of Norway.

The British bombers, said an Air Ministry announcement, streaked out in last night's darkness and attacked the big air base on the North Sea island of Sylt and sank two patrol vessels in the vicinity and also attacked German air bases at Aalborg in Denmark and at the Norwegian cities of Kristiansand, Oslo and Stavanger.

The German high command announced that its troops had "occupied an important position" at Steinkjer, north of Trondheim, on Norway's west coast, shortly after Stockholm advised that reported that British forces driving southward had reached and then returned from the town.

This was one of three principal sections of Norway where German forces were fighting against combined allied and Norwegian troops. The other two were about Narvik, the far northern port and in the vicinity of Lillehammer and Rena, about 80 miles north of Oslo.

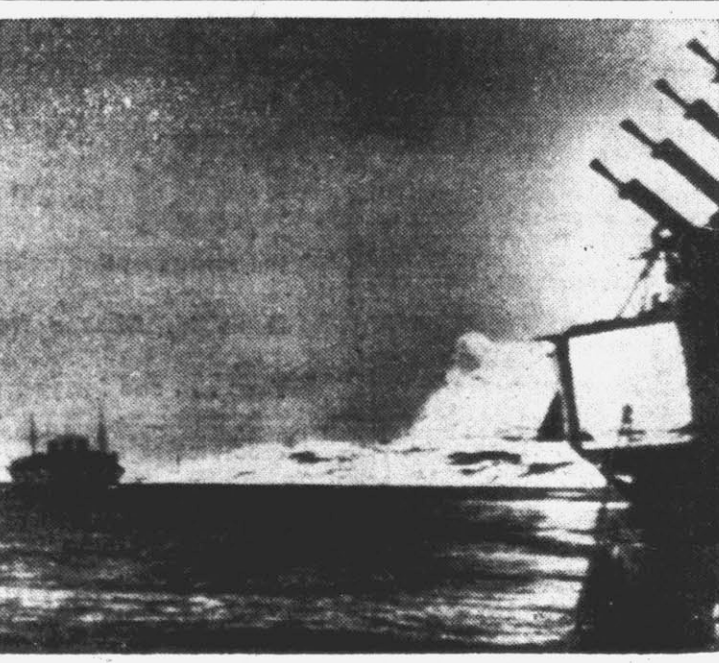
Several Tried At Superior Session

ORDERS STUDY OF N. C. LABOR

Migratory Worker Problem To Be Investigated

Washington, April 24—(AP)—North Carolina's migratory worker problem and its effect on communities where it is prevalent will be studied by a special house committee of five authorized to investigate the situation in the nation as a whole.

Rep. Tolson (D-Calif.), sponsor of the investigation, which was prompted by the migratory worker problem in this state, said studies by the Works Progress Administration and the Farm Security Administration indicated the situation in North Carolina too might be serious.

He said these studies pointed to the strawberry fields of southeastern North Carolina and the potato growing section in the northeastern part of the state as "sore spots." Tolson estimated that between 15,000 to 20,000 migratory workers were attracted to the strawberry belt at picking season, whereas the

Total of 134 Others Accused By The Grand Jury

Detroit, April 24—(AP)—Richard W. Reading, former mayor of Detroit, and 134 other persons were indicted today by a county grand jury, which charged graft and corruption, conspiracy in the operation of a lottery and numbers rackets. Twenty-eight others were named as co-conspirators, but not defendants.

Named with Reading were Prosecutor Duncan C. McCreary and Harry Colburn, his chief investigator already under indictment on charges of attempting to protect gambling in the operation of illegal enterprises in Wayne county (Detroit).

Others listed in today's indictment, third to be returned by Circuit Judge Homer Ferguson, sitting as a one-man grand jury, are present or former members of the city police department and a group of individuals named specifically as operating numbers and policy rackets.

GUFFEY LEADS OVER FOES IN PENNSYLVANIA

Steady Increase Seen In New Dealer's Margin

GREATEST VOTE POLLED BY FDR

Dewey Leads As Republican Choice In Heavier Totals Piled Up By Members Of His Party

Philadelphia, April 24.—(AP)—Senator Joseph F. Guffey, down-the-line supporter of the new deal, held a steadily widening lead today for Democratic nomination for United States senator in Pennsylvania primary which gave President Roosevelt a heavy test vote.

The President's name was placed on a presidential preference ballot by the Democratic state committee, which endorsed him for a third term.

Guffey never lost his early lead over his chief rival, Walter A. Jones, Pittsburgh oil man, who was supported by the Democratic state chairman and other leaders.

Unofficial returns from 5,426 of the state's 8,105 districts gave Guffey 269,538; Jones 212,764; and William H. McNair 35,457.

The count from 3,303 districts gave the President 263,303 votes—the highest received by any candidate on the Democratic ballot.

Thomas E. Dewey of New York swung far ahead in write-in votes on the Republican presidential preference ballot.

Republicans with a registration of 2,572,100 to the Democrats' 2,046,129 were polling heavier totals. Republican organization backed candidates won by wide margins.

Leading the slate Philadelphia City Chairman Jay Cooke added steadily to his lead over his chief opponent for Republican nomination for United States senator, Albert H. Laddner, Philadelphia attorney.

Unofficial returns from 4,928 of 8,105 districts gave Cooke 454,968; Laddner 134,021.

Unwonted speed characterized the action of the House banking committee in approving unanimously legislation requested last week by Secretary Morgenthau to clarify Presidential powers to require licensing of transactions in securities of foreign governments and their nationals.

Mr. Roosevelt imposed such a requirement after Denmark and Norway were invaded. Some attorneys questioned whether he had the authority. His legal advisors said that he did, but that it would be well to clinch it with special legislation.

Washington, April 24—(AP)—Fred M. Howe, who said he had been "kicked out of office" in a marine radio union, told the Dies committee today that "high officials" of the American Communication Association (CIA) were Communists who planned to help set up a Soviet system in this country in event of war.

He testified also that he had seen a man named Stano, whom he identified as a Communist, in the radio room of the yacht Sealcloud, owned by Joseph E. Davies, former United States ambassador to Belgium and Russia.

WAR ACTIVITY REPORTS VARY

Berlin And London Claim Advantages In Conflict

Berlin, April 24—(AP)—German authorities announced today that all southern Norway between Oslo and Stavanger was under control of the German army and that the Reich's air and sea forces had taken heavy toll of the British navy in the Norwegian campaign.

The high command reported that three British planes had been shot down southwest of Stavanger in an attempt to bomb that port, 200 miles southwest of Oslo.

German reconnaissance planes, the high command said, had discovered large units of the British fleet approaching Narvik, Norway, far northern port, apparently planning more extensive troop landings in that area.

Austrian Alpine troops were reported ready to fight them.

London, April 24—(AP)—The war office announced today that British troops in the Trondheim area had beaten off a strong German counter attack "after some sharp fighting" yesterday and had reestablished their lines.

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FLAGS PLACED IN PITT COURT

Judge Pless Praises Officials For Such Action

Two large, beautiful, hand-embroidered silk flags, United States and North Carolina, adorned the Judge's day of the Pitt county court room as Superior court was resumed following the luncheon recess this afternoon.

The flags were placed in position, the North Carolina flag to the judge's left and the United States banner to his right, during the noon recess.

Placement of the flags in the court room was suggested by the North Carolina Council of Judges.

Each banner is four and one-third by five feet, attached to 10-foot brass-trimmed stands capped by solid brass eagles.

Although Judge J. Will Pless, Jr., of Marion, who is presiding over the session of court, had no advance warning the flags were being placed in the court room, he made a stirring talk immediately before resuming business of the tribunal.

"I think it is entirely fitting that the court take notice of the fact that the county officials have installed flags here at the judge's bench," declared Judge Pless, addressing the solicitor and gentlemen (Continued on Page Six)

SEEKS PASSAGE AS NOW DRAFTED

Sen. Vandenberg Describes Tennessee Project as Ludicrous As Florida's Ship Canal

Washington, April 24.—(AP)—Senate flood control and power development advocates were urged today to avoid turning a \$231,000,000 rivers and harbors bill into a grab bag for their favored projects, lest in doing so they should imperil the entire measure.

The plea was entered by Chairman Bailey (D-N.C.) of the Senate Commerce committee, who asked passage of the authorization bill which in its present form, is devoted solely to navigation improvements. Bailey told his colleagues it would provide a seven-year program starting in 1941.

But, he argued, if Senators sponsoring various non-navigation projects for flood control or power sought to load these onto the measure it chances of passage might be threatened.

One of the works which is included already in a \$66,000,000 proposed waterway connecting the Tennessee and Tombigbee rivers. Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) termed this "just as ludicrous as the Florida ship canal."

Mrs. Yetta Shure, 55, wife of Samuel Shure, died at her home in Bethel at 8:15 o'clock this morning following several days of illness. She had been in declining health for a number of years.

Mrs. Shure had lived in Bethel for the past three years, having moved there from Rocky Mount. The body will be taken to Brooklyn, N. Y., her former home, for burial in the family cemetery there Thursday.

Besides her husband, Mrs. Shure is survived by two sons, Dr. Irving Shure of Bethel and Alvin Shure, medical student at the University of North Carolina; and two sisters, Mrs. Lois Chavis of Brooklyn, and Mrs. Sam Soloff, also of Brooklyn.

Symphonic Chorus Needs Funds For Northern Tour

The Eastern Carolina Symphonic chorus of 45 young singers, which has been commissioned by Governor Hovv as Ambassadors of good will and good music from North Carolina, will give a concert at Jarvis Memorial Methodist church Sunday night preparatory to a northern trip which will include an appearance at the White House.

The northern tour will include concerts at Washington, Baltimore and New York. In order to make this trip, however, which will provide much favorable publicity for Pitt county, it is necessary to raise funds to defray part of the expenses so the members themselves will not have to bear the burden alone. The students have to pay a yearly fee for the vocal music course in the public schools and they receive no financial aid either from the local schools or state. The members have been required to pay their own transportation to the district contests here and the state contest in Greensboro.

Confident that the citizens of Pitt county and Greenville will support them financially in their proposed northern trip, members are appealing for donations. Contributions will be received and acknowledged at either the Chamber of Commerce, the Daily Reflector or the News Leader.

The chorus will appear at the White House at the invitation of Mrs. Roosevelt on May 14. It deserves the invitation and also deserves the financial support of the citizens of this community.

The singers are outstanding members selected from three small Class C high school choruses in Avden, Winterville and Snow Hill. The first two of these three schools are located in Pitt county and are adding a very definite contribution to better choral music in this section. While it is not unusual to have choruses in large city schools where the students have received musical training from the grades up, it is considered remarkable to have a group of chorists from small Class C schools. Many members of the choir come from good, but farm homes of moderate circumstances and are in need of financial help. Most of the expenses for the trip will be paid by the singers themselves, but they are unable to bear the full amount.

HEARINGS SET FOR SATURDAY

Sunday Scrape To Be Aired In Magistrate Court

Charges of assault with a deadly weapon are scheduled to be aired Saturday against six defendants allegedly involved in the fight and shooting scrape off the Washington highway Sunday which resulted in the death of Hubert Harrington.

The six are to be given a preliminary hearing before Magistrate H. L. Jenkins at 10 o'clock Saturday morning. The six are V. T. Harrell, Jesse Whitaker, Frank Harrington, Fountain Harrington, Dewey Brooks and Earl Speight.

V. T. Harrell was released from the county jail under bond of \$100 this morning. Jesse Whitaker, however, remains in the jail.

Meanwhile, the condition of Bennie Harrell, who was allegedly shot in the leg by Dewey Brooks, was described by hospital authorities to be "satisfactorily and showing improvement."

Bennie Harrell is alleged to have fatally shot Hubert Harrington and the charge is now in the hands of the grand jury.

The fights and shootings occurred Sunday afternoon about 5 o'clock when a group of eight men is alleged to have invaded a poker game being played by a group in a field off the highway.

After the luncheon tables were removed, Mrs. White asked Mrs. J. L. Fleming to introduce the speaker of the occasion, her long-time friend, Mrs. Lyman Cotten, which she did in a most fitting manner. Mrs. Fleming explained to those who had not known Mrs. Cotten before that she is claimed by Greenville club women as one of their own since she was the daughter-in-law of Mrs. Sallie Southall Cotten, the much beloved "Mother Cotten" to the club women of this town and state, and because she, herself, has been with the clubs at various times in the past.

Mrs. Cotten responded most graciously, then began with her subject "Old Houses of North Carolina." She used as a basis of her talk large and beautiful photographs of first homes in North Carolina, mostly in Eastern Carolina. These photographs were taken by Miss Frances D. Johnston, who obtained a grant through the Carnegie Foundation for the work. Mr. and Mrs. John Sprunt Hill of Durham bought and gave these beautiful pictures to the University of North Carolina, specifying that they be put in the Southern Historical collection. The films of these pictures have been given to the Library of Congress for safe-keeping. Mrs. Cotten, who is doing research work for the Southern Historical Collection, has worked in co-operation with Miss Johnston in getting information on many of the homes, hundreds of letters being required to obtain this information.

The first photograph she showed was of the Old Betts farm very near the North Carolina-Virginia line. Nothing whatever has been learned of the beginnings of this house, except that certain types of architecture point to the fact that it was probably built about 200 years ago. Her second picture was of St. Thomas Church at Bath, built in 1734, which is being restored at present and which, it is hoped, will soon be one of our religious shrines.

Others were the Cupola House at Edenton, which was built during the middle of the 18th century, St. Paul's at Edenton, the second oldest church in the state, the Court House in Edenton, which is the perfect type of 18th century architecture and which, Mrs. Cotten thinks, is the loveliest and best paneled room in America, which she has seen; the beautiful gates of the Hayes house and the building of the Academy in Craven county, built in 1807, which was the first school of its type in America.

Beautiful pictures of New Bern homes naturally followed, among the loveliest being those of doors, elegant stairways built about 1800, the Presbyterian church which was planned by Sir Christopher Wren and built in 1820 and the lovely hallway of the Smallwood house.

Nearer home, she brought us by showing Bracebridge Hall, a neo-classic structure built in 1826 by Governor Elias Carr's father. Then Mrs. Cotten took us to Forsyth county and showed many of the lovely things of Winston-Salem, many of which reflect the Bohemian influence, for instance, the hooded entrances built about 1780, the Washington Tavern, Chimney House and the first church near Salem College.

Many other places were shown by Mrs. Cotten and many of them demonstrated clearly that a concerted effort must be made to preserve the few lovely old houses which still stand in North Carolina. Some of the handsome mantels and woodwork of past years are in houses of decay and ruin, others have been sold into other states. In closing Mrs. Cotten read a letter from a former descendant of the owners of

Prospect Hill, telling of the glories of the past of the family and the house and of its far reaching inspiration of houses in other states. This is probably typical of many other houses.

At the close of the talk a surprise came to the club members in the form of many beautiful prizes. The door prize, a handsome vase of flowers, was given by Mrs. Wylie Brown. To Mrs. D. J. Whichard, Jr., the only club member present whose birthday happened to be on April 23, went a beautiful cake with its sixteen lighted candles. Mrs. W. I. Wooten, who drew low number—on her place card, also received a beautiful cake. Mrs. Cotten, who had high number, was given silk hose. To the San Souci and Chatham Clubs went Scrap Books for high attendance at the luncheon.

This occasion was truly delightful and inspiring, and it is hoped that another such day will be planned for next and other years. The meeting closed with the singing of a most appropriate song. As the guests departed they again stopped by the well—a magic well—for this time it produced a delicious punch.

Favors Promotion Of Public Health

Albemarle, April 24.—"Everything possible should be done for the advancement of public health in North Carolina," State Senator Lee Gravely, a candidate for governor, told members of the Albemarle Lions club at their regular luncheon session here today.

"The state has taken over the cost of the eight-months school term for every child, no matter how humble his circumstances," the Rocky Mount business man candidate asserted, "and we have assumed the obligation for the construction and maintenance of a great road system. Thus, it behooves us to concern ourselves more intimately with preserving the great foundation of everything else—public health."

Senator Gravely envisaged success in the undertaking through "extending the fullest protection against disease and disaster to every classroom in the state."

The speaker also expressed hope for closer cooperation between the counties and the state in the battle against tuberculosis. All beds are needed, he declared, and every effort should be made to see that every available bed is put to good use.

Conclude Program On Oral Hygiene

It was announced at the health department today that the state-county dental program carried on for the past six weeks in the colored schools and conducted by J. H. Barnhill was concluded on last Friday.

A summary of the work follows: Number of schools visited, 21; children inspected, 821; children treated, 323; referred to local dentists, 40; fillings, 186; treatments, silver nitrate, 247; extractions, 126; teeth cleaned, 323; lectures on oral hygiene, 34; total attendance at lectures, 877.

The health officer, Dr. N. Thomas Ennett, expressed the opinion that dental work in the schools is one of the most important pieces of preventive medicine in the health department's program. He stated that Dr. Barnhill worked in Pitt county for several years and that his work was always of a high order.

Books Sought For Reading Room

Miss Sadie Brewer, adjutant in charge of Salvation Army work in Greenville, today issued a call for all used books in good condition to be placed in the reading room of the Salvation Army hall on Dickinson avenue.

The books are to be used by boys and girls from five to 18 years of age. The boys gather in the reading room each day in the week except Wednesdays, when the hall is devoted to girls' activities. The reading room has proved popular and Salvation Army officials are attempting to make it even more popular by stocking it with additional books.

The reading room is directed by Louis Gordon. Persons having appropriate books they are willing to donate to this cause are urged to telephone Adjutant Brewer at 2324 and someone will be sent for them.

Holding Revival At Salvation Army Hall

Mrs. Euvy Cook of Elizabeth City is conducting revival services at the local Salvation Army hall which began yesterday and will be continued through May 5.

Miss Cooke before joining the Salvation Army was an evangelist. The public is invited to attend the services, which also will be featured by special music.

Methodist Church In First Session

Atlantic City, April 24.—(AP)—Seven hundred and seventy-six delegates from all over the world, half of the ministers and the other half laymen, began in the municipal auditorium here today the first general conference of the year-old Methodist church.

For three weeks they will study the first quadrennial message from the Council of Bishops, sift 105 "memorials" from individual Methodists and groups of Methodists and adopt legislation to strengthen administration of a far-flung spiritual empire.

They will coordinate women's work in the church, decide whether to continue, modify or discard several "youth" organizations inherited from the three previously estranged branches of Methodism and they will review, but probably won't change the articles of doctrine bequeathed to Methodists by John Wesley back in the eighteenth century.

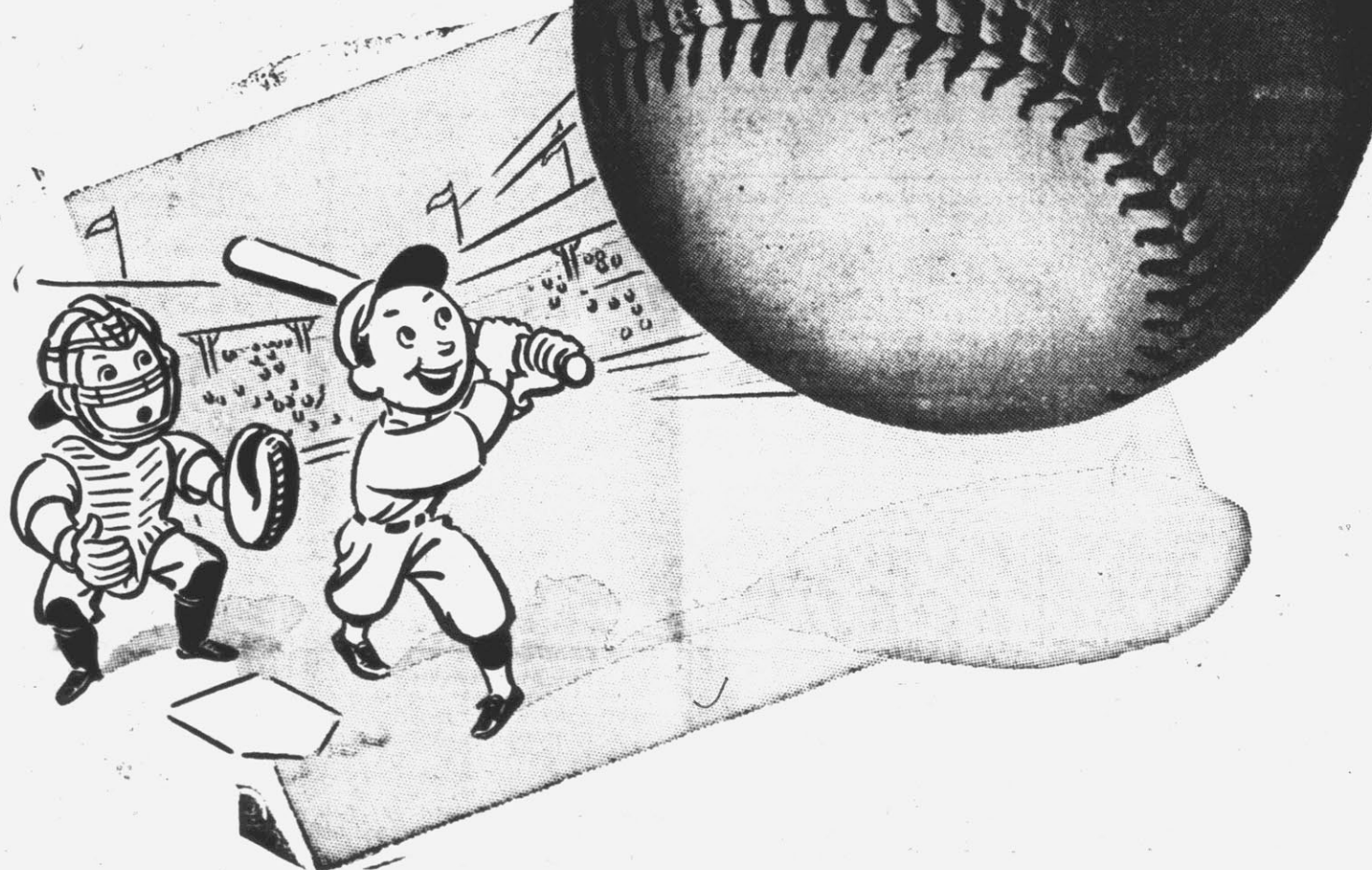

Washington Daybook

Washington—News item: Presi-
dent Roosevelt expresses approval of
people of the United States who
show an interest in studying up on
Greenland.

Reason: (Mostly capital con-
jecture) Greenland belongs to Den-
mark. The Germans take over Den-
mark. Greenland is in the western
hemisphere in which the United
States would resist foreign in-
vasion should the Monroe Doctrine be
invoked. Also some situation might
develop similar to that in the Virgin
Islands in 1916 when the United
States told the Danes they would be
mighty smart to sell them to us
for \$25,000,000. The Danes thought
so, too.

Okmulgee Has More Folks
Greenland, an area of 827,275
square miles, would just about fit
over the states of Texas, New Mexi-
co, Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska,
North and South Dakota. It has a
total population of 16,630, slightly
less than the last official popula-
tion of Okmulgee, Okla. Of these,
403 are Danes, the rest Eskimos
and half-breeds.

The whole interior of Greenland
is covered with ice, in some places
a mile to a mile-and-a-half thick.
Its western shore (the habitable
area) is divided into two inspector-
ates. Godthaab is capital of the
south; Godhavn of the northern.

Julianshaab is its most southern
town. From there it's only a seven-
to-nine hour bomber flight to the
coasts of Canada, northeastern
United States, and Great Britain.

One of my sources says it has
about 60 settlements; another says
it has about 175. Take your pick.
The Danes and a few of the Eski-
mo high-mucky-mucks live in wood-
en houses. The rest in huts.

Flowers And Icebergs

The whole of the island if you
can call a hunk of land like that an
island has two monthly newspa-
pers. They are printed in Green-
landish, which is outlandish Eskimo.
The summers (but don't park
your parka last from April to Sep-
tember. Mostly, the whole summer
is daylight. There are flowers then
lots of them—about 400 kinds.
With some of its better glaciers
running from 25 to 50 miles across,
Greenland is the home of the ice-
bergs that float down the Labrador
current to worry skippers in the
north Atlantic.

It's also the home of the auk
Ditto the elder (for elderdown)
ducks, seals, reindeer and snowgo-
ing jackrabbits. It also has a good
share of the world's polar bears
that are not in zoos.

Hunt, Fish, Pay Taxes

Its principal industries are whal-
ing, sealing, hunting, fishing, and
mining cryolite in the mines at
Ivittut. Cryolite is an almost trans-
parent mineral, among the by-prod-
ucts of which is aluminum.

The prices of everything in
Greenland are fixed. One-sixth of
the one-sale price of all outgoing
products is taken for government.
There's no other tax.

Umanak is the most northern set-
tlement and one of the most north-
ern in the world. Up there, in
summer, the gardens grow radishes,
broccoli, lettuce and sometimes
turnips—but no parsley.

Unlike spots I could name, Green-
land admits that its weather is al-
ways uncertain. Dense fogs blot out
the sunshine while your back is
turned. The rainstorms are well-
batters. And the blizzards... well,
just Arctic.

The people are kindly, jovial, honest
and intelligent. Crime is so close
to unknown that there's not a po-
liceman in the land. The only
drunks are sailors who come on the
boats that visit Greenland from
May to November. The main social
function is the kaffemik—coffee
party. To the Greenlanders, its cock-
tails at the Ritz.

Greenland costs Denmark about
\$150,000 a year.
But if somebody doesn't send
boats up there this summer, Green-
land's population won't hold a blub-
ber candle to Okmulgee's by 1941.

THIRTEEN MEN PURE ROOKIES

Two Veterans And Four Service Men On Club

Skipper Rube Wilson, although "determined to do the best we can with the material we have," was anything but optimistic today on the eve of the opening of the Coastal Plain season, as he cut his roster down to the 18-man limit. The limit will be cut to 15 after 20 days.

The Greenies open with Wilson at Guy Smith park here tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 o'clock and Ray Goodman, league president, advised club officials last night he would be here for the contest.

This year's edition of the Greenies can rightfully be called "Rube's Rookies," as 13 men on the roster are Simon Pure rookies, never having played in any league of professional ball before. Although the team is allowed three veterans, or players with unlimited experience, the Greenies will open with only two, the Skipper himself and Freddy Caliguri, pitcher, who took a turn in the field last year when the locals were hard hit by injuries and made a good showing in chasing flies and at bat. Manager Wilson is counting on Freddy to turn in some wins for the Greenies this season as he is the only veteran hurler on the roster. Last year Freddy won eight games and lost four.

Greenville will start the season with three limited service men. Morris Wilson, another pitcher, who was at first thought to be a veteran, is only a limited service man, a check on his records revealed this week. Wilson was with Greenville part of last season, winning 12 and losing eight games. He is slated to start on the mound for the locals tomorrow.

Harry Jenkins, third sacker last year, will be back at his old stand. He is a limited service player, having entered professional baseball with Greenville near the close of the season in 1938. Harry has been looking good this year and his hitting is showing improvement over last year when he looked good one day and terrible the next.

The local's third unlimited service man is Phil Green of Boston, Mass., the only pitcher on the Greenville hurling staff.

As previously shown only four members of last year's pace-setting team are back this year. Manager Wilson, Pitchers Wilson and Caliguri and Harry Jenkins. All in all it looks as if the Greenies of 1940 will be a far cry from the team of last year.

Manager Wilson said he did not even have a veteran in mind to attain the full quota of unlimited class men each team is entitled to carry.

Greenville's 13 rookies, all of which Manager Rube admits are almost as unknown to him as to the fans, includes the following pitchers: All right-handers: Bill Teller of Richmond, Va., whom Rube considers as one of his best prospects; Forrest Mines, Greenville lad and son of M. O. Mines, one of the city's most enthusiastic baseball fans and for years a director of the local club; O. D. Curtis of Burlington; Edward Meyer of Pittsburgh.

Two rookie back-stops are on the local rosters: DeLuka of Newark, N. J., and Beckley, who was secured from the Harrisburg Senators, now training in this city.

Rube intends to be back at his first base position and is not counting on doing much, if any, pitching, although last year he took several turns on the mound, winning two and losing two. The pilot figures he will be too busy keeping an eye on the youngsters, for a while at least, to concentrate on the task of pitching.

Arthur "Sonny" Kracke, Brooklyn, N. Y. lad, has the call for second base for the time being at least. Two prospects are still seeking the shortstop position and Skipper Rube was uncertain today which would start tomorrow. They are Leland Watson of Kenly and Gail

New York, April 24.—(AP)—Ralls opened an upward path for the rest of the stock market today, but traders showed great hesitancy in following the lead.

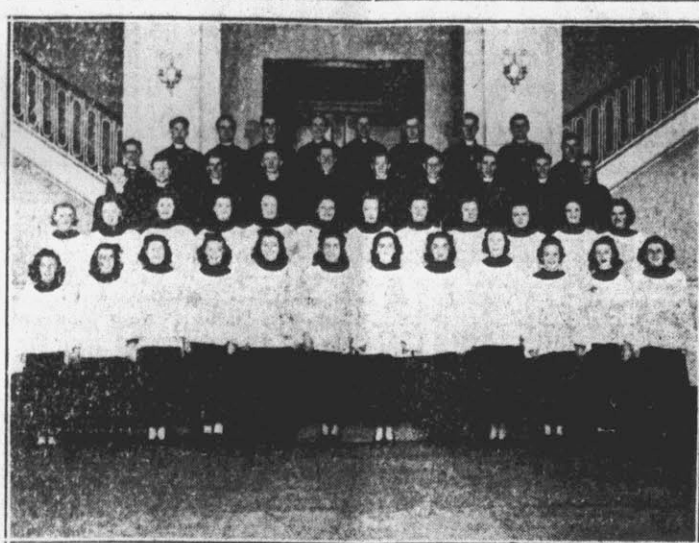
Despite rising tendencies in several categories, including specialties, prices were uneven toward the fourth hour.

Picture At GHS On Diversified Occupations

A moving picture of diversified occupations program min action was shown to the Senior High School assembly yesterday by Coordinator Wallace Bourne. It told the story of the Fayetteville, N. C., diversified occupations program from the time the school committee first thought of it to the successful completion of its first year with 25 students. Scenes showing conferences of local and state officials demonstrated the method of procuring the program and explained just how federal and state vocational education funds are used to support it.

Interesting shots of business houses, shops and factories, showing cooperating businesses and students at work on their apprentice jobs, made graphically clear this extremely practical type of education. To carry the story through, students were shown studying their "related subjects" in school and receiving pay at work.

The picture was made for the Fayetteville schools by J. Duke Haynie, diversified occupations coordinator in that town, who is lending it to Mr. Bourne for showings in Greenville. The Junior Chamber of Commerce is expected to see it at an early date.
