BARDEN PLANS TO LABOR ACT SEEM DOOMED

Predicted Amendments Would Fail In Senate

GEORGIA SOLON URGES DEFEAT

Declares Senate Will Not Adopt Drastic Changes And If It Does FDR Will Veto Them

Washington, April 30.—(AP)—A prediction that the Barden wage-hour amendments would not pass the Senate even if the House approves them was made today by Rep. Tarver (D-Ga.) as he urged the House to defeat the legislation.

Moreover, Tarver forecast that if change in the wage-hour law as "drastic" as those proposed by Rep. Barden (D-N.C.) should finally be passed by both branches of Congress, they would be vetoed by President Roosevelt.

"If you adopt drastic amendments," Tarver said, "the Senators would not consider them, but even if they did they will not be signed by the President. It would be wise to abandon attempts to pass drastic amendments."

Rep. Cox (D-Ga.) asked whether Tarver believed the Barden proposals were "drastic."

"In some respects I do," Tarver replied. "I will say this, if any legislation that goes as far as the Barden amendments is adopted it will be vetoed by the President."

The amendments by Barden would exempt from both the wage and hour requirements of the law a score of occupations connected with processing of farm commodities.

Duplin Man Granted Reprieve Of 90 Days

Raleigh, April 30.—(AP)—Governor H. H. Gray has granted a 90-day reprieve to Stephen Holland, Duplin county man due to die Friday for the murder of his step son, Parole Commissioner Edwin Gill announced today.

Gill said the reprieve was granted to allow completion of an investigation by the State Bureau of Investigation into conditions surrounding the alleged murder for insurance of the step son, Ray Goodman.

The reprieve automatically sets Holland's new death date on August 16.

Bancroft Moseley On N. C. Insurance Board

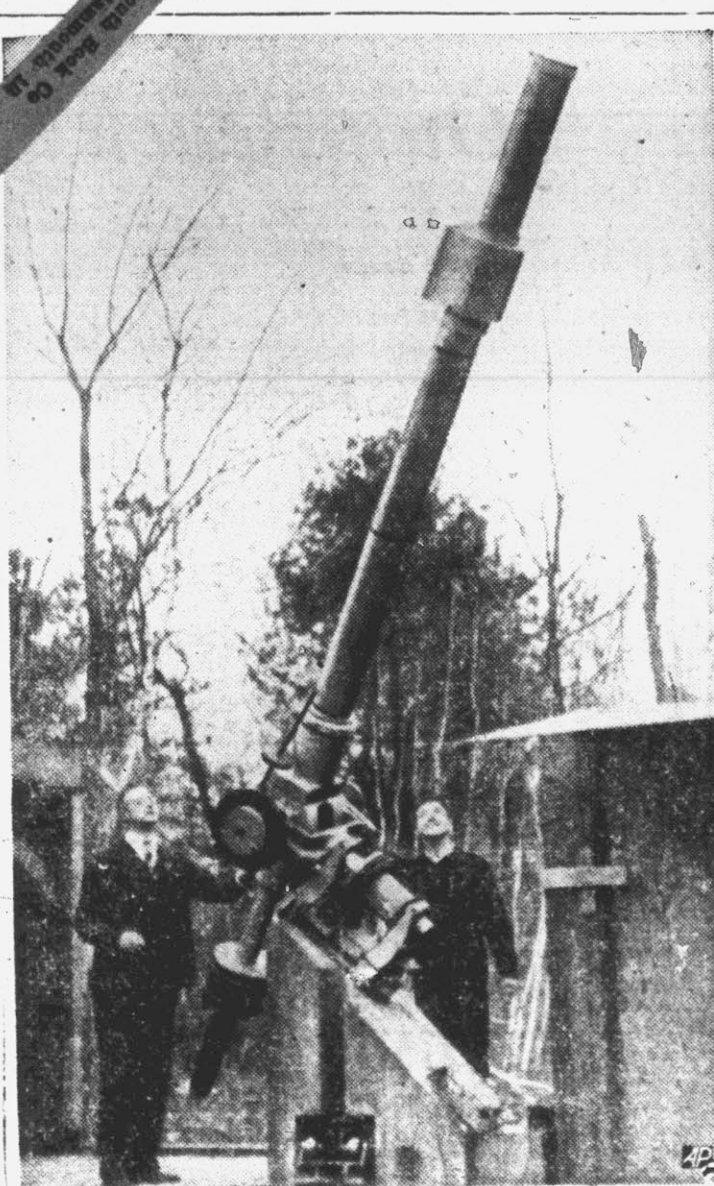

DEATH CLAIMS J. M. HOBGOOD

Rites To Be Held Tomorrow for Farmville Man

Funeral services for James Madison Hobgood, 58, prominent Farmville tobaccoist who died suddenly at his home late yesterday afternoon, will be conducted at the Farmville Presbyterian church tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock.

The services will be conducted by Rev. B. B. Furdham, pastor of the Farmville Baptist church, of which Mr. Hobgood was a member, assisted by Rev. H. M. Wilson, pastor of the Farmville Presbyterian church. Burial will be in Forest Hill cemetery.

Mr. Hobgood was one of the most successful tobacco warehousemen in the state. Although he had suffered heart trouble for several years, he apparently was in his usual health before suffering the attack yesterday.

He was born near Oxford, a son of the late J. M. and Nancy Sheppard Adcock Hobgood. He joined the Baptist church in early boyhood and was a member of the Farmville Baptist church, and a member of the building committee for the new church, now under construction.

Mr. Hobgood was a veteran warehouseman, having been actively engaged in the business for many years. (Continued on Page Six)

Horton Reported Gaining In All Sections of N. C.

Reflector Bureau. By HENRY AVERILL. Raleigh, April 30.—The gubernatorial tide is running strongly in the direction of Lieutenant Governor Wilkins P. Horton, if informants from every part of the state have any real knowledge of local conditions in their sections.

These Horton gains many close observers declare, are assuming proportions sufficiently large to threaten a genuine upset of the political dogpound who have for weeks been generally agreed that J. M. Broughton, Raleigh attorney, was in the No. 1 position to make him a certain entrant into a second primary.

Most analyses of the situation as of today still place Broughton at the top or in a virtual tie with Horton, but some of the keenest of those making these observations believe that if the present trend continues, Broughton will not only finish back of the lieutenant governor but will be behind Allen J. Maxwell and the eight ball so far as his gubernatorial aspirations extend.

There probably are no absolute "neutrals" in word and deed and thought in this campaign and it is quite within the realm of possibility that Horton has done nothing more than secure the largest and loudest collection of claimers. There does seem, however, more than deliberate and Horton-inspired propaganda behind the reports of the lieutenant governor's gain.

The talk of them comes from too many places and persons who are not Horton supporters to discount the whole thing or dismiss the Horton pickup as a myth or figment of fertile imaginations.

One of the significant things about the reports is that within the last few days the very first claims have been made of more than moderate Horton sentiment in the East. Up to the middle of last week there were few, even among the most enthusiastic Horton backers, who assigned him better than fourth place in the sunrise section's voting, while many honestly figured (Continued on Page Six)

FORD ORDERED TO REINSTATE 94 EMPLOYEES

NLRB Ruling Favors Participants In 1937 Strike

WORKERS TO GET FULL BACK PAY

Company Required to Post Notices in Plant That Employees Are Free To Remain In Union

Washington, April 30.—(AP)—The Labor Board ruled today that the Ford Motor company had violated the Wagner act at its St. Louis plant and ordered the company to reinstate, with back pay, 94 employees who participated in a strike in 1937.

The board also ordered the company to bargain upon request with the United Automobile Workers union as the exclusive representative of the St. Louis plant employees.

In addition, the company was ordered to disestablish the St. Louis division of the Liberty Legion of America, Inc. The company, the board declared, had "dominated and interfered" with the formation and administration of the Liberty Legion.

At the same time the labor board dismissed allegations that the Ford company had discriminated against 163 workers other than the 94 ordered reinstated.

Complaints of "unfair labor practices" by the CIO Automobile Workers union in 1937 resulted in an NLRB investigation of the Ford company. This inquiry led up to today's order, which among other things directed the company to post notices advising its workers that they are free to become or remain members of the Auto Workers union if they desire.

Kittrell Out For Aldermanic Board

J. B. Kittrell, who for 30 years has been engaged in the brokerage business in Greenville, today publicly announced his candidacy for alderman from the second ward.

The office is now held by J. A. Walton, who has not made any public statement as to his intention to run for a second term.

A two-way race already is assured for the third ward post, a position being vacated by J. M. Taff, who will seek re-election. The office is being sought by J. D. Simpson, former member of the board and Hoover Taff.

One other post is to be filled at the coming primary election, that of one of the two aldermen from the fourth ward, a post now held by Dr. M. B. Massey, who has not publicly stated his intentions.

Mr. Kittrell has had previous experience in the board. He was named to fill an unexpired term and also was elected for two full terms. He is active in the American Legion, the Rotary club and is a vice president of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce. He also is a past president of the North Carolina Division of the Travelers Protective Association. The candidate expects the distinction of being the only man ever to serve two terms as president of the Greenville Rotary club.

Was Named On Staff Despite Inexperience

Washington, April 30.—(AP)—A 27-year-old lawyer told the House committee investigating the Lager board today that he was appointed to the board's staff of review attorneys two months after his admission to the bar at Chicago.

The witness, Roscoe L. Barrow, a native of LaGrange, N. C., testified that he was graduated from law school in 1938, was admitted to the bar in December of the same year. In response to questions by committee counsel, Edmund M. Toland, Barrow said he never had engaged in the practice of law.

Sent To Federal Pen On Whiskey Charges

Raleigh, April 30.—(AP)—Judge I. M. Meekins in federal court today sentenced Claiborne W. Woodall of Johnston county to 18 months in the federal penitentiary for a year and a day after a guilty plea to being a party to transporting 55 gallons of non-tax paid whiskey.

Junius Lofton and Ruffin Lofton, both of Wayne county, were given 18 months each for liquor violations. Edward Merriman of Vance county was sentenced to three years in Atlanta for violation of the national auto theft act.

Great Britain Concedes Reversals On All Fronts

NAZIS CONNECT TWO KEY BASES

German High Command Reports Its Forces Have Established Land Connections Between Oslo And West Coast Port Of Trondheim; Claims Allies Retreating On All Fronts

Berlin, April 30.—(AP)—The German high command announced today that German forces in Norway have established land connections between their main bases at Oslo, the capital in the south, and the west coast port of Trondheim.

A brief communique said: "German troops advancing north from Oslo via Trondheim and south from Trondheim met today in the railroad suburb of Støren."

"Land connection between Oslo and Trondheim is thereby established."

Earlier the high command had announced that German troops advancing toward Dombas, 80 miles south of Støren, had forced the Allies to retreat all about the line.

If the German line established between Oslo and Trondheim can be maintained and deepened, British concentrations at Andalsnes and Namsoy can be cut off from each other by land.

The German army also is now in a much improved position if sufficient troops are at hand to strengthen its forces at Trondheim for drives against British forces in the coastal regions to the north and south.

Control Of Southern Norway At Stake



A battle, which may decide control of southern Norway, shaped up in the Dombas section as a German column struck the railroad at Hjerikinn (1), menacing an allied force at Støren (2) with a pincers action. Hungary Sends Warning To German Protectorate

Budapest, April 30.—(AP)—Hungary today warned Slovakia, a protectorate of Germany, that she would "not hesitate to act in defense of her national honor" if the rights of the Hungarian minority in Slovakia are not respected.

The government declaration, read by Count Istvan Csaky, minister of foreign affairs to the upper house of Parliament, warned Slovakia against "hiding behind the German guarantee" of her independence, "because we fully believe in the stability of Hungarian-German friendship."

Csaky's declaration said the present position of the Hungarian minority in Slovakia must be quickly remedied and that Hungary was "now at the limit of her patience."

Csaky's declaration, after asserting that Hungary had tried its best to establish neighborly relations with Slovakia, said that Hungary wishes to play her part in consolidating European tranquility, but "there is a limit when the cup runs over."

Merchants Begin Drive Aimed At Clean Streets

The Greenville Merchants Association, special committee on "Cleaner Streets" today went into action at a meeting held in the association offices.

The special committee is asking the citizens of Greenville to cooperate with city officials by refraining from throwing trash on the streets, explaining that the Merchants Association, city officials and other organized efforts would be useless without the cooperation of the public.

The committee is composed of J. C. Waldrop, chairman, Berry Boston and Thomas E. Wilson.

The committee issued the following statement directed at the general public, following its meeting: "Several weeks ago it was called to the attention of the Association that our downtown streets were not so clean. This is largely attributed to the citizens of the town throwing trash on the streets and the children going through the trash boxes in the rear of the places of business and scattering loose paper. We are asking the cooperation of every man, woman and child to help keep Greenville clean in that they be careful and not throw trash on the streets. When you get your mail do not open it and throw papers and circulars on the streets. We want visitors to Greenville to say that we have a good clean city."

Mayor Spain and C. K. Beatty, street superintendent, are putting forth every effort possible and in the past several weeks there has been a great improvement. For those business firms that would like to have a trash box for their place of business with a pass key to same, Mr. Beatty is glad to work this out with them if they will get in touch with him. There are several firms that have recently installed these boxes and it has been of great assistance.

"Again, we are asking the citizens to cooperate with the officials of the city and the street department by being careful about throwing trash on the streets."

STOREN TAKEN BY NAZI ARMY

Two British Submarines and 2 Trawlers Lost; Trade Talks With Russia Strikes Snag Over Exports To Germany; Plea Is Made For U. S. Understanding Of Economic Warfare

London, April 30.—(AP)—The British conceded setbacks today on the land, sea and diplomatic fronts.

Military sources said the Germans had captured Støren, railroad junction 30 miles south of Nazi-held Trondheim, which may prove to be the key to the whole campaign in Norway.

The Admiralty announced that two submarines were overdue and must be regarded as lost. They are the 1,095-ton Tarpon, which carried a normal crew of 53, and the 678-ton Starlet, whose normal crew was 40.

This raised Britain's loss of under-sea craft to seven of the 57 with which she entered the war last September.

The Admiralty also disclosed the sinking of two trawlers, but said there was no loss of life.

As trade talks with Russia struck a snag over Russian exports to Germany, Ronland H. Cross, minister directing the British blockade, pleaded for American "understanding" of economic warfare.

Cross said that copper, rubber, tin and other materials, much of it from the United States, were reaching Germany through Vladivostok, Russia's Pacific port, in such quantities they were an "undoubtedly serious" leak in the blockade.

Prime Minister Chamberlain told the House of Commons "I do not think it would be in the public interest to make any statement as to measures adopted by Britain in Norway."

The Prime Minister reiterated that the Allies have "no vindictive designs against the German people." The Royal Air Force swung into action on the Norwegian coast, bombing Fomene airport and engaging German bombers in several air battles. Two Nazi planes were shot down. It was reported authoritatively.

While the war office kept silent, a military source said the Germans had taken Støren and described the allied position in the Dombas sector, 80 miles south of Støren, as "difficult."

Project Is Approved For Local WPA Work

Raleigh, April 30.—(AP)—Approval of 22 WPA projects calling for the expenditure of \$396,473 and to provide employment for 1,013 relief clients was announced today by C. C. McGinnis, state WPA administrator.

The projects included one in Pitt county to develop cemetery and athletic field in Greenville, \$11,210 and 24 workers.

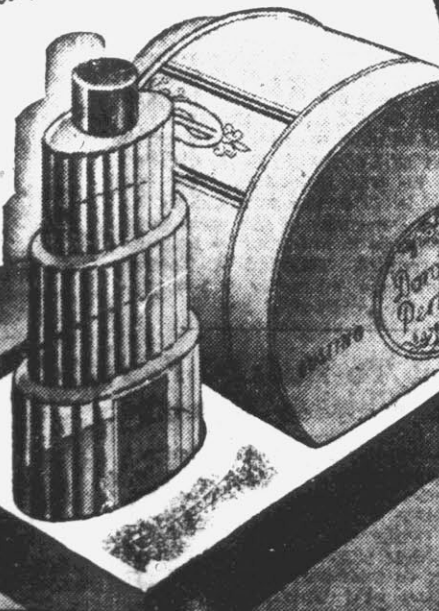

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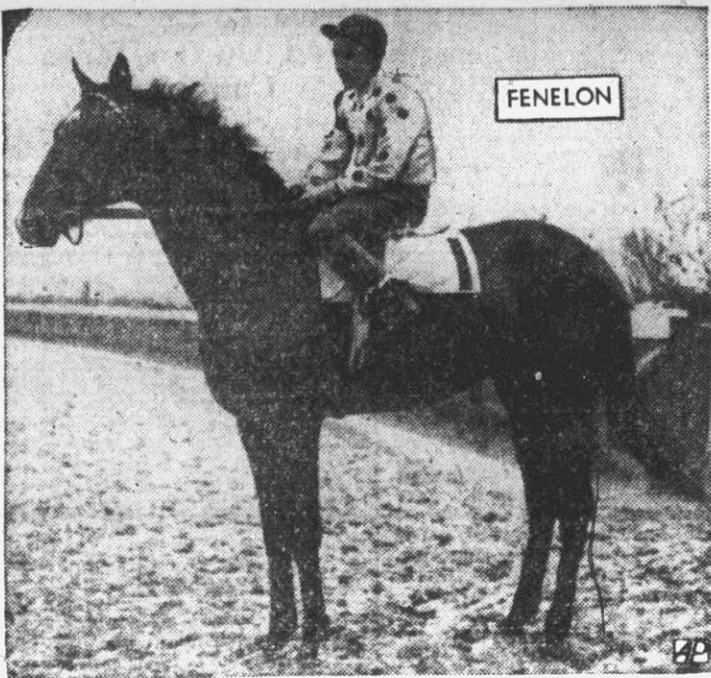

Moulton weighs only 95 pounds and is four feet, six inches tall, but he really puts weight and precision behind his strokes.

He scored a birdie three on the fifth hole. The score of 41 gives him the club record in the junior division. Neil Herring, with a 36, holds the club record for all divisions, a fact that is quite pleasing to Pro Bob Bailey since Herring was a protégé of Bailey.
