TO ASK RETURN OF LABOR ACT TO COMMITTEE

Leaders Convinced Changes Would Go Too Far

FAVOR DROPPING ENTIRE SUBJECT

Committee Bill Already Heavily "Loaded Down" With Far-Reaching Exemptions From Act

Washington, May 3.—(AP)—Reportedly convinced that the House wants to go too far on amending the wage-hour act, administration leaders were said today to favor dropping the whole subject.

They were reported to be preparing a request that the House send the question back to committee for further study. This would kill chances for action this session.

Most labor committeemen said that while they still believed "moderate" amendments were necessary, the committee bill of amendments had been heavily "loaded down" with proposals to exempt too many operations from the act.

Its chief sponsor, Representative Norton (D-N.J.), called the measure as it now stands "a disgrace to the country."

Meanwhile Representative Dempsey (D-N.M.) filed in the House a petition to wrest from the House Judiciary committee a bill extending the so-called Hatch "clean politics" law. A score of the required 218 signatures were affixed within a few minutes.

Despite this action, however, Dempsey predicted that the House Judiciary committee would be asked to reconsider its vote to pigeon-hole the measure.

He intimated that a wrong count in the committee might have shelved the legislation.

Festival Concert Here On May 10th

The fifth annual Spring Music Festival concert of the Eastern Carolina Symphonic Choral association will be presented at the Wright Memorial auditorium at the college here Friday night, May 10, at 8 o'clock.

This will be the first time the festival has been held in Greenville, but since Greenville is the new headquarters for the association the festival will be an annual event here.

All eleven choruses of the association will be represented. The three junior choruses in Winterville, Ayden and Snow Hill will combine into one large chorus of 75, and present a group of numbers. Likewise the three high school choruses from Winterville, Ayden and Snow Hill will combine into a large chorus of 100 voices and sing several selections. The five symphonic choruses from Greenville, Robersonville, Ayden, Snow Hill, and Goldsboro will also combine into one large chorus of 100 voices, forming the Festival Symphonic chorus. This group will present a group of songs.

All three of these large combined choruses will appear in their beautiful white and cream colored vestments.

The special touring choruses of the Association, the Eastern Carolina Symphonic singers, will present one group of songs. This will be their final appearance before leaving for their northern tour Monday, May 13th. Their two outstanding concerts on this tour will be at the White House and at the New York World's Fair.

The Greenville Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the festival.

Official Sources Declare That Government Of Norway Is Still In Being And Britain Has No Idea Of Abandoning It; Air Force Claims Successes Against Nazi Scandinavian Bases

London, May 3.—(AP)—British spokesmen today re-emphasized Britain's determination to fight on in Norway while the arrival of powerful British-French naval forces at Alexandria stressed the Allies' determination to be on guard in the Mediterranean against any German or Italian move.

As if in confirmation of the statements that the war in Norway would go on, the Air Ministry reported two successes for Royal Air Force bombers in raids on German bases in Denmark and Norway.

In the face of reports from Stockholm that the Namso region north of Trondheim had been abandoned by the allied forces, as was the Andalsnes sector to the south, and at both moves indicated a general allied withdrawal, one reliable military source said:

"The government of Norway is still in being and we have no idea of abandoning it or the campaign."

While other authorities supported this statement, there was no word, official or otherwise, on the situation at Namso.

Stockholm reports said the British left the Steinkjer-Namso area last night and the French the night before, thereby abandoning the northern jaw of the pincers by which the Allies sought to capture Trondheim. The southern jaw collapsed with the withdrawal from Andalsnes.

An Air Ministry communique revealed that British warplanes had been engaged in protecting the convoy of warships and transports which the British army's withdrawal from Andalsnes was being carried "elsewhere," as Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain said.

TO ADVERTISE UNPAID TAXES

Unpaid 1939 Taxes to Be Advertised Next Week

The Greenville Board of Aldermen, in regular session last night, authorized City Clerk J. O. Duval to advertise unpaid 1939 taxes the second week in May. Last year the unpaid taxes were not advertised until August.

The city clerk revealed in his monthly report that approximately 85 per cent of the 1939 taxes already had been collected. Of the total levy of \$96,413.85, the clerk's office has collected \$80,143.05, leaving \$16,270.80 in real estate and personal taxes outstanding as of May 1.

The clerk also revealed that all outstanding taxes as of May 1, including back taxes as far as 1927, amounted to only \$37,473.54, compared with \$42,249.76 as of the same date a year ago.

The city has \$15,742.75 left in its budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, of the total amount of \$102,246.47 appropriated, \$87,103.72.

FIGHTING IN NORWAY COSTLY FOR BRITAIN

On the Steinkjer Front, Northern Norway—British and French troops, which had landed north of German-held Trondheim for the campaign against the Nazi invasion embarked last night in Namso harbor and sailed away.

The entrance of German troops in this sector is awaited at any moment—perhaps within 24 hours.

As a result of the new withdrawal north of Trondheim following the removal of allied forces from the Andalsnes region south of Trondheim, it is believed here that the war in Norway virtually is finished.

CREW REPORTS U. S. VESSELS HIT AT BERGEN

Return With Stories Of Battle At Norwegian Port

SHIPS SWEEP BY ALLIED PLANES

Although Accounts of Crew Members Vary All Agree That Vessels Struck By Accident

New York, May 3.—(AP)—Two American freighters were swept by machinegun bullets when allied warplanes raided German sea and land forces in Bergen, Norway, last month, crew members of one ship charged today upon their arrival in New York harbor.

Returning with a vivid description of the battle of Bergen—the first of its kind to reach this country—the crew of the freighter Flying Fish, trapped there by the sudden outbreak of hostilities, told of narrow escapes from bombs, mines and bullets.

They also reported for the first time that the American freighter Charles R. McCormick was caught in a spray of machinegun fire that cut its mast staves and wire rigging.

The State Department recently instituted inquiries to determine whether the whereabouts of the Charles R. McCormick when the vessel's operators expressed concern over its failure to answer a cable ordering it home. The ship presumably sought shelter in a Norwegian fjord.

There was considerable variance in the stories told by the Flying Fish's crew, but all hands agreed that the American ship, which displayed their colors prominently, were struck by accident.

Capt. W. W. Wollaston, of Denver, Col., said the Flying Fish also was hit by fire from a land fortress which was aiming at an attacking plane.

So one on either the Charles R. McCormick or the Flying Fish was injured.

GAIN NOTED IN BUILDING HERE

Twenty-Six Permits Let For Work To Cost \$71,830

The new residential construction "boom" noted in Greenville recently was reflected in building permits issued at the city clerk's office during the month of April.

A total of 26 permits for construction to cost \$71,830 was issued during the month. This was the largest number of permits and involved the greatest expenditures of any month in the past several years.

March's 17 permits for construction to cost \$33,540 had held the record for this year, but the April figures exceeded those for any month since permits were issued for the new municipal buildings and college classroom building.

Permits issued in April follow: Floyd McGowan, after two-story residence on Reade between Ninth and Tenth, to be used for apartments, \$1,000.

Torsos of Two Persons Located In Pittsburgh

May Have Been Victims of Cleveland's "Butcher"

Pittsburgh, May 2.—(AP)—Torsos of two persons whom Deputy Coroner Anthony Sapp said might have been the victims of Cleveland's "mad butcher" were found today in box cars in the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie railroads' repair yards in nearby Stow township.

Stappo said the parts in which the bodies were found arrived here from Struthers, Ohio, near Cleveland, on April 21.

The two apparently had been killed about six or eight weeks ago, he said.

Dr. P. R. Helmbold, coroner's physician, asserted one of the bodies was that of a man, a victim of murder.

Farmville Man Fined For Evasion Of Levy

Raleigh, May 3.—(AP)—Federal Judge I. M. Meekins imposed fines of \$500 each today on J. J. Henderson of Winterville and Albert C. Monk of Farmville after they pleaded guilty to evading 1933 income taxes.

Henderson admitted failure to pay a tax of \$9,399.72 and Monk was charged with evading payment of \$14,687.18, though he paid part of the \$19,363.58 due on 1933 income. The men told Judge Meekins they had paid the evaded taxes.

HITLER AGAIN DECLARES AIM

Fuehrer Asserts Germany Fighting For Existence; Nazi Foreign Quarters Hail "Catastrophic Defeat" Of Britain In Norway And Challenge Her To Find Success Elsewhere

Berlin, May 3.—(AP)—Foreign office quarters, proclaiming the allied withdrawal from Andalsnes "a catastrophic defeat", today defied the British to find "success elsewhere", while Adolf Hitler suddenly broke his silence to reiterate that the war was a fight for existence for the Germans.

Speaking before 6,000 army and air force officers and leaders of the SS black-shirted elite guard in Berlin's Sportsplatz, Hitler said the conflict is "a fight for being or not of being of the German people."

Foreign office quarters asserted that Prime Minister Chamberlain, forced to look to other fields to wipe out the stain of Norwegian defeat, was threatening action in the Mediterranean, but "come what may Chamberlain will find Germany prepared for a counter blow."

The German high command currently announced rapid progress of the German forces in Norway in the clean-up against "isolated" resistance, acknowledged that the Allies were squeezing the Nazi garrison at Narvik in the far north, and made claims of huge blows against Allied sea power.

Asserting Germany's readiness for any British counter blow as a result of the Norwegian defeat, foreign office circles said:

"We ask Chamberlain before the world: who is the next victim of British plans for widening the area of combat?"

"Is it Rumania, Greece, Yugoslavia?" they asked.

DNB, official German news agency, this afternoon reported "lively reconnaissance activity north of Steinkjer," 60 miles north of Trondheim.

Be Sure To Watch Your Coat.

Vienna (AP)—Take good care of your clothing and soap rationing cards as otherwise you will have to get along without them, says a new order issued by the authorities of Vienna.

Ever increasing reports from citizens claiming to have lost their rationing cards have induced authorities to issue strict orders, effective immediately, that no substitute cards be granted for clothing or soap cards reported lost.

Whereas food rationing cards are always issued for four weeks, clothing and soap cards are valid for a whole year. The loss of these, therefore, is a severe blow as neither textiles nor soap can be bought in Germany without them.

Oil Rig Set To Go To College.

San Angelo, Tex. (AP)—An oil-stained oil well rig soon is to have a prominent place on the University of Texas campus at Austin.

It is the derrick from the Santa Rita No. 1 well near Texon where oil first was discovered in that field. Since that day, May 23, 1928, more than \$25,000,000 has flowed into the permanent endowment fund of the university from oil royalties.

MANY REQUEST DATA ON STATE

Total Of 3,476 Inquiries Received During April

Reflector Bureau.

Raleigh, May 3.—A total of 3,476 requests for information concerning North Carolina were received by mail by the Governor's Hospitality Committee of the Department of Conservation and Development during April. It was announced today by Director R. Bruce Etheridge of the Department. During March 2,323 inquiries were received, in February 1,197 and in January 855, making a total of 8,011 so far this year.

These 3,476 inquiries received in April brings the total number of inquiries received since the state advertising campaign started in July of 1937 to 82,812, including some 20,000 inquiries received from the information booth in the North Carolina exhibit at the New York World's Fair last summer. This means that the Governor's Hospitality Committee of the Division of State Advertising has been receiving an average of 2,500 letters a month for the 32 months the state advertising program has been in operation. During the peak months of the spring and summer seasons the hospitality office frequently received from 8,000 to 10,000 letters within a single month.

Each of these 82,812 inquiries has been answered with one or more booklets about North Carolina published by the Division of State Advertising, while thousands of personal letters have also been written to those asking for more specific information than that contained in the various publications. The greater number of requests has been for the "North Carolina, Variety Vacationland" booklet designed especially for vacationists and tourists, although many thousands of "Outdoors in North Carolina," "Golf in North Carolina" and of the other booklets have also been distributed. In all, more than 400,000 booklets telling about North Carolina have been distributed since the advertising campaign started.

FDR CAMPAIGN PUSHED IN N.C.

Organization Now Functioning In All Sections

Raleigh, May 3.—"North Carolina for Roosevelt" organizations have been set up in most of the counties of North Carolina and are now functioning actively and smoothly. Chairman John Folger, head of the organization which opened headquarters here less than two weeks ago, said today.

"In view of the limited time for a world of detail work, the North Carolina for Roosevelt organization is now working with unusual effectiveness," Mr. Folger said. The FDR leaders have made no specific plans for activity at the precinct meetings which will be held all over the State tomorrow afternoon, but they believe that the spade work already done will result in the offering and adoption of Roosevelt for renomination resolutions in scores of the precincts.

Chief emphasis, however, is being laid on the county conventions which will be held Saturday, May 11. They are the truly decisive angles of the whole campaign. If the Rooseveltites put through their resolutions in all or nearly all the counties they will have the State convention "in the bag." Senator Folger went on the air last night over a six-station hook-up covering most of eastern North Carolina and appealed for the President's nomination in order to prevent the country having to take a "second best" president. "There are times when a second best President is like a second best day—only an illusion of false security," he said. "There are times when the only president we can afford to have is the best president we can possibly get."

Lucas Is Concerned Over The Registration Situation

Raleigh, May 3.—Chairman Will A. Lucas of the State Board of Elections views the current registration status with concern, if not with the traditional political "alarm."

The election board head, under whose energetic leadership numerous radical changes were made in the 1939 General Assembly in the state's election laws has not heard from all the sixty-odd counties in which complete new registrations began last Saturday, but he has heard from enough to have a fairly good cross-section; and that cross-section indicates to him that too many North Carolinians are about to neglect the very important duty of qualifying themselves to vote in the approaching primaries.

"There's one job the newspapers and the politicians of the state have before them right now," he said. "That's to keep hammering away on the registration question and thereby seeing to it that the voters get on the books in time to vote on May 25."

Mr. Lucas had no definite figures available, but it was obvious that he knows enough about the situation to be keenly aware that there is real need of jogging up the public memory.

He did not say so, but it is clear that he feels that a very low registration, resulting in a tremendous falling off in the total vote in the primary of this year as compared with pollings of recent years would bring an unfavorable reaction, undeserved but genuine nevertheless, against the changes made in the elections laws—changes which the chairman feels were highly salutary.

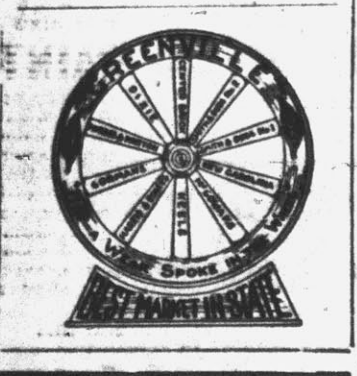

Don't put off until you have to face them in eternity the decisions which ought to be made at this very instant.
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Washington Daybook

Washington—It's the easiest thing in the world to fight a war on a map on your library table.
Any ordinary fellow with a knack for strategy can beat any full fledged general, hands down. As Napoleon observed, anybody can map a masterful piece of strategy. But it takes a genius to carry it out.
The trouble with you and me when we map strategy is that we leave out factors, including the weather, and what it does to armies and navies, and the elements they use for travel—water, air, and terrain.
More often than not, it's the weather that wins and loses battles, and not armed forces.
In this battle for Scandinavia, two extremely important weather factors don't appear on your map.
1. The North Sea is the foggiest area on the earth's surface in the spring and—
2. Norwegian roads at this time of year look like the lane to the pasture after a spring rain.
That means the Germans have an ally in the Scandinavian weather, just as they had the weather for a friend in Poland, and just as the Russians tried to use the weather against the Finns—and darn near lost the war.
Weather Beat Poland
In Poland, Germany wanted to stage a blitzkrieg with a mechanized army. So her generals took the weather map for 70 years back, picked the average driest month of the year—August—and struck. Motorized armies run best in dry country. You know the rest of the story.
In Finland Russia chose December. Finland has been invaded eight times, you see, and every time, the attacking force chose December. It's the one time the lake ice is frozen deep enough to hold up

marching columns. At other times, an invading army could be cut up, and its units beaten by guerrillas.
Dame Nature almost beat the Russians, because she sent the worst package of weather in 50 years to northern Europe.
In Scandinavia, the Germans are playing the weather to the hilt, and the law of averages, too.
Usually, the fog closes in 40 per cent of the time along the coast of Norway at this time of year. Add to that some 10 hours of darkness in every 24, and you have increased hiding time for German transports and naval units—perhaps up to 60 per cent of the time.
That's just what the Germans want to slip past the British fleet. German ships navigate along the Norwegian coast only during fog or darkness. When the weather clears they hide in fjords.
Fog Favors The Germans
Now that Germany has her armed forces in command of land positions at Trondheim, Oslo, Bergen, Stavanger, Kristiansand, and other points, she has the drop on both naval and aerial forces because of the fog. And for an attacking army, the roads are terrific—all slush, now freezing, now thawing.
Victor Hugo, in Les Miserables, wrote: "If it had not rained on the night of June 17, 1815, the future of Europe would have changed." He meant the rain delayed units of Napoleon's armies. Subsequent historians think Napoleon's conflicting orders had something to do with Waterloo, too, but anyway, rain was an important factor.
At Jutland in 1916, the weather almost beat the British fleet, then suddenly changed, and helped the British gunners find their targets.
Today the weather is more important than it ever was before. The weather man has a word for it. Visibility. He tells us what visibility is in his daily charts, and on his daily maps.
As visibility goes, so goes the war.

These sample mops will be placed on exhibit all over the county in stores, banks, and other public places.

It should be kept in mind that the length of the mop handle should be adjusted to the height of the person using it.

A card giving instructions on mopping for boll weevil control will be attached to the mop handle.

Raids Ordered By Dies Held Illegal

Philadelphia, May 3.—(AP)—Federal Judge George A. Welsh ruled today that raids on local offices of the Communist party and the International Workers Order by agents of the Dies committee investigating un-American activities last month were illegal.

The ruling was made in dismissing a motion by counsel for the Dies agents and Magistrate Jacob Dogole, which asked that a complaint by the Communist party be thrown out.

The complaint, made by Carl Reeve, Communist candidate for the United States Senate, and Frank Hellman, district organizer for the International Workers Order, charged that warrants issued by Dogole for the raids April 2 were illegal and demanded return of confiscated records.

Judge Welsh held that an individual's civil rights can be violated by seizure of records and property of a corporation when the individual is an officer in charge of them.

"The man who builds a better mouse trap does not always have a path beaten to his door, but he does have the consolation that he has rendered a service to his community and state whether he be a butcher, baker or candlestick maker."
