

HOUSE REJECTS PLAN OFFERED BY ROOSEVELT

Passes Resolution Against Reorganization Order

PROPOSAL NOW GOES TO SENATE

Some 75 Democrats Join Solid Republican Membership In Voting For Nullifying Plan

Washington, May 8. — (AP) — The House passed and sent to the Senate today a resolution rejecting President Roosevelt's fourth government reorganization order which would place the Civil Aeronautics Authority in the Commerce department.

The resolution was approved by the roll call vote of 232 to 153.

About 75 Democrats voted with a solid Republican membership for nullification of the reorganization order.

The order, which would abolish the Safety board of the CAA, will become operative next month unless the Senate also approved the House resolution.

President Roosevelt announced on April 11 that he had decided upon several changes in the make-up of government agencies and departments. Congressional opposition immediately developed to one portion which would shift the CAA from an independent agency to a bureau under Secretary of Commerce Hopkins.

Meanwhile, the Senate Judiciary committee recommended early Senate consideration of the House-approved Logan-Walter bill to facilitate judicial review of the decisions of federal administrative agencies.

Sen. Lee To Speak At College Finals

United States Senator Joshua B. Lee, Norman, Okla., will deliver the commencement address and the Rev. Francis F. Lynch, rector of Saint Thomas Church, Baltimore, will preach the baccalaureate sermon at E. C. T. C. at the thirty-first annual commencement, on the weekend of June 2, when around 200 seniors will be granted their A. B. degrees.

Saturday, June 1, will be devoted to senior and alumni activities. Alumni have scheduled their annual meeting for 9:30 and their luncheon for 1:30, with the twenty-five year class, the two ten-year classes, and the one-year class as guests of honor.

Mrs. Elizabeth Stewart Bennett, Forest City, president of the Alumni Association of E. C. T. C. will be in charge of the program. In the afternoon President and Mrs. L. R. Meadows will hold open house for alumni and faculty.

At 6:30 the senior class and the alumni will join in a new commencement feature, an "Allegiance Program," on west campus; and following this will come the Music Recital.

For Sunday's program there will be the baccalaureate sermon at 11:00 and the vesper service of the Y. W. C. A. and the Y. M. C. A. at 7:00, with the Rev. Francis F. Lynch as speaker at both.

Senator Lee's address will come at 10:30 Monday morning, and the graduation exercises at 11:30.

Venters of Shermerville and W. A. Venters of Black Jack; four sisters, Mrs. Fumey Gaskins of Black Jack, Mrs. Frank Harris of Ayden, Mrs. Charles Savage of Dover and Mrs. John Buck of Vanceboro.

Dies Group Accused Of Trying Get U.S. in War

FOUR VICTIMS DURING APRIL

April And May High-way Fatalities Are Same for Troop

Four persons were killed on highways in Troop A, including some 30 northeastern counties, during April, the same number as were killed in the previous month, the report of Lieut. Lester Jones, commanding officer of the troop, revealed today.

The officers investigated a total of 53 wrecks during the month, in which 35 persons received non-fatal injuries. In March the officers investigated 74 wrecks, in which 32 persons received non-fatal injuries.

Of the 335 arrests made during April, 48 were for driving drunk. In April the patrolmen arrested 453 persons and 48—the same number as in April—were charged with driving while drunk. Of the 335 arrested in May 323 were convicted and 12 acquitted. Sentences meted out totaled 97 years and five months. Fines amounted to \$12,241.30 and costs \$3,070.90.

The patrolmen recovered stolen property valued at \$5,200 and collected \$8,465.65 in revenue.

The combined force covered 154,193 miles of highway during the month and reported the additional following activities: vehicles inspected, 3,382; lights corrected, 2,088; warnings issued, 131; court cases extended 614; cars recovered 10; vehicles stored, 22; vehicles weighed, 518, with 187 found to be overloaded; complaints investigated, 348; first aid rendered, one; citations, 568; drivers' license examinations given, 74, all applicants passing.

VOTERS PLACE CALIFORNIA IN FDR'S COLUMN

Third Termers Make Clean Sweep Of Primary Vote

MOST OF TEXAS WON BY GARNER

Alabama Decides To Cast Her 22 Votes at National Convention For Speaker Bankhead.

(By The Associated Press) Roosevelt third term supporters added the big California delegation to their growing forces today as a result of a Democratic primary sweep.

A national convention state pledged to the president defeated a Garner ticket six-to-one and held nearly a three to one majority over the combined vote for Garner and two uninstructed tickets.

While the Roosevelt candidates were carrying virtually every California county, Vice President Garner won the vast bulk of the delegates chosen for the Texas State Democratic convention and Speaker Bankhead (D-Ala.) was given favorite son support by the 23 national delegates elected in Alabama.

These developments highlighted election activity yesterday in six states. Only one senatorial race was involved. Senator Charles Andrews of Florida led for Democratic renomination, but apparently will be forced into a run-off against Bernard MacFadden, magazine publisher and new deal critic.

Despite the one-sided Roosevelt victory in California, two Garner delegates may be among the 44 going to the Chicago convention. There were two vacancies on the third term state and election officials said that the two highest candidates on the next ticket—the Garner one—would be designated to fill them.

In Texas, Garner headquarters said that the vice-president had won 653 delegates chosen in county conventions, against 32 for the president. Nearly every county convention, however, endorsed the Roosevelt administration and many delegates to the state meeting were pledged not to aid any "stop Roosevelt" movement.

The final outburst was set off by a question by Representative Thomas (R-N.J.), who asked whether Quill would be willing to bear arms for the United States if it became involved in war with Soviet Russia.

"I'm an American citizen," boomed Quill, rising to his feet and shaking his finger at the committee, "and as such I would be willing to defend its flag."

When Thomas pressed him as to whether that meant he would be willing to serve with American troops if they had to go to Russia, Quill shouted that he was opposed to going overseas, but added: "That's what this committee is trying to do. You're trying to bring on a war."

Meeting Held By Home Bldg. - Loan

The Home Building and Loan Association of this city held its 34th annual meeting last night in the Sheppard Memorial Library.

Ninety-six hundred and twenty-seven shares were represented either by proxy or in person.

Heber Forbes, vice president, presided over the meeting. After a few opening remarks, Mr. Forbes called on J. J. White, secretary and treasurer to make his annual report.

Mr. White's report revealed that the Association loaned approximately \$200,000 last year for the construction of new homes; that \$125,000 was paid to shareholders through the maturity of stock; paid out individuals \$29,000 and that after having paid these dividends the surplus and reserves totaled \$75,000.

The statement also revealed that the Association had on hand a large sum of cash and owes no money.

W. W. Lee, assistant secretary, was called on for few remarks, after which several stockholders made short talks on the fine progress of the Association.

The following directors were elected: L. C. Skinner, R. M. Garrett, J. B. James, C. T. Munford, B. S. Warren, James S. Ficklen, C. W. Harvey, E. B. Allsbrook, W. W. Lee and J. J. White.

Immediately following the annual meeting of stockholders, the directors met and elected the following officers: L. C. Skinner, president; C. H. Forbes, vice president; J. J. White, secretary and treasurer; W. W. Lee, assistant secretary and treasurer and J. B. James, attorney.

Fishing Is Allowed On Friday, May 10th

Hundreds of Greenville and Pitt county men and women are expected to take to the streams Friday of this week, the closed season on fishing in inland waters ending on Thursday, May 9.

POPE PIUS, XII SHARES FEARS

Sees Extension Of War Into Other Countries

Rome, May 8.—(AP)—Pope Pius, XII, made it known today he shared widespread fears that other countries were in danger of invasion.

Addressing an audience of 4,000 pilgrims, the Pope said "a world poisoned with lies and disloyalty has lost the spiritual health of peace."

"The earth should be a place of concord," the pontiff declared, "but instead the fire of war has broken out in various nations and is threatening to invade others."

Meanwhile, tension in the Mediterranean subsided somewhat as it became evident Italy still is watching the moves of other countries and particularly the fate of the Chamberlain government before taking any belligerent action.

Virginio Gayda, frequently Premier Mussolini's mouthpiece, declared that Italy "intends to remain in peace and friendly cooperation" with the Balkan countries.

Italians blamed the British for the apprehension and alarm in the Balkans and Near East which led to reported precautionary measures by Italy, the Allies and other nations in this area.

Rome, May 8.—(AP)—A Fascist Senate report describing Italy's attitude toward the war as one of "pre-belligerency" rather than non-belligerency" gave fresh support today to the growing belief that this country is only waiting for an opportune moment to enter the war.

This new statement of Italian policy tended to reaffirm previous semi-official assertions that Italy could not remain permanently out of the fight.

George B. King Rites At 4:30 p.m. Thursd'y

Final services for George Badger King, 79, former resident of near Falkland, who died in Washington, D. C., yesterday morning, will be conducted at the graveside in Cherry Hill cemetery tomorrow afternoon at 4:30 o'clock.

The body will arrive by train in Rocky Mount and will be brought directly to the cemetery.

The services will be conducted by Dr. John Dan Schaick, Washington minister.

President Is Invited To Fish In Carolina

Washington, May 8.—(AP)—Senator Bailey (D-NC) accompanied a delegation of North Carolinians to the White House today to invite President Roosevelt to fish off the North Carolina coast. The group was headed by Bruce Etheridge, head of the State Department of Conservation and Development.

Bailey said the President told them he would "come if you will just get rid of congress."

Asks Attitude

Budapest, May 8.—(AP)—Great Britain was reported in diplomatic circles tonight to have asked the Hungarian government to state its attitude toward any German move to send troops through Hungary.

Following published reports that Germany had requested such permission, these sources said the British minister had asked the Hungarian premier to declare his country's stand.

The premier refused a definite answer, according to these informants, saying Hungary's attitude would depend on circumstances when and if Germany got ready to move.

The British ambassador was reported to have offered support of the British army and air force if Hungary chose to resist any German attempt to march through.

LLOYD GEORGE JOINS DEMAND

Calls On Chamberlain Government To Resign

London, May 8.—(AP)—A labor opposition demand that the House of Commons oust the Chamberlain government, instantly accepted by the Prime Minister as a challenge to a test of votes, was supported today by David Lloyd George.

Lloyd George, who led Britain to victory in the World War, denounced the Chamberlain administration for "unintelligent" and "half-hearted" leadership.

Pointing a finger directly at Chamberlain, he said the Prime Minister had spoken of sacrifice, then added bitterly:

"There is nothing that would contribute more to the cause of victory in this war than that he sacrifice the seals of office."

Judge Harrington Pitt Bar Speaker

Judge J. Frank Harrington, veteran clerk of Pitt Superior court, addressing the Pitt County Bar Association at its regular meeting last night, expressed the opinion that the world was "going too fast."

Mr. Harrington declared that all would be better off if we would slow up and consider where we are going and what we are doing, rather than always plunging head-long into some new adventure.

He also spoke of the fraternal spirit among members of the bar as well as among all citizens.

The bar set Monday, May 20 as the date for exercises in connection with the presentation of a portrait of the late Judge Lloyd Horton of Farmville. The portrait, to be presented by members of the family, will be officially accepted on the opening day of a civil term of court beginning May 20. The program will be held at 2:30 o'clock.

The portrait will be placed on the wall of the court room, along with those of other prominent Pitt county citizens.

REACHES HOME FROM NORWAY

Writer Gives First-Hand Account Of Withdrawal

London, May 8.—(AP)—I landed at a northern British port yesterday with an allied expeditionary force from Namsos, Norway, which reached home intact, despite 39 attacks by German planes, which sank three allied destroyers—the British Afridi, the French Bison and the Polish Grom.

I had gone to Namsos on a reliable tip that an allied offensive was about to begin north of Trondheim. That was just one week ago.

The next day French troops streamed back from the front and embarked, as I later learned the same night. The British, however, assured me they had no intention of leaving. Later, however, I was ordered to pack my kit and be ready. We were set to sail May 3.

Steaming up some from the Steinkjer front about 50 miles from Namsos, we entered the port as a terrific bombardment was taking place.

Incendiary bombs set fire to the whole waterfront with swift pursuit planes swooping down on the city to strafe the roads with machineguns.

Immediately after the French had withdrawn, the British received orders to proceed to the dock. Leaving behind equipment, personal belongings and much material which had arrived only that afternoon, the troops began embarking.

Various regiments which had abandoned the Steinkjer front under forced march through knee-deep snow covered about 32 miles in less than 14 hours.

Dog tired, they boarded the transports and flopped where they could on every deck.

Forest Blaze Raging In Western Carolina

Boone, N. C., May 8.—(AP)—Despite the efforts of more than 400 fire fighters, a forest fire raged unabated today in the Elk Creek section of Watauga county, northeast of here.

Jack Spratt of Lenior, district forester, said the fire already had burned over more than 5,000 acres and that conditions for fighting it are "very bad."

Local Home Damag'd By Oil Stove Blaze

An oil stove in the kitchen of the home of James Piver on Dickinson avenue was damaged by smoke this morning when an oil stove in the kitchen flared up and threatened to start a destructive fire.

The fire had been extinguished when firemen arrived, but smoke had damaged much of the house and furniture.

The Revolutionary War statesman, James Otis (1725-1783), was killed by a stroke of lightning.

VOTE TO COME AFTER DEBATE

House of Commons Expected To Decide Fate of Chamberlain's Government Tonight; Prime Minister Promptly Accepts Challenge To See "Who Is With Us And Who Is Against Us"

London, May 8.—(AP)—His Majesty's Labor opposition formally asked the House of Commons today to oust the Chamberlain government and the Prime Minister sprang to his feet to declare that he welcomed the challenge.

Herbert Morrison, vigorous labor leader, introduced the vote of non-confidence at the end of a bitter speech in which he declared that if Chamberlain and his principal advisors stayed in office "we run a grave risk of losing this war."

Rising quickly, the Prime Minister declared he and his colleagues "were not slow to accept their responsibility."

The vote will come at the end of debate tonight, probably about 11:30 p. m. (5:30 p. m. E.S.T.).

The government will seek to turn the vote into a motion of confidence. "We shall see who is with us and who is against us," Chamberlain chided. "No government can prosecute the war efficiently unless it has public and parliamentary support."

Morrison especially demanded the ouster of Chamberlain, Air Minister Sir Samuel Hoare and Chancellor of the Exchequer Sir John Simon. He charged, too, that the Prime Minister was putting Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, in a "shop window" and using him for a "shield."

Illness Is Fatal To Mrs. Carlisle

Mrs. Effie Warren Carlisle, 57, died today at noon at her home near Conetoe. Funeral services will be held from the late residence Thursday afternoon at 1 o'clock by the Rev. M. Y. Self, Methodist minister of Bethel. Interment will follow in the family cemetery.

Mrs. Carlisle was born in Pitt county and spent her entire life in the community in which she died.

Surviving are one son, Ashley, of the home; two daughters, Mrs. L. O. Brewer of Greenville and Mrs. J. P. Brewer of LaGrange.

Prisoner Is Shot Trying To Escape

Richard Davis, 19-year-old convict serving an 18 to 24 months sentence at the Pitt county prison farm, was shot in the leg by a guard yesterday afternoon when he attempted to flee while working on the highway between Ayden and Winterville.

Th convict was taken to the hospital yesterday, but returned to the camp today and his condition was not considered serious.

The prisoner was sentenced to the 18 to 24 months term in Edgecombe county January 29, 1940, for larceny.

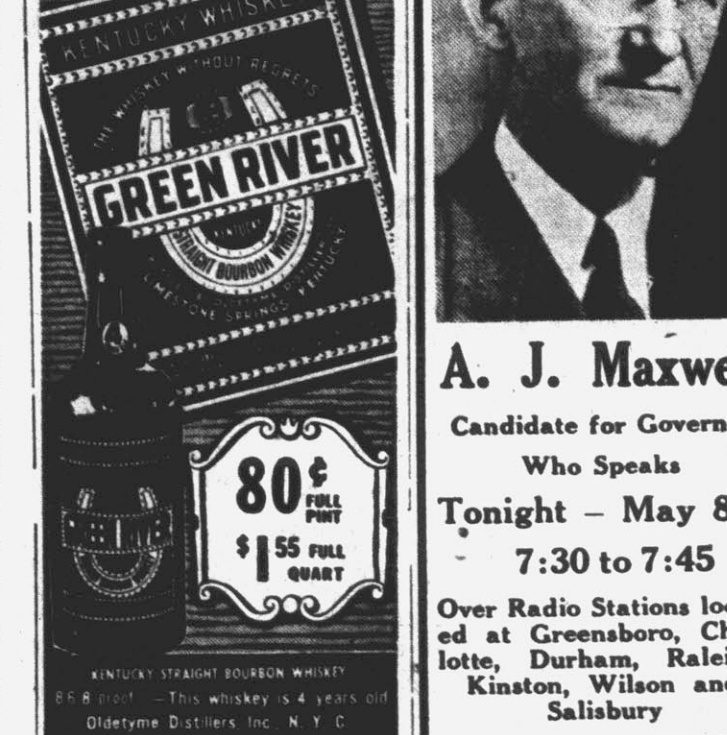

TRADITIONAL NEUTRAL- ITY NO PROTECTION FOR SCANDINAVIA

The fallacy of the isola-
tionist policy that a nation
can remain neutral merely
by wishful thinking has
been exploded not once, but
three times, during the pres-
ent war. For three of the
four traditionally neutral
Scandinavian States have al-
ready suffered invasion, and
Sweden, the last remaining
neutral country is in danger
of a similar fate.

For years the foreign poli-
cies of these Scandinavian
countries have had one basis
—to keep out of war. They
had no territorial ambitions,
took no part in foreign quar-
rels, settled all disputes in a
friendly, fair manner and,
when hostilities engulfed the
rest of the world, leaned over
backwardly maintaining
strict neutrality.

So successful was this poli-
cy in the World War of
1914-18 that such isolation-
ists as the late Senator Bor-
ah pointed to these nations
as the model the United
States should follow to keep
from being involved in for-
eign quarrels. But the suc-
cess of that time could not
be repeated during the pres-

ent struggle because the
Scandinavian countries are
dealing with rulers who
know no respect for treaty
obligations or international
law.

The failure of this was
not evident to all even after
the invasion of Finland.
Sweden and Norway appar-
ently felt even then that if
they pursued their tradi-
tional neutral policy, they would
be spared the horrors of war,
so they refused to go to the
aid of their sister democracy.
Then came the invasion of
Norway and Denmark—des-
pite every effort made to ap-
pease Hitler.

Now Sweden, threatened
by invasion that would turn
its land into one of the great
battlefields of Europe, is
again placing its faith in
neutrality. As a consequence,
it is rapidly losing all sem-
blance of real liberty, as ar-
rogant German demands
stifle the Swedish press and
force concession after con-
cession from the hapless
nation.

The lesson gained at the
expense of liberty by the
Scandinavian people is
thought by many to be a
warning to the United
States that mere neutrality
and hatred of war does not
exempt a nation from acts of
aggression. It is becoming
more and more evident that
Hitler and Stalin are a grave
menace to democracies
wherever they may be, and
that victory by Germany
threatens the sovereignty of
the United States. The fate
of Norway proves that it is
now impossible to achieve
peace merely by wishful
thinking, legislation and
speech-making. — Scottish
Rite News.

laid waste Egypt in Biblical times.

Locusts Aren't Locusts

The Puritan theologians were na-
ture-faking. Seventeen-year locusts
aren't locusts at all. They're period-
ic cicadas, no relation to the vorac-
ious insects of the Bible. But the
preachers poured it on, and the bad
name stuck.

Now a 17-year locust "plague" is
coming again this year, the biggest
since 1923. Uncle Sam's entomolo-
gists say there's no cause for alarm.
Adult cicadas don't eat at all. They do
make the woodlots ring at once, but
who'd begrudge a cicada his brief
few weeks of song after wait-
ing patiently for his turn for 17
years?

As bugs go, cicadas are high-type
citizens. They aren't major pests,
and their life cycle is the most in-
teresting in bugdom. For instance:

The eggs are polite, and wait their
turn to be hatched. The first eggs
hatched first, and so on. A fe-
male lays about 500 eggs in bark.
It doesn't hurt older trees, and rarely
injures younger ones.

The hatched larvae drop to the
ground, and burrow in for 17 years,
a la Rip Van Winkle. Nobody knows
why it takes 'em so long to develop.

Someday, after 17 years in a
solitary burrow, they can tell to the
hour when the other pupae are
about to emerge. All the males come
out one night, the females several
nights later.

Music in Their Legs
Their "digging clothes" in which
they spent 17 years split down the

back when they emerge. The cicada
steps out in a milk-white debut
dress, complete with gauze wings.
They turn darker in an hour. Then
they have black bodies, orange
legs, and big, red eyes.

After that, life's one brief round
of song—but only for the males.
They sing choruses in the top
branches of a tree, solos in the low-
er branches, by rubbing their wings
on hollow sound boxes on their
bodies.

The bureau of entomology finds
that cicadas are homebodies, who
stick close to their own localities. A
brood emerges somewhere every

year, but is restricted to a definite
area.
The American broods of cicadas
have been numbered. This year's
crop is Brood 14. It is the largest
and most widely distributed. The
1940 17-year locusts are spread
from Cape Cod to Illinois. Brood 10,
which is due again in 1953, is next
largest.
That's the not-very-many low-
down on "17-year locusts," who are
going to visit us in a "plague" this
summer. Too bad they got the
wrong kind of publicity, back there
in 1934, isn't it?

SHORT SHOTS

Reflector Bureau.

Raleigh, May 8.—Cesar Barker of
Durham, a candidate for the Sixth
District Congress seat, claims to be
the original Roosevelt man as far
as the current primary campaign
goes.

Here on a short visit, the Dur-
ham man pointed out that he isn't
any coat-swinger hanging onto the
tails of the ample garments of the
current North Carolina Roose-
velt movement, because, he points
out, he plumped squarely for the
President and the New Deal program
as far back as last September when
he made formal announcement he'd
run for Congress again this year.
Barker is about to launch an in-
tensive speaking campaign in the
Sixth and says he plans to challenge
two of his opponents—John Caffey
of Greensboro and incumbent Carl
Durham of Orange—to state their
views on the national administration
and President Roosevelt. He con-
cedes that the fourth candidate (Ed
Hanford of Alamance) is a "liberal
and a Roosevelt supporter," but he
does not believe that Hanford is a
really formidable rival.

The Bull City man took comfort
in the big registration so far record-
ed in his home county. He estimat-
ed that the final figures will ap-
proach 15,000—which would give the
county at least its normal Demo-
cratic vote.

Chairman Will A. Lucas of the
state board of elections has figured
that the 37 counties which do not
have new registrations this time cast
slightly more than 184,000 votes in
the second gubernatorial primary of
1936—perhaps slightly more than
200,000 in the first. He sees no rea-
son why there should be any notice-
able decrease in the primary vote
this year in these units.

Walter (Pete) Murphy, Rowan's
dean of Democratic legislators who
is now a candidate for Secretary of
State, was appointed Inspector
General of the United Confederate
Veterans on May 24. It has been
learned.

He did not give the appointment
any publicity, his friends say, be-
cause he considers things which per-
tain to the Confederacy as "sacred."
Murphy's opponent, incumbent
Thad Eure, was not so long ago ap-
pointed a Colonel on the staff of a
Confederate veterans organization.

Veteran Zeb Turlington, Iredell
House member, was here Tuesday,
but seemed to prefer to chuckle over
his famous "rabbits hunting in the
snow" bill of the 1939 General As-
sembly than to talk about his own
campaign for re-election or the
mixed up Governor's race.

Zeb led the House members and
newspaper men to believe he in-
tended to introduce an important
statewide bill, probably with refer-
ence to prohibition or a state-wide
referendum, last spring; but when
the time came he sent up a mea-
sure to "permit hunting of rabbits in
the snow in Iredell county."

He didn't get round to saying so—
and it may be just a report—but
apparently authentic information
has it that Turlington will vote for
Pete Murphy for Secretary of State;
which is unusual in that Zeb is
known as just about the foremost
Dry in North Carolina, while Mur-
phy has always been the most out-
spoken and persistent opponent of
prohibition and all its works.

Both are veteran political figures,
however, and neither has ever been
accused, even by his most bitter
enemy, of any lack of sincerity.
Which may account for their hold-
ing mutual admiration.
