NAZIS ENTER BRUSSELS

Act Swiftly To Put Defense Program Into Operation

MAY RESTORE OLD WARSHIPS

Government Financing of Plants to Produce War Materials Considered; Army Asks Removal of 6,000-Plane Limitation; Support of President's Program Is Widely Accepted

Washington, May 17.—(AP)—President Roosevelt disclosed today that the government was considering re-commissioning all remaining world war destroyers—35 of them—which are not yet in service.

At a press conference he said also that study was being given to the question of government financing of plants for expanded production of defense materials, perhaps with the plants privately operated, but government-owned.

A short time before the President spoke, congress was asked by the War Department to remove completely the existing 6,000-plane limit on the army's air force so that the military may work swiftly toward the goal of 50,000 air fighting machines set up by President Roosevelt in his defense message to Congress yesterday.

Support for the program, he outlined, continued to be evidenced in various quarters today. In New York former President Herbert Hoover said that he favored it and added that "there can be no partisanship upon the principle of national defense."

In addition to all the other defense problems which the government is considering, Mr. Roosevelt disclosed at his press conference that attention is being given to the advisability of establishing in the interior of the country factories vital to defense.

That applies primarily to new branches of existing plants, he said, rather than to picking up those plants now operating and moving them from the seaboard.

The President discussed at length what he expected to do with the \$100,000,000 which he asked Congress to place at his disposal for defense operations and the additional \$100,000,000 in contract authorizations.

Things might come up during the summer when he would not want to call Congress back, he explained, which could be taken care of if he were given the funds.

The army's request for removal of the plane limitation was presented to the House Military committee by Brig. Gen. L. D. Gasser, deputy chief of staff.

He testified at the hearing started to rush through the \$1,182,000,000 defense program the President proposed yesterday.

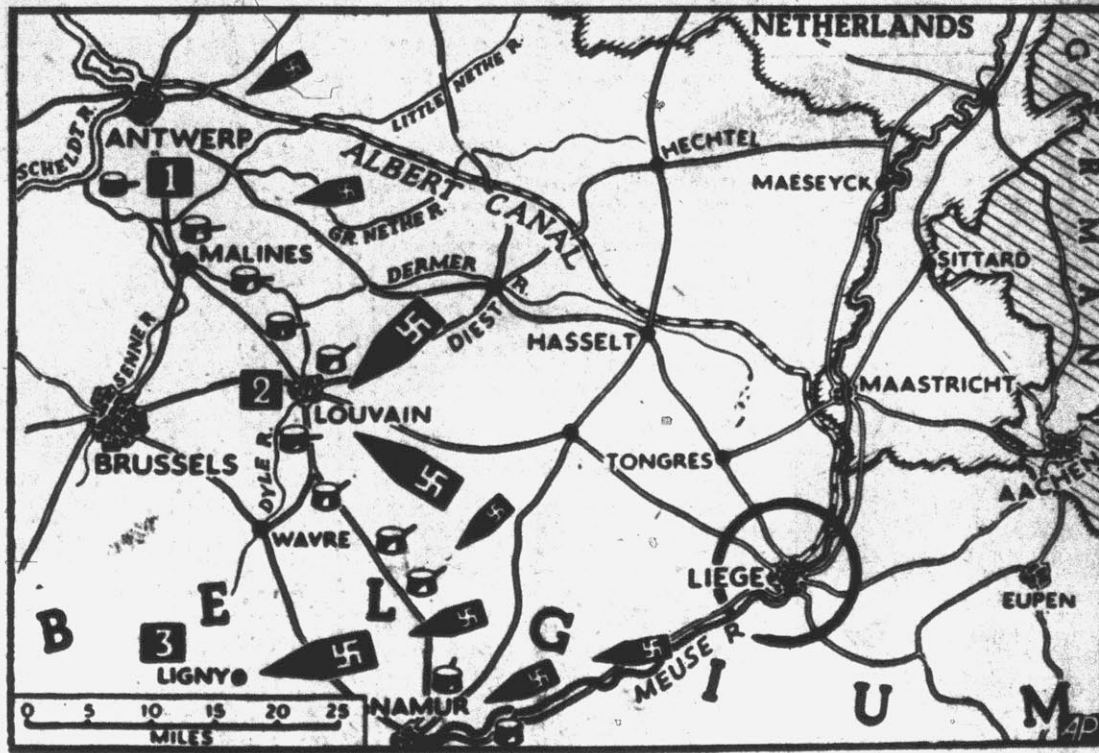
Democrats Of County At State Convention

Germans' Three-Pointed Drive Rips Allies



On the basis of late official statements, this map illustrates the progress of the battle on the Western Front from Antwerp to Namur, spearhead of the Sedan battle. At (1) the British supported Belgians north of Antwerp. Heaviest fighting probably was at Louvain (2) where Nazi pincers aimed at Brussels. The big bulge through outer fortifications of the allies took place at Ligny (3) where Germans were forging ahead slowly. Forts indicate the Belgian line along the Dyle river. The fate of Liege was uncertain but there were indications some fort of that area were still fighting although the Germans have passed the city.

ALLIES' VIEWS ARE OUTLINED

Admit Situation Serious, But Slightly Improved

London, May 17.—(AP)—An authoritative source said today that the military situation from the standpoint of the allies, "though very serious, may be regarded as very slightly better than yesterday or on Wednesday."

A meeting of the Allied Supreme War Council in Paris yesterday was described as having had "a very beneficial effect."

This is an authoritative British view of today's war position:

1. The situation on the French battle line is very serious.

2. However, the outcome is awaited with "complete confidence."

3. Reports from the fighting zones make it clear that the Royal Air Force, "machine for machine and man for man, is decisively superior to the enemy."

A British spokesman compared the present battle of the Meuse with the protracted fighting at Verdun in the World War (from February to November, 1916).

He said the battle might be expected to continue "with varying fortunes for both sides" and that it was impossible to form a "clearer appreciation" of the situation at this time.

Leave Britain

London, May 17.—(AP)—The United States embassy, on instruction from Washington, today advised American citizens in Great Britain to return home if possible. The United States is sending American ships to meet them on the west coast of Ireland.

Many Americans called at the embassy today, seeking advice and ways of getting out of Britain and securing passage for home.

The embassy estimates there still are about 3,500 Americans in the United Kingdom, more than half of them in the London area.

ALARMED OVER WAR SITUATION

London Warns Citizens Against False Optimism

London, May 17 (AP)—Allied troops were reported tonight to have fallen back along the 115-mile front from Antwerp to Sedan and the British public war warned that the military situation is "extremely grave."

A military spokesman said allied troops still were covering Brussels, 16 miles east of which the British were said in advance from the front to have stemmed German attacks.

Despite the withdrawals in Belgium, the spokesman said, the situation "is slightly better" for the Allies than yesterday.

The Press Association, British news agency, said authoritative quarters in London "do not attempt to disguise their opinion that the situation is of extreme gravity" and cautioned against false optimism.

Threaten To Bomb City Of Brussels

Berlin, May 17.—(AP)—Alexander Kirk, United States charge d'affaires, was summoned to the foreign office yesterday and informed why Germany no longer regards Brussels as an open town. It was left to the American government's discretion whether to pass the information on to the Belgium government.

It was understood the Belgian capital's immunity from German bombing attacks expires today unless the city is stripped of its character as a fortified town to the satisfaction of the German high command.

German scouting planes, Kirk was told, established the fact that there were large army concentrations within the capital, that railway stations were jammed with war materials and that cannon were mounted in parks and public squares.

COLLEGE CLUB GETS CHARTER

Charter Night Held By Democrats At ECTC

The Young Democratic club of East Carolina Teachers College was officially launched Thursday night, May 16, by a public program in the Austin auditorium, presided over by James Whitfield, president of the local group, in which the charter of the group was presented by Judge Dink James and received by the president, James Whitfield.

Prof. R. C. Deal made a short speech welcoming the young democrats to the party, and Commander J. H. Rose spoke on the importance of the philosophy that makes right the philosophy of the government on the part of intelligent young people.

Allies Reportedly Routed From Position In Antwerp

RETREAT FROM NAZI THRUSTS

Berlin Sources Declare Allies Unnerved

Berlin, May 17.—(AP)—The Allies have been routed from Antwerp to Sedan and German forces have pierced the Maginot line in a way which even German optimists had believed impossible, authorized Germans claimed today.

These sources asserted the allied forces were unnerved by Germany's awe-inspiring dive-bombers and were "in hopeless confusion."

For Belgium, they said, there is only one sensible choice—capitulation before Brussels is laid in ruins and the remaining Belgian forces annihilated.

The high command said in its regular communiqué that in northern France the Maginot line "actually the 'little Maginot line' in that region," was broken through on a width of 100 kilometers (62 miles) around Sedan.

It reported that in Belgium the Dyle river defense system was pierced south of Wavre, 20 miles southeast of Brussels and on the Namur front "the fortress was taken."

In London British said that the Allies had fallen back from some positions in the Antwerp to Sedan line through central Belgium, but that the situation was not completely clear due to the heat of battle. They said "rubbish" to German contentions that Belgium virtually is "finished."

Germany's thrust into northern France has been against the so-called little Maginot line fronting on Belgium rather than the main Maginot fortifications on the German-French border. Both of them, even as is Germany's west wall, are deep systems of fortifications, rather than mere lines, so that they may be pierced without being broken.

Certainly the repercussions of that conflict are already spreading into every crevasse of the world. No one knows what the morrow will bring to this nation in shock and peril."

"This is no time for division with in the Democratic party. We must close our ranks and exalt our welfare and security of the republican and of the state above every consideration of factionalism."

Only briefly did Ramsey refer to the Republican party: "The foe who was once able to give battle on virtually equal terms has been reduced to a powerless minority. The Republican party has fallen to such low estate in North Carolina that it has lost its capacity to irritate, not to mention its power to command respect. It arouses in the compass-

Allies Told Die On Spot Rather Than Cede Stand

German Troops Said In One Unconfirmed Report To Have Forced Drive To Within 76 Miles of Paris; Campaign Aimed at France In General And Paris In Particular

Berlin, May 17.—(AP)—German troops marched into Brussels, the Belgium capital toward evening today after British and French positions south of Louvain had collapsed, it was announced in Berlin.

Paris, May 17.—(AP)—General Maurice Gustave Gamelin, the allied commander-in-chief, tonight ordered his troops "to die on the spot" rather than cede further ground to the German invaders.

London, May 17.—(AP)—The Belgium government is now at Ostend on Belgium's North Sea coast, having moved there yesterday from Brussels, Reuters British news agency reported today in an Ostend dispatch.

Berlin, May 17 (AP)—German troops tonight were reported "in northern France," one source said without confirmation they were within 76 miles of Paris in a continued drive from a broad opening forced between Maubeuge and Montmedy.

"Events in the next few days will show what it meant to force this opening," an authorized source said as it was hinted the German campaign now is aimed at France in general and Paris in particular.

Berlin, May 17 (AP)—German forces have reached the outer fortifications of Antwerp, DNB, official German news agency, announced tonight.

Paris, May 17.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler's swift armored units have driven 30 miles into France to a battle-field about 100 miles northeast of Paris, but French military spokesmen considered the situation still "in hand."

Three great battles are raging, one in the German bulge toward Paris in the Rethel region southwest of Sedan; another south of Sedan; and the third in Belgium, where the Germans are thrusting forward with Louvain 16 miles east of the Belgian capital the main scene of conflict.

The French high command admitted that German mechanized units had reached the region north (Continued on page six)

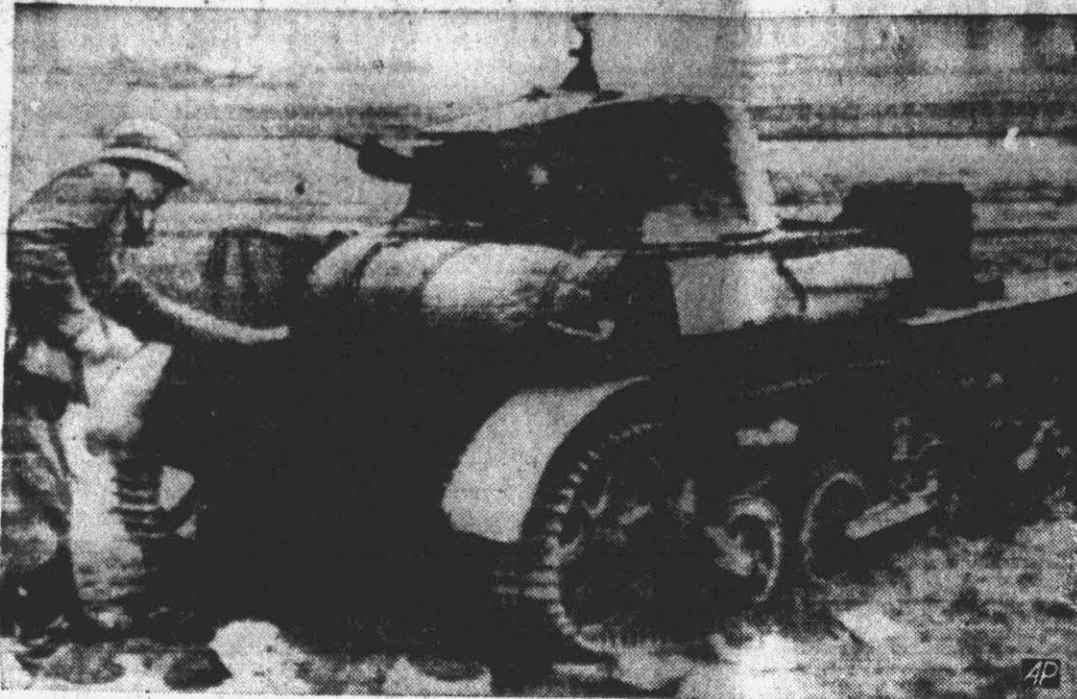

Agreement Is Reported Between Maxwell, Horton

Raleigh, May 17.—There is hardly a chance that even an unwritten "gentleman's agreement" has been made between headquarters of Lieutenant Governor Wilkins P. Horton and Commissioner of Revenue Allen J. Maxwell, but there is a very prevalent belief that if these two candidates should finish one-two in the first Governor's primary there wouldn't be any second heat.

Politics being what it is, this cannot be proved if it is so, and it will no doubt be vigorously denied if mentioned to henchmen of either; but it being widely accepted as gospel truth.

Those who feel this way can advance very logical reasons—reasons which have convinced them if they will convince nobody else.

Of all these reasons, the only really vital one can be reduced to a five letter word meaning gold, silver or other metal stamped by legal authority and used as currency.

Which is to say that the second man in a Horwell-Maxton primary (to mix them up so as to show no partiality) would find himself absolutely unable to finance a second race.

This is true, 'tis said, because the groups which are giving financial aid and comfort to Maxwell and to Horton are doing so more out of fear of J. M. Broughton than because of any marked preference between the Commissioner and the Lieutenant Governor.

That being true, these would be no point in putting up money for a second race between Tweedle-dee and Tweedle-dum—it just wouldn't be worth it.

And so, if Horton were to lead, with Maxwell second, the veteran boss of the state's exchequer would be quietly told "You're the best Commissioner of Revenue since Alexander Hamilton—beg pardon, that was another story about Andy Mellon."

Anyhow, Maxwell would be told he can remain Commissioner of Revenue with Horton as Governor and, being a very practical man and a savvy politician, Maxwell would see the light and simply fail to ask for a second running.

And vice versa. If it should be Maxwell and Horton 2, the Lieutenant Governor would be told to look here, there's no sense in all this sort of thing. You're a swell guy and you'll be taken care of, so don't go running against Maxwell and causing a lot of money to be spent when there's no use in it. In fact we're going to see to that by not giving you any money to spend.

Whereupon Mr. Horton, likewise a fellow who knows his way around in the political woods, would gracefully concede the hole and match to Mr. Maxwell.

All this, remember, is what is being bruited about in circles which are intimately acquainted with the financial "inside" of North Carolina campaigns. It isn't provable, as said, and your Raleigh reporter wouldn't even go so far as to attach to it any stamp of authenticity beyond the fact that it comes from folks who are wrong only once in many guesses.

There is almost certainly no actual agreement or concert of action between Horton and Maxwell headquarters; but the two have studiously refrained from fighting each other and it seems a certainty that if either is eliminated in the first primary and the other goes into a second race with Broughton, the loser in heat number 1 will support, quietly if not vocally, the Broughton opponent.

DEATH AT WORK

By Tex Lindsey and Civics Class
Death lies in wait on every country
road and city street. He shows no
leniency toward the young, nor does
he have respect for other infor-
mation of age.

Fatalities from automobile ac-
cidents are not caused by faulty mo-
tors or other motor defects. They
are caused by the defects between
the cars. Less than 10 per cent of
the fatal accidents are caused by
faults of the car. The persons driv-
ing the cars are responsible. They
place themselves in situations that
they cannot get out of without hav-
ing an accident or causing some one
else to wreck their car.

There is far less traffic at night,
but 35 per cent of the accidents hap-
pen during the dark hours. One
big reason for this is the effect of
light. All persons should dim their
lights when meeting another car.
Your eyes react very slowly to light.
After looking at a bright light, the
pupils of your eyes are contracted,
and you may drive as much as a
half mile with poor vision. It takes
the pupils of the eyes two or three
minutes to get back to normal after
being exposed to a bright light.
Bright lights may cause head-on col-
lisions, driving off the road, or side
swipes, therefore, we should always
dim the lights when meeting a car
at night.

Bad weather does not cause ac-
cidents. In fact, less wrecks are
recorded in rain, fog, snow and ice
all put together, than in clear
weather. Here again is proof that
the driver is responsible. In 1939
the recorded fatal accidents from
three weather conditions: fog, rain
and snow were 3,970 and in clear
weather 25,180. Speed, which is
the largest cause for accidents, is
hampered by bad weather and the
accidents are reduced.

Many safety devices have added
to the safety of the car: tires, safety
glass, better brakes, steel bodies,
better lights, easy steering, etc. These
devices make the possibilities of
accidents almost impossible, unless
they are misused by the impudent
driver.

The average driver is not a good
driver. The average driver may
avoid an accident, but he cannot
prevent one when he finds himself in
a dangerous situation. There are a
great many drivers who attract at-
tention. People stop and stare at
them and wonder why they are alive.
A good driver is unnoticed, except
by the people who are riding with
him. It is a pleasure to ride with a
good driver. It would be a blessing
if the show-off driver and the spec-
tacular drivers could be stopped with
a machinegun or cannon—because
they are just as dangerous, or more
so—to all the good drivers.

Here are some of the mistakes and
results which drivers made in 1937:
9,380 were killed while exceeding
speed limit.

3,440 on wrong side of road.
3,920 did not have right-of-way.
510 cutting in.
160 passing standing street cars.
360 passing on hills or curves.
310 improper signaling.
4,440 reckless driving.

These mistakes caused fatal ac-
cidents in which many innocent peo-
ple were killed. If a reckless or
drunken driver should cause a

wreck, in which a member of your
family would be fatally injured, you
would brand him as a murderer.
Don't be guilty of the careless mis-
takes.
A great percent of our accidents
occur on the week-ends, so let's be
alert, attentive, sober, courteous and
aware of the fact that we cannot
stop our car on a dime.

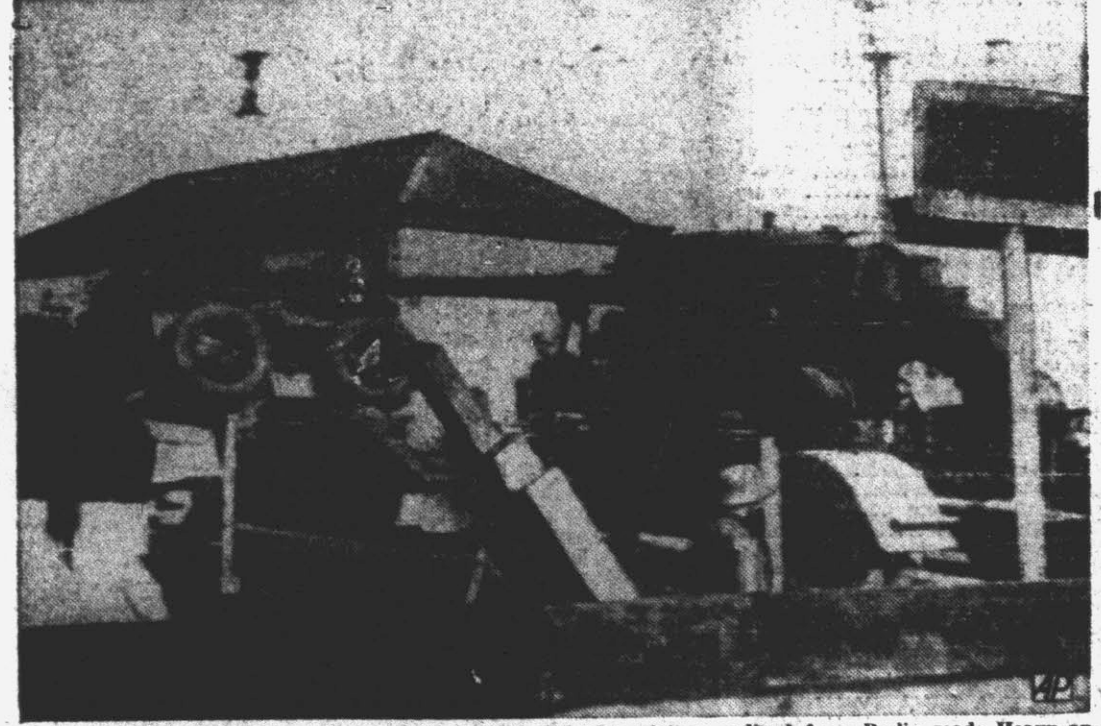

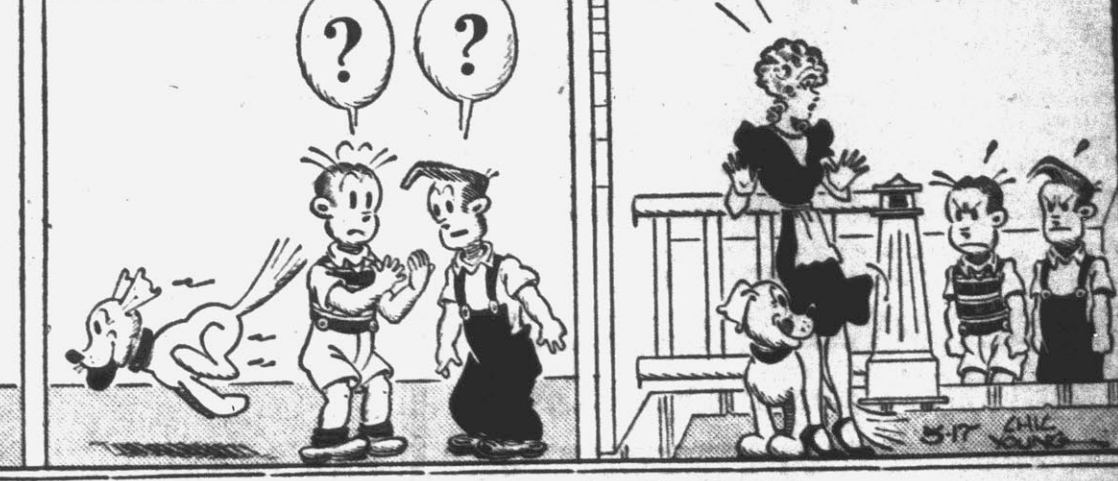

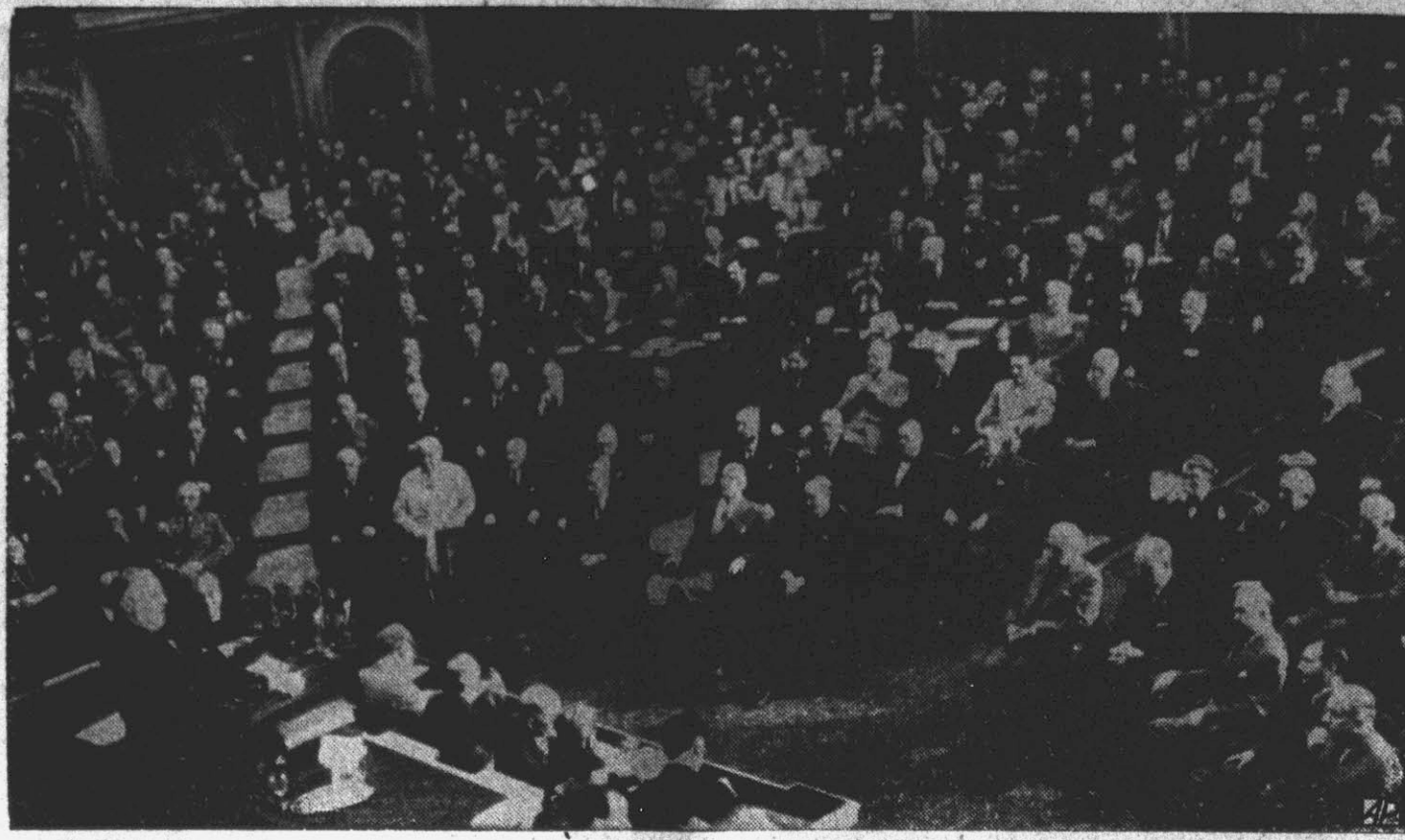

A spectacular battle continued through its third day in northern France, where the French said, that at least for the moment they had halted the German drive toward Paris. It was a battle of swiftly attacking

columns of tanks and armored cars and the mass use of aviation with no tendency to settle into the world war style of fixed lines.

The Germans, after see-saw fighting that lasted throughout the night, launched a new attack at dawn today.

In view of the grave developments, British Prime Minister Churchill flew to Paris from London yesterday, accompanied by military experts for an urgent conference with French leaders. Paris, meanwhile, maintained its calm after anti-aircraft batteries again were in action during the night. The military was in charge of the city as a result of last night's decree placing it in the army zone.

knew no one better qualified to speak to such a group.

"Can the sons and daughters of democracy be as tough as the sons and daughters of totalitarian states," was the question put by Commander Rose. There is a testing time ahead, he said. Some of the weaknesses in our democracy are the fault of the teaching profession. It has too long held back from taking any part in politics—from local, state, and national issues. Teachers have felt that politics was too dirty to take part in, and have perhaps been too much interested in keeping the status quo. Clubs like the Y. D. C. in a college like this, a teachers' college, should help change that condition, he declared.

We need more men interested in politics who do not want political jobs, he said. Also, we teachers need to learn from actual experience how the current is moving underneath. To be continuers of democracy, we must make democracy tough enough

to resist totalitarian ideas and must see that dictators do not arise here.

If this club of young Democrats can have a part in this, then it will be a valuable organization to have.

The chairman closed the program by introducing the other officers, Miss Ethel Gaston and Miss Christine Tripp, and the faculty adviser, Dr. R. L. Hilldrup.

An informal dance followed the program.
