MAJOR ALLIED OFFENSIVE IS EXPECTED

Nazi Campaign To Paris Stalled By Heavy Losses, Shifted Toward Channel

FRENCH ADMIT ANOTHER LOSS

Thrust Toward English Channel, If Successful, Might Isolate 300,000 British Soldiers And Attain Channel Bases For Attack On England; Germans Realize Threat Of Pincer Move

The Nazi blitzkrieg drive toward Paris, apparently stalled by staggering losses, veered today toward the English channel.

For the moment it seemed the Germans had abandoned their onslaught against the French capital. The German high command said the Nazi drive to the west had gained 20 to 30 miles on a line northward from St. Quentin, which is 80 miles northeast of Paris. Late today the French admitted they had withdrawn from St. Quentin.

If successful, it was estimated that the thrust to the English channel might isolate 300,000 British soldiers on the Allies' north flank and also attain channel bases for a quick start attack on England.

The channel port of Calais, presumably one of the main German objectives, is only 20 miles from Dover, England.

Paris dispatches said the new German march to the west comprised five mechanized divisions, or about 80,000 men, supported by tanks and bombing and fighting planes.

The sudden shift in Nazi tactics came as General Maxime Weygand, new commander in chief of the Allies, was reported massing a huge French-British-Belgian force to "pinch off" the 50-mile deep German salient striking into the heart of France on the Meuse river valley front.

The Germans apparently realized the threat of this pincer movement and decided to abandon the road to Paris.

Nine Cases Aired In Today's Court

Nine cases, two of them involving traffic accidents were aired in Municipal recorder's court this morning.

C. B. Galloway was acquitted in one wreck case, but R. L. Davis, a co-defendant, was convicted of driving to the left of the center of the highway and was ordered to pay \$10 on the costs. In the other wreck case both defendants, David Briley and M. F. Jolly were acquitted.

Lillie May Dawson, colored, was convicted of drunkenness, disorderly conduct and destroying personal property and was given 30 days, suspended upon payment of costs. Isaiah Cogdell, colored, was acquitted of disorderly conduct and assault.

Lewis Hodges was convicted of assault with a deadly weapon and was given a 12-months sentence. A co-defendant, Roy House, was acquitted. Clyde Whitfield, convicted of drunkenness, was given 30 days, suspended upon payment of costs.

John Green, colored, convicted of larceny, was given four months. Doreneus Smith, convicted of drunkenness was given 30 days, suspended upon payment of costs. Alton Williams, tendered a plea of guilty to larceny of an automobile and the case was bound over to Superior court.

NAZI DEMANDS ARE DECLINED

Sweden Refuses To Allow Transit Of Troops

Stockholm, May 20.—(AP)—Usually well informed circles declared themselves convinced today that Sweden had made plain to Germany that she could not permit transit of Nazi troops and supplies across the nation to help life the allied siege against German-held Narvik, Norwegian port.

Authoritative quarters, however, steadfastly denied rumors that formal demands for transit facilities had been received.

The rumors coincided with reports indicating that surrender of the small German force at Narvik were imminent and that only by quick reinforcements could Germany now hope to prevent defeat there.

No Signs of Italian Intention To Enter War

Rome, May 20.—(AP)—Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano is arranging to go to Albania, Italy's Balkan outpost, tomorrow as a sequel to his advice to Italians yesterday to be ready for a call from Premier Mussolini to gain the nation's aspirations.

Ciano, it was said, intends to inspect public works projects now under way in Albania, which Italy occupied, starting April 7, 1939, but his trip is bound to be watched closely because of Italy's military foothold there in the main Balkan peninsula between Yugoslavia and Greece.

Italian schools were ordered to close May 31, two weeks earlier than had been intended, but still there were no definite signs of imminent Italian entry into the European war.

Rumors that a mass meeting had been called for an important announcement by Mussolini were dispelled when authoritative quarters said that tonight's turnout in Piazza Venezia was to welcome a large Japanese delegation come to negotiate a new trade agreement.

U. S. MILITARY LEADERS URGE QUICK ACTION

Call On Aviation Industry To Cooperate

DISCUSS PLANS AT CONFERENCE

Would Achieve Goal Of 50,000 Planes As Quickly And Efficiently As Possible

Washington, May 20.—(AP)—The government's military chieftains urged the aviation industry today to achieve President Roosevelt's goal of a 50,000 plane air fleet "as quickly, as efficiently and as cheaply as possible."

The essentials of the program were repeated by ranking army, navy, treasury and Civil Aeronautics authority leaders at a hastily called conference of manufacturers of airplanes, engines, machine tools and allied products.

More than 100 prominent business men or their representatives attended to hear the pleas.

On Capitol Hill George Marshall, army chief of staff, told the House Military committee meanwhile that the War department wanted to extend the air corps to 10,000 planes.

The chief of staff remarked that President Roosevelt had spoken of a total of 50,000 planes a year, but said "we are thinking of a force of 10,000 planes."

The army is limited to 6,000 at present.

Louis Johnson, assistant secretary of war, one of the speakers at the conference, said "Rome wasn't built in a day and this work cannot be done in a day, but by teamwork we can do the job as quickly, as efficiently and at as small a cost as possible."

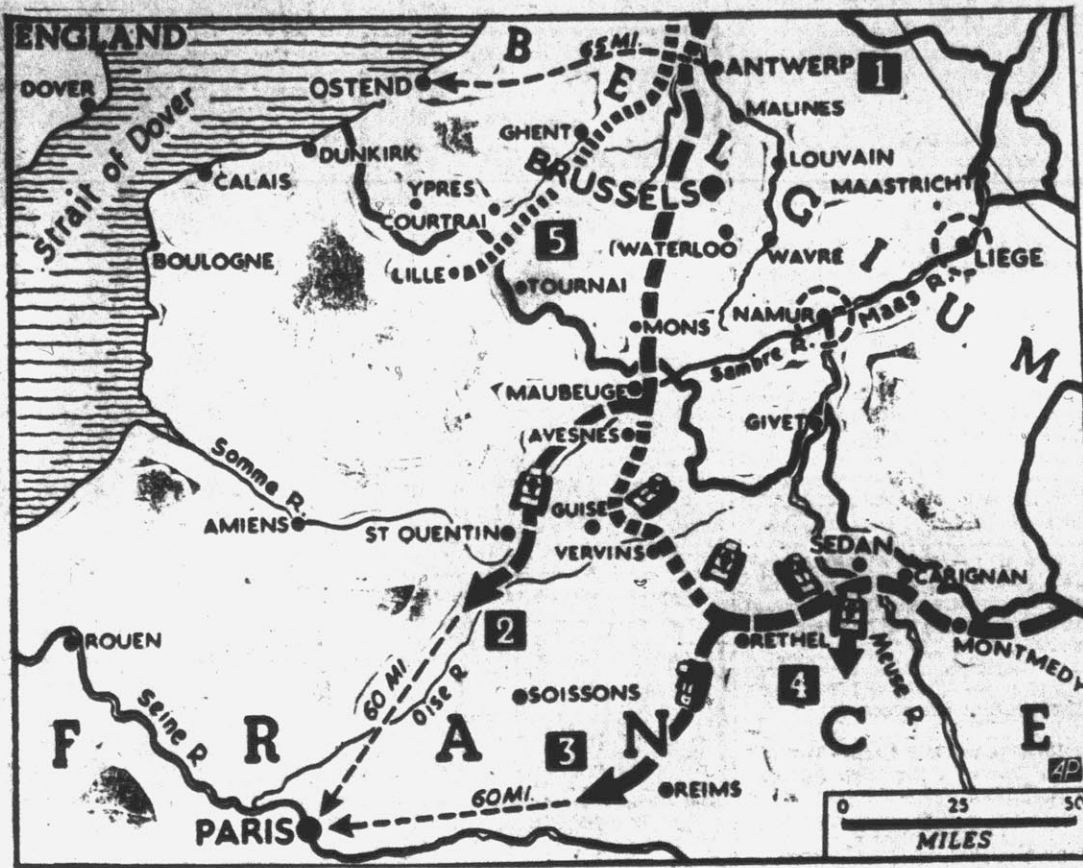

French Admit The Germans Widen Their Gains

GROUP ADOPTS DEFENSE BILL

Measure Quickly Adopted By Military Committee

Washington, May 20.—(AP)—A \$1,820,941,000 army bill, unprecedented in peace time, won quick approval of the Senate Appropriations committee today, while the nation's military chieftains urged speedy realization of President Roosevelt's goal of an air armada of 50,000 planes.

Leaders arranged to start Senate debate on the big army supply bill tomorrow and it may go to the House for consideration of Senate amendments by mid-week. The appropriations committee required only two hours to vote its approval.

Of the total in the bill \$1,497,711,368 cash would be available for expenditure immediately upon President Roosevelt's signature of the legislation.

The measure includes Mr. Roosevelt's recently requested allotment of \$44,770,364 in cash and \$186,229,636 in contract authorizations for army expansion, purchases of airplanes, materials, machinery and supplies.

PROPOSED U. S. TAKE ISLANDS

Sentiment For Acquisition Grows At Capital

Washington, May 20.—(AP)—Senate sentiment appeared to be growing today for American acquisition of Allies' islands in the West Indies to increase the security of the Panama canal.

Some law-makers proposed transfer of the property as part payment of World War debts and others suggested that the United States take over the land in the event Germany wins the European war.

Puerto Rico, now is the outpost for U. S. defenses in the Caribbean. Stretching between Florida and the east coast of South America, however, are dozens of little islands owned by the British, French and Dutch, all within striking distance by air of the canal.

Farther out in the Atlantic to the north Britain's Bermuda islands offer a possible base for airplane attacks either on the canal or on the United States mainland.

A company statement said that Lamont had terminated his services as president because he has reached an age when he realized a younger man must soon succeed him and because he wished more leisure than the duties of the office allowed him.

UPHOLD RIGHT TO FIX PRICES

Authority For Government Held In Court Opinion

Washington, May 20.—(AP)—The Supreme Court ruled, eight to one, today that the federal government has power to "undertake stabilization of an interstate industry through a process of price-fixing."

Justice Douglas delivered the majority decision opinion, which held constitutional the 1937 national bituminous coal act designed to stabilize the industry by fixing minimum prices and regulating marketing.

Asserting that the history of the bituminous coal industry was "written in blood as well as in ink," Douglas held that Congress was given power under the constitution to attempt to stabilize the industry.

"The commerce clause," the opinion said, "empowers Congress to undertake stabilization of an interstate industry through a process of price-fixing which safeguards the public interest by placing price control in the hands of its administrative representatives."

To Be Aimed Against Foe In Northern French Area

New Commander In Chief Of Allied Forces Reported To Be Massing Huge Army For Counter Thrust Intended To Pinch Off German Salient On Meuse River Front

General Maxime Weygand, the new commander-in-chief of the Allies, was reported today to be massing a huge British-French-Belgian army to "pinch off" the 50-mile German salient striking into the heart of France on the Meuse river valley front. Reports reaching Switzerland said Weygand envisioned a blasting counter thrust from each side of the Nazi "pocket" which has penetrated to a point about 80 miles from Paris.

The French War Ministry meanwhile disputed the Nazi high command report that German mechanized legions plunging a massive two-headed flanking movement toward the French capital and English channel had captured St. Quentin.

The French insisted that the city, 80 miles northeast of Paris, was the scene of see-saw fighting which left its fate still in doubt.

The German high command said flatly that St. Quentin had been captured.

Nazi mechanized forces were also said to have reached the historic Somme battlefield of 1916.

French military authorities admitted that the enemy was attacking furiously in the region east of Cambrai, only 70 miles from the channel port of Dunkirk, just across the channel from Dover, England.

The Nazi high command in claiming these successes, said the British were driven back under forced march toward the English channel.

The Allies suffered "the heaviest losses, especially armored troops," the high command declared.

Dreaded German Dive bomber squadrons in wave on wave were reported to have destroyed an armored allied column reaching north from Leon, at the southwest tip of the huge German "bulge" along the Meuse river front to combat the German advance in the St. Quentin sector.

WPA Invites Public To Visit Service Projects

Open House will be observed by all Professional and Service projects during the week May 20-25. At this time the public all over the United States is cordially invited to visit these projects to see for themselves what is being done and what remains to be done. It is hoped that every interested taxpayer in Pitt County will join in this activity and avail himself of the opportunity to see whether the program is worthwhile in the county.

At the present time there are eight types of projects operating in Pitt County, consisting of Adult Education, Library, Sewing Room, Surplus Commodity, Recreation, Matron Service, Historical Survey and Lunch, gardening and canning.

The Adult education program in Pitt county has seven teachers who are employed by WPA. There are two white and five negroes. Classes are conducted in Literacy, Home-making and Citizenship. According to the 1930 census one person out of every ten in North Carolina is unable to read or write. Of course, the 1940 census will not show illiteracy as having been completely wiped out during the ten years since the last census, but it should show a marked decrease in illiteracy.

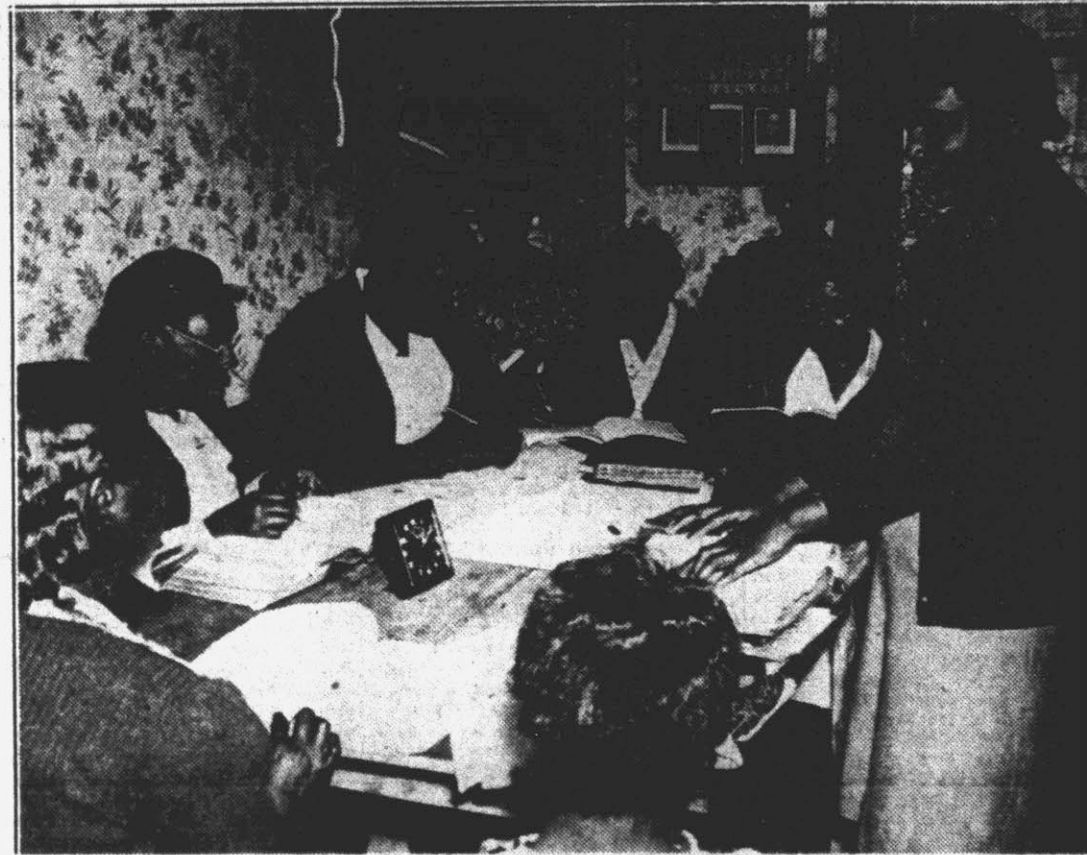
The Greenville WPA Gallery is functioning for the purpose of stimulating an interest in art among the citizens of the community of Greenville, and in Pitt county. The program is planned with the hope of cultivating a greater appreciation of art in the everyday life of the people. It is presented by means of exhibitions, gallery talks, demonstrations, clubs and other events pertaining to cultural education. A continuous line of exhibitions from the Exhibition Section of the WPA Art project in Washington, D. C., is furnished free of charge. The expense of exhibitions, others than these, are borne by the sponsoring group in the community. This project gives employment to four local WPA certified workers and furnishes the director of the gallery. The gallery has received visitors from sixteen States and Canada, and from one hundred towns and cities in North Carolina and has had an attendance of 13,500.

The WPA Library Project, whose aim is to demonstrate library service and to give employment to certified women, has been operating for the past three years in our county. In this time eleven school libraries and three public libraries have been established and organized. In addition, assistance has been given to the staff of the Sheppard Memorial Library. The circulation through these libraries now averages about 12,000 volumes per month. Since the operation of this project Pitt County has made an appropriation to give library service on a county-wide basis. This shows the rapid progress that Pitt county had made, but there are still many school libraries without any library facilities, and many people in the rural areas who do not yet have access to books.

Eleven women are employed in Greenville on the Sewing Room project. When you visit this unit it is hoped you will compare the operation with that of any garment-making factory and determine that WPA sewing projects are set up on an industrial basis, that garments made compare favorably in workmanship with factory-made ones, and that production cost is at an acceptable level. Approximately 7,000 garments were made during the last twelve months and these were turned over to the Pitt county welfare department for distribution to

its needy clients.

The Recreation program in Pitt county operates in Farmville, where maintenance workers and recreational leaders maintain play areas, recreation centers, club rooms, and conduct and promotes recreational activities. This program is sponsored by a recreation council which serves to govern the program, direct its growth and provide materials and facilities for carrying it on. Recreation aims at the intelligent

use of leisure time for all age groups.

There are twenty-five WPA workers employed on the Matrons project, servicing 67 rest rooms in the public schools of Pitt county. 8,075 children have been benefited by this service and probably no project operated by WPA will have such lasting influence on the health and morals of school children.

The Historical Records Survey was created in the winter of 1935-36 as

a nation-wide WPA project for the "discovery, preservation and listing of basic materials for research in the history of the United States." In 1939 it was terminated as a Federal project, and since has been sponsored locally, operation in a National program. Since its inception the North Carolina project has been sponsored and has worked in very close cooperation with the North Carolina Historical Commission, of which Dr. C. C. Crittenden

is Secretary.

The Lunch Room project was set up (1) to give employment to certified women, and (2) to serve lunches to the underprivileged and underweight children. Many principals of schools have reported that students have gained as much as eleven pounds since the lunch room opened. They also report that the number of promotions has steadily increased since the children are being served an adequate meal each day. In Pitt county there are thirty-two lunch room workers who served 32,578 free lunches to needy children since January 1, 1940.

Besides giving employment to 1,000 unemployed persons in the county, WPA P. & S. Division alone has a payroll of \$24,416.40.

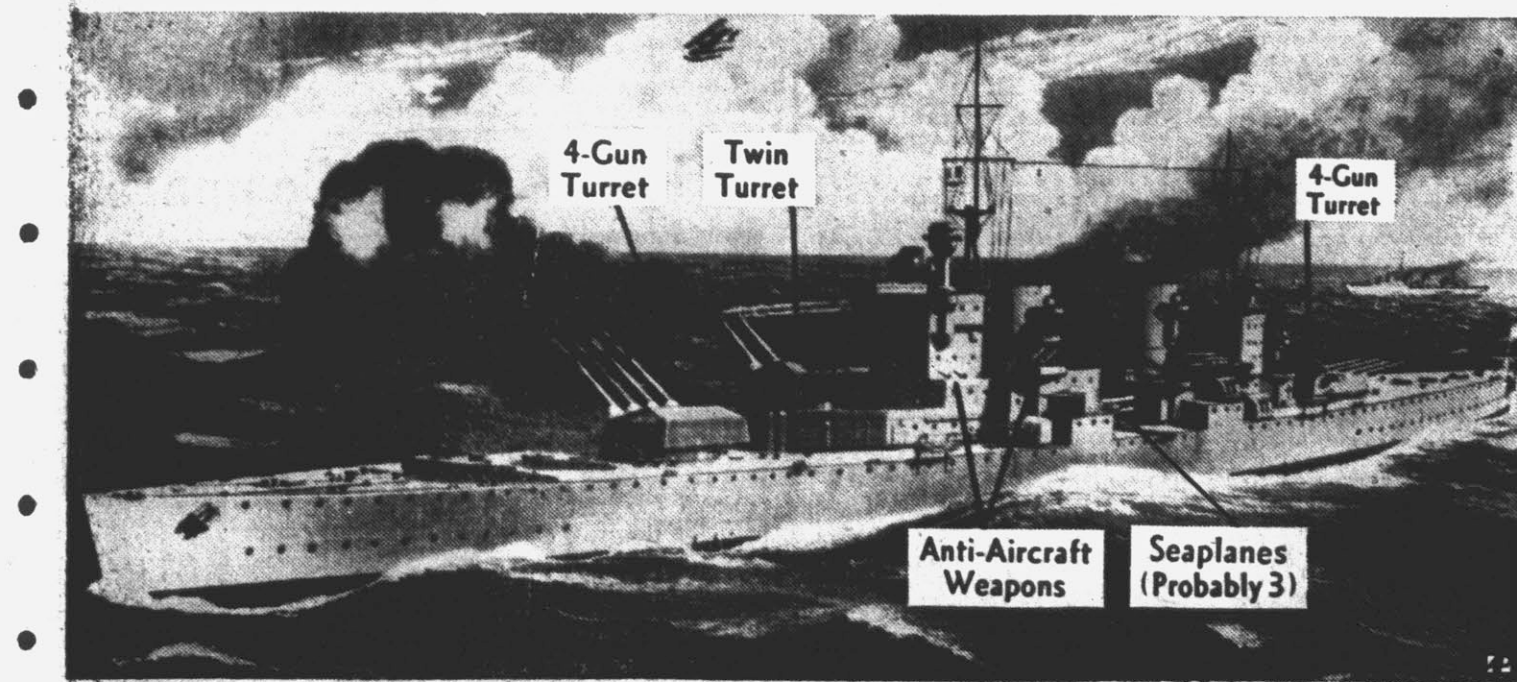

Britain Turns Out 5 New Super-warships

'The Most Strongly Protected In The World'



What Battleships Of The George V Class Will Look Like

AP Feature Service
London.—The Royal Navy is commissioning five 35,000-ton battleships for its fight against Germany. Experts say the new men of war are "the most strongly-protected battleships in the world."

The new ships were laid down in the first five months of 1937. Called the King George V class, each carries ten 14-inch guns and sixteen 3.25 guns, plus what the British Admiralty calls "enhanced defense against air attack."

In addition to the King George V, named for the present sovereign's father, the class includes the Prince of Wales, named for the

king's elder brother, now Duke of Windsor; the Duke of York, commemorating the title the king used before his accession to the throne, and the Jellicoe and the Beatty, after the World War admirals whom Britain rewarded with earldoms and big grants of money.

Armor 16 Inches Thick
The 14-inch guns of the new ships are a new model, officially stated to have greater effective range than the 15-inch guns of earlier ships, "as measured by the perforation of any given thickness of armor."

Unofficial but "authoritative" reports placed armor weight of each of the new ships at 14,000 tons, and

waterline thickness at 16 inches.

Main armaments are the four-gun turrets, one forward and one aft. Experts say the King George V ships carry "probably three" seaplanes. There are no torpedo tubes.

The King George V class is exceeded in size only by the 40,000-ton Lion and Temeraire and two unnamed others of the same class, which still are under construction and by the 42,100-ton battlecruiser Hood, largest warship in the world. In addition to the 4-gun turret each ship carries one twin turret of 14-inch guns and many smaller guns, mostly anti-aircraft weapons. Each will carry 1,500 officers and men compared to the 1,361 of the

Nelson. Weight of defensive armor in each ship is 40 per cent of her displacement of 35,000 tons, reportedly a world's record. The speed is more than 30 knots—34½ miles per hour—compared with the Nelson's 23 knots. The battlecruiser Hood, launched in 1918, has a designed speed of 31 knots.

Shells Weigh 1,400 Pounds
The "new model" 14-inch guns fire shells weighing "at least 1,400 pounds and probably more," and have a high rate of fire. They are superior to the 15-inch guns of Britain's older battleships in range and can penetrate thicker armor. Completion of the King George V class raises Britain's capital ship strength to 19, with at least four more building.

IT DEPENDS UPON US
... and we've gazed Robert Louis
Stevenson with almost his last
breath. "I have had a splendid life."

Year after year had been spent in
it. He had been an exile from his
native land for a long time seek-
ing health in parts of the world
where the climate was milder than
that of Scotland.

Abraham Lincoln once said that
people are generally about as happy
as they make up their minds to be.
Some cannot be happy amid wealth
and luxury, as we very well know
from the high suicide rate among
the privileged class. The people who
complain most are often those who
have most, and the most radiant
souls are frequently recruited from
among those to whom life has ap-
parently handed a pretty raw deal.

Happiness does not depend on what
we have, but on the way we take
what we have, be that much or little.
If one has a happy heart, a crust of
bread will cause him to rejoice; but
if he has an unhappy heart, fifty
thousand a year and achievement in
any or all fields will not suffice to
draw him out of himself.

To a certain extent people are
born with tendencies toward cheer-
fulness or melancholy. But not to
the extent that they can do nothing
about the matter. If we but have
the will to do so, we can make our-
selves happy in sickness as well as
in health, in poverty as well as in
affluence, in trouble as well as in
good fortune.

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WORLD SITUATION
THREATENS SECURITY
OF THE UNITED STATES

The agility of the daring
young man on the flying tra-
peze may soon be needed by
both the White House and the
State Department as this coun-
try watches Japan, Mexico, the Pacific, the At-
lantic, the Caribbean, Italy
and South America, while
the Nazis continue to blast
their way through the low
countries.

According to reports
which reached Washington
some time ago, if Hitler is
successful in his war against
the Allies, Japan was prom-
ised supremacy in the Pacific,
with the Dutch East In-
dies and French Indo-China
as its prize. In order to pre-
vent friction between Japan
and the U. S. S. R., the latter
will be offered Eastern China
—now under Chiang Kai-
shek—and Northern India.

Northern Africa will be
Mussolini's reward, while
the Reich will dominate Eu-
rope and exercise controlling
influence over the other
three totalitarian states.

The alarming develop-
ments in Europe are pre-
sented to the White House
and the State Department



critical problems which must
be decided not at some more
convenient time, say after
the election in November, or
in the next months or weeks,
but within the hour, and
these choices are of the
greatest magnitude.

Reports reaching Wash-
ington from every section of
the United States, show that
President Roosevelt un-
doubtedly spoke for the Am-
erican people when he de-
clared, in addressing the
American Scientific Con-
gress in Washington: "We
are shocked and angered by
the tragic news from Bel-
gium, and The Netherlands
and Luxembourg."

Both Congress and the
President are holding fast to
a policy of non-involvement
in the European war, but, in
the opinion of close observers,
it is useless to pretend
that we draw no distinction
between the forces fighting
in Europe. The United
States does not and cannot
condone the subjugation of
independent countries and
the slaughter of people to
gain military objects. That
inexcusable practice is a
crime against free nations in
general.

This country, they insist,
would be blind to its own in-
terests if it did not condemn
such resort to the law of the
jungle and, by measures
short of war, aid the victims
of unprovoked aggression.
Apparently neutrality has no
meaning when such a merci-
less military machine as Hit-
ler's is in full operation. No
free country can possibly be
indifferent to a war of this
kind, for, as President Roose-
velt points out, it is a chal-
lenge to the civilization to
which we have become ac-
customed. — Scottish Rite
News.

Washington.—There's a 50-50
chance that the next congress
will have among its representatives
the only man who for 20 years suc-
cessfully competed with the Wash-
ington Monument as a capital drawing card.
Walter Perry Johnson, the "Big
Train" of baseball and the greatest
pitcher the big leagues ever turned
out, is the Republican nominee in
the sixth Maryland district. Politi-
cal wiseacres say he has an even
chance of tossing a third strike on
the Democratic incumbent, William
D. Byron.

Over and over, I've heard the
story since his nomination from
men who came here as youngsters
during the two decades that fol-
lowed 1907: "When Walter Johnson
was pitching, you couldn't get a kid

to go near the Washington Monu-
ment or the White House.

"There wasn't a boy who came to
town in those days who wouldn't
rather have had one brief 'Hi, son'
from Walter than to have shaken
hands with Presidents 'Teddy'
Roosevelt, Taft, Wilson, Harding
and Coolidge all at once."

Rookies Are Bench-
ed
If the big, slow-talking Maryland
farmer does come to congress next
January he'll still be a drawing
card, but it'll be on past perfor-
mance. Rookies in the congressional
league scarcely ever get a chance to
pitch.

Take a dynamic fellow like Bruce
Barton, for example. Before he ran
for representative from New York,
he already had had his finger in
national affairs and big business.
He had written books, made speech-
es. He told folks he was coming
down to Washington and repeat a
bill a day.

Now I haven't checked up lately,
but I don't think Mr. Barton has
repealed a bill at all. Rookies in the
House just don't do that sort of
thing. If they are smart, they spend
a couple of years bench-warming.
If they go trying to lambast a
homerun every time somebody lets
them hold a bat, they're likely to
find themselves back in the bush
leagues.

Now if Walter Johnson does come
down here in January and you want
to drop in and see the man who for
20 years outdrew the Washington
Monument at the tourist turnstile,
come ahead. But don't expect him

to be throwing any legislative speed-
balls. Not even the killer-diller poli-
ticians do that in their first two
years and Walter is no killer-diller.

A 50-Cent Campaign
He did get himself elected com-
missioner of Montgomery county,
where his 550-acre farm is located,
and he did get the nomination to
congress, but he didn't use much
politics.

His first campaign cost him 50
cents for campaign cards, and his
second couldn't have cost him much
more. He doesn't like to make
speeches. He's so modest that it's
impossible for him to tell the crowd
what a swell representative he
would make. He couldn't even re-
mind you that he used to be a
pretty good pitcher without blush-
ing.

He is Republican and anti-New
Deal, all right, but he can't get
very mad about it. His political phi-
losophy consists of something about
"a return to the American way of
life," which apparently means to
Walter the right of every man to
plant his own potatoes, hoe his own
crop, and sell them for the best
price he can get, without anybody
butting in. He doesn't like govern-
ment spending on a big scale either.
That's about all, except he's so hon-
est, he would argue with an umpire
who mis-called a decision in his fa-
vor.

In some respects, Walter might
be almost as unique in congress as
he was on the mound. If he does get
in, he'll be interesting to watch,
once his rookie days are over.

It's also because Italy might suddenly decide to become Germany's fighting ally and try to break through the mountain passes into France.

FDR.

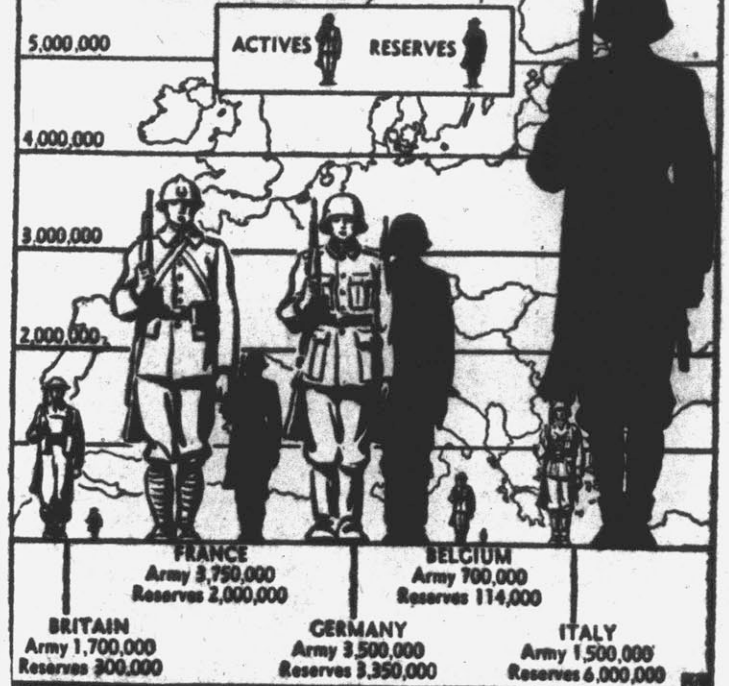

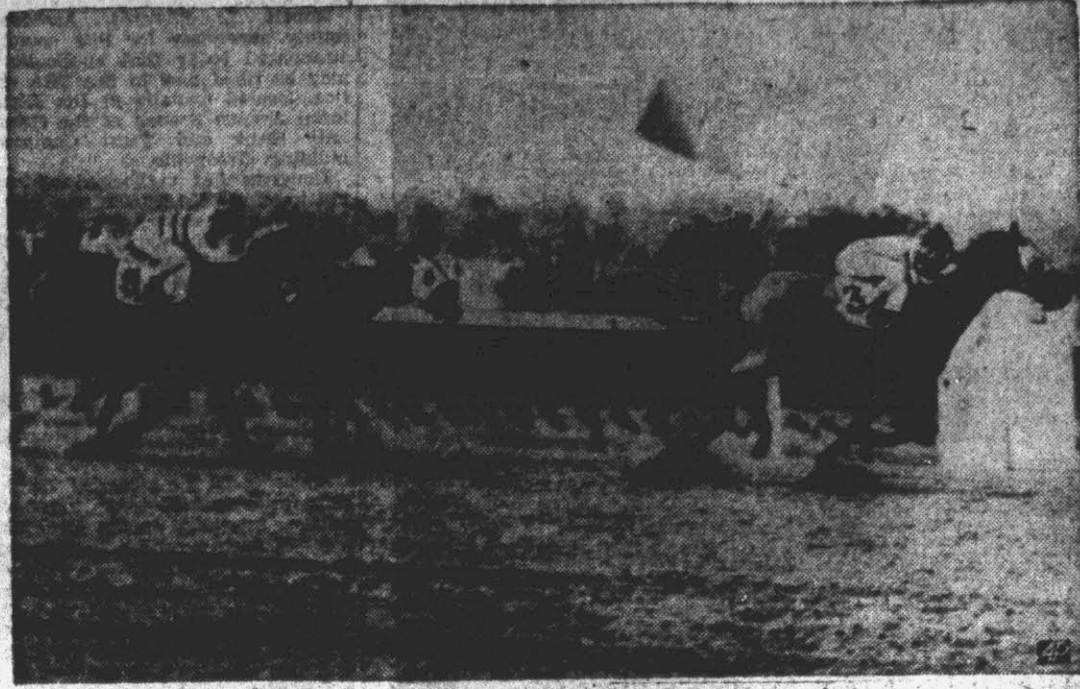

Hatem made a homer in yesterday's game, but the New Bern boys proved too much for the locals. Greenville got 16 hits to New Bern's 17.

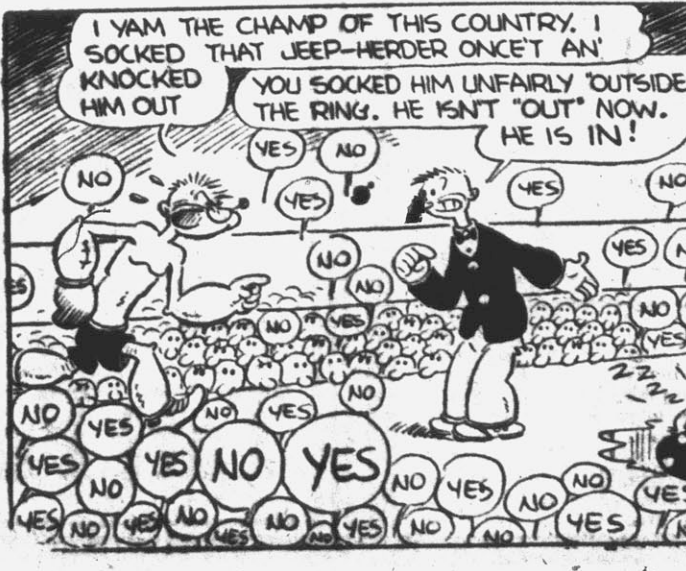

Thereafter this scribe would retire into strict privacy, ready to be completely untroubled if the candidates finished in completely different order—with one exception. If you want this corner to bet, the only wager it will make is that Simmons will be last. Grady could beat Cooper, Cooper could beat anybody or everybody. Grady can be anywhere from 1 to 4. The first three could be bracketed.

The order in which the candidates are now listed is not that in which your reporter would have put them two days or two weeks ago; but this has been a campaign of apparent, if not real, peaks and valleys of popularity for the various candidates. And here there are a few exceptions, too. There never has been a peak for Simmons or Grady. They've been down all the way. There hasn't been much of a peak for Cooper. Grady is for the first time beginning to gain a bit of altitude. Horton has been as far down as a formidable candidate could be that was just about the time he made his formal announcement. Broughton has been a consistent front runner with the exception of a brief period some weeks back when there were indications he was slipping badly. At that time Horton was on a peak. It now seems that the Broughton curve is upward.

while Horton's is down. Which brings the thing around to Maxwell. The Commissioner started with strength acknowledged on all sides. If he's lost any of it, it has not been apparent. On the other hand there are signs that he has picked up in many sections. 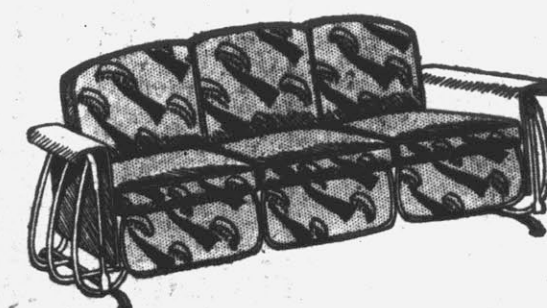
