NAZIS EXTENDING DRIVES

Italy's Immediate Entrance Into Conflict Is Expected

AWAITS ORDER OF MUSSOLINI

Blackouts of Chief Industrial Centers and Air Raid Drills and Statements in Press Lead to Belief That Italians May be Called to Fight On One Of Nation's Frontiers

Rome, May 21.—(AP)—Italy, Germany's non-belligerent ally, appeared today to be preparing to enter the war as she ordered blackouts and air raid drills in her chief industrial areas for a three-day test beginning tonight.

Speeches of Foreign Minister Ciano in Milan and Cremona, in which he said that Italy awaits only "the order of the day" from Premier Mussolini "when he will have decided upon it," increased the feeling among Italians that they might be called shortly to fight on one of their frontiers.

Diplomatic circles attached significance to an article in Ciano's newspaper asserting "the hour is near when our influence on the course of events must be more active."

When Italy does move, it added, "one of its objectives will be territorial increases."

The paper declared that although Britain and France undoubtedly would react differently now to Italian claims than they did two months ago, it would be "too late."

Telephone connections between Rome and London, meanwhile, remained suspended.

The possibility of Italy's entrance into the conflict in the immediate future was indicated further by the air raid drills, which were the first ordered since the opening days of the war last September.

Skopje, Yugoslavia, May 21.—(AP)—The frontier between Yugoslavia and Italian-held Albania was closed today by Italian order.

News of the border closing was received here shortly after the announcement in Rome that Italian Foreign Minister Count Ciano was leaving for Tirana, capital of Albania, now part of the Italian empire.

Reports filtering across the frontier to Yugoslav military quarters here said the Italian army had speeded up transport or large quantities of war materials to Albania.

Fire completely destroyed the Mount Feed Mill on the corner of 14th and Railroad streets here today around 11:45 o'clock. J. H. Blount, proprietor, estimated the loss to range around \$15,000.

The building and equipment were total loss. This was one of the heaviest losses experienced by a fire in Greenville during the current spring months.

Two Boys Held In Sunday Robberies

Greenville police officials today announced the arrest and confession of two white juveniles in connection with the Sunday robberies of the training school and Sheppard Memorial library.

Officers said they had recovered the loot, composed of fountain pens, glasses and musical instruments taken from the school building and stamps, a magnifying glass and a book from the library. Part of the loot was found on the boys, part at their homes and part hidden behind a store in the business district.

The two boys, Charles Kinlon and E. E. Barber, were quoted by authorities to have admitted the robberies. What disposition will be made of the case has not been decided.

President Will Confer With Landon Tomorrow

SUGG IS HEARD BY CIVIC CLUB

Urges Cooperation of All In Current Crisis

Another crisis confronts the tobacco growers but by cooperation of everyone—business men, professional men and farmers—the set back will be overcome, declared B. B. Sugg, prominent business man, banker, and tobaccoist, in a brief address last night to the Greenville Rotary club in its regular weekly dinner session. He exhorted his hearers to follow the lead of the bankers and cooperate in meeting this crisis as have others which have faced Pitt county.

The war in China and Europe has upset the exchange value of money and the normal channels of purchase and handling which has removed these two countries from the market. Normally they buy 400 million pounds of tobacco bought each year—350 million is brought for domestic consumption. Last year over a billion pounds was produced in the absence of crop control further upsetting the market with excess tobacco, he explained.

Last year a similar prospect precipitated a crisis and the Federal government saved the situation by having the Commodities Credit Corporation buy the tobacco usually setting a solution for the tobacco, he explained.

The bankers of this tobacco section in their recent convention went on record as approving a three crop corn control program. The bankers have been cooperating and sitting in on conferences to try to help work out a solution for the tobacco (Continued on Page Six)

Mix-Up In Arrangements Is Straightened Out

Washington, May 21.—(AP)—The White House said today that Alf M. Landon definitely would confer with President Roosevelt tomorrow, although there had been a mix-up in arrangements and that as a preliminary Rep. Wadsworth (R-NY) would lunch with the chief executive today.

Stephen Early, White House press secretary, said that efforts had been made to postpone the visit of Landon, 1936 Republican presidential nominee, until Thursday.

But through a misunderstanding, he said, some of those involved in making the arrangements thought the engagement was being cancelled. Now, Early explained, the original plan for the President to talk with Landon tomorrow will be followed.

Chicago, May 21.—(AP)—Alf M. Landon, who said last night an invitation to a White House conference had been rescinded, announced today he was going to Washington after receiving a personal telephone call from President Roosevelt.

The Republican leader received a long distance telephone call in the midst of a conference with reporters regarding last night's cancellation of a White House invitation. Landon said the call was from the White House and the President "wants me to come on down."

Landon received word from Brig. General E. M. Watson, presidential secretary, last night that the meeting had been postponed "indefinitely."

He had answered a question concerning the rescinding of the meeting with Mr. Roosevelt, but after talking with the President declined statement he had made.

Cruiser And Mine-Layer Acknowledged To Have Been Sunk; Home Defenses Being Pressed At High Speed As German Drive Threatens Air Attack And Actual Invasion of Isles

London, May 21.—(AP)—Loss of the 9,550-ton cruiser Effingham and the mine-layer Princess Victoria was announced today by the Admiralty on the darkest day of the war for Britain, menaced by threats of Nazi invasion.

The Admiralty said the Effingham had been lost after striking a rock off the Norwegian coast. She became a total loss but all aboard were saved.

Loss of the entire crew, 31 men and two officers, of the mine-layer was feared.

British home defenses were pressed at "war speed" as the German lightning drive toward France's north coast brought steadily nearer the double threat of air attacks and actual Nazi invasion.

"Invasion of Britain is perfectly feasible," declared the Daily Express. "But it can not be successful if we are prepared."

Public clamor echoed Prime Minister Churchill's demand Sunday that "we must have quickly more tanks, more airplanes, more shells and more guns" as reports indicate a lack of material had caused repeated withdrawals in the vast "defensive battle" in France.

ASKS REMOVAL OF WPA LIMITS

Roosevelt Seeks Elimination Of Cost Restriction

Washington, May 21.—(AP)—President Roosevelt urged Congress today to remove a relief bill cost limit on WPA projects and contended that advocates of the limitation could "be charged with a desire to return to 'boondoggling.'" The President in a letter to Representative Cannon (D-Mo) expressed opposition to provisions in the pending \$975,650,000 bill, which would limit the cost of a federal project to \$50,000 and the federal contribution to a non-federal project to the same amount.

"The commissioner of works projects," the letter said "informs me that the proportion of relief labor on large construction projects is in many cases greater than on small projects and furthermore that the over-all proportion of relief labor on all construction projects now in operation is between 96 and 97 per cent."

It added: "The limitation would have a particularly harmful effect upon the attempt which is being made to use the program of the WPA to further national defense."

Mr. Roosevelt vetoed as not needed, in view of "a sufficient backlog," a bill authorizing appropriations of \$109,985,450 for rivers and harbors improvement—ants and surveys. The house committee on un-American activities listened in private to Nicholas Dozenberg after the one-time Communist leader protested that he could not talk publicly of his possible connection with the Soviet government "no matter what you do to me."

NAVY ORDERED RUSH WORK ON NEW BUILDING

To Employ Additional Shifts In Defense Activities

ORDER AFFECTS PRIVATE FIRMS

Civilian Shipbuilding Forces To Be Increased By At Least 15,000 Within Three Months

Washington, May 21.—(AP)—All navy establishments were ordered today by Lewis Compton, acting secretary, to speed up defense preparations, by working additional shifts and by increasing civilian shipbuilding forces by at least 15,000 within three months.

Compton sent a letter to the commanders of all naval districts, yards and stations, all bureaus and offices of the Navy department and headquarters of the Marine corps.

"There are 66 warships under construction or projected including 8 battleships."

"In connection with the army phase of the emergency defense program, meanwhile, it was forecast that the House Military committee would vote to remove for a prescribed period all limits on the number of planes the army may procure."

This action, committee members said, would be in line with President Roosevelt's proposal for a 50,000-plane army and navy force.

The army has asked only that the air corps present limit of 6,000 planes to be raised to 10,000, but committee members said that in view of President Roosevelt's recommendation of world conditions, the army should not be hampered by legislative restrictions.

Even as Compton's order was announced, President Roosevelt concentrated on navy affairs, summoning ranking admirals and Senate and House committee chairmen to a conference at which the effects of federal labor laws on shipbuilding were expected to be discussed.

The House committee approved a proposal to authorize the navy to dismiss without regard to the civil service law employees engaging in subversive activities. The committee withheld final action on the legislation, however, until Chairman Vinson of the House Naval committee could take to the White House a set of amendments designed to relax the labor laws.

William Whitehurst, 4-H club boy of Grifton, won the county-wide annual health contest conducted by the Home Demonstration and Health offices yesterday afternoon and will represent the county in the district contest to be held in Tarboro June 18.

Announcement was made yesterday that Isabelle Barnhill was declared winner in the senior girls' group. Other winners among the girls also were announced yesterday, showing Audrey Patrick of Grifton and Fumey Muri Mills of Grifton runners up in the senior group and Jean Forbes of Pactolus, Beulah Raspberry of Bell Arthur and Anne Smith of Bell Arthur ranking one, two and three in the junior girls' group.

Burley Smith of Chicod was second in the senior boys' group, Tillman Chauncey of Grifton third and Winfred Sutton of Grimesland was fourth.

Stephen Humbles of Red Oak was declared winner in the junior boys' group, with J. Brooks Tucker, Jr., of Grimesland second and Thurman Dail of Pactolus third.

A total of 166 boys and 199 girls were entered in the local contests, with 10 boys and 16 girls ranking 97 or better. The county contests were entered by eight boys and 12 girls.

Reynaud Reviews Mistakes of War

Says Truth Alone Can Save The Fatherland

Paris, May 21.—(AP)—Premier Reynaud blamed the French high command today for "incredible faults" because of which disaster, xxx total disorganization" was inflicted by German armored blows on the French army defending the Meuse.

The premier solemnly told the Senate those "faults will be punished."

"But he declared there was no need for further disaster 'if each soldier realizes his enormous task and the millions of sons of France realize their future is at stake.'"

"France can not die. If a miracle is needed to save France I believe in miracles, because I believe in France."

Telling the senators "the truth," because it alone "can save the fatherland," the premier declared "we must make immediate decisions."

He admitted that France had suffered from a lack of machine guns. He explained the disorganization of the army assigned to hold the line of Meuse river in Belgium by disclosure that French divisions "were less numerous" in that sector.

"The best troops had been sent farther into Belgium," the premier continued, declaring that made it "easy" for an enemy mobile unit to penetrate into the Meuse region.

The premier laid part of the blame for the Nazi advance on the failure of such defenders to blow up bridges across the Meuse.

These faults "will be punished," he shouted, and the Senate, which had been listening in somber silence, broke into cheers.

Chairman Reviews History Of Poppy

How a simple little wild flower became a symbol of exalted sacrifice was described by Mrs. R. D. Whitchard, American Legion Auxiliary poppy chairman, at Legion headquarters today as Auxiliary women continued their preparations for the observance of Poppy Day, Saturday, May 25.

"The wild poppy of France and Flanders was the one touch of nature's beauty which survived amid the death and destruction of the battle front," said Mrs. Whitchard. "It grew and bloomed around the trenches and shell holes. It sprang up on the fresh graves of the battle dead and became associated in the thoughts of the soldiers with the sacrifice of their fallen comrades."

"Colonel John McCrae, of the Canadian forces, saw the brave little flowers and wrote: 'In Flanders fields the poppies blow, between the crosses row on row—' giving immortal expression to the idea."

"Poppies were first worn in America in tribute to the war dead on November 9, 1918, two days before the Armistice, when Miss Moina Michael, of Athens, Georgia, distributed poppies at the Y. M. C. A. headquarters in New York city. In June, 1919, they were sold on the streets of Milwaukee in connection with the home-coming of the Thirty-second Division. The American Legion adopted the poppy as its memorial flower at its national convention in Cleveland in 1920, and one of the first acts of the Auxiliary's first national convention in Kansas City in 1921 was to make the poppy the memorial flower of the Auxiliary. The British Legion also uses the poppy as its memorial flower and distributes millions throughout the world."

"In addition to honoring the dead, the poppy brings more than \$1,000,000 each year for the work of the Legion and Auxiliary in behalf of the disabled veterans and the families of the dead and disabled."

HOUSE PASSES TOBACCO ACT

Amendments To Agricultural Law are Expected

Washington, May 21.—The tobacco amendments to the Agricultural Adjustment Act embodying the views of tobacco farmers and agreed to by Members of the House from tobacco districts were unanimously passed by the House yesterday.

The bill introduced by Representative Harold Cooley and reported by him from the Committee on Agriculture was on the Consent Calendar but had not been on there long enough to make it eligible for consideration Monday. Sensing the situation, Representative Lindsay Warren asked unanimous consent for the immediate consideration of the bill as Mr. Cooley had not returned from North Carolina. Immediately Minority Leader Martin and Representatives Schafer of Wisconsin and Wolcott of Michigan entered objections, but were persuaded by Mr. Warren, Judge Kerr and Representative Burch of Virginia to withdraw them. Senate action is expected shortly.

Had the bill not been passed today it could not have been considered until June 3rd.

Utah Cave Reopened

Salt Lake City.—(AP)—Minnetonka Cave, near St. Charles, Utah, will be reopened to the public this fall, with new trails and lighting installed by the national park service. Discovered 30 years ago, the great cavern was closed about 1930 when vandalism threatened to destroy its beauties.

THREE FRENCH CITIES SEIZED

Drive To West Declared To Have Surpassed Those Scored By Kaiser's Imperial Army During Entire World War; Britain Describes Battle As More Confused Than Ever.

Nazi blitzkrieg legions in a two-forked flash to the west and south drove to within 12 miles of the English channel, the German high command announced today and said they were within sight of the Eiffel tower in Paris, only 69 miles away.

The French cities of Arras, Amiens and Abbeville were seized, the high command said.

A French War Ministry spokesman said the Germans were meeting "furious resistance" everywhere.

The drive to the west—apparently an attack on England itself—surpassed the westward gains scored by Kaiser Wilhelm's Imperial army in all the World war.

Other German columns forking south from the Meuse river front in the Sedan sector were reported within sight of the Eiffel tower in Paris.

The German high command reported that the ninth French army defending the Meuse front from Namur to Sedan has been crushed in "the biggest attacking operation of all time."

By contrast, a British spokesman described the battle on the Western front as "more confused than ever, with everybody behind everybody else's lines."

It was apparently a wide open scrimmage as confusing as part of a football game.

A British spokesman said there were "bands of German tanks, wandering about living on the country" in a wide salient striking into France. He said, however, they were "becoming more vulnerable to counter attacks."

The Nazi high command reported that "General Giraud, hitherto commander of the seventh French army who assumed command over the ninth army," had been "captured with his general staff."

The German communiqué said Hitler's armies were "crowding toward the channel coast all the French and Belgian armies still to be found north of the Somme."

Earlier German estimates said 1,000,000 French and 250,000 Belgians were fighting in this area with some 300,000 British soldiers to the north of these.

Paris, May 21.—(AP)—The Germans striking with devastating force hurled their armored cars today almost to the English channel.

Amiens and Arras, on the edge of the coastal plain, were ablaze and (Continued on Page Six)

LUNCH ROOMS PROVIDE JOBS

WPA Projects Set Up For Two Fold Purpose

The WPA Lunch Room project was set up to give employment to certified women and to serve lunches to underprivileged and undernourished schoolchildren.

In many counties the Health Department determines the children whose physical condition denotes the need for hot lunch by weighing and measuring them. Charts are kept all year recording the gain of each pupil. The Welfare Department determines the children coming from needy families who shall be given free lunch. The P.T.A. visiting committee and teachers can also refer children who by their work show the need for hot lunch. Some of the children who are so much underweight are given both breakfast and lunch.

The lunch received by the underprivileged child and the child who pays for his lunch is exactly the same, and only one menu is served each day. No one is permitted to handle money in our lunch rooms, so the children who enter the room must have tickets, exactly alike, and those of the lunch room workers themselves do not know who receives free lunches, as the children select their own lunch and sit where they please.

WPA Lunch Rooms have to observe the same rules as public eating places. Each worker must have a food handlers certificate posted on the project, and they are also required to wear white cotton uniforms and head bands, which are furnished by the WPA.

Food is secured in various ways: by sponsors of the project, and interested citizens, children whose parents are able to contribute money, children whose parents are able to contribute food. Food is allotted to schools by the Surplus Commodities Division. Food is produced and canned from school gardens and fresh foods are grown in fall and winter gardens. The gardening and canning work is done during the summer months by the lunch room workers.

In Pitt county there are thirty-two lunch room workers who have served 32,578 free lunches to needy children since January 1, 1940.

Madron Service.
There are twenty-five WPA workers employed on the matrons project servicing 67 rest rooms in the Public schools of Pitt county. 8,075 children have benefited by this service.

The matrons also care for first aid rooms, nurse sick children, give first aid to injured children under the supervision of the teacher, mend children's clothes when torn at school, teach the children proper use of toilet fixtures and economy in the use of towels soap and other toilet supplies.

Some of the principals, when approached about matron's service work in their schools were skeptical, they didn't think there was enough work in the rest rooms to keep a person busy. Now those principals find they can use not only one matron but three and sometimes four. They also state that school buildings are cleaner now than they ever were before matron service was introduced into the schools. Probably no project ever operated by WPA will have such lasting influence on the health and morals of school children.

Already the Dare County Chamber of Commerce is distributing thousands of copies of a pamphlet which goes into costliest over the performance, cites the favorable opinion of many theatrical critics, and quotes President Franklin D. Organization Headquarters To Continue Stay Open

Raleigh, May 20.—North Carolina for Roosevelt headquarters has not been abandoned, despite an item in Raleigh's morning paper to that effect Saturday.

On the contrary the Third-Term organization will continue to function, though of course on a less elaborate scale, right up to meeting of the Democratic National convention this summer, and perhaps even thereafter—certainly if the President is renominated as it is now indicated he will be.

Already the headquarters has been moved from the Seventh floor of the Sir Walter—where the staff was located in a big sample room, to the first floor, where a skeleton staff will carry on in Room 102.

Former State Senator John Folger, chairman of the Roosevelt movement; State Senator John D. Larkin, Jr., assistant chairman; and Dr. Ralph W. McDonald, real power-behind-the-throne, said they do not know exactly what there will be for the organization to do at the present time.

"But North Carolina is still for Roosevelt and we propose to see that nothing is left undone in his behalf," Dr. McDonald added.

The leaders are naturally jubilant at the success which capped their efforts to assure North Carolina's 26 convention votes for renomination of the President.

They feel, as do most observers, that without their organization, the Tar Heel 26 would have gone to Chicago either uninstructed or with instructions to vote for some one other than FDR.

Mr. Sugg reviewed the series of crises that have confronted tobacco farmers since 1914 and how each was finally met and the difficulties overcome. He did not hesitate to declare the plight was real but he said he had confidence that by co-operation this crisis like the rest would be met.

Brief announcement was made by Dr. John Winstead of the work of the Field Army for Cancer Control which has the aim of informing the public about the cancer so it may be controlled. For Dr. Winstead said, cancer in its early stages can be cured; so, if one recognizes cancer, it can be treated satisfactorily. Dr. Winstead urged that everyone watch for signs of cancer and have the advice of a physician at the slightest sign.

Dr. N. T. Ennett cited the interesting statistics that one out of every eight women who die after forty will die of cancer, and one out of twelve men who die after forty will die of cancer.

The average span of life has been increased from 35 years to 62 years by the efforts of doctors and science in the last fifty years, Dr. K. B. Pace stated.

Fenner Corbett who was chosen to be Junior Rotarian of the month by the students of the Greenville High School received some very nice words of commendation from the High School principal, V. M. Mulholland, in a letter to R. R. Bennett, Chairman of the Rotary Boys Work Committee. Fenner was referred to as one of the outstanding students of Greenville High School due to his fine scholarship and ability of leadership. He is a member of the Eleventh Grade and is very active in extra curricula activities.

The program was presented last night by the chairman of the program committee, Jack Spain. Carl Adams, club president, presided.

Agents Urged To List Farm Lands For Sale

Any farm land for sale in Pitt county can be listed for sale with the Farm Security Administration for consideration under the FSA tenant purchase program, Robert L. Edwards, Assistant County Supervisor, announced today.

This means any real estate agent or farm land owner in Pitt county can register farms for sale at the FSA office located upstairs in the Dickinson Avenue Branch of the Guaranty Bank and Trust company building, Greenville, N. C. Funds for the sale of farm lands to tenants seeking to become owners under the FSA program have been appropriated by Congress under the Bankhead-Jones Act, and purchase of these farms is under supervision of the Farm Security Administration.

Mr. Edwards said each county FSA office wanted as large a selection of farms as possible in aiding tenants to purchase farms, and asked that local farm real estate men file their lists of suitable farms for sale with FSA office. The prospective purchasers, who expect to borrow from FSA, will be referred to the owners and agents of suitable farm lands.

F. C. Harding to Lead Open Forum in City

F. C. Harding will speak upon the subject, "America and War in Europe" on Saturday night at 8 p. m. at the Eighth Street Christian church.

Mr. Harding will lead an open forum discussion of his topic at the conclusion of his talk. Members of the audience will be invited to ask questions or comment.

This will be the fifth in a series of such open forum discussions held intermittently this spring at the Christian church. Other forums have been led by Dr. Frank, Miss Helen Dugan, Dr. Paul Toll, and Dr. R. L. Hildrup.

Members of the community of all denominations are invited to attend and participate in the discussion of what is believed to be the most vital question of modern times, led by a man who has been one of Pitt county's leading citizens for many years.

Scholarship Open To Colored Youth

Greensboro May 21.—A one-year scholarship to the Agricultural and Technical College here is being offered to the Negro 4-H club boy who completes the best project record this year. R. E. Jones, Negro 4-H club specialist of the State College Extension Service, announced today. The college is giving the scholarship, valued at \$50.

Jones said that any bona fide club boy is eligible to compete for the award, but he must be eligible and prepared to accept the scholarship for the full term following the making of the award, or else the scholarship will revert to the first alternate. Records must be turned in by July 1, and the winner will be announced by August 1.

The specialist announced the following basis for the award: The club member's record of production as shown by his project record books for any two years of his club career, 45 points; participation in club, community and county activities, such as fairs, judging contests, etc., 20 points; leadership activities, 20 points; the club member's own story of his 4-H experiences, 10 points; and the club member's senior high school record as shown by his principal's report, 5 points.

There are more than 5,000 Negro boys in the State enrolled in 4-H clubs, Jones said, but of course only those who have graduated, or will graduate from high school this spring, will be qualified for this scholarship. However, the scholarship will be awarded annually, and every club member will eventually have a chance at it.

"We appreciate the interest that the A. and T. College is showing in 4-H club work, and its willingness to encourage continuous achievement in all phases of Negro 4-H club work," the specialist declared.

MARKERS LAW IS EXPLAINED

Statement Issued By State Chairman Lucas

W. A. Lucas, chairman of the State Board of Elections, today issued the following statement regarding markers in the primary Saturday:

The 1939 General Assembly made a very drastic change in the use of markers in primaries.

The only voters who may be assisted in the marking of their ballots are those who cannot read and those who by reason of physical handicap, such as blindness, paralysis or other disabling defects, are unable to mark their ballot.

In an official opinion, the Attorney General ruled that only those illiterates registered under the Grandfather Clause of the Constitution were entitled to assistance by reason of their inability to read.

When a voter is entitled to assistance in the marking of the ballot, he must obtain the assistance from a near relative, (husband and wife; parent and child; brother and sis-

ter; or grandparent and grandchild) but if no such near relative is present, he may then ask any other voter of the precinct who has not assisted any other voter, to give him the assistance. If, however, there is present no near relative, or other voter who has not marked another ballot, the voter may then, but only then, call upon the registrar or a judge of elections for assistance.

The registrar is required to keep a record of all voters who receive assistance and the names of the persons giving assistance.

It is not only unlawful for any person to give assistance, but also, unlawful for any person to receive or permit assistance except under the terms of the act.

The act does not prevent members of the same family (husband and wife; parent and child; brother and sister; grandparent and grandchild) from assisting one another, and no record is required of such.
