ALLIES CHECK GERMANS

Britain Marshals All Its Resources To Save Empire From Nazi Forces

WIDE POWERS ARE GRANTED

Wealth and Man Power to Be Conscribed By Government In Effort To Save Nation From German Invasion; Government Given Sweeping Authority by Act Of Parliament

London, May 22.—(AP)—Britain marshalled all her wealth and man power today to save the empire from the peril of Nazi invasion.

The government demanded—and was swiftly assured—parliament's consent to enact today a special emergency powers law, giving it sweeping authority over all wealth, labor and resources.

All powerful production councils would be set up to speed supplies of

munitions, ships, aircraft, farm produce and minerals.

Major Clement R. Attlee, who spoke for Prime Minister Churchill, demanded that munitions boards "get on the job" tonight.

"All labor and property would be at the government's disposal. There would be a 100 per cent excess profits tax.

Attlee said there might be cases where firms would be closed and others where property would be destroyed.

All munitions factories will immediately be placed under government control.

Parliament promptly rushed the bill toward enactment, amid appeals to show Adolf Hitler it was an efficient instrument of war.

Attlee, lord privy seal and member of the inner war cabinet, said the object of the drastic bill was to make effective the whole resources of the nation "for whatever task may fall upon it."

He called the present situation a crisis for Britain demanding extraordinary and immediate measures.

Terms of remuneration, hours of labor and conditions of service, Attlee declared, will be prescribed by the government.

Everyone should continue in his job until ordered to do otherwise, Attlee emphasized.

"There must be power to carry on essential services," he said, "over a wide field, industry will be carried on for the community and not for private purposes."

"Wages and profits will be under government control," Attlee declared.

The house cheered.

Conscription of labor and wealth he continued, "would apply to everybody."

Has No Designs On Dutch East Indies

Tokyo, May 22.—(AP)—Germany today informed Japan she was "not interested" in the Netherlands East Indies. Interest in maintaining the status quo there has been expressed in Japan, the United States and Great Britain.

The German ambassador told Foreign Minister Arita that Germany had no intention of interfering with the islands' status quo.

The Japanese government announced on May 11 that it had notified all powers concerned that Japan would insist upon maintenance of the status quo in the Dutch East Indies despite the invasion of the Netherlands by Germany on the day before.

The United States, Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy and The Netherlands were notified to this effect.

How Nazis Cross Rivers Despite Wrecked Bridges

GARDEN TO AID FREE LUNCHES

Project To Provide Vegetables Next School Year

Recognizing the fact that this community will be faced next year with a greater need for furnishing free lunches to undernourished children in the schools than during the current year, the school board and the Board of Aldermen, with the assistance of the WPA are cultivating a ten acre garden on the Hardee Farm recently purchased by the city.

The produce grown on this ten acre garden will be put up in cans during the summer months. The WPA will furnish women who will do the canning.

There has been set out already six thousand tomato plants. Ten thousand more will be set out. There will be about two acres of snap beans and butter beans.

Four acres have been planted in corn. Two acres will be planted in sweet potatoes.

The community is furnishing the seed and the fertilizer. Already one ton of fertilizer has been donated by fertilizer companies.

The garden now needs all the tomato plants it can get and also potato slips, along with more seed corn, and beans for planting.

Should any citizen desire to make a contribution of any seed or plants at any time, it is requested that the information be phoned to Julius H. Rose, Superintendent of Schools, who is directing the project.

Rumania Prepares For Russian Move

Bucharest, May 22.—(AP)—Rumania ordered a virtual general mobilization today in a move which diplomats believed was linked with Bucharest's fears that Soviet Russia's big army may soon march into Bessarabia.

The general staff called 300,000 reservists to the colors within the next 24 hours, bringing the army to what the staff called "the highest state of preparedness."

Reports to military headquarters here said that Soviet troops concentrated on Rumania's frontier had been heavily reinforced within the last few days.

American Volunteers Are Killed In France

Paris, May 22.—(AP)—Eight drivers of an American volunteer ambulance unit operating in the northern war zone now are reported missing with their cars.

Four members of this corps were officially listed as missing yesterday. Four more were listed today and another driver was reported wounded.

All Settled

London, May 22.—(AP)—The incident in which British embassy officials in Rome were mistreated "has been satisfactorily disposed of between the Italian minister for foreign affairs and his majesty's ambassador in Rome and is regarded as closed," R. A. Butler, under-secretary for foreign affairs, told the House of Commons today.

MRS. BURLESON GOES ON TRIAL

Faces Charge of Slaying Husband's 2nd Wife

Columbia, S. C., May 22.—(AP)—Twenty-seven witnesses were ready to testify today in the case of Mrs. May Walker Burleson, 51, Galveston, Texas, artist, charged with murder in connection with the fatal shooting of the woman who succeeded her in marriage to Col. Richard C. Burleson, U. S. A.

Defense attorneys said they would present witnesses from Boston, Mass., Baltimore, Md., and Texas, but declined to give their names. Neither would the lawyers indicate what procedure they would follow for their client, who recently was adjudged "not insane."

The second Mrs. Burleson was shot as she sat at a hotel cafeteria table in Columbia, March 8.

The coroner's jury was told that the divorced wife walked up behind Mrs. Burleson, pushed a pistol barrel through a black cloth handbag and fired into the woman's back. As the victim slumped the first Mrs. Burleson walked in front of her and fired again, the witnesses said.

BALLOT PROBE NOT FINISHED

Lucas Investigating Alleged Illegal Removals

Wilson, May 22.—(AP)—W. A. Lucas, chairman of the State Board of Elections, said today that his investigation of the alleged illegal removal of some ballots for Saturday's primary from the offices of the Craven County Elections Board had not been concluded and he had not ascertained how Charles L. Abernethy, Jr., a democratic candidate for Congress, got the ballots.

"I am trying to find out how the ballot got into circulation," said Lucas. In the normal course of events, when I have concluded by investigation, I shall lay my findings before the solicitor of the district for what action may be proper."

Abernethy is running against Rep. Graham A. Barden and Dr. Zeno B. Spence of Goldsboro.

"My investigation shows that no election official was involved in any way and that no ballots were printed unlawfully," Lucas said. "A check showed that the Craven county board was short 1,500 of its 14,000 ballots for Saturday's primary."

About midnight last night Mr. Abernethy gave me a bundle of 500 of the ballots."

Lucas said that Abernethy conferred with him this morning, but declined to reveal how he got the ballots.

"I told him that I said the ballots were surreptitiously removed from the office of the elections board," said Lucas. "He said I should not use that word, that I should say that the ballots were delivered from that office. He would not say how they were delivered or how he got them."

BLACK JACK RALLY

DECLINES TO SELL PLANES TO ALLIES

Wash., D. C., May 22 (AP)—"By a vote of 12 to 1, the Senate Foreign Relations committee shelved today a proposal that the United States sell army and navy planes to the allies."

Only Sen. Pepper (D-Fla.), the author, voted for the proposal. Chairman Pittman (R-Nev.) said it was the consensus of the committee members that the

legislation would violate international law and would constitute "intervention by the United States" in the European war.

Pepper, Pittman said, agreed with this view, but argued that "Hitler had violated all the rules of international law, and that the success of the Allies was of vital importance to us."

INCREASE TALK OF COALITION

Landon's Conference With Chief Executive At White House Adds To Speculation, But Leaders of Neither Side Will Support Idea Openly

Washington, May 22.—(AP)—In an atmosphere of harmony over national defense efforts, President Roosevelt and Alf M. Landon discussed across a luncheon table today the grave problems raised for the United States by the European war.

Landon's visit to the White House raised much talk of the possibility of a coalition government, but neither in democratic nor republican circles had it found any strong support when Landon walked into the chief executive's office.

Stephen Early, presidential secretary, discussing possibilities for an expanded government to meet the defense emergency, said it would most likely take a simplified form of the 1917-18 type of government with "dollar a year" men assisting and advising the regular government officials.

Early indicated appointment of various such aides and selection of more presidential assistants was imminent.

Landon himself declined to discuss coalition questions when reporters met him upon his arrival in the capitol this morning. However, Sen. Capper (R-Kan.) breakfasted with him and later said that "I don't know of any republican for coalition."

At the same time, he said, republicans would give President Roosevelt's defense program full support.

The House agreed to a request of democratic leaders to dispense with usual parliamentary procedure and take up tomorrow defense measures from its military and naval committee unlimited expansion of the army air corps—which is aiming for a 10,000-plane fleet—and a minimum of 10,000 planes and 16,000 pilots for the navy.

Appearing before the naval committee in support of later objective, Admiral Harold B. Stark declared that "nations desiring peace must be stronger than those desiring war."

District Projects Affected By Veto

Washington, May 22.—President Roosevelt yesterday vetoed the rivers and harbors bill containing 151 projects that had been approved by the engineers in various sections of the nation.

Projects in North Carolina suffered heavily by the veto as the bill contained 14 projects for the state, nine being in the district represented by Lindsay Warren; three by Representative Barden and two by Representative Clark. The President gave the international situation as his main reason for the veto.

Members of congress interested in rivers and harbors work were quite gloomy today and said that it would probably be many years before another rivers and harbors bill was passed. Should any bill be passed in the future the projects contained in the bill that was vetoed yesterday would again be eligible.

Projects in the first district were as follows: Inland Waterway Norfolk to Beaufort, \$39,000; Chowan and Blackwater Rivers, \$135,000; Pamlico Sound to Rodanthe, \$5,000; Pamlico Creek Edenton, \$9,500; Roanoke River to Hatteras, \$27,000; Swan Quarter Bay and Canal \$22,500; Silver Lake, Ocracoke, \$60,000; Pamlico Sound to Avon, \$16,500; Mantle to Oregon Inlet, \$45,000.

WOULD PROVIDE 25,000 INCREASE

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Reveals Contents Of Suicide Note

Sheriff J. Knott Proctor today made public a letter left by William Waddell Heath, 24, of Grimsland, who died Sunday, May 12, of a self-inflicted bullet wound.

Mrs. Heath took her life three weeks prior to the date of Heath's suicide and the Grimsland man had been suspected by many of having killed his wife, according to his own admission in the note.

The note, addressed to the public, said "I'm sorry that you people have such a hard feeling, thinking that I killed my wife." It continued that no one, not even he himself, knew why his wife took her own life and added that he "loved her better than anything in life." The note added that he was going to find the reason of his wife's action.

No one knows what man has been through or what he has got to go through until it is too late, it concluded.

Legion Post Head Backs Poppy Sale

Call for every veteran of the World war and for all other patriotic citizens to wear a memorial poppy on Poppy Day, Saturday, May 25, was issued today by T. J. Swain, commander of the Greenville post of the American Legion. The commander's message stated:

"Twenty-two years ago the American forces in France were beginning a series of great battles which brought victory and peace to the United States and to the world. In those battles 50,000 young Americans gave their lives, and many thousands more were wounded and disabled. Those sacrifices assured our country the peace, freedom and democracy we have enjoyed since too.

France Optimistic As Army Recaptures Arras And Regains Abbeville

Berlin Claims

Berlin, May 22.—(AP)—Two curving prongs of the German army ripped northwest toward the bottle neck of the English channel and south to within some 50 miles of Paris today.

But while Nazi bombers showered down death from channel seaports to interior battle-grounds, the main German army in northern France braced itself for a hard counter attack by the allied armies, now under the supreme command of General Maxime Weygand.

"It may be that our present movements will come to a temporary halt," General Von Reichena, German commander in the field, acknowledged. As "Weygand has ordered every man to stand his ground, that may mean hard fights ahead."

T. K. FOUNTAIN HEADS LEGION

Seeks Changes In Immigration Dept.

Washington, D. C., May 22 (AP)—President Roosevelt asked Congress today to approve transfer of the immigration and naturalization service from the Labor to the Justice department thereby to enable the government to "deal quickly" with aliens whose conduct "conflicts with the public interest."

"The startling sequence of international events," Mr. Roosevelt said in a message, "has necessitated a review of the measures required for the nation's safety."

"This review," he said, "closed a 'pressing need' for the suggested transfer."

Mr. Roosevelt said that although the plan was designed "to afford more effective control over aliens," it did not reflect any intention to "deprive them of their civil liberties or otherwise to impair their legal status."

The chief executive said that in view of the "urgency" of the matter, he hoped Congress would take action to permit the plan to go into effect.

Counter - Attacking French Soldiers Reported To Have Retaken Aaras, Sixty Miles from Channel, From Germans and To Have Driven Nazi Advance Units Out Of Abbeville

A new wave of optimism swept over France today as reports reached the capital that the French had retaken Arras and chased a strong advance guard of Germans out of Abbeville, 12 miles from the English channel.

Fiercely counter-attacking French troops reported they had recaptured Arras, 60 miles from the channel, easing pressure on a "pocketed" British and Belgian army of 550,000 fighting with their backs to the sea.

The German high command, however, claimed lightning-paced Nazi thrusts—daring motorcycle raids, apparently unsupported by infantry—had widened the corridor through France reaching almost to the channel.

The German high command announced the Tuesday break-through to the west had been widened in the direction of St. Pol, 25 miles northeast of Abbeville and Montreuil—25 miles due north of Abbeville and 10 miles from the channel.

Premier Reynaud of France expressed his confidence in ultimate victory immediately after conferring with General Maxime Weygand, the new commander-in-chief of the Allies.

"I repeat to you if we hold for one month—and we will hold for whatever time is necessary—we will have travelled three-fourths of the road to victory," Reynaud said.

The French destroyed all bridges across the Somme river in a move to block the German march to the sea and a Paris military spokesman said the Nazis would have to bring up much heavier forces to attempt a crossing.

Tenant Is Successful In Producing Wheat

County Agent R. B. Bennett, following a visit to a wheat field on the Dr. Paul Jones farm on which Bennie Wooten is tenant, reported that the tenant is successfully producing a crop.

Mr. Bennett declared: "Bennie did a good job in preparing the seed bed, which is very important in securing a stand and growth, and seeded the wheat by hand. A perfect stand was secured. The crop grew off well and will reach maturity in a few days."

"The wheat kernels are now in the dough stage and are filling out for a good heavy yield."

"This field of wheat is well worth a visit and it will be interesting to watch a combine harvest the golden grain when it is ripe."

"Bennie is also conducting an experiment with a windmill for weed control on tobacco beds. He reports that he did not have to pick one bed which he treated and which is planted along side of other beds not treated but which were picked. He expects to continue this experiment and hopes to have some interesting results to report."

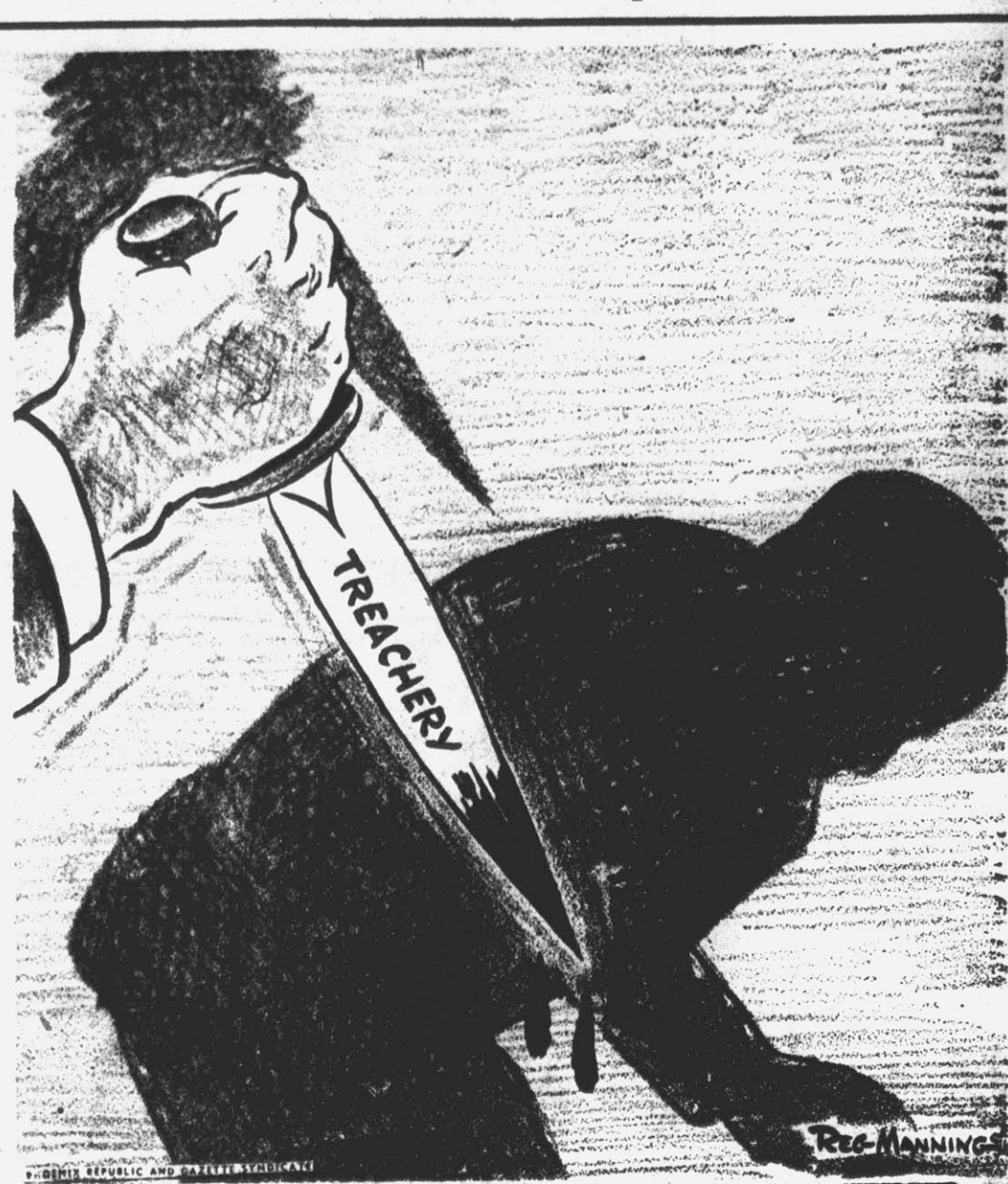

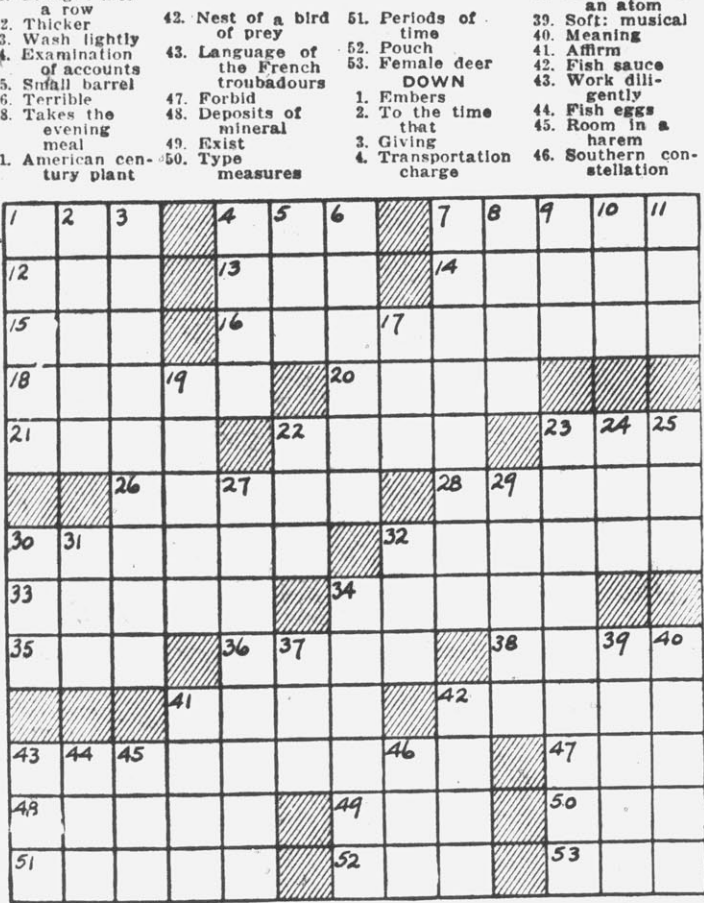

The War keeps getting into the governor's race. Lieutenant Governor Horton has advocated probe of "Fifth Column" activities; Lee, Gravely is stressing his plans for aid to tobacco farmers who have been hard hit by the hostilities. Last night Commissioner of Revenue Allen J. Maxwell said that he favors unrestricted sales of all sorts of war supplies to the Allies.

Here's a good one from Goldsboro as reported by the alert News-Argus:

Broughton And Maxwell Lead In Four Districts

(This is the first of three articles dealing with the gubernatorial primary by Congressional Districts. First to Fourth are surveyed in today's; Fifth to Eighth will be considered tomorrow and Ninth to Eleventh on Thursday.)
Raleigh, May 21.—The lead in Congressional Districts One to Four, inclusive, in North Carolina's gubernatorial campaign is a neck and neck struggle between Raleigh Attorney J. Melville Broughton and Commissioner of Revenue Allen J. Maxwell.
Lieut. Gov. Wilkins P. Horton is likely to be pressed hard by Rocky Mount's "Business Man" Lee Grady for the third position; while the balance of the field will trail these leaders at quite a respectable distance.
That, at least, is how it looked to your Raleigh reporter who only wishes he could be like the old

country judge who proclaimed from the bench, "There may be error in this court's decisions, but there is no doubt." In the instant case there can not only be error, but there is even more than a modicum of doubt lurking in the back of the reporter's mind.
Nevertheless and notwithstanding, it is repeated that these districts, which embrace 38 counties casting 172,484 votes in the 1936 first gubernatorial primary will wind up by giving a lead over the field either to Broughton or Maxwell—probably the former.
Contributing to this are several factors. Both Maxwell and Broughton live in the fourth, as, for that matter do Horton, Grady and Grady, but they enjoy the advantage of living in heavier voting units than their rivals. Wake, for example, cast more than 23,000 votes in 1936, and it is generally conceded that the great bulk of the Wake votes of next Saturday will go to

Broughton and Maxwell, in that order.
Nash, which voted approximately 8,500 in 1936, will be almost solid for Grady, so solid that the leaves will hardly be worth picking up. Johnston, practically 10,000 (four years ago) is in the Grady bag, with many estimates that he will get 85 per cent of the total cast. Chatham will undoubtedly back its citizen, Horton, but it will have to stretch to make a 5,000 (only 3,400 in 1936).
Maxwell's home county, Wayne, had better than 7,000 four years ago and registration is heavy this year. So on the basis of local pride, Broughton and Maxwell start off with an advantage they do not lose elsewhere.
Getting down to cases, the First District (14 counties with a 1936 vote of 36,849, excluding a few scattered McRae votes) seems to be a wide open affair.
Taking up some of the counties with the approximate 1936 vote in parenthesis, here's how they shape up:
There is general agreement that Horton will get Beaufort (4,807) and has a fine chance of leading in Chowan (1,556). Senator "Bill" Rodman and Edenton's Representative John Fernando White are credited

with these. Second place in both is a toss-up between Maxwell and Broughton.
Currituck (2,023), Dare (1,475) and Perquimans (1,335) are put in the Maxwell column by many supposedly unbiased observers; while the Commissioner of Revenue is given a good chance in Camden (1,886), Gates (1,542) and Tyrrell (767).
Broughton looks best in Hertford (1,965), Martin (3,093) where Grady is said to be strong and a real factor, and Washington (1,678). Pasquotank (3,519) has generally been listed as for Broughton but Maxwell is thought to have a look-in, even if a long shot.
The Second District's eight counties voted 42,360 strong in 1936. It's Broughton district this time.
Here Lee Grady is well ahead in Edgecombe (5,729) and is rated to have equal chances with Horton in Halifax (9,561) and Wilson (7,765), though in the last two counties, neither Broughton nor Maxwell, headquarters will concede they are at a disadvantage.
Broughton looks the winner in

Warren (3,271) and Bertie (3,191). He probably has a slight edge over Maxwell in Northampton (4,021). Lenoir (5,124) is likewise likely to give the Raleigh man a lead.
Greene (3,687) is in the Maxwell column according to best estimates. In the Third (9 counties that cast 33,999 votes in 1936) it appears to be Maxwell, who will sweep Wayne (7,810) and run at least reasonably well in almost all the other units. He should lead in Onslow (2,958) and Sampson (2,810) although Broughton has strength in both and Horton isn't to be counted out in Onslow.
Carteret (3,819) is leaning to Broughton, but could be very close to a three-way split, and the same goes for Craven (5,950).
Pender (2,647) will land in the Raleigh man's column, while Duplin (4,768) is probably closely in the fight, with Grady having some strength. Information on Pamlico (1,562) is confusing and scarce. Jones (1,875) could wind up for Horton.
The Fourth District's 59,276 votes of 1936 make it an important bat-

tleground, with Wake (23,073) as the key county. Here Broughton will have a substantial lead, but he will by no means swamp Maxwell, who looks to be well entrenched in second place. There probably will not be anything like 20,000 votes. Chatham (3,376) will be a sweep for Horton, while, as said, Grady is still rated way in front for Johnston (9,941). Grady has a lock on Nash (8,485).
Broughton ought to lead by a substantial margin in Franklin (5,548) where Willie Lee Lumpkin is reportedly at work for him! and he seem to have an edge in Vance (5,007).
Maxwell forces expect Randolph (3,846) to be one of their banner counties of the state.
The Broughton lead in the Fourth will not be tremendous.
There are so many factors complicating the race that any attempt to divide the vote numerically would be barging out into a sea of pure speculation.
Registration from all the counties in the section which has come to your reporter's attention has been

surprisingly heavy but one man's guess is almost as good as another's when it comes to figuring the total vote—much less how it will be divided.
In most of the counties there will be no majorities, only pluralities for the several leaders, and with the balance of the vote split from two to five ways there can be no reasonable certainty about anybody's share of the grand total.
If the total poll goes to 150,000, as it probably will not, the leader, whether it be Broughton, Maxwell or a dark horse, will likely have no more than 55,000 at the very outside, with the second place man not more than 5,000 back of that.
Tomorrow, attention will be given the Fifth, Sixth, Seventh and the Eighth Districts.

U.S. Plane Builders Urged To Speed Output



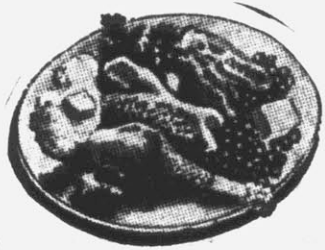

WHITE-COLLAR WORKER AIDED

Another Article On WPA Projects in Section

Following is another article prepared on WPA projects. It deals with records and research work, or so-called white collar jobs.

It is surely time to pause a few minutes and focus our attention on our white collar workers, this class has grown numerically, at the expense of all others. They are the people who work with paper rather than with machinery, and there is no social advantage to be gained in trying to recondition these people for another kind of labor.

The real problem is trying to define ways in which society can use their services when they have no private employment. What can they do? That is certainly the vital question to be considered, and we feel that the Work Projects Administration, through its professional and service division has devised useful means whereby these workers can be used to an advantage, one of which is by working on records.

The knowledge of whence we have come, from which alone we can guess whether we are going to know things that must be gathered with great toil from records and the great bulk of them consists of public archives and the newspapers of our communities. All newspapers filed on paper printed since the 1880's are doomed, for they are printed on wood-pulp paper that is disintegrating so rapidly that some one who consults a newspaper of the Spanish war era may be the last one to consult it, the paper falls apart when the page is turned. In our public archives the state of our local records has been deplorable, some of them having been piled like rats' nests in basements and attics where they are either dry rotting or molding as the case may be. Others have been burned and we are lucky to have what remains. From these much of our local history must come, so our first and basic task should be to rescue physically the records in which alone the account of the life of the community it contains.

Who is to rescue our records? I may not be able to answer this question, but I certainly do know that the white collar workers, the clerks, on the Research and Records Projects Division of the Work Projects Administration can do a lot to help. Indeed they already have. Ask any Register of Deeds, in North Carolina about the WPA white collar workers and he will probably tell you that they have gone into his or some other county office and set up a new file of records for the county that he and all other interested citizens may be proud of. Under the technical supervision of county officials the WPA white collar workers have transcribed, indexed and filed deeds, mortgages, leases and contracts; judgments and special proceedings; marriages, divorces, births, and deaths, some of them dated back as far as 1702. They have gathered up old dusty records from top shelves, put them into new packets, indexed and filed them.

Under the North Carolina Historical Records Survey of the Works Projects Administration they have written histories of churches, salvaged old historical records, made lists of books in public and private libraries so that no one who wants to consult a certain book that happens to be in any American library need go without it for lack of knowledge of its location.

To supplement the official records which the State of North Carolina began in 1914, they have recorded tombstone readings covering births and deaths in cemeteries and plantation grave yards prior to 1914.

They have done fine work under the Municipal Survey of the Professional and Service Division of the WPA. When the National Resources Board surveyed our knowledge about ourselves it was found that our Municipal statistics today are worse kept and less published than they were in 1880, for instance it is much easier to discover who was Mayor of China in 1840 than to find out who was mayor in Cleveland in 1840.

The white collar workers of the Work Projects Administration are now making inventories of cities and towns in North Carolina.

In many places they are also setting up new files of police records recording the dispositions of arrests and warrants originating in the police department through the Recorder's Court and on the Superior Court. They are making real property surveys from which many people may learn many interesting things, for instance, just how many people live in substandard houses, the number of vacant lots available in case of manufacturing plant desired to locate in the town.

All these things which I have mentioned have been done and are still being done by the white collar workers. They can still index, read estate conveyances, chattel conveyances, vital statistics, county commissioners' minutes, and local laws, county board of public instruction minutes, civil and criminal court cases, judgments, liens and liens pendens, special proceedings orders, and decrees, probate records which include wills, legacies, estates, guardianships, administrators' and executors' records, records of incorporations and partnerships, doctors' nurses, architects and engineers' certificates and miscellaneous annual reports.

Any county in North Carolina can have as much or as little as the relief situation and the interest of the community may require.

Europe's First Ladies Work At Home To Help Win War

These First Ladies Follow Tradition

All but one of the six most talked of women in Europe are playing traditional women's roles in history's greatest war.

Queen Elizabeth of England, the Duchess of Windsor, Frau Herman Goering (wife of Germany's marshal), Countess Edda Ciano (daughter of Il Duce) and Madame Magda Lupescu (friend of Rumania's king) are not trying to play dramatic parts. They're doing their bit in a woman's way.

Wilhelmina In Britain

Cabled reports indicate only one seems to be touching affairs of state: Queen Wilhelmina, of the Netherlands, who has taken refuge in Buckingham Palace. There, as guest of King George and Queen Elizabeth, the Dutch queen is busy directing the government of her conquered kingdom and aiding the subjects who have escaped to Great Britain.

Queen Elizabeth is "up to her eyes" in war work. She is commandant in chief of the women's auxiliary airforce services, accompanies the king on inspection trips and takes an active interest in First Aid and Red Cross work. She superintends knitting bees in the big Blue Room of the gray-walled old palace where all the women of the household meet twice a week.

She is guiding the two young princesses, Elizabeth and Margaret Rose, in war work, too. They're knitting sweaters and gloves for poor children evacuated from Scotland's densely populated cities.

The Duchess of Windsor is making Paris and Versailles headquarters for her war work. Dressed in her natty khaki uniform she goes to Versailles to superintend the work of the Collis de Trianon, of which she is honorary president, and which assembles comfort kits for soldiers. Their contents were chosen carefully after the Duke of Windsor toured the front and reported on what the soldiers wanted.

Secret Headquarters

On the other side of the conflict Frau Emmy Sonnemann Goering, the Gretchen-type wife of Germany's doughty field marshal and chief commander of the air force, is a modern patron saint of German flyers. All officers of the Herman Goering regiment wear a medalion of her as an amulet, while hundreds of pilots have it mounted on the instrument boards of their planes.

Frau Goering, virtually first lady of the land, has personally taken charge of the Air Force hospital outside Berlin, and spends many hours giving aid and comfort to wounded aviators. She rises every morning at 6, attends to countless begging letters, writes more to members of the government and to friends asking their aid in deserving cases, and then goes to the hospital.

She tops it all, however, by 7:15 in the evening when a direct telephone wire is reserved for her to talk to her husband at the Air Force high command's secret headquarters. She chats with him of household problems and baby Edda's latest prank.

A Woman's Place

Countess Edda Ciano, daughter of Mussolini and wife of his foreign minister, is devoting most of her time to care of her family—foremost responsibility of an Italian woman. Although she was once supposed to wield considerable influence, no one in Rome any longer credits her with power to affect Il Duce's decisions and she has kept in the background.

While Rumania also is still outside the conflict, Madame Lupescu is giving serious thought to the country's defense. The tithed friend of the king has pushed cards aside at her famous afternoon bridge parties to lead her guests in rolling bandages and finishing gas masks.

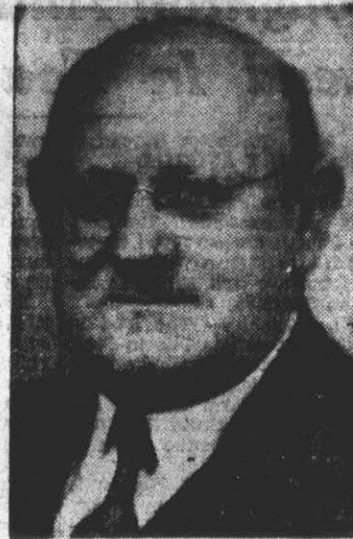

White baseball is in high swing the Black Jack boys will play Frog Level again Saturday at Black Jack, beginning at 2 o'clock.

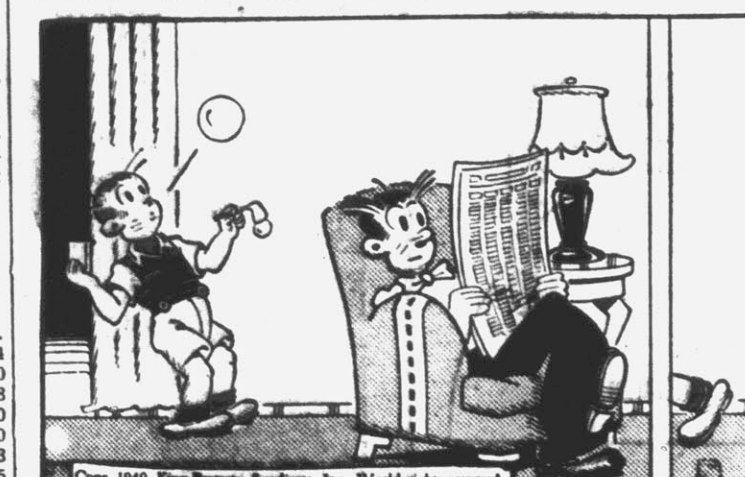

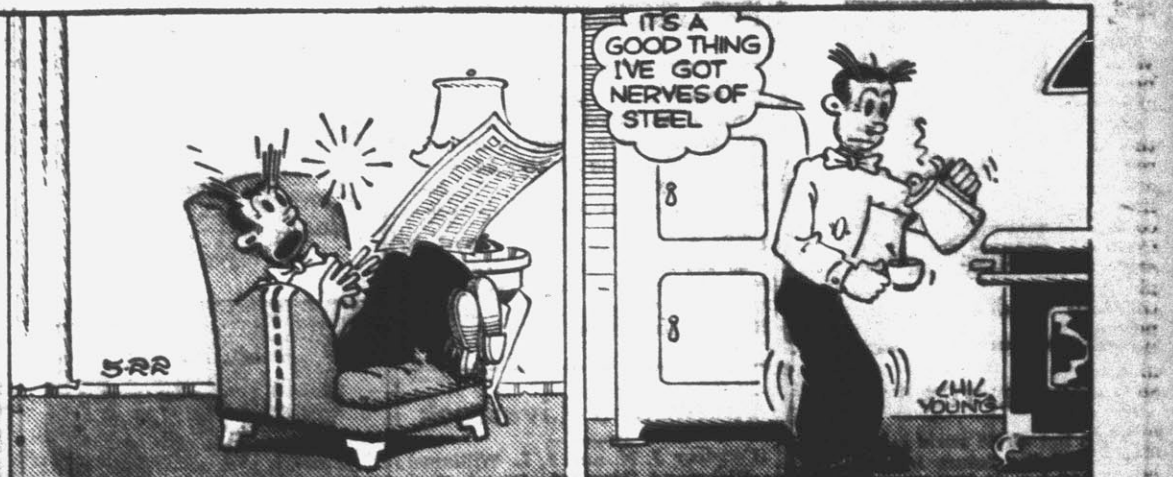

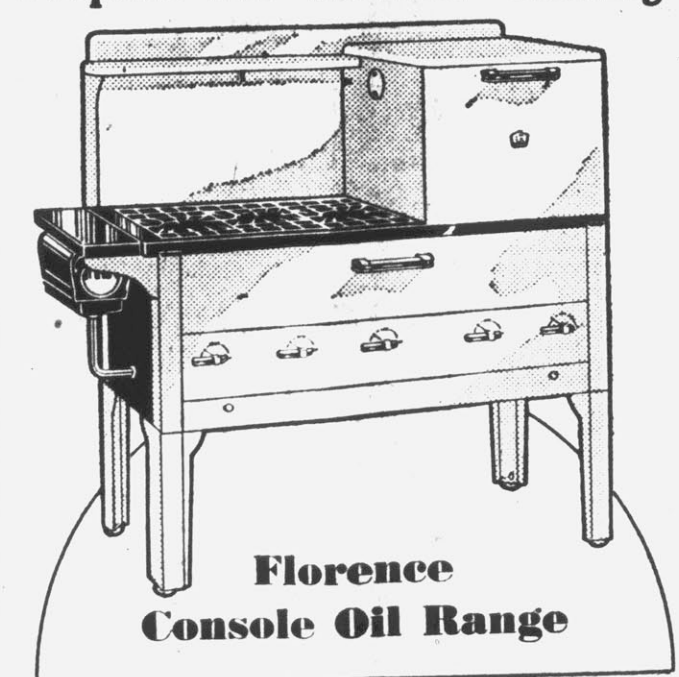

1913. "Bright red poppies studded the fields where these men fell and were the only floral tribute to their battle graves. In tribute to them we wear the poppy, their memorial flower, on Poppy Day each

year. This year when world events have brought home to us forcefully the value of our American heritage, the poppy will have increased meaning to America. Wearing that little flower will show that we still are devoted to the ideals for which our war dead gave their lives so gallantly twenty-two years ago.

"I am calling upon every member of The American Legion to wear a poppy on Poppy Day, Saturday, May 25, and I urge all other citizens to show their patriotic remembrance for the dead in a like manner. While remembering the dead, do not forget those who sacrificed health and strength in the nation's service and the families left in need by war death or disability. Contribute for your flower as liberally as your means will allow and help make the poppy a symbol of hope for the living as well as of honor for the dead."
