GERMANY CONTINUES DRIVE TO COAST

French Wage Defense In English Channel Sector As Flanders Battle Rages

ADMIT LOSSES IN COAST AREA

Fighting Along Coast Admittedly Heavy, With Battles Under way in Other Regions; Spokesman Declares Little Change Since Yesterday in Valenciennes - Cambrai - Arras Area

Paris, May 24.—(AP)—French advance guards fought vigorously today against small German light units in the region of the English channel near Boulogne, a military spokesman said, while the battle of Flanders raged into its third day with sustained violence eastward in the vicinity of Valenciennes.

The French spokesman acknowledged that the German infiltration to the Boulogne area, important channel port just 26 miles from England, was continuing through a 25-mile wide gap in the allied lines south of Arras.

The German troops were moving northwesterly through the gap, which the French and their allies were attempting to plug.

The fighting next to the coast was described as "heavy" although the German detachments at Boulogne were still reported to be only "light effective."

The spokesman said there was little change since yesterday in the fighting in the Valenciennes-Cambrai-Arras area, where the French then claimed gains.

French, English and Belgian troops were said to have repulsed German attacks and themselves counter-attacked. The positions were said to have remained relatively the same overnight.

A high command communique, unusually terse, said that the Somme river positions had been held firmly after a series of small French victories reducing German bridge heads on the southern banks.

The French push into the southern section of Amiens yesterday was maintained, the French spokesman said. French action was said to have thrown back German outposts and to have established strong French positions from which German units were being mopped up.

The Germans met with "little or no success in fighting farther eastward, south of Sedan, he reported."

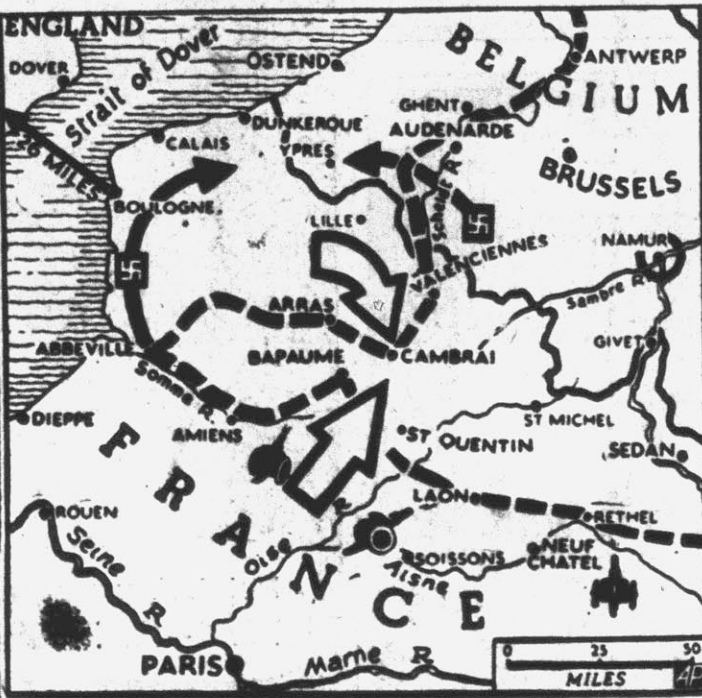
WPA Sewing Project On Industrial Basis

Following is another article on the various phases of WPA activities being carried on in this community: "WPA sewing projects are set up on an industrial basis. The line stitching method, which is the same operation used in garment-making factories, has been adopted by all WPA sewing rooms. The garments made compare favorably in workmanship with factory-made garments. This method of sewing enables the less skilled worker to have work. It also trains the unskilled worker to take her place in private employment."

"During the past year over 8,000 garments were made in Pitt county and these were turned over to the County Welfare department. Eight women are now employed in the Greenville sewing room."

Germans Drive Toward England



Having opened a gap in allied lines between Arras and Bapaume, the German blitzkrieg captured Abbeville, France, 12 miles from the English channel, and Boulogne, a French port on the channel. According to Nazi sources, the Germans sought a supply pincer (indicated by black arrows) around the allied forces in the northwestern France-Germany claimed to have bombed Dover, England, and Dunkerque, France, both channel ports. The British admitted the Germans have crossed the Scheldt river near Audenarde in another thrust toward the channel. Meanwhile Paris said the French were moving north near St. Quentin, attempting to meet allied northern forces near Cambrai and blast away the Nazis' western spearhead with a pincer movement as indicated by white arrows.

REVEALS PLAN TRAIN PILOTS

Fifty Thousand Men To Receive Basic Training

Washington, May 24.—(AP)—President Roosevelt disclosed plans today to give basic training as pilots to 50,000 men in the 12 months beginning July 1.

Through the Civil Aeronautics Authority, he said, three months of primary training in flying will be provided. While not all those who take the course will be finished material for the army and navy air forces, the President asserted, they will be incorporated in various reserves.

He told his press conference that Congress would be asked for a supplementary appropriation to handle the pilot training program. In contrast with the large expansion contemplated in flier training the chief executive noted that in the present fiscal year ending June 30 basic training would have been provided for 10,000 individuals.

City, County Offices Closing For Primary

City and county offices and ABC liquor stores will be closed tomorrow for the primary, but otherwise business is expected to proceed as usual. The public offices are closing on account of the fact that both will be used for polling places. The Water and Light Commission offices will stay open.

Banks and stores will be open during the regular hours. One of the largest votes in the history of the county is expected to be cast if the weather is favorable. Approximately 8,300 ballots were cast in the 1938 primary.

To Extend Bus Line Charlotte, May 24.—(AP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission granted today permission to the Carolina Coach Company of Raleigh to extend its motor bus operations to connect Tarboro and Dunn.

Famous Exiled Russian Puts Blame On Stalin

Mexico City, May 24.—(AP)—Leon Trotsky was attacked today by a group of 30 or 40 men who fired into the famous Russian exile's bed room. He was slightly injured by flying glass.

Several shots were fired into the room.

Trotsky came to Mexico in 1937 after the wandering exile that followed his falling out with the powers of Soviet Russia he helped to build as one of the leaders of the October, 1917, revolution.

One of Trotsky's secretary-guards, Sheldon Harte, was missing after the attack, during which assailants gained entry to the grounds, took two motor cars and broke down several doors. A fellow guard said Harte was "kidnaped."

Some members of the band held at bay several federal district police who customarily guard the place. The secretary, who said he spoke with Trotsky's authority, declared the attack was personally directed by Joseph Stalin. The former Soviet war lord long has been a critic and enemy of Stalin, whom he charged with "countless murders" in "so-called Moscow trials."

ALLIED OFFERS ARE DECLINED BY MUSSOLINI

Attempts To Keep Italy Out of War Appear Futile

EXPECTED LEAP ANY TIME NOW

Mussolini Reported to Have Said Allied Concessions Too Little And Came Too Late

Rome, May 24.—(AP)—Futile allied offers of concessions to Premier Mussolini in the hope of keeping Italy non-belligerent were reported today in Italian quarters.

With Italy observing the anniversary of her entrance into the World War 25 years ago today, unofficial sources said the French secretly offered her credit facilities through the Suez canal and a free port at Djibuti, French Somaliland. Djibuti is the only rail outlet to Italy's Ethiopian empire.

Britain has been negotiating for an arrangement to lift the allied blockade in the Mediterranean for Italy.

Mussolini, however, was quoted as saying the concessions are "too little and too late."

Some Italians more than half expected Premier Mussolini to celebrate today's anniversary by announcing that Italy is ready to strike for attainment of her long-heralded territorial aspirations.

There were no surface indications of the exact time or place of Italy's leap. But most guesses were that it would be against France or Yugoslavia, against both of whom Italy has filed territorial claims.

Members of the Fascist university youth organization, who assembled in Turin for a series of sports contests were told the games were taking place "on the eve of our war" in a message from the vice secretary of the organization.

Sailing of the Italian liner Rex for New York has been postponed from May 29 to June 12, Italian line headquarters said.

Asked the reason, line officials said "we do not know."

JAIL EIGHT IN CRIMINAL GANG

State-Wide Ring Is Broken Up By Officers

Raleigh, May 24.—(AP)—Frederick Handy, director of the State Bureau of Investigation, announced today that eight persons had been arrested in a crack-down on what he termed "the biggest organized criminal gang operating in the state."

Agents Howard L. Pierce and W. I. Gatling, with the aid of Chief Detective King and other Durham officers, Lieut. A. T. Moore of the highway patrol and Captain Bailey and other Durham ABC officers, made the arrests during the night.

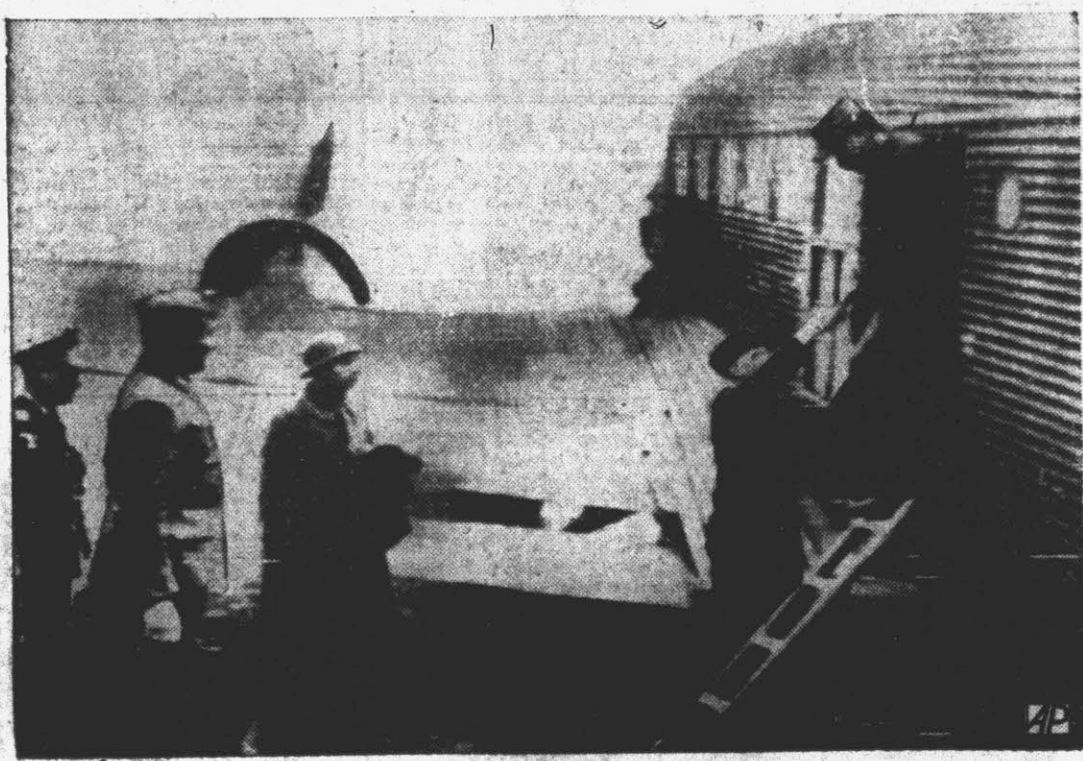
"The gang's activities were state-wide and crimes included everything from car thefts to safe-blowing," said Pierce. The theft of \$800 worth of cigarettes in New Bern and a new automobile at Pilot Mountain led to the clean-up.

Pierce identified the prisoners as held in Durham, Wallace Riggsbee of Durham, Graham Murphy of Burlington, J. D. Stroud of Durham, Helen Johnson of Durham and Ruben Chappell of Durham; held at Hillsboro, Percy Newsome, an escaped convict; held at Raleigh, Allen Oglesby of near Morehead City, and Evelyn Britt Johnson of Durham.

GERMAN ARMY RAKED BY FIRE

Allied Artillery Opened Up On Invading Nazis

By The Associated Press Allied artillery fire raked advancing German armored columns with a devastating crossfire in the battle of Flanders today as other Nazi legions struck at the gates of Calais—only 22 miles from Dover, England—and captured the strategic French seaport of Boulogne.

With the mastery of the English channel at stake, the Allies hurled masses of infantry against the German salient at its bottle neck between Cambrai and the river Somme.

It was the first time in the 15-day-old campaign that the two branches of the service in which the Allies claim superiority, infantry and artillery, were thrown into full play.

Away to the south in France, the Germans rained bombs on the Paris-Rouen railway in an attempt to cut off the French capital from the important harbor of Le Havre.

Predicts 450,000 Ballots Tomorrow

Raleigh, May 24.—(AP)—The State Board of Elections estimated today that about 450,000 votes would be cast in tomorrow's Democratic primary. No guess was hazarded as to the probable Republican vote.

One Democratic gubernatorial candidate, A. J. Maxwell of Raleigh, was ill at his home. His physician said Maxwell was suffering from laryngitis, but would be able to vote tomorrow "if he has no fever." Rumors that Maxwell was suffering from a breakdown, which gained wide circulation here and at Durham during the morning, were denied by the doctor.

Negro Executed At State Prison

Raleigh, May 24.—(AP)—The State executed Simon (Coochie) Gibson, 23-year-old Negro, today for the rape of a white woman in New Hanover county.

Gibson contended he was convicted through mistaken identity. Chaplain L. A. Watts said the Negro's last statement was: "I did not commit the crime and I could not say that I did it because I didn't." Gibson entered the death chamber at 10 o'clock and was started a minute and a half later and he was dead after 13 minutes. He was the 236th person executed here, the 42nd for rape, the 191st Negro and the 64th put to death by gas.

Navy Said To Have Only 500 Capable Warplanes

Washington, May 24.—(AP)—Upon a protest that "the people ought to face the facts," the Senate Naval committee declined today to suppress testimony which one senator said showed that the navy has only 500 aircraft capable of meeting modern European warplanes in equal combat.

The testimony, by Rear Admiral John H. Powers, chief of naval aeronautics, was that of the navy's 1,367 combat planes, only 192 were less than a year old and the others ranged in age up to seven years. Sen. Byrd (D-Va.) said he estimated by Powers' figures that only about 500 of the navy craft could meet modern European planes in equal combat.

When Chairman Walsh (D-Mass.) said this presented "a very bad picture" of national defense and suggested suppression, Sen. Tydings (D-Md.) asserted that "I don't think that would be a wise course."

"Too much of a spirit of confidence exists now," he added, "I feel that we ought to face the facts and that the people ought to know the facts."

A Senate-House conference committee returned to the House for a direct vote a provision in the army's civil functions appropriation bill for \$15,000,000 in cash and \$99,000,000 in contract authority to start work on a third set of Panama canal locks.

The House began consideration of an emergency bill to permit unlimited expansion of the army air corps and immediately was faced with a republican demand, voiced by Rep. Andrews of New York, for enactment of new taxes to help finance defense costs.

An indirect result of the war situation was a recommendation by a Senate banking sub-committee that Congress grant the Commodity Credit Corporation a \$500,000,000 increase in its loan funds to cushion possible price declines due to the war.

One Week Of Civil Court Completed

This week's session of Pitt Superior court was completed yesterday afternoon after most of the week had been taken up with the trial of the case of W. J. Nichols and wife vs. Mrs. Lena Mae Kinsauls and N. V. Kinsauls.

The plaintiffs attempted to recover a farm sold under mortgage, but a jury decided in favor of the defendants.

The court went into the case of Jack Edwards, administrator of the estate of the late I. J. Frizelle vs. R. H. McLawhorn, but the case was referred to David Bland of Goldsboro after a motion to dismiss was denied.

CHARGED DENIED BY PENAL HEAD

Pitt Refutes Political Activity Accusations

Raleigh, May 24.—(AP)—Oscar Pitts, superintendent of the State Penal division branded as false today any charges that he was attempting by coercion of intimidation to secure votes from prison employees for J. M. Broughton, democratic gubernatorial candidate.

Governor Hoyer reiterated that state officials and employees "were free to support the candidate of their choice." He said the administration was not attempting to "dictate the nominee for governor."

Don S. Elias, Buncombe political leader and supporter of W. P. Horton, another gubernatorial candidate, telegraphed Governor Hoyer that he had reliable information "that employees of the prison and road departments are being threatened with discharge by one Oscar Pitts of the prison department unless they and their families vote and work for Broughton."

Pitts said: "It is a fact that I am supporting J. M. Broughton for governor, but the charges that I am trying to coerce or intimidate any of the employees of the highway and prison departments to vote for Mr. Broughton are wholly and absolutely false."

Malaria Projects Under Way In Pitt

It was announced at the health department today that the matter of malaria drainage in various sections of the county is claiming much attention from the local health department.

Dr. Ennett, the health officer, stated that a group of citizens from the Frog Level section, out on the Farmville highway, recently requested the county board of commissioners to give every effort to have the state give them malaria drainage, and that in turn, the commissioners requested that the health officer investigate the situation and take the necessary steps to have the drainage done.

Accordingly, the health officer and the Pitt county sanitary inspector, J. H. Moore, in company with several of the Frog Level citizens, made a thorough inspection of the proposed project on yesterday. The health officer stated that he had already requested C. L. White, Jr., engineer, malaria division of the state board of health, to come to Greenville at the earliest practical moment to inspect the proposed project.

Allies Admit French Port Of Boulogne Is Captured

Sweeping Nazi Rush To Sea Apparently Preliminary To Invasion Of England; Trap Around Between 500,000 and 1,000,000 Allied Troops Being Tightened

By The Associated Press German capture of Boulogne — France's strategic seaport just 20 minutes by air from London — was admitted in authoritative London quarters today.

The sweeping Nazi rush to the sea preliminary to a heralded invasion of England, also gained in two other smashing blows.

German mechanized troops were reported in Berlin to have advanced to within close reach of Calais—the "gateway" to the French channel port only 22 miles from Dover, England—while another Nazi force grappled in fierce fighting with allied troops in the streets of Ghent, Belgium.

A later report said swift German armored cars driving through St. Omer approached the "gate of Calais."

Ghent is 30 miles northwest of Brussels, where the Germans were reported attacking on the outskirts of the city.

The trend of battle in the critical struggle for mastery of the English channel veered rapidly north with the Germans striking hard for the shortest direct jumping off base for England—at Calais.

In so doing, Hitler's armored legions, simultaneously tightened the steel trap between 500,000 and 1,000,000 allied troops "pocketed" in northern France and Belgium.

With the success of the German drive to the channel, the Nazis jubilantly declared the encirclement of the Allies was nearing airtight completion and said that a great "destructive battle may occur earlier than was expected."

The Germans also reported the fall of the last allied-held fort in Maubeuge, France, just south of the Belgian border. Tournai was declared captured.

Reports reaching German diplomatic sources in Bern, Switzerland, also listed the capture of Montreuil and La Toquet on the channel and said the Nazis had retaken Arras in the Cambrai battle sector.

The German high command announced the bomb sinking of six loaded British transports in the English channel.

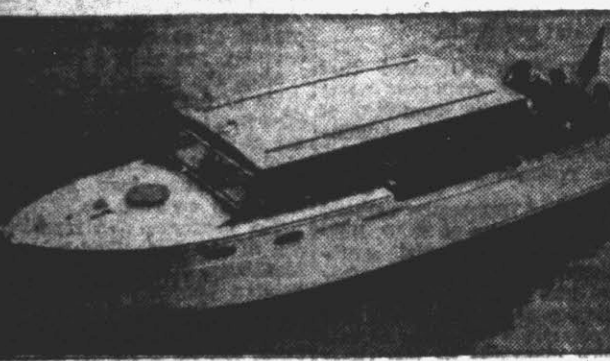

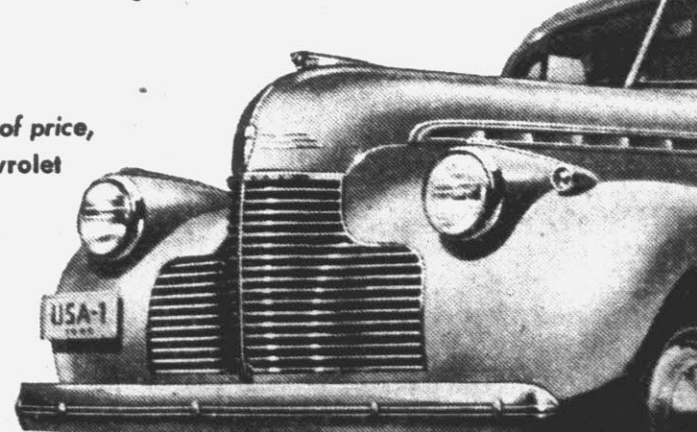

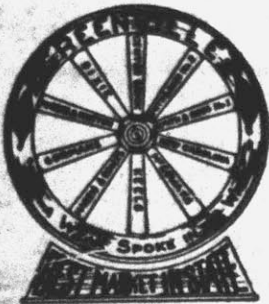

Washington Daybook

Washington—Capital in wartime: There are army men about who, off the record, will warn you: look out for poison gas; it won't be long now.

Indications are, they say, that the "gentleman's war" may develop any time now into the same old slugfest, with no weapons barred.

About two years after the beginning of World War I the Germans introduced poison gas at Ypres. But things move faster now. Hints are found in the flame-throwers and the use of liquid fire—as well as the charges from both sides that open cities are being bombed.

The number of brutal weapons other than gas, used in the World War are too numerous to mention. Secretary of State Lansing had over the mantel-piece in his office, a collection of saw-edged, jagged, curly-cued bayonets, knives and bolos. There were wicked looking dirks.

said to have been used by certain half-savage terrorists for scalping. Army men here insist that the dum-dum bullet that splays out like a hand and then rips its way through flesh, was a myth—not because of its horror, but because it was impractical. It fouled the bores of rifles and was inaccurate.

Although army officials won't discuss it, the Americans had a few odd weapons of their own. One that drew a violent protest from the Germans was the sawed-off, pump-action shotgun. At short range, it was brutal. Secretary Lansing's answer to the German protest was a scorching—something to the effect that what, in the face of the evidence, made them think they had any humanitarian rights.

Note to American Society of Undertakers: There have been plenty of long faces in Washington lately but the longest are the faces of the Republicans. They are just as perturbed about conditions abroad as the Democrats and have the added misery of feeling that the crisis in American affairs is one of the most potent forces against them. Political sages have been saying for months that the greatest factor in favor of President Roosevelt and the third term, or even of some one like Secretary Hull, if he were to be designated by the President to carry on, would be an increasingly critical situation in Europe.

Biographical note: French General Maxime Weygand, new "Mr. Big" of the Allied armies, was known during the World War as "The Shadow" of Marshal Foch.

A United States army officer recalls that when he was a military attaché abroad, he was in a conversation with the fiery little Foch. The talk got around to Weygand. "Weygand?" said the marshal. "Weygand, c'est moi."

Short-lived story: All that talk about America's new "turtleneck battleships."

Secretary of the Navy Edison made his speech about putting heavy armor on the topsides of battleships to protect them from aerial

bombs, and immediately the fantasy boys started discussing streamlined men o' war as floating tents of steel. Then some one explained

Raleigh, May 24.—Whether or not the electorate has been swayed even slightly by platforms and campaign speeches of the seventh candidates for the gubernatorial nomination is open to debate; but here, in very brief, is the main "catch vote" theme of the various gentlemen who seek to be governor.

J. M. Broughton: "Take the tax off the table."

Tom Cooper: "Throw the rascals out."

Paul Grady: "Beat the liquor barons."

Lee Gravelly: "Let a business man do away with the ten little kingdoms called highway divisions."

Wilkins P. Horton: "Look my record over."

Allen J. Maxwell: "Don't tamper with the tax set-up. If you do we can't have better paid teachers and better roads."

Arthur Simmons: "Vote for two governors, I'll resign at the end of two years and let the lieutenant governor in."

Incidentally, Simmons has written some folks that he will resign as Governor so that he will be able to make the race for U. S. Senator against Bob Reynolds in 1942.

Fair enough, but millions of Tar Heels are going to let him be free to do that without having to bother about resigning as Governor.

Lieutenant Governor Wilkins P. Horton is bucking two long-standing jinxes of North Carolina politics, to wit: No man since colonial days and

born out of the state has ever been Governor and (2) no lieutenant governor has ever been nominated direct from that office—though three others have tried it in the last twenty years.

The governor's race has been remarkably free from mud slinging and purely personal thrusts; but

there is one race in the state which has been marked by all this. That's of John Caffey of Guilford and the Sixth Congressional struggle, Congressman Carl Durham of Orange.

Half Million Democrats Likely To Vote Saturday

Raleigh, May 24.—Half a million North Carolina Democrats, more or less, will tomorrow go to the polls to nominate:

(1) A governor, (2) a lieutenant governor, (3) a secretary of state, (4) a state auditor, (5) a commissioner of agriculture, (6) an insurance commissioner, (7) five congressmen, (8) approximately 90 members of the State House of Representatives, (9) about 35 State Senators, and (10) a scattering of county officials all over the state—mostly registers of deeds, county commissioners, judges and solicitors of recorder and county courts.

At the same time those Tar Heels of the Republican political persuasion will choose candidates for governor, lieutenant governor and for a scattering of legislators and county officials in the comparatively few counties in which the G. O. P. offers opposition to the dominant Democrats.

Without primary opposition are the Democratic and Republican candidates for attorney general, superintendent of public instruction, a half dozen congress posts and a large number of 120 representatives and 50 state senators.

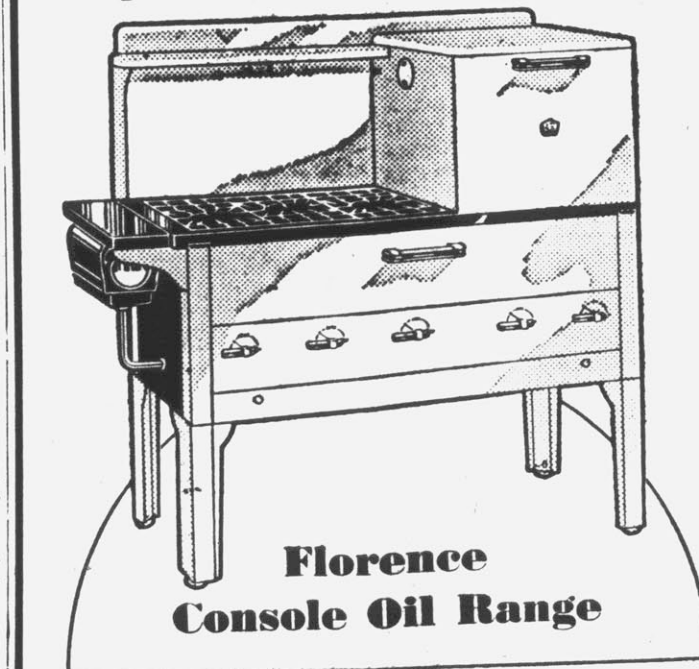
