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NAZI TRAP ALLIED TROOPS IN NORTH

National Defense Emergency Council Will Be Set Up

WILL INCLUDE BUSINESS MEN

Plans For Establishing Coordination Group At White House; Announced Purpose to Speed up Nation's Extraordinary \$3,297,011,352 Defense Program

Washington, May 25.—(AP)—The White House announced today that President Roosevelt is planning to name a national defense emergency co-ordination group composed of both private individuals and government officials.

The group would coordinate and speed up the nation's extraordinary \$3,297,011,352 defense program.

Mr. Roosevelt, an informed authority said, already has compiled a list of names from which the council members may be chosen, but the identity of the men on the list is a closely guarded secret. Administration aides have been studying an enabling statute dating back to 1916 to determine what revisions it may be necessary.

The word that a defense council was likely coincided with forewarnings of a Senate drive to expand the navy's air arm far beyond the limits suggested in President Roosevelt's emergency preparedness program. One avowed objective was a greater armada of long-range planes as the "surest" guarantee against an invader's attack.

Advance notice of a Senate drive for greater immediate enlargement of the navy air force was given after the Senate Naval committee decided yesterday to recommend a bill which would authorize a \$2,200,000,000 four-year program for the naval air corps and its shore bases. The measure, however, imposed a 10,000-plane top on the navy strength.

This quota placing contrasted with simultaneous House action in voting for an unlimited expansion of the army's air fleet.

CLAUSE ADDED TO ALIEN LAW

Senate Group Would Require Finger Printing

Wash., May 25 (AP) — Legislation requiring registration and finger-printing of all aliens in the United States was approved today by a Senate Judiciary sub-committee. Sen. Connally (D-Tex.) said the requirement was added to a "comprehensive bill already passed by the House and designed to protect our armed forces from subversive activities and our people from fifth columns or similar groups."

Sen. Danaher (R-Conn.), republican member of the sub-committee, said the broad bill was a necessary part of the general national defense bill.

The House bill merely provided for finger-printing of all immigrants entering or visiting the United States, but senators agreed to expand this to require registration and finger-printing at post offices of all aliens already in this country. Richmond, Va., May 25.—From the welter of war and armament news of the past fortnight, there are several conclusions that stick out like lighthouses on a dark and rocky shore. First, the war will not be won by Germany until the British navy is scuttled and the French army routed. Second, in a Hitler-controlled Europe, the Nazi air force and the Japanese navy are the two greatest threats to American security. Third, we must cut out "politics" in the United States and form a Coalition Cabinet. Fourth, in the shattered world of 1940, only a spiritual awakening will enable us to meet successfully the economic and political upheavals ahead.

Nazi Bombers Attack Four Channel Harbors

Berlin, May 25.—(AP)—German and allied troops fought today in the streets of Calais, just 22 miles from England, while Adolf Hitler's dive-bombers rained destruction on four channel harbors where the British apparently are attempting to land reinforcements to break the trap around allied armies in Flanders.

The German high command announced it had drawn a solid ring around the Belgian army, the main body of the British expeditionary force and parts of France's first, seventh and ninth armies. The trapped troops were estimated to number between 500,000 and 1,000,000 men.

Dive bombers dropped explosives on harbors at Dieppe and Dunquerque, France, and Ostend and Blankenberge, Belgium.

Military authorities said that while Calais had not fallen, it had been rendered useless as a base for British landing operations. They also said more cities actually had been captured by the Germans than the high command had announced, but that they were being kept secret for military reasons.

One military source said there is "not a possibility" of the allied armies breaking out of the German circle.

A hint that the British Isles might be in for "great surprises in the way of new weapons" when and if the Germans assault England was given by an authorized military source.

Moye Plans Enroll At Banking School

Joseph S. Moye, assistant cashier of the Guaranty Bank and Trust Company, will leave here June 15 for Rutgers University at N. Brunswick, N. J., where he will enter the Graduate School of Banking conducted by the American Bankers Association to begin advanced study of recent developments in banking.

An advanced school for bank officers, the Graduate School of Banking is attended by 600 bank officers from all sections of the country. Each year approximately 200 new students enter the school and 200 bank officers are graduated upon the completion of the course, which consists of intensive two-week resident sessions at Rutgers University for three successive years and two years of extension work at home under the supervision of the faculty of the school. The writing of a suitable thesis is also required for graduation.

The work of the school covers a broad range of practical subjects in commercial banking, investments, economics, business law, trusts, savings, and related fields. The faculty of the school consists of university professors, practical bank operating officers, and government officials.

AWAIT ORDERS OF MUSSOLINI

Entire Resources Subject To Conscription

Rome, May 25.—(AP)—Geared for war, her entire resources subject to conscription under a new civil mobilization order, Italy is ready today for Premier Mussolini to press the button that could plunge her into the European war as an ally of Germany.

All signs indicated that the move might not be long in coming. Among the ominous indications, topped by passage of the civil mobilization decree, were:

1. Reports that additional classes of army and navy reserves had been called to the colors.

2. Postponement of the sailings of three big trans-Atlantic liners—three which might possibly serve as troop transports.

3. Intensified blackout preparations.

4. Rumors that Il Duce had rejected allied concessions—including relaxation of the Mediterranean blockade—offered in the hope of keeping Italy on the sidelines.

5. Increasingly bitter press attacks on the Allies and new anti-allied street demonstrations.

Many foreigners, including English residents, quietly prepared to leave the country. Those who had booked passage on Italian vessels now tied to their docks hastened to transfer their passage to American vessels.

CAMPAIGN END BRINGS VOTERS TO THE POLLS

Most Of Color By TOM COOPER

Campaign Had Been Only Luke-Warm and Issueless, With Cooper Offering the Only Novelty

Raleigh, May 25.—(AP)—North Carolinians wrote their verdict today to a luke-warm and generally issueless campaign that has been unusual only by the number of candidates seeking the gubernatorial nomination—seven Democrats and three Republicans.

While no clear-cut issues of statewide significance have developed in the campaign, a novelty was injected by Tom Cooper of Wilmington, who used a sound truck to stump the state.

Cooper, who years ago served a prison term for banking law violations, later was elected mayor of Wilmington. He has charged that the state is run by "machine politicians" and promises to give the "government back to the people."

The other democratic candidates for governor are J. M. Broughton, Raleigh; A. J. Maxwell, Raleigh; Lieutenant Governor W. P. Horton, Pittsboro; L. Lee Gravelly, of Rocky Mount; Paul Grady, Kenil, and Arthur Simmons of Burlington.

The republican candidates for governor are Robert McNeill, Statesville; John R. Hoffman, Burlington, and George M. Pritchard, Asheville.

The democrats, besides a governor, will nominate several state officials, representatives from five congressional districts and legislative, county and township officials. Election officials estimated the vote would be about 450,000.

Barlow Explosive Experiment Fails

Aberdeen, Md., May 25.—(AP)—Inventor Lester P. Barlow's liquid oxygen carbon "super explosive" apparently failed as an instrument of death in a test on live goats at Aberdeen proving grounds today.

A 1,000-pound charge of the explosive, which Barlow claims radiates "vacuum waves" over a wide radius, failed to kill a single one of a herd of 98 goats tethered at distances ranging from 200 to 1,000 feet from the point where the bomb was set off.

Observers who went out on the test field after the explosion said they could not find one dead goat and Barlow admitted the experiment had flopped.

"I'm licked on it," he said, "but I had to try it to find out."

Four Are Hurt In Brisk Wind Storm

Pikeville, N. C., May 25.—Four persons were injured in this vicinity by a brisk windstorm last night which caused much property and crop damage.

Thirteen farm houses or out-buildings were either destroyed or damaged.

The storm first struck on the farm of Mrs. Beulah Scott, three miles west of Pikeville, destroying two tenant houses, two tobacco barns had a smokehouse.

White Man Arrested On Larceny Charges

Stewart Enfield, white, is being held in the city jail on charges of larceny of metal from J. Sam Fleming's junk yard north of Tar river. Officers are continuing their investigation of the theft. Although the place was broken into last Monday night, officers are working on the theory that the metal had been taken over a period of time.

Nebraskan Independent Says He Can't See How FDR Can Refuse to Run

More Than Majority of Convention Votes Are Pledged

Washington, May 25.—(AP)—With more than a majority of Democratic convention delegates already committed to President Roosevelt, Senator Norris, (Ind.-Neb.) said today:

"I do not see how the President can refuse another nomination with conditions as they are."

Prior to Germany's lightning smash toward the English channel, the veteran Nebraskan had doubts that the chief executive wanted a third nomination. He felt then that Mr. Roosevelt was permitting state after state to pledge delegates to him in the hope of swinging this strength to another liberal candidate.

But now, Norris believes the man he has supported in the last eight years will "almost have to run" whether he wishes to or not. The "rank and file" of the party want the President to stay in the White House, he said.

The belief is so widespread at the capital that Roosevelt will not decline another nomination that talk in recent days has revolved almost exclusively around the vice presidential candidates.

Cloak room conjecture has mentioned Senators Byrnes of South Carolina, Wheeler of Montana and O'Mahoney of Wyoming for second place. Even another Roosevelt-Garner ticket is not being discounted.

Several friends of the vice president reported privately a belief that the Texan would not refuse a third term bid on the ticket in order to demonstrate party unity in the present emergency.

Declines Comment On London Report

Washington, May 25.—(AP)—The State Department declined today either to confirm or to deny a report that a staff member of the American embassy in London had been arrested in Scotland Yard's drive on "fifth column" suspects.

A dispatch from London bringing word of the report quoted embassy officials as saying "we can make no comment whatever."

In response to questions at his press conference, Secretary Hull declared there was nothing he could say about the report. He declined to predict whether information would be made available later.

Dr. Dan Wright has been ordered before an examining board at the adjutant general's office in Raleigh for appointment as second lieutenant of Field Artillery, North Carolina National Guard.

He will be assigned to Battery A, 113th Field Artillery, stationed in Greenville. This will complete the complement of four officers for the local battery, commanded by Rev. Worth Wicker, captain.

ACTS TO CURB FIFTH COLUMN

Gov. Rivers Orders All Licenses Revoked In Ga.

Atlanta, May 25.—(AP)—In an unprecedented move aimed at "fifth columnists", Governor E. D. Rivers directed today that the business, occupational and professional licenses of all Georgia aliens be cancelled on June 1.

The executive orally instructed Revenue Commissioner T. Grady Head to revoke the permits effective that date. Immediately after this was announced Head and Rivers went into consultation to determine if exceptions would be made of aliens who have applied for citizenship by that time.

The revenue department was unable to say at once how many persons would be affected or to estimate the value of the businesses involved.

This step was the most drastic of several taken by Rivers this week in a campaign against subversive elements. Included in these was a proclamation requesting that all aliens register with police units and be finger-printed. This proclamation brought a threat of court action from the American civil liberties union.

Bolster Home Defenses.

London, May 25 (AP) — The British war office tonight called for 18-year-old volunteers to strengthen home defense forces against the possibility of invasion by Germany.

Position Of Large Force Is Declared 'Very Grave'

German Gains Isolate From 500,000 to 1,000,000 British, Belgian and French Soldiers Who May Be Forced to Surrender, Die Or Escape By Water Unless Relieved

The allied armies in northern France and Belgium—five hundred thousand to one million men—have been trapped, the German high command declared today.

Authoritative German sources said tonight that the Reich armies of the west had reduced the Flanders background in which the allied armies are encircled by two-thirds in the last 48 hours and predicted the surrounded units would be "wiped out" within a week.

British military sources, asserting the position of the allied armies in France was "very grave," declared that "a coordinated allied effort still can retrieve the situation."

The French, who said they had reduced the Ferme-Bapaume gap from between 30 and 35 miles to about 30 miles wide, admitted that Nazi blitzkrieg units were still pouring through to the coastal plain along the English channel.

But the Nazi advance in the St. Omer region has been checked, a French military spokesman asserted, and the whole front is "without change." He called the situation at Boulogne "uncertain."

The German gains mean that the allied forces are isolated with the Germans stretched in an unbroken line in front of them and the English channel at their backs. Unless a corridor can be broken through to them it appears they must surrender, die or try to escape by water.

It puts the Germans another step closer to position for an invasion of England.

"The gravity of the situation deepens hour by hour and we are called upon to make a supreme effort to defend the country, to preserve our liberties and win the war," British Prime Minister Churchill exhorted the labor unions.

The British banned details of the fighting in France, where they admitted the peril of the British expeditionary force in a "very grave and very confused" situation.

The encircled allies include the main body of the British expeditionary force, the Belgian army and parts of France's first, seventh and ninth armies, the German communiques said.

Weak allied attacks to relieve them, the German communiques said, have been repelled, an "increasing" number of prisoners are being taken and war booty "cannot be estimated."

Calais, where the Strait of Dover leaves only 22 miles of water between England and the battle zone, was reported encircled. It was said unofficially in Berlin to have been captured.

Both sides reported aerial successes.

The Germans said they had bombed waterfronts, artillery positions. (Continued on Page Three)

"We are a part of a large movement throughout the nation to make more enduring marriage and better home life."

"One of the most important principles in home-making is co-operation with a capital 'C'. Without co-operation we are sure to fail. The best place to experiment with democracy is in the home. If we cannot be democratic in the home we cannot be democratic anywhere."

"In order to have co-operation in the home there must be co-operation in money matters. Co-operation in discipline of children is an important phase. Small children and even babies are observant of attitudes and are sensitive to disagreement between parents. Order and discipline for ourselves is significant too."

We should have a common objective for our homes. What is a home for? A Christian home will have agreements about what a home is for.

A creative atmosphere is necessary. There should be encouragement and a place to give every person in a home an opportunity to follow his own interests and to develop their special abilities.

Constant affection is very necessary. Children must feel secure. Home should be a safe place where children are understood, appreciated and cared for. It is not the right kind of affection that spoils children. Love is the basis of good home life for parents and children. Families

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forgive each other a lot if they know they are loved by each other.

We should have common recreation in our homes. Certain things in which every one in the family may enjoy and participate. We should have such attractive home life that we can compete with outside activities.

Architect Randolph Evans. It is an excellent example of what might be termed contemporary American as distinguished from early American or modern. Spacious living in small quarters is amplified by carefully planned economical electrical service. Correct wiring to each outlet assures full voltage electricity with no waste between the meter and the point of use—a common complaint in many small homes.

Convenient outlets are where they will be needed for kitchen appliances, dining service, portable lamps, radio, clocks and other electrical devices in common use today. Lighting switches are arranged so that it will not be necessary to step into a room, hall or stairway without light. Thus the electrical requirements indicated on the floor plan assure safety, economy and the extra convenience which characterizes modern living.

According to Mr. A. C. Tadlock of the First Federal Savings and Loan Assn., this house can be built

in around Greenville for as little as \$3500.00. On an amortizing mortgage the house could be paid for, including principal and interest, for as little as \$25.00 a month. DR. REYNOLDS ISSUES APPEAL

Calls For Physical Preparedness Program

Raleigh, May 24.—Dr. Carl V. Reynolds, state health officer, has issued an appeal to the people of North Carolina to begin at once a program of physical preparedness.

He said: "A desperado and his gang are loose in the world. They are running amuck, destroying civilization, leaving in their wake death and destruction among innocent, God-fearing nations and individuals.

"Our President has called for a program of preparedness designed to give us protection against this sinister force, involving a billion and a half dollars, which amount will be increased as necessity demands. This will give us mechanized units, airplanes, submarines and other material with which to defend ourselves if this should become necessary.

"These mechanized units, however, will avail us nothing unless we enter into a definite program of physical preparedness. Let us not repeat the mistakes of 1917, when our manpower was 33 1-3 per cent unfit for active military duty. It is of paramount importance that the individual becomes physically fit before he offers himself for the service of his country. It is only through physical fitness that he will have the mental alertness, the healthy eye and the physical endurance to make the quick decisions necessary for the successful prosecution of a war and then prosecute these decisions. If we must fight to

preserve our heritage, let us man our machines of war with men whose eyes are clear, whose hands are steady and whose nerves are of iron.

"We can begin this program of physical preparedness now, rather than later. Tomorrow it may be too late. As state health officer, I earnestly call upon our people to take advantage of every means that science, through a benign Providence, has placed at our disposal to make us physically fit. Let the work of immunization against preventable diseases begin now. Let our people take stock of themselves and make the unwavering decision for physical preparedness.

"North Carolina was first at Beth-el. Let it be first in physical preparedness. We gave the world the airplane, war's most modern and effective weapon. Let us also pioneer in giving our nation the best there is in manpower.

"God spare us from the desparado—deliver us from war. But in war or peace, 'God give us men!'"

SEES FLANKER AS CURE FOR SHIFTING DEFENSE

Seattle (AP)—Coach Jimmy Phelan of the University of Washington predicts a wider use of the flanker in intercollegiate football this fall.

Phelan, addressing a clinic of high school football coaches, offered the flanker as an offensive antidote for shifting defensive lineups, such as five, six, seven or even eight man lines.

Jimmy has used a flanker for the past three years or so. A halfback takes his position wide of the end. "Having the flanker out there means the defense will have to delegate one and possibly two men to watch him," Phelan explained. "This opens up the defense for thrusts into the vacated zones. The flanker can figure in pass plays, on reverses, as a blocker or merely as a decoy."

Short Cut To Safety

Detroit (AP)—How to get out of trouble with the bases full and no one out was demonstrated in a local high school baseball game recently by Fitcher Al Thielmans of St. Ambrose.

Facing a pinch hitter for the De La Salle team, Thielmans suddenly whirled and threw to second base to nip Ed Skotzke for the first out. He assumed the pitching position and threw a ball to the batsman. Catcher Bill Lendzion whipping the ball to third where Jack Goyke was tagged out.

Now with two men out and Geo. Detloff on first, Thielmans again stepped to the rubber, eyed Lendzion's signal and suddenly whipped the ball to first where Detloff was nipped.

De La Salle never recovered from the shock and Thielmans breezed in a 5 to 2 winner.

similar to that of General Robert E. Lee in the War Between the States. Lee was a brilliant general, but he needed western horses and wheat, northern iron and textiles. The Union's huge, but bungling, land and sea forces choked off these essential supplies without which Lee could not hope to win, no matter how brilliant his blitzkriegs, no matter how daring his lightning thrusts.

Hitler is in the same position. He cannot force Britain and France to

their knees so long as they can cut off his food and oil, his iron and copper. So, the big unanswered question is today, just as it was last September, "Can Hitler's air force pulverize the French army and smash the British navy?" America, to be safe, however, must now prepare for an unfavorable answer. A Hitler-controlled Europe immediately changes the entire outlook for American security. If the Germans win, we will inevitably tangle with them over the enforcement of the Monroe Doctrine. Hence, a German victory means a gigantic increase in our tax bills to cover defense costs for this country.

Hitler Victory Costly

It means an immediate outlay of \$5,000,000,000 for a second navy to replace the British navy which is now patrolling the Atlantic for us. In addition, we must spend at least \$3,000,000,000 more per year to maintain a sufficient air and land force to back up the two fleets. We would need an Atlantic navy because we cannot afford to take our present fleet out of the Pacific. Not only must we protect ourselves against Germany, but also against Japan. Her navy is growing by

leaps and bounds. It is difficult to get accurate figures, but many observers believe the Japanese navy is now about 75 per cent as large as ours. One of the biggest reasons for these gains is the fact that Japan gets twice as much ship for every dollar she spends as we do.

The wide disparity in costs is due to the varying prices for labor and raw materials. There is no eight-hour day in Japan, no 5-day week, no labor unions. We are furnishing Japan with many of the essential materials with which she builds her battleships. To Der Fuehrer and Il Duce, the United States is crazy to supply Japan with the materials she needs to build a huge navy whose main purpose is to menace the United States. Hitler and Mussolini would put a stop to such practice in less time than it takes to tell about it. In the tremendous defense job that faces us, nothing—neither labor leaders nor wage-hour restrictions—must be allowed to stand in our way as they did in France.

More Efficiency Needed

If Germany's blitzkrieg wins, we will be living in a hostile world. Totalitarian governments will face us on all sides. For our own security,

we must inject some of the efficiency of the dictator nations into our own democracy. As the first move toward such a goal, we need a spiritual awakening which will emphasize that courage is the only security and progress comes only through willingness to sacrifice. There is no question that Hitler chose 1940 because he was sure there was nothing to fear from American intervention. He knew that 1940 would be a year of political disarmament in America.

Many suggestions have been made in the last few days calling for a coalition government. My feeling is that whoever wins the election this November should include in his cabinet representatives from all parties. Whether we get into the war or not, there are great sums to be spent and great problems to be solved. These vast sums should be expended and these problems should be tackled under the direction of a coalition cabinet. "Politics" must be prevented from handicapping us in this gigantic task. Moreover, as a solution of our domestic problems, it will give the nation renewed confidence if all candidates will promise to bring a Coalition Cabinet to Washington!

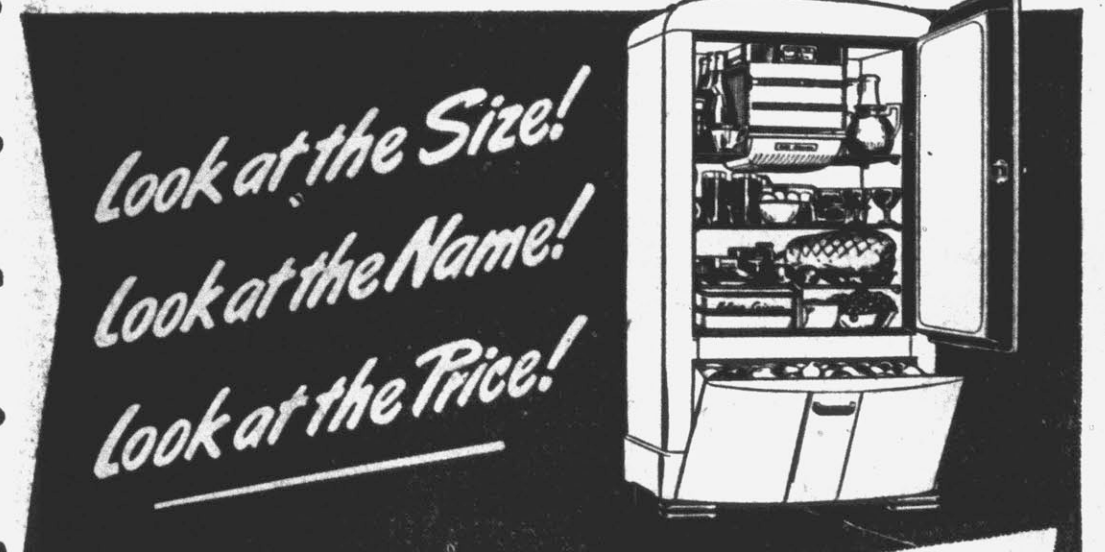

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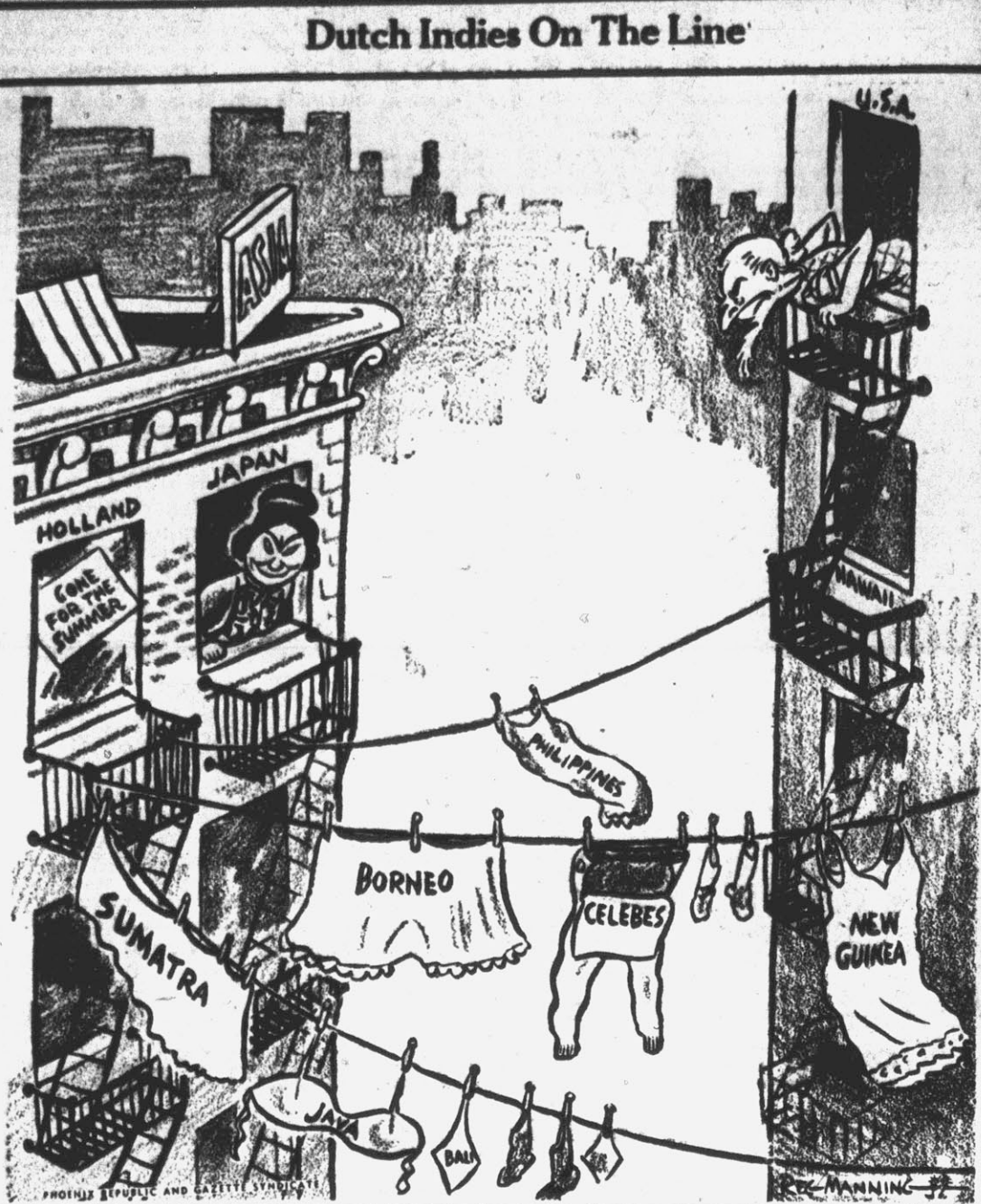
GUARD MEMBERS SHOULD GET TIME OFF

The National Guard usually considered our second line of defense in reality is our first line of defense from the standpoint of ground forces as each of the units is complete while the regular army is a skeleton organization.

During the coming summer the guardsmen will have to remain in camp three weeks instead of the usual two-weeks summer training period and naturally there are some employers who do not like to let guardsmen in their employ off for the training period. Taking into consideration, however, the great value a well trained National Guard will prove to this country in time of peril employers should consider it a patriotic duty to see to it that members of the guard are not penalized because of the longer training period this summer.

The following item from the Wall Street Journal speaks a fine attitude on the part of the financial institutions toward having our country well prepared to defend itself if and when it becomes necessary.

Leading financial institutions in New York City, including the largest banks and the New York Stock Ex-



change, are planning complete co-operation with Army officials in their program of extending training periods of National Guardsmen. Extensive Army maneuvers are planned for a three-week period during August. Most of the New York National Guard regiments already have received orders to participate in these maneuvers, while others have been ordered to extend the regular summer encampment from two weeks to three.

A survey yesterday indicated that the leading banks here will follow their usual policy of granting leaves to employees who are members of the National Guard. In addition to continuing their pay during the three-weeks training period, most banks are planning to give these employees an additional week's vacation. Employees of the New York Stock Exchange who are enlisted in the National Guard already have been informed that they will be given pay during the three-weeks training period.

Washington Daybook

Washington.—For weeks there hasn't been a night that midnight oil hasn't been burning in the gray, ramshackle Department of State building.

The 44-hour week has become more than twice that for many officials and a lot of their underlings. Foreign relations must be kept intact. Scenes abroad change swiftly. Raise your finger from the world's pulse one moment and the hint of a new and vital flux may be lost. But if you think Secretary Hull's boys in the home office of American diplomacy are overworked, pity the men in the field, sweating over the new problems that a war raises. Besides their regular duties they are working for the Allies. In Berlin, Brussels, The Hague, Copenhagen and Oslo, the United States embassies or legations have been authorized to handle all the business of Great Britain, France, Canada and Australia, and in some instances that of Belgium, Luxembourg, New Zealand, South Africa and Egypt.

Courtesy Doesn't Pay
This is all a matter of international courtesy. Nations who have gotten themselves into a mess don't pay a dime for the labor expended in their behalf, although they do make an honest effort to defray all cash outlays involved.

The first obligation generally is seeing that the representatives of the nation represented get safely out of the country.

For example, when Hitler crashed through Holland and Belgium, it was our legation at The Hague and embassy in Brussels which assisted the French and British representatives in getting safe passage home. In September, 1939, when England finally tossed down the glove Alexander Kirk, United States charge d'affaires, helped Sir Neville Henderson, the British ambassador, get his "30 men, seven women and two dogs" onto the sealed train that carried them to the Dutch border.

Next, United States representatives take over the records of departing officials, place the United States seal on the buildings left behind, and settle down to try to straighten out the problems left in their hands.

We're The Mouthpiece
Not the least of these is the business of transmitting messages between countries that no longer speak to each other. When Belgium wanted to notify Germany that Brussels was an open city—that is, unfortified and not subject to bombing—the whole business was transmitted through the U. S. embassy. The Belgium state department passed the word along to the embassy; the embassy passed it

along to the U. S. embassy in Berlin, and from there it went to the Nazi state department in the form of a formal note. The answer was passed back.

On the other hand, Germany wants answers that, unless she surrenders immediately, the city will be considered a military objective, subject to the worst that the Nazis have to offer. This word goes through the American embassies and the answer is handed back to Berlin.

So, if one of our European diplomatic staff members rises up during his two hours of sleep and shouts "to hell with the Nazis," I think the Germans should understand—and bow at least as deeply as Sir Neville Henderson.

Sports Fan To Sports Official.
St. Louis, Mo. (AP) John J. Griffin, recently appointed chairman of the Missouri state athletic commission, has not missed a boxing or wrestling show in St. Louis for ten years. Never an athlete himself, he always has been a close follower of sports.

Lincoln, Neb. (AP) — Meet Bill Cook, Nebraska University distance star who learned how to run by jogging four miles from high school to his farm home almost every night.

N. C. BEACHES TO OPEN EARLY

Raleigh, May 25.—Most years North Carolina's beach resorts do not open their season until June 1, at the earliest, but this year practically all of them have increased their facilities and already are open for the business of supplying rest or recreation to vacationing visitors.

The unusual variety of shore activities is accredited with the increasing popularity of the North Carolina shore. The surf, inlet, and Gulf Stream fishing is nationally known. Manito has rebuilt throughout the area of last year's fire and has added new tourist accommodations. New fishing boats have been added to the fleet around Oregon Inlet. New boats and more quarters are available at Hatteras and Ocracoke.

At Morehead City and Beaufort construction has been underway for months. A new public beach has been built at Fort Macon.

Southward the Hurlst and Orklow beaches, small and new developments, offer some of the smoothest grounds.

Next are Wrightsville and Carolina Beach, two of the largest resorts in the state and both within a few miles of Wilmington. At both these favorites there has been much new construction this year.

All the resorts apparently look for a record season this summer, to judge by the way in which they have been improving and building.

Then comes Southport, well known to fishermen who visit Fryin Pan Shoals. Across the harbor is Port Caswell, now a family resort. In the mouth of the Cape Fear is Bald Head, semi-tropical, and last are Holden Beach and Seaside, small but growing.

would set up penalties of 10 years in prison and \$10,000 fine for any subversive attempts upon the armed forces of the United States.
The bill also tightens up numerous provisions for deportation of aliens.

Tribute Is Paid to Late President

"A trail-blazer in the field of education," and one "whose influence will live on after his name is forgotten," President L. R. Meadows, first president of the East Carolina Teachers College in an address in his memory Friday at the college assembly.
President Meadows prefaced his talk by reading from the Apocryphal book of Ecclesiasticus the passage called "Let Us Now Praise Famous Men."

Then declaring that he considered it a privilege to talk to the student body each year on or near Dr. Wright's birthday, and to introduce to them this man who had meant so much to the College, Dr. Meadows said, "President Wright stood on this platform where I am standing, and rested his hand where mine now rests, not scores but hundreds of times, and spoke to audiences like this one."

Dr. Wright came from a fine family, the speaker said, a family that was interested in education and religion. His mother was a teacher and the mother of a number of teachers. He was blessed in his environment, too, for it gave him something to struggle against, as he was reared in the reconstruction period. He was a rich little poor boy rather than a poor little rich boy.

"If you sometimes get discouraged in trying to get an education," said Dr. Meadows, "remember this man who worked his way through college, even though he had to enter late and earn his own money."

Many people today say that one purpose of a college is to develop personality. President Wright had that already—he was a remarkable personality, said the speaker, and went on to give a number of incidents showing the kindness of his subject.

He then described President Wright's work as a pioneer in the teacher-training field as trail-blazing in an uncharted forest, done because of his love for the children of the state and his interest in their education. He himself said that he preferred to die in the harness rather than turn his work over to someone else. That is what he did, said Dr. Meadows, and the influence of his work will live on and on.
