HORTON CALLS RUN-OFF VOTE FOR GOVERNOR

Broughton Holds Lead of More Than 40,000

2ND RACE IS SEEN FOR LT. GOV. POST

Pou Defeats Miller; Eure Wins From Murphy; Scott Retains Office; Boney Maintains Post

Raleigh, May 27.—(AP)—J. M. Broughton, Raleigh lawyer, and Lieut. Gov. W. P. Horton, the leaders in a seven-man race will enter a run-off primary June 22 for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination. The nomination is equivalent to election.

With 1,806 of the state's 1,913 precincts counted Broughton had 143,045 votes to Horton's 102,472. A J. Maxwell, state revenue commissioner, was running third with 98,531.

The vote for the other candidates was Mayor Thomas E. Cooper of Wilmington 32,617; Paul Grady of Kenly, former state legislator, 15,150; L. Lee Gravelly, Rocky Mount business man, 60,977; and Arthur Simmons of Burlington, 2,459.

A second primary became assured when Horton turned thumbs down on a suggestion by Maxwell that he forego a run-off. Maxwell issued a statement saying he hoped "the state and the counties may be saved the expense and confusion of a second primary."

A second primary was also indicated in the lieutenant governor's race, in which R. L. Harris of Roxboro and W. Erskine Smith of Albemarle led a field of four.

With 1,725 precincts reported, the count stood: Harris 135,507; Smith 115,022; L. A. Martin of Lexington 70,577; Dan Tompkins of Sylva 41,992.

All five incumbent congressmen who had opposition appeared to have comfortable leads, but a run-off was indicated in the eighth district, where Rep. W. O. Burgh had several thousands votes of a majority over C. B. Deans.

Rep. Graham A. Barden, in the third district, polled 17,538 votes with 135 of 157 precincts reported. Zeno B. Spence of Goldsboro, a Townsendite organizer, had 5,677 and Charles L. Abernethy, Jr., 5,879.

In the Eleventh district, Rep. Zebulon Weaver, with 221 of 255 precincts reported, led his two opponents by a wide margin.

Rep. Carl Durham was renominated in the Sixth district.

In the Fourth district, Rep. Harold Cooley defeated E. P. Griffin of Louisburg, 30,121 votes to 8,798, with 158 of 182 precincts reported.

The contests for state offices stood: auditor, 1,665 precincts, Chas. W. Miller, 113,361; George Ross Pou, 231,061.

Secretary of State, 1,666 precincts, Thad Eure, incumbent, 240,729; Walter Murphy of Salisbury, 125,525.

Agriculture Commissioner, 1,665 precincts, W. Kerr Scott, incumbent, 223,619; C. Wavland Sprill of Bertie county, 132,034.

Insurance commissioner, 1,653 precincts, Dan C. Boney, incumbent, 235,979; William B. Oliver of Fuquay Springs, 107,071.

Republican 337 precincts, governor, John R. Hoffman, 768; Robert H. McNeill, 3,181; George M. Pritchard, 2,095.

Lieutenant governor, 333 precincts, Halsey B. Leavelle, 2,515; J. Forrest Wilten, 2,556.

Second Primary

A two-contest second primary was indicated for the county ticket today with the formal announcement by Roy T. Cox that he would ask a run-off for the office of Register of Deeds and J. A. Staton indicated he also would ask a second primary.

Amos O. Clark was high man in the race for Register of Deeds. Mr. Staton was third high man in the four-way race for the two Pitt county seats in the State House of Representatives.

Mr. Staton said that if there was to be a second primary he would more than likely enter. He would run against S. O. Worthington, second high man. Dr. W. I. Wooten polled sufficient votes to be assured of his seat.

SCHOOL FORUM 3:00 TUESDAY

Final Open Discussion Of Season Will Be Held

Tomorrow afternoon is the time for the last open forum of the year conducted by the high school on general school problems. School will be dismissed at 2:30, an hour earlier than usual, in order that the discussions may get under way by 3 o'clock.

The meeting will take place in the high school library and will have as its topic "School and Home Policies for Next Year." Principal V. M. Mulholland, who will preside, has issued through the high school students a personal invitation to each parent to attend this important meeting.

The concluding paragraph of the invitation to parents reads as follows: "The ultimate success of the high school program depends on your enthusiasm and intelligence as that of the school administrators and teachers. Won't you please attend the forum next Tuesday afternoon and share in the planning for next year? No interest, it seems, should surpass that which you have in your own child."

Topics which will likely be discussed include participation in school activities, the appropriateness of night meetings for students, the advisability of frequent school dances, the sensible hour for closing dances, and the necessity for school fees. Other phases of school life which may seem vital to the group will also be considered at this meeting.

"All parents of high school students are urged to attend this discussion group," stated Principal Mulholland. "Nothing is more important than an agreement between school patrons and school administrators as to what constitutes sound and sensible school and home policies. It is imperative that the parents of Greenville assist the school in the tremendous task of educating the youth of Greenville. Without the genuine interest of parents little there is that the school can do."

"Three other meetings with parents this year have been decidedly meaningful and delightful. It is the wish of the high school administrators and teachers that the discussion tomorrow afternoon will be the most valuable one of the year."

Nazi Sources Contend Evidence Of Criminal Attempt Aimed At Refugee Ship Keeps Accumulating; Official London Quarters Assert No Sane Man Could Believe Such Warnings

Berlin, May 27.—(AP)—"A most serious warning" has been given the United States embassy repeatedly in the past two days that the Allies either planned or already had carried out a "criminal attempt" on the American liner President Roosevelt, authorized sources disclosed today.

The President Roosevelt is en route to Ireland to bring Americans home.

The German sources said the warnings had been addressed to Alexander C. Kirk, charge d'affaires of the United States embassy. "Evidence keeps accumulating more and more hour by hour, they said, that some sort of manipulation is planned regarding the refugee ship in the hope thereby of drawing the United States into the war."

In London a foreign office source said "no sane man" could accept the warning.

"In the past," the source said, "it has been the German policy to accuse the Allies of doing exactly what the Germans themselves have in mind."

"This story is similar to those asserted that the British sank the Athenia and Raeder's warning about the Trocadero."

Grand Admiral Erich Raeder is commander in chief of the German navy.

In New York officials of the United States lines said they had not been officially informed of the Berlin report that safety of the liner President Roosevelt was threatened and that they did not plan to radio the master of the ship concerning the report.

Stokes Is Winner In Township Race

J. Gus Stokes, constable of Greenville township for the past several years, was reelected to that post in Saturday's primary by a majority of 2,349 votes.

He defeated Hybert Moore 2,905 to 556.

Heber Sumrell was reported to have led for constable of Ayden township, winning over J. B. Denkins and O. L. Jolly.

A. L. Corey was reported to have won over J. E. Buck in Winterville township.

LABOR UNIONS NOT LIABLE TO SHERMAN ACT

Activities Exempted By Supreme Court Ruling

ACTION SEEN AS WIDE IN EFFECT

Opinion, However, Declares Sit Down Lawless Invasion Of Most Brutal Kind

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—In a far-reaching decision, the Supreme court ruled today that the activities of labor unions are not subject to the federal anti-trust laws unless they "restrain commercial competition in some substantial way."

Justice Stone delivered the six-to-three opinion that held specifically that a Philadelphia labor union was not subject under the anti-trust laws for damages resulting from a sit-down strike.

Although Justice Stone asserted that the sit-down constituted a "lawless invasion and destruction of property by force and violence of the most brutal and wanton character," he said the Sherman act did not provide for damages.

The decision clarified to a considerable extent the long controversy that has existed over whether labor organizations were subject to the 1890 Sherman act and later legislation which prohibition combinations or conspiracy in restraint of interstate trade of commerce.

Chief Justice Hughes wrote a dissenting opinion in which Justices McReynolds and Roberts joined.

Specifically involved was a suit by the Apex Hosiery company of Philadelphia for damages sustained during a seven weeks' sit-down strike in 1937 by a local unit of the American Federation of Pull Fashioned Hosiery Workers.

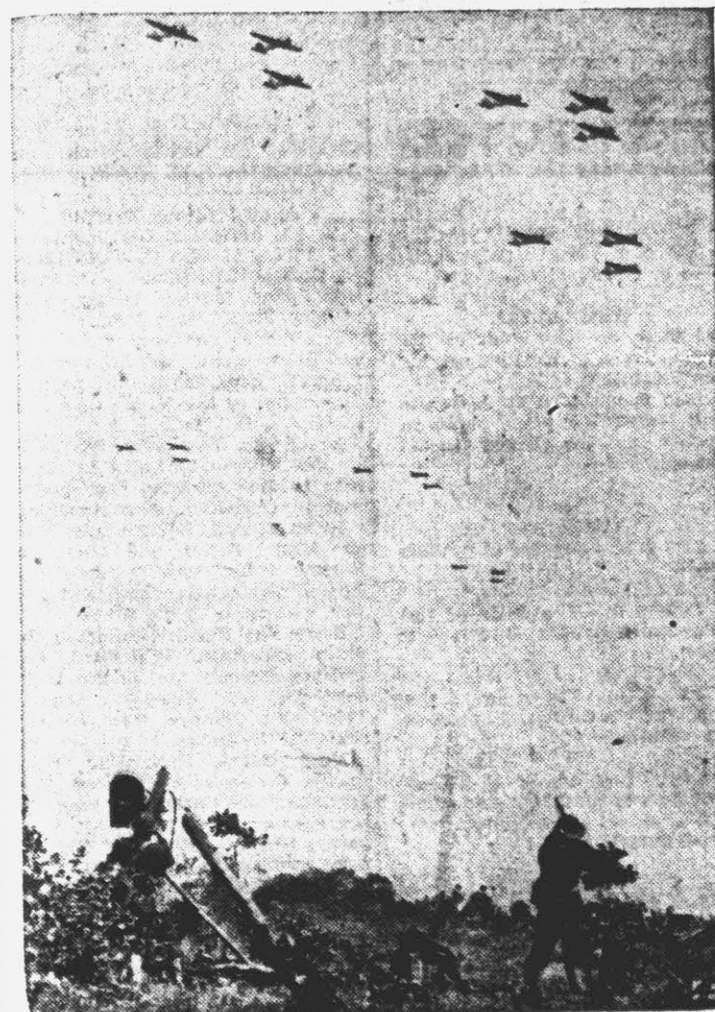
Will Case Taken Up As Court Is Resumed

Judge Walter J. Bone of Nashville today resumed a civil session of Superior court and after the granting of one will, the court took up a will case which probably will last throughout the day and until the luncheon recess tomorrow.

The case taken up was in regard to the will of Mrs. Pennie R. Johnson. An attempt is being made by some of the survivors of the woman to have the will set aside on the ground that Mrs. Johnson was not of sound mind when the will was made. The will was executed in 1933 and Mrs. Johnson died in 1937.

U. S. Blitzkrieg Wins Mock War



Forty thousand "Blue" troops were defeated in the closing stage of the United States army's mock war when "Red" air forces staged a "blitzkrieg" and pounded the defending "Blues" with incessant aerial attacks near Camp Beauregard, La. "Red" planes and tanks battled together after the fashion of German invaders in France and Belgium. "Blue" soldiers are seen firing anti-war craft guns at the invading planes.

House Adopts Proposal For Transfer of Agency

Mrs. Perkins Called "Notorious Incompetent"

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—The House adopted a resolution today to give quick effect to President Roosevelt's transfer of immigration to the Justice Department as a means of gaining "more effective control over aliens."

The action came on a voice vote. If approved also by the Senate the president could make the transfer effective in 10 days.

During House debate, Rep. Taber, (R-N.Y.) described Secretary Perkins as a "notorious incompetent."

He gave this reason why "many of us" would vote for the resolution. "Other congressional developments: The Senate Judiciary committee approved legislation to require the finger printing of aliens in this country, some 4,000,000 of them, and to impose severe penalties for 'fifth column' activities."

M. L. Wilson, director of the Agriculture department's extension division, told the Senate Civil Liberties committee that defense ex-patriation should be administered as far as possible to rehabilitate economically distressed areas.

LITTLE NEGRO CHILD KILLED

Victim Of One Of Several Accidents In Section

Several wrecks and minor traffic collisions were reported in this section during the week-end, one of which claimed the life of an eight-year-old Negro child. No serious injuries were reported in any of the other mishaps, although property damage was heavy in at least two or three.

The child killed was Mattie Mae Moore, daughter of Doc Moore of Bethel, route 2. According to Patrolman W. W. Massengill, who investigated the accident, the girl ran in front of a car driven by Seldon Merrill about 11 o'clock yesterday morning on the Bethel-Tarboro highway, about a mile and a half from Bethel.

The girl died at 10:30 o'clock last night. She suffered a fractured skull, broken jaw and a broken leg. Merrill is not being held pending an inquest scheduled for tomorrow.

Patrolmen reported that a pickup truck bearing several Negroes turned over on the Pactolus highway last night and that a Negro, who was arrested for being drunk, drove his car into a ditch on the New Bern highway yesterday afternoon.

At least one wreck was reported in the city, but no one was injured and no charges were brought immediately.

Mrs. Lillian Denny Austin, 67, died Sunday afternoon at 6 o'clock at her home, 410 E. Eighth street following several months of declining health.

Funeral services will be conducted Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock at the home by her pastor, Rev. T. M. Grant, pastor of Jarvis Memorial Methodist church, assisted by Rev. Walter Patton of Louisville and Rev. E. L. Hillman of Rocky Mount, both former pastors, and Rev. W. A. Ryan, pastor of the Eighth Street Christian church.

Following the service, the body will be taken to Holden, Mass., for interment in the family plot by the side of her late husband, Herbert E. Austin, who died in Greenville December 14, 1929.

Mrs. Austin is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Pricilla Johnson, Holden, Mass., and Mrs. Elizabeth West, Currituck; two sons, Edward (Continued on Page Six)

Foes Clash For Control Of Channel

One Phase Of Battles Is German Attempt To Separate Allied Armies, 500,000 To 1,000,000 Strong, Already Encircled; Mastery Of English Channel Is Another Objective At Stake

German and Allied armies thrashed like giant pythons, each seeking a stranglehold in the bloody battle of Flanders today.

Mastery of the English channel and the fate of the so-called "lost million" allied troops were at stake. In one major phase of the struggle, Generalissimo Maxime Weygand's forces sought to break through the German salient to the channel at its 18-mile-wide bottle neck in the Bapaume-Peronne area.

If successful, the vital line of communications feeding the German columns along the channel would be broken and the Nazi spearhead columns isolated.

In the second phase Hitler's armored troops were flailing hard to pinch off the allied salient in the north between Lille, France, and Courtrai, Belgium, at a similarly narrow bottle neck.

If successful the Germans, in turn, would isolate allied forces which are seeking to isolate the Nazis.

Amid this complicated action terrible German attacks which were described by the French as launched "without regard to losses," threw back allied troops to new defense positions in the Belgian Lys river valley and spiked through almost to the World war battlefield of Ypres.

The new onslaught was aimed at separating French, British and Belgian armies, estimated at between 500,000 and 1,000,000 strong, already encircled by the Nazi pincer movement.

To the south along the Aisne-Meuse river sector the French reported that their 73's (three-inch guns) were taking a tremendous toll as German infantry battered in vain to break the allied lines.

Student German soldiers wandering into French positions confirmed reports that complete companies of Nazi infantry were wiped out, the French said.

Bodies of Germans were reported "piled high" between the lines. "The first rush of the enemy has come almost to an end," said French General Duval.

The British Air Ministry said Royal Air Force bombers battered enemy communications in Belgium and Holland.

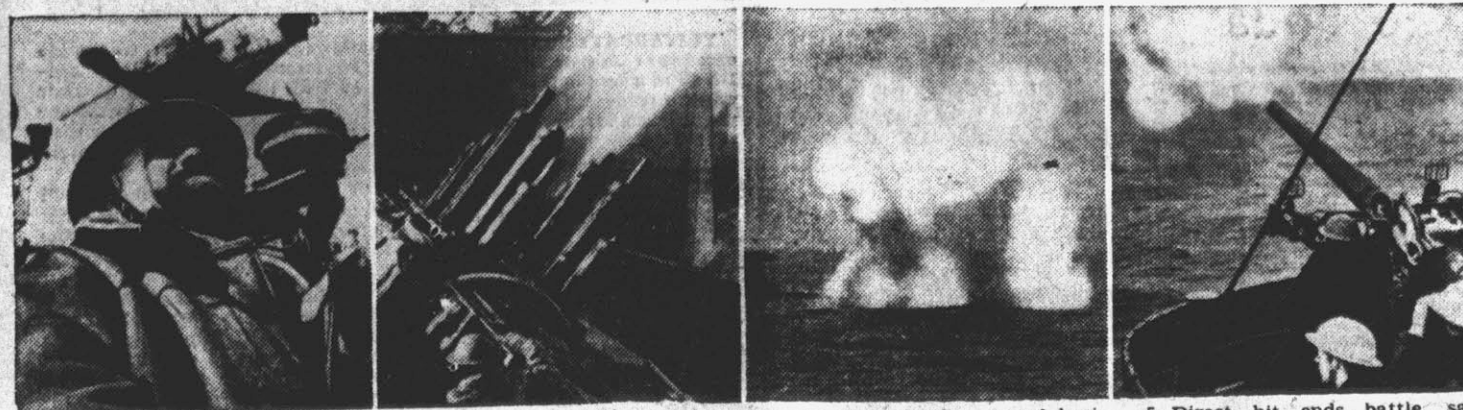

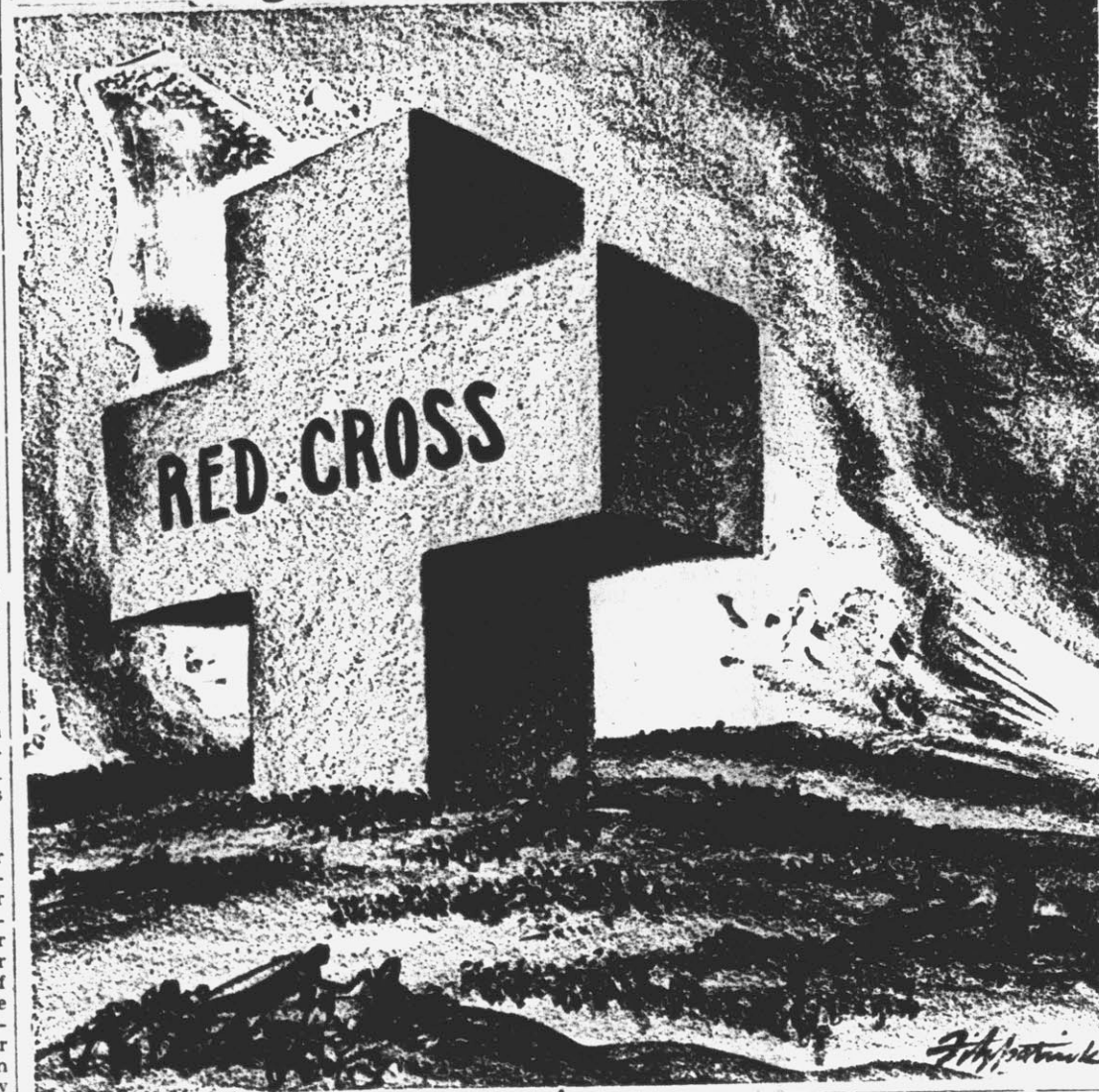

He Had To Be Top Man

Last summer Byron Nelson won the National Open golf championship and now he's ready to defend that crown.



Late one afternoon 11 years ago Mrs. John Nelson left the porch of her Fort Worth home for the golf course—a couple of brassie shots away—where Byron, a tall, thin 17-year-old amateur, was playing in the golf club tournament.

As she approached the clubhouse someone told her that Byron was runner-up. Mrs. Nelson was proud. "Where is the cup you won?" she asked Byron.

"It's over in the weeds," he grumbled.

That's where Byron had tossed the \$125 piece of silver. It represented second place and Byron wasn't cut out to be a runner-up. He had to be top man.

Last summer that same John Byron Nelson, at 27, won the National Open golf championship. In a few days, June 6 to 8, he will be seeking to retain that crown in this year's Open over the Canterbury course in Cleveland.

"Sure I think I can win it," he says. "I'm playing as well as I was last year."

Nelson realizes the odds against him are high. He regards Jimmy Demaret, who has won 6 tournaments this season; Ben Hogan, with four triumphs, including the recent Goodall Round Robin, and Sam Snead as his severest challengers.

Quite A History
But Byron's history is something to reckon with.

It took the Texan seven years to cover the rough, bunker-infested span between a professional's apprentice and the national title. Nelson turned pro in 1932. It wasn't until 1936 that he won an important tournament, the Metropolitan Open.

Byron met Gus Moreland in a Southwestern tourney. Dallas sportsmen backed Gus Ft. Worth golfer covered all bets. And Byron missed a 3-foot putt on the 37th. With it went the title and Ft. Worth's betting money to Dallas.

Byron was snubbed. There was talk that he didn't have nerve. He

around in the sand-pits and thick rough, Nelson fashioned a sub-par 68 for a tie with Denny Shute and Craig Wood at 284. Byron shot another 69 in the first playoff. Wood matched it but the fast pace eliminated Shute. Then, in the second playoff, Nelson's 70 whipped Wood.

As a youngster, Nelson kept the neighbors terrified by hitting iron shots across the big yard of his home. In the evenings he would lay his cap on the divan and pitch golf balls into it from the rug.

Still Pale
Byron's pal in those days was Ben Hogan. After caddyding they would play and replay the 18th hole, always pretending that their putt was for the national championship. Hogan still is Byron's pal and has made a name for himself. They may battle it out for the 1940 crown.

In his late teens Byron was one of Texas' best amateurs. It was a cold reception from Ft. Worth friends, after he had lost an important tournament, that caused him to turn professional.

Byron stands just above 6 feet and weighs 170, all bone and muscle and that explains his booming drives. He's perhaps the best long iron player an dthe nerviest.

Horton Smith once summed up the professionals' respect for Byron's boldness:

"If they parked the flag on the corner of the clubhouse roof I believe Nelson would go for it."

WEATHER AIDS PEANUT CROPS

Planting May Be Completed by Next Week - End

Raleigh, May 27.—If favorable weather continues, peanut growers of North Carolina should have most of their crop planted by the end of this week. B. Troy Ferguson, district agent of the State College Extension Service, said today.

During the past two weeks, good weather enabled farmers to proceed rapidly with their planting operations, the State College district agent said.

In its latest report, the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics pointed out that growers of the Southeastern states have completed their plantings except in the northern fringe of the belt. The crop is in good condition, and all portions of the Southeast report a good stand.

However, reports continue to emphasize the increased acreage in this region. One sheller who talked with a large number of growers said not one had indicated a decreased acreage and that the majority reported an increase. For the most part, small growers are responsible for the rising acreage.

On the market, the movement of farmers' stock peanuts has increased, with higher prices being paid for best Jumbos. Some mills are now offering 4 1/2 cents a pound delivered for Jumbos of best grade. Bunch peanuts are not advancing in price as rapidly as Jumbos; and the spread between the prices of the two varieties is wider than it has been for some time, the U. S. Bureau reported.

Trading in finished goods is somewhat light, with the market relatively quiet. The market trend is steady instead of being firm as it has been during the past two weeks.

Seven Defendants In Today's Court

John Harrell, colored, was convicted of drunkenness and given a 30-day sentence, suspended upon payment of costs.

A charge of assault on a female against James Wooten, colored, was not pressed with leave.

Evangeline Little was given a 30-day jail sentence upon conviction of larceny.

Jack Stokes, white, was brought to trial on charges of larceny of automobiles in two cases and waived preliminary hearing in each. Bond of \$500 was fixed in each case.

Name Miss Anderson B-P Meeting Speaker

Miss Mary Anderson, director of the Women's Bureau of the U. S. Department of Labor, will speak at the convention of the North Carolina Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs on Saturday, June 15, at Blowing Rock. Miss Anderson will speak at the luncheon meeting on that day. The Statesville club will sponsor the luncheon and Mrs. Blanche King, president of the club, will preside.

Miss Anderson will be introduced by Mrs. J. B. Spilman, of Raleigh.

"Women at Work" will be Miss Anderson's subject and it is doubtful if a better qualified person could be found to speak on this subject for not only is Miss Anderson now the head of a government bureau organized to render special service to women workers, but she herself spent many years in industry and knows from experience that worker's side of labor problems, particularly those which affect women workers.

Miss Anderson was born in Lidköping, Sweden, and received her education in her native land. She has for years been a naturalized citizen of the United States, to which she came at the age of 16. First, she entered the garment-making industry in Chicago. Later she entered a shoe factory and found this an interesting trade. During this period she became interested in the problems which confront the laboring classes and was active in every effort which sought to improve working conditions. She was elected representative of women in the National Boot and Shoe Workers' Union and traveled over the United States as an organizer. When the United States entered the World War she was drafted into service by the Council of National Defense Advisory Committee and was appointed to the women in industry section. Later she was made assistant to the chief of the Women in Industry service, a temporary war-time agency established by the Labor Department to guarantee protection to women workers while their employment was being used most effectively for the national good. When the Women's Bureau was created as a permanent agency in the U. S. Department of Labor by act of Congress, Miss Anderson became its first director, and she has been reappointed since that time by each succeeding administration. Miss Anderson has performed valuable service to all women who work through the many and varied activities of her bureau. She has always been a champion of a square deal for women earners and has spoken out in their behalf with fearlessness and firmness on many occasions.

N. C. OBSERVES 'DAIRY MONTH'

Statement Is Issued By State's Chief Executive

Raleigh, May 27.—Governor Clyde R. Hoey has issued the following statement in connection with National Dairy month. J. A. Arey, State College Extension dairyman, said today:

"North Carolina's great farm industry is closely allied with the dairy cow and her products, the annual income from which in this state approaches \$32,000,000. This will indicate the importance of this industry and also the possibilities in its further development.

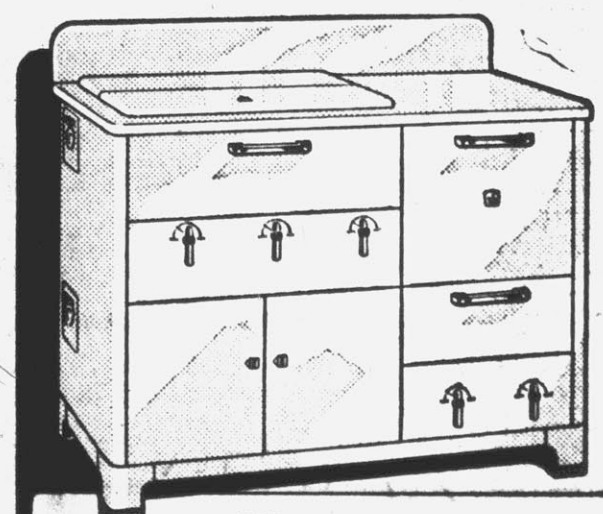
"Scientists have long recognized the high nutritional value of milk and its products, butter, cheese, and ice cream; and from youth to old age they occupy primary position in the diet as nourishing, refreshing, and appetizing drinks and dishes. A nation's human health is greatly enhanced by the products of the dairy cow, the foster mother of mankind.

"Today milk and other dairy products are relatively cheap; and June being the season of abundance on the market, prices always tend downward. Therefore, during the month of June, milk will be among the most economical food purchases for any family.

"With the idea of stimulating the use of dairy products during this period, it has been determined that June shall be designated as the dairy month in North Carolina, during which time special attention should be given to dairy products and all of the people further urged to enjoy some of these delicious and wholesome products during these first summer months.

"And I admonish the people of North Carolina to drink more milk, use more butter, cheese, and ice cream, and therefore improve the health and at the same time add to the stability of this industry in a period of peak production; and I trust that the month of June will find our people participating in this observance."

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
