GERMANS DRIVE ON LINE GUARDING PARIS

U. S. LAUNCHES HUGE SHIP AT PHILADELPHIA

Battleship Washington, first addition since 1921

LARGEST CRAFT OF U. S. NAVY

Sister Ship, the North Carolina, To Be Launched At New York Navy Yard Later In June

Philadelphia, June 1.—(AP)—The 35,000-ton battleship Washington, first capital ship addition to the United States fleet since 1921, was launched into the Delaware river at the Philadelphia navy yard today before a cheering crowd of 30,000.

War-time restrictions blanketed the navy yard as the \$65,000,000 "battleship" slid down the ways.

Fifteen-year-old Virginia Marshall, great, great, great granddaughter of Chief Justice John Marshall, christened the battleship in honor of her home state, Washington.

Senator Walsh (D-Mass.) declared in an address to the gay throngs of spectators that the launching signalled the "beginning of a renaissance of naval preparedness" that will protect the United States from any attack.

"The American people," said Walsh, chairman of the Senate Naval committee, "are determined at all costs to prepare for any eventuality that may follow the European war."

The Washington, mounting nine 16-inch guns, exceeds by 1,600 tons the largest ship the navy now has afloat. However, the Washington and a sister ship, the North Carolina, which will be launched at the New York navy yard later this month, will not join the fleet for more than a year.

Appeal Issued By Census Director

A final appeal was received from Denton W. Lupton, district census supervisor, today urging all persons who were missed by enumerators to act at once in order to be counted in the 1940 census.

Mr. Lupton, who is stationed in Washington, N. C., issued the following statement through W. T. Kyzer, executive secretary of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce:

"Any and all persons living in the city of Greenville, both white and colored, who have not been enumerated in the census of Greenville, will please notify the Greenville Chamber of Commerce or the census office in Washington, N. C., as we are anxious to have all counted in the 1940 census."

J. A. Staton Files For Run-Off Race

J. A. Staton of Bethel yesterday officially filed with the County Board of Elections, signifying his intention to enter a run-off primary with S. O. Worthington for one of Pitt county's two seats in the State House of Representatives.

Mr. Worthington was second high man and Mr. Staton ran third. Dr. W. I. Wooten ran in first place and was assured one of the two seats.

Roy T. Cox filed Thursday afternoon, calling a run-off primary with Amos O. Clark for the office of Register of Deeds.

These are the only two county contests to be waged in the second primary, June 22. Voters, however, will participate in a gubernatorial run-off between J. M. Broughton and W. P. Horton.

Manhattan Defers Sailing For U. S.

Genoa, June 1.—(AP)—The sailing of the liner Manhattan was postponed today until noon tomorrow because of the crush of Americans trying to quit Italy before the Mediterranean is bottled up by possible spread of the war.

Officials who had hoped to start the ship back for the U. S. today, were handicapped by a jam of nearly 2,000 passengers—almost all of them Americans.

"Some who had to be turned away offered as high as \$1,000 for the \$200 to \$400 tickets—without takers."

James Fleming Describes Conditions Now In Paris

Conditions in Paris since the German invasion of France were outlined in a letter received by Mrs. J. L. Fleming from her son, James Fleming, who at present is in Paris.

Because of the great interest here, Mrs. Fleming, at the request of The Reflector, consented to permit the letter to be published. It follows:

"I just received your cable and I understand your uneasiness. The situation for France and England is becoming rather serious. German superiority in the air and possibly in number of tanks on the ground make it difficult for the Allies not to withdraw little by little until they can make up that difference, or until America decides to stop aiding Italy and aid the Allies more effectively. The real thorn in the flesh of France is Italy. As long as she is a so-called neutral nation she supplies Germany with American materials and France with threats so that France must keep men and materials mobilized in the south far from the actual fighting, thus weakening her northern defense.

Vessel Said To Have Been Lost With 700 of Crew

Berlin, June 1.—(AP)—An authorized German spokesman said today that the battleship Nelson, 33,950-ton, flagship of the British home fleet, had been sunk with the loss of 700 of her crew of 1,320.

The statement was made in response to a question at a press conference and was not volunteered.

The correspondent told the spokesman that there had been rumors that the battleship had been sunk, whereupon the spokesman replied that the rumors were true and that 700 crewmen had gone down with the ship.

The spokesman declined to give any further details for "military reasons."

The Nelson is Britain's biggest battleship. She carries a normal crew of 1,361 men.

Last February the British admitted she had been damaged by a mine. She reached port under her own power, was repaired and rejoined the fleet some time in March.

Th Nelson and her sister ship, the Rodney, are the only British warships mounting 16-inch guns. Each carried nine of those huge guns.

Laid down in 1922 and completed in June, 1927, the Nelson cost 7,504,055 pounds (then about \$37,500,000).

LEGION ASKED TO COOPERATE

Called Upon By Hoy Curb Dangerous Propaganda

Raleigh, June 1.—(AP)—Governor Hoy today suggested the appointment of a committee in each American Legion post in North Carolina "to cooperate with government agencies in unearthing un-American activities and discovering the possible plans for subversive teachings and spreading of dangerous propaganda among the people."

In a letter to Junius H. Rose of Greenville, state legion commander, the chief executive said "we know what the system of espionage and sabotage has accomplished in other countries and we must not sleep while these forces work in any part of our land."

"I call upon you as commander in chief for the Legion in North Carolina," he wrote, "to enlist the active assistance of the various Legion posts throughout the state and of every individual legionnaire to aid in our national defense program and in sustaining the efforts being made to make our own country safe in the principles of real Americanism."

J. H. Rose, in reply to Governor Hoy's request for the cooperation of the American Legion in combating possible subversive activities in the state, issued the following statement:

"The American Legion posts throughout the state and the individual members of the Legion are again at the service of the state and nation. We offer our service fearlessly and grudgingly in all matters relating to the defense of our shores and the preservation of the ideals of our democracy. The Legion knows the heart and the brain of our government are in the right place and we appreciate the fact that he has been preaching the doctrine of true Americanism in his speeches. We also know that our governor's speeches are sincere expressions of his genuine convictions."

"Detailed plans for carrying out the governor's suggestions now are being worked out and will be presented to the state convention in High Point on June 22. The governor himself will address our convention on Tuesday, June 25."

Crowd For Return Aboard U. S. Liner

Galway, Ireland, June 1.—(AP)—Nearly 1,100 Americans sought passage home on the liner President Roosevelt amid confusion today.

Passengers had their tickets, but at noon nobody knew whether they were actually going on board.

There were reports here the liner Washington would call for passengers left behind because plans to carry some passengers between decks were cancelled without explanation.

ALL BUT ONE DIVISION SAFE

Surrender Of Belgian Troops Had Left Allies Trapped In Precarious Situation

A Southeast Coast Port in England, June 1.—(AP)—Britain exulted today at one of the greatest military rescues of all time as it was estimated unofficially that all save one division of the British Expeditionary Force—a division originally numbering 15,000—had been brought back from the German death trap in Flanders.

The strength of the BEF sent into Belgium at the outset of the great war in the west was placed at 175,000 men. How many were killed in the spectacular 20-day campaign is not ascertained. At all odds, however, some unofficial sources put the number of returned men at well above 100,000.

Though it was announced definite figures could not be released as yet, informed sources reported a tremendous increase in the numbers of home-coming troops within the last 24 hours.

When King Leopold, III, ordered the surrender of the Belgian army last Tuesday and thus laid open the allied left flank, the BEF appeared to be faced with the alternative of putting up the white flag or being annihilated by an onrushing German army of some 1,000,000 men.

There has been neither surrender nor annihilation. Covering the withdrawal of the British army Hitler sought to destroy, British and French forces still are waging a furious rear guard action against the Nazis closing in on the narrowing Dunkerque corridor.

Allied naval guns and the allied air forces are supporting the withdrawal and embarkation proceeding under the additional cover of low-lying fog that has hampered the operations of the numerically superior German air force.

"Royal Manhood" will be the subject of the commencement sermon to be delivered to 1940 seniors of Greenville High School tomorrow night at 8 o'clock in the high school auditorium by Dr. Robert S. Boyd, pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Greenville.

The Senior procession will get under way shortly before 8:00 o'clock followed by the singing of "Are Ye Able, Said The Master," by the congregation. The Rev. Worth Wicker, pastor of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, will offer the invocation.

A special selection by a mixed chorus, "Hear Our Prayer, O Lord," will be followed by the scripture reading to be offered by Dr. Boyd. The Boys' Glee Club will offer another number, "Spacious Firmament."

Two other numbers by the mixed chorus, "There Shall A Star From Jacob" and "The Lord's Prayer," along with the benediction by Rev. Wicker, will conclude the program of the evening.

Rumanian Official Resigns Position

Bucharest, June 1.—(AP)—Foreign Minister Grigore Gafencu resigned today because of "ill health" and was immediately replaced by Ion Gurgutu, minister of communications and a close friend of the German government.

The resignation of Gafencu, who had been energetically pro-British and pro-French during his two years as foreign minister came as surprise.

It is understood that Gurgutu has been entrusted by King Carol with reorienting Rumanian policy to obtain better relations with both Berlin and Moscow.

OPPOSITION TO FDR PROPOSAL TO CALL GUARD

Sharp Dissension Over Request For Such Power

EXTRA BILLION PLEA IS BACKED

Total Now Requested Three-Fourths of Total Expenditures For First Year Of World War

Washington, June 1.—(AP)—Congress rallied unhesitatingly today behind President Roosevelt's call for another billion to fortify the ramparts of national defense, but there was sharp dissension in the ranks over his request for power to call out the National Guard if needed.

From both parties came staunch support of the broadened preparedness plans. Rep. Martin of Massachusetts, the republican leader, said his party would join in every effort to improve defenses.

The latest arms recommendations gave the nation a prospective military bill roughly three-fourths of the \$6,148,795,000 spent for army and navy during America's first full fiscal year in the World War.

Although Mr. Roosevelt spoke in round terms of "more than a billion dollars," authoritative quarters said the expenditures contemplated in yesterday's special message would come to \$1,375,000,000. Added to regular and extraordinary measures now pending this would make a total of \$4,672,011,352.

While Congress evinced readiness to vote the mounting millions, Mr. Roosevelt's accompanying national guard recommendations encountered prompt opposition.

Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) told reporters the request for power to call out the National Guard, if necessary to maintain neutrality, was a "shocking" proposal which sounded as if the President wanted to be able to order a partial mobilization by executive authority alone.

Babson Draws Lesson For United States

Charleston, S. C., June 1.—Without doubt these are the most critical days in at least a century of world history. Only a few months ago we were talking about a "phony" war. Only a few weeks ago the Allied generals were talking about that "crazy paper hanger" in Germany. Even the London Times which arrived here a few days back discussed the peace terms which England would inflict on Germany when Hitler was mopped up.

When recently talking with our high government officials, they told me that the French army was invincible. They admitted that the war might be a long struggle, but insisted that no army could whip the French. They stated that it was the largest, most completely-equipped army in the world. They also spoke in highest terms of its commanders and especially of the French strategists. Certainly, it makes one lose confidence in army officials to see what has taken place only a few weeks after such statements. For evidence, read The

DEFENSE UNIT OF FBI FORMED

Veteran G-Man Named Head of Investigating Group

Washington, June 1.—(AP)—Creation of a "national defense investigation" unit was announced today by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Hugh H. Clegg, veteran G-Man and at present an assistant director of the FBI in charge of training and inspection, was appointed to head the new group which will have among its duties investigation of "fifth column" and similar activities considered prejudicial to national safety.

Meanwhile it was disclosed that the Dies committee would hear testimony beginning Monday on reports that Communists were employed in the Tennessee Valley Authority and the Birmingham, Ala., steel industry.

Chairman Dies (D-Tex.) said merely the committee would look into "fifth column activities in the south."

Dies proposed that President Roosevelt create a council of home defense to coordinate the nation's anti-fifth column campaign under "constructive sane leadership."

His suggestion followed the Senate's action yesterday in voting 55-4 to approve a presidential reorganization plan to shift the immigration service from the Labor Department to the Justice Department to "deal quickly" with trojan horse threats.

Battle Launched On South Bank Of The Somme Yesterday, Resumed This Morning And Continued Throughout Today; Expected To Roll Down France Before Striking at England

German forces wheeled today in an attack on the Somme river—the Allies' line guarding Paris—as battle-stained allied troops snatched from the Nazi death trap in Flanders reached the safety of England.

The French said they held against the Nazi onslaught on the south bank of the lower Somme in a battle launched by the Germans yesterday, resumed at dawn today and still going on.

A bridge head which the French established on the north side of the river bore the brunt of the German assault, but the Nazis struck also against French positions on the south bank.

With the Germans striking along the Somme front, while still hemming in remnants of the "trapped" allied armies in Flanders, a new phase of the war began.

The Allies expected Germany hinted a Nazi attempt to roll down on France before losing any attempt to invade England.

Italy still hovered on the sidelines, apparently drawing steadily closer to the decision which might send her armies northward, while the Germans pushed southward in a gigantic pincer on France.

Italy called up 10,000 non-commissioned officers today to supplement a force of 50,000, while both Italy and in Spain clamored for Britain to relinquish Gibraltar—her stronghold at the western gate of the Mediterranean.

The reckoning varied meanwhile on what the British called "the greatest rescue in military history."

Unofficial British estimates that three-fourths of the BEF had reached Britain meant that from 130,000 to 140,000 Tommies of the 175,000 sent over to face the Nazi blitzkrieg had been rescued.

The German price for the Flanders' triumph, British newspapers said, was half a million men.

But the Germans estimated they had one million allied prisoners, not counting the Belgians and the Dutch, or will have when the mop-up in Flanders is complete.

However, the Nazi estimates probably exceed the total manpower of all the British and French forces in the campaign in the low countries and northern France.

The Germans said they had taken 25,000 prisoners in a pocket south of Lille alone and had recaptured their material losses by booty abandoned by the Allies in flight—brand new motorized war machinery and cannon, as well as hundreds of thousands of rounds of machine gun ammunition and large supplies of shells.

Despite adverse weather, the German high command said Nazi leaders had sunk five transports, damaged three warships and 10 merchantmen in raids on Dunkerque. Speedboats, it said, also sank an allied destroyer and an allied submarine.

In the air, the Germans said, the score for yesterday's fighting was 49 allied planes lost to nine German planes missing.

The British, however, declared they had shot down or seriously damaged 66 German planes at a loss of only 19.

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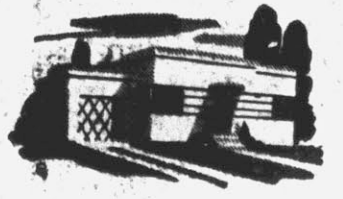

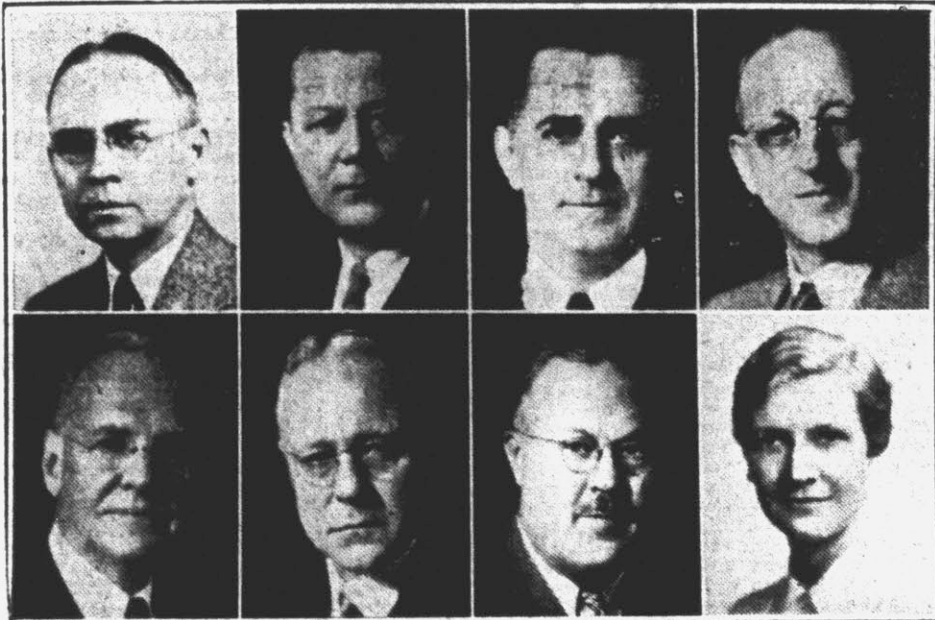

England still controls the other side. It is true that London is now only a few miles from Germany's new air fields, but it is likewise true that these German air bases are only a few miles from British shores. Moreover, do not forget that England still has her navy and merchant marine intact.

Right Over Might

The answer to the question, "Will Great Britain collapse?" will be determined not by Germany's blitzkriegs, but by the character of the English people. From time immemorial, new methods of warfare have been developed. Those nations which first grasped and used these new methods have, temporarily, been successful. The ultimate force, however, which has determined the result has been spiritual rather than material. The "blitzkrieg" is no more important in the eyes of history than the invention of the long bow to take the place of spears, of powder and shot to replace battering rams, of iron ships to overcome wooden frigates.

These are days when we should read ancient history. A study of the rise and fall of Babylon, Persia, Egypt, Greece, Rome, and the Spanish Empire shows that new methods of warfare have won battles but have never won wars. This is being demonstrated by what I saw in the Far East last September. There barefooted and poorly-equipped Chinese armies are holding up Japan's modern war machine fully equipped with airplanes, tanks, and artillery.

Gang Warfare

Let us be calm for a moment and visualize what is now happening among the German-conquered nations. As various countries are taken over, a Hitler aide is placed in control. There are now dictators in Czechoslovakia, Austria, and Poland. These already are beginning to differ as to policy. Recently other dictators have been placed in Norway, Denmark, Holland, and Belgium. Considering the native brutality and dishonesty of these dictators, isn't it certain that they will soon begin fighting among themselves?

This is all the more likely when one considers that these nations all have different languages, great traditions, and diverse instincts. Brutality, deceit, and ingenuity will be used by these sub-dictators to trap one another just as they have been used to trap innocent and peaceful neutrals. "A leopard cannot change its spots." History shows that if the English race is willing to stake their lives and property, they in the end will save both; but not in any other way.

Arm Immediately

Here in the United States, we need at least fifty thousand airplanes to protect North and South America. If we can produce four million pleasure cars a year, we certainly ought to be able to produce fifty thousand military planes. I am behind those who demand adequate defense for this hemisphere. We must be in a position to give effective aid to Canada and the West

Indies whenever they ask for it, without demanding a penny for our services. We, however, must remember that battleships, airplanes, and tanks will not save America any more than these things have thus far saved the Allies. Security cannot be purchased; it comes only through courage, self-sacrifice, and discipline.

It also should be remembered that these airplanes, which we are building can be used against us by an inside enemy just as easily as we can use them against an outside foe. This means a character-building campaign should be a definite part of our defense program. Now, more than ever before in the history of warfare, it is vital that the people of the strongest character should furnish the men who are to be trained for this new and all-important branch of our national defense. Let religious and civic leaders who are serious in their prayers read this last sentence.

Orthopedic Clinic In Greenville May 7th

The State Orthopedic Clinic will be held here Friday, June 7th, from 12:30 to 4 p. m.

This Clinic takes all types of cripples, both white and colored, free of charge who are unable to afford private treatments. It is desired, though not required, that patients be referred by a physician or the Welfare Officer, and that the patient bring such note to the Clinic.

The Clinic is set up to serve especially the Counties of Beaufort, Carteret, Pamlico, Pitt and Tyrrell, though patients from other counties who desire to come may do so.
