HITLER LAUNCHES VIOLENT OFFENSIVE

GROUP NAMED TO FIND FUNDS FOR DEFENSE

Ten-Man Body Named By Ways and Means Committee

WILL SEEK FIND ADDITIONAL SUM

Principal Proposal Calls For Broadening Of Income Tax Base To Reduce Exemptions

Washington, June 5.—

(AP)—The House Ways and Means committee, bent on raising money for growing defense costs, directed a 10-man sub-committee today to find a way to add at least \$200,000,000 to the \$656,000,000 in the pending defense tax bill.

The principal proposal laid before the sub-committee was a broadening of the income tax base to reduce individual income tax exemptions from \$2,100 to \$1,800 for heads of families and from \$1,000 to \$800 for single individuals.

Chairman Doughton (D-N.C.) estimated this would raise \$80,000,000.

With such a broadening and an increase in levies on the middle and lower income tax brackets as has been suggested would raise a sum estimated unofficially at upwards of \$400,000,000.

Doughton said that whatever funds were derived from the taxes would be used to retire a \$4,000,000,000 federal debt limit increase already approved by the committee. Any excess over the amount needed to retire this debt would go into the general fund of the treasury, he said.

In response to other questions, Doughton said no consideration had been given by the committee to any war excess profits tax or to a general sales tax.

Pleas Entered By Quantico Marines

Alexandria, Va., June 5.—(AP)—Two marines from the Quantico, Va., marine base pleaded guilty in federal court today to second degree murder in the death of Sidney M. Little, 29, tobacco salesman of Washington, N. C.

Alexander Joseph Stevenson, 28, of Andalusia, Penn., and William J. Palmer, 26, of Sunbury, Penn., entered the pleas before Judge Robert N. Pollard, who heard testimony of about 10 witnesses behind closed doors. The two were indicted by a federal grand jury at Norfolk two months ago.

Little's body was found January 7 near the Fort Hunt Civilian Conservation Corps camp. Police said he had been killed by a blow on the head.

Dr. C. A. Ransom, Fairfax county coroner, said the probable cause of death was a skull fracture and identified the picture of an iron brace from one of the picnic ovens which, he said, could have caused it.

President Roosevelt A Grandfather Again

Boston, June 5.—(AP)—President Roosevelt became a grandfather again today when a seven-pound, nine-ounce son was born to Mrs. Anne (Clark) Roosevelt, wife of John, his youngest son.

Dr. Charles G. Shedd, who delivered the child, said both mother and infant were in excellent health.

Peiping Picked As Air Capital

Peiping, (AP)—Japanese plan to convert Peiping's civilian airport into the biggest in China. It was built by cooie labor two years ago, and already is considered too small for expanding air activities. The new airport is projected as the hub of air travel in North China.

WGTC On The Air

Greenville's Radio Station WGTC this afternoon received authority to go on the air for its regular schedule tomorrow morning at 6:45 o'clock.

The station, operating on 1500 kilocycles, is scheduled to start its testing about 8 o'clock or shortly thereafter tonight and to go on the air at 6:45 Thursday morning.

FLOOD WATERS FATAL TO FIVE

At Least Eight Others Missing In Nebraska

Omaha, June 5.—(AP)—Stories of suffering and heroism were told today in the wake of northeast Nebraska's devastating flood which claimed at least five lives and in which at least eight persons were reported missing.

Hundreds are homeless as a result of torrential rains that sent small streams raging out of their banks, to sweep houses and business buildings from their foundations in six north-eastern counties, causing damage as yet unestimated.

Homer, Pender and Winnebago appeared the worst hit.

Edith Lipp, 20, only member of her household of six who is not either dead or missing, told this graphic story:

"We were out in the yard loading goats in our truck when the water hit us. We grabbed onto a clothes line, all of us. One by one I saw them drop off."

"Finally I couldn't hold on any longer. The water washed me down into a tree. I was there for at least eight hours before they rescued me."

Leg of Youth Broken In Traffic Accident

Greenville police today reported that Charlie Seamster, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Seamster of Greenville, is in Pitt General Hospital suffering a fractured leg received yesterday afternoon when run over by a delivery truck driven by Desk Oatis Sharpe.

The accident occurred around 3:30 o'clock, but was not reported until today. Sharpe advised police of the accident and said that the truck he was driving and the bicycle on which the youth was riding were headed toward Five Points.

There was no official investigation and no charges have been preferred.

Dr. W. I. Wooten said that both bones in Seamster's left leg were fractured below the knee. Dr. Wooten said the youth received no other injuries.

Bugs Dine On \$700 Bonus

Nevada City, Calif.—(AP)—When Henry Lewis, war veteran, went to look for \$700 in bonus bonds he had packed away, he found that termites had destroyed them. Brushing up what fragments of paper remained, he mailed them to Washington. Officials were able to identify the bonds, and sent Lewis their full face value plus interest.

Nations Have Parallel Interests In Near East

London, June 5.—(AP)—Soviet Russian circles in London said today that Russia views her interests in the Black sea and the eastern Mediterranean as parallel with those of the Allies.

These sources, surveying the international situation, particularly the factor of Italian pressure, in the light of Moscow's acceptance of Sir Stafford Cripps as Britain's new ambassador, hinted that there at least was a good possibility of diplomatic cooperation between the Kremlin and the Allies in the Near East.

France's move to name Erik La-bonne, former French resident general in Tunisia and ambassador to Republican Spain, as ambassador to Moscow also was sighted as a factor in improving Soviet-Allied relations.

A Russian source said, however that Britain "must show by deeds as well as words, an honest desire for friendship with Russia."

Funeral services will be conducted at the home tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock by the Rev. C. B. Marshall, pastor of Farmville Christian church, of which Mrs. Dixon was a member, assisted by the Rev. D. A. Clark, pastor of Farmville Methodist church, burial will be in Hollywood cemetery, Farmville.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. J. P. Surret of Farmville; six brothers, D. E. G. C. L. D. and Herbert Worthington of Kingston, and T. R. and W. C. Worthington of Grifton.

NO 3RD TERM FOR LOUISIANA

Democrats Vote To Send Uninstructed Delegation

Brion Rouge, La., June 5.—(AP)—Louisiana Democrats refused to approve third term support for President Roosevelt and drove United States Senator Allen J. Ellender from the platform with boos and hisses at their first state convention in 16 years.

The convention voted to send delegates to the Democratic National Convention at Chicago uninstructed and directed them to cast the state's 20 votes as a unit.

This action came last night after the convention had howled down Ellender's attempt to have the delegates instructed to support President Roosevelt for renomination.

A resolution later adopted said that "the unfavorable reception given Ellender was not to be construed as any reflection on President Roosevelt."

Ellender formerly was aligned with the forces of the late Huey P. Long, which recently were defeated by Governor Sam Jones.

Service League Of City Concludes Work Of Year

The Service League terminated its year's activities yesterday at its annual luncheon meeting at the Greenville Country club. Work will be suspended for the summer and resumed next fall.

The Service League's main projects are the hospital bed, the thrift shop, the lending closet, the girl scout scholarship, layettes, clinic work and transportation of the workers for the State Commission for the blind. In addition to these the League prepares and distributes the community Christmas baskets, assists materially with the Community Chest Drive, the Red Cross Roll Call, and the Red Cross Christmas Tubercular Seal Sale.

Through the Service League's hospital bed fund, twenty-six patients, both white and colored, have received hospitalization during the past year. Twenty of these were adults and six were children. Community-wide interest in this project is consistently shown by donations to the bed fund and by the liberal patronage the public gives all affairs sponsored by the League for the maintenance of the bed.

The Thrift Shop and Service League office occupy rooms over the Key Brown Drug Company through the kindness of Mr. Brown who allows the League to use them gratis. The Thrift Shop receives its stock of second-hand clothing and household utensils by donation from friends and League members. These articles are sold at nominal prices to the needy who are privileged to purchase them very cheap rather than to receive them as charity. The Thrift Shop has had seven hundred customers since it reopened last October. Mrs. A. J. Moore has been its chairman.

FIFTH COLUMN REPORTS RUSH DEFENSE AIMS

Activities Reported In Latin-American Nations

SEEN AS CAUSE MUCH CONCERN

Roosevelt Said To Have Asked Authority To Mobilize Guard In Case Army Sent Elsewhere

Washington, June 4.—

(AP)—A secret statement from the army high command on "fifth column" activities in several Latin-American countries kept hemisphere defense problems to the fore today in the rush of preparedness considerations.

Reasons for the army's manifest concern over the potentialities of conditions in some parts of the Western Hemisphere were outlined yesterday in a closed meeting of the House Military committee by General George C. Marshall, chief of staff.

General Marshall, some members said later, named five countries in Latin-America where he declared "fifth column" activities were cause for apprehension. An intensification of efforts might be expected, Marshall was quoted, if Great Britain and France appeared certain to be defeated.

Discussion of "fifth column" activities hinged on preparation of a bill that would empower President Roosevelt to mobilize the National Guard in case of necessity without congressional approval. The President's request for this authority has drawn the fire of some congressmen.

Marshall, urging the merits of the legislation, said it was needed because there were "dangers" that might be serious specifically with relations to the Panama canal.

One high official later asserted that the reason Mr. Roosevelt asked the power to call out the National Guard was the possibility that regular army troops might have to cope with an emergency elsewhere in the hemisphere.

If it was necessary to mobilize the guard, this official said, it would be used to relieve regulars who might have to be sent to the Panama Canal zone, Puerto Rico or some other point outside the United States.

Summer School Opens In City On Thursday

Summer school for the elementary grades, one to seven, of the Greenville system, will begin tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock in the Training school.

The summer sessions are conducted for students who failed to complete their grade during the regular term and wish to make up the work in order to be promoted at the start of the fall session.

APPROVE PLAN PROTECT AREA

Move To Prevent Transfer of Regions Is Approved

Washington, June 5.—(AP)—A resolution recording congress as opposed to the transfer of any region in this hemisphere from one non-American nation to another was approved swiftly today by the Foreign Relations committees of both the Senate and House.

Supported by Secretary Hull, the resolution won unanimous approval of the Senate group.

In a matter of minutes Chairman Bloom of the House committee announced that in it democrats and republicans alike had supported the resolution and that all but two committee members voted for it.

At its session today the Senate committee also rejected, 19-2, a proposal by Senator Pepper (D-Pa.) to direct President Roosevelt to aid the Allies short of actual participation in the war.

Chairman Pittman (D-Nev.) said speedy Senate action would be sought on the resolution to deny United States recognition of any changes in Western hemisphere sovereignty due to the European war.

Declares Farmers Are In For A Rap

Raleigh, June 5.—(AP)—Rep. Graham A. Barden told delegates to the annual meeting of the North Carolina Cotton Growers Cooperative Association and the Farmers Cooperative Exchange today that the farmer "is in for another rap" because of the European war.

Joint meeting of the two large cooperatives attracted about 5,000 farm folk to Raleigh, including delegations from nearly every county in the state. J. M. Broughton, democratic gubernatorial nominee, welcomed the delegations.

M. G. Mann, general manager, reported a "highly successful year" for the cooperatives in which they did a gross business of more than \$6,000,000.

New directors inducted into office during the meeting included: Cotton association: J. W. Andrews of Goldsboro, J. T. Thorne of Farmville, B. C. Mayo of Tarboro; Farmers' Exchange—W. W. Eagles of Tarboro and J. B. Patrick of Washington.

Maxwell Is Reported As Still "Very Sick"

Raleigh, June 5.—(AP)—Revenue Commissioner A. J. Maxwell was "better this morning, but still a very sick man, in critical condition," his physician, Dr. W. B. Dewar, said. Maxwell suffered a stroke of paralysis while campaigning unsuccessfully for the democratic gubernatorial nomination.

Paved With Gold
Newhall, Calif.—(AP)—A new highway cutoff north of here is being surfaced partly with gold, silver and platinum, says D. F. Strobeck, a prospector. The gravel used has been traced by him to a mineralized deposit which he assays from \$1.40 to \$15.30 a ton.

Paris Is Seen As Goal Of Latest Nazi Thrust Along 125-Mile Front

New Bombings

Paris, June 5.—(AP)—An area in central France was bombed today by German planes. "Various objectives" were hit by the enemy raiders, semi-official reports said, after the alarm had been sounded from 1:20 p. m. to 3:05 p. m.

A squadron of French fighting planes collaborated with anti-aircraft batteries in fighting off the attack.

Information on objectives hit and damage done was not immediately available.

RELIEF FUNDS ARE APPROVED

Annual Measure Endorsed By Senate Committee

Washington, June 5.—(AP)—Approving a number of national defense provisions, the Senate appropriations committee reported today to day an annual relief bill carrying \$1,073,584,915 and an addition \$125,000,000 in loans.

Senator Adams (D-Col.) in charge of the measure, said he expected the Senate to begin consideration of the bill tomorrow.

The committee adopted a provision for non-combatant military training for CCC youths.

As sent to the Senate the relief bill appropriation total was \$38,170,000 below the amount approved by the House, but this did not take into account an order directing the Reconstruction Finance Corporation to provide \$125,000,000 for relief loans to farmers.

The Senate committee also approved a \$975,650,000 WPA fund for the eight months beginning July 1. This is expected to provide a monthly WPA employment of 1,950,000.

Provisions barring aliens, communists and Nazi bund members from relief rolls also were approved without change from language adopted by the House.

Complete Session Of County Court

This week's session of Pitt county court was completed yesterday afternoon after eight cases had been disposed of following a busy morning session.

While defendants were in the morning session, the afternoon session, as they were during the morning, five of the eight defendants called after lunch being white.

A nol pros was taken in the case charging O. J. Galloway with driving without a license.

A. J. Cox was ordered to pay the costs in a case charging possession of non-tax paid liquor.

An agreement was reported to have been reached in the case charging C. A. McLamb with non-support of his child and the case was left open.

Peyton Atkinson, Negro, was convicted of driving drunk and was fined \$50, taxed with court costs, had his license revoked for 12 months and was given a 60-day suspended sentence.

Maxel Minges was found guilty of exceeding the speed limit and judgment was suspended upon payment of court costs. The judgment also provided that the clerk of court hold the defendant's license for one week.

Charlie Teel, Negro, was convicted of non-support of his child and was ordered to pay \$1.50 weekly in to the welfare office to be used for supporting the child.

D. B. Willis pleaded guilty to violating law providing for keeping records on meat and poultry bought and sold in the county and prayer for judgment was continued.

Curtis Willis, Negro, convicted of being drunk and disorderly and with a deadly weapon, was given a four months road sentence.

Massive Onslaught, Touched Off By Hitler Himself, Directed At Region Of Amiens And Along Ailette Canal Between Laon And Soissons; Paris Is "Practically Exposed"

General Maxime Weygand's French Poilus were reported "holding solidly" late today in a titanic battle of 2,000,000 men raging along the 125-mile Somme-Aisne front as Hitler launched a violent new blitzkrieg into the heart of France.

By contrast, authorized German sources in Berlin asserted that the Nazi army's "right wing was sweeping forward 'on the broadest front'—heading south and west along the English channel coast toward Le Havre and Rouen.

The German thrust was aimed at further separating France from England.

As the struggle surged to new heights of man against man ferocity, London reported that German "armored vehicles"—probably swift-striking motorcycle vanguards—had reached both sides of Amiens.

This would indicate typical blitzkrieg tactics of speeding around strongly fortified cities without attempting to storm or capture them.

Berlin reported that Nazi dive-bombing planes had wrought "great destruction" and an "extremely demoralizing effect" in attacks on French tanks south of Abbeville, on the Somme front.

Many French tanks were reported "completely disabled."

Paris and the lower Seine river were the apparent ultimate objectives, seemingly in a mighty smash to turn the flank of the main Maginot line.

Touched off by the German fuhrer himself from his headquarters on the Western Front, the massive attack began at 4:04 a. m. (10:04 p. m. Tuesday, EST) with a furious artillery barrage against the French lines.

While the Nazi air force thundered overhead, bombing and strafing masses of uniformed German infantry moved forward through the dawn haze.

The heaviest blows were directed at the region of Amiens and along the Ailette canal between Laon and Soissons. The latter is only 55 miles from Paris.

Berlin declared Paris—the apparent target of the new blitzkrieg lay "practically exposed" to the German onslaught.

With Belgium crushed in a 25-day campaign, Hitler sent his legions striking into the heart of France with a hint that he had offered the Allies some kind of peace terms—possibly a separate peace to only one side—and had been rejected.

Thus, in his "order of the day" addressed to his armies the fuhrer declared:

"The plutocratic rulers of England and France who pledged each other to avoid with all means the bloom of a new and better world want a continuation of the war."

London several days ago reported that Hitler was expected to offer a separate peace in an attempt to split the Allies—and Prime Minister Churchill pledged yesterday that Britain would fight "alone if necessary" to win the war.

Allied planes again retaliated for the Nazi aerial attack on Paris—which left 254 dead and 652 wounded—(Continued on Page Six)

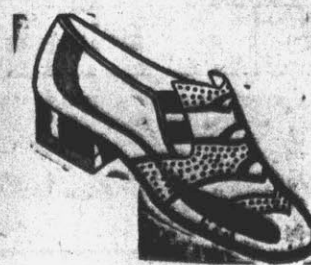

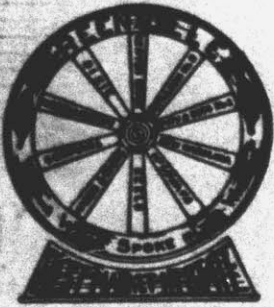

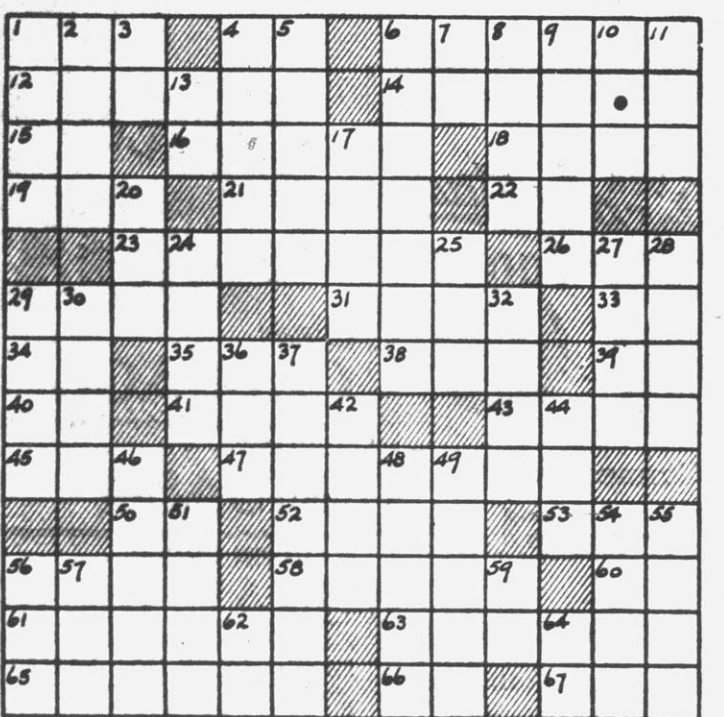

The Service League's Lending Closet contains everything actually necessary for a sick room and the articles will be lent upon request to emergency and obstetrical cases in homes lacking these necessities.

The League's Girl Scout Scholarship finances the scouting activities of one Girl Scout for a year. This year its holder will be sent in July to the Shirley Rogers Girl Scout Camp near Roaring Gap.

Twenty-six layettes have been turned over to the Pitt county health office to be used in connection with the League's work in the maternity and infant clinics. League members assist in the office and furnish regular transportation for patients at this and the tubercular and the venereal disease clinics.

During the summer the league will continue to provide this transportation and also that of Mrs. Annie B. Faircloth, state worker among the blind, when she is in Pitt county. An interesting report of her work here, which is sponsored by the local Lions club, was sent by Mrs. Faircloth to be read at Tuesday's meeting. She has been taken 570 miles to pay 115 visits to 32 persons.

She is teaching nine blind people to read and write Braille, two to typewrite, and eight to produce salable articles. Mrs. Faircloth also instructs her pupils in various aspects of social adjustment and homemaking. Service League members have found real satisfaction and inspiration in working with Mrs. Faircloth.

Members of the league's advisory council were guests at Tuesday's luncheon meeting. They were given corsages upon arrival. Mrs. R. C. Stokes, Jr., retiring president, presented each of the Service League officers' shoulderettes of roses and sweets as a token of her appreciation of the co-operation they had given her during her term of office.

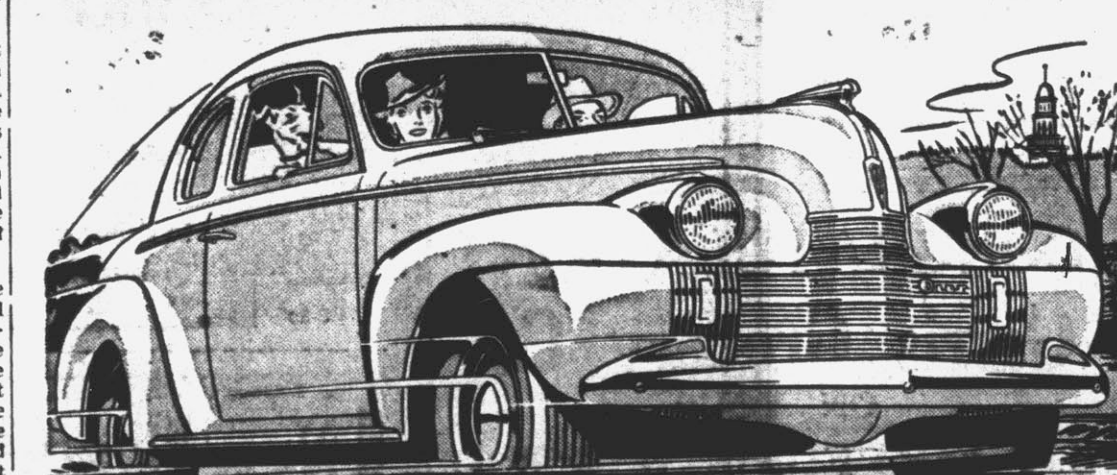

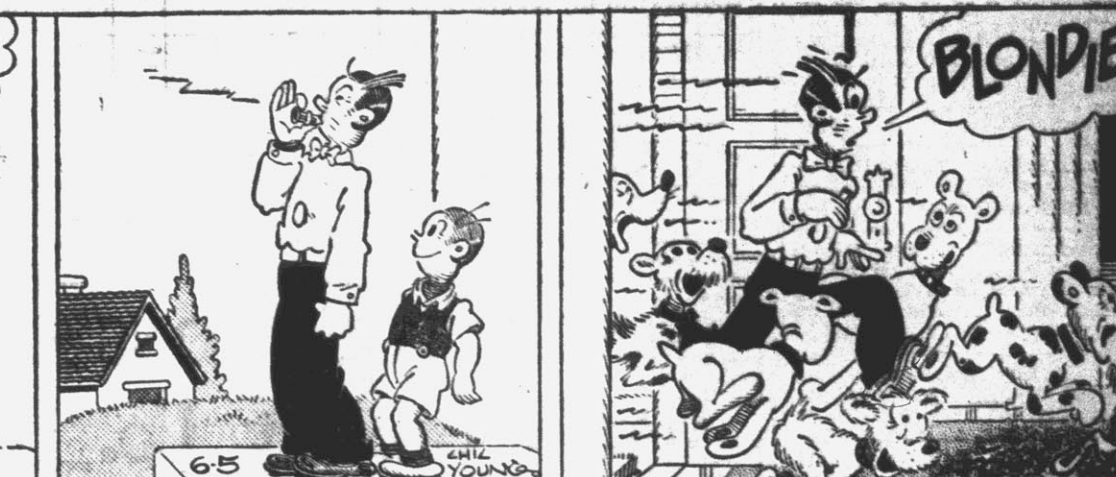

Broughton To Take Over With His Hands Untied

Reflector Bureau.

Raleigh, June 5.—J. Melville Broughton, North Carolina's next governor in the absence of death or a political miracle, will take office next January with very few definite commitments, either from his own or the Democratic party's platform, to tie his hands.

He has pledged his best efforts for establishment of a system of teacher retirement; he has flatly advocated removal of the sales tax on foods for home consumption; and he has definitely committed himself to the principle that funds derived from sale of hunting and fishing licenses should not be diverted to any other purpose.

Beyond that he will have a perfectly free hand to take almost any position he pleases on any issue which may come up in the 1941 General Assembly. Of particular interest is the fact that he is completely uncommitted on a statewide liquor referendum or reapportionment.

The specific pledges mentioned were either in Mr. Broughton's original platform declaration or in speeches during the campaign. The Democratic platform, adopted here last month was notable for its failure to promise anything whatsoever. It was one of the most indefinite on record and was one upon which anybody in the world could stand without the slightest fear of falling off.

Now that he has been duly nominated and all the fighting is over, it might be of interest to review the original Broughton platform, which he issued on Tuesday, December 12, 1939.

Economy: "I will oppose any measure or appropriation that will cause a deficit or in anywise impair the credit of the state. A financially sound state, with financially sound units of government, should be our first and unyielding policy."

Taxes: "Taxes in North Carolina are as high, in my opinion, as the people can stand. The effort should be toward reduction and not increase."

Sales Tax: "Even if it should for the present be deemed a necessity, there is the very general hope that it may be ultimately eliminated from our tax system. In any event, the exemption on necessities of the

meat and bread varieties as now in the law should be continued; and, if possible, this exemption should be extended to all food for home consumption." This theme was emphasized in the Broughton campaign under the slogan "Take the tax off the table."

Teacher Retirement: "I believe that normal increase in revenue, together with certain economies that can be effected, will enable the next General Assembly to increase teachers' salaries as well as to set up a just and adequate teacher-retirement system." This was featured and re-stated more emphatically during the campaign and in the Democratic platform one of the very few outright promises is a retirement system, not only for teachers, but for all state employees.

Highways: "They must be adequately maintained and extended. Increasing emphasis should be placed on farm-to-market roads."

Highway Fund Diversion: "Every dollar of highway funds is needed for highway and road maintenance and construction. Our revenue situation is such that no diversion of highway funds will likely be made during the current biennium. This is gratifying, and such policy should be continued in the future." During the campaign Mr. Broughton again emphasized opposition to "diversion," but there has been doubt that his statements went so far as to pledge opposition to the existing Revenue Act provisions for so-called contingent diversion.

Conservation, Diversion of Game Funds: "Receipts from fishing and hunting licenses should be wholly used for such purpose. The next General Assembly will undoubtedly be able to provide funds from other sources for the very essential work of timber conservation and forest fire prevention."

Agriculture: "We can have neither sound prosperity nor general welfare without continued improvement in farming methods, particularly as to diversification and marketing."

Labor: "Relations between capital and labor in North Carolina have been singularly fortunate. The spirit of cooperation that has existed should be extended to the end that capital may have fair return upon its investment and labor may

enjoy a reasonable wage and comfortable and adequate living conditions.—We will attempt to be legislative, negotiation and arbitration to settle all labor differences in North Carolina spirit of cooperation and fairness."

Industry: "There is and should be no antagonism between the state and its industries. The relationship is one of mutual cooperation and understanding."

That, in brief, was the platform Mr. Broughton campaigned upon. He made few vital alterations in it during the primary vote soliciting. It is, as all can see, more or less in-

definite and there is little in it which will bind the Raleigh lawyer to any specific course of action upon any issue.
