

GERMANS STORM AT GATES OF PARIS

Boost Defense To Meet Problems Of This Hemisphere

HUGE INCREASE IS SUGGESTED

Army Chief of Staff Sees "All Manner of Possibilities" In The Western Hemisphere; Additional \$1,706,053,908 Asked, Bringing Total So Far To \$5,021,619,612

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—The House Appropriations committee recommended an additional \$1,706,053,908 outlay for national defense today to prepare this country for what the army chief of staff called "all manner of possibilities in the Western hemisphere."

The huge increase, submitted one day after Italy's entrance into the war, would boost defense appropriations for this session to \$5,021,619,612, would add 95,000 enlisted men to the regular army, provide 3,000 new warplanes for the air corps and permit the navy to start work on 68 additional warships.

The measure also carried \$3,358,800 to give the Federal Bureau of Investigation 500 additional agents to deal with espionage, sabotage and other national defense activities.

Among other items in the bill were \$1,000,000 for the national defense council and its recently appointed advisory commission, \$47,500,000 for the acquisition of strategic minerals and materials and \$32,000,000 additional for the civil aeronautics authority to give training to a total of 87,000 civilian airplane pilots.

General George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, was recorded as telling the committee that "this plan is entirely devoted to the problems as we visualize them in the Western hemisphere. We do not visualize any invasion of this country. An air raid or something of that sort is possible, but frankly, at the present moment, we do not see it in the offing. But we see all manner of possibilities in the Western hemisphere."

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—The House completed congressional action today on bills permitting the navy to have a total of 10,000 planes and 16,000 pilots and to build 22 new combat vessels.

Both pieces of legislation now go to the White House for President Roosevelt's signature.

In addition to the fighting ships, the fleet increase measure would permit construction of a similar number of auxiliary vessels.

Specifically the bill permits a 11 per cent increase in the Navy's surface tonnage.

Drive Is Impeded By Thunderstorms

Paris, June 11.—(AP)—General Maxime Weygand's armies were declared tonight in dispatches from the front to be checking the invading Germans on the French left (west) flank, where the deepest Nazi thrust had carried light armored columns across the Seine.

Meanwhile thunderstorms broke over the vast dry and hot battlefields impeding the dive bombers and tanks at the head of the German advance toward the French capital.

In the central section of the front northeast of Paris a heavy German offensive was being met head-on in the Ourcq valley. The French right was declared holding firm.

Asks \$50,000,000

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today drafted a letter asking Congress to appropriate \$50,000,000 to be used by the Red Cross for refugee relief in Europe.

The letter will be sent to Vice President Garner and Speaker Bankhead today.

Stephen Early, presidential secretary, said the request for funds for the Red Cross was a sequel to Mr. Roosevelt's declaration in a speech last night that the United States would extend its material resources to the Allies.

Food, clothing and medical supplies, he said, would be considered as material resources.

Roosevelt Stand Hailed By Allies

Assurances Said To Insure Victory Over Nazis

London, June 11.—(AP)—President Roosevelt's assurances of material aid from the United States insured an allied victory in the war against Germany, Clement R. Attlee told the House of Commons in a war report today.

"From across the Atlantic has come the answer of a great democracy," Attlee said.

"It was as though day had followed night when, only a few hours after the dictator of Italy had made his dastardly announcement before the startled ranks of the blackshirts, the president of the United States delivered to the youth of his country a message worthy of a great and free republic, sending the whole of America's sympathies to those nations who are giving their blood in combat against the forces of hate."

Attlee said Roosevelt had "vitality inspired the free peoples of Europe. His assurance that the material resources of his great nation would be placed at the disposal of the Allies makes it inevitable that however hard the road, the cause of civilization will in the end prevail."

The House resounded with cheers. Substituting for Prime Minister Churchill who was absent, Attlee told the House Britain had already seized 14 Italian ships and 10 others are in British ports, he said.

Hitler and Mussolini have united to destroy democracy, he said, but "democracy will answer the challenge."

Richard Duncan Wins In Airplane Contest

Richard Duncan, president of the Hub City Modelers, Greenville, took first-place honors in one of two events entered by four members of the local model airplane club who went to Raleigh Sunday, where they entered the model airplane rodeo at the Raleigh airport.

Duncan placed first in the scale model event. The other event in which the local aviation enthusiasts participated was the glider event. The contest lasted from 12 o'clock until 5 o'clock.

A gas model airplane made a seven-minute flight and went out of sight. Two Raleigh modelers treated the 50 attendants to a flight by an eight-foot gas model, which released 24 miniature parachutes while in flight.

Judge W. F. Harding Is Claimed By Death

Charlotte, June 11.—(AP)—Judge William F. Harding, dean of the western division of the North Carolina Superior Court bench, died in his hotel apartment here today after a long period of ill health. He was 72 years old.

For the last two years Judge Harding had been inactive in an official capacity because of his health. His death was unexpected, however, as yesterday he had appeared to be about as well as usual.

He had lived in Charlotte for about 40 years and had been a judge for 27 years. He was born in Aurora, N. C.

Survivors include his wife and one son.

Judge Harding was a brother of F. C. Harding of Greenville, dean of the Pitt county bar, and also of Mrs. H. T. Latham and Miss Bessie Harding of this city. The jurist was a member of the law firm of Harding and Harding before moving to Charlotte in 1903.

He also is survived by another brother, H. P. Harding, superintendent of the Charlotte city schools. Funeral services will be conducted at the Charlotte Methodist church tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock, with burial to follow in Charlotte. Among those from here to attend the services will be Mr. Harding, his daughter, Miss Mary Harding, Mrs. Latham and Miss Bessie Harding.

Paris Ablaze

New York, June 11.—(AP)—National Broadcasting company correspondents in Europe reported today that waves of German bombers were flying over Paris and that parts of the city itself were burning this morning.

Fred Rate, NBC correspondent in London, said that the French embassy there, still in communication with Paris, had confirmed reports that parts of the capital were aflame.

Damage in the suburbs is great, the NBC correspondent reported, and casualties also are believed to be heavy.

Many fires, he said, were caused by incendiary bombs. The report said roads leading away from Paris were thronged with refugees.

ITALY PLACED ON WAR BASIS

Not Certain Whether Troops Have Struck Yet

Rome, June 11.—Italy marshalled all her imperial resources for war today as authoritative sources said Fascist troops, naval and air forces "undoubtedly are engaging" the Allies.

New taxes—in some cases increases of 100 per cent—were levied by the cabinet in a one-hour session devoted to war legislation.

Rents, prices and salaries were fixed to suppress speculation. Punishments for crime were changed, including death for all offenses formerly punishable by life imprisonment.

To make Rome an open city, therefore not legally liable to air attacks—the military command and offices of ministries directing the armed forces left the capital for "somewhere else."

But there were no direct reports that Italy had struck a blow.

A spokesman denied reports that Italian troops had invaded France last night, but said he lacked information whether French territory had been entered since midnight.

The spokesman made no comment on President Roosevelt's speech last night, beyond calling attention to the fact that the Italian press had taken no position regarding it.

It might be concluded, therefore that it had created no particular impression in Italy, he said.

MOVE ADOPTED AGAINST ITALY

Washington Reaction To President's Denunciation of Italy Either Enthusiastic Or Apprehensive

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—Invoking the neutrality act against Italy, President Roosevelt held out to the embattled Allies today an unqualified pledge of material and moral support from the United States.

A series of presidential proclamations last night which named Italy as a belligerent, subject to "cash and carry" neutrality restrictions, provided the official postscript to a strongly worded pronouncement on foreign affairs by the chief executives.

The Italian government, Mr. Roosevelt said in a historic address at Charlottesville, Va., had rejected the opportunity for peaceful negotiations of its differences with France and England.

"The hand that held the dagger has stuck it in the back of its neighbor," he added sternly.

The reaction of official Washington was that President Roosevelt had, in effect, served notice on the world that the United States was shifting its role of neutrality to one of non-belligerency.

Members of Congress who heard the president were either enthusiastic in their approval or apprehensive that the speeches increased the danger of the nation being drawn into the war.

OPPOSE BOOST IN WEED LEVY

Solons From Tobacco-Growing States Put Up Protest

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—House members from the tobacco-growing states of Kentucky, North Carolina and Virginia opposed today a decision of the House Rules committee to restrict amendments to the \$1,004,000,000 tax bill.

Their opposition was predicated on their desire to eliminate a proposed increase in the levy on cigarettes.

Rep. Cooley (D-N.C.) declared that tobacco was a "sick industry" already heavily burdened with taxes and expressed opposition to an increase in the cigarette levy from \$3 to \$3.50 a thousand.

Rep. Flanagan (D-Va.) predicted that the cigarette tax would be reflected in lower prices to growers, while Rep. Chapman (D-Ky.) forecast that a heavier tax might result in lower cigarette consumption and consequently a diminishing revenue return to the government.

U.S. Liner Halted

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—The State Department announced today that the United States liner Washington with 1,029 passengers en route from Europe was stopped early this morning by an unidentified submarine which first ordered abandonment of the ship, but later allowed it to proceed.

The liner was on its way from Lisbon to Galway Island to pick up additional Americans.

The State Department said that upon the order to "leave ship" the passengers and crew, the liner numbering 578, were ordered to lifeboats and some of the boats were actually being lowered when the order came from the submarine to "please go on."

The Washington proceeded and soon afterward sighted a second submarine, but without any interference.

Italy's declaration of war against the Allies drew the world's attention to these four Mediterranean points involved in Italian aims: 1—British surrender of Gibraltar; 2—French surrender of Nice; 3—British surrender of the Suez canal and French surrender of Jibouti; 4—British surrender of the Suez canal and French surrender of Jibouti. Shortly after Premier Mussolini announced Italy's declaration of war, Italian troops invaded French territory along the Riviera in the general vicinity of Nice.

FORD IS READY MAKE PLANES

All Set For Swinging Into Mass Production

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—Edsel Ford said today after a conference with William S. Knudsen, member of the National Defense Commission, that his company was ready to swing into mass production of airplanes as soon as the government granted its contracts.

The Ford company president conferred for two and a half hours with Knudsen, production member of the commission.

He scheduled another meeting with Knudsen for the afternoon.

Ford told reporters that the army staff pursuit planes, the P-40, which engineers of his company examined yesterday, was found suitable for mass production "depending on what you mean for mass production."

He declined to estimate how many planes he believed his company might turn out, but Ford sources have indicated previously that they believe a production of 1,000 a day was feasible.

Meanwhile at Detroit Henry Ford said mass production of high-speed pursuit planes—at least 1,000 a day within six months—not only will be a simple task, but they can be rolled off his assembly lines without interruption to normal output of automobiles.

The 76-year-old Ford made this assertion after he and his engineers had thoroughly inspected yesterday the type of plane the United States War Department believed would be "most needed in an emergency," the Curtis P-40, a single-engine machine with a top speed of 367 miles an hour.

W. A. Ryan Speaks Before Lions Club

Rev. W. A. Ryan, pastor of the Eighth Street Christian church, addressing the Greenville Lions club last night declared "we have more to fear than the fifth column."

He said that we should not become hysterical over the European situation, adding that hysteria in this country was more to fear than the "fifth column."

Other Small Nations Fear Extension Of Conflict

Ankara, Turkey, June 11.—(AP)—Soviet Russia holds the key to Turkey's fulfillment of her mutual assistance treaty with Great Britain and France, it was acknowledged in informed quarters today.

The cabinet met throughout the afternoon and its stand was reported to depend on a response from Russia as to the Soviet attitude in case Turkey should join the Allies in fighting Italy in the Mediterranean.

The official newspaper declared that Turkey possesses "the might and capacity to accomplish the national task" and was ready to fight any power infringing her rights, but did not mention the pact with the Allies.

The other small nations of southeastern Europe clung precariously to their neutrality and expressed hope—not too strong—that they would be able to avoid war. Civilian populations tightened their belts in response to reinforced regulations designed to conserve food and supplies.

Greece anxiously watched for naval activities, fearing that because of her geographical position between Italy and Turkey, her peace might be threatened.

Princess Juliana Safe On This Side

Halifax, Nova Scotia, June 11.—(AP)—Juliana, crown princess of The Netherlands, came to the new world today with her two young daughters for refuge from Europe's war.

Announcement of the safe arrival of Juliana, heiress apparent to the throne of German-occupied Holland, by Dutch warships from England was announced by Canadian Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King.

With Princess Juliana were her daughters, Beatrix, 12, and Irene, nine-months-old.

Nazis Reach Point Along Marne River

British War Office Simultaneously Announces Vital Naval Base Of Malta In Mediterranean Subjected To Raid By Hostile Aircraft; Germans Aim At Slicing France

(By The Associated Press)

Hitler's armies stormed at the gates of Paris tonight, Berlin reported, reaching at one point the Marne river—historic battlefield where French soldiers stopped the Kaiser's rush in 1914.

Simultaneously the British war office announced that hostile aircraft raided Malta, Britain's vital naval base in the Mediterranean near Italy.

The Berlin report of Nazi armies smashing through the French Maginot line to the Marne did not say what point they had reached.

It was indicated, however, that the thrust knifed down through the Soissons-Rethel sector in the center of the French defense lines extending from the Maginot line to the English channel.

If so, it was possible that the German onslaught engulfed or passed Reims and penetrated to or beyond the old battlefields of Chateau Thierry, where General Pershing's American expeditionary force repulsed the Imperial German army in the World War.

Berlin also asserted Nazi legions had crossed the lower Seine—west of Paris—"at various places."

Amid these unconfirmed reports of sweeping German victories, the battle sources in Berlin also claimed the "destruction" of two entire French armies in the great battle of Paris—now apparently fast nearing a climax—and said that mechanized German columns were speeding southward to slice France in half.

"Destruction" of two entire French armies in the great battle of Paris was reported by informed sources in Berlin today who said Hitler's mechanized columns were speeding southward to slice France in half and meet Italian troops from the east.

Nazis estimated the two French armies comprised between 400,000 and 500,000 men.

The French high command reported that General Weygand's French armies had stemmed a Nazi "scythe" attack aimed at slicing the French capital from the rear while Italy still masked her plan of attack as a full military partner of Germany.

"On the Alps front our troops are in position and have not been attacked," said the French communiqué.

Berlin has estimated that 1,500,000 French troops are entrenched on France's southern front, awaiting Italy's expected onslaught.

At dawn the beleaguered French capital presented a weird appearance as smoke from fires set by German incendiary bombs darkened the city like a pall.

Much of the population of 3,000,000, including all but a shell of the government, had fled.

German tanks in bold isolated raids were reported to have sliced through the French lines to the in-

WHEAT QUOTAS ARE ALLOTTED

Tar Heel Farmers Being Advised Of 1941 Acreage

Raleigh, June 11.—North Carolina farmers are now receiving their 1941 wheat acreage allotments as established under the AAA program. E. Y. Floyd, AAA executive officer of N. C. State College, announced today.

In most cases, Floyd pointed out, the 1941 farm allotments are changed but little from the 1940 allotments, except on individual farms where special changes have been made in farming operations. For example, such changes take rotations in account.

The State College AAA executive officer explained that each farmer's allotment in his proportionate share of the 1941 national wheat allotment of 62,000,000 acres, the same as the 1940 national quota.

The fact that the new national allotment is the same as that for this year is an indication of the progress farmers of the United States have made in stabilizing wheat supplies under the AAA farm program, Floyd stated.

The reserve of wheat carried over from the 1940 crop and average yields on the 1941 allotment will assure enough wheat for all domestic needs and the foreign demand anticipated during the 1941-42 marketing year.

Wheat growers who cooperate in this program for marketing stabilization by planting within their allotments will qualify for such advantages of the farm program as conservation payments, parity pay-

ments, crop insurance, and wheat loans.

North Carolina's share of the 62,000,000-acre wheat allotment is 400,512 acres, Floyd pointed out.

So Don't Worry If You See a Cat! Sacramento, Calif. (AP)—The cat mundi, a predatory little animal that scientists have known was spreading out from its Mexican habitat, has now been definitely identified in California. The state division of fish and game described the newcomer as about the size of a raccoon and living on either fruit or flesh.

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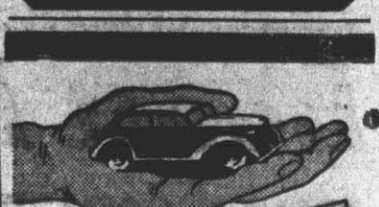

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MUCH CONCERN ON UNC RADIO

Bystanders Wonder Reason Behind All Wrath

Raleigh, June 11.—Innocent bystanders to the blow-off of some conservative trustees of the University of North Carolina are still wondering why they picked on the University's radio setup as their main way of lashing out at Dr. Ralph W. McDonald, associate Extension director, whom they accused of mixing his professional duties with his political activities.
Reason for the wongement is that the voice of Dr. McDonald has been heard over the Chapel radio program just exactly once in all the months it has been going on—and that in a very and exceedingly brief introduction of the Federal Communications Commission chairman on the occasion of the dedicatory exercises for the radio studio.
There have been all sorts of programs—musical, instructional, vocal, dramatic, pertaining to folk lore and even to types and forms of aesthetic dancing; but withal there has never been any program which could by the widest stretch of imagination be considered "political."

Yet it was at these perfectly innocent radio programs that most of the lightning bolts were hurled and Andy Monroe even introduced a resolution to investigate them. On the other hand, not a word appears to have been spoken out in meeting about the public forums which McDonald has been instrumental in sponsoring all over the state and at which, if ever, he exercised his political witchery.

There is ample authority for the statement, however, that President Frank Graham has failed to receive even one complaint showing that Dr. McDonald did at any meeting, anywhere or at any time, allow his politics to get into his University work.

There is also ample evidence that Dr. Graham has repeatedly asked complainants (whose complaints were always generalized) to give particulars such as time, place and nature of the McDonald political activities which were averred to have been engaged in to the neglect of the McDonald duties toward the University. There is no case on record in which the requested details were supplied.

In short, there seems to be considerable justifications for the statement of McDonald friends that the Doctor "has never allowed politics to interfere with his University duties, but on the other hand his University duties have often interfered with his politics."

It is perfectly obvious that the attacks on McDonald for his political activities and upon Dr. Graham for the asserted "radicalism" of the University, bogged down completely in the face of overwhelming support for both McDonald and Graham among the board of trustees.

So apparent was this sentiment that there is good reason to believe that a very active anti-McDonald man came away from the meeting without ever having taken from his pocket a resolution he had prepared for introduction—this resolution being, in effect, a "Little Hatch Act" which would have prohibited any University official, professor or instructor from holding any political office or engaging in any political activities or any sort, kind or description.

Man About Manhattan

Her appearance on Broadway as Beatrice in Mr. Irving Berlin's and Mr. Morrie Ryskind's pleasant fable of Louisiana politics must be marked up as something of a triumph for the judgment of a New York lawyer whose name is Martin Spector.

Mr. Spector, known as "Mike" to his friends, had known Miss Bruce's father for years. They were old friends. While talking one day the girl's father asked Spector if he knew of a good agent for his girl, who had been told that she possessed a likeable voice and who was desirous of trying for musical comedy.

From there Spector guided her up several additional rungs, turning down one bid by Paramount for \$350 a week. "She needs only one good show on Broadway, and we can add another cypher to her salary," he said.

Apparently she had it. She got a break by being practically the only new name in the cast. Victor Moore and Zorina and the others are stars, but there is nothing especially new to write about them. They gave expert performances, just as everyone knew they would, but that much has been said of them so frequently that it is no longer news.

Uncle Sam Gets The Big Money Metal From Europe As Nazi Fights 'Tyranny' Of System

Uncle Sam, like Midas, finds himself wallowing in gold.

Will he, like Midas, be flabbergasted when he finds he cannot eat gold?

This question has been propounded frequently of late, as the yellow metal has streamed from war-ridden Europe to America.

The United States treasury currently holds more than \$19,250,000,000 worth of it—some 70 per cent of the known monetary yellow metal stocks of the world.

In addition, the Federal Reserve Bank of New York has in its vaults huge stores of glittering bars, for the account of European central banks. The total as of May 31 was \$1,270,000,000, and a good chunk has been added since, perhaps \$500,000,000.

Brought By Convey?
The money gold held by Uncle Sam (these figures do not include gold in rings and watch cases and otherwise employed in industry and the arts) has almost trebled since the value of the dollar was fixed at 1-35 of an ounce of the stuff by the Gold Exchange Act, January 31, 1934.

The money metal, in the form of bars about the size of a small ear of

corn, worth \$12,000 each and neatly boxed, rolled in from overseas at the rate of about \$250,000,000 a month during the early months of the war, until May, when the total jumped to \$440,000,000. Early in June, between \$500,000,000 and \$600,000,000 arrived in New York from Canada in three days alone, supposedly brought across the Atlantic by convoy.

Most of the gold comes through the big banks, in their usual international transactions. They immediately sell it to the treasury at \$35 an ounce. The treasury issues certificates to the Federal Reserve bank in payment, and the commercial banks receive deposit credits for them. They are required to keep a certain volume of reserves with the Reserve Banks, but they now have reserves of more than \$6,500,000,000 in excess of requirements, principally due to the gold influx.

Bankers Still Trust In It
Nazis proclaim that they are fighting against, among other things, "the tyranny of gold." Soon after the Hitler government came into power in 1933, it shipped out all but a few million dollars worth of its money metal, in payment of debts, and proceeded thereafter to do business with the rest of the world on a barter basis.

It has not hesitated to use gold to make foreign payments, however, when it could get it. Holland and Belgium are believed to have shipped out most of their gold before they were invaded, and other countries threatened with invasion have rushed much of their yellow metal treasure to this continent.

A part of the Nazi philosophy as proclaimed by its spokesmen calls for a currency based on "labor," not "gold."

Most banking authorities in Washington and Wall street express confidence that gold will remain the chief international method of reckoning value, and that Uncle Sam will have no difficulty in putting his metal to work when the times comes. Some say that anything like free enterprise and trade in the world requires a ready exchange standard of value, and because of centuries of tradition, almost approaching instinct, gold will remain the principal measuring stick.

A good many money experts look to the day when a revival of trade on a broad peacetime basis will bring about a better distribution of the money metal through the world, asserting that it cannot effectively serve its traditional function with the great bulk of it piled up in one country.



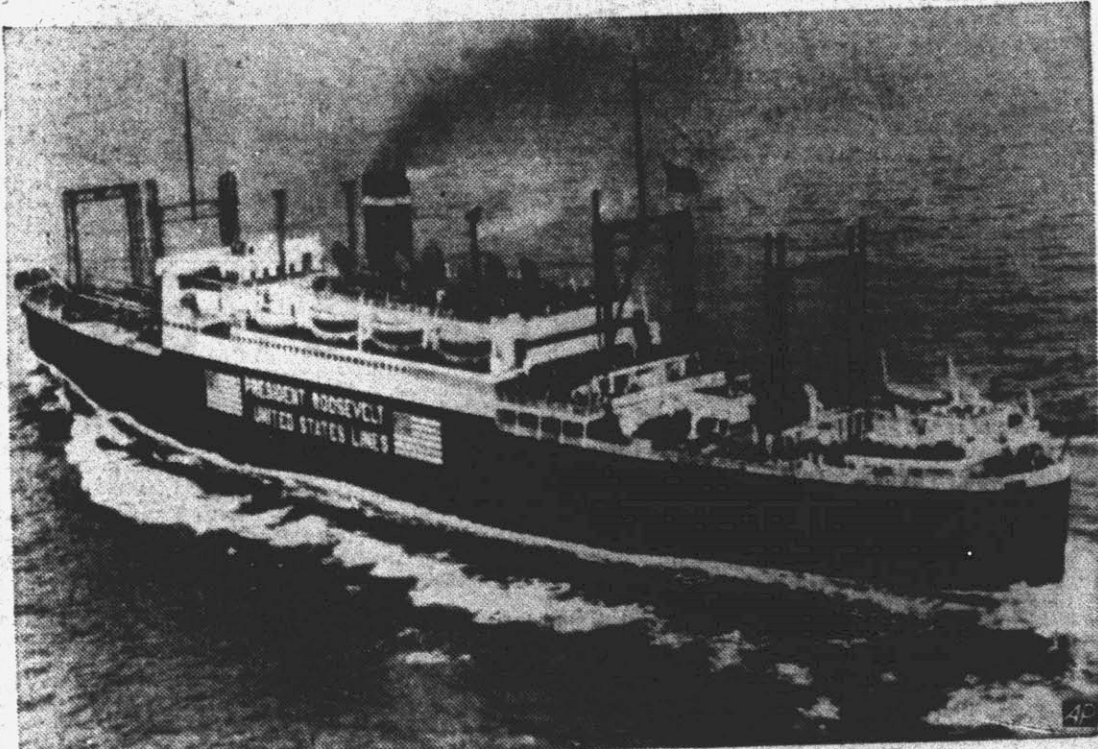

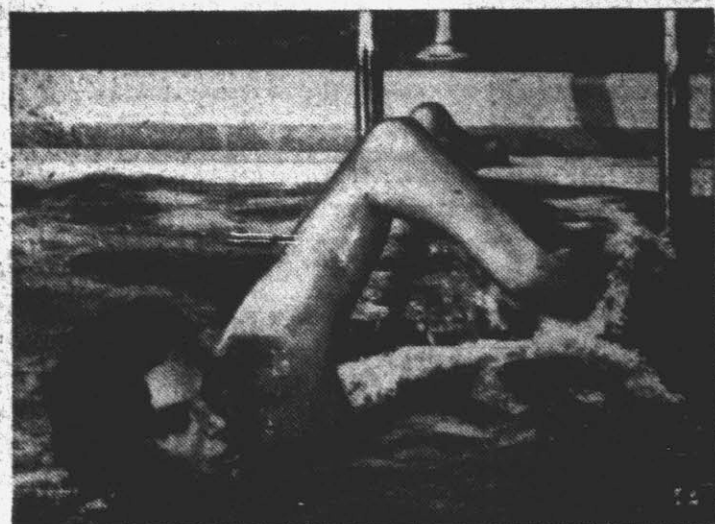

Get In The Swim



(Fourth In A Series)
Having mastered the dog paddle, start next with whatever stroke appeals to you most, such as the side-stroke or the crawl. In the side-stroke, lie on either side, though the right side is preferable for most people. The arm stroke is an alternate pull, with neither hand breaking water. The scissors kick is used, the legs drawn up and then kicked out in a scissors movement, with the kick made on the downward pull of the upper arm, as the under arm is reached forward.

I prefer the crawl, and advocate first learning to roll from side to side, so as to get the arm out of the water on the overarm stroke. Most beginners do not roll sufficiently and plow straight ahead without getting any traction with the arms

on the roll. If you turn the body, one arm is naturally partly out of the water.

It is good practice to hook up your toes on the edge of the pool and roll the upper torso and shoulders as you go through the arm stroke.

Safety Institute To Be Held Here

A Safety Institute, sponsored by the North Carolina Highway Safety Division in cooperation with the Center for Safety Education of New York University, will be held at East Carolina Teachers College tomorrow. The program will be featured by talks by officials and

specialists in the field. At 12 o'clock, at the assembly hour, in the Austin Auditorium, there will be talks before the entire school. The public is invited. During the day there will be talks and group discussions in various classrooms.

This is the third of a series of 12 safety institutes held at the summer schools throughout the state in groups of three periods. The first one was held at Elon College yesterday, and the second is being held in Wilson, at Atlantic Christian College, today.

Those participating are from the North Carolina Highway Safety staff and from New York City. Milton Kramer, instructor in Safety Education in New York University, is scheduled for the institute to be held here, and Kenneth N. Beadie, director of the Education Division

of the National Conservation Bureau of New York City, will assist in those to be held the last week of the series.

The leaders from the state staff are Ronald Houtt, director of the N. C. Safety Division, and two field representatives, Mrs. Bill P. Flythe and Dr. Walter Cutter.

Major problems will be presented and discussion will follow. "What is the Accident Problem?" will give important phases of the problem with detailed descriptions as it is in North Carolina. "What Is the State Doing About the Accident Problem?" will be answered by an outline of the program to combat street and highway accidents and will offer resources to teachers and others interested in various safety projects. "What the Schools Are Doing and Can Do About the Accident Problem" will give the entire school program, from grades through high school and college, and show how the program affects attitudes on the subject.

The Champ Has Daytime Insomnia; But Not From Worry Over Godoy

Greenwood Lake, N. Y.—Arturo Godoy's crouching South American away puzzled Joe Louis last February and the champion is boxing five days a week at his training camp here to solve that puzzle.

Never before has Joe's pre-flight conditioning program included so much boxing. Generally he has spent three, occasionally four days, in actual ring warfare. He actually boxed 11 of the first 14 days of drills at his new site.

Joe's punching wasn't sharp against Godoy and his uppercut, particularly, wasn't working. He figures he'll need that uppercut against Godoy like a golfer needs a niblick when his ball pops into the sand. Their 15-round heavyweight title battle is slated for June 20 in Yankee Stadium.

Despite his additional boxing it wasn't difficult to notice that he is being hit more often by sparring partners today than he was a year or two ago. He isn't being hurt; the punches are just landing, punches that he would have slipped or blocked in other days.

And another trend I noted is that Joe has cut down on his daylight snoozing—if that means anything, so far as his ring work is concerned. Coming up, and even after he was champion, Joe was plumb fond of shuteye. He'd catch a few winks at every possible interval in his drills. But he's changed. He sleeps soundly from 9 a. m. to 5 a. m., but he is finding things to occupy his sunlit hours.

I had an idea that Joe, disturbed by the cat-calls of the crowd and miffed by his own inability to do anything against Godoy in their last go, might have perhaps a little extra incentive this time. He might even have a mad on against Arturo, such as he did against Schmeling in their second tussle.

But Joe says no, he isn't sore at Arturo.

"I don't blame him for fighting thataway," Joe said. "I guess all he wanted to do was to go the route with me. And he done it. Heck, anybody can go the distance if they runs and puts their chin between their knees."

What if Godoy adopts the same crouching tactics again?

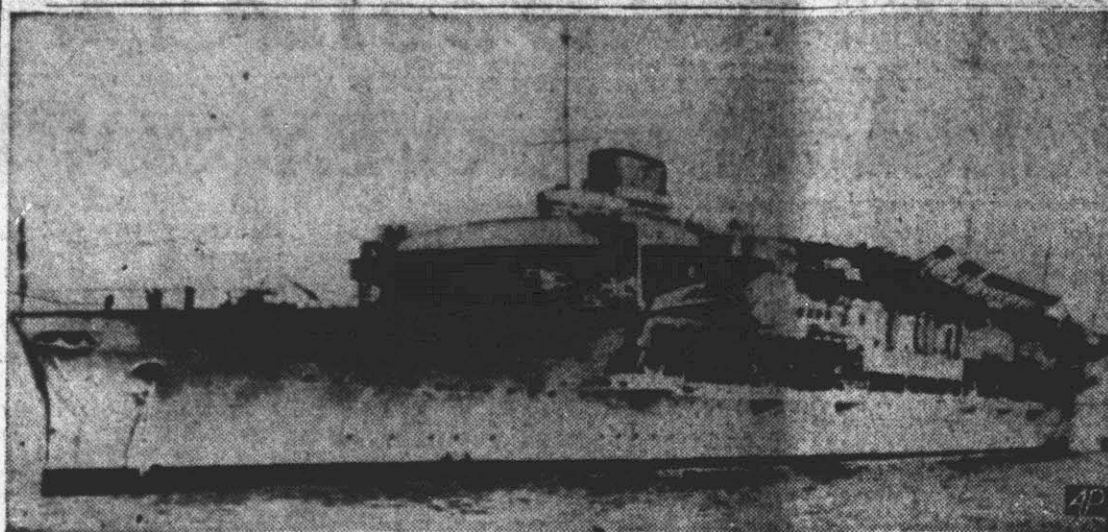

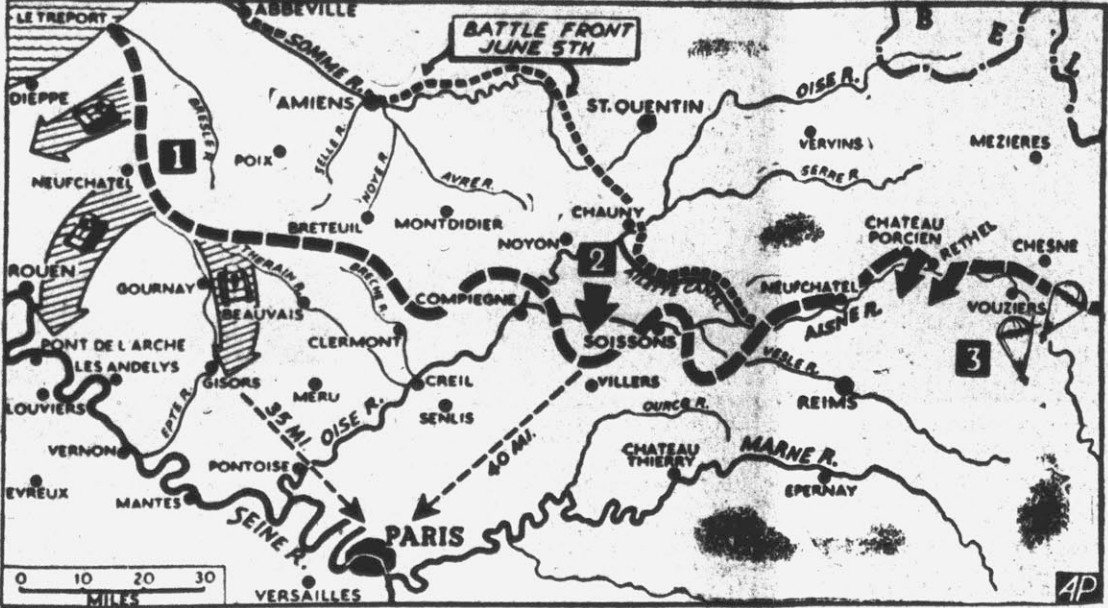

Wage-Hour Law Defended By Chieftain A. L. Fletcher

Raleigh, June 11.—The current drive for wage-hour law compliance in the lumber industry is "exploratory" rather than "punitive," not only in North Carolina, but in the whole nation, Major A. L. Fletcher, Federal Wage-Hour Administrator for North and South Carolina, said today.

"We want to find out how many are engaged in the lumber industry and how many of them are complying," he said. "We have never known this and until recently we did not have the necessary personnel to make a thorough checkup and find out."

He pointed out that the drive is not confined to Region 6 (North and South Carolina), but is nationwide in scope. This will prevent any unintentional favoritism for the benefit of those in the industry who do not comply with the wage-hour standards.

"Up to now we have tried to investigate such complaints as we received, but whenever we found a lumber concern not complying and forced it to come up to the standards set by the act we were quite unintentionally doing a favor to the competitor who was not complying but against whom we had had no specific complaint," he said.

"The first aim of the drive began Monday is the elimination of the factor of claimed ignorance as an excuse on the part of a violator. Every sawmill or lumber yard vis-

ited by our inspectors will be examined to determine whether it is now complying. Material explaining the law in the simplest language will be made available. Those desiring to come into compliance will be assisted in making the necessary computations. Those who refuse to do so will be proceeded against."

In North Carolina the drive began Monday morning when a force of 11 inspectors took the field in Elizabeth City. Five of them were from the Federal Wage-Hour law enforcement division, with Senior Inspector Fred J. Cox in charge. Six are from the State Department of Labor with Senior Inspector W. G. Watson in charge.

After completing inspection of all saw mills, lumber yards and other concerns connected with the lumber industry in Elizabeth City and Pasquotank county, the force of inspectors will move southward along the North Carolina coast, taking in all counties of the coastal section. The inspectors of the State Department of Labor will stop when the South Carolina line is reached, but the Federal Wage-Hour men will join forces and continue down through the Palmetto state.

Major Fletcher said that every county in North Carolina will be visited and its lumber industry concerns inspected just as fast as the inspectors are able to get from place to place. The same thing is being done in every state in the Union, so that there can be no complaining that any particular section is being "picked on."

To have proceeded against the industry in one part of the country before the division was ready to proceed in others could only have further increased the unfair competitive advantage enjoyed by the non-complying employers in these sections necessarily left out of such a program," Fletcher said.

Major Fletcher announced, incidentally, that a branch office of the Federal Wage-Hour Division was open yesterday in Columbia, S. C. in room 101 of the Federal Building.

WHEAT GROWN ON POOR LAND

Alamance Farmers Show Value of Improvements

Raleigh, June 11.—A piece of land that was so poor less than two years ago it's owner said he "couldn't raise a fuss on it" now is growing what is probably the best stand of wheat in Alamance county.

W. D. Lee, soil conservationist of the N. C. State College Extension Service, said H. J. King bought the acre and a quarter in 1930 to piece out a tract of land adjoining his farm. At the time, corn growing there was no larger than a person's thumb and blackberry briars were growing between the corn rows.

Up until 1938, King said he made a few improvements but the land was still so poor and run-down that it produced only seven and a half bushels of corn.

"This year," the Alamance farmer stated, "it was thoroughly digested and decided to quit cultivating that piece of land. However, on the recommendation of the Soil Conservation Service, I planted crimson clover that fall. It fertilized it heavily, and to my surprise, I got a good stand."

I turned the clover under in the spring of 1939, followed it with another crop of corn, and last fall I got almost 40 bushels as compared with the seven and a half I'd been getting," he continued.

King planted peas in the corn last summer. The peas made such a rank growth they had to be mowed and run over with a disc harrow before they could be turned under.

Wheat was planted on the land last winter after the corn crop was harvested. Now, King's neighbors, stopping by to observe the field, say they don't know of a better stand of the grain in the entire county.
