

GERMANS DRIVEN BACK

NEW TAXES FOR DEFENSE FUND ARE PROPOSED

Suggestions Include One Cent On Soft Drinks

GASOLINE LEVY FACING BOOST

Bailey Declares Proposed Increase In Cigaret Tax Would Be Offset By Relief Needs

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—Senate Finance committee members suggested today that miscellaneous taxes to raise more than \$240,000,000 a year—including a cent a bottle soft drink levy—be added to the \$1,004,000,000 defense revenue measure voted by the House.

The committee, continuing hearings on the tax legislation, received a proposal from Chairman Harrison (D-Miss.) that a sliding scale of amusement taxes might be imposed to raise an additional \$60,000,000 a year.

Democratic leader Barkley said that a tax of one cent a bottle on soft drinks would raise \$70,000,000 annually or more. He suggested, too, that \$112,000,000 additional could be provided by increasing the federal gasoline tax from one to two cents per gallon instead of to one and one-half cents as provided by the spending bill.

Barkley also urged that the present 30-cent gallonage tax on whiskey rectifiers should be increased.

Barkley and Senator Bailey, (D-N.C.) both said that the projected increase from \$3.00 to \$3.50 a thousand on cigarettes (six cents to seven cents a package) would injure tobacco farmers, Bailey declaring that the expected \$76,000,000 increase in annual revenue would be more than offset by additional relief requirements of tobacco growers.

Cities And Towns Seek Arms Plants

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—The War Department took steps today to prevent the quickened defense preparations from being overwhelmed by a flood of applications from cities and towns for aircraft and munition plants.

Armed with an order from Assistant Secretary Louis Johnson, Major General Charles M. Wesson, chief of ordinance, and other key officials refused to receive civic delegations. They were directed to devote their full energies to defense matters.

Johnson estimated that 450 applications for government-financed plants had been received by his staff from individuals or groups visiting the War Department in person and that about 700 had been forwarded by members of Congress. Across the street in the Federal Reserve Board building, where the new National Defense Commission has set up headquarters, about 2,000 visitors are being received daily. A large proportion are persons seeking to present the claims of their cities for the new plants.

Precaution

Shanghai, June 12.—(AP)—The Japanese-controlled "central Chinese government" at Nanking published a declaration tonight demanding that all troops, warships and other armed forces of the European belligerents, station in China be withdrawn. The Nanking regime, headed by Wang Ching-wei and acting under Japanese advice, said it was interested only in avoiding any "unlawful incidents" in China. It pointed out that Britain, France and Italy all have forces in China—in many cases stationed in the same localities. "In this critical period," it said, "the presence of belligerent troops is likely to result in conflict which may develop to serious proportions."

Berlin, June 13.—(AP)—Reinhardt, although unofficial sources, said tonight that the French, through United States Ambassador William C. Bullitt, have advised Germany that all troops have been removed from Paris. The report, which could not be checked in official quarters, said that the American ambassador in a message on behalf of the French government said only firemen and police were remaining in Paris. The Germans have emphasized that Paris might meet the fate of Warsaw or Rotterdam, both badly bombed if the French insisted on defending the city against the German forces now almost half encircling it.

ALIEN LAW ON STATUTE BOOK

Rose Cites Act Passed By 1927 General Assembly

J. H. Rose, commander of the North Carolina department of the American Legion, who is leading that organization's campaign against subversive elements in this state, today cited a North Carolina law requiring the registration of all aliens in North Carolina.

The law, chapter 185 of the 1927 statutes, follows: Whereas, the state of North Carolina desires to protect its citizenship against undesirable aliens entering this state in violation of the United States immigration laws; to enforce more successfully its criminal law; to maintain a complete record on vital statistics; and to cooperate with United States government in the enforcement of its immigration laws;

Now, therefore,

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. This act shall be known as the Alien Registration Act. Section 2. The word "alien" as used in this act shall be construed to mean any person more than sixteen years of age who is not a citizen of the United States. Section 3. Every alien residing within the state of North Carolina shall, within ninety days after the ratification of this act, register with the clerk of the Superior Court of the county in which such alien resides; and every alien entering the state of North Carolina after this act goes into effect shall, if remaining within the state for a longer period than ninety days, register with the clerk of the Superior Court of the county into which he or she has come to reside within such ninety days.

At the time of registering every alien shall give the following information:

1. Name.
2. Nationality.
3. Date of birth.

Idle-Hour Burned At Atlantic Beach

Idle-Hour recreation parlor at Atlantic Beach was destroyed by fire about 2:30 o'clock yesterday morning. The parlor contained 10 bowling alleys, five pool tables and other recreational features, as well as a soda fountain and equipment. It was the chief amusement center not only of Atlantic Beach, but also of the entire Morehead-Beaufort area. The establishment, owned and operated by Cooper Brothers of Morehead City, was constructed and equipped at a cost of more than \$20,000 during the winter following destruction of the center by a previous fire. The origin was unknown, but was discovered about 2:30 yesterday morning, 30 or 45 minutes after the parlor had closed for the night. Work on the part of Morehead City firemen and beach cottagers prevented the spread of flames to a row of cottages nearby.

GOP Presidential Aspirant Appears Confident

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—Wendell Willkie, 48-year old utilities executive, carried his campaign for the Republican presidential nomination into the industrial East today, expressing confidence that he has a good chance of winning.

Willkie, whose eleventh hour entrance into the Philadelphia convention he describes as a "topsy-it-just-grew" candidacy, threw down the gauntlet to the new deal on everything except its foreign policy in talking to reporters yesterday. He left last night for New York.

Before the June 24 convention he will speak in Boston, Hartford, Conn., Providence, R. I., and Brooklyn.

Claiming a minimum of 70 votes on the first ballot and more thereafter, the black-haired head of the Commonwealth and Southern Corporation said that his position in the presidential picture was one of "growing strength."

"There's some kind of major trend going on that I'm the head of," he said, "declaring that the American people are weary of business bailing."

ANY TRANSFER TO BE OPPOSED

Propose Resolution Upholding Monroe Doctrine

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—Legislation to reinforce by law this government's vehement opposition to any transfer of sovereignty over territory in the western hemisphere from one European power to another won quickly today a right-of-way to House consideration, while plans for an early adjournment of Congress were virtually abandoned.

The Rules committee cleared the territorial resolution for House consideration after Rep. Fish (R-N.Y.) asserted that he favored going to war if necessary "to uphold the Monroe Doctrine."

Fish predicted that the resolution could be brought up in the House Tuesday.

In the Senate formation of a bloc to oppose any direct governmental aid to the Allies such as transfer of old naval destroyers to Great Britain was reported under way.

Early adjournment prospects appeared to be giving way under the pressure of demands in various quarters for the law-makers should stay here ready to function for the period of the international crisis.

Both Speaker Bankhead and Majority Leader Rayburn of the House said Congress probably would be here after the June 22 date on which administration leaders had hoped to adjourn.

Rep. Celler (R-N.Y.) introduced a resolution to repeal the neutrality act. He called it a "shallow fiction." This country is not and can not be neutral, he said.

Three New Donations To Red Cross Drive

Additional contributions of \$5 today brought the local Red Cross war relief drive to \$105.

Miss Ruth Dudley contributed \$1, a similar contribution and another for three dollars were made by "friends."

Contributions continue to come in; although not to such an extent as had been hoped for. A more determined effort will be exerted, however, with the naming of officials of the campaign.

ITALIAN AIR FORCE ACTIVE

Rome, June 13.—(AP)—The Italian air force has raided Bizerte, French Mediterranean naval base in Tunisia, and Tunis, Mediterranean port in France proper, the Italian high command announced today in its second communique of the war.

ACTION COMES AS BOMBSHELL

Had Been Expected to Join With Allies; Egypt Pledges Communication Systems, Air And Naval Bases To Britain

Ankara, June 13.—(AP)—The Turkish government signed a new commercial agreement with Germany.

The accord came as a bombshell, especially since Turkish leaders had insisted Turkey would fulfill her mutual aid pacts with Britain and France and the controlled press had severely attacked Italy.

Diplomats flocked to the Foreign Ministry in an attempt to learn the significance of the move.

The accord, it was announced, provides for the exchange of certain products to the extent of 21,000,000 Turkish pounds (about \$14,200,000). It was the result of months of negotiations between the government and the German ambassador in Turkey.

Trade between Germany and Turkey had been at a standstill for months because of credit and other difficulties.

Informed circles said the agreement was of no political significance, but the first reaction in diplomatic circles was that it might indicate Turkey was not planning to enter the war immediately.

Istanbul, June 13.—(AP)—Turkey today reaffirmed her mutual assistance pact with Britain and France and disclaimed Mussolini's offer to respect her neutrality as worthless.

The government, however, awaited developments before making any definite move toward entering the war.

The officially-controlled Turkish press, which since Italy's entry into the war has been extremely cautious suddenly loosed a violent attack on Italy.

There were indications that these attacks were inspired and reflected the government's attitude.

Alexandria, Egypt, June 13.—(AP)—Egypt placed all her communication systems, air and naval bases and ports at the disposal of Great Britain today and pledged her ally the "greatest possible assistance" in the war against Italy.

Premier Ali Pasha declared the nation would fulfill all her obligations under the Anglo-Egyptian treaty of friendship, but intended to refrain from any offensive action against Italy although diplomatic relations had been severed.

Since the alliance is purely defensive, he continued, the country does not intend to send an expeditionary force with the British if Libya or other Italian colonies were invaded, but means to protect herself from attack.

Alexandria's natives watched the skies apprehensively today, suddenly conscious of enemy bombers after the first air raid warning of the war.

When raiders appeared last night and sirens wailed the people ran excitedly to their homes and air raid shelters, clearing the streets almost instantly. No bombs were dropped.

Eighty-three scouts returned yesterday from a week of service visitors at the New York World's Fair. They were divided into two troops and Alfred Hodges, the assistant executive, reported at the Greenville board meeting yesterday that the Greenville scouts won the applause of all who saw them in action.

PARIS DEFENSE LINE HOLDING UNDER STRAIN

Withstands New Nazi Reinforcements in Battle

FRENCH DECIDE TO SPARE PARIS

Soldiers To Retire South of Paris If Lines North of Capital Forced To Give Way

Paris, June 13.—(AP)—The defense line in the battle for France is holding, a military spokesman declared today—holding under the heavy strain of new German divisions which have been combined with the old to make a total of 120—about 1,800,000 men—striving to crush the French.

The spokesman said that while the French would continue the defense around Paris—where a five-mile gain by counter attacks was reported earlier—they would not defend the city itself.

Paris was declared an "open city" to spare it from the devastation of battle.

The French have no intention of fighting in Paris itself.

The French spokesman emphasized the heavy strain the French have been under from the Germans' superiority in numbers and equipment—a note which Premier Reynaud struck in an appeal to the United States for all help short of an expeditionary force.

The spokesman declared that the French would defend their lines in front of Paris and if forced back would defend them south of the capital.

"We do not want to battle in Paris itself," he said, explaining that the French forces would move back rather than risk destruction of the city. The Germans, he asserted, would be responsible for any destruction of the city.

The French acknowledged: 1.—Establishment of a German bridgehead on the south bank of the Marne near Chateau Thierry, about 45 miles east-northeast of Paris.

2.—A German drive apparently aimed at capture of LeHavre, strategic port about 110 miles northwest of Paris at the mouth of the Seine.

The Nazis there were said to be moving toward the coast via Caudebec, about 25 miles east of Le Havre.

3.—The loss of Reims. Today tanks and armored cars were reported to have crashed head-on into Reims, forcing the French to retire.

ALLIES TAKEN AT ST. VALERY

London Acknowledges Capture of 6,000 Soldiers

London, June 13.—(AP)—Military circles said today that about 6,000 British and French troops were captured by the Germans at St. Valery on the French coast, where high cliffs and a heavy fog prevented the re-embarkation of more than a "comparatively small number" of allied forces surrounded there.

The troops were running out of ammunition and food, these informants said. Troops that were re-embarked have been related in France and "fresh reinforcements are in line and fighting under French orders," they said.

Apparently the Germans have "engaged all their armed forces in the battle for Paris," it was added. About two brigades of the BEF divisions were surrounded at St. Valery, it was said, while two brigades returned with the French below the Somme.

South of the Seine fresh British troops recently arrived from the United Kingdom were said to have taken their place in the line with their French comrades.

The entire continent of Africa except for Abyssinia and the Spanish protectorates was involved in the first World war.

Hoey Says This State Will Fight For Peace

Speaks In New York At Battleship Launching

New York, June 13.—(AP)—North Carolina favors "a national defense program carried forward with characteristic American speed" and "we love peace so well that we are willing to fight to preserve it."

Governor Clyde R. Hoey said today at the launching of the new battleship North Carolina.

The state, Hoey said, is proud of the record made in past wars by her soldiers and seamen, and of the five North Carolinians who have served as secretaries of the navy since 1829.

"The whole state feels a real pride in this colossal battleship," said Hoey. "It commands our respect and it will help us to command the respect of the world. It speaks a language that even a dictator can understand. It represents another effort of our great nation to provide an adequate defense."

"North Carolina joins heartily in the demand that America be fully and completely prepared to meet any invading foe and to defend herself against the world if need be. We love peace so well that we are willing to fight to preserve it."

Communism and Nazism "cannot live in the American soil of North Carolina," the Tar Heel governor said. "Radical doctrine and subversive propaganda wither and die in our rarified democratic atmosphere. North Carolina is an old line American state, steeped in the high traditions of loyalty and dedicated to the lofty ideals of liberty, freedom and justice. We cling everlastingly to the guarantees of the constitution and we believe in the fundamental rights of a free people."

"We believe in national unity," he proclaimed. "Every disloyal element ought to be made to feel the heavy hand of the law. We shall not have a repetition in this country of the fifth column treachery and sabotage which has contributed to the downfall of Holland, Norway and Belgium and almost struck a death blow to France."

His state, Hoey said, "is willing to travel the pathway of sacrifice and self-denial in order to make secure our democratic institutions and preserve our cherished American ideals."

U. S. AIRCRAFT AIDING ALLIES

General Weygand's Soldiers Said To Have Driven Foes Back 5 Miles North Of Paris, With Near-est Nazi Soldiers 25 Miles From Capital; Paris Declared Open City

Supported made home front soldiers hurled the back five miles north Paris today, the French military spokesman said. Allied line was reported holding elsewhere under the onslaught of 120 Nazi divisions.

With the beleaguered French capital now declared an "open city"—technically inviolate against bombing and shelling—a French spokesman said the French have no intention of fighting in the streets of Paris itself.

Battle-weary French soldiers were holding stubbornly all along the 400-mile line, the spokesman said, despite the fact that many of them have not been relieved since Hitler launched his massive offensive from the Somme on June 5.

Simultaneously the German high command was reported preparing to broadcast a "surrender or be destroyed" ultimatum against the beautiful French capital.

In Berlin a Nazi spokesman said German troops were only eight miles from Paris.

The French, however, said the nearest German soldiers were now 25 miles from the French capital. And armies were attacking the defenders of Paris from three sides.

The German demand for capitulation, Berlin reported, would follow the procedure in the cases of Warsaw, capital of Poland, and Rotterdam, capital of Holland.

Warsaw, refusing to surrender, was bombed and shelled to ruins. Rotterdam capitulated in time to save much of the city.

Berlin asserted the fate of Paris would probably be decided "within the next hours."

The Nazi high command said operations along the entire front were "progressing rapidly" and that columns of the main German army of 2,000,000 men had captured Chalon-sur-Marne, about 25 miles south of the great French cathedral city of Reims.

The Germans asserted Reims had already fallen. The French denied it.

POTATO BLACKLEG IS TRACED TO SIXTY-TWO KINDS GERMS

Chatham, Va., (AP)—Blackleg, a dark discoloration of potato plants which causes the United States, an annual loss of \$5,000,000 or \$6,000,000 has been attributed to too much rain, too little rain, to the moon being full and to the moon being dark, says J. A. Pinckard of the Virginia Agricultural Experiment Station here.

But the real reason for this potato

disease is bacteria, or plain germs. But there are 62 varieties of bacteria, each of which can cause potato blackleg.

This summation of the blackleg host is the work of Reiner Bonde and its telling takes 20 pages of fine print in the agricultural journal, Phytopathology.

That's not all. The 62 varieties can cause other plant rot diseases, and some of them hide in corn worms and other unsuspected places, by which they sneak up on potato fields. But not one of Dr. Bonde's 62 varieties appears to be harmful to man's health.

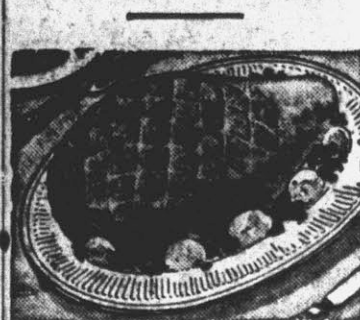

I can remember when cooking a whole ham was almost as much of an undertaking as a Byrd Expedition. First there was overnight soaking. Then came the scrubbing and a protracted period of parboiling. Next, the ham was baked, and ultimately eaten. But by this time Mother was usually prostrate from her labors.

GIN DAMAGES PROVE COSTLY

Loss Last Year in N. C. Set At \$100,000

Raleigh, June 13.—Gin damage cost North Carolina cotton farmers an estimated \$100,000 last year, J. C. Ferguson, cotton ginning specialist of N. C. State College, said today.

Approximately 13 per cent, or an average of one bale out of every seven, was damaged sufficiently in the ginning operation to reduce the value one or more grades.

To handle an average crop in an efficient manner, only about 400 modern ginning establishments would be necessary in North Carolina, the State College man pointed out. Yet last year, there were 818 active plants operating. Almost 200 of them were idle during the season.

Cost records reveal that a four-stand outfit must handle at least 1,500 bales a season to maintain equipment on a fairly modern basis, with little or no profit. Still the 818 active gins last year averaged only 564 bales each.

"This it can be understood," Ferguson said, "why so many ginning

establishments are operating with obsolete equipment. With more modern cleaning facilities and drivers, the average grade could be raised materially, which, in turn, would add thousands of dollars to the value of the North Carolina crop.

North Carolina has suffered heavier losses in the reduction of gins during the past six years than has any other cotton producing state. Even with the tremendous loss from 1,260 to 1,108 during this period, the volume per gin is smaller than in any of the other major lint states.

"Since there is evidence that further reductions in gin plants will be necessary," Ferguson said, "it seems reasonable that ginning resources may be able to save themselves in many cases from financial disaster."

WANT A BABY HIPPO TO CALL YOUR OWN?

London.—(AP)—Anyone is welcome to play foster-parent to a strapping young hippopotamus in the London zoo for the duration of the war—providing he pays about \$4.45 weekly for the animal's upkeep.

A sleek young giraffe can be adopted for \$2.23 weekly, or a porcupine for about 22 cents per week. Labels bearing the adopter's name are fixed to their cages. About 230 animals have been already adopted.

RED CROSS REPORTS NO BAD TREATMENT TO PRISONERS

Geneva, Switzerland (AP)—International Red Cross officials, just back from an inspection of prison camps in Great Britain, France and Germany, say they found no cases of ill treatment and no violations of any international law governing war prisoners.

Germany, according to neutral sources in Switzerland, could swap 10 French-British prisoners for every German held by the Allies and still have tens of thousands left. These sources estimate that Germany's total advantage in prisoners, including Belgians and Dutch, is close to 50 to 1. Germany still has approximately 250,000 Polish prisoners, many of whom have been put into labor battalions.

The International Red Cross prisoners' bureau, an all-Swiss organization which coordinates the work of national societies, so far has handled 587,000 letters from prisoners and their relatives and 220,000 other communications.

Thousands of prisoners were exchanged through the Red Cross during the last war, but so far only a few internal civilians have passed through Switzerland in this war.

Raleigh, June 13.—When June Rose, State Legion commander, began to preach a gospel of "Save food, this is going to be a hungry world" he was just catching up with an amiable chap down in Wilmington who boasts that his "cantankerous persistence" has resulted in the growing of hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of vegetables on what were once unsightly waste spots and city eye-sores.
This column is ordinarily devoted to a number of short topics, but for today it will be given over to passing out a bit of information on Carl Rehder of Wilmington and his hobby by which feeds thousands.
His idea has been a grand one in piping times of peace. It helped soften the blows of depression for thousands. It still is a boon to many. In time of war, he ought to be drafted to supervise and extend like activities into hundreds of other cities of the country.
For years Rehder, an advertising man by profession, used to divert himself by more or less piddling around with flowers and a few vegetables in his own back yard.

He told them he'd furnish seed and instruction, and give cash prizes if enough girls and boys would plant gardens.
They did, he did, and it turned out that so many of the children were enthusiastic that Rehder knew he really had something. He received calls from practically all the schools and his hobby spread into hundreds of back yards. The Clarendon contest became the outstanding event of every school year.

burden, but the local newspapers came to his aid. They give the prizes, though Rehder still has exclusive direction of the program. This year there were 428 school gardens entered.
When depression brought ERA and WPA and all sorts of alphabeti-cal relief, Rehder fell natural her to leadership in the "garden project" in New Hanover. And there, at least, the "no garden, no relief" rule (often completely ignored elsewhere) was enforced.
It worked well and when the Federal government dropped its require-ment and its garden projects, the city retained position of director of city gardens for Rehder and he kept right on.
Each year politicians have sniped at him. It has often seemed that his work was doomed because of failure of the governing board to him any financial support. But somehow or other, money or no mon-ey, politicians to the contrary, the gardens have been planted with Rehder as director.
The seed is given to WPA workers and other families of low income. Rehder gives advice and moral support. From one end of town to the other, from one end of the year to the other, he goes, promoting the garden idea wherever he finds a vacant back yard.
"Right now we are trying to get our gardeners interested in putting up stuff for the winter," says Rehder. "The way things are with the world now, I believe in prepar-edness for all emergencies."

MACHINE GUN SHOOT
ONLY SPOT OF LIGHT
BUT IT IS EFFECTIVE
Laramie, Wyo., (AP)—A machine gun which shoots beams of light in- stead of bullets is the new, econom- ical way they're turning out expert machine gun marksmen at the Uni- versity of Wyoming R.O.T.C.
Major Malcolm E. Craig of the teaching staff described the device

as a telescope with a small light be- hind it. When the trigger is pulled, the light strikes the target instead of a bullet.
Major Craig has built a sound box for amplifying the noise of machine gun fire to make practice realistic.
Two minutes of rapid fire in real shooting requires 1,000 rounds of 30 caliber cost \$31.45. The army allows only 610 rounds—a min- ute of rapid fire—to train a gunner. But Wyoming's recruits can fire the beam gun as much as they please, and there is no wear on the firing apparatus. The gun was developed by the major and other army offi- cers upon basic ideas advanced by Capt. Charles H. Coates, now of San Francisco. Its range is only 500 feet, but a smaller target is used to compensate for shortened range dis- tance.

Explains Advantages Of Swine Sanitation

The swine sanitation system will not only new dividends to the swine growers through cheaper feed cost but growers who now follow the swine sanitation system may have their hogs checked by the government inspector at Kingan's plant in Richmond, to determine if they are free from parasites, and if found to be free will receive 25 cents per hundred pounds premium on their hogs, County Agent R. R. Bennett explained today.

Sixteen Pitt County farmers shipped through their Pitt County Mutual Exchange 174 hogs, weighing 35,625 pounds, and brought \$1,792.02—\$14.89 premium as a result of 32 head of hogs that were grown under the sanitation system by F. C. Martin of Bethel.

For several years leading farmers, county agents and extension specialists of the State College Extension Service, have been working on the sanitation system and plans for a better price for hogs grown free from parasites.

Kingan & Company has recognized the value of the swine sanitation system and has agreed to pay a premium of 25 cents per hundred pounds for hogs grown under this system, and found free of parasites when sold in lots of 20 or more.
