Advices Farmer How Kill Grass Hoppers

The grass hopper may be controlled with a mixture of 50 pounds of wheat bran, two pounds of paris

green, six to eight finely chopped oranges or lemons, 1 gallon molasses (black strap), enough water to moisten thoroughly. Thoroughly mix the bran and paris green while dry. Add sufficient water to the molasses so that the molasses can be easily poured. Add the lemon and juice to the water and molasses. Then pour the molasses-water-juice mixture on the bran-paris green mixture. Mix well and add enough water to thoroughly moisten. Do not make a sloppy mixture.

FAVOR WOMAN FROM HALIFAX

Mrs. Josey in Democratic Vice-Chairman Picture

Raleigh, June 18.—She did not support the victor in this year's unique gubernatorial race, but Mrs. Anna Kitchin Josey, a very charming lady from Halifax county, is regarded as being very much in the picture when it comes to selection of a vice chairman for the Democratic executive committee.

Reports come drifting into this bureau that Mrs. Josey is decidedly persona grata to those Washington elements of the Democratic party in North Carolina, and while the official (Congressional) and unofficial (O. Max Gardner, et al.) Tar Heel delegation does not have the power to vote Mrs. Josey, or anybody else, into the vice chairmanship, the support of its elements is not to be taken lightly.

On the subject of the vice chairmanship, or any other party post for that matter, Governor-Nominee J. M. Broughton has kept very quiet, but it is being said in many quarters that Mrs. Josey would be far from obnoxious to him.

During the governor's race, the lady from Halifax worked ably and overtime for Lieutenant Governor Wilkins P. Horton and to her is given no small part of the credit for bringing the Pittsboro candidate into second place in the May 25 balloting.

The vice chairmanship vacancy comes about by reason of resignation of Mrs. W. B. Murphy who quit to become woman's manager for Allen J. Maxwell in the primary. Mrs. Murphy hasn't been counted altogether out of the running for the post she quit, but there are many indications favoring Mrs. Josey.

Hollywood

Sights And Sounds

Hollywood.—One rather merciful effect of the new film economy drive, from this point of view of the customers, may be a general shortening of the time taken to absorb what has passed for entertainment.

All the major plants, confronted with market losses, talk once again of restricting or eliminating their "B" product, concentrating on the "A" or intendedly superior pictures. The so-called "evil" of double features is under scrutiny, and there are other evidences that producers, in these dark days, wish to get back to fundamentals.

In the getting, they might well recall the screen's beginnings, when nickelodeons amassed profits by rapid audience turn-overs, and seeing a movie show was a diversion rather than a miniature career or protracted "sit-krieg." The piling on of so-called "production values" reached a peak in the big "Wind," a peak justified by the public interest that has made it so phenomenally successful. However, the "Winds" are few and far between, and rare is the story that requires or does not suffer from excessive running time.

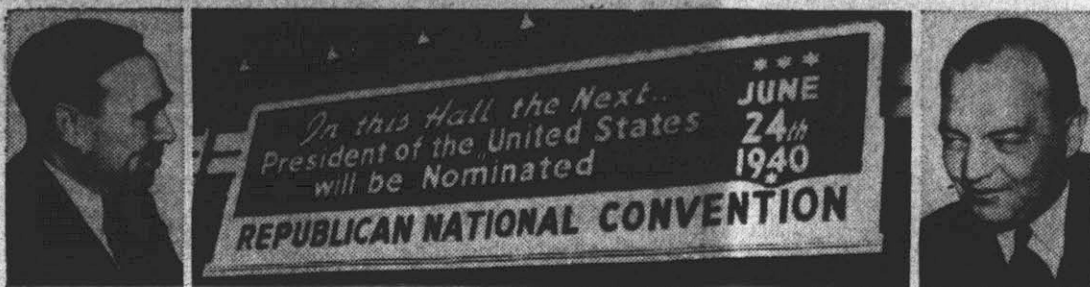
The added expense entailed by most "production value" stuff may be a sharp enough reminder to movie-makers of that excellent, neglected slogan, "Let's get on with the story." When you consider that such a satisfying comedy as "My Favorite Wife" unreeled itself in one hour and 28 minutes, you find even less excuse for the wearisome dragging out of less potent theses. And a look at Paramount's two current box-office leaders, "Buck Benny Rides Again" (one hour and 24 minutes) and "Typhoon" (one hour and eight minutes), ought to convince the doubters of brevity's virtues. Both are "A" pictures, both are keyed to the boxoffice. "Typhoon" at least has little to commend it from a strictly critical outlook. "Buck Benny" draws kindly critical acceptance and yet, even here, part of its box-office power can be attributed to quicker audience turn-over. A pleasing short picture that sends audiences out happy, to tell waiting audiences about it, obviously is a better bet than one which by sheer length puts them in a coma, sore of heart and sitting equipment—if for no other reason than that it clears the theater for new customers. The customers will wait for a good long one, but Hollywood has made enough bring-your-lunch bores to explode further entertainment-lacking "production" splurges.

When Hollywood gets on with its story, the public can get on home and to bed at a reasonable hour and be refreshed to come back for more.

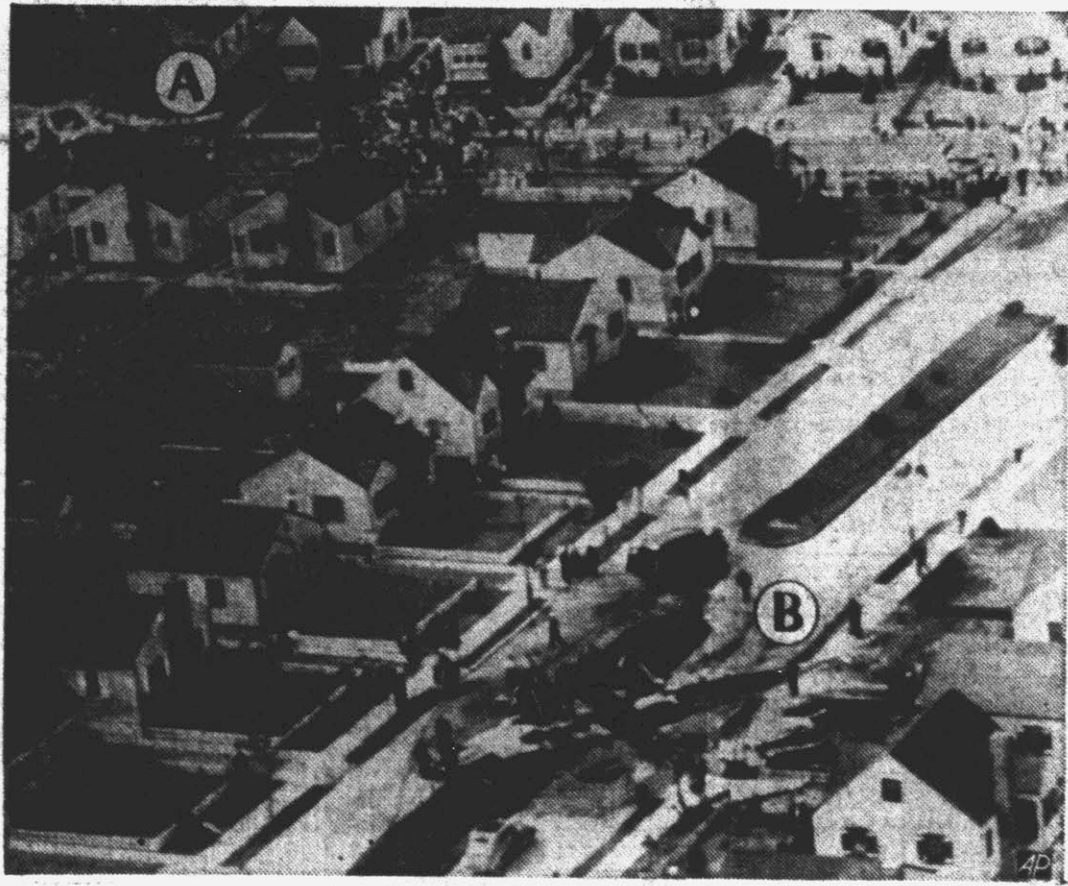

Violent Deaths In N. C. On Increase This Year

Raleigh, June 18.—North Carolina has not been in the zone of hostilities, but the state's "casualty list" of violent deaths has shown a sharp increase for the first five months of 1940, a study of vital statistics indicates.

This list stood at 829 through the last day of May, while during the corresponding five months period of 1939 there were only 773 deaths from suicide, homicide and preventable accidents—the categories which have been lumped together under the heading of violent deaths.

Of the nine specific causes, only one has shown a decrease this year. Deaths from railroad accidents dropped off from 36 in the first five months of 1939 to 23 through May 31.

The others (suicide, homicide, au-

tomobile accidents, auto-train collisions, air accidents, conflagration or accidental burns, drowning and accidental shootings) all showed increases ranging from one in the case of auto-train crashes to 26 in the case of suicides.

Nobody could give any positive information on the subject, but there is a general belief that the increase of nearly 23 per cent in suicide cases (self destructions jumped from 115 to 141) resulted from worry over the European war and its possible effects on people in this state. At least one case here in Raleigh has been assigned directly and positively to that sort of worry. A veteran of the 1917-18 battles in France, killed himself here after listening intently for many hours at a stretch to broadcasts about the German blitzkrieg in the low countries and France.

The board of health figures on automobile accident deaths run counter to reports from the State Highway Safety division, showing an increase for the first five months of this year while the Safety division statistics show a big decrease. Difference between them is due to the fact that in both January and February the health board carried deaths which were due to 1939 accidents, while the safety division referred them back to the months in which the crashes occurred.

In this class, the health board showed 303 deaths so far this year against 291 last.

On a percentage basis, the increase in deaths from air transportation accidents led every other sort. Air deaths actually tripled, but even so amounted to only .54 of a dozen, of slightly more than one a month. Through May 31, 1939 there had been but two deaths from plane crashes.

New Orleans — "He's so wild he can hardly hit the backstop, but there's a pitcher who some day will pitch and win a World Series game."

The speaker, at the 1924 St. Louis Cardinal spring training camp, was Branch Rickey. He was talking about a rookie pitcher whose wildness had the hitters jittery about stepping up to the plate, had them grumbling about such a hurler getting a big league trial.

Six years later that same pitcher shut out the Philadelphia Athletics in a World Series contest. His name was Wild Bill Hallahan.

Wild Matthews, canny ivory hunter for the Cardinals tells that story

as an illustration of his point that baseball scouting is a complicated occupation.

Takes Real Judgement.
"You can't judge 'em," says Matthews, "solely on record or appearance."

"I don't know what Rickey saw unless it was just a big, close jointed boy with a free delivery. He must have known that Hallahan's faults were faults that could be corrected. It just goes to show you that the best major league prospects aren't necessarily leading the Class A leagues—they may be way down in a Class D loop."

Rogers Hornsby, who batted .256 for Denison, Tex., and then set all kinds of records in the majors, is another favorite example used by Matthews. On the other side of the ledger, Wild points to the scores of sensational minor leaguers who turn out to be No. 1 floppers when they move upstairs.

What do scouts look at then, if not at the records?

Just this, says Matthews: "The prospect must have the right temperament, intelligence and physical makeup. He must be a clean liver—dissipators don't help a club any."

Man About Manhattan

New York—If the peculiar talents of Dr. Henry Lee Smith, Jr., who joins the faculty of Brown University this fall, were solicited by the police they no doubt would be of inestimable value in the detection of crime.

Dr. Smith, however, employs these talents for pleasure and for profit. His specialty concerns the fundamentals of public speaking, and his special gift is this:

He can "place" you by listening to you read a few simple lines. By "placing" you he can tell you whether you come from Brooklyn or Des Moines, San Francisco or Dallas. People who live within 25 miles of each other may employ an entirely different style of speech. His ear is so practiced in these "dialects" that he can easily "place" you at-

ter only a few moments of conversation.

The Dr. says the principal classifications of American speech are: New England, which divides into coastal and interior; South, which divides into tidewater, or general plantation, or southern hill; and Midwestern, which includes the phonetic bulk of American speech. The Bronx and Brooklyn are only a few miles apart, yet there is a vast difference in the pronunciation of words. Dr. Smith says people in the Bronx use more dentalization—that is, placing the tongue against the teeth.

So widely has his fame spread that this 36-year-old native of Baltimore, Md., now conducts a weekly broadcast over a wide network. Guests who are total strangers to him are invited to read a few simple lines. After listening to them, he analyzes their speech and tells what section of the country they are from. On a recent evening he correctly placed a woman who had lived in New Orleans, and two people who had been childhood friends but who hadn't seen each other for years. They were from cities in the West just 60 miles apart.

To outward appearances the war hasn't had much effect on the New York theater—there is, in fact, only one war play on Broadway. But underneath, in the unseen records of the box-office and in the piled up scenery in the warehouses, the effect has been tremendous. It boils down to this: the public is puzzled and troubled. It has neither the

Somewhere—way back in a foolish little drawer—they keep foolish little mementoes: like a worn pair of baby shoes, a frilled baby bonnet, a piece of paper with "mama" scrawled on it.

But the babies are grown, responsible men now. So responsible that groups of voters are backing each one for the presidency.

It must be a solemn moment for a white-haired woman when she visualizes her son burdened with the cares of the nation. This Mother's Day there were six such women. But none has made any comment on her son's soaring fortunes.

America's "First Mother" Most famous, of course, is Mrs. Sara Delano Roosevelt. She's 84 now. An active, curious, gregarious 84 that packed up, quite unexcitedly, and left Europe just ten days before war broke out.

She was born wealthy. Married wealth. Lived in secluded comfort until her son, Franklin, started his campaign for the presidency. It took her some time to become accustomed to the hubbub.

A few weeks before inauguration, she sailed into her Hyde Park drawing room to find several strangers sitting there. She said to a servant, "Who are these people?"

They were three cabinet-members-to-be!

She has said one thing about the possibility of a third term. It

Find Bud Worms Damages Tobacco

Bud worms are doing considerable damage to tobacco in the fields at the present time, a survey by the county agent discloses.

They may be controlled by the use of the corn meal poison bait made up according to the following formula: One pound of arsenate of lead mixed with 50 pounds of corn meal.

Applications, which should be made only in the morning when the tobacco buds are open, are made every week until the tobacco is topped. One peck or 12 pounds of the poison bait is sufficient for one application per acre. A small pinch of the bait is dropped in the bud of each plant.

For more detailed information or a copy of the bulletin giving control for the more important tobacco insects, farmers are urged to see the county agent.

Control Of Tobacco Horn Worm Possible

The tobacco horn worm may be controlled by dusting with four to five pounds of arsenate of lead per acre.

Or if flea beetles are present, the horn worms and flea beetles may be killed at the same time by dusting with a mixture of one pound of paris green to five pounds of arsenate of lead, using three pounds of the dust per acre on small tobacco and four to six pounds of the dust per acre on tobacco that is half grown or larger.

The dust should be applied when the plants are dry and in such a way as to get a maximum amount of dust on the bottom side of the tobacco leaf.

The dust has shown to be more effective than the spray. However, if a farmer prefers the spray and has spray equipment rather than a dust machine, he may use two pounds of arsenate of lead to 50 gallons of water for worms or for horn worms and flea beetles. 1 1/2 to 2 pounds of the 6 in 6 paris green and arsenate of lead mixture to each 50 gallons of water.

WAGING DRIVE IN THIS AREA

Wage-Hour Officials Checking Lumber Industry

Inspectors of the wage and hour division engaged in an information and inspection campaign for compliance of the Fair Labor Standards Act started work in Pitt and surrounding counties this week, with bases in Windsor, Roanoke Rapids and Washington.

This campaign in Region VI (North Carolina and South Carolina) started June 10, the same time similar drives were started in all sections of the United States in which the industry is centered. The first base for Region VI was in Elizabeth City. Similar bases were established under direction of regional directors in Georgia, Alabama, Arkansas, Michigan, Minnesota, the New England states, and the Seattle area of Washington.

Regional Director A. L. Fletcher sent the inspectors out under supervision of Senior Inspector Fred J. Cox, Jr., with instructions to make inspections of all lumber concentration plants, sawmills and logging operations. The inspectors were to leave information on the provisions of the Act in simple language so that "ignorance may no longer be pleaded as an excuse for violation of the law."

The wage and hour inspectors are working in cooperation with inspectors of the North Carolina Department of Labor headed by Senior Inspector W. G. Watson.

The two groups worked together in Elizabeth City to carry out inspections of plants in six counties of that area. Leaving there Saturday, the state inspectors went to Roanoke Rapids to establish a base for inspections in Hertford, Northampton, Halifax and Warren counties. Monday the wage and hour inspectors established a base in Windsor and later in the week transferred to Washington for inspections in Dare, Tyrrell, Hyde, Beaufort, Washington, Martin, Pitt and Bertie counties.

No report has yet been made on the degree of compliance in Martin and surrounding counties, but report forwarded by Mr. Cox to Regional Director Fletcher at his Charlotte headquarters indicated an unusually high degree of compliance, and preliminary reports indicate that a similar condition exists in this section.

In the Elizabeth City area several plants, including at least one of the largest in the South indicated that compliance could be made of back wages due and that restitution will be made. Restitution payment for one plant was expected late this week.

Every operator contacted assured the inspectors that they would come into full compliance of the law in the future. A later and more thorough inspection is to be made later to determine if the desired results are being accomplished in this information and inspection campaign.

The inspectors are particularly insisting that all operators keep records as required by the Act.

The Act prescribes a minimum wage of 30 cents an hour for all covered employees and at least one and one-half time at the regular rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 42 in any work week.

The campaign in Region Six will be carried into every part of North Carolina before wage and hour inspectors go into South Carolina and work to the Georgia state line.
