RUMANIA SUBMITS TO SOVIET DEMAND

Berlin Press Demands Retaliation For British Raids

ANGRY CHORUS IS RESOUNDED

Newspapers, Radio And Authorized Spokesmen Call For Punishment "A Thousand Fold" For Reported Nightly Raids On Undeclared Non-Military Objectives By British Planes

Berlin, June 27.—(AP)—Demands that England be punished "a thousand fold" for nightly air raids on Germany swelled to an angry chorus in Berlin newspapers today.

Press, radio and authorized spokesmen charged the British with "bombing aimlessly" killing civilians and damaging non-military objects. Caustic comment on British war leadership increased in volume.

The press asserted British raiders sought out communities which lacked defenses because they are not military objectives.

In one night, the newspapers said 371 bombs fell on German soil, killing 16 civilians and wounding 41. DNB, official German news agency, also reported 200 bombs fell in Heider, German-held Dutch navy base, the night of June 24. Giving a Dutch newspaper as its authority, DNB said most of the bombs dropped on non-military objectives and that there were 36 dead and 22 wounded civilians.

The German shortwave news commentator declared last night England is making "well camouflaged attempts to get in touch with the axis powers," presumably for peace negotiations.

German quarters reported a number of British boats attempting to approach the German-held French coast in a "ridiculous undertaking" had been driven off.

Huge Relief Bill Is Signed By FDR

Washington, June 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt signed into law today a \$1,157,711,357 bill to finance relief for at least eight months beginning July 1.

The measure provided a basic \$975,000,000 fund for the full 12 months of the fiscal year, but contained a provision which would permit the president and the WPA to use it over an eight months period if they believed it necessary.

Congress earmarked \$25,000,000 of the total for national defense projects. The bill contained new restrictions against aliens on relief rolls and retains the recent provision that at the end of 18 months persons on relief must be dropped from the rolls.

It also contained a \$50,000,000 fund to aid European war refugees and provided for machinery by which CCC enrollees may be trained in such non-combatant work as cooking, engineering and communications.

Contribution of \$5.00 Boosts Fund To \$826

Only one donation to the Pitt County Red Cross War Relief fund was reported today, this one coming from A. D. Frank.

The contribution, for \$5, increased the amount raised in the campaign to date in this county to \$826.17, the previously reported figure having been \$821.17.

Officials meanwhile urged citizens to continue contributing to the fund in as much as the need is being realized to a greater extent daily.

Watch Rumania

Budapest, June 27.—(AP)—Hungary and Bulgaria, both with territorial claims on Rumania, kept close watch today on the outcome of Soviet Russia's demands on King Carol's country.

Rumania's reported submission to Russian demands will, it is believed in foreign quarters, of Budapest and Sofia, be certain to force Bulgaria and Hungary to look after their own interests.

There was no sign of extraordinary military activity, but foreign observers pointed out that both Hungary and Bulgaria have strong forces on their borders with Rumania.

DEFENSE BILL BECOMES LAW

President Puts Signature To \$1,479,777,147 Act

Washington, June 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt put his signature today to a supplemental defense bill giving the war and navy departments \$1,479,777,147 in cash appropriations and authority to make additional contracts totalling \$289,136,761.

The total thus provided—\$1,768,913,908—was about equally divided between the two departments and was in addition to regular appropriations of \$2,800,000,000 voted by Congress for the army and navy in the coming fiscal year.

The navy's share of the supplemental fund was earmarked thus: Beginning of construction of 22 new warships and faster construction on more than 100 more, alterations to existing vessels, production of 400 new anti-aircraft guns, emergency stocks of critical and reserve materials, housing and ammunition storage facilities, aviation and ship-building facilities and re-commissioning of laid-up ships.

The army is empowered by the bill to:

Build thousands of new planes, purchase new equipment, construct anti-aircraft batteries, buy land and expand seacoast defenses.

Also provided was a \$32,000,000 fund to permit the Civil Aeronautics Authority to train an estimated 46,000 persons in primary piloting courses and part of that number in secondary instruction.

Pitt Jail Population Is Far Below Average

The county jail population is unusually low for this time of the year, only 10 inmates being held pending trial in Superior court. The next term of criminal court is set for August.

Of the 10, five are white men and five Negroes.

Six persons, three Negro men and three Negro women, are serving sentences in the jail.

At this time last year there were 25 or 30 persons being held in the local jail and Jailer W. G. Leggett said the average now was at least five or ten below the usual number.

AERIAL RAIDS ARE REPORTED

Britons Dig In For Siege; Americans Warned To Leave Island; Royal Air Force Carries Out Raids In Italian East Africa

London, June 27.—(AP)—The people of this island kingdom dug in today for siege, cheered by indications that strong units of the French fleet would fight on at the side of Britain's navy.

German bombing planes made their sixth extensive early morning raid in nine days, marking the first attack on a Welsh town. Five bombs were dropped on that unidentified community.

British aviation circles meanwhile reported new and "very heavy attacks" on various military objectives in Germany's Ruhr valley in a day-light raid yesterday.

Other developments in preparation for the war on two continents included:

1—Advice from United States Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy that all Americans "who do not have any urgent reasons for remaining here longer" sail home on the United States liner Washington from Galway, Ireland, July 4. He said it was "very likely to be the last American vessel to come over until after the war."

2—Official British acknowledgment that a "strong detachment of Italian troops and tanks had occupied a British frontier outpost on the Ethiopian-British Somaliland border after the small garrison withdrew under attack."

3—Royal Air Force raids on Gura airdrome in Italian East Africa, on gasoline dumps at Matassa and on "military targets" at Assam, Italian Eritrea.

4—Five Italian air raids on targets in the Mediterranean base of Malta in a 24-hour period ending at 6:00 p. m. yesterday in which 12 civilians were killed and several wounded.

Important segment of the naval power that once was France's were reported to have refused to surrender for internment under terms of the French armistice with Germany and Italy.

Rome, June 27.—(AP)—Italian troops may join German forces in an attack on the British Isles, an authoritative source said today.

He said Italian planes and warships also are believed likely to take part in the operation.

Army May Oppose Further Increase

Washington, June 27.—(AP)—The prospect of a Congressional drive for a regular army of 750,000, or 1,000,000 men placed the War Department today in the unusual position of counseling a temporary halt in further expansion of the fighting forces.

Authoritative sources forecast there would be army opposition to any plan that would increase the number of troops beyond a maximum of 500,000. Even this would raise difficulties which some officers prefer to postpone.

The 400,000-man army recently approved by the House embodies the general staff's idea of the size of land and air corps forces which can be fully organized, trained and equipped in the next few months without jeopardizing readiness to cope with an emergency.

Despite the army's view, proposals for further immediate increases toward a million men have been advanced in both the Senate and House and are expected to be presented when Congress reconvenes next week.

GOP PREPARES TO BALLOT ON PARTY LEADER

Ten Candidates Officially Placed In Nomination

"STOP WILLKIE" BLOC INCREASES

Hoover Believed To Be Anxious To Measure Own Strength Before Making Commitment

Convention Hall, Philadelphia, June 27.—(AP)—Word that Herbert Hoover wanted to measure his own strength before making any commitments on the Republican presidential nomination circulated today among national convention delegates eager to start balloting on a 1940 party leader.

With 10 candidates placed in nomination for the presidency, the convention recessed at 1:45 p. m. EST, until later in the afternoon when it will start balloting.

Only that balloting can determine the strength of the former president, whose name was not formally placed before the convention, and disclose how far Wendell Willkie has pierced the delegate defenses of Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg, and Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

Hoover, himself busy with conferences at his hotel, did not amplify his previous statement that he was not "seeking" public office again. But some party leaders brought from him the impression that he not only wanted to stop Willkie, but also would accept the nomination himself if the opportunity arose.

The first few ballots were expected to tell whether other candidates with the apparent support of Hoover had been able to nail down their delegations tightly enough to withstand the push of the hard-hitting Willkie.

Candidates whose names have been presented to the convention follow: Taft, Dewey, Willkie, Vandenberg, Sen. H. Styles Bridges, of New Hampshire, Sen. Charles McNary of Oregon, Governor Arthur H. James of Pennsylvania, Hanford MacNider of Iowa, Frank Gannett of Rochester, N. Y., and Governor Harlan J. Bushfield of South Dakota.

Hitler Reported Backing Hungary

Budapest, June 27.—(AP)—Premier Count Pal Teleki has received a letter from Adolf Hitler saying Hungary's territorial claims "will be met," it was reported reliably today.

Both Hungary and Bulgaria have claims against Rumania.

The contents of the reported Hitler letter were made known as an extensive realignment in the Balkans seemed underway.

Hitler was said to have written in reply to a letter from Teleki expressing pleasure over the German victory in France and to have said he was gratified by Hungary's attitude on the war and indicated she would be rewarded.

This authoritative disclosure, coming simultaneously with the Russian-Rumanian crisis, added to the belief that Hungary might persist her claims to Rumania immediately if Russia gets her demands without fighting.

Recruiting Station Head Is Transferred

Sergeant Stonewall Jackson, who has had charge of the local army recruiting station since its establishment about a year ago, left for his new post today at Fort Bragg, where he will be with the air corps.

Sergeant Jackson, before leaving, expressed his appreciation for the cooperation he had received while located here.

He is being succeeded by Staff Sergeant McMullan, who has just arrived from Hawaii, where he had spent the past 12 years.

Tobacco Crop Reported To Be Making Progress

Monthly Report Issued By Local Sales Supervisor

The latest report on the condition of tobacco crops within a 50-mile radius of Greenville, issued monthly by R. C. Rankin, sales supervisor of the Greenville market, stated today that tobacco had made satisfactory progress and that farmers are pleased with its present condition and the outlook for a good crop.

The report follows:

"East Carolina is experiencing a slightly dry June, or it might be said that kind of a dry June which is indicative of a good crop. For the past two weeks seasons have consisted mainly of local showers or rains, but during the interval between these seasons growers have kept their crops worked clean, and as a result, the ground was receptive and tobacco received full benefit from all rainfall. With hot weather and good seasons prevailing, tobacco has made satisfactory progress, and growers are pleased with its present condition and the present outlook for a good crop."

"There are complaints, local and general. The crop as a whole is somewhat spotted and it is broken and more or less irregular. There are general complaints of damage from bud worms and horn worms. These are more destructive than usual, and growers are busy using poisons and other preventives in an effort to curb further damage. Complaints because of dry weather come from Bear Grass township in Martin, Carrs township in Greene, Newport township in Cartaret, and several townships in Onslow county. Unless they have seasons within the next few days, there will probably be more complaints of dry weather."

"There are only a few reports of tobacco budding out, and only scattered reports of hail damage. Growers in Ayden and Paoletti townships in Pitt No. 8 and 9 townships in Edgecombe, Shine and Bullhead townships in Greene, and Manning township in Nash, report slight hail damage. In Richland township, Onslow county, a half dozen farms have suffered heavy damage."

Territorial Concessions To Be Made To Russians

Disclosed Officially, However, that Armed Forces Being Concentrated on the Frontier To Resist Any Attempts Of Hungary To Occupy Transylvania

Bucharest, June 27.—(AP)—The Rumanian government tonight officially signified its acceptance of Russia's ultimatum demanding the cessation of Bessarabia, northern Bucovina and other concessions.

At the same time official sources disclosed that the Rumanian army was being concentrated in Transylvania near the Hungarian frontier. Hungary has been agitating for restoration of Transylvania, which she lost to Rumania after the World war.

The communiqué issued shortly after 8 p. m., (1 p. m. EST), two hours before the deadline of the Soviet ultimatum, said "Rumania would desire to maintain good relations with the Soviet Union and has asked the Soviet government to fix a locality and name a delegation for discussion of the Russian demands."

Official sources said this acceptance of negotiations was merely a formal way of stating that King Carol is prepared to satisfy all of Russia's demands.

With Hungary, however, it was different.

Officials expressed the belief that Carol had decided to accede to all of Russia's demands in order to be able to throw all his army against an expected Hungarian attempt to regain Transylvania.

Authoritative sources said that Russia demanded:

Return of Bessarabia, once part of Czarist Russia.

Cession of the northern part of Bucovina, once part of the Austro-Hungarian empire, and control of Rumania's big Black Sea port, Constanta, for a naval base along with railway bases and supervision of Galati and Braila, two ports which control all navigation on the Danube river.

There were unconfirmed reports in the capital that Russian troops already were at Danzig across the frontier of Bessarabia and north Bucovina and that Russian warships had steamed into the harbor of Constanta.

Bucharest, June 27.—(AP)—Rumania decided today, according to diplomatic quarters to yield vast territorial concessions to Soviet Russia, but pleaded for time to discuss on the Red demands and ordered a precautionary mobilization.

Little more than five hours before expiration of an ultimatum calling for immediate return of Bessarabia and other concessions and amid reports of a Soviet massing of military might Rumania asked for postponement of the deadline, fixed at 10 p. m. tonight (3 p. m. EST).

Russian planes were reported destroying the still and arrested the men, said the two were preparing to make a run of whiskey.

ACT PROTECTS SMALL FARMS

Two-Acre Tobacco Farmers To Have Same Quotas

Raleigh, June 27.—Small two-acre tobacco farmers are protected by law from further cuts in their acreage allotment should growers adopt the three-year leaf control plan in the July 20 referendum. E. Y. Floyd, AAA executive officer of N. C. State College, explained today.

Where more than two acres are grown, the farm allotment may not be reduced more than 10 per cent from the 1940 flue-cured tobacco allotment. However, this guarantee will not apply to those who violate the marketing quotas.

Large stocks of tobacco on hand, resulting from the tremendous crop of last year, and unsettled conditions abroad as a result of the war caused the secretary of agriculture to proclaim quotas on the 1941, 1942, and 1943 crops.

However, growers themselves will be given the opportunity of accepting or rejecting these restrictions through a formal balloting. Voting places will be set up in each county in which flue-cured leaf is grown.

Any person who will share in the returns from the 1940 crop will be eligible to cast a ballot. A two-thirds majority will be necessary to pass the control program.

Floyd pointed out that growers will have their choice of a three-year program or control in 1941 only. He explained, however, that the three-year plan will assure growers of a more stabilized price, since the government will be better able to give aid in this long-time planning.

JOHNSTON MAY VOTE OUT ABC

Likely to Discontinue Legal Liquor Sales

By HENRY AVERILL.
Raleigh, June 27.—Johnston county seems on the eve of voting out its ABC stores, which have produced more than \$100,000 a year profit since they were established after vote of the people on May 29, 1937.

Advocates of the legal sale of liquor through the county operated stores cling to the hope that tomorrow's voting will be in their favor. They claim, indeed, that the ABC's will survive by a majority of "from 100 to 500."

On the other hand those who would ban the legalized sale of liquor in any shape, form or fashion confidently assert they will have a two to one margin at the polls.

The ABC's won by something like 300 three years ago. There were signs to the petitioners which forced tomorrow's election no less than 6,000 names, and nobody but qualified voters were properly eligible to sign. If, then, the drys can rally at the polls the same strength they showed on the petitions, the ABC's are on their way out—and that right fast.

Particularly and peculiar importance and more than local significance is attached to the result in Johnston because this will be the first case in which a county which has an opportunity to watch the workings of the ABC system has decided to vote on getting rid of them.

If Johnston, goes into the prohibition column, it will be incentive to drys in other ABC counties to try the same trick. If Johnston remains in status quo, controllers in some counties now without legal stores may be encouraged to seek an election on the question of establishing them.

Tomorrow's voting is complicated by other issues than the out-and-out question of stores or no stores. Local political factions have become involved to the point where the matter is looked on in many quarters as more an effort to get the "Wallace gang" than a real prohibition fight.

The "Wallace gang," incidentally, is headed by Representative Lawrence Wallace, whose brother is chairman of the Johnston ABC board.

Wallace's House colleague, R. T. Fulghum, is going along in the battle to save the ABC's, but a former Johnston county Representative, Judge F. H. Brooks is one of the most vocative of the prohibition orators.

The fact that Wallace led the entire legislative field in the May 29 primary has encouraged the control forces, because the fight against Wallace and the stores was in full cry even before the first legislative voting.

Advocates of the ABC's paint the whole thing as a battle between the stores and the bootleggers, and charge that the so-called "prohibition" forces are being financed by bootleggers' money. Incidentally, there are strong indications that there is no lack of funds on the part of the drys.

The Johnston county stores have made a total gross profit of \$321,330.95 since their establishment in 1937, according to records of the State ABC board here.

Summing up, it appears that the drys have an advantage in the eve of the vote. Johnston is almost completely rural and it has a comparatively heavy Republican vote—both of which are factors to the advantage of the prohibition forces.

The prohibitionists have conducted a driving, fiery campaign and appear to have the whip hand.

Some of the store advocates contend that the Republicans in Johnston are not quite so solidly dry for political purposes, as in many other counties. They claim, indeed, that most of the precincts in which there are many Republican votes will be carried by advocates of the legal liquor stores.

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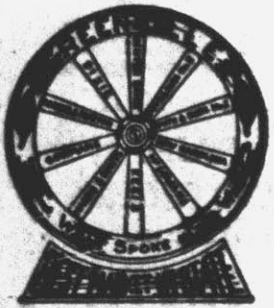
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Strength For The Day

Washington Daybook

By Jack Stinnett

Washington—Fee, fie, fo, fum—
in the veins of Charles A. Lin-
dbergh runs the blood of a congress-
man.

Is that, Washington is asking,
what has driven the Lone Eagle to
do a little soaring on the radio? Is
it because the blood of his father,
Charles A. Lindbergh, Sr., who served
10 years in congress from Min-
nesota, and of his grandfather, Ole
Manson, who was a member of
Sweden's parliament, heats up at
time of great national stress that
the 38-year-old flyer has plunged
back into the spotlight with criti-
cisms of the government and warn-
ings that we are trending toward
war?

Maybe. I wouldn't know, and
Lindbergh is not telling. But what-
ever the motivation, Lindbergh
has caused more furor in Wash-
ington in the last year than any
other man outside government or con-
gressional circles.

Boos To Praise
Four times in nine months, he has
gone to the radio to take issue on
matters of government. Last Sep-
tember and again in October, he
condemned congress for its move
to repeal the arms embargo. Twice
in the last month he has tossed
the weight of his popularity and abili-
ty into the warning that "we can-
not continue for long to follow the
course our government has taken
without becoming involved in war
with Germany."

The reception of these speeches
in Washington has run gamut from
boos to high praise.

One congressman said: "I suggest
that every member of this house
study Lindbergh's speech daily un-
til it becomes thoroughly im-
pregnated in an indelibly im-
pressed upon the collective conscious-
ness of this body."

On the other hand, he has been
accused of everything from being a
"fifth columnist" to the relatively
mild charge that "he is a young
man inexperienced and totally un-
familiar with our country, its
statesmanship, and its military mat-
ters."

Senator Key Pittman (D-Nev.)
said: "If Col. Lindbergh desires to
help in our national defense, let
him throw aside all his false polit-
ical advisers and volunteer in the
United States government as an ex-
pert in aviation." Let Col. Lin-
dbergh and his advisers know that
when one fools with politics in a
national emergency, he is fooling
with disaster.

Senator Ernest Lundeen (Farm-
Laborite, Minn.) said: "We
thank God for the Lindberghs, fa-
ther and son—the immortal con-

gressman Charles A. Lindbergh, the
invincible and intrepid Col. Charles
A. Lindbergh. So long as America
follows their crystal clear policies of
patriotism we need have no fears
for our ship of state."

Those are scarcely drops in the
bucket of comment that has been
put into the recent Lindbergh re-
cord. But it gives an idea of both
sides of the picture.

Since Washington is predomi-
nantly behind the Administration's
defense drive and almost equally as
strong behind the Administration's
"all aid to the Allies—short of war"
program, it goes without saying that
Lindbergh's popularity has taken
something of a nose dive in these
parts.

He Will Be Heard

The fact remains, however, that
his speeches have carried some
weight and it is considered a feath-
er in the cap of the isolationists that
they have Lindbergh carrying their
fight to the people.

Just who his advisers are nobody
knows. In the State Department,
some old-timers have said, off the
record, they recognize the hand of
an assistant secretary of state un-
der President Hoover in Lindbergh's
speeches. They think such phrases
as "stop these gestures with an
empty gun" and "stop this hysteri-
cal chatter of calamity and inva-
sion" are the trademark of this for-
mer official.

I wouldn't know, but before
Lindbergh made his last address, he
did confer with Senators Clark, of

Missouri; Wheeler, of Montana; La
Follette, of Wisconsin; Clark, of
Idaho; Representative Van Zandt,
of Pennsylvania, and other isola-
tionists. They are not all Republi-
cans by any means, the Clarks and
Wheeler are Democrats and La Fol-
lette is a progressive.

Neither Lindbergh nor the others
have been fighting defense—just the
"trend toward war."

If it's Lindbergh's political blood
that has driven him to become the
spearhead of the "stay out of war"
movement, he scarcely could have
picked a better time to jump into
the Washington arena. He may be
unpopular with the opposition, but
he sure will be heard. The tempest
he has already caused has proved
that.

them he was, "Well, we're both for

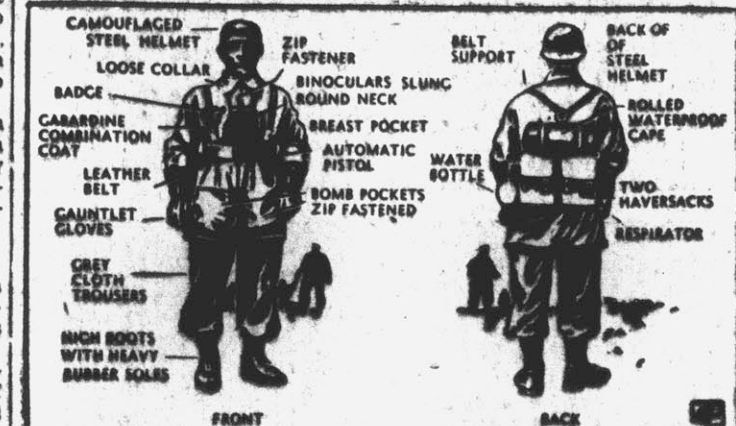
you—what's your name?" When told

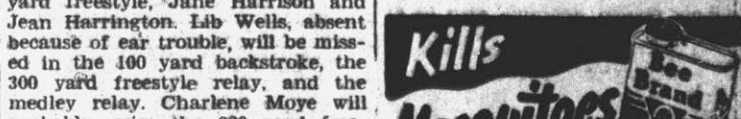

kening the Rumanian skies, while Russia massed troops, tanks and artillery at the northern frontier. Simultaneously with the end of an afternoon session of the Rumanian Grand Council, King Carol presiding, it became known that a virtual general mobilization order had been issued by the war ministry. Diplomatic observers, however, expressed belief that Rumania's military precautions were of a precautionary nature, rather than indicative of any intention to oppose Russia's demands with force. Apparently Germany and Italy both counseled Rumania to bow to the Russian demands. Ministers of the axis powers conferred at length with King Carol. It was reported the Russian demands were for Bessarabia, which was Russia before the World war settlement, and a portion of the province of Bucovina.

Moscow, June 27.—(AP)—Soviet Russian circles were silent today regarding reports in Bucharest that Rumania had agreed to Russian demands for Bessarabia and Bucovina and control of the ports of Constanta and Tulcea.

There Are No Freshmen For Tar Heel Congress

By HENRY AVERILL

Raleigh, June 25.—Victory of W. O. Burghin of Davidson in second primary against C. B. Deane last Saturday in sure that there will be no freshman in the North Carolina delegation to the 77th Congress, barring death or what is much less probable, a political upset which would put a Republican in the group.

This is in considerable contrast to the case two years ago when three new members were selected—Burgin, Carl Durham from the Sixth and Lon Folger from the Fifth. None of that three went in by winning over a sitting member, and this year's results leave the Bailey-Simmons Senatorial race of 1930 and the Reynolds-Morrison upper house battle of 1932 as the only instances within memory of the younger generation wherein an incumbent was defeated for re-election—and Morrison had not been elected by the people, but was serving by appointment.

When the eleven North Carolina House members start their term for the 77th Congress next January they will have behind them a total service of 134 years (67 terms) prior or service, an average of slightly more than twelve years apiece; though of course the service is by no means evenly distributed.

On the contrary it will run from R. L. (Farmer Bob) Doughton's full thirty years down to the two put in so far by Folger, Durham and Burgin.

Next to Doughton, in continuous service, is the Second District's John J. Kerr, who was first elected to the 68th congress and who has served, therefore, eighteen years at the end of 1940.

Kerr is topped in total service by Asheville's Zeb Weaver who has been elected by the voters of his district (once the 10th, now the 11th) eleven times prior to this year. In 1928, however, he was run over by the Anti-Smith avalanche; and so he had to sit on the sidelines and kibitz during the 71st congress.

In total service Kerr is tied, too, by Major A. L. Bulwinkle of the 10th (formerly the 9th). The Gastonia veteran won his first congressional race for the 67th congress, but like Weaver, was given a two year vacation by his constituents who went running after strange idols when the Democrats put up Al Smith for President.

Lindsay Warren of the First will be starting his ninth term in January, he went first to the 69th congress. J. Bayard Clark, who represents the Seventh, started his congressional career in the 71st congress, so this next term will be his seventh.

Harold D. Cooley, of the Fourth, takes short precedence over Graham Barden of the Third, by virtue of winning a special election in July 1934, to fill out the unexpired term of E. H. Pou. Both Cooley and Barden won their first full terms in the 74th congress.

Folger, Durham and Burgin are still the infants of the House delegation.

On the Senate side, Josiah W. Bailey went in after beating F. M. Simmons in 1930. Robert R. Reynolds overthrew Cam Morrison in 1932.

They are spending the morning observing the work in the classrooms, the early afternoon in conference groups discussing what was seen during the morning, seeing a film demonstration given in the Training school auditorium from 4:30 until 5:30, and attending a concert this evening.

Tomorrow morning will be spent on observation again and the summary of commendable practices will be given at a luncheon in the college dining hall.

This conference is sponsored jointly by the department of elementary principals of the N. C. E. A. and the State Department of Public Instruction. Miss Julia Weatherington, of the State Department, says that the unique feature of these conferences has been that there are no headline speakers and that leaders from the schools come together to see the children live under expert guidance and then summarize the reports on their observations.

The theme is "What Are Good Practices?" This is the first series of conferences ever held in this state for the one purpose of studying the children at work and of making evaluations of what these children do at their work. This is the third and last of three conferences, one in each section of the state.

The committee for promotion and planning these conferences is composed of the following: chairman, Miss Julia Weatherington, of the Department of Public Instruction; Miss Ruth Fitzgerald, of the Woman's College; Miss Kate McIntyre, of Laurinburg; Mr. J. E. Miller, of Washington, former president of the elementary department of elementary principals, and Dean Pyette, the president for the current year.

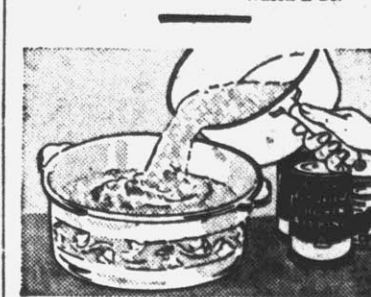
