SWEDEN JOINS
IN TRADE PACT
WITH NORWAY

Openly Enters Course
Of Cooperation
With Nazis

SAYS OBJECTIVE
PROTECT TRADE

Officials Point Out
Means Of Resuming
Business Is Through
Trade With Ger-
many

Stockholm, July 8.—(AP)—Sweden openly entered a course of close cooperation with Germany today, its aim a "normalized Scandinavia."

Trade—the trade for which Sweden depends for its existence—and safeguarding of the nation's "living space" were the objectives sought through agreements with Denmark and German-controlled Norway.

These agreements, expected to be completed this week, were practical manifestation of the new Swedish policy indicated by Prime Minister Hansson.

Hansson's policy is based on the promise that, with the war in Norway ended and Sweden's access to British markets closed the Swedes one hope of resuming business is through trade with Germany.

The new agreements are designed to promote interchange of goods between the countries concerned. Negotiations with Norway so far have concerned only Sweden's trade with that country; in other words there is no hope, as yet, of using Norwegian or western Swedish seaports for trade with the Americans.

Sweden's acquiescence last week to a German request for permission to send troops and supplies across Swedish territory into Norway indicated the Stockholm government's unwillingness to let anything stand in the way of a realistic settlement with Germany.

Points Out Needs
Of Local Cannery

The need for a cannery in this community was stressed today by J. H. Rose, who declared he had received several requests from all sections of the county that arrangements be made whereby the farmer could furnish the produce, half going to the farmer and half to the school lunch supply.

Mr. Rose declared the belief that some county agent should get behind a cannery project immediately, pointing out that that food which would prove of much value in the winter months if canned probably would go to waste unless preserved.

He explained that facilities the school is using to can produce from its own garden were taxed to capacity and that, although he would like very much to get the food for use in the school lunch room this winter, it was impossible to handle it.

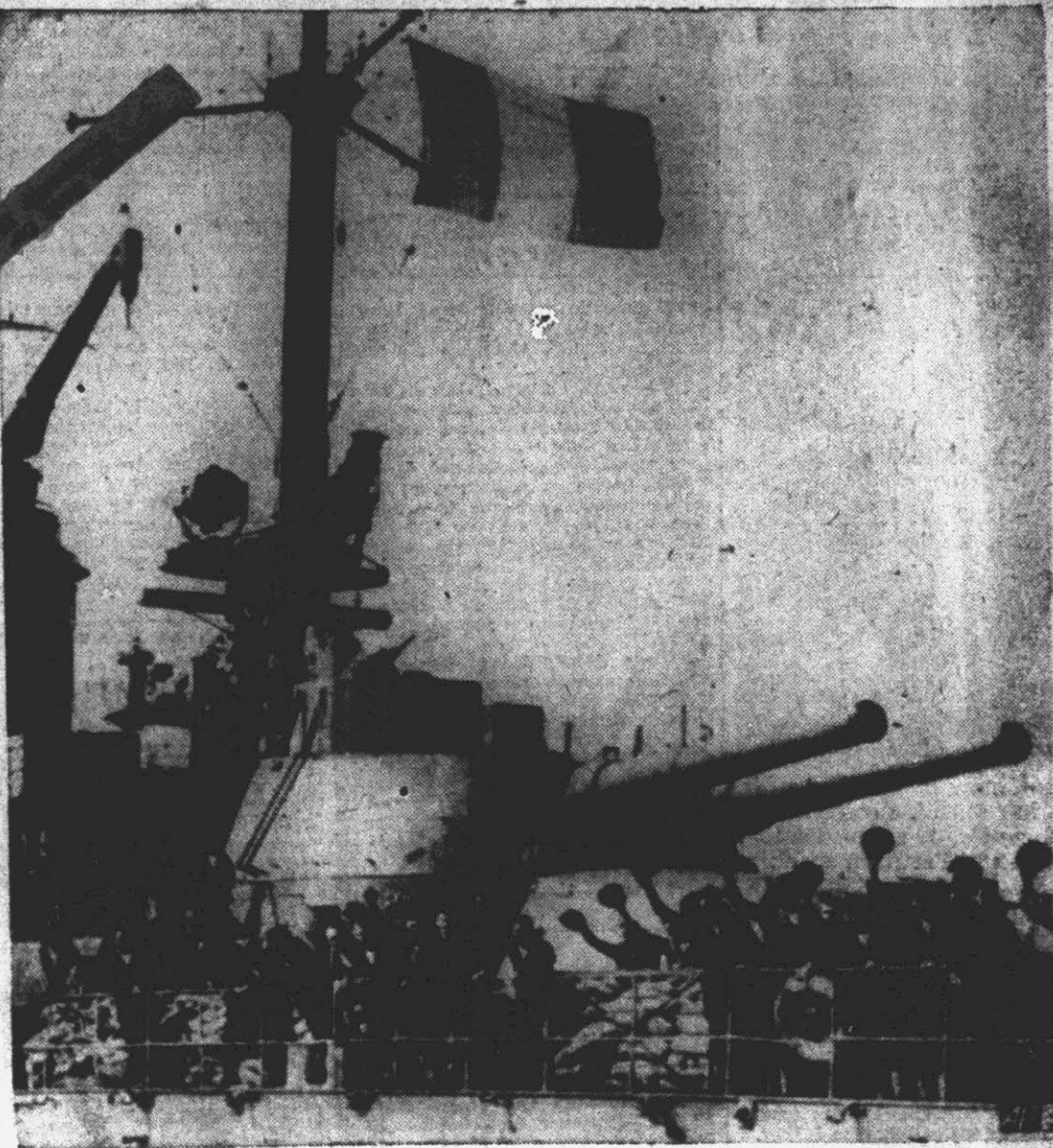
Offensive?

London, July 8.—(AP)—A war office spokesman, commenting on defense measures against any German invasion of Britain, said tonight that Britons "must take care not to become too defense-minded. We must be ready to meet Germany anywhere."

This was interpreted in some quarters as still another official hint that Britain, as suggested by War Minister Anthony Eden, may be preparing to attack Germany on the continent.

Naval barracks at Germany's great naval base on Wilhelmshaven were among the objectives bombed by British warplanes Sunday night, the Air Ministry announced tonight.

Rumania Facing CollapseREFUSE CLOSE
BURMA ROUTE

Britain Flatly Rejects
Demands Made
By Japs

Tokyo, July 8.—(AP)—Britain has rejected Japan's demands for the closure of the route through British Burma to war supplies for the Chinese government. He asserted that such action would be incompatible with Britain's commitments to Burma and India, an authoritative source said tonight.

British Ambassador Sir Robert Leslie Craigie today personally delivered the British reply to Foreign Minister Arita.

Sir Robert was reported to have pledged that trade between the British crown colony and the Chinese hinterland had been halted and therefore there was no foundation for Japan's demands for the stopping of arms traffic by this route.

Arita expressed "deep dissatisfaction" with the British reply, a Japanese informant said, and emphatically stated Japan's views, urging Britain to reconsider the question of the Burma route.

This source reported that Sir Robert said he would report to the British government immediately.

Four Iron Guard
Members Resign
Official Posts

Bucharest, July 8.—(AP)—The collapse of Premier Gurgu's five-day-old pro-German cabinet appeared possible late today following the resignation of four Iron Guard members.

Some political quarters held it likely Gurgu's successor may be General Antonescu, Iron Guardist, who was war minister in an earlier anti-Semitic, pro-Nazi cabinet.

The possibility was seen that he might head a 100 per cent nationalist Iron Guard machine.

The way was believed opened by an "understanding" the Iron Guard—Rumania's Nazis—was reported to have reached with the leaders of the powerful peasant party.

Mrs. Bettie Wilson Edwards, 82, widow of Thomas Edwards, died at 7 o'clock yesterday morning at the home of her son, J. L. Edwards of the Red Banks community.

Funeral services were conducted at the home this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock by the Rev. E. L. Ballard, Free Will Baptist minister of Greenville. Burial followed in the family cemetery near Ayden.

Mrs. Edwards is survived by the one son with whom she made her home and three grandchildren, Peggie Rose, Bettie Jane and Rudolph Edwards, all of Greenville.

She was one of the oldest members of the Disciple Church of Salem.

Accident Is Fatal
To Raleigh Man

Raleigh, July 8.—(AP)—S. Brown Shepherd, Jr., 34, member of a prominent Raleigh family and widely known over the state through his activities in the Young Democratic clubs, shot himself accidentally this morning, Conner Roy Banks said, and died instantly.

Shepherd was president of the Wake Young Democrats several years ago during the gubernatorial campaign of Governor J. C. B. Ehringhaus, and drove Ehringhaus to many of the places where he spoke. He worked in the State's Local Government Commission and in recent months he had travelled for a cement company.

Conner Banks said Shepherd and his wife returned home late last night from a visit, and Shepherd, whose hobby was firearms, went downstairs to clean some of his nine guns kept there.

He apparently was cleaning a high-powered hunting rifle, 45 caliber.

NINE MORE DIE
ON HIGHWAYS

June Toll Two Higher Than The Previous Month

Nine persons were killed and 45 injured in 65 accidents on East Carolina highways during the month of June, the regular monthly report of Lieut. Lester Jones of the State Highway Patrol showed today.

In the previous month seven were killed and 27 injured in 50 accidents on highways in the Eastern section of the State.

There was a sharp increase in the number of arrests in June over the month of May; also an increase in the number of persons taken in custody for drunken driving.

Seven were charged with drunken driving. Of the total number arrested there were 356 convictions. Sentences approximately 17 years and 3 months.

During the month members of the highway patrol engaged in the following other activities: issued 101 warnings; recovered three automobiles; investigated 373 complaints; rendered first aid to four persons; corrected 2,656 lights.

There were 715 citations; stored 14 vehicles; found 57 motor vehicles to be over-loaded; issued 752 citations; examined 108 applicants for driver's license and approved as many applications.

There were 160,928 miles covered in 14,944 spent on duty. The patrol purchased 909 pints of oil and 9,341 gallons of gasoline. There were 30 days absent with leave and furlough because of sickness.

The value of property recovered amounted to \$1,361; fines \$2,637.45 and costs \$2,440.40, making a grand total of \$6,438.85. Revenue collected approximated \$3,484.83. This combined with the other income was \$9,923.68.

Upper Hand Claimed By
British Royal Air ForceHEAD OF FLEET
IN WASHINGTON

Admiral Richardson
Arrives At Navy De-
partment; Will Con-
fer With Officials
Regarding Policies

Washington, July 8.—(AP)—Traveling as secretary of the fleet, Admiral J. O. Richardson arrived unexpectedly today at the Navy Department from Hawaii, where the United States battle armada is now stationed.

The department did not disclose the presence of the fleet's commander-in-chief until a day after he reached Washington yesterday.

It was announced only that he came here to confer with officials regarding routine policies for the training of the fleet.

He was scheduled to have lunch with President Roosevelt and it was considered likely that he would talk with President Roosevelt as well as with high navy officers.

Observers expected that Richardson would discuss with the high commands the pressing question of where to keep the fleet, as well as lessons in naval operations which have been learned from the European war.

It was at Richardson's request that the fleet was kept in Hawaiian waters this spring beyond its scheduled training period.

A fortnight ago, the fleet sailed quickly and unexpectedly from Hawaii. There were reports, neither confirmed nor denied by the navy, that it was heading for the Panama canal and the Atlantic, but it returned last week to Hawaii, with the announcement that it engaged merely in routine training operations.

Petain Slated To Head
New French Governm't

Would Hold Office
Similar To That Of
Generalissimo Fran-
co In Spain; Censor-
ed Press Openly
Predicts President
Lebrun Will Resign
And Be Succeeded
By Petain

Geneva, July 8.—(AP)—The censored press of Nazi-occupied France carried reports today that Marshal Petain's government was "only transitory" and would make way for a new regime with Petain as "chief of state" like Generalissimo Franco in Spain.

A dispatch forecast the resignation of French President Albert Lebrun and his replacement by Petain who, it said, would "only accept the title of executive powers."

A triumvirate of former Premier Laval, General Weygand and Adrien Marquet, former Minister of Labor, would dominate the government under Petain's direction, this report said.

Petain's present ministry, it added, "seems to be making a last concession to 'dying rights' by an elaborate legislative procedure carried out by a picked group of Senators and deputies."

These plans, the writer emphasized, are only forecasts, but the fact that they were permitted to appear in the strictly controlled press indicated that they may be based on known plans of French leaders.

HOLD EDGE IN
AIR ASSAULTS

Although German
Raiders Continue
Attacks on England,
British Fliers Re-
port Nazi Fighter
Shot Down in
Flames, Four-Engine
Bomber Wrecked
And Other Hits Are
Scored

London, July 8.—(AP)—Britain claimed the upper hand over Nazi air raiders today and declared that her fliers were matching blow for blow as waves of German planes still poured over England.

Several persons were believed to have been killed and some damage was caused in towns of northeast and southwest England as the Germans continued their forays, from which the British have had but one day of respite since June 18.

One of the forays, on a southwest town, was made by a diving bomber which flew over the town with its engine cut off and arrived unheeded.

New information added an entire family of five to the toll of dead in Western England last night. All were killed by one bomb. Four other families, taking shelter indoors, were buried under their caved-in homes when bombs fell in the heart of a residential area.

But the Air Ministry said Royal Air Force planes in daylight raids on Germany, shot down a Nazi fighter in flames and wrecked a big four-engine bomber on the ground.

Besides destroying the big German planes, the Air Ministry said, British fliers scored a direct hit on a runway and are believed to have caused extensive damage to grounded planes.

Attacked by five Nazi planes, it added, a British bomber raiding German-occupied France shot down one in a burst of gunfire and escaped to sea.

Eight Tar Heel Solons
To Serve Fourth Term

Mull Of Cleveland
Will Begin Fifth
Session

Raleigh, July 8.—Eight members of the 1941 North Carolina House of Representatives will be serving their fourth straight term when they are sworn in next January.

No member will outrank this octet in continuous service, though at least one other member (Odus M. Mull) will be serving his fifth term. Two of the eight with three consecutive terms behind them will also actually be entering upon their fifth term, though not served consecutively.

The two who will be starting their fourth straight and fifth term in all are Victor S. Bryant of Durham, who was a member of the 1921 legislature before coming back again in 1925 and staying ever since; and George Uzzell of Rowan who was "in" for the 1931 session, "out" in 1933 and "in" ever since the 1935 meeting.

The other half dozen who will be the veterans of the House are 1939 Speaker D. L. Ward of Craven, Claude C. Abernethy and W. E. Fenner of Nash, Roy L. Davis of Dare, Rupert T. Pickens of Guilford and Clarence Stone of Rockingham.

Thirteen House members will be serving their third term in a row, and 34 will be first-termers of 1939 come back for their sophomore year.

The Representatives who started in 1937 are Arch T. Allen and William Hatch of Wake, J. T. Benton of Perquimans (who, incidentally eased back for 1941 by 36 votes in a runoff primary), E. T. Bost, Jr., of Currituck, J. C. Brulson (Republican) of Hertford, R. F. Underwood of Johnston, Joe Garrett of Rockingham, Rex Goss of Forsyth, J. B. Grant (Rep.) of Davie, C. E. Quinn of Duplin, J. B. Volger of Mecklenburg, and Grady Withrow of Ruthford.

The 34 sophomore members will be U. B. Blacklock of Anson, Glendon C. Boswell of Currituck, L. L. Burstin of Henderson, E. R. Burt of Montgomery, Dr. J. H. Crawford (Rep.) of Graham (if he wins), Leslie Crawford and Frank Taylor of Wayne, Wilbur Darden of Washington, George Davis of Hyde, H. C. Dobson of Surry, Dr. Zeno Edwards of Beaufort, E. S. A. NEW PRESSURE
ON ROOSEVELT

Urged By Massachu-
setts Delegation
To Accept

Washington, D. C., July 8.—(AP)—President Roosevelt was urged "to be a candidate or consent to be drafted" today by two leaders of the Massachusetts delegation, where James A. Farley had the bulk of his delegate strength to the Chicago democratic convention.

A day after Farley's conference with Mr. Roosevelt, when the democratic national chairman was let in on the president's third term intentions—but kept them strictly to himself—Rep. McCormack, chairman of the Massachusetts delegation, and William H. Burke, Jr., state democratic chairman and a convention delegate, called at the White House and on the way out talked with reporters.

While Burke nodded agreement, McCormack said:

"We urged him just as strongly as we could to be a candidate or to consent to be drafted."

"I think it's absolutely indispensable that the president run. He is the outstanding man in government life in the world today and is the one man who is the leader of the forces in government life of enlightenment, progress and peace."

As to the solution of the third term puzzle, when, and if, the democratic convention might draft Mr. Roosevelt, the two Massachusetts leaders said they had no more information than the rest of the nation.

Of 34 Massachusetts delegates, Farley has 32½ votes pledged to him, while one one-half are unpledged.

Hollywood. — Paul Whiteman brought his genial double chin and band-beg pardon, orchestra — to town to "Strike Up the Band."

His stay, this time, was different. The last time he made a movie in Hollywood he and the gang stayed a while. Their latest visit was for a mere five days, or long enough to do their sequences for the Mickey Rooney-Judy Garland musical.

Metro did not bother, as Universal once did, to throw up a lavish rustic bungalow to accommodate them. The movie business has changed, but the King of Jazz, himself, has changed little.

He still doesn't fancy himself as a movie actor, although "The King of Jazz," his one starring picture, finally grossed somewhere around \$4,000,000 throughout the world.

"Here's one fiddler," he said, "who isn't looking for a chance to act. If they give me any dialogue, they'll have to tell me how to say it."

Whiteman and orchestra pioneered in making jazz respectable, "way back in the twenties. Through changing musical eras and fads, the plump maestro has stuck to music and shied away from "novelties," while still keeping abreast of the trends. He "says it with music" rather than with the cacophonous beating of pipes together, the clonking of chains or the wrecking of kitchen stoves.

The jitterbug, Whiteman observed, is a vanishing species, mostly prevalent now among youngsters of high school and early college years. "Kaje kuerstsephrdleutain."

In "Strike Up the Band," Rooney plays the leader of an amateur orchestra who is offered a job by Whiteman when the kids take over during an intermission. Mickey, a song-writer and no mean musician himself on the side, learned a few things from Whiteman during his visit.

Mickey was sitting behind the camera tapping a rhythm on his knees, when Whiteman came over and challenged him. "Can you do this one?"

Whiteman sat down and began a complicated series of toe-tappings, hand-clapping, and knee-slappings. Mickey tried it, while a crowd gathered around, and he got nowhere. He tried it again, and again, and still didn't make it.

"That," said Whiteman, "is what I ask my boys when they think they know more about rhythm than I do."

The maestro's last film work was in "Thanks a Million," the Dick Powell picture, and the Whiteman sequences were made in New York. He was such a stranger to movie ways, this trip out, that he actually conducted and the orchestra played during a scene. But he got the hang of it quickly—he conducted and the orchestra merely went through the motions of playing "My Wonderful One." He even took a convincing bow when the extras dancing gave him "silent" applause.

The big Whiteman number in the film is "When Day Is Done"—played according to his old, original arrangement.

STORED GRAIN IS IN DANGER

Insects Prove Serious Enemy To Grain Now In Bins

Raleigh, July 8.—Stored grain is now in just as much danger from its insect enemies as it was in the field before harvest, according to A. D. Stuart, extension seed specialist of N. C. State College, and secretary of the N. C. Crop Improvement Association.

"Farmers should keep a close check on their grain bins to see that insect damage is stopped as soon as it appears," he advised. "Also, they should make certain that grain stored with too much moisture is stirred frequently until danger of heating is passed."

Stuart says there are two methods of treating stored grain to avoid insect damage. One is re-cleaning the grain with a cleaner equipped with an air blast. The other is with chemicals.

"For most farmers," he stated, "the use of chemicals will be the easiest and most economical method because, in most cases, they do not have access to a seed cleaner."

The seedman recommends the use of carbon di-sulphide, or a mixture of three parts of ethylene dichloride with one part of carbon tetrachloride. It will require from 3 to 5 gallons of the chemical per 1,000 bushels of grain, or 5 pounds per 1,000 cubic feet of storage space, he said.

Carbon di-sulphide is poisonous and inflammable and must be handled with care. The ethylene dichloride-carbon tetrachloride mixture is not inflammable, but it should not be inhaled in concentrated form due to its anesthetic action.

The chemicals are placed on top of the grain since the fumes go down as the liquid evaporates.

Scientist Studies What Life In A Refrigerator Is Like

Minneapolis — A refrigerator, to most of us, is a thing to tuck away in a corner of the kitchen. But Professor Frank B. Rowley of the University of Minnesota has reversed the procedure.

For he has put not only a kitchen, but a full-sized house, inside a huge refrigerator in one of the university's laboratories.

The house is 22 feet square, save for a niche in one corner, but there is plenty of room to spare in this 30 foot square and 28 foot high "cooler."

The purpose of the venture is to work out some insulation problems raised largely by air conditioning. Temperature in the refrigerator can be driven down to 30 below zero to duplicate effects of winter weather, while inside the model 3-room house the mercury can be kept at any desired point.

A principal objective of the study is to determine why moisture sometimes forms inside the walls of a house, and to find means of preventing it.

Vapor passes readily through ordinary plaster, then condenses inside the wall, said Dr. Rowley. The best solution discovered to date, he said, is to prevent it from getting into the wall in the first place, by properly-placed vapor barriers—certain papers or paints—although ventilation of the wall is an aid.

Various types of insulation are used, mounted in sections of the

walls, which are removable to permit inspection.

A complicated maze of wiring permits an operator of a control board in the laboratory basement to read temperatures at any of more than 50 points inside the rooms, inside the walls and around the outside of the house.

Man About Manhattan

New York.—There is, I believe, the root of a sermon or an editorial in this scrap of conversation. . . . Carl Erbe and this reporter overheard it the other night at the Riviera bar. . . . It was between shows. . . . It was about 11 o'clock in the night. . . . Four or five men, two of them obviously of Spanish ancestry, were in a little cluster at one end of the bar, talking. . . . "This is what I mean," one of them said, gesturing with his free hand to the crowd. "Look at those people. They are well dressed. They are happy. They drove out here in their own automobiles. The same is true not only in New York but in other sections of this country. Your standard of living is so much higher than ours. Yet my country has many natural resources too. Why have you progressed so far beyond us?"

For a moment, for just one little moment there was one of those infinitesimal fractions of silence that sometimes can seem an eternity; then came the answer.

"Two or three hundred years ago," his companion replied, "the Spaniards landed on your shores, looking for gold. . . . About the same time a handful of Puritans landed on these shores, looking for God."

Later in the evening Erbe and I went back to the cliff-side of the Riviera to renew our acquaintance with a family of raccoons that comes each year to be fed on the rocks by the river, when the Riviera opens. This night club, you will remember, is on the rim of the Palisades, overlooking the Hudson.

There is a drop of a hundred feet or more to the water's edge, a rocky, densely shrubbed shoreline. Each year a dozen or more raccoons miraculously appear to bask in the glow of the colored lights, accepting food from the hands of the guests. The waiters have them all named. They have been there for years, and each summer, when Ben Marden returns with this staff of waiters to the Riviera, the boys ascertain whether those raccoons are there even before their luggage is unpacked. . . . In the daytime you could search for hours and never find one. . . . and if you did find one he would run away from you. . . . But when night comes and the lights wink on they lose their fear and come out of hiding, to enjoy the music and the free handouts. It is a phenomenon of nature that could only happen in the environs of a great metropolis.

Carl Erbe himself is one of those peculiar and often inexplicable characters that go to make up the world we call Broadway. . . . He used to be a hobo. . . . For awhile he was a guide in Yellowstone National park. . . . He has thimble in the wide deserts of Mexico, and lingered at sidewalk cafe tables in what used to be Paris. . . . A couple of years ago he invited me to take the inland waterway route with him to the Florida keys. . . . He had a fine boat. . . . I couldn't make it, and he set out alone with his dog. . . . A couple of days out his boat suddenly sank, and he floated with his dog, a toy wirehair named Punchy, for what to him is still an eternity. . . . But he wasn't going to desert Punchy in an extremity like that. . . . Finally he was rescued. . . . And today, among his most prized possessions, is a medal given him in recognition of the fact that he risked his own life to save that of his dog.

Visits Profitable To North Carolina

Reflector Bureau.

Raleigh, July 8.—The Governor's Hospitality Committee has just reported that it has positive evidence that 1,831 persons from other states spent 7,487 days in North Carolina; and, what is vastly more important, time being as cheap as it is, approximately \$50,000 as well.

The committee, a division of the Department of Conservation and development, is sure of its facts because it has received, between February 1 and June 24, 1940, that many cards from the visiting persons.

The expenditure estimate is based on the generally accepted average of \$8 a day for each person traveling. That's the figure the American Automobile Association arrived at after a number of years study.

The cards received by the committee are those sent to each person who writes for information concerning North Carolina. Each is asked to fill in the card how long he plans to stay, etc. The average number of persons in each party is about three, the average stay approximately six days. Cards were returned by only about six per cent of those to whom they were sent.

During the period January through June, inquiries were received from and North Carolina booklets sent to more than 16,000 persons who wrote the committee in response to the national advertising done by the Department of Conservation and Development.

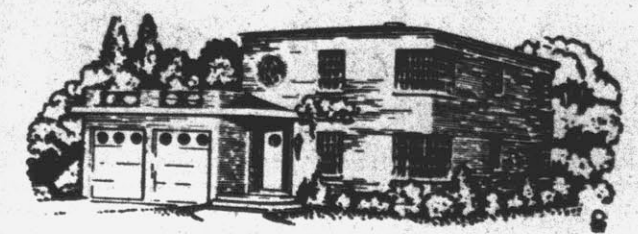

Many people complain that life
has lost its relish for them. Where
this is true, people need a little salt
to bring out the latent flavors of
life.

They may think that what they
need to make life more palatable is
more sugar. But this is a mistake.
Sugar has its place, but it does not
bring out the latent flavors of food
and give it relish. This is done only
with salt. Yet salt in itself is most
disagreeable to the taste. Sugar by
itself is very pleasant, and people
are more often sugar-minded than
they are salt-minded. But a little
pinch of salt added to a flat and
tasteless dish will transform it into
something really delectable.

Life often becomes flat and taste-
less, and when it does, people long
for the sugar bowl. If they can
sweeten life up a bit, they believe
they will be happy. But God more
often sprinkles a little of the salt of
discipline over our lives, gives us a
few reverses, makes us face a few
hard things, and life that before was
tasteless becomes a thing of relish.
We may not like salt, but a little
dash of untoward circumstances, a
few disappointments and reverses,
often make tasteless life savory and
palatable.

Washington Daybook

By Jack Stinson

Washington.—Being appointed to
high office by executives of the
Democratic party is nothing new to
Republican Henry Lewis Stinson.
He has been honored by every
President from Roosevelt to Roose-
velt. Only in President Harding's
administration did he not hold high
office and even then he was men-
tioned for cabinet and legal posts.

The appointment of Stinson as
Secretary of War isn't even the
first time that F. D. R. has recog-
nized the talents of the man who
had nothing to do with politics un-
til he was 40 years old. In 1938,
Roosevelt named him to the Hague
Court and, on another occasion,
asked him to be one of two men
on an important treaty mission to
South America.

So certain must Stinson have
been that he would come back to
Washington some day, that he never
relinquished ownership of historic
Woodley, a lovely old house on a
16-acre estate at 3000 Cathedral Av-
enue. The rambling old mansion of
pre-Civil War construction was
bought by Stinson when he was
Secretary of State under President
Hoover. It used to be the summer
White House of President Cleve-
land.

He Rode Into Politics
It's only a stone's throw from the
spot in Rock Creek park where
Stinson actually galloped into poli-
tics. Elihu Root and President Ted-
dy Roosevelt were out for an early
morning horseback ride. Root saw
Stinson riding across the creek and
remarked to the President that he
probably would be a good man for
the post of district attorney in New
York. The President said, "Call him
over." Root hailed Stinson and the
latter, disregarding the steep bank,
dashed into the creek at breakneck
pace, caught up his horse as he
stumbled in mid-stream and
brought him lathering and rearing
up the near bank.

T. R. cried, "Magnificent horse-
manship! Magnificent!" and with-
out further ceremony asked him
to take the New York federal prosecu-
tor's job.
Stinson probably is the only Sec-
retary of War (he also held the post
of War) who graduated from the
Army War College.

Before that, however, in the
World War, as a colonel, he was ap-
pointed to the judge advocates di-
vision. Then, although over 50, he
was assigned to command in the
31st field artillery where he served
for the duration and got decorations
from both Britain and France.
After he returned he checked in
at the War College and completed
the super-super army courses that
are the last word in military tactics.

His Parrot And Goat
When things calm down, I'm go-
ing to take a run out to Woodley
and find out whatever became of
"Old Cook" and "William Hamil-
ton Bones." Probably no man ever
had two pets who were better known
than "Old Cook," the parrot who
spoke Chinese, English and an Irish
brogue and could swear like a ma-
rine in all three languages; and
"Billy Bones," the goat who would
butt a mile for a package of any
kind of cigarettes.

Johnston isn't going to enforce the
liquor laws, never has enforced them

force.

June Rose, retiring Department
Commander of the American Legion,
admits he thought the biggest laugh
of his oratorical career when his
tongue slipped in a recent address
and he loudly proclaimed that:

world every month."

keenly interested in his legislative
intentions. They fear (though not
for publication) that he will sponsor
a movement to separate game and
fish from Conservation and Develop-
ment.

During the row McLaughlin did
not go that far in words, but he did
side throughout with Thurmond
Chatham, another board member
who served notice he intends to
fight, tooth and toe-nail, for such a
separation.

There are going to be plenty of
angry people in Pitt county if former
State Senator Ed. Planagan isn't
made a member of the State High-
way and Public Works commission
when Governor Broughton's admin-
istration gets in.

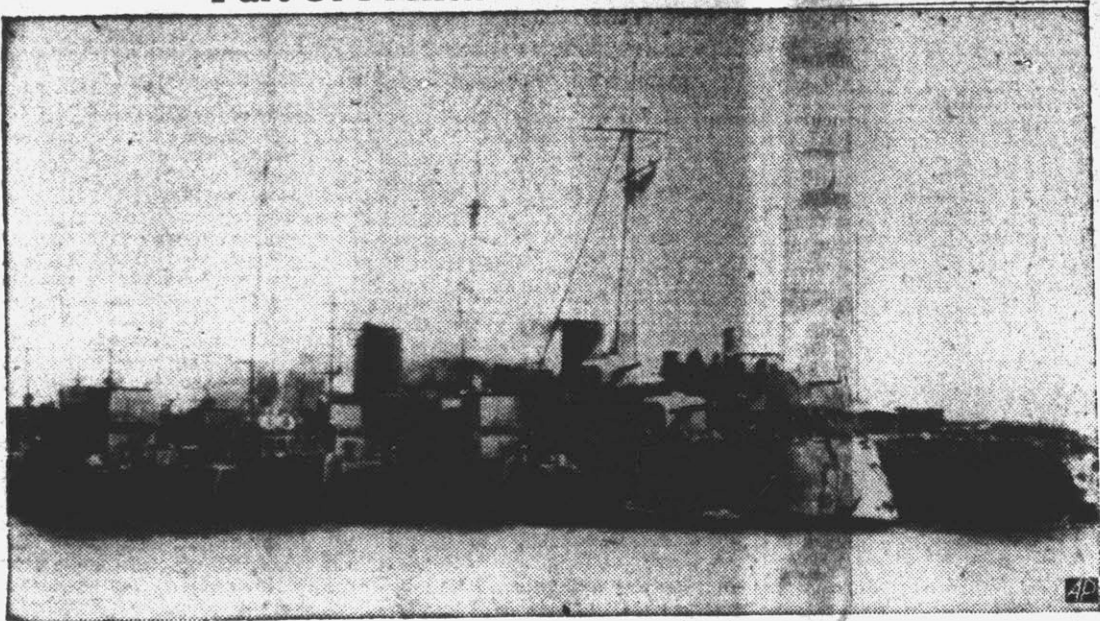

Zebra Stripes Taught Him How to Save His Farmland

Odenton, Md. — A zebra taught Dr. M. B. Waite how to terrace his farm.

From a zebra he learned how to stop the waste of precious life-giving top-soil, through erosion and now he's growing daffodils and tobacco.

The "zebra clue" came in building terraces — parallel, curving steps or basins around hillsides to lead off rainwater slowly and safely. By time-honored fashion, farmers plow, even on steep hills, in straight furrows. But these are perfect "channels" for heavy rains to rush down, gouging away the topsoil.

Back in 1907 Dr. Waite—who retired five years ago as a U. S. department of agriculture plant pathologist—plowed to build terraces that followed the contour of the hill. Each terrace was to have a gradual downward incline.

But he would meet little hills or bumps that would force the terraces to go up.

Learned When to Quit

One day at a zoo he noticed zebras have curving, parallel stripes. Sometimes a stripe ended abruptly, or tapered off.

Why not, he decided, simply stop a terrace when it came to an elevation, and let the water it was draining flow down to the next "step"? He did.

John Cotton, extension soil conservationist at the University of Maryland, credits Waite with being the first Maryland farmer to start such terraces.

Two Cash Crops

They, and other conservation

steps, proved profitable for Waite. He soon had a rich terraced peach orchard, and recently has turned mainly to growing tobacco and to daffodils as a cash crop.

Terraces and most conservation practices are not new, but, Cotton said, "there is a grim reawakening to the necessity of combatting erosion." Waite's farm, he added, illustrates that an individual can go ahead on his own without government aid to do the job.

MIGRANTS DIG SPUDS IN N. C.

4,000 People From Out Of State Are Given Work

Reflector Bureau. Raleigh, July 8.—Nearly 4,000 migrants were counted by agents of the North Carolina Employment Service during harvest of the potato crop in eastern counties.

Farm placement workers in the potato areas counted 3,781, or approximately 75 per cent of the estimated total, it has been reported by the Employment Service.

Interviews with these migrants revealed that almost 90 per cent were from Florida, with 3,388, with five other states furnishing much smaller percentages of the total. These states were North Carolina 206, South Carolina 125, Alabama 36, Georgia 30 and Delaware 6.

This horde of transient workers travelled, according to the Employment Service count, in 225 passenger cars and 131 trucks.

The migrants included men, women and children of all ages; and were of both races, mostly Negroes except for foremen, contracting agents and bosses.

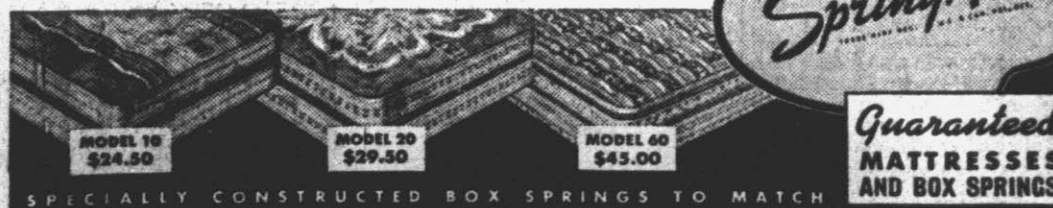
