Tentative Budget Calls For Continuation Of \$1 Levy

APPOINTEE JOBS FILLED FOR 1941

Sellers Succeeds Fleming As Mayor Pro-Tem; Wooten Named Assistant Chief

Greenville's tax rate of one dollar will continue in effect for another year under the budget tentatively adopted by the Board of Aldermen in regular session last night. The budget calls for expenditures, excluding school maintenance, of \$180,040.89.

All major appointive officers were selected to serve for another year at last night's meeting—the most important of the year.

Of the total expenditures for the current fiscal year \$41,958.75 goes on the city debt service, \$26,776 on the school debt service, \$104,126.64 for the general fund, or operating expenses. During the past fiscal year the general fund was \$102,848.47. In addition to the regular funds, additional funds were set aside for the colored cemetery, repairs to the motor grader, balance due the Port commission and some other items.

Little opposition developed to the reappointment of present city departmental heads. R. E. Sellers was selected mayor pro-tem over L. B. Fleming, the incumbent. Aldermen Evans, Massey, Fleming and Watson voted for Fleming and Aldermen Collins, Simpson, Sellers and Clapp for Sellers. Mayor Spain broke the tie in favor of Sellers.

W. C. Harris was unanimously elected treasurer; J. O. Duval clerk and tax collector; W. L. Patrick, assistant tax collector; Miss Mary Louise Langley, stenographer; George Gardner, chief of the fire department; Jasper Jones, assistant chief of the fire department; with Gardner, Jones and Berry Sumrell as truck drivers.

George A. Clark was retained as chief of police on a seven-to-one vote. Alderman Simpson nominated H. E. Wooten, but was the only member of the board to vote for his choice. Wooten, however, was named assistant chief over J. L. Whichard, the incumbent. Voting for Wooten were Collins, Sellers, Clapp and Evans, while Simpson, Watson, Fleming and Massey favored the retention of Whichard in the capacity. Mayor Spain broke the tie in favor of Wooten.

Other appointments made were C. K. Beatty superintendent of the street department; H. L. Rivers, city engineer; Haywood Willis, custodian of the Municipal building; J. K. Hester cemetery caretaker.

A review of the budget, which must await until the August meeting to be adopted formally reveals few substantial changes in any of the various departments. The administrative department was appropriated \$5,047.94, compared with \$4,824.94 for the last fiscal year. Salaries coming in the department, including that of Mayor, aldermen, treasurer and mayor pro-tem, were kept at the same level, but slight increases were deemed necessary elsewhere.

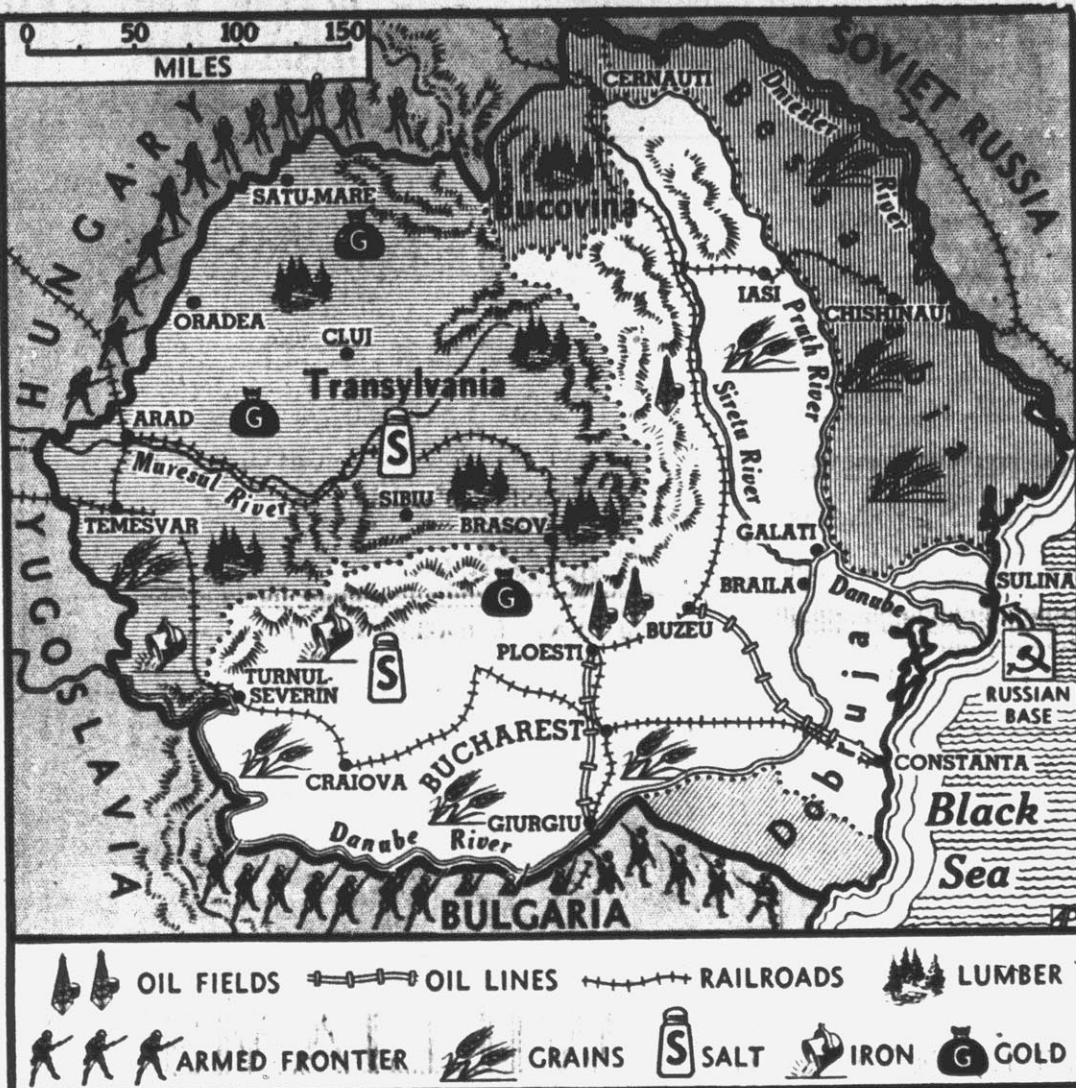

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Rumania, A Queen's Needlework, Is Ripped Apart By 2nd World War

Washington.—The international crazy quilt that is the map of Rumania was tailored by Queen Marie. Now her stitches, sewn in the post-war peace, are popping out. King Carol, the apprentice-tailor heir to her empire, already has seen a fifth of his country sheared off by Russia, Hungary and Bulgaria are waiting eagerly for other Rumanian seams to split.
Marie, and her consort, Ferdinand, made a cold-turkey horse trade with the Allies to declare war on the Central Powers in August, 1916. The Allies pledged Transylvania and Dobruja to Rumania if they won.
The mother-in-law of the Balkans earned her fee. Rumania was overrun by the German eastern armies during the World war, but in the peace, Marie shared in the pay-off as agreed. Rumania's territory was increased by 140 per cent, her population doubled.
(Bessarabia went to Rumania through no part of the deal with the Allies).

SOME FOLKS WON'T GIVE AND TAKE
