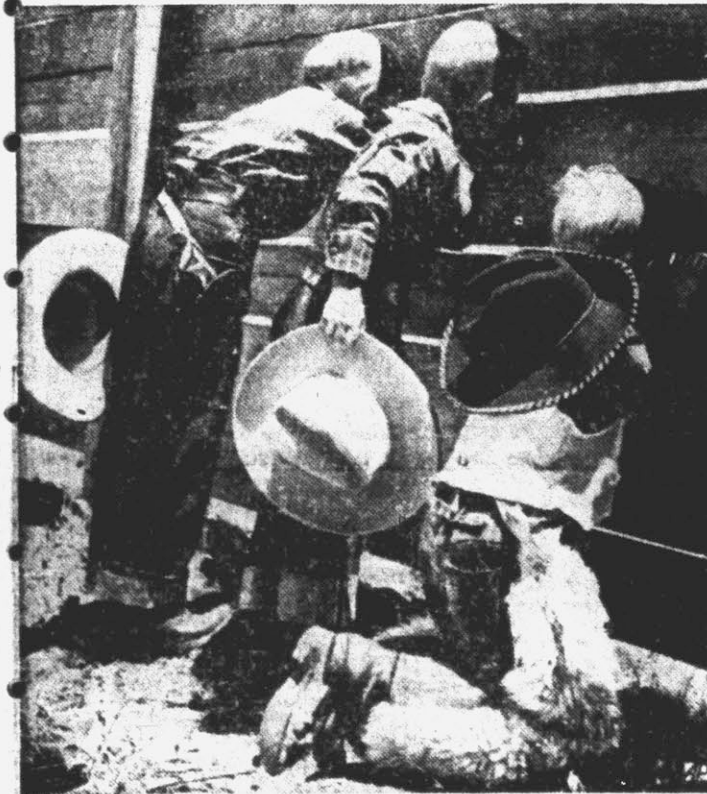

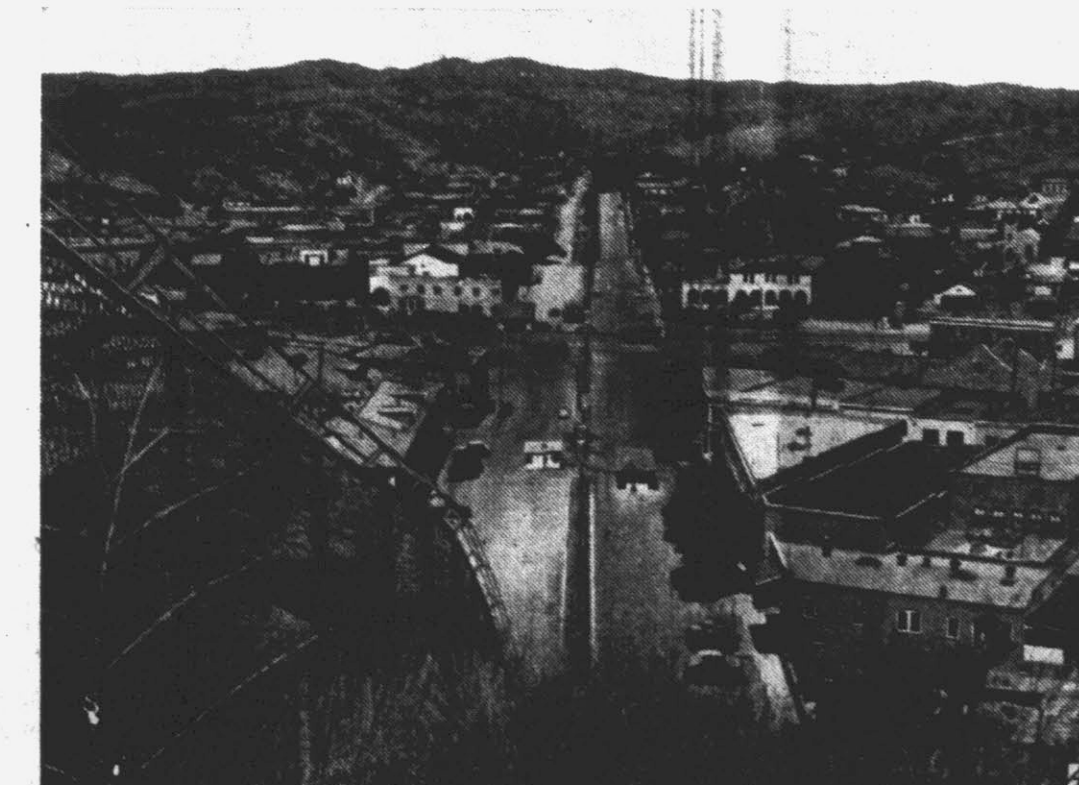

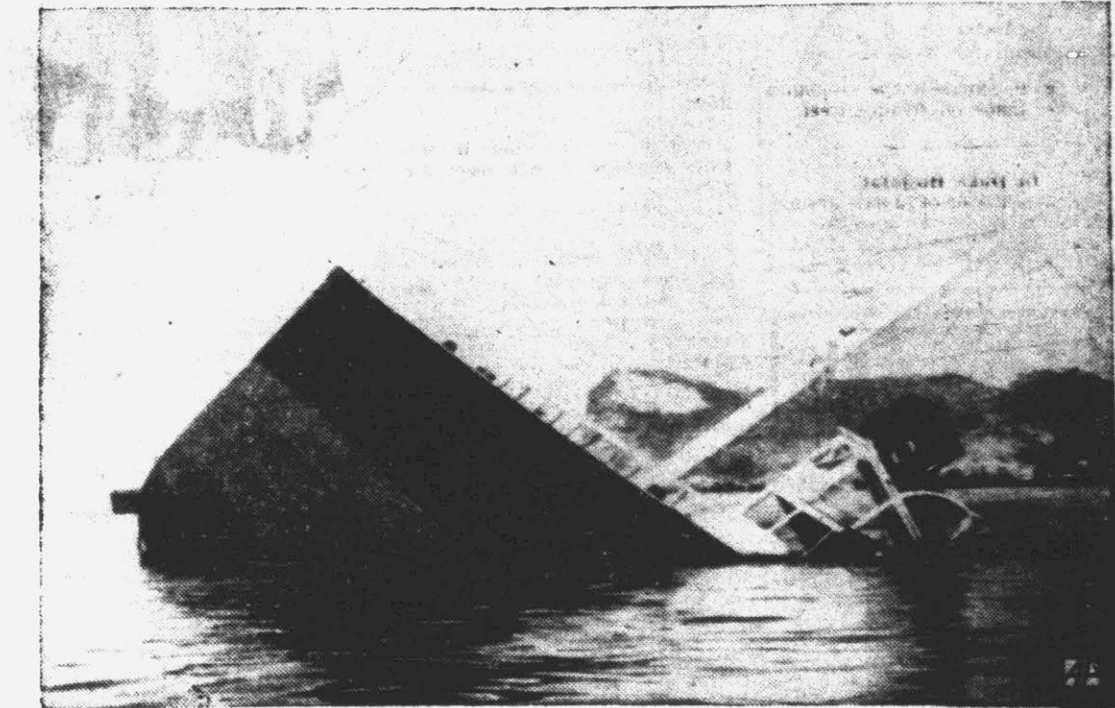

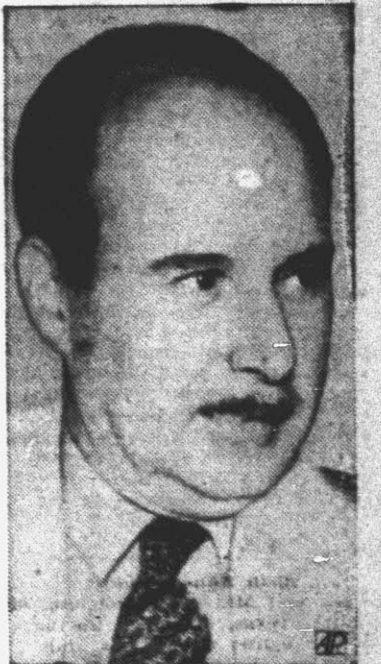

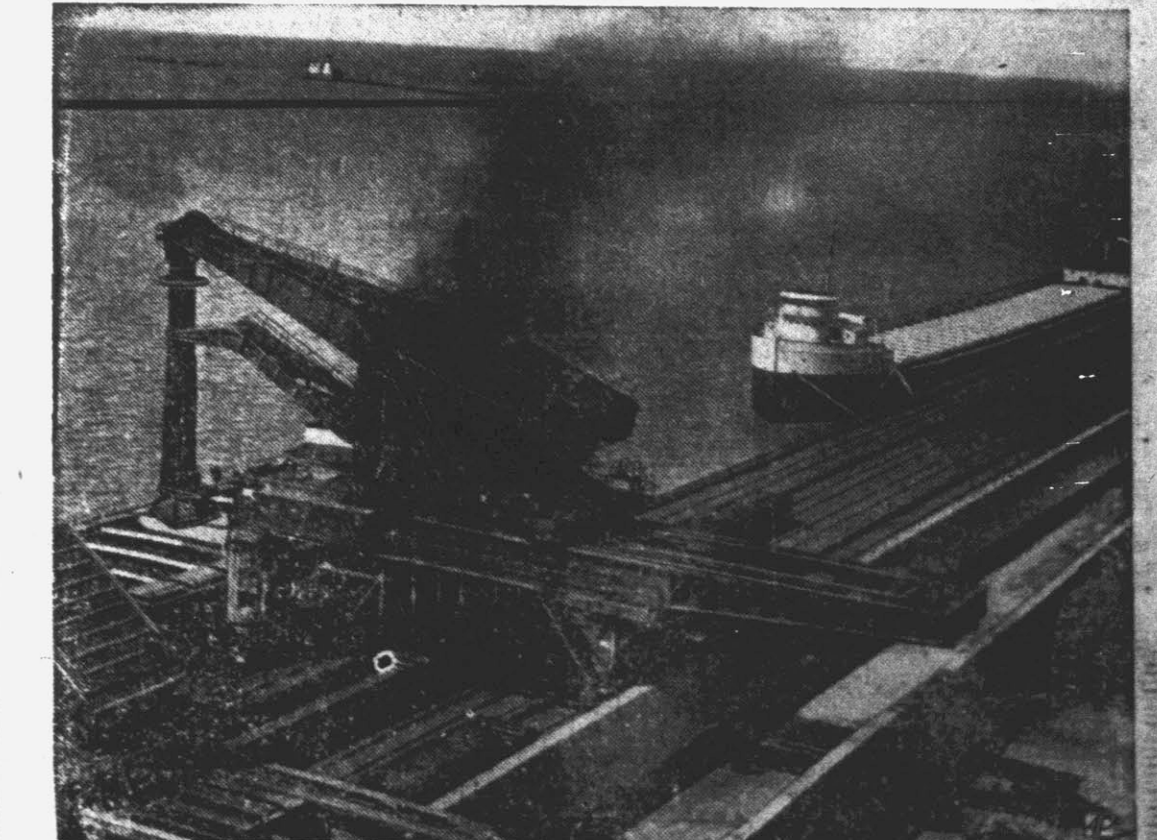

CIRCUIT BLOW DECIDES GAME

Pinion Homers With One On In Sixth For 2-0 Win

Howard Simon, young right-hander of the Tarboro club, attained membership in baseball's most coveted niche at Guy Smith stadium last night as he hurled a no-hit, no-run game against the Greenies. The visitors won 2-0.

Only five Greenville men reached first, one on an error and four via walks. The Greenies got two on third base, but were never able to get a man home. Only three local players hit to the outfield, all three going to Euse. Dal Thornton came nearer to getting a hit than any other local player, but his hard blow to right was snagged by Euse. The same fielder also made a shoestring catch of Caligiuri's blow to right early in the game.

The Cubs were able to score in only one inning. In the fifth inning Mincey singled, but was out when Schenz reached first on a fielder's choice. Big Jack Pinion, Tarboro catcher then came to bat found one to his liking and clouted a 330-foot homer over the left field wall.

Cukor came from the stage a decade or so ago with a reputation for knowing how to direct women. Women alone, and women in job lots, were all the same to him. In recent months he has more than justified his name, for he has come unscathed through the temperamental pot-pourri that made up the cast of "The Women," and he has piloted Joan Crawford and a predominantly female cast through "Susan and God" without injury to any and with much benefit to all, including himself. True, he's now but a shadow of his former self, but that's due to rigid diet, not to ducking tempestuously hurled missiles.

Cukor's next job is "Philadelphia Story." And that means his next problem is Katharine Hepburn, who used the stage play to confound her movie critics and charm even that small section of Broadway which had seen her earlier stage debacle in "The Lake." charming things. Katie was fresh—the kind of girl who, if she's tagged for speeding, would talk back to the cop and not try to be sweet and coy with him. She comes from a remarkable family, you know. She told me once how her father used to say none of his children would ever willingly attend a wedding or a funeral unless they could be the bride or the corpse.

"But she's older now, more meliowed as a person. I think she'll be more interested than ever."
