SpiritREADY TO OFFER
FOUR PROJECTS
Proposals Said To Be
Couched In Lan-
guage Indicating
Nation Desires To
CooperateHavana, July 25.—(AP)—
Argentina, the big question
mark of the Pan-American
conference on hemisphere
defense, indicated today a
desire to retain the spirit of
inter-American solidarity.Leopoldo Melo, head of the Ar-
gentine delegation, said his country
was ready to present four projects
on the following subjects:

1. Foreign possessions.
2. Inter-American neutrality and security zone.
3. Protection of children.
4. Coordination of defense measures.

The proposals, he said, are couched
in language showing Argentina
wishes to maintain the present status
of a unified hemisphere.A new United States proposal
dealing with the menace of "fifth
column" activities in the Americas
was also disclosed as the conference
awaited the text of the Argentine
project.This proposal, a companion to an
earlier proposal aimed at diplomatic
and consular officials, was described
as more sweeping in character
and designed to form a solid American
front against foreign attempts
to subvert domestic activities, to
foment disorder or set up a non-American
system of government in any
American area.Under the proposed resolution the
Americas would make suppression of
such activities a common concern
warn each other of any foreign
threats and consult fully on all
measures.Illness Fatal To

resignation of Louis Johnson as as-
sistant secretary of war and the
nomination of Robert Porter Pat-
terson of New York, judge of the Sec-
ond United States Circuit Court of
Appeals as his successor.Stephen Early, presidential sec-
retary, told reporters that "since
time immemorial" a cabinet officer
has had the right to select his as-
sistant secretary and that Henry L.
Stimson, new Secretary of War, had
asked the chief executive to name
Patterson.Early said Johnson had resigned
yesterday and flown to Bohemian
Grove near San Francisco.As soon as President Roosevelt
can get around to it, Early said
he will write Johnson an acceptance
of his resignation and "advise him
that he is confidently expecting him
as soon as he has had a rest to re-
turn to Washington for continued
service with the government."There were indications that John-
son might become a presidential ad-
ministrative assistant—filling the
last of six such jobs at the White
House."If Louis accepts the administra-
tive assistant's job—and we hope
that he will," Early said, it is the
president's intention to have him as
an official member of the White
House family, become his eyes and
ears, his progress reporter on the

Factories To Be
Erected By Britain
In This Country To
Enable Nation To
Purchase 3,000
Planes A Month In
Addition To Pre-
vious Orders

Washington, July 25.

(AP)—Secretary Morgenthau
said today the United States had
pledged "every facility" to enable the
British to buy 3,000 military air-
planes a month in this country
in addition to huge orders
previously placed.Confirming an announcement in
London by Lord Beaverbrook, the
treasury head said that the new ar-
rangement was in addition to all
previous orders and would require
construction of new factories.The British have promised to pay
for the erection of the new factories
as well as to buy their output, Mor-
genthau added.The secretary asserted that the
Treasury, War and Navy depart-
ments were in complete accord on
the commitment and that William
S. Knudsen, production member of
the defense commission, had agreed
to undertake to work out the details.He said the new factories involv-
ed in the program would give the
United States capacity to build "far
in excess" of 50,000 planes a year,
set by President Roosevelt as a goal
in his May 16 defense message. He
declined to estimate the exact cap-
acity planned.Saying that the British "mean to
have plenty of money," Morgenthau
said that the "sums involved are
colossal.""For our own national defense
and for the benefit of American in-
dustry," he continued, "I believe this
is the most important thing with
which I have come in contact."Pageant Arranged

EuropeBerlin, July 25.—(AP)—
Walter Funk, German min-
ister of economics, asserted
today that it is up to the
United States to decide
whether and to what extent
it will trade with Europe
after the war, but it must
abandon the idea it can force
its economic terms upon Ger-
many or Europe.Funk, in an interview published in
Vienna and broadcast by the Ger-
man radio, gave for the first time
an authoritative outline of the new
economic system which Fuehrer
Adolf Hitler plans to impose on the
continent.He said there would be no attempt
to make Europe entirely self-suffi-
cient, since "certain products will
always be lacking in Europe," but
trade with overseas countries will
be on the barter basis."To what extent we shall trade
with the United States," Funk said,
"is absolutely left in the hands of
Americans themselves.""If the United States wishes to
contribute again to the development
of an international economic sys-
tem it will have to get rid of its
false method of trying to make the
United States the biggest creditor
nation and at the same time the
biggest export country in the world.""The United States must abandon
the idea that it can force its eco-
nomic terms upon Germany or Eu-
rope. For trade with South Ameri-
can countries we do not require

Subjected To EmbargoScrap Iron And Other
Scrap Metal Also
On ListWashington, July 25.—(AP)—
President Roosevelt today added pe-
troleum and petroleum products,
scrap iron and other scrap metal to
the list of commodities subject to
possible embargo.He signed an order subjecting
these to a system of export licensing
should it be deemed necessary soon
after Secretary Morgenthau con-
firmed stoppage of two shipments
of oil to Spain.The order amended a proclama-
tion and regulations issued last July
2 designed to keep in this country
materials essential to the national
defense.Stephen Early, presidential sec-
retary, said the order did not mean
an embargo was being placed on
these products, but that the authori-
ty merely was being provided to
control shipments to other coun-
tries.While Morgenthau would supply
no reason for the oil shipment stop-
pages, it was learned elsewhere that
a virtual embargo already had been
established to prevent the oil from
reaching Germany and Italy

SINKS VESSELSmall Nazi Craft
Speeds Across Chan-
nel To Sink Armed
Merchantship Near
British Naval Base;
Nazi Air Bombs Are
Dropped Within 12
Miles Of London;

Nazi bombs fell 12 miles
from the outskirts of London
today, the German high
command reported, while in
another daring operation a
50-mile-an-hour Nazi tor-
pedo speedboat sped 60
miles across the British chan-
nel to sink an armed mer-
chant ship near Britain's
great naval base at Portland.Speeding over the rough channel
waters too fast for the big long-
range guns of the naval base to
make it an effective target, the Ger-
man sea raider got in its knockout
blow on an 18,000-ton craft and
gashed home again.The Nazi high command's report
of this spectacular feat was quickly
countered by Britain's First Lord of
the Admiralty, A. V. Alexander, who
declared the craft was the French
ship Meknes with nearly 1,300
French officers and men on board
—en route home to German-con-
quered France."I have just heard the German
high command admit responsibility
for this sinking," Alexander told the
House of Commons."The boat was flying the French
flag and had the French colors
painted on deck and sides and was
fully illuminated."

About 1,000 men were saved.

The German high command said
German planes bombed the big
British aircraft factory at Wey-
bridge, just 12 miles from London.The raid came as Britain claimed
victory in the first major phase of
the five-week-old struggle against
Nazi conquest—by repeated violent
attacks on German bases across the
channel—and at the same time
tightened her blockade of the Reich.With more than 1,000 massed air
raids a London spokesman said the
British Royal Air Force now has
"made it extremely difficult for Ger-
many to organize mass attacks on
this country from airbases in Hol-
land, Belgium and France or from
bases the enemy hopes to establish
in Norway."The British report, taken at face
value, might at least partially ex-
plain the mystery of Hitler's delay
in launching his long-threatened
blitzkrieg on Britain.Hitler's warplanes, nevertheless,
kept up the bombing of the United
Kingdom.Anti-aircraft guns chattered again
on the southeast coast and the sky
was reported "alive with aircraft"
as about 80 German raiders swarmed
down to attack a merchant convoy
in the English channel. British
fighter planes quickly sent them
fleeing.The Air Ministry announced that
ground defenses and fighters shot
down four German planes partici-
pating in the raid. A fifth craft was
downed by defenders off northeast
Scotland.Lower layers of rock in the Ba-

For Sale: Long Island's Mansions — You'll Not See Their Like Again

Roslyn, N. Y.—Long Island's great estates are vanishing one by one.

Some of the most famous were doomed only this summer by changing times. At least one country estate is being torn down to save taxes. Others have been sold and their landscaped gardens and private golf courses cut up into neat suburban plots.

The financial kings who built these show places are gone and their wealth divided among children who have homes of their own. Taxes and upkeep would make terrible dents even in ample incomes.

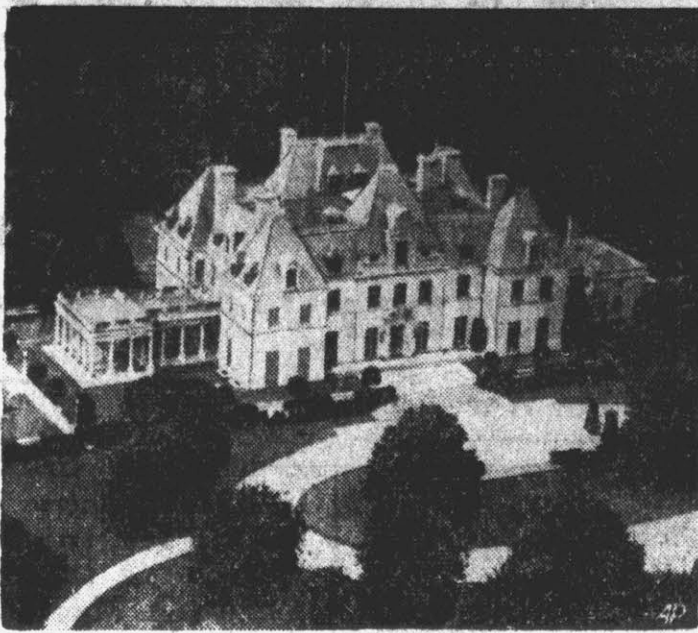
But there's more than death and taxes behind it all. There's a new mode of life. The young bloods seem to have no taste for the pomp and circumstances which the old generation loved. They like both their houses and their parties simpler and gayer.

Diamonds And Champagne

Latest of the great Long Island mansions marked for the wrecker is Colonel Henry H. Rogers' beach house at Southampton. Built with millions that gushed from oil wells it will soon be torn down, at an estimated cost of \$10,000, because of taxes and upkeep.

The 50-room stucco house, with its lavish furnishings and formal gardens, was the scene of glittering parties while Colonel Rogers lived. Guests whose names made headlines chatted with him over cigars in the blue-walled library, and champagne and diamonds sparkled in the huge drawing room, furnished with Italian antiques. After his death it was rarely occupied.

Oheka—Otto Kahn's famous 440-acre place at Woodbury, L. I., also reflects the change of the times. During the life of the famous banker and art patron, the 100-room "French chateau," crammed with art treasures and books worth a fortune, was the showplace of the countryside. Its parties, always made

company to be platted for commuters' homes. Mrs. Graham Fair Vanderbilt's 115-acre estate at Manhasset has already been subdivided. Another Long Island show place offered for sale is the late Clarence Mackay's big Roslyn estate, where the Duke of Windsor was entertained as Prince of Wales. Samuel Untermyer who died last March, disposed of his suburban estate by proffering it to New York state for a public park.

Thus the estates are following the Fifth avenue mansions into the limbo of the past. As the owner of one of these mansions, filled with a fortune in art treasures, summed up the trend of the times recently when he was showing a reporter his house: "Take a good look. You'll never see the like of this again."

But the project was abandoned this spring when the Department of Sanitation sought partial exemption from taxes on the place and the Huntington, L. I., town board opposed the plan. The estate reverted to the Kahn heirs and was sold recently to a real estate development

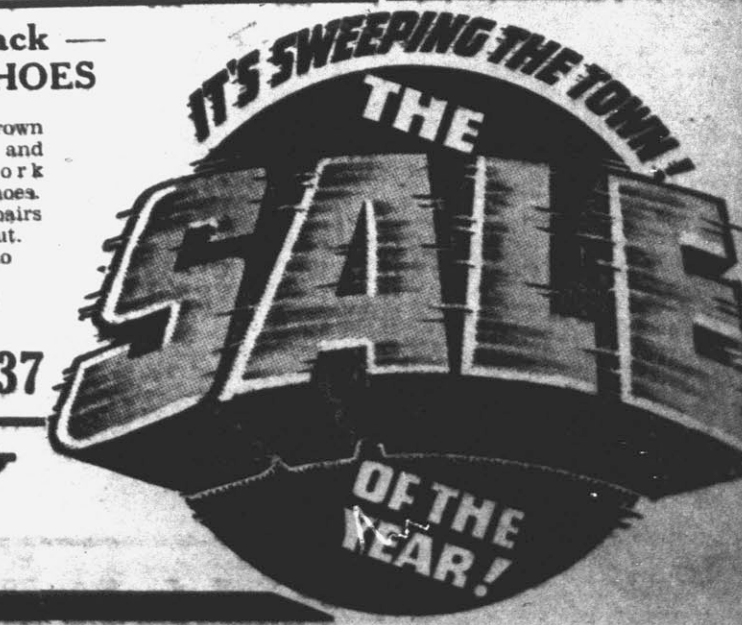

Washington Daybook

Washington—Things to be remembered about the Chicago convention:
In spite of the stamped which Wendell L. Willkie's unique method of political blitzkrieg stated at Philadelphia, no one at Chicago makes any effort to duplicate it. James A. Farley did a lot of lobby-hopping but it was nothing like Willkie's lone wolf prowls on the



hunt for delegates. Sen. Burton K. Wheeler generally was around his headquarters, receiving delegates and friends. Sen. "Jimmy" Byrnes was accessible when you could catch him, but that was about as simple as catching a bat on the wing. Paul V. McNutt dropped into his palatial headquarters occasionally to pose for pictures. But Willkie still in the one-and-only when it comes to upsetting the traditional apple-cart of convention campaigning.

Ladies' Hats In Ring
It was Sen. Alva B. Adams, the Coloradoan, who dug up that 44-year-old plank in the Democratic Platform of 1896, that "no man should be eligible for a third term of the presidential office." If he had gone back to 1912, the first convention that President Roosevelt attended, he would have found a plank favoring a single term for the President. Platforms reflect the issues and the threats of the day. In 1912, the threat to the Democratic party were both President Taft and former President Theodore Roosevelt.

Those Jittery Police
Not even political conventions are free of the practical joker pests. One stuck a firecracker into the vest pocket of one of the delegates and lighted it. It was just outside one of the Stadium entrances and the speed with which the police descended on the unfortunate victim is a demonstration of how jittery we are these days.

Whenever my modesty threatens to desert me about this pillar of type, I recall that it took a little more than a million words a day to keep you all informed of what went on at the conventions. Of course, no paper can carry a million words. The special correspondents and the duplicating services to various papers and groups of papers accounted for the vast verbiage.

Nearly everyone I talked to at the convention agreed that it was the pressure of delegate and public sentiment that forced Roosevelt into the statement he made through Sen. Alben Barkley. The convention had bogged down as if wading in a swamp and the delegates were miserable and lifeless. The powers that be insisted they had a job to do and frantically pleaded with FDR to give it to them.

Short Shots

Raleigh, July 25.—J. M. Broughton, who will be governor of North Carolina after early next January (G. O. P. nominee McNeill has taken virtual exception to this statement before it is made), isn't very likely to go looking for anything to scrap about in the matter of organizing the next General Assembly.
Mr. Broughton isn't the kind of man who'd go looking for a fight just for the fun of it anyhow, but the very real reason he will keep very, very neutral in the unessential (to him) of the legislature is the fact that he will be a "minority" governor with the law makers, just as he was with the Democratic voters.

Man About Manhattan

New York.—The little man with the wistful face and the baggy pants has not always had his share of luck from those who control the destinies of the children of Broadway. Trooping into stage doors glowing with hope and trooping out again with blasted dreams is not a novel experience for Jimmy Savo. No one can remember when the critics have not written well of him, but somehow his luck has been to be assigned to plays that have seldom "wowed 'em" at the box office. For this reason one of the greatest, if not the greatest, pantomime artists in the whole length and breadth of the American theater is little known away from Broadway.
But maybe 1940, with its carnage of wars, its horrors and famines and political upheavals, will come through with a new coin of luck for Jimmy Savo. He is in Maine now trying out a new musical comedy—a show that he owns himself and he will bring it to Broadway this summer. Inquire after this show and he will tell you "It's a one-man revue, full length, and its title is 'Mum's the Word.'"

A suggestive title, this. The Savo style is pantomime, not sound. Charlie Chaplin calls him the "greatest pantomime artist in the world," and perhaps he is. His appeal is pathetic. Other comedians make you laugh. Just as often Savo makes you want to weep.

Ben Hecht and Charles MacArthur once wrote a scenario, and then filmed a picture with Savo as the star. It was the story of a little Russian hero hobo who wandered through France, finding trouble wherever he turned, and the final fadeout had him trudging down a country road in his baggy pants and his over-flowing shirt, hurt but not down, a wisp of cheer shining through eyes that in anyone else would be dimmed in disillusionment.

As a finished product it was not a good picture. There were obvious theatrical flaws. But moments in it rank, in this observers opinion, with the best patho-comedy ever put on film.

You must not imagine, from the foregoing, that Jimmy has not made money, and that he is not able to get jobs, or that he is on relief. You don't own Broadway revues when you are broke. But only occasionally, since the days when he was worrying his mother half to death as a kid practicing ledgerdom on her juggling soup spoons, or attempting to balance the kitchen stove on his chin, has he come in to the rewards he deserves.

In Broadway restaurants Savo is as shy as Paul Kunasz says, as a Disney deer. He seems uneasy in crowds. This isn't true at all times. It is only that the gift of pantomime, which always has reflected a wistful sort of pathos, makes him appear that way.

In "Mum's the Word" Savo will sing one song—a special number written for him by the great musical comedy song writing team of Rogers and Hart. Otherwise he will be in pantomime—first as a Swedish maiden, then, in this order, as a hospital orderly, a lonely hunchback, a character from Moliere, a Chinese concert singer, a sentimental laundress, and last, as Eve.
I don't know how long this show will last, or what Broadway will think of it, but if there is only one person I would like to see get all the breaks that anybody can get on a break-queer street like Broadway, it is this same shy little Italian-American in the baggy pants.

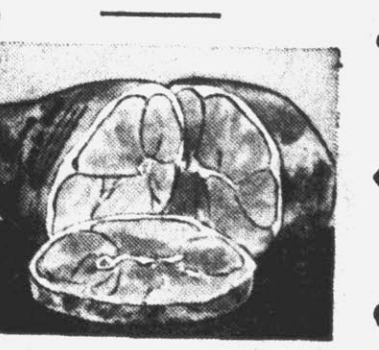

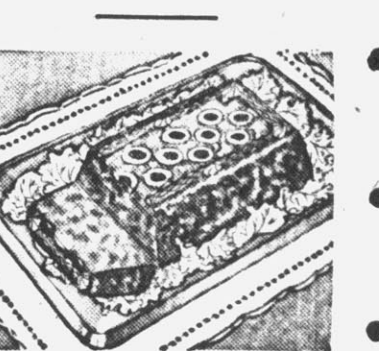

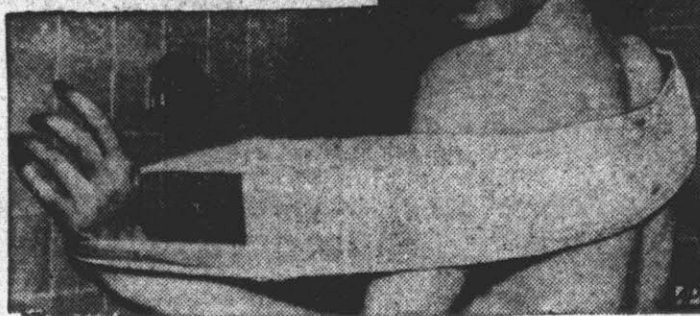

JEFFERSON DIRECTORS HEAR REPORT OF GAINS

Roscoe Cox, W. E. Hooker and L. M. Buchanan, local representatives of the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company of Greensboro, have received the annual report of the company's operations in 1939, as presented by President Julian Price at the semi-annual meeting of the directors.

Assets of the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company increased \$3,800,000 during the first six months of this year, directors of the concern were told at their semi-annual meeting yesterday.

This average gain of \$650,000 a month brought total assets of the company up to \$91,300,000, President Julian Price, who presided, said in his report.

President Price's report showed continuous gains in all departments, and was heard with satisfaction by the board.

During the past six months, new sales by Jefferson Standard came to \$24,000,000, bringing the company's total life insurance in force to \$411,000,000 as of June 30.

Payments to policyholders and beneficiaries came to \$3,367,000 in the period bringing to \$115,000,000 the total paid out since the company was organized.

The surplus account was increased by \$275,000 making a total capital and surplus of \$5,275,000.

Mr. Price reported the company had \$132,000,000 of life insurance in force in North Carolina, leading the 26 southern and southwestern states in which it operates. Texas stands second with \$72,000,000.

Directors declared the usual dividend of 75 cents per share.

In spite of a difficult investment situation, Mr. Price reported, the company had "very satisfactory experience" in this field. Even in the face of the uncertainty of changing world conditions, the president expressed himself as optimistic over the future of life insurance in the United States.

W. A. Blair of Winston-Salem, and W. G. Clark, Sr., of Tarboro, were named to draw up a resolution of respect to the late Julius W. Cone, board member who died this year. His successor was not chosen.

Directors and officials of the company were entertained at a luncheon at the Hamilton Lakes home of Julius C. Smith, vice-president and general counsel.

Acknowledge Loss Of Transport Ship

London, July 25.—(AP)—Authorized sources said today that 2,823 persons were missing in the sinking of the Cunard liner *Lancastria* at anchor off St. Nazaire during the evacuation of British troops from France.

There were 2,477 known survivors of the 5,300 aboard.

Others, however, may have saved themselves by swimming or wading ashore and falling into German hands.

The 16,243-ton *Lancastria*, struck by bombs from Nazi planes, took a heavy list which hampered the launching of lifeboats.

She capsized and sank within half

an hour of the attack. The exact date was not given but the evacuation was in mid-June.

A number of women and children refugees were among the 5,300 passengers. How many of these were lost is not known.

Seven WPA Projects Approved For State

Raleigh, July 25.—(AP)—The WPA announced today approval of seven projects which will cost \$166,548 and will provide jobs for 323 persons.

Projects include: Vance county, to build and improve roads, \$51,411 and 125 workers; Wilson county, to build a school, \$33,912 and 46 workers.

UNC WILL HAVE NO ROTC UNIT

Committee, However, To Make Study Of Air Aid

Reflector Bureau.

Raleigh, July 25.—A special meeting of a special committee from the Board of Trustees of the University of North Carolina will meet with Governor Clyde R. Hoey next week and formerly announce that there will be no program of military training at Chapel Hill.
The Governor's call for the "purpose of considering the question of military training at the University of North Carolina" sounds as though the group would really discuss and perhaps, debate the issue, but word sent out by the U. S. War Department some time ago knocked the Chapel Hill ROTC project flatter than a well stepped on flour.
The War Department, through Assistant Secretary of War Louis Johnson, informed that there will be no new ROTC units set up anywhere, in view of the fact that the government has decided to rely upon the principle of compulsory training rather than upon a ROTC program.
What the UNC committee will discuss, however, is what the University can do to assist the government in its program of intensive and rapid training for its air force personnel.
The University is already participating, of course, in the current program, but its activities are of necessity confined largely to "ground" training in view of the lack of proper air field facilities any closer than Raleigh. Some university students come here for regular flight training along with their colleagues from North Carolina State College.
Members of the special committee, which has been called by the governor to meet on July 31, are Federal Circuit Court Justice John J. Parker of Charlotte; Former Governor O. Max Gardner, of Shelby; and J. C. B. Ehringhaus of Raleigh; L. P. McElendon of Greensboro; Charles A. Jones of Lincoln; and H. P. Grier of Statesville.

Sights And Sounds

Hollywood—John Barrymore says "The Great Profile" is not—definitely not—a life history of John Barrymore. He admits, with a lift of the screen's most expressive eyebrows, that the character does bear coincidental "resemblances."
"In the first place," he says with a sardonic chuckle, "the hero is a ham actor. In the second, he's nuts. In the third, he is forever hearing the clank of jail doors and begins to miss them when they stop. They become like the music of cyphals to him, ha! I myself have lived lately amid so much noise—the sound of the city—that when I sought quiet I couldn't rest.... But no—it's not the story of my life. This picture—and it's very funny—is a compendium of all hams!"
John is attired as Hamlet, sitting on the sidelines of his set, but he's not doing it straight—"a ham Hamlet," he explains.
The "great profile" is not the heroic figure he once was, but there's life, and plenty of it, in the old boy yet. And his fund of stories—related with gusto and liberally sprinkled with picturesque, inimitable profanity—has not been depleted. Mention of Winston Churchill sets him going, recalling the first time he met the man who is now Britain's war chieftain. It was at a party in Scotland, at which they played charades, and Churchill—"really a great fellow for fun, with a marvelous humor"—got himself up as a buxom scrub-lady, complete with red nose and generously padded chest.
Speaking of Churchill reminds him—"I saw an old friend of mine today. Tiny Jones...."
Tiny is a bright-eyed, diminutive Welsh woman who plays bits and parts and is a long-time Barrymore favorite. When John was making "The Man from Blankley's" 10 years ago the same Winston Churchill, visiting in Hollywood, called on Barrymore on the set. It made quite a good story at the time, because John presented one friend to the visitor and casually ignored the others—his fellow actors, the director, and all else but Tiny.
"Tiny" recalls John, "was all aflutter when she saw Churchill and asked if she might shake his hand. They sat down together and talked quite a while. All I could hear was Tiny saying, 'Oh, no, Mr. Churchill!'"
John asked Tiny later what they'd been discussing and Tiny said, "Fruit Mr. Barrymore. Fruit. He was asking if it were true what he heard about the fruit out here, and I was telling him it wasn't."
Mrs. Barrymore, the famous Elaine, is not in "The Great Profile." Mary Beth Hughes is the girl, and one of John's conferees in comedy is Gregory Ratoff, temporarily abandoning direction to resume his old career.
Ratoff thinks John is "wonderful" and John thinks Ratoff is "marvelous." Ratoff is cast as the great ham's manager, and they have a scene in which Ratoff expostulates violently with his Hamlet for his latest escapade.
It is interesting to watch Ratoff, the genius pitted against Barrymore, the genius of the genius ham. Ratoff is roaringly funny, but the scenes are that Barrymore—with his "serious" expression—

Jim Farley, who, reports say, is quitting politics to head a syndicate paying more than \$4,000,000 for the New York Yankees, was a national sports figure as New York Athletic Commissioner from 1925-1933. He introduced the no-foul boxing rule and sent the Dempsey-Tunney 1926 heavyweight championship fight to Philadelphia by holding that Negro Harry Wills was the logical contender and that Dempsey must meet him before Tunney or fight outside New York. Farley made influential

friends by giving away free tickets. Sports people like Jim. As one explained, "He will never throw you a curve," meaning that Farley always gives a straightforward answer. Farley has said he held the Postmaster General job (salary \$15,000) at a financial sacrifice. He should make several times that sum as Yankee boss. Rumors in recent years have had him resigning to become (1) baseball commissioner, (2) boxing czar, (3) turf ruler, (4) pro football commissioner. As a youngster, 6-foot-3 Farley was known as "Stretch," fancy-fiddling Grassy Point, N. Y., first baseman.

He's a turf enthusiast, rarely misses a Kentucky Derby. He generally sees Notre Dame-Army, Army-Navy football games each fall.



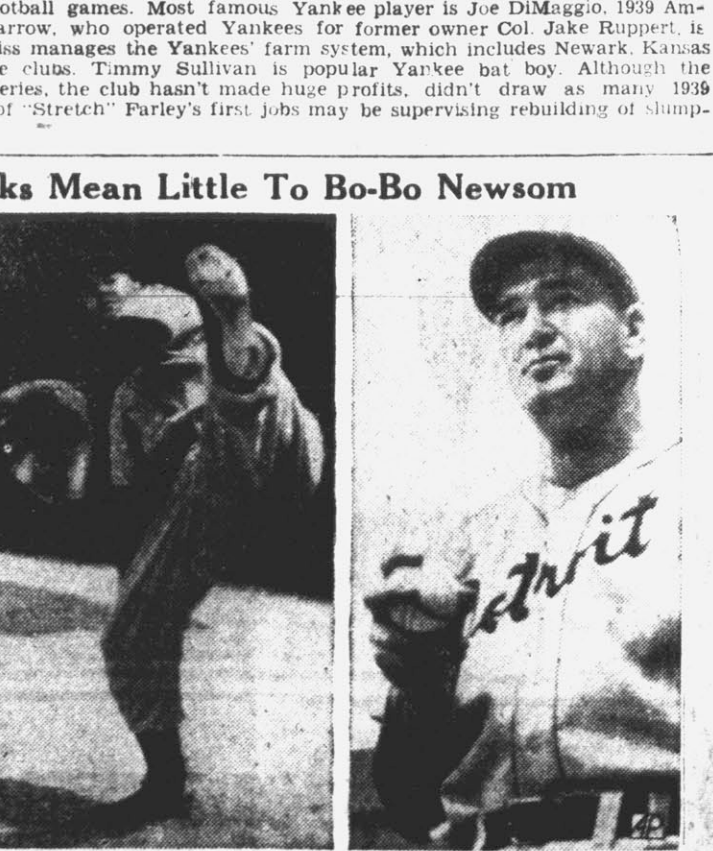

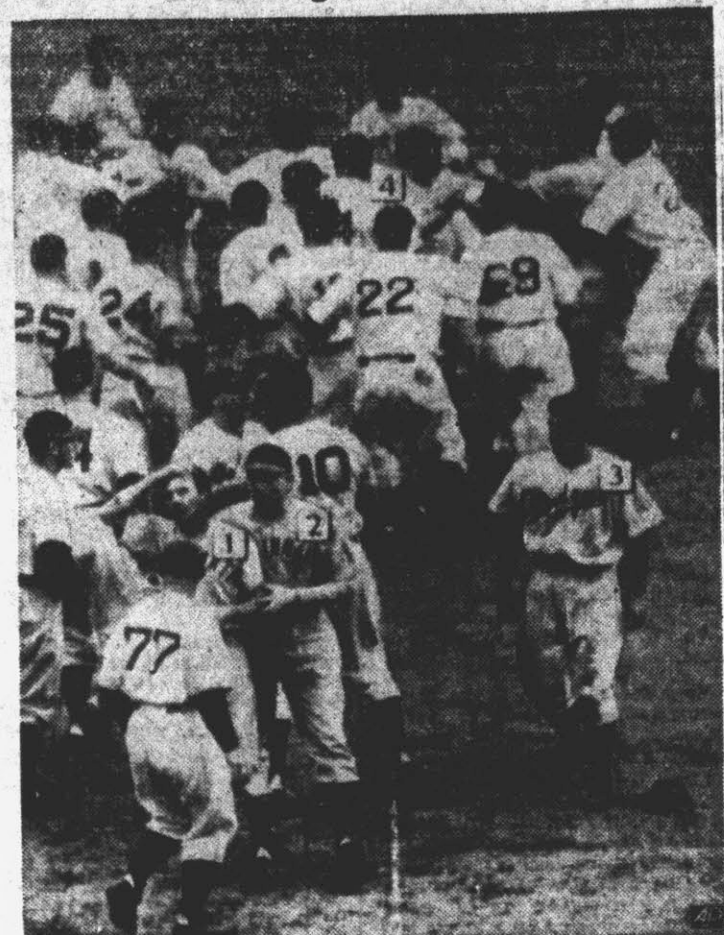

British Blitzkrieg Dreamed Years Ago

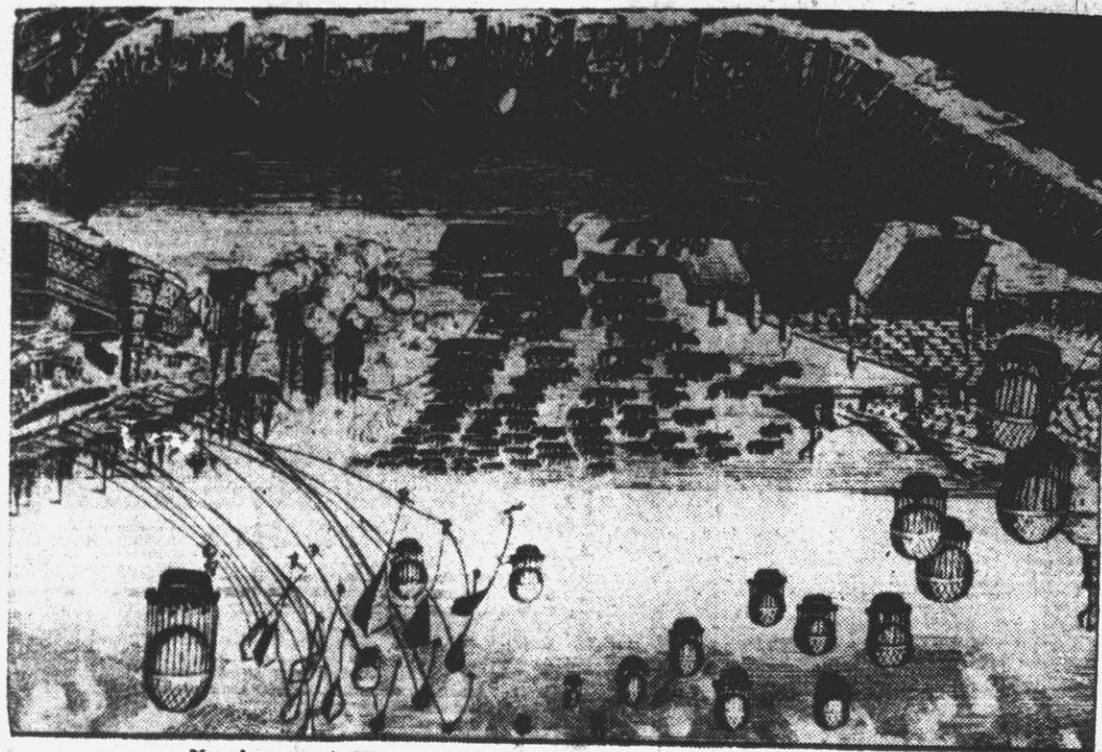
Parachute troops, air armadas and all the other innovations of the war in Europe really aren't new at all. They were conceived in the nineteenth century by imaginative artists.

The sketch at the right appeared in the German magazine Ueber Land Und Meer in 1895. The artist pictured hordes of parachute troops wearing wing-like contrivances. He saw, too, that anti-aircraft guns would be developed. The artist was specific in his location, the attacked area representing an English port.

Much earlier—in 1804—Napoleon I had a plan for invading England. The idea is presented in the sketch below—from "Paris und London." 1804. It was Napoleon's theory that if he could master the English channel for 24 hours, he could transport 150,000 men to England in flat-bottomed scows. One suggested plan for attack included a tunnel under the channel, through which soldiers would march.

BENEFIT FUND HAS \$100,000

Officers' Fund Has Large Cash Balance On Hand

Raleigh, July 25.—The North Carolina Law Enforcement Officers' Benefit fund has a cash balance of more than one hundred thousand dollars on hand at the end of the fiscal year, report of an audit of the fund made to State Auditor George Ross Pou shows.

This balance of \$114,838.54 is more than five times as much as the fund has paid out in benefits during its four years in existence. In the last year there was paid out \$11,100, which added to the benefits of \$10,900 previously paid brought the total benefits paid to \$22,000.

Last year's receipts reached \$18,325.72, of which all but \$20,000 came from collection of the \$1 special costs added by the legislature to every criminal conviction in North Carolina. Of each dollar collected, fifty cents goes to maintenance of the State Bureau of Investigation and identification and the other fifty cents to the law enforcement officers' benefit fund. Whenever the SBI's share exceeds the cost of its operation the balance is turned over to the benefit fund. Twenty thousand dollars was thus transferred in the fiscal year ended June 30.

The next legislature is sure to be urged to place the SBI on a regular appropriation basis, the agency to be maintained wholly from the general fund, the entire dollar of special costs to go to the benefit fund. Any surplus over benefits paid would be diverted to the retirement feature now provided for law enforcement officers who pay into this special fund three per cent of their salaries.

The audit revealed that the benefit fund's operation is not subject to depletion by payment of large administrative salaries.

John R. Morris, former sheriff of New Hanover county is listed as drawing \$825 and \$1,065.24 in travel expenses for the year. The only other salary item of \$1,020 for Patty Penn.

Since setting up of the benefit fund, courts all over the state have turned in a total of \$251,131.32 as follows: Superior courts \$9,272.18; county courts \$66,452.14; city courts \$125,594.50; and justice of the peace courts \$49,811.50.

This being only half the special \$100 cost collection, it is evident that the courts have collected in all something more than half a million dollars from this source.

That means there have been slightly more than half a million convictions in criminal cases in the last four years and in which the costs have been collected. That gives an average of about 125,000 convictions a year or more than 10,000 convictions a month in North Carolina.

Mr. Pou said that the fund is in a very healthy state. He is furnishing to every sheriff in North Carolina a copy of the report showing collections for the past year, and from what courts and J. P.'s they came. With his copy as a basis, each sheriff can check pretty well on the accuracy and completeness of the reports and money being turned in by the inferior courts, particularly the J. P.'s.

JAMES FLEMING HOME AFTER FLEEING PARIS

tulation of the Belgian king and the fall of France's seven best motorized divisions, his group decided it was time to leave.

He related how he and Mr. Hummer worked all night packing important documents and files in the latter's office. He told of German planes flying over the city while they were working in the offices, but said they were not especially frightened since they had become accustomed to this, although Paris had been bombed only one time. He recalled that on this one occasion—the time Ambassador Bullitt came very close to being struck by a bomb—that he was eating lunch. The planes were so high, he said, that they could not be seen, but the roar of the propellers from the 200 or so planes filled the air.

Upon preparing to leave, members of the party realized that extra automobiles would be needed and an old Cadillac was purchased, making three automobiles in all.

After starting to leave about lunch time on June 11, the party was delayed until the next morning because of the bursting of a tire on the newly purchased second-hand car. Mr. Fleming said it was impossible to buy a tire as he recounted with mixed disgust and amusement how the three on the automobile delayed them several days on different occasions.

Upon leaving Paris the party only thought they would retire to southern France, no one believing that France would lay down its arms or be subdued by the Germans. They were heading for Hendaye, just inside France from the Spanish border, where Mrs. Hummer and her two children had been since last summer.

As developments continued to increase in their seriousness, however, the party decided to leave Europe. This was not so easily done as decided.

In order to enter Spain it was necessary for a person to have a ticket to sail. In order to leave France a person had to have a Portuguese visa as Spain did not want war refugees to remain within its borders, although as Mr. Fleming had put it, France had opened its frontiers to the Spanish during the Spanish civil war. In order to secure a Portuguese visa a person must have a ticket on a vessel leaving Portugal. Mr. Hummer went to Bordeaux and secured these only a few hours before that city was completely closed to all persons because of the already crowded conditions there.

Mr. Fleming related many incidents. While on the international bridge between France and Spain an official took up all passports to make some official note on them. When he started to return the passports it was found that Mr. Hummer's was missing. After several hours of searching an American slightly intoxicated was waving one about, declaring that he had declared his money and was on his way. It developed that the passport was that of the local man.

Mr. Fleming also told of taking a Norwegian girl who had been studying in Paris and who had not heard from her family since that country was invaded, with them when they left Paris. The girl, without funds and nowhere to go, was taken to a hotel in Saint Jean de Luz, where she was to try and find work.

Although the party managed to get enough gas, the fuel was scarce

and one night was spent at a filling station in Blois operated by an American Legionnaire waiting for the delivery truck to arrive. They were forced to pay two dollars per gallon for gasoline in Spain.

It was impossible to make any time as the roads were crowded with refugees—two and three cars abreast with bicycle riders and pedestrians on the side of the road.

On the trip from Paris to Hendaye, the party went around Tours, seat of the French government at that time, because they realized that it probably would be under heavy Nazi bombardment.

During the five-day trip members of the party slept and ate in their automobiles. Little or no food was available at restaurants and there were no accommodations for sleeping at most places.

Traffic moved slowest at the International bridge between France and Spain, where it would take hours to move even a few feet because of the required technicalities to cross the border.

Mr. Fleming said that a few Americans remained in Paris and probably were there today, but that most of them left.

He expressed the lightning-like force with which Germany struck stunned France and she was never able to get sufficiently organized to curb the drive.

He said the respect which the French had for Pétain possibly prevented a revolution, as the average man did not want to lay down arms under terms dictated by Germany.

There is no doubt, he said, that the present Pétain government is merely a "puppet" regime acting under domination of Germany.

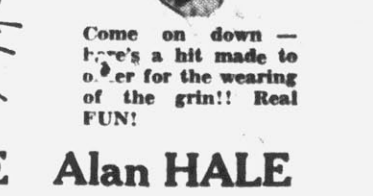
