

RUMANIA YIELDS UNDER THREAT OF AXIS POWERS

HOUSE GROUPS MAKING STUDY OF DRAFT BILL

Cox Opposes Conscriptio Of Manufacturing Plants

VOORHIS ASSAILS WILLKIE'S VIEW

Defense Appropriation Measure Goes To Senate-House Conference For Adjustments

Washington, Aug. 30. — (AP)—Representative Cox (D.-Ga.), contended today that sponsors of that section of the pending Burke-Wadsworth training bill which would empower the government to take over plants needed for defense "were taking advantage of a state of excitement to turn the government further to the left."

Cox made the statement as the House Rules committee, of which he is a member, discussed procedure for debate next week on the House bill calling for registration of men from 21 to 44, inclusive, and making them liable for a year's military training.

At the morning session the committee heard proponents of the legislation argue its merits, but postponed until later in the day a decision on whether to grant legislative right-of-way for its consideration on the House floor.

The House military committee approved the measure yesterday without the factory use proposal, but arranged to meet again next Tuesday morning to consider whether the members would offer it during the debate.

Rep. Voorhis (D.-Calif.) told the House that it appeared to him that Wendell L. Willkie was "putting human rights in one category and property rights in another."

Voorhis referred to the Republican presidential nominee's opposition to the Senate amendment empowering the government to take over manufacturing plants if necessary for national defense.

"He is willing for young men to be conscripted, but not willing for property to be conscripted so those young men will have the necessary weapons with which to protect themselves. It seems to me utterly inconsistent," Voorhis said.

Pre-debate skirmishing opened up in the House on the conscription bill with a group of foes assailing it as "unnecessary" and its advocates predicting that it would ride through to overwhelming approval by the end of next week.

A \$5,133,628.27 defense appropriation, passed speedily by the Senate yesterday, was sent to a Senate House conference committee today for a consideration of differing versions passed by the two bodies, thus delaying final action until acceptance of the committee's recommendations by both houses, probably next week.

The bill carries funds to start construction of 200 warships for a "two-ocean" navy and more than 14,000 airplanes.

Applications Filed To Remove Trains

Application for the removal of the Kingston-Rocky Mount and Washington-Parmae passenger trains has been filed with the North Carolina Utilities Commission by the Atlantic Coast Line Railway, but no date for a hearing has been set.

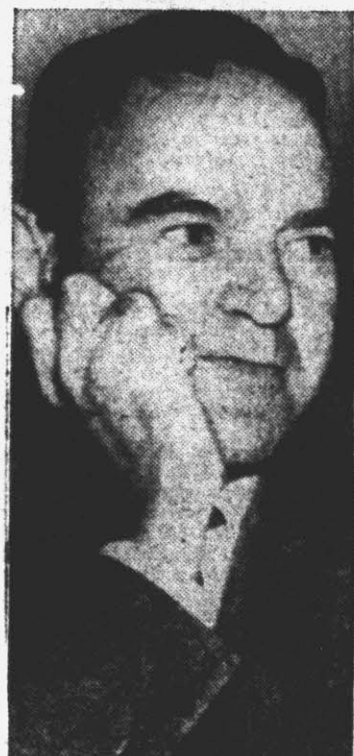
If the application is granted, the trains operating from Kingston to Rocky Mount and return, which provide service for Greenville, will be discontinued and the Washington-Parmae passenger service also will be discontinued.

A movement has been started in Pitt, Edgecombe and Lenoir counties to oppose the application when it is heard. The Pitt County Board of Commissioners agreed to cooperate with officials of other counties and a committee composed of Chairman J. N. Williams, M. B. Hodges and County Attorney M. K. Blount was authorized to spend a nominal sum of money in the fight. If it is found that a considerable expenditure is required, however, the committee will report back to the board for instructions.

The Greenville City schools will open Tuesday, September 3, and all indications are that the schools will have a large enrollment and that they will have the best year in their history. The faculty is practically complete; the buildings have been re-painted and repaired; the state textbooks for pupils have been received; and everything is ready to go.

In the Training school there are no changes. There will be the same principal and the same teachers.

In the Third Street school there is one change, brought about by the resignation of Mrs. Elizabeth Higgs Buchanan in the second grade. This position is being taken by Mrs. Emily Moye Hadley. There will be a seventh grade in the Third Street school this year, taught by Miss Moelle Jones who was formerly of the high school faculty.

In West Greenville school there are two changes, brought about by the resignation of Mrs. Herma Stancill and Mrs. C. D. Hatley. Mrs. Mary Fleming Clark will take the place of Mrs. Hatley in the sixth grade, and the other position will not be filled, due to the fact that the schools lost one elementary teacher this year.

In the high school there are a few changes. V. M. Mulholland will return as principal of the junior and senior high schools. Miss Helen Dugan, Herman Dally, Miss Mabel Lacey, Mr. Hubbard and Rodney Leftwich will not return. Miss Dugan will be here for the opening of school and will help with plans for the student council congress to be held here in the fall. She will not teach this year but will live in Washington, D. C. Her work will be taken by Miss Margaret Zinn, of Gettysburg, Penn. Miss Zinn is a graduate of Gettysburg college with a Master's degree. She has taught in the Gettysburg, Penn., schools. In addition to her work in English and history she is also a very talented musician.

The work of Mr. Dally will be taken by Horace Cunningham, of Wilson, who has just received his Master's degree from the University of North Carolina and has taught five years previously. Mr. Cunningham is recognized by the history department of the University of North Carolina as one of its best students.

Asks Position on Conscriptio Of U. S. Industry

Rushville, Ind., Aug. 30.—(AP)—For the second time in 24 hours Wendell L. Willkie called on President Roosevelt today to state his views on conscription of industry for national defense.

The Republican presidential candidate was told Mr. Roosevelt had refused at a Hyde Park, N. Y. press conference to comment on the Overton-Russell amendment which would let the government, under certain conditions, take over factories for defense production.

The President asked inquiring reporters if it was customary for the chief executive to comment on measures before Congress.

"I cannot believe that the President meant to say that he has never commented on pending legislation, Willkie said in a statement.

"Did he have nothing to say about the legislation packing the Supreme court while that legislation was pending in Congress, did he not tell Congress to pass the Guffey coal act irrespective of doubt about its constitutionality.

"Again I ask the President without regard to my motives—is he for or against the Overton-Russell amendment. Was it introduced in the U. S. Senate with his knowledge and approval, does he believe in its principles.

RÉPULSED BY RAF DEFENSES

Third Attempt Undertaken After Invaders Turned Back On First Two Occasions By British Fighters And Anti-Aircraft Guns

London, Aug. 30.—(AP) Furious dogfights raged high in the skies over London today as waves of German bombers, some of them dropping bombs in dive attacks upon the outskirts, struck again and again at the British capital.

Three air raid alarms kept the city running to and from air raid shelters from just before noon until nearly 6 p. m., when the clear signal of the last alarm sounded.

The first two waves—perhaps 400 in all—were turned back after fierce battles.

But in the last attack the sound of dive bombers could be heard at a distance in the outskirts and the sound of motors indicated there were large numbers of them.

In all 42 German planes were brought down over Great Britain today and 10 British planes were lost, the Ministry of Information announced.

The Air Ministry reported the Krupp armament works at Essen and other military targets in Germany, Holland, Belgium and France were raided by British bombers in attacks last night.

Berlin, Aug. 30.—(AP)—D.N.B. the official German news agency, said Nazi bombing squadrons attacked airdromes in south England late today, especially in Hampshire, and shot down a total of 51 British planes. Fifteen German planes were acknowledged missing.

London, Aug. 30.—(AP)—German raiders swept in from the coast this afternoon for a third attempt to raid London in five hours after twice unsuccessfully trying to penetrate the city.

CANADIAN LEAF CROP IS SHORT

Winterville Man Writes About Conditions There

The tobacco situation in Canada this year is serious for all concerned, including many curers and other workers who went to that country from North Carolina and Virginia, according to a letter received by the Reflector today from George Kittrell of Winterville.

Mr. Kittrell wrote from St. Thomas, Ont., and explained that some of the statements were based on official government figures while others were observations of his own.

He explained that in 1939 Canada, which had declared war on September 3, produced the largest flue cured tobacco crop in its history, having raised approximately 80,000,000 pounds. After some 50 million pounds of the crop had been sold the demand apparently had been filled and some 30,000,000 pounds were left unsold. Under an arrangement with the government and banks farmers were allowed nine cents per pound for the 30,000,000 pounds, estimated to be worth 18 cents a pound. The nine cents a pound, it was stated by Mr. Kittrell, was not enough to cover the cost of producing the tobacco.

The Pitt county man said the 1940 crop was cut 33 and one-third per cent under a control program and added that a late season caused the crop to be very poor and, with few exceptions, was about two weeks late in reaching the curing stage.

He reported that on the night of August 23 frost settled in Norfolk, Middlesex, Oxford and Brant counties, leaving an estimated loss of 20 million pounds of tobacco valued at about \$5,000,000. The several counties suffered a 50 per cent loss it was estimated, with no insurance. Some farmers helped save some tobacco by keeping smudge fires.

The following Saturday the streets of St. Thomas were crowded with Belgian, Hungarian and other war refugees.

FDR DECLINES TO BE FORCED INTO DISPUTE

Says Effort Made To Start Controversy On Draft Bill

NO COMMENT ON WILLKIE DEMAND

GOP Candidate Had Asked Chief Executive To State Stand On Industrial Plant Provision

Hyde Park, Aug. 30. — (AP)—President Roosevelt charged today that efforts were being made to involve him in a controversy over a provision of the conscription bill authorizing the government to take over private industrial plants.

He declined at a press conference to answer Wendell L. Willkie's demand that he state his position on the provision, asserting that an attempt was being made to involve him in a political discussion.

"Let us all acknowledge it and stop there," the President said.

The provision inserted in the conscription bill before it passed the Senate would empower the chief executive to take over plants or facilities when the Secretary of War or the Secretary of Navy was unable to negotiate an agreement with the owners for production of defense needs.

Asked whether he approved the amendment, sponsored by Senators Overton (D.-La.) and Russell (D.-Ga.), Mr. Roosevelt inquired in turn whether reporters remembered an old rule of 1933.

"Does the President comment on legislation, amendments or rules pending in Congress?" he asked.

"Sometimes he does," a reporter remarked.

Mr. Roosevelt declined also to be drawn into a discussion of whether he concurred with Henry A. Wallace's statement in his speech last night accepting the Democratic vice presidential nomination that the Republican party was a party of appeasement.

He said he did not think a question along that line needed an answer, that the Wallace speech spoke excellently for itself, as he told the secretary in a telegram last night.

In fact, we found the Home in better condition than we had anticipated. We consider the County Home one of the county's most creditable institutions.

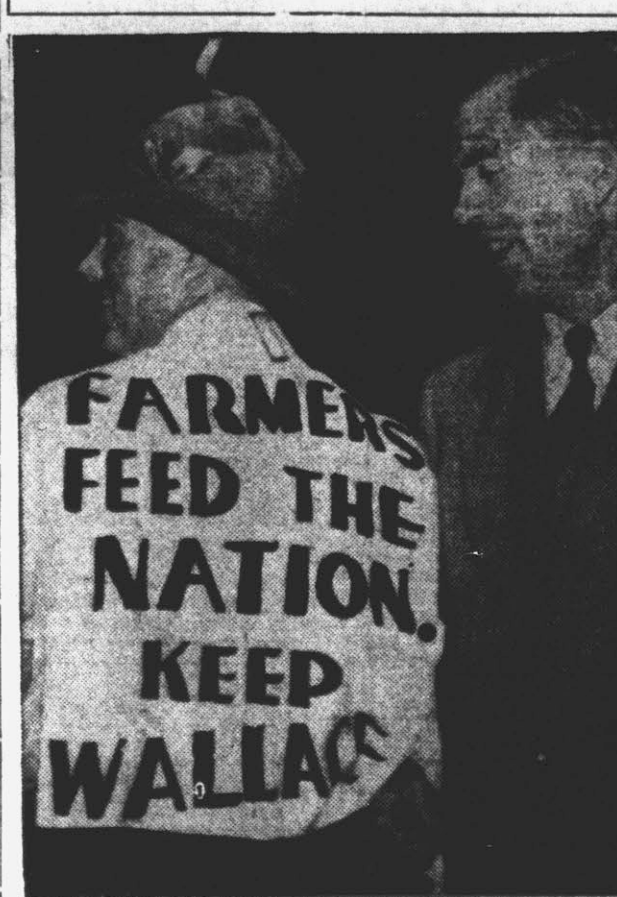
"We have inspected the public school buses in the county and find the mechanical condition good. In our opinion, as a whole, the county has a good and safe fleet of school buses.

Rivers In Western N.C. Again In Flood Stages

Streets In Several Sections Covered By Water

Asheville, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Flood damage was reported this morning from several points around Asheville as a result of heavy rains during the past 24 hours.

The French Broad and Swannanoa rivers were higher than in the recent flood. Biltmore was flooded for several blocks by the rampaging Swannanoa.

Mount Mitchell reported 12.10 inches of rainfall and Asheville had 6.78 inches during the past 24 hours.

Canton suffered the heaviest damage. Water was reported eight feet deep in the main street there, and the Champion Fibre Company plant was flooded.

The night shift at the plant of the Enka Rayon Company—about 1,000 men—was marooned in the plant by high water. The men were being brought out by motorboats.

A street at Marshall, west of here, was under four feet of water from the French Broad.

A bridge on highway 19 toward Atlanta was washed out near Hominy.

All telephone lines were out to Canton and Enka and detailed information as to damage was not available at either point.

No loss of life had been reported.

Large Area Of Province Is Returned To Hungary

More Than Half Of Transylvania Ceded At A Time When Nazi Troops And Planes Reported Ready To Attack; Germany Pledges To Resist Further Soviet Pressure

(By The Associated Press) Under an axis-dictated threat of immediate attack, King Carol's little Balkan kingdom of Rumania yielded more than half of Transylvania to Hungary today in return for a reported pledge that German troops will protect Rumania from further Soviet Russian pressure.

Bucharest reported that German motorized columns and Nazi warplanes were ready to attack at a moment's notice if Rumania had defied the Berlin-Rome ultimatum delivered in a four-power Vienna conference.

The promise of German troops to protect Rumania's borders was interpreted in some quarters as a decisive axis move to halt any further Russian expansion into southeast Europe.

Government circles in Bucharest said that in addition to an axis-supported attack by Hungary as well as a probable Russian invasion, Rumania also faced the likelihood of a Bulgarian assault from the south if she refused to yield.

The Rumanian government's communique follows: "Rumania has decided to accept arbitration on the Transylvania question as a result of the ultimatum demand of Germany and Italy."

The Berlin radio reported that the axis powers would grant Rumania's guarantee of absolute security for her territory in return for Rumania's cession of 19,300 square miles of the rich province of Transylvania to Hungary—roughly a little more than half of the province which belonged to Hungary before the World War break-up of the old Austro-Hungarian empire.

Government quarters in Bucharest said King Carol had been given only until tonight to accept the Vienna plan—without argument or discussion—under threat of attack from Hungary and Bulgaria, supported by the powerful Rome-Berlin axis.

Banks Will Observe Holiday Next Monday

The three banks of the city and the ABC stores will observe a holiday Monday, Labor Day, it was disclosed today, but other business houses are expected to continue business as usual.

Although no definite announcement had been made, no rural or city postal delivery service was expected to be made on the legal holiday.

Tar Has Dropped To Depth Of Only 7 Feet

B. T. Clark, in charge of the local weather bureau, reported this afternoon that the Tar river had returned to its banks and had receded to a stage of seven feet after having crested at 22.2 feet.

The stream is not back to normal, which is about four and a half feet, but is expected to drop to that stage probably tomorrow.

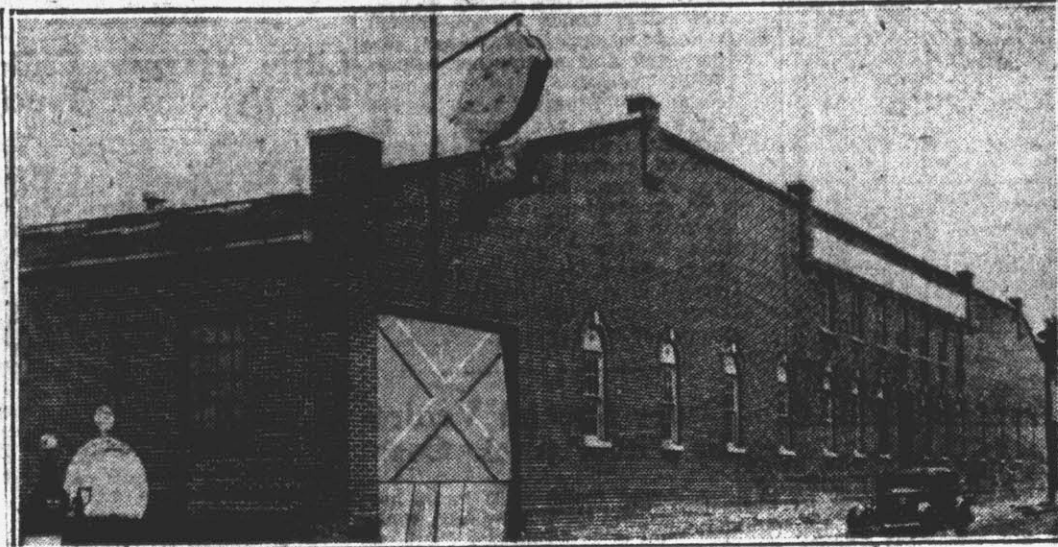

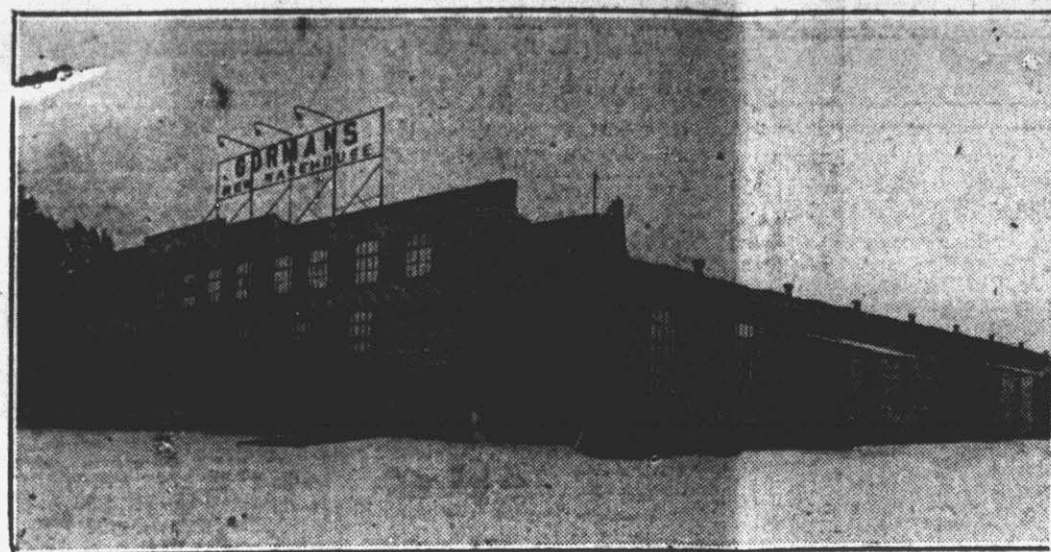
