German Raiders Sty-
mied By Heavy Fog
And Smoke

MORNING ALSO

Report Of Heavy

A heavy pall of fog over London, reinforced by smoke pouring from the capital's million chimneys, gave Londoners their soundest night of sleep in many weeks last night and all but stymied German raiders.

The beleaguered city passed its second successive morning without an air raid and it was not until after noon that an alarm sounded.

Although last night's attacks on London were much lighter than usual, it was disclosed that 25 persons were killed when a bomb damaged a department store air raid shelter.

A heavy blow to British troops en route to the Near East was reported by Virginia Gayda, authoritative Fascist editor, amplifying the Italian high command's assertion yesterday that six British ships were sunk by Italian torpedo boats in the Red sea.

Gayda declared the ships went down with the loss of all hands—between 3,000 and 4,000 lives lost out of the 35-ship convoy's total of 22,000 troops.

The British Admiralty denied that none of the convoy ships was damaged and that the only British casualties were three wounded aboard the destroyer Kimberley which later blew up the Italian destroyer Francesco Nullo.

In London the Air Ministry new service said it had information that 30 per cent of Germany's productive capacity has been "affected" by Royal Air Force bombing forays. These quarters also said the Germans have been forced to consider the "rebuilding" of Hamburg, the great North German seaport which has been relentlessly pounded by the Royal Air Force.

Injuries Fatal To
Wm. L. Whitehurst

William L. Whitehurst, 23, passed away at Jackson Memorial Hospital in Miami, Florida, at 6:25 a. m. today as a result of severe head injuries sustained in an automobile accident Monday afternoon in Miami. He was vacationing in Florida at the time of the accident.

Funeral services will be conducted at Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church in Greenville, Friday morning at 11 o'clock, by the pastor, Rev. T. M. Grant, and burial will follow in Cherry Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Whitehurst was graduated from Greenville high school in 1935. He then attended East Carolina Teachers College, and after he became affiliated with Carolina Coach Company, being located in Burlington, Chapel Hill, Greensboro, Rocky Mount and Durham. At the time of his death he had been serving as ticket agent in the Union bus station in Durham. He was a member of the Methodist church in Greenville.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Whitehurst of Greenville; three brothers, Albert, Donald and Bynum J. Whitehurst; five sisters, Ethel, Marjorie, Isabelle, Marie and Linda; all of this city; his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Lulu Whitehurst of Whitehurst, and his maternal grandfather, W. C. Willett of New Bern.

Reductions Made
In Freight Rates

Raleigh, Oct. 23.—(AP)—The Utilities Commission announced today that reductions to become effective in the next few days on class freight rates would save shippers who use railroads more than \$57,000 a year.

The new rates will apply to intrastate traffic and inter-state traffic for distances up to 20 miles between North Carolina points and points in South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia.

Utilities Commissioner Stanley Winborne also announced that he would attend a conference in Chicago October 28 between a subcommittee of the Southern Governors' rate policy committee members of the Interstate Commerce commission and parties interested in what promises to be the most extensive freight rate investigation ever undertaken by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Indications Of Major
Developments Pending
In European Struggle

Hitler Reported In
Secret Conference
With Spain; Axis
Powers Said To Be
Determined To
Smash Out On All
Fronts Before U. S.
Elections As Warn-
ing To Americans

(By The Associated Press)

Adolf Hitler was reported in secret conference with Spain's Generalissimo Francisco Franco on the French-Spanish frontier tonight and there were indications of major new developments in the offing.

Amid a day of flurry diplomatic activity in which a French government spokesman declared emphatically that France would undertake "no military, naval or aerial action against England," a Rumanian newspaper flared black headlines over a Berlin dispatch saying the Rome-Berlin Axis now plans:

1. Immediately entry of Spain into the war with an attack on Britain's great rock fortress of Gibraltar.

2. Definite military and naval action by Japan to counter Britain's reopening of the Burma road for war supplies to China.

3. Entry of France into the war as a belligerent before the November 5 presidential election in the United States.

The dispatch said the Axis powers were determined to smash out in all possible directions before the election "in order to give a real warning to America."

The French government spokesman's assertion that France will keep out of Britain's petty followed by a "strategic meeting" "somewhere in France" between Hitler and French Vice Premier Pierre Laval.

President "To Take
Off Gloves" In
Talk Tonight

WILLKIE SPEAKS
IN NEW YORK

GOP Candidate Demands Foe Tell People Whether He, Willkie, Had Falsified In The Records

President Roosevelt, ready for a "bang-up" finish drive, took to the campaigning trail today for the first of a series of major political addresses in populous Eastern territory.

Even before Mr. Roosevelt attained for Philadelphia, where he speaks tonight, his republican opponent, Wendell L. Willkie, challenged the chief executive's statement that he would do everything in his power "to keep war away from these shores for all times."

Willkie at a Chicago rally last night also demanded that the Democratic nominee tell the people whether he, Willkie, had falsified in the records in the attacks he has made on the Roosevelt administration.

The Willkie demand apparently was aimed at Mr. Roosevelt's assertion in announcing his political speaking program that his purpose was to discuss the "systematic program x x x of deliberate falsification of fact" which he charged had characterized the Republican campaign.

Secretary Ickes said Mr. Roosevelt would "take off the gloves" in the speech tonight and Willkie House aides said their chief was set for a "bang-up" campaign finish.

James A. Farley, former Democratic national chairman who has the reputation of being a big factor on his party's victories in 1932 and 1936, announced last night: "I shall vote the straight Democratic ticket on November 5 and urge the members of my party to do likewise."

Willkie who has been assailing the idea of a third term, said last night that if elected he would make every effort for the "passage of a constitutional amendment that will bar for all time" the possibility of a third term.

From his Chicago appearance, Willkie turned eastward today bound for New York for an address tonight.

Noted Speaker On
Teachers Program

Dr. Harold A. Dawson of the National Education Association with offices in Washington, D. C., will be one of the most outstanding speakers to appear on the program of the annual conference of the Northeastern district of the North Carolina Education Association to be held here November 15.

Dr. Dawson will appear on the program being sponsored by the Rural Education Association of the NCEA. He will speak at a luncheon meeting to be held at the Woman's club building at 1 o'clock. The program is being arranged by D. H. Conley, superintendent of the Pitt County schools, who has charge of the Rural Education division of the meeting.

The conference will bring principals and teachers here from 22 counties comprising the Northeastern District of the association.

Student Council Congress
To Be Held Here Nov. 1-2

Plans for the North Carolina State Student Council congress to be held in Greenville high school November 1-2, are going ahead at a rapid rate, according to Miss Evelyn Buchanan, faculty adviser for the G. H. S. council. At present the greatest hitch is the difficulty in obtaining sufficient housing accommodations for the delegates.

This is the fourteenth annual meeting of the congress and the fourth to be held in eastern Carolina. Greenville has participated in the last four conventions. The congress was secured for Greenville through the united efforts of G. H. S. students and civic clubs of the city. The president of this organization is Bob Kohl of Raleigh; Fenner Corbett, local president of the G. H. S. student organization, is treasurer of the State Congress.

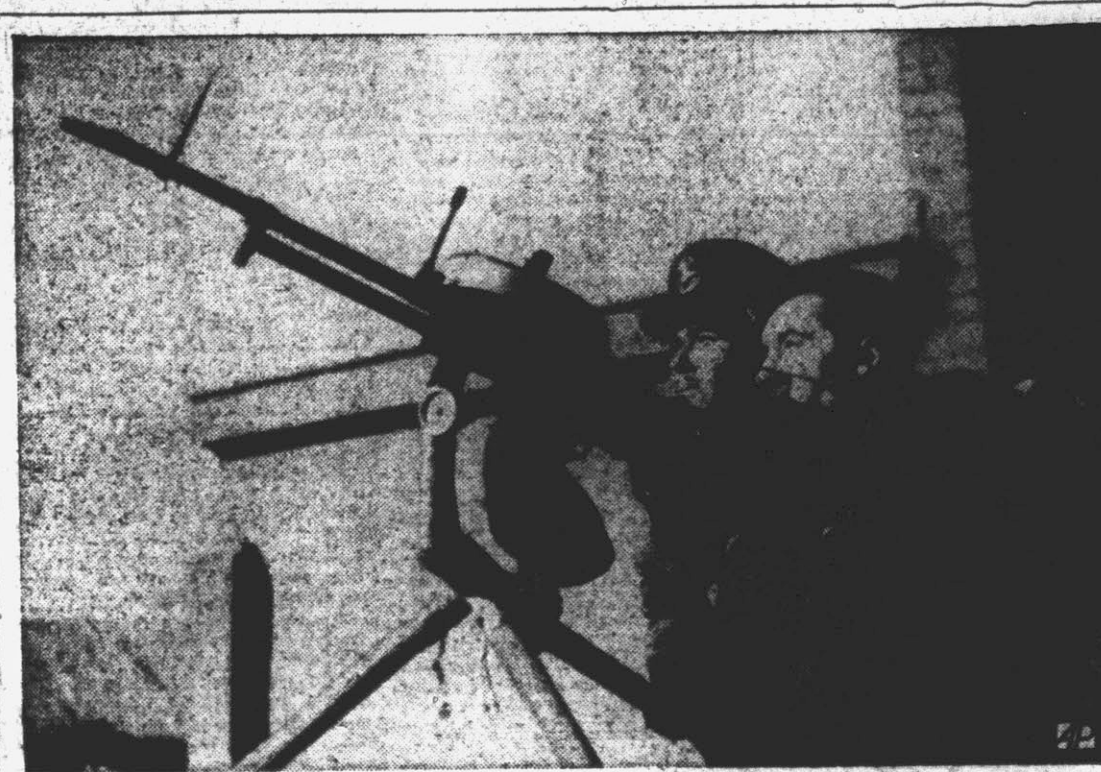

Alleged Sports Lot-
tery Operator Freed
On \$900 Bond

Ed Parker, Goldsboro attorney and alleged operator of a sports lottery in several Eastern North Carolina counties, was taken in custody here this morning and booked on charges of kidnapping D. R. Peacock and his wife and threatening them with a pistol.

The Wayne county man was freed after posting a cash bond of \$900. He is scheduled to be given a preliminary hearing before Magistrate John Ivey Smith tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Parker was taken in custody about 11 o'clock this morning on a warrant sworn out by Peacock and placed in the hands of the State Highway Patrol Monday. The arrest was made by Patrolmen W. W. Missengill and C. L. Teague. Officers had been tipped off that Parker would come to Greenville today and the officers stationed themselves to watch for his car, after having secured the license number.

Patrolman C. R. Williams, quoted Peacock, who is said by Williams to have admitted that he was an agent of Parker last year before the two "fell out," as saying that Parker picked him and his wife up last Friday night, presumably to take them home. Instead of taking them home, Patrolman Williams quoted Peacock as telling him the Goldsboro man drove out the Bethel highway and turned off on a dirt road. Parker then is alleged to have pulled a gun on Peacock and threatened him. Officers said Peacock told them that while Parker held the gun on him with one hand he slapped him with the other. Mrs. Peacock, ill at the time, is under the care of a doctor at the present.

Officers expressed the belief the "misunderstanding" between Parker and Peacock dates back for some time. They said Peacock told them that Parker called him over the telephone Monday afternoon and "threatened to kill" the Greenville man. Peacock then turned the warrant over to the highway patrol and secured a peace warrant against Parker.

Parker was said to have become incensed at losing heavy bets through his alleged gambling operations in and around Greenville recently and to have blamed Peacock for the "slip ups."

Officers, however, said Peacock denied any such accusations and said that he had had no connections with Parker for the past year or so.

Poorer Offerings
On Market Today

Prices on the Greenville tobacco market today were declared by Sales Supervisor R. C. Rankin to have been slightly higher than yesterday. He added, however, that the quality of offerings continues to decline.

A big demand for good tobaccos continued evident on the local market and farmers are being urged to sell their better grades now in preference to poorer quality leaf.

All warehouses were being cleared this afternoon and sales will be resumed tomorrow morning according to schedule.

FDR IN APPEAL
FOR DELAWARE

Urges Listeners To
Reaffirm Definition
Of Liberty

Aboard the Roosevelt Train En Route to Philadelphia, Oct. 23.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today in a brief speech at Wilmington, Del., that he hoped the people of Delaware would "reaffirm" with ballots this year "their own definition of liberty—the same definition they made four years ago."

Bounding for Philadelphia, where he will deliver at 9:15 tonight the first of five or six major political speeches prior to the November 5 election, Mr. Roosevelt spoke at Wilmington from the rear platform of his special train.

After telling in his prepared speech a fable which he said Abraham Lincoln once used to illustrate the difference between a sheep's idea of "liberty" and a wolf's idea of it, the President said:

"In 1936 the people of the United States took definite action to determine what they intended liberty to mean in this country in the next four years. They repudiated the wolf's dictionary.

"I am sure that this year the people not only of Delaware, but of the United States, are all taking a renewed interest in that word 'liberty.' There are not so many countries left where the word has any real meaning.

"I hope that by their votes on election day the people of the state of Delaware will reaffirm their own definition of 'liberty'—the same definition they made four years ago."

Mr. Roosevelt recalled that he visited Wilmington during the 1936 campaign. Some "political experts" told him then, he said, that he "certainly was optimistic" if he thought Delaware would go Democratic.

"They were surprised at the result of that election," he said.

PRESSURE MET
WITH DEFIANCE

French Government
Spokesman Declares
His Country Will
Not Declare War on
England Under Any
Circumstances; Mys-
tery Surrounds Meet-
ing Of Laval And
And Hitler Yesterday

Triple defiance of reported Axis pressure on France to join the war against Great Britain emerged today, following a mysterious meeting "somewhere in France" between Adolf Hitler and French Vice Premier Pierre Laval.

The vanquished republic will undertake "no military, naval or aerial action against England," a French government spokesman said.

"France will not declare war on England under any circumstances," he added.

Reports from Berlin previously said events seemed to be shaping toward an attempt to join surviving part of the French navy with the German and Italian fleets for a combined smash at Britain's sea power.

While Nazi officials and the German press displayed extreme reticence on the Hitler-Laval meeting, indications arose that the republic was concerned over a possible upsurge of rebellion in the conquered republic.

Authoring the meeting in Berlin described the meeting as the best answer to British Prime Minister Winston Churchill's efforts to "stir up" the French against the Rome-Berlin axis.

Simultaneously, Premier Marshal Philippe Petain's French government at Vichy pressed an attack on a widespread "communist" movement in unoccupied France accused of spreading propaganda in favor of the "free French" leadership of General Charles de Gaulle.

Foreign circles in Rome heard that Hitler sounded out Laval on a plan for a temporary settlement which would make France, Italy and Germany "collaborators" in the war—with Laval promised still greater power in France and Germany to aid in French reconstruction.

Premier Petain was reported strongly opposed to any joint Franco-German action against England, but dispatches from Bern, Switzerland, said there were indications Laval might replace Petain as actual leader of the French government.

Civilian Held In
Death Of Soldier

Payetteville, Oct. 23.—(AP)—James Dickinson, 51, was held in jail today without privilege of bond pending an inquest into the fatal shooting last night of Private John E. Hunsucker, 21, of Battery E, 17th Field Artillery of Fort Bragg.

Hunsucker, who had been in the army more than three years, was a military policeman, but was off duty at the time of the shooting. He was struck in the neck and killed by a shotgun blast fired through a glass in the front door of Dickinson's home as he stood on the porch.

Sergeant Ralph Leggett of the Payetteville police said Clara May Dickinson, 14, a daughter of James Dickinson, was being held as a material witness.

Leggett quoted Dickinson as saying he had asked the soldier to leave the house and fired at him after he insisted upon coming in.

Hunsucker's home address was given as Albemarle.

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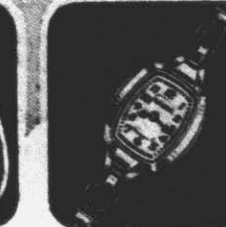

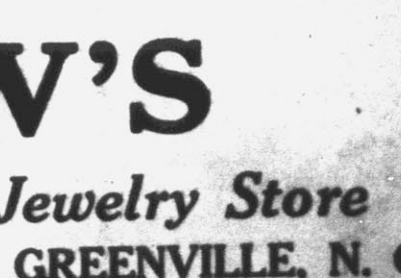

"The Marine Band is not only an outstanding musical organization but it is one of the world's most famed bands and through the years has maintained its high prestige."
"I feel sure that the people of North Carolina will be very glad to patronize these concerts in the cities to be visited by the band and I know that in this hour when we are all thinking in terms of our country and its proper defense that these splendid concerts will heighten our patriotic interest as well as give us delightful entertainment."

The Marine band's concert in Raleigh will be the first it has given in the state's capital in more than two decades. Its leader is now Captain William F. Santellmann, son of Captain William H. Santellmann who was its conductor at the time of the band's last visit to Raleigh.

"In the meantime the honey sweet outfits saw the kids—and they make dance bands—going for the hot stuff. The sappy blooz just didn't lure 'em. So those leaders stuck in a few swing licks—their style—and put on a little exhibition dance.
"There you have it. The swing boys swung to sweet. The sweet boys swung to swing. Neither one all the way, you understand, and there's still a difference."

Doctor Finds A New Drink

DOCTOR FINDS A NEW DRINK
By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE
Associated Press Science Editor
Portland, Ore.—Evidence that men who drink denatured alcohol can both learn to like it and to live has been collected by Dr. Frank R. Menne, of the University of Oregon medical school.
Denatured alcohol is made by adding to alcohol a small amount of the poison methanol or other obnoxious chemicals. Around here this drink is called "dehorn" alcohol.
Dr. Menne found his evidence in an unusual place, an autopsy on the tissues of 22 men who had died



of drinking what they thought was "dehorn" but was actually pure methanol sold them by mistake. The poison killed them all in a period of two or three days. The methanol entered the tissues and then slowly oxidized into formic acid, which is about six times as poisonous as the methanol itself.
These men, Dr. Menne said, undoubtedly had been consuming methanol in denatured alcohol in small amounts for long periods. Their tissues developed the ability to oxidize the stuff without fatal or even troublesome results.
Questioning methanol addicts, Dr. Menne was told that they had developed a craving and decided preference for the methanol. Its only apparent physical effects were hilarity and drunkenness. It was cheap and due to its widespread industrial uses, readily available.

DIGGING TIME IN NC-VA. BELT

Digging Proceeding More Rapidly Than Expected

Raleigh, Oct. 22.—Fifty to 75 per cent of the 1940 peanut crop has been dug and stacked in the fields in Eastern North Carolina. B. T. Ferguson, northeastern district farm agent of State College, reported today on the basis of information received from county farm agents and the Agricultural Marketing Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.
"Digging of new crop farmers' stock has been heavy during the past week throughout the North Carolina-Virginia belt," Ferguson said. "If the weather continues favorable a good share of the crop may be dug by the end of the present week. This digging is proceeding more rapidly than was thought likely a week or 10 days ago."
The extension agent reported that the crop is spotted in both quality and yield. Early tests made of peanuts coming from Southern North Carolina indicate unusually light weight in the peanuts first ready for market. The total meat content in the early samples runs 50 to 60 per cent, with a larger proportion than usual of No. 2's and oil stock. Saps are also numerous.

The October 15 Peanut Stock report of the U. S. D. A. indicates the 20 million pounds of Virginia-type farmers' stock remained in mills and warehouses on September 30 as compared with less than four million pounds at the close of September business in 1939.
Very few lots of old crop farmers' stock peanuts now remain unsold, however, and nominal prices range from 3.40 to 3.45 cents per pound for best Jumbos and 3 1/4 to 3.40 cents per pound for best Bunch, the Federal Agricultural Marketing Service reported.

Two-Word Part Makes Helen Craig A Star

New York.—The boss said it was to be an interview with a "gal who won't talk."
He wasn't exactly right.
As Belinda, the deaf mute leading lady of "Johnny Belinda," Helen Craig doesn't utter a sound for three acts. Only at the final curtain does she speak. Just "Johnny Johnny."
A soft job you say? No lines to learn? Hardly. Belinda "talks," but she doesn't speak—she uses her eyes, gestures, the sign language of the deaf and dumb. Take it from Helen, who is a good conversation artist off stage, the role is no cinch.
"It's the toughest I've ever tackled," she says. "Just imagine. In three hours Belinda must meet the audience, make it feel the loneliness she has known for 18 years, gain its sympathy, and make it understand her emotions as she becomes an unwed mother, as she experiences love, and as she kills to keep her child."
All that without speaking a word. Quite a large order.
Five Weeks Of Study
The story is one of a motherless deaf mute in a small town in Nova Scotia. To prepare for the part, Miss Craig studied the sign language for five weeks under Mrs. Florence May at a school for deaf and dumb in Hartford, Conn. Helen is proud that teachers have told her she is an "excellent signer." She says deaf persons are "intensely interested" in seeing their problems presented in a play.
The role brought her a lot of publicity. All Miss Craig's stage training had stressed the importance of reacting naturally to any stage sounds. A terrific thunder-clap in one scene gave her trouble at first.
"I knew it was coming but it scared me every time. I had to dig my toes into the stage boards and grab at a table to keep from jumping straight into the air. Wouldn't that have been a pretty performance?"
At Atlantic City, after the tryout boardwalk strollers stopped Miss Craig and asked if she really could talk. They seemed to think somebody else had spoken Belinda's two-word part.
Belinda is not Helen's debut in a leading role. She does consider it her "biggest chance," though a "real" challenge. She was the heroine of last season's "The Unconquered," her "biggest" other important roles.
A vivacious personality off stage, she has trouble keeping her flashing eyes toned down to mere fright and mumble in the early scene of Johnny Belinda. She has a sturdy figure, gives the impression she could really handle Belinda's grain mill job—but she's far from out of place in the very feminine curves of Belinda's clothes.
"Talked" With Hands Before
Born in Chile, the daughter of American mining people, Helen lived there until she came to America at 16 to study for the stage. People teased her, she says, about how she gestured as she spoke.
After eight or nine years, she worked out of that habit. But now "talking" in her dressing room about the play and her part, she emphasizes a point here and there—and uses her hands in sign language, too.
She is the wife of John Beal, film actor. He kidded her plenty about her non-talking role, wrote that he was glad to learn she had been given a part, even if it was just a walk-on.
To her indignant reply that she spoke two words, he wired back: "Congratulations on promotion to bit part."

Count Of Paris, 32, Fights Hard To Head The 'Fourth Empire'

South of Gibraltar, far from France in miles yet near in hours, a trim, mustachioed aristocrat busied himself at the task of "awaiting events."
He dictates to two secretaries. He sends many telegrams. He inter-countless visitors.
Over the activity hangs an air of expectancy, its pulse rising or falling with arrival of each message.
The Count of Paris, a young man who inherited a fortune estimated at \$30,000,000, is awaiting word which would make him king.
Scion of the House of Orleans, the 32-year-old nobleman believes restoration of the throne may be "just around the corner."
So from a retreat at Larache in Spanish Morocco, he is pulling strings, keeping in close touch with Royalist sympathizers who are insisting, perhaps to Adolf Hitler himself, that solution of the problems surrounding the new French government lies in making the count a sovereign Henry VI.
On Leave From Legion
The pretender normally would be taking things easy since he is on leave from period of incognito soldiering in the French foreign legion.
But the business in hand leaves few idle moments.
Political matters come first, of course, closely allied with his authorship of Royalist newspaper articles.
A consuming interest in aviation also takes its toll in hours.
And not overlooked is the necessity of making his athletic figure, delicate features, little smear of a moustache, blue eyes, and calm, thoughtful manner as familiar as possible.
Man Of Ideas
As pretender to a non-existent throne, the Count of Paris likes to think of himself as a man of ideas and as democratic.
He wants a monarchy "to preserve French liberties," asserting through close friends that he neither created the war nor signed the Armistice and would not have signed the peace treaty.
"Poor France, she has suffered a terrible defeat," Royalists further quote him.
The Duke of Guise, the late father of the count, issued several manifestoes calling for monarchical rule. Recently some observers have speculated the Petain government might be only a temporary one aimed at restoring the monarchy.
Countess Returns
Adding to this belief was the recent return from Brazil of the Countess of Paris, the former Princess Isabelle, whose trip was linked in France to a report her husband

would receive an offer of a puppet kingdom from Chancellor Hitler.
The would-be monarch's ideas or government have not been expounded recently "for the record" but a book published under his name in 1936 recommended a decentralized France, effected by division into the provinces he believes are its "natural regions."
Over everything would be the king, arbitrating and paying an umpire between capital and labor and other factions.
He's A Traveler
Working toward such an ideal have been Royalist groups in every French province, many of whom on being called by century-old titles, rather than "madame" or "madame."
The count's fortune, handed down the long line of forebears who ruled France 1,000 years, has financed the campaign.
Owning estates in Belgium and Italy as well as at Larache, the count has traveled much. His sports monoplane and his red Buick (Italian) automobile are familiar in most European capitals that know him as one of the "Orleans" or a dressed man despite a preference to aviation regalia.
Barred From France
At head of the Bourbons-Orleans line he is barred from France under an old law but sought prior to the war to enter his country, armed forces.
Turned down by President Albert Lebrun, he applied to the foreign

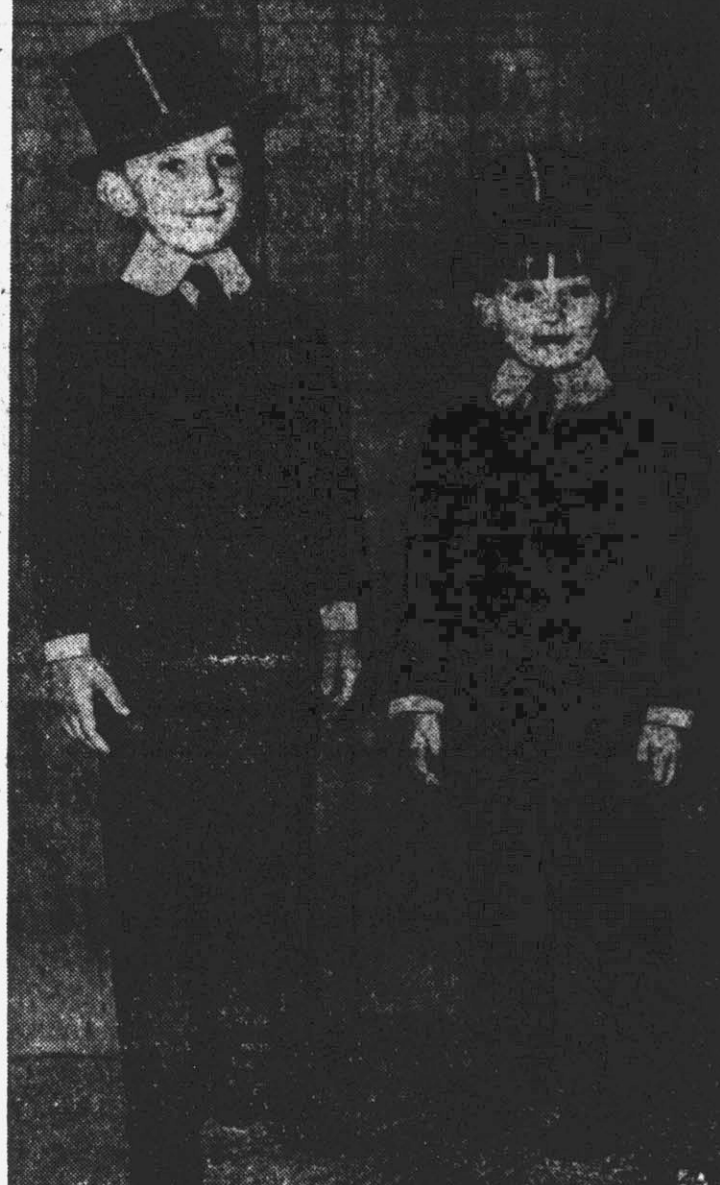

To objectors who argue that armor-clad civilians wouldn't have sufficient mobility, Grancsay retorts they'd have more than they now have hiding in air raid shelters.



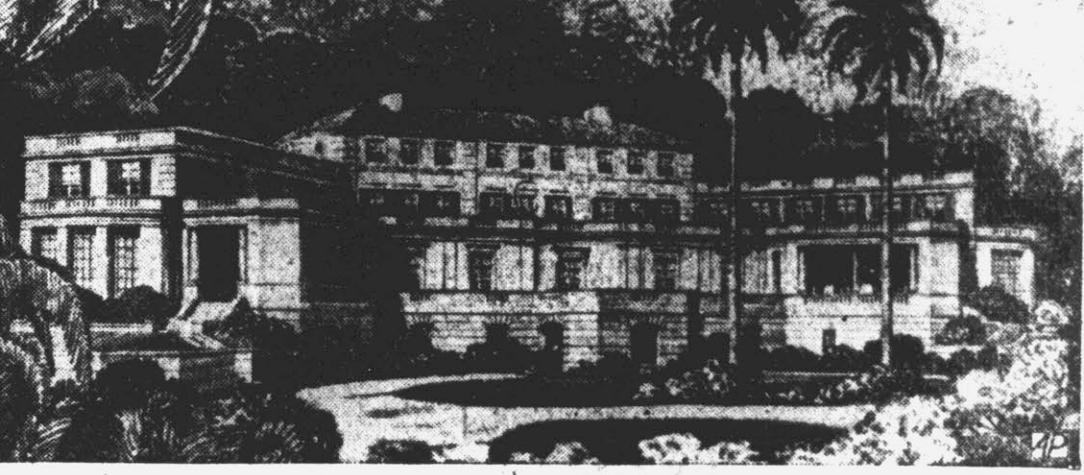

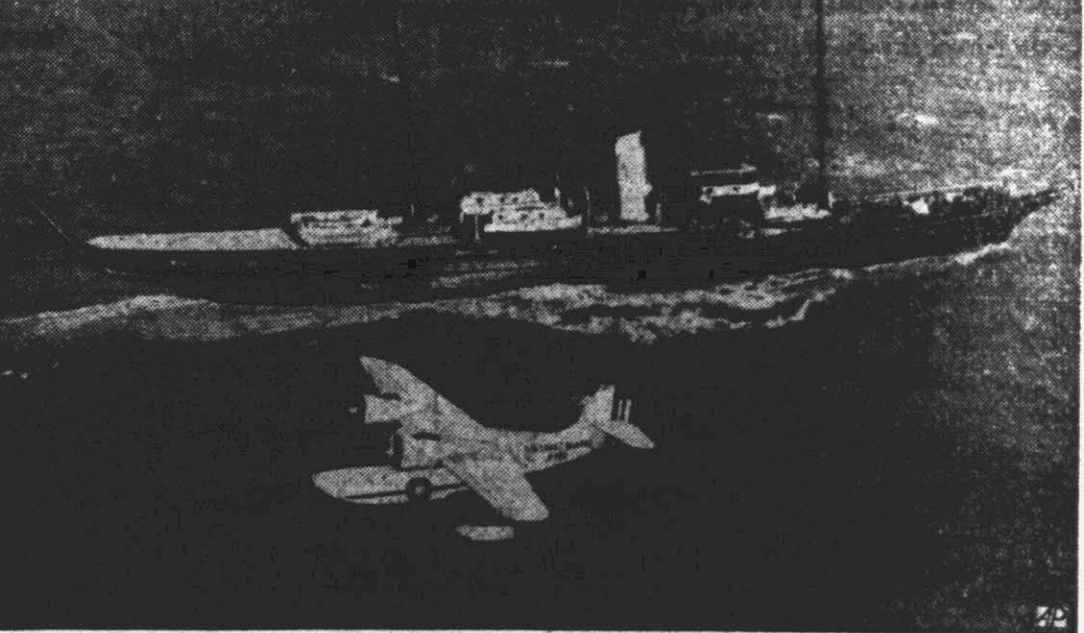

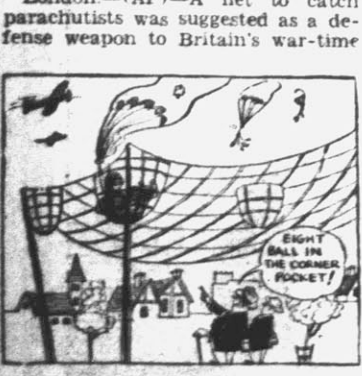

Christmas Is In The Air—So Watch For Shoplifters

AP Feature Service
Los Angeles.—Amateur shoplifters many of them women of good family, cause retail stores just about as much trouble as professional ones, says B. E. Simpson, superintendent of the Stores Protective Association of this city.

Between 50 and 75 detectives are constantly at work here protecting department stores from shoplifting depredations. The holiday shopping season, when stores are crowded and clerks are busy, is the time the detectives must be most on the alert.

"Our amateur shoplifters are not poor people," says Simpson. "They are people who are living beyond their means, persons who believe they never would be suspected. They may be wives of professional men who have run over their budgets or young girls of good families who buy a cheap article and can't resist the temptation to pick up an expensive one at the same time."

Get 10 Per Cent
Professional shoplifters, he says, ordinarily dispose of their loot through "fences" in the East and get only 10 per cent of its value. But a good one can average \$300 worth of merchandise a day.

Among the tricks used by shoplifters, Simpson mentions the following:

A box wrapped to resemble a tied package actually has a false bottom, and the shoplifter has merely to lay it down over an article and pick it up adroitly.

A silk bag which at first glance resembles a sport coat is carried over the arm and can be stuffed with stolen goods. This device permits the shoplifter to leave the store with both hands showing.

The thief enters the store with stamped boxes, addressed to herself, introduces stolen merchandise into them and drops them in a mailbox. She thus escapes being "caught with the goods."

Use Their Coats
Men shoplifters favor double-breasted coats, and Simpson's office has a record of three men who got away with eight suits of clothes in a single day by secreting them on their persons.

The net result of shoplifting, Simpson points out, is increased prices to the public. Every large store has an item known as "shrinkage," representing merchandise that the store has bought but not sold—which apparently has vanished into thin air.

This cost must be taken into account in fixing prices.

That the national drink bill totals over \$3,500,000,000 and consider along with that sum the increase of drinking among all classes. The greatest increase in drinking has been among women, Ervin said.

The Rev. R. C. Goforth of Shelby, making the temperance board report, said that "since liquor interests of the whole country are using the press, radio, motion pictures and other agencies to make drinking attractive and to increase the consumption of alcoholic beverages, we urge our pastors, members of the official boards, teachers and church members to expose this vicious propaganda and to fight the liquor interests with every legitimate method."

The board recommended that a letter be sent to President Roosevelt urging him to prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors near military camps and other military establishments. It was also recommended that full cooperation be given the United Dry Forces in North Carolina.
