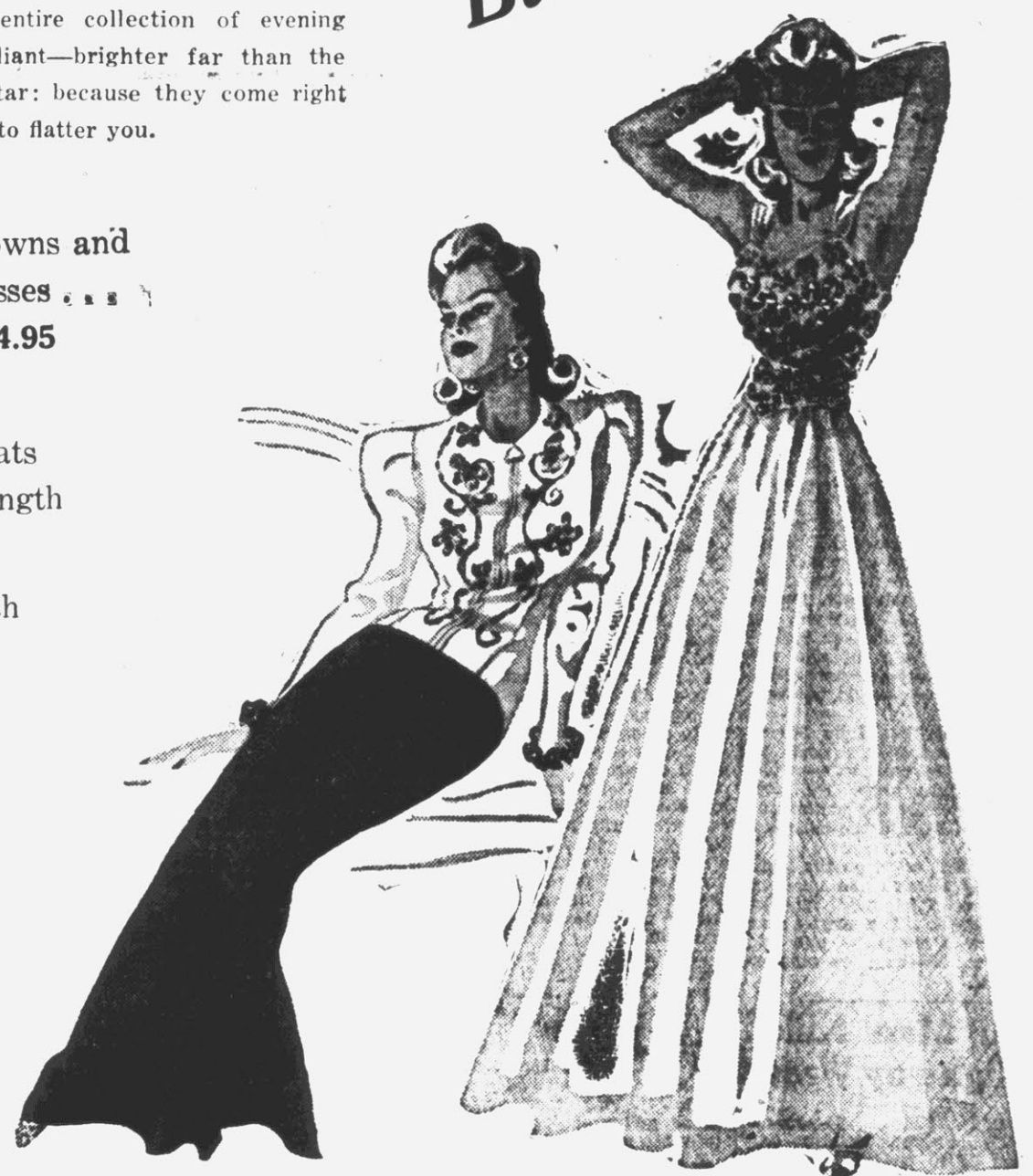

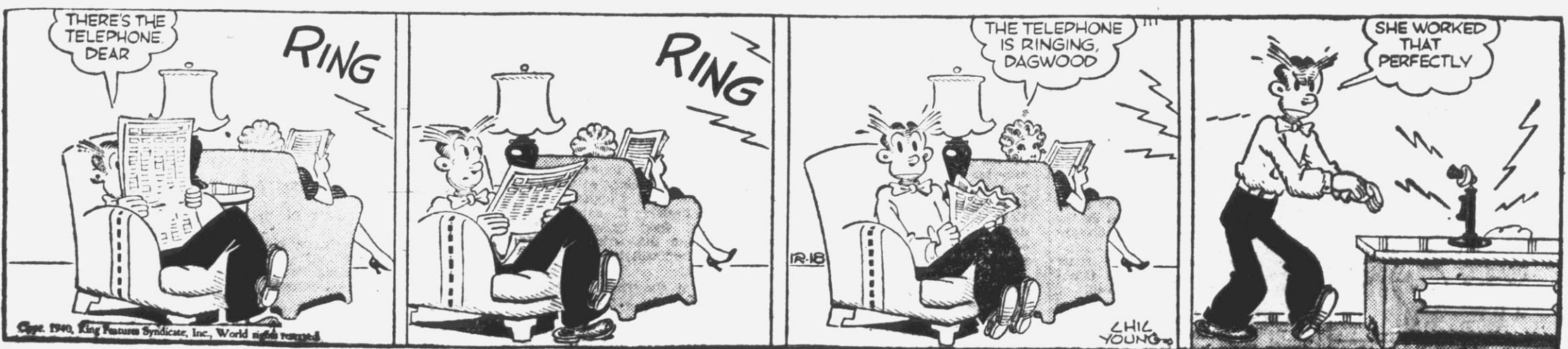

THOUGHTS OF YOUTH

About the year 1500, two weather-
beaten English sailors used to sit
sunning themselves on a dock tell-
ing of far-away places and adven-
tures. They did not realize that a
youngster who continually played
on the dock then was taking in
everything they said. The boy's
name was Walter Raleigh, destined
to be a great figure in England's
chronicle of discoveries.

Children are influenced not so
much by what they hear as by
what they overhear. Try to teach
them something, and they immedi-
ately put up all their defenses. But
they are greatly influenced by the
casual remark, the unmediated
observer which older people make
on persons and situations. The rea-
son why children learn more from
their parents than they can possi-
bly learn from the best of teachers
in schools is, first, because they are
with their parents longer than with
any teacher, and second, because
their minds are relaxed in the
home and often a passing idea,
which will later greatly influence
them, slips into the mind unnotic-
ed.

Two old tars talked about the
glories of distant lands, and young
Walter Raleigh first dreamed of the
days when he would go forth to
visit them and later laid great
plans for English colonial expan-
sion. What he overheard went into

heart to give him courage.

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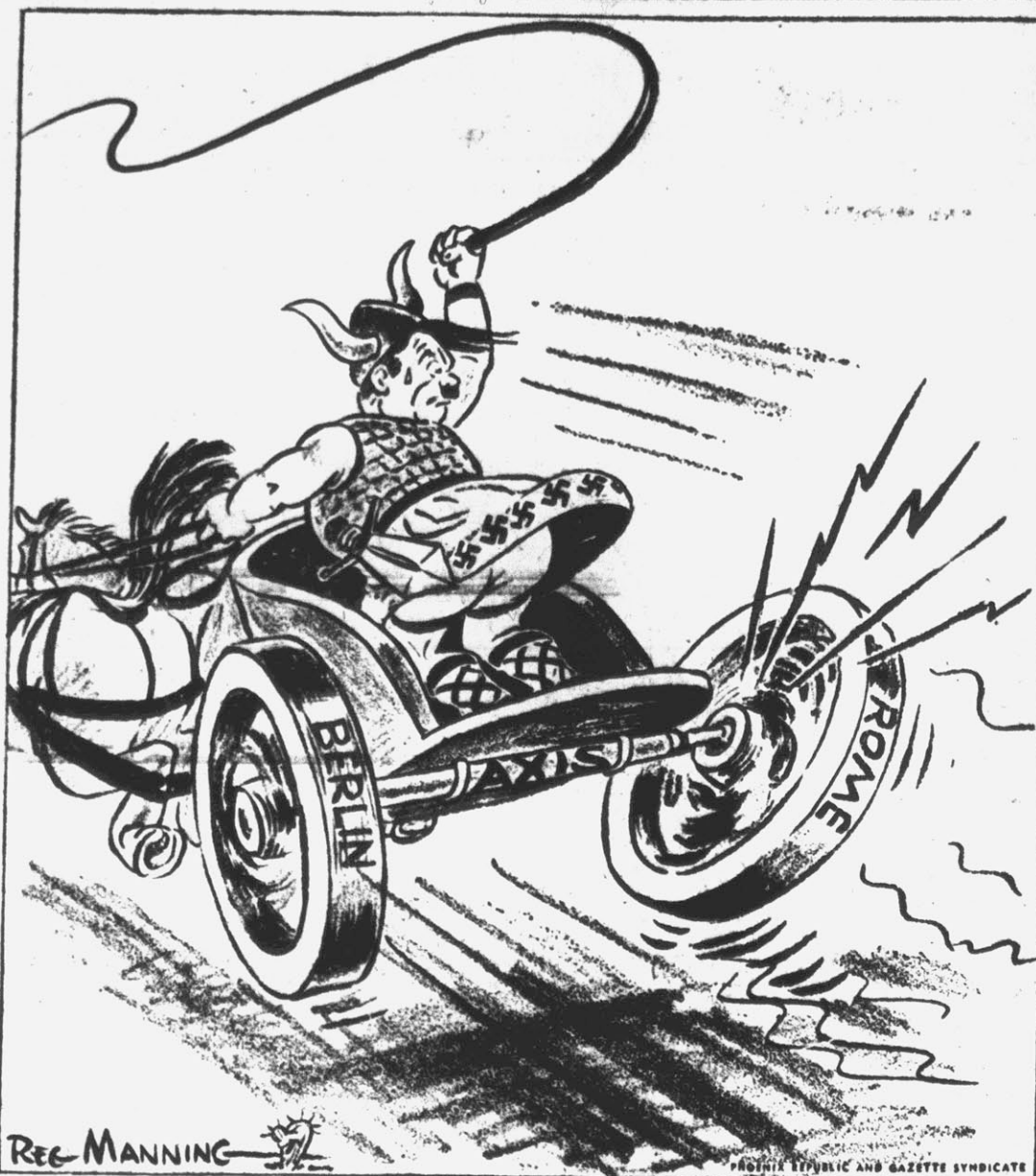
TEAMWORK NEEDED

There has been consider-
able press comment of late
concerning differences be-
tween the Dies Committee
and the Federal Bureau of
Investigation. According to
some observers, men asso-
ciated with the Dies Com-
mittee have promulgated
publicized findings concern-
ing fifth columnists and sab-
oteurs, and thus have seri-
ously hampered secret ac-
tivities of the FBI.

It would certainly seem
reasonable to expect a legis-
lative committee investi-
gating subversive activities
to cooperate with an estab-
lished branch of government
armed with police authority.
The fine work of the FBI in
fighting criminality in the
past is well known. The
Dies Committee has done im-
portant work in unearthing
those who would undermine
this country and its govern-
ment.

One of the tragedies of the
present controversy is that,

long enough continued, it
could lessen the confidence
of the public in both groups,
and thus actually aid those
subversive elements which
seek a fertile field in which
to operate. That must be
prevented.

As a high official has said
of FBI work, "The enemy
does not know our actions
and cannot anticipate a time
when he might plan his de-
vious task with a minimum
chance of danger. The effec-
tiveness of our activities
would be hindered unless
our work were conducted
with the utmost secrecy." No
one can deny that. Both the
Dies Committee and the
FBI should correlate their
functions as to enable each
to produce maximum results
—with neither treading on
the toes of the other. Above
all, there should be no com-
petitive basis between these
two agencies.

Washington & Daybook

Washington—Buried in the dis-
patches from Greece the other day
was an item that Dodecanese Is-
landers residing in Greece were or-
ganizing an expedition to expel the
Italians from the Aegean.

Washington observers who noted
it got ready to write another
chapter in one of the most tangled
tales in history—the story of the
Dodecanese.

These islands (that's what the
name means) are sometimes referred
to as the "The Rose of the
Aegean and her 11 sisters."

The island of roses is Rhodes,
largest of the group, which stretch
as almost like a breakwater off the
southern Aegean coast of Turkey.

The others are Astypalea, Calym-
nos, Carpathos, for which the Car-
pathian sea is named; Cos, Chalki,
Rhodes, the homeland of Hippocra-
tes, the father of medicine; Nisyros,
Pinos, where St. John the Apostle
is believed to have written the book
of Revelation; Symi and Telos.
There actually are a thirteen, but
it is no more than an islet and gen-
erally is considered a part of the
roses.

People Always Greek
The history of the islands is long
and complicated, stretching back
into the mists of Greek mythology.
The Dorian and Persian invasions;
the wars with the Greek city
states; the struggles against Rome;
the centuries of Turkish domina-
tion; the Italian occupation in 1912
all are there, but the people always
have remained Greek. Although it
is no more than a pebble-ship to the
Turkish mainland, the islanders still
refer to their neighbors as "the men
of over there" as if they were folk
of another hemisphere.

Periodically the inhabitants—fish-
ermen, shepherds, farmers, traders
and sailors—have found their is-
lands over-populated and have set
up their "home from home" in
many parts of the world—in the
United States and the Argentine, in
Egypt, Australia and Greece.

In 1912 the Italians "liberated"
the Dodecanese from the Turks. The
people at first rejoiced but soon
found they were not enjoying the
self-rule they had expected.

In the secret treaty of April, 1915

Great Britain promised Italy (as
part payment for coming into the
war) that when peace was made
the Dodecanese would be hers to
have and hold. The group that
gathered at Versailles had other
ideas. Among these was the dele-
gation from the United States, and
in May, 1921, the Senate passed a res-
olution "That it is the sense of the
Senate that the twelve islands of
the Aegean should be awarded
by the peace conference to Greece."

Islands Never Returned

Italy finally agreed, and a later
treaty with Greece stipulated that
after a year 11 of the islands would
be returned and 15 years later
Rhodes would be given back "pro-
vided England returns Cyprus to
Greece."

For the year was up, however,
there was a change of Italian ad-
ministration and not only were the
islands never returned, but the
Italians heaped on the Dodecanese
an unforgettable insult. They ex-
pelled from his Greek Orthodox see
the arch-bishop of Rhodes, which
even the Moslem Turks had con-
sidered too drastic to be attempted.

Italy has held the Dodecanese ever
since. With Great Britain occu-
pying and fortifying Crete, which
overshadows the islands on the west,
they are not at present important
from a standpoint of military strategy.
For that reason, if for no other,
an expeditionary force might
have no great difficulty in expelling
the Italians and once more bring
home to Greece the Rose of the
Aegean and her 11 sisters.

GENERAL ITALIAN RETREAT IN AFRICA INDICATED

lenti might already be in Greek hands.

Dispatches from Athens said fires had broken out at Kilisra, leading to the belief that the Italians were burning supplies in readiness to abandon the town.

Premier Mussolini's high command said Britain's desert armies in Libya, weakened by losses, had eased their pressure and Fascist planes and artillery were reported to have littered the battlefields with the wrecks of burning British tanks and armored cars.

Rising British strength elsewhere in Africa—the continent "claimed" by Adolf Hitler for the Rome-Berlin Axis—was reflected in a bold 35-mile dash by British mechanized forces into Italian Samolliand in southeast Africa. Reinforced by black troops, the British command said, the raiding column sacked the Italian base at El Wak, killing 10, capturing 120 and seizing guns and "large quantities of stores and ammunition."

Princess Juliana Visits Roosevelt

Washington, Dec. 18.—(AP)—An exiled royal princess from the land of tulips, wooden shoes and windmills travelled to the capital today on her first visit to the United States.

Juliana, Crown Princess of The Netherlands, was invited to spend three days at the White House as the guest of the President and Mrs. Roosevelt.

The princess is making the trip by rail from Ottawa, Canada. Under the escort of State Sumner Welles and other officials arranged a welcome for the royal party upon arrival of the train.

When the Germans invaded Holland last May, Queen Wilhelmina and the crown princess and her husband, Prince Bernhard, and their two children sought refuge in England. Juliana brought her daughters to Canada in June.

The FBI agents said they had recovered \$4,553 after seizing Wells here last night.

While employed as manager of an armored car service at Savannah, Wells cashed a payroll check for \$18,212 at the bank. It was his duty to divide the payroll at the bank for employees of a construction firm.

After cashing the checks, Wells told fellow employees that he had been called to Charlotte, N. C. The shortage was discovered after he left.

The FBI record showed that he had been arrested for larceny of an automobile at Salisbury, N. C., in 1932, and sentenced to the East Carolina Training School, from which he was paroled in February, 1936.

Measles Reported In Local School

With a number of cases of measles having been reported in the Greenville city schools, Dr. N. Thomas Ennett, Pitt county health officer, today warned the public that the situation may be approaching the epidemic stage and offered some advice in determining symptoms and also on the treatment of the malady.

School authorities reported that there had been instances of measles in the schools, but did not regard the situation as alarming.

The health officer explained that the usual case of measles begins with the same symptoms as does the ordinary cold and that within from two to several days a rash appears. He stated that the complications such as middle ear disease, pneumonia, etc., made it highly desirable that a physician be called promptly.

The state quarantine regulation is 14 days from the onset, or seven days from the appearance of the rash. There is no quarantine for children who have had measles.

The health officer urged that parents not allow children to go to school when the child does not appear to be in his usual health, stating that measles is highly contagious from its earliest symptoms.

He also stated that the state law was very strict in the matter of quarantine and that anyone breaking quarantine is subject to a fine or imprisonment.

Reports To Officers That He Took Poison

Fayetteville, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Desk Sergeant Nathan Bell said that a man staggered into the police station here last night and gasped that he had just taken poison. He identified himself, Bell said, as Wilson Williams, 24, of Goldsboro, and was booked on a charge of stealing a taxicab.

The man was rushed to a hospital for immediate treatment. His condition was termed critical.

SPEED OUTPUT OF AIRPLANES

Much Less Dismal Picture Painted By Latest Figures

New York, Dec. 18. (AP)—An
output of 1,500 to 1,700 war planes
a month—a rate of 18,000 to 20,000
a year—will be achieved by Ameri-
can factories in the next seven
months, reliable sources in the air-
craft manufacturing industry esti-
mated today.

Considerably shy of the periodic
forecast of production since last Au-
gust these figures are based on the
available engines, machine tools
aluminum and the supply of trained
factory personnel.

This fact can be added to the
statement of William S. Knudsen,
production chief of the National De-
fense Commission, last week that
aircraft production was 30 per cent
behind schedule—the industry itself
appears to have been overly opti-
mistic in reporting its capacity to
Washington.

Figures submitted to the Defense
Commission by airplane makers last
summer intended to picture the pro-
duction peak which could be reach-
ed in January included all types of
airplanes, private, commercial and
military.

That led Knudsen on August 8 to
announce that the rate of warplane
manufacture was 10,000 a year and
would pass the 18,000 mark in Janu-
ary.

The actual production of military
aircraft by American manufactur-
ers in this calendar year will be
slightly in excess of 5,000 machines.
With the more conservative fig-
ures as a barometer, warplane out-
put during the coming year taken on
a much less dismal appearance than
that reflected in the Knudsen state-
ment. The engine problem, probably
the worst of the many facing the
industry, has been made more criti-
cal by shipments of engines to Eng-
land to power British manufactured
planes.
