Small handled bags, for contrast are daintier and more jewel-like than ever, embroidered with beads or glittering with brilliants.

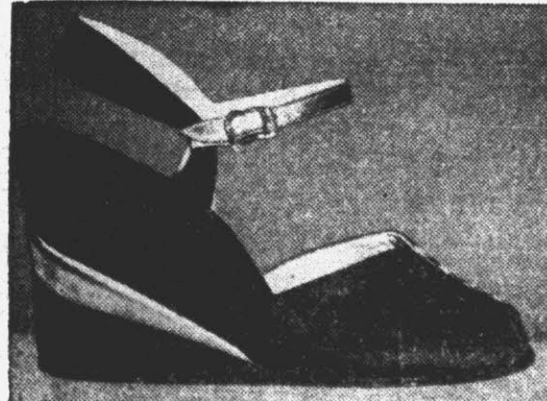

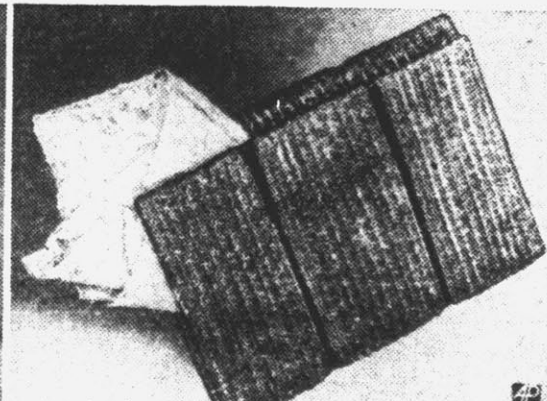

LABOR LIKELY GIVE UP FIGHT

May Leave The Merchants In War On Sales Tax

Raleigh, Dec. 30 — Ever since enactment of North Carolina's sales tax act, the two outstanding groups in opposition to the three per cent levy so abominable in the sight of the retailers have been the merchants and union labor.

The North Carolina Merchants Association, though not so rabid in its ratings as Paul Leonard's Fair Tax Association, has stood consistently for repeal of the sales tax. The North Carolina Federation of Labor has never let a convention pass without adopting ringing resolution of hatred for the tax. The C.I.O. units have been equally vigorous.

But now there appears a strong likelihood that the unions will leave the merchants flat. The Federation doesn't take kindly to aggression stand taken by the merchants in opposition to enactment of a state wage and hour law, and in reprisal very strongly considering abandonment of any organized effort against the sales tax.

Your reporter has heard this from sources extremely close to the Federation's principal leadership. Whether or not the threat of any such action would have even a minor effect on the merchant's attitude toward a wage-hour bill is very doubtful. The Merchants Association, of which Willard Dowell, a brother-in-law of next Governor J. Melville Broughton, is the responsible head, has for some years realized the futility of any very aggression against the existing tax law and has been more or less quiescent outside the formality of adopting resolutions of censure at every opportunity.

It is possible, however, that the merchants see in the Broughton "Take the Tax Off the Table" attitude, the entering wedge by which

they stand a chance ultimately to repeal the sales tax in its entirety. If they do they would hardly care to antagonize the only large group of organized consumers which has stood shoulder to shoulder with them against the sales tax.

So far the retailers have been the most bitter and unrelenting opponents of any North Carolina wage and hour law even remotely resembling the federal Fair Labor Standards act.

At the recent hearing before the Wage-Hour Commission, chairmaned by Commissioner of Labor Forrest H. Shuford, retailers of all sort—most of them marshalled by the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, spoke long and loud against any statute limiting the hours of labor. They did not seem so dead set against wages, those who appeared paying in practically all cases more than any minimum which could conceivably be passed by a North Carolina legislature.

It is improbable that a Labor threat can turn the merchants aside from this opposition; but the prospect of such a threat opens up an interesting situation.

Juneau, Alaska.—(AP)—Discovery of a submarine mountain range 3,000 feet in altitude but 8,000 feet below the ocean's surface, was reported here by Lieut. Commander R. D. Horne on return from a charting cruise off the Aleutian Islands.

He said coast geodetic survey vessels have completed about 20 per cent of a new study of the Aleutian area started in 1934. Previously the only charts available were those made by Russians in the 1860s.

Larkins and Gay Contesting For President Pro Tem

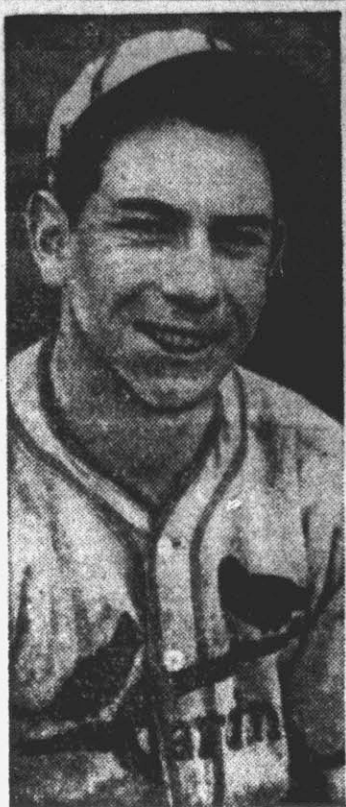
Raleigh, Dec. 30 — Outstanding oddity about the Larkins-Gay fight for president pro tem of the Senate is that they are scrapping tooth and nail for a job which yields no political return commensurate with the effort required to win it in the face of any sort of opposition.

Neither of the contestants could probably land a good committee chairmanship were he to put his mind to it with the same enthusiasm and drive he is displaying in the current campaign. Neither is a person non grata to Lieutenant Governor Reg Harris, which would make such an appointment the more likely.

The Senate's president pro tem hasn't any appointive power, no patronage to dispense and, in general, is little more than an honorary figure head.

On the other hand it does not call for any hard work and gets nobody into a political jam or on a political spot; while an important chairmanship often does both. Maybe that's why John D. Jr. from Jones, and Archie from Northampton are so anxious to get the place.

Second unusual feature is that neither is claiming his election "in a walk." Larkins' top estimate of his pledge support is 28 votes, Gay's is 27. The Jones county Senator

concedes 18 to his opponent and says he has been definitely informed by eleven that they will be against him. He believes that at least 18 of his supporters have written Gay that they are committed to Larkins.

In view of the fact that there is and the candidates themselves a top of 46 votes (two Republicans counted out of the fifty senators) in the caucus, it is noticeable that either he 28 or the 27 claim leaves room for a rather close contest which could be changed by the switch of a very few; or by a misunderstanding of the "pledging."

Group Regulating Trades To Be On The Defensive

Raleigh, Dec. 30 — One large group of lobbyists who for the past several sessions of the North Carolina legislature have been particularly aggressive are almost certain to find themselves on the defensive, rather than the offensive, next month.

These representing the multitude of "commissions" and "boards" regulating trades and professions are referred to — groups, for instance, like the Dry Cleaning Commission, the Board of Barber Examiners, and the like.

For many years there has been a trend toward more and more, stricter and stricter regulation of the trades and professions. It all started with such groups as the lawyers and the doctors — unquestionably professional units — and spread to almost every line of work.

Each legislature has seen new commissions set up to regulate the trades and to pass on the qualifications of those desiring to work at them. Those already "in" have sought unceasingly to keep others "out" and they have more often than not succeeded in convincing the legislators (often by use of all the high pressure lobby tactics) that there is some public interest which requires protection which can be given only by making the trade a tighter corporation.

Two years ago Senator Chester Corbun of Haywood made a one man battle against all these commissions and boards. Wherever one was proposed, or whenever it was proposed to increase the power and scope of one, he would first fight the whole scheme, then seek to have his county exempted.

He made himself decidedly a nuisance to the lobbyists for the trade groups and, often, to his Senate colleagues, but before the session was over, there was much evidence that he had made quite an impression.

In the House there was the big "dry cleaners" fight in which the regulators scarcely got even a draw. During the debates there became apparent a strong tide of

everybody in sight. They knew him too. Seems as if he made the round of all the lots, collecting five dollar touches to get to Frisco. One time he fought in Russia. This time it happened to be in China. He is the smoothest, slickest touch artist in Los Angeles. But I don't begrudge him the touch. The fascinating lies he tells are worth it."

In short, there was a definite turn of the tide. All evidences are that the current is still running in North Carolina very strongly against the policy of turning over to trade guilds, so to speak, the power to determine who shall be allowed to work at the trade. There has developed the strong belief that these groups are obviously monopolistic and are much more concerned with hogging the whole works for themselves than with rendering any service of value to the general public.

So in all probability the coming General Assembly session will see the lobbyists working hard against legislation designed to provide for strict accountability of all trades and professional regulatory and

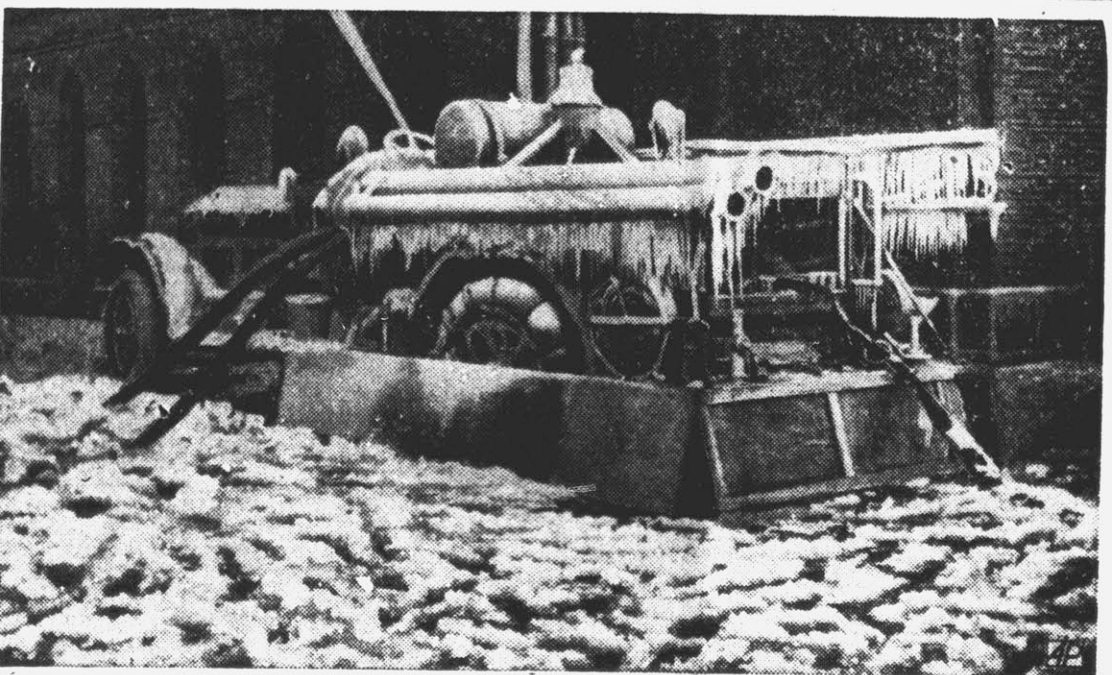

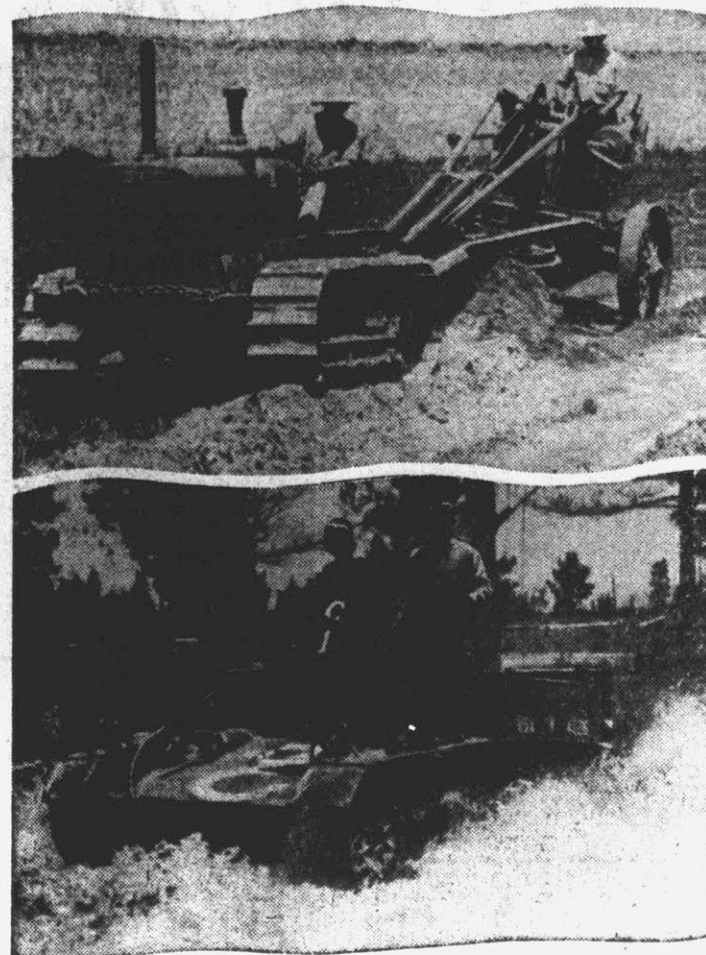

A tractor and terracing machine are implements of agricultural defense, just as a tank is a military defense weapon. Farmers of North Carolina are cooperating with the State College Extension Service and the Federal Farm Program in terracing thousands of acres of land to control erosion. County farm agents organize and direct Soil Conservation Associations which operate heavy terracing equipment. Forty-one of these cooperative associations operate 46 terracing units, each of which consists of a 40 horsepower crawler-type tractor and two-wheel terracer. Subscribers and heavy discs are also owned by some of the associations. They terraced more than 50,000 acres in North Carolina in 1940.

Clinic For Cripples To Be Held Friday

The State Orthopedic clinic will be held next Friday in Greenville from 12:30 to 4 p. m.

This clinic takes all types of cripples, both white and colored free of charge who are unable to afford private treatments. It is desired, though not required, that patients be referred by a physician or the welfare officer, and that the patient bring such note to the clinic.

The clinic is conducted by Dr. Hugh A. Thompson, orthopedist, of Raleigh. This clinic has been running for something over three years, and is now serving a large number of cripples, adults as well as children, in this area.
