

BRITAIN SETTING UP GREEK DEFENSES

BRITISH FORCE BOMBS BERLIN DURING NIGHT

Powerful Explosives Loosed On Heart Of Capital

NIGHT ASSAULTS IN OTHER AREAS

Ministry Acknowledged Loss Of Eight Planes During Operations On Strategic German Centers

London, April 10.—(AP) British air raiders dropped "powerful high explosive bombs" in the center of Berlin last night and started large fires, the Air Ministry announced today.

Overnight attacks also were made on an aluminum plant in German-occupied Norway and a radio station in Denmark, the British declared.

They acknowledged the loss of eight planes in these operations and in daylight assaults yesterday on Brest and other targets, but declared that German bombers were downed in heavy attacks last night on the English Midlands and north-east.

The Berlin radio, in a broadcast heard by NBC and CBS in New York, said the cities of Birmingham and New Castle were the chief targets of the German air raiders.

It was the first British raid on Berlin since March 23. An informed source said that while the attack was not comparable in size with Monday night's assault on Kiel, "it would have been felt."

Smaller forces of British night raiders were said to have struck at two cities near Hanover.

Three Local Men To Address Friday Night Meet

TO USE PLANES FOR NEW DUTY

All Army Craft Diverted For Transfer Of Troops

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—The War Department disclosed today that all army passenger and flight transports had been diverted to move troops and supplies between the United States and overseas possessions and bases.

Undersecretary Robert P. Patterson announced at the same time that a complete censorship had been clamped on all military information on all overseas bases.

The diversion of passenger-carrying cargo ships and freighters which comprised the army transport service have been shifted to the new assignment.

In addition, the War Department has chartered ten freighters, and Patterson said he had asked the Maritime Commission for more ships.

"Our greater activity in Hawaii, the Philippines, the Canal Zone and new Atlantic bases require full use of the transport service vessels," Patterson told a press conference.

The diversion involved suspension of the army's passenger and freight transport service, long in operation between the Atlantic and Pacific coast, Hawaii and the Philippines, via the Panama canal.

AIRPORT WORK TO BEGIN SOON

Start Work Tuesday Morning; School Being Sought

T. L. Moore, assistant projects superintendent of Pitt county for the Works Projects Administration disclosed today that 61 laborers would start work Tuesday morning April 15, at 7:30 o'clock on the \$90,000 improvement project at the city-county airport.

Mr. Moore said he had received final approval for the project and that work would begin with the start of the new work month, next Tuesday morning.

The 61 men to be placed on the project now are employed on a road project in the county.

Local city and Chamber of Commerce officials started work today on efforts to have the local airport designated as the site for the aviation school to be established in Eastern North Carolina.

Announcement was made in Washington yesterday that one of the largest flying schools in the East would be located in the eastern part of this state for training army pilots under contract with the War Department.

Sen. R. R. Reynolds, who made the announcement, declared that Safir, Inc., of New York City, one of the largest and oldest aviation schools in the East, plans to transfer the major portion of its organization to an undetermined site in Eastern Carolina for operation of the contract army aviation base.

Local officials today wired Sen. Reynolds, Sen. Bailey, Rep. Binner and the president of the Safir company, pointing out the facilities offered by Greenville.

The WPA project for development of the local airport was held up until Army engineers declared the site was suitable for expansion for possible army service.

Schools Prepare Observe Holidays

Teachers and students of the city and county schools today made plans to observe Easter vacations, but there will be no interruption in work at the college, which already has observed its spring holidays.

With the county having operated on a schedule throughout the season and with the prospect of early closing, Easter Monday will be observed. In announcing the decision, Supt. D. H. Conley said the action was taken at the request of principals, teachers, patrons and students.

All city schools will be closed both Good Friday and Easter Monday. The high school also will observe next Tuesday, but other departments will resume work Tuesday morning.

V. M. Mitholland, principal of the high school, explained that the college auditorium would not be available for commencement exercises on Friday night, May 30, because of a college musical program and the exercises would be postponed until Monday night, June 2.

The high school students will attend school on the day of June 2 thereby making up for the additional Easter holiday.

THREAT OF WAR BEHIND ACTION

Move Regarded As Indication Of Seriousness With Which Turkey Considers Threat Of Capital Being Involved In Conflict Being Waged In Balkans

Istanbul, Turkey, April 10.—The Turkish government announced today that it "found it advisable" to withdraw a considerable portion of Istanbul's population.

The government offered to transport the people free into the interior.

The action was regarded as an indication of how seriously Turkey considered the threat of war to Istanbul on the European side of the Bosphorus, less than 100 miles from the frontier of Bulgaria, about 150 miles from the eastern section of Greece, both occupied by Germany.

The announcement followed only a few hours after the Rome radio broadcast a report that Germany's ace diplomat, Franz Von Papen, ambassador to Turkey, had reiterated "the assurance that Germany has no intention of attacking Turkey."

Istanbul lies on the European side of the strategic Bosphorus, linked between the Dardanelles and the Black sea. It is less than 100 miles from German-occupied Bulgaria.

CROAT REGIME BEING FORMED

Berlin Reports Independent State Established

Budapest, Hungary, April 10.—(AP)—The official German news agency announced today under a Zagreb dateline the formation of an independent Croat state.

The agency said Yugoslav Vice Premier Vladimir Macek, speaking over the Zagreb radio, announced that Ante Tavelic, head of the Usta-chi terrorist organization which was to have plotted the assassination of King Alexander of Yugoslavia in 1934, would be chief of the new state.

Tavelic has been in Italy since he was condemned to death by the Yugoslav government on charges of plotting the assassination.

The German agency quoted Macek as saying that he himself would participate in the new regime and reported that he appealed to the populace to display German and Croat flags on their houses.

The funeral procession will go to Lileville, where the burial will be held.

Active pallbearers will be Lee H. Moore, M. L. Turnage, C. A. Musselwhite, Jack Teel, Dr. R. L. Meadows and Luther Whitehurst.

Mr. Seago was born and reared in Anson county. He lived in Charlotte for a number of years, and also made his home in Washington, D. C. for some time. He had lived with his brother here since December, 1938.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. O. S. Hillman of Columbia, S. C. and one son, J. T. Seago of the U. S. navy. Two grandchildren, several sisters and brothers also survive.

U. S. EMBRACES GREENLAND IN DEFENSE AREA

Agreement To Permit Establishment Of Air Bases

REASONS CITED FOR SUCH MOVE

Chief Executive Declares Action In Accordance With Monroe Doctrine And Havana Declaration

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—The United States embraced Greenland within its hemisphere defense system today under an agreement permitting establishment of air bases, and President Roosevelt said it was proposed to make sure the big island would remain a Danish colony.

The chief executive said in a formal statement that the present set-up, which in effect brings Greenland under the protection of this government, "is a new proof of our continuing friendliness to Denmark."

An agreement to place the island within the scope of America's plans for cooperative defense of the Western Hemisphere was signed yesterday by the President and by the Danish minister, Hendrik De Kauffman, who, Mr. Roosevelt said, acted on behalf of the Danish king.

In handing the President's statement to reporters, Presidential Secretary Stephen Early said the agreement had been consummated after the United States "had received information that German planes have been flying over Greenland."

Greenland, he said, has been placed in exactly the same category as any other Atlantic islands owned by non-American powers. The agreement, the secretary asserted, is in complete accordance with terms of the Monroe Doctrine and with a declaration signed by the 21 American republics at Havana.

In that latter declaration the republics agreed that no foreign possession in the Western Hemisphere should be transferred to the flag of another foreign country.

URGES SAFETY OVER HOLIDAY

Hocutt Sees No Reason For Easter Highway Deaths

Raleigh, April 10.—"Is there any good reason why a score of people must be killed on North Carolina streets and highways over the Easter week-end?" Ronald Hocutt, director of the Highway Safety Division, asked today.

Hocutt asked this pointed question after learning that on the basis of last year's Easter week-end traffic toll and the current accident rate in the state, there is a gloomy possibility that from 20 to 25 people may be killed in traffic accidents in the state this week-end.

Easter Sunday fell on March 24 last year, and the 12 persons killed in traffic accidents that week-end represented 22 per cent of the monthly total of 53. Around 100 persons were killed by motor vehicles in the state last month, and indications are that April's record will be no better, and possibly may be worse.

Delegates and alternates, two each, will be named at the meeting.

Seeks Danish Ships

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—American acquisition of 39 Danish cargo ships was expected to be asked of Congress by President Roosevelt today, presumably as a move toward strengthening Britain's Atlantic convoys.

Preparing For Battle With German Invaders

Strong Reinforcements Arriving At Southern Greek Ports To Establish Line Across Greek Peninsula; Athens Reports Trapped Greeks Still Holding Out; Yugoslavs Are Fighting Alone

Bern, Switzerland, April 10.—(AP)—The British were reported filling in a new defense line across the Greek peninsula today, rushing flame-throwers, tanks and armored cars north from Piraeus, the port of Athens, for a decisive battle with German blitzkrieg invaders.

Strong British reinforcements were said to be arriving in southern Greek ports from Africa.

(Presumably, many of these troops were brought from the Libyan desert campaign in North Africa, where a skeleton defense force has fallen back under the onslaught of combined German and Italian contingents.)

With Greece split in two and eastern Thrace and northern Macedonia engulfed in Adolf Hitler's drive to the East, the British were reported to be manning a new line extending from a point south of Salonika to the Albanian port of Chimara, on the Adriatic sea.

Although the Greeks asserted the remnants of their eastern army, encircled by the Germans north of Salonika, still were holding out in a fight to the death, it appeared that all hope for stemming the Nazi push hinged on the new defense line.

Reports from the front indicated that Yugoslavia would be compelled to fight a separate battle.

Italian dispatches early today said the German and Italian armies, driving into Southern Yugoslavia from opposite directions, were "on the point" of joining hands. A Budapest newspaper said they had made contact.

The meeting was expected to take place not far from the Albanian-Yugoslav border west of Skopje, strategic city at the head of the Vardar river valley leading to Salonika.

The Yugoslavs, meanwhile, were making a desperate effort to cut through the Italian line in Albania and join hands with the Greeks near Lake Ochrida, but they were said to be still some 50 miles from their objective.

One Yugoslav column, driving down along the Albanian coast, was reported attempting to force a crossing of the Mati river, about 31 miles north of the Albanian capital of Tirana, capturing Scutari and Alessio in a 35-mile advance.

Some dispatches from Turkey raised the possibility that the British air force and fleet might seek use of bases in Turkey for operations against Thrace. This, the dispatches said, would be in accordance with the manner in which the Germans use bases in Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria for attacks on Greece and Yugoslavia.

J. T. Timberlake Claimed By Death

James Thomas Timberlake, who for many years was engaged in the tobacco industry in Greenville, died at his home in La Grange, at 8 o'clock this morning following an extended illness of two years. He was 52 years old.

Funeral services will be conducted at the home tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Mr. Timberlake is survived by his wife, Mrs. Fieta Taylor Timberlake, sister of Mrs. J. C. Lanier of this city; one daughter, Miss Susan Timberlake, and his mother, Mrs. H. A. Timberlake of La Grange.

ACCEPT TERMS IN FORD TIEUP

Union Agrees To Plan Submitted By Gov. Van Wagoner

Detroit, April 10.—(AP)—The United Automobile Workers (UAW) accepted today a three-point proposal for settlement of the Ford Motor Company strike which Gov. Murray D. Van Wagoner laid before both sides in the controversy.

The governor, in the presence of union officials, read a letter of reply to him from R. J. Thomas, union president, which said the UAW already had moved pickets off the Rouge gate for the naval training school.

"That's very fine; I appreciate them doing that," the governor said. Posing for photographers in his shirt sleeves while shaking hands with Thomas, Van Wagoner said, "I am very happy about this and even happier that you have removed those pickets from the naval gate. I want you to know I have tried to be fair to both sides in this."

Thomas replied, "I think you have done as fine a job as anyone in the country could in trying to get the company and the union together."

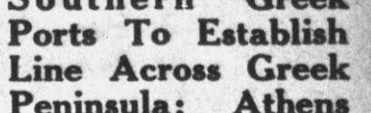

This is the day of Passion Week which commemorates the establishment of the Lord's Supper. The same night in which our Lord Jesus was betrayed, He took bread and wine, gave thanks for them, distributed them to His disciples and told them to eat and drink in remembrance of Him.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is above everything else a feast of remembrance. We recall to mind the sacrifice of our Lord. His crucifixion is a fact so well established in history that it would hardly seem necessary to remind ourselves of it. But the truth of the matter is that while men remember the fact, they forget the significance of it. The most important thing in the Christian religion is not what Jesus said, or even what He did, but what He was. The Sacrament reminds us of our Lord Himself. He knew that if men remembered Him, they would remember the things He said and would be comforted and strengthened by the things He did.

Best of all, they would remember Him as one who had laid down His life, and by so doing had brought the divine drama of redemption to its climax. The bread and wine bear mute testimony to the amazing fact that through the death of one man came life for all men, and through the suffering of One, came peace.

### WE CAN'T STOP NOW

The seriousness of the situation in Europe should convince this country that no more time should be lost in our defense program and in getting all aid possible to the other democracies, even if we have to carry it to them. In the enactment of the lend-lease program we have officially admitted that we consider the fight now being waged by the democracies our first line of defense, and the best way not to have to send our soldiers to those battle fields is to rush all possible material aid to Great Britain and her allies. In order to guarantee the safe delivery of the supplies it may become necessary for us to use our navy to get them across the Atlantic, but it seems to us that it would be better to do this and help stop Hitler now than to have to use both our army and navy later on to keep the totalitarian forces away from our shores or prevent them from dominating the rest of the world and strangling us economically. We have already committed ourselves and we can't let the democracies lose now.

### THIS IS THE PLACE FOR IT

Today's announcement that one of the country's largest flying schools for the training of army pilots might be established in Eastern North Carolina has set our city and Chamber of Commerce officials busy trying to place before the proper authorities the ad-

Our city-county airport is already one of the largest in this section and within the past few days War Department representatives have looked over the field and adjoining properties to ascertain possibilities of expansion of the field if and when needed, and have placed their full approval on the project. The fact that the War Department feels that there is available here all the necessary space for future expansion should be a big factor in attracting the flying school to Greenville.

Already a fine piece of work has been done in the preliminary development of our airport to take care of the Civilian Pilot Training school now under way, and on next Tuesday a large number of workers will begin work of further development of the project.

Should we secure this flying school for army pilots it his highly probable that even after the present emergency is over the school will continue for the training of commercial fliers, and

in such case we would have a very worthwhile permanent program here. We urge all our citizens to give their full support to the efforts to secure this flying school for our community.

## Washington Daybook

Washington.—Title trouble: Harvey Klemmer, one-time crack reporter for the Detroit News and now one of the bright young men of our London embassy staff, is back in Washington. He first came here with Joe Kennedy, when the latter was head of the Maritime Commission. And out of that experience came Harvey's book, "Harbor Nights," which might have been subtitled "Don't Go Down to the Sea in Ships If You're Looking For Romance and Adventure." Harvey is home from London to report and soon will be winging back. He already has seen a heap of war, with such experiences as the afternoon when he and his wife and two daughters were having tea in the London suburb garden and were attacked by eight Stuka dive bombers. One of them "as only 50 feet overhead when it levelled off and started climbing. Fortunately for the Klemmer family, all missed. Which proves that not even the Stukas can "lay their eggs in a barrel," as some of the boys claim our pilots can do.

All But A Name  
It was out of this harried life however, that Harvey found material for his new book, "They'll Never Quit," which is crawling up the non-fiction best seller lists

When Harvey first sent the manuscript over from England, it bore the title, "Murder in the Black-out." His publishers called that that would never do. People would think it was a mystery and curse it for its misleading name, they said. They could think of nothing else Klemmer suggested "Blitzkrieg." That, they cabled, had been used already. So Harvey came home with no title and not even a good idea. After days of brain-cudgeling, he walked out on the street and in desperation accosted a cab driver.

"What would you like to know more than anything else about the British?" Harvey asked.

"The Jehu didn't hesitate. 'Will they stick?' he asked.

"'Brother,' Harvey almost shout-

ed, "you have just named a book." In his excitement and eagerness to get to his publishers, Harvey forgot to get the taxi driver's name. Now he can't even send an autographed copy to the man who gave him the title.

**Power Of Suggestion**  
Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau was holding a press conference. He and the boys were doing a little informal chatting about the national defense saving stamps with which even the dime-savers will get in on financing the government's big defense load.

"Mr. Secretary," asked one of the reporters, "don't you think there might be a chance that counterfeiters will try to work on these stamps?"  
"Oh, I hardly think so," Mr. Morgenthau said. "For instance there are the food stamps. There has been no traffic in counterfeit stamps there."

A week later almost to the day two men were arrested in New York. The charge: Conspiring to foist a million dollars worth of counterfeit food stamps on an unsuspecting public.

**Signs Mean 'Positively'**  
If you don't believe in signs about "Keep Off the Grass," then keep out of Washington. In two days, 92 persons were arrested for cutting across the patchwork of sickly lawn between some of the government buildings on the Mall. Most persons forfeited their \$2 collateral (personal bond). Those who appeared in court, generally saved \$1 by getting fined only a buck. One arrested was a Fort Meade soldier. He was turned over to military police and had to go back to camp 28 hours before expiration of his leave, which was severest punishment of all. If Washington could find a type of grass that would grow in its top-soilless earth, think how many capital cops could go back to working on crime.

## Short Shots

Raleigh, April 10.—Among the nine cases which will be argued orally in Supreme court next week is one which shows vividly why there was so much deep feeling in the movement to ban sale of fortified wines in North Carolina, and why Speaker Odus Mull flatly threatened an all out fight for a liquor referendum unless something were done about the wine situation.

Case is the appeal of a 17-year-old Negro boy, Joseph Samuel Miller from a death sentence for the brutal murder of a white barber, C. C. Ritter, in Charlotte.

Evidence showed that Miller shot Ritter because the latter would not submit tamely to robbery of some \$30 he had in his pocket. First thing the youth did after the killing was to hot foot it to a wine store to buy a gallon of the "fortified" stuff; and it can readily be inferred from the record that the real reason for the killing was a desire to get money enough for a big

wine jug. Incidentally, the evidence of a Charlotte detective should give pause for thought to some who brag loudly about the progress and "fine living conditions" of Negroes in the state.

Said he of the home in which Miller lived with his 78-year-old grandmother:  
"The condition of her home is pretty bad—I'd say about the average for colored people."  
So the "average" is "pretty bad," according to one who has a fine chance to observe.

**Fair Dates**  
The State Fair will be held October 14 to 18 this year, Dr. J. S. Dorton, manager, says. He has figured out, incidentally, that ordinarily the fair premium lists account for about a quarter of its revenues.

**Chance To Fly**  
From the Raleigh recruiting office it is learned that the navy is soon to offer an opportunity to some 2,200 young Americans to learn much about the business of flying.

It is contemplated that 600 of these enlisted men will be ordered to active duty at vocational schools on or about June 1, and that an additional 600 will be ordered about eight weeks later.

It is expected that the course of vocational instruction will cover about 16 weeks and it is planned to provide recruit training as well. Upon completion of the course these men will be ordered to further active duty in connection with avia-

### An Easy Meal For Easter

No homemaker in the world is "sitting prettier" when it comes to choosing what she'll serve for Easter than Mrs. Amelia Housewife. For example, if she and hers prefer a rich smoked taste, and if she wants to bake her ham in her own sweet way, she can choose the ham that bakes in just 16 minutes per pound, and no parboiling, thank you. One of the best of these hams is called the original Tender, Extra Mild Smoked Ham.

But if she prefers a ham that's even faster to fix, she will choose one of the tender, ready to serve hams. This ham can be served just as it comes from the wrapper. Or if you wish to serve it hot, it heats to juicy perfection in just five minutes per pound in a moderate oven. Another thing, both of these hams are made so delectably tender by a special secret process that you don't need a cover on the roaster and you don't need to hang over them and keep them basting as you cook. Doesn't this make getting Easter dinner a simple thing!

**EASY EASTER MENU**  
Cream of Mushroom Soup  
Toasted Crackers  
Spring Vegetable Salad  
Baked Tender Made Ham  
Fluffy Mashed Sweet Potatoes  
New Peas in Cream  
Fresh Fruit Cup—Sherry Flavored Lamb Cake

To bake a tender, ready to serve ham—Allow the whole or half ham to come to room temperature (68 to 70 degrees F.). Place it fat side up in an open pan or uncovered roaster. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

and bake, allowing 5 minutes per pound for a whole ham and 8 minutes per pound for a half ham. (Yes 'm you always need to cook a small piece of meat a longer period per pound than a larger piece requires. Reason probably lies in the larger amount of surface per cubic contents.)

**New Way to Decorate Ham**—When the ham is done remove it from the oven and lift off the skin, leaving a small collar of the skin if you wish. If you slash the edge of this collar at two-inch intervals with a scissors, you will get a very pretty curled effect when the ham comes to the table.  
After removing the skin, score the fat in circles with a small round cookie cutter. This is a nice change from the ordinary diamond shape scoring. Now sprinkle the ham rather liberally with brown sugar. Decorate with marashino cherries, cut into very narrow strips and insert in the circles which you have made with the cookie cutter. Return the ham to the oven for about 20 minutes more so that it develops a light brown glaze. The result will be a handsome gleaming ham, decorated with a series of circles outlined in scarlet cherries.

To Bake a Tender Extra Mild Smoked Ham—Allow ham to reach room temperature (68 to 70 degrees F.). Bake in a moderate oven (325 to 350 F) for 16 minutes per pound. When baking a half ham allow 19 minutes per pound. Decorate this ham in the same way suggested above.

"Lamb" Cake is not so difficult as it sounds. It does not even require a Lamb cake mold. Some one in your family will draw a kneeling lamb for you. Cut this out. Make two sheets of layer cake. Use the "lamb" as a pattern and cut out a lamb shape from each sheet of layer cake, exactly as you would cut out material with a paper pattern. Use your favorite boiled icing. After you have set the two layers of the cake together with icing andiced the cake on the outside, cover it thickly with grated coconut. The result is a fricky white woolly lamb cake that even grown-ups will enjoy.


the bare stretch of beach and tried to draw away, so that she might tell him what had happened between Neil and herself. Apparitions

## Question Of Exemption Not Completely Settled

Raleigh, April 10.—When Chief Justice W. P. Stacy recently wrote the unanimous opinion of the Supreme court that the test for tax exemption of property owned by "charitable" institutions is the use to which it is put and not the character of the organization owning it, there was a somewhat general belief that the subject was about settled.

Certainly the Stacy words were clear, clean-cut and correct; but it now turns out that they did not cover every possible variation of ownership and use.

So it has come to pass that tax listing and assessing officials over the state are still finding themselves confronted with puzzling problems.

Take the case of Guilford's tax supervisor. He has so many live, pressing questions that he spent most of Wednesday morning here in close conference with Assistant Attorney General T. Wade Bruton, trying to straighten out the situation in his county.

The supervisor (R. G. Hudson) had a variety of puzzles to solve; possibly more than the average county official because Guilford is a county in which are located numerous colleges and a variety of religious denominations owning real estate of one sort or another.

Mr. Hudson wanted to know what to do about listing for taxation a church which is owned, in fee simple, by its preacher. There isn't any board of trustees, no deacons or elders, no church corporation, no anything of that kind. He and Mr. Bruton think it should be taxed, but what if the preacher-owner goes to court about it. Does the Supreme court decision go so far as to make taxable property which is actually used as a church?

And another one. How about college property located on its campus, with a leased building on it? It seems that the building is undoubtedly taxable under the court's rule but is the land value?

Again, what is a charity hospital
