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LONDON BEARS BRUNT OF TERRIFIC NAZI BOMBING

DEFENSE WORK FACES TIE-UP FROM STRIKES

Walkouts Threatened
At General Motors
Plants

NAVY YARD ALSO
FACING TROUBLE

Critical Point Reached
In Threatened
Tie-Up At Boston
Yard With AFL Op-
posing Walkout

Strike threats in plants of the General Motors Corporation and in the Boston navy yard reached the critical point today and the American Federation of Labor threw its influence against a Pacific coast walkout of 1,700 AFL and CIO shipyard machinists.

Members of a National Defense Mediation Board panel attempting to head off a strike in 60 General Motors plants which have \$700,000,000 of defense contracts adjourned early yesterday, after nine days of negotiations with CIO leaders and company representatives.

Chiefs of the union, the United Automobile Workers, flew back to Detroit to consider whether to call a walkout. But Chairman W. H. Davis of the board panel said negotiations under its direction would resume tomorrow and that "there is no indication of any purpose not to continue production."

The UAW wants a new contract providing for a wage increase of 10 cents an hour. The company has offered at least two cents an hour for all workers and three to five cents for certain skilled craftsmen. The present wage rate varies with the type of work but company officials said the average was slightly over \$1.

AFL's Building Construction Trades Council had 925 members. It would not report today at the Boston navy yard, where \$30,000,000 of defense building is underway, in protest against the employment of 1,100 WPA workers. Secretary-Treasurer E. A. Johnson said the union would not picket at present but that members would not go back to work until it was agreed that union labor would handle all new construction "from start to finish."

In the meanwhile William Green, president of the AFL, asserted in Patterson, N. J., yesterday that a walkout of union machinists in San Francisco shipyards was an "outlawed strike" and that the AFL was "appealing to the unions there to rescind their strike action."

Boston, May 12.—(AP)—The Office of Production Management has arranged a conference in Washington tomorrow over a strike of more than 900 American Federation of Labor skilled craftsmen which today halted work on \$3,000,000 of a \$30,000,000 contract at the navy's big South Boston drydock.

Ernest A. Johnson, secretary of the Building and Construction Trades Council (AFL), said a telephone call from the OPM came as union heads were considering extending the walkout orders to 300 union workers in the navy yard.

Johnson asserted E. Graves would leave tonight to confer with Rear Admiral Morrell, navy chief of the Bureau of Yards and Docks. Johnson declared that the union was not picketing and that the 1,200 WPA and civil service employees at the base, described by him as protest point of the strike, were not interfered with today.

Hess In Crash

Berlin, May 12.—(AP)—Rudolf Hess, Adolf Hitler's crone, number two politician, has crashed in a plane flight, made contrary to the Fuehrer's orders, the Nazi party announced tonight, and his adjutants, accused of permitting the flight, have been ordered arrested. The brief announcement from the National Socialist headquarters did not at once make clear the extent, if any, of the party deputy's injuries, but said Hess had been in failing health. Hess was said to have been missing since a flight in his own plane last Saturday. His adjutants—of unspecified number—were accused of having been aware that Hess had been ordered not to fly when he took off.

DRAFT BOARDS TO RUSH WORK

Ordered To Proceed
With Classification
Of Men

Washington, May 12.—(AP)—Brigadier General Lewis B. Hershey, acting Selective Service director, has asked all local draft boards to "proceed with the prompt classification" of 10,000,000 men who registered for military service last October but have not yet been classified as to their availability.

This was learned at Selective Service headquarters today and it was indicated the information gained by complete classification would be useful both in determining the number of skilled defense workers who might be affected by the draft and in showing the age ratings of available men preliminary to any decision on lowering the top limit of 35 years.

Of the total of approximately 16,500,000 men registered, approximately 6,500,000 have been classified. Previously the boards have followed the policy, under instructions from Hershey, of classifying only a sufficient number of men to provide a small margin beyond the number actually called for military service.

CLAIM BRITISH ARE REPULSED

Different Story Reported By Middle East Command

Beirut, Lebanon, May 12.—(AP)—The Iraq general staff declared today British armored forces were repulsed in violent fighting around the fort of Rutba.

The British were said to have lost two of their armored cars in the attack, and a British plane, caught in the machinegun fire from the ground, was reported shot down in flames. The details were given in addition to the high command communiqué which declared the Rutba fort still in the hands of Iraqi and that there was increased activity near Basra, to the south.

(A British Middle East communiqué today from Cairo said that after bombing of the fort at Rutba by a single RAF plane, motorized troops took over the stronghold Sunday morning and were in control of the entire Rutba area.)

CHINA IN NEED OF ARMS ONLY TO DOWN JAPS

Chiang Asserts No
Land Or Naval
Aid Required

CITES NEED FOR
ECONOMIC HELP

Generalissimo Declares Chinese Victory Or Defeat Would Be Victory Or Defeat For America

Chungking, May 12.—(AP) Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek declared in a speech last night that China, without the help of an expeditionary force or naval action but with material and economic aid, was prepared to undertake single-handed the task of putting down Japan.

He added it was his conviction that "any country in the world matching itself against American democracy would meet with certain destruction."

He spoke at a farewell dinner given by Madame Chiang for United States Ambassador Nelson T. Johnson, who is leaving to become minister to Australia. Many leading figures in China attended.

"Should the Japanese militarists manage in some way to dispose of their China problem they would certainly attack America," Chiang said. "Chinese victory or defeat would be a victory or defeat for America, and every other nation in the Pacific. A Chinese defeat would result in the expulsion of the British and American forces from the Pacific and Soviet Russian arms from Vladivostok and Siberia."

Expect Follow Up Clean-Up Drive

TALK MEETING OF DICTATORS

Hitler, Il Duce And Stalin May Get Together Soon

Vichy, May 12.—(AP)—Diplomatic circles reported today that meetings among Adolf Hitler, Premier Mussolini and Joseph Stalin are considered likely in the near future. These informants indicated the meeting would be in connection with possible reorganization of European economic if not the European military bloc.

Diplomats believe that the meetings, if they actually take place, will be a part of far-reaching moves all over Europe—including a shake-up of the Spanish civil and military organization and French Vice Premier Darlan's negotiations with the Germans.

RAF Planes Also Active During Night

Britons Heartened Over Fact Germany Beginning To Feel Effects Of Counter Aerial Offensive By Royal Air Force; Hamburg And Bremen Principal Targets Singled Out By British

London's millions trudged to work today through acres of fire-blackened ruins in the heart of the empire capital—scarred anew by Luftwaffe violence over the week-end—but they knew that Germany at last was feeling the sting of a big scale aerial counter-offensive.

An armada of 100 RAF warplanes bombed the ports of Hamburg and Bremen during the night, it was reported, leaving "many large fires" raging in both cities from a rain of Britain's new super bombs.

Other RAF squadrons attacked Emden and raided in Nazi-held Holland.

In an imminent attempt to cripple the RAF's intensified striking power, German planes concentrated the weight of their overnight assaults on night flying bases in southern, central and southeastern England. Nazi quarters in Berlin said many multi-motored planes were believed damaged or destroyed in attacks on RAF airdromes.

London itself had the lightest night raid in three weeks, but thousands of residents huddled in shelters fearful of another storm such as that which hit the capital Saturday night.

Rescue workers still dug in the wreckage for victims of that all-out attack, which inflicted a total of uncounted dead and wounded. A single bomb smashed through a hotel and exploded in the basement where 140 persons had taken refuge. Westminster Abbey, the House of Parliament, including Big Ben, were among the venerated symbols of the British empire scarred anew during the six-hour shower of explosives and fire bombs. The Luftwaffe used between 300 and 400 warplanes in the raid and lost 33 of their bombers. These, with seven downed last night brought the total reported downed at night over England since May 1 to 132.

Photograph Exhibit.

The Greenville WPA Art Gallery has an exhibit of photographs showing the silk screen process of printing. This is a method of reproducing designs on articles for practical use. It can be used for textiles in house furnishing; for posters, placards and other forms of publicity; for invitations, place cards, menu cards and programs. The photograph in this exhibit shows a craftsman designing a textile. He begins with a plain piece of percale, applies the design step by step and finally uses it as draperies or portieres in an interior.

The photographs and the description of the process were worked out by the Milwaukee Handicraft project of the Works Progress Administration. This method of reproducing designs has great possibilities and is being used extensively for posters and publicity work in the defense program. It provides work for individuals or for groups of people.

This exhibit will stay up until the latter part of May. The art gallery is on the second floor of the Sheppard Memorial Library. The hours are 2 to 6 each day except Sunday. The gallery is closed on Sundays. The public is invited to attend all exhibitions.

TALK STARTED OVER CHANGES

Minor Job Shifts Begins Political Tongues Wagging

Raleigh, May 12 — Firing of one minor official and his almost immediate re-hiring by a different state department started political tongues to wagging here and when this episode was followed shortly by unofficial information that another minor officeholder is to be let out in the very near future the chatter increased noticeably in volume.

Incident one involved the replacement of W. Capers White as a prison camp superintendent and his quick engagement as an aide to State Auditor George Ross Poul.

Incident two is receipt of notice by John C. Baskerville, secretary of the Governor's Hospitality Committee, that his services will not be required after June 1. There has been no official announcement to this effect; but there isn't any doubt about authenticity of the report.

In each case the politically minded are discussing the extent to which Governor J. M. Broughton was personally responsible for dismissal of a state employee whose record indicated complete competency to do the job he had been assigned; and they are drawing inferences which are completely at odds with the oft-repeated advice of "no politics" the governor has given his appointees to major positions.

The White case, veteran observers of the Tar Heel scene say, had its root way back when George Ross Poul was prison director. In those years, 'tis said, Oscar Pitts chief political aide - de - camp in the Broughton administration, was "agin" Mr. Poul while Mr. White was "fer" him. Result was that as soon as Pitts got the chance, off went the White head. The state auditor's action in giving him a job immediately was explained by this line up of years gone by.

The Poul friends are pointing to the incident as proof of a keen sense of loyalty on the auditor's part. They flatly declare that few state officials would have dared employ a man so obviously the object of the gubernatorial lieutenant's displeasure.

In this case there is no direct evidence that Broughton has any preference for the Goldsboro girls 2-4 earlier in the week.

Eileen tried to speak, but Caroline interrupted her. "You're getting me wrong. I'm not blaming you. Any hard-up girl with wits would have"

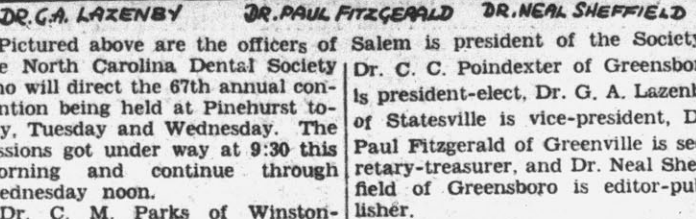

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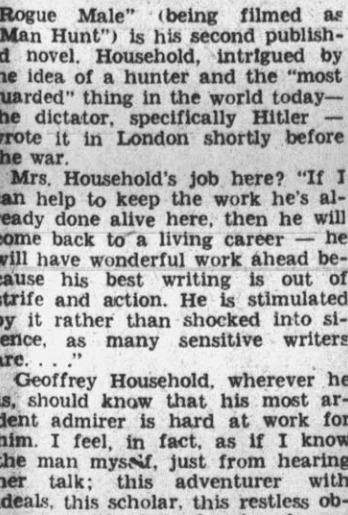

Hugh Latimer, the famous dis-
senting bishop in the English
Church, was once asked to preach a
sermon before King Henry VIII and
greatly offended his royal patron by
his plainness of speech. King
Henry commanded the humble
court chaplain to preach on the
same text the following Sunday, de-
velop it as the king thought it
should be developed, and make a
public apology for having offend-
ed his sovereign.

The next Sunday Latimer as-
cended the pulpit, read the text,
and thus began his sermon. "Hugh
Latimer, dost thou know before
whom thou art this day to speak?
Before the high and mighty mon-
arch, the king's most excellent ma-
jesty, who can take away thy life if
thou offendest; therefore, take heed
that thou speakest not a word that
may displease. But then, consider
well, Hugh! Dost thou not know
from whom thou comest—upon
whose message thou art sent? Even
by the great, the Almighty God, who
is all-present and beholds all thy
ways, and who is able to cast thy
soul into hell. Therefore take care
that thou deliverest thy message
faithfully."

And so, taking the same text from
which he had preached the Sunday
before, Latimer, with increased en-
ergy, preached his sermon over
again, emphasizing and making
even stronger the points which had
offended the king and sparing not
even his royal majesty as a sinner
before the throne of God.

Needless to say, the king, who ad-
mired bravery in any man, shrug-
ged his shoulders and allowed Lat-
imer to go unpunished.

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UNITED STATES MUST ACT NOW TO INSURE BRITISH VICTORY

(Scottish Rite News)

Military events in Europe
are making it clear to think-
ing American people that a
German victory is imminent
—only several months hence
—if the United States does
not, at whatever risk or cost
to itself, deliver munitions
and vital food products to
the ports of England, Scot-
land and Northern Ireland.

Secretary of War Henry
L. Stimson brought the issue
squarely before the nation in
his radio address on May 5.
Advocating the use of the
United States Navy for con-
voys, he solemnly warned
that "unless we on our side
are ready to sacrifice and, if
need be, die for the conviction
that the freedom of
America must be saved, it
will not be saved."

Prominent responsible
men and women, who were
formerly out-and-out isola-
tionists, are in growing num-
bers coming to the conclu-
sion that the fall of Britain
would mean the fall of our
civilization. It is obvious that
the time for half measures
are over. War materials must
be delivered to Britain's
fighting forces.

Death and destruction
from Nazi bombs continue
apace in many cities on the
British Isles. Very recently
Dover, Portsmouth, Ply-

mouth, Liverpool, and Bel-
fast in Northern Ireland,
with some Scottish cities,
have suffered the most. Dur-
ing the past ten days, Ply-
mouth has been so severely
bombed that authorities have
declared the city an "evacu-
ation area," and requested
the citizens to seek shelter
elsewhere.

Despite the magnificent
resistance of Greece, Yugo-
slavia and Great Britain, the
Nazis now control the Bal-
kans and threaten Iraq and
the Dardanelles. Military ex-
perts predict that the Axis
will next attack Egypt and
the Suez Canal from the east
by way of Syria, and from
Libya on the west coast. Re-
ports indicate that, in such
an event, the British forces
under General Wavell will
be without adequate air or
land equipment and will be
outnumbered two to one.

Others are of the opinion
that the British Navy in the
Mediterranean would to a
degree compensate for these
deficiencies by bombarding
the Axis supply ships before
they reached bases of opera-
tion to the west of Egypt.

Others are hopeful that the
material now arriving in
ships at Port Said from the
United States will greatly
aid the British Army. But
without, many military ob-
servers believe that Britain's
chances to win in the Near
East are discouraging, if not
hopeless. Added to the Brit-
ish handicaps in the Near
East are threats of war by
the Mohammedans, egged
on by the Nazis. Should this
threat materialize, there is
no question but what Great
Britain would lose the war
in the Mediterranean; lose
all gained in East Africa,
and be completely cut off
from a direct route to India
and Australia. This would
subject the British empire
in the Orient to attack by
Japan.

Another threat facing
Great Britain is the occupa-
tion of Spain and Portugal,
also Spanish and French Af-
rican possessions, including
the Canary Islands and the
Azores.

It is reported that twenty-
seven Nazi divisions are now
massed along the southwest-
ern coast of France between
Bordeaux and Bayonne
ready to enter Spain. It is
believed in London, accord-

ing to high authority, that
French Vice-Premier Admi-
ral Jean Darlan will give his
consent to the passage of
German troops through Un-
occupied France to Spain.
Also at the proper time he
will yield to the Nazi de-
mands for the French Navy
and the French Army under
General Weygand in French
Morocco. All this, it is point-
ed out, portends the further
challenge of the British
Navy in the Atlantic.

Observers believe that
the only hope of thwarting
Hitler's designs further to
involve France against
Great Britain and the estab-
lishment of air and subma-
rine bases on the west coast
of Africa is an effective con-
voy system between the
United States and the British
ports. This, it is held, will
not only give Great Britain
needed supplies, but will re-
lease its Navy and aircraft
to counter German attacks.

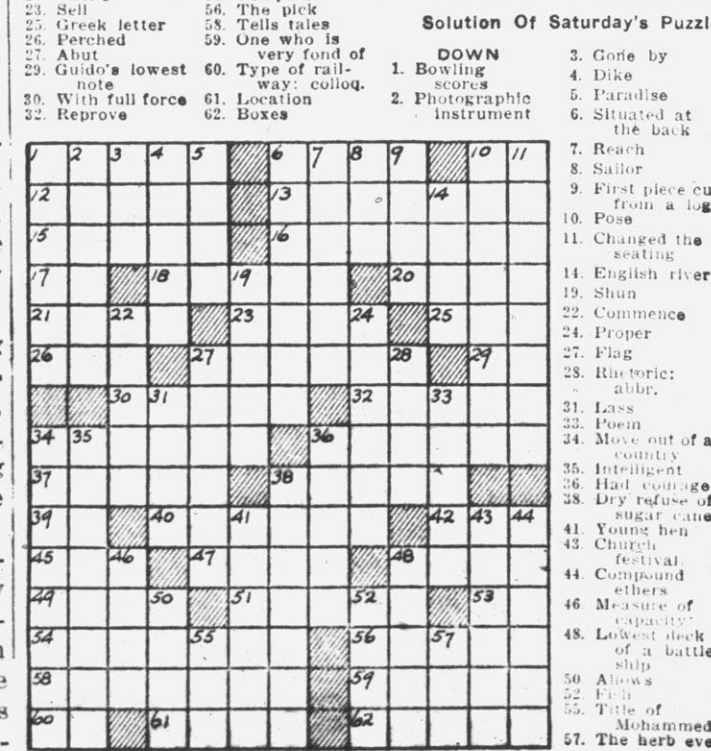

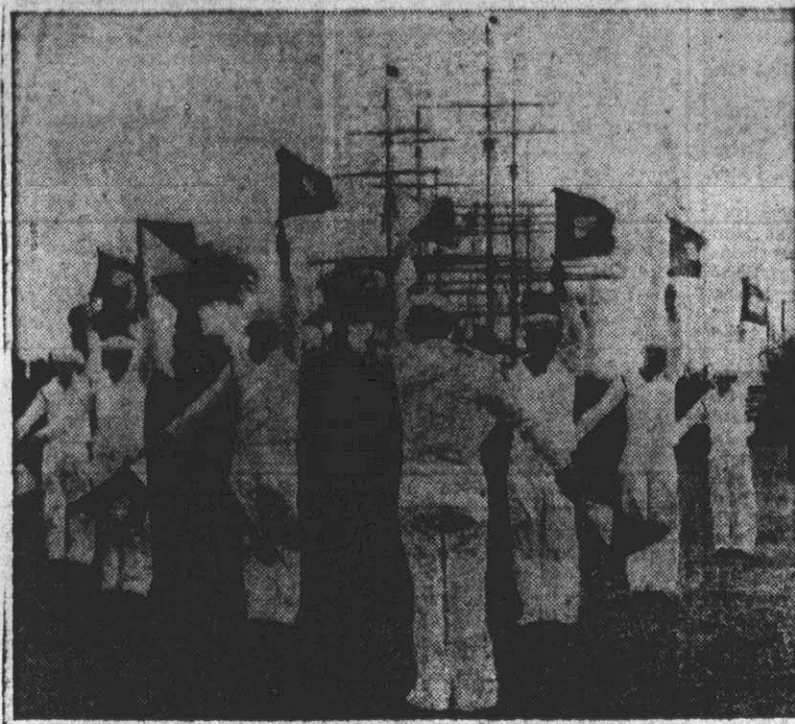

U. S. TRAINS YOUTHS FOR SEA



The United States Maritime Service is meeting the threatened shortage of skilled merchant seamen by training youths who have had no previous seagoing experience. Young American citizens in good physical condition 18 to 23 years of age are being enrolled for a seven month course of instruction in the duties of the deck, engineers, and stewards departments. Enrollees are paid \$21.00 monthly; clothing, food, and quarters are furnished by the Government. The training course qualifies these young men for jobs on American merchant vessels where pay starts at \$72.50 a month with food and quarters furnished. For detailed information write to U. S. Navy Goes Exclusive.

There has been a little interpleine
war in our armed forces, and the
Navy has poked the Army where it
hurts most — in the stomach. The
Navy has closed its cafeteria to out-
siders — and "outsiders," to the
admirals, includes the Army.

The story behind it is this: The
army cafeteria (in the Munitions
building) is small and no great
shakes for food either, so war de-
partment workers — at least a lot
of them — have been in the habit
of running across the street to Navy
for their noonday chow. This, plus
the great increase in employees,
caused a daily traffic jam in the
Navy beany.

To eliminate this, the Navy is-
sued its order and has posted
guards to see that only persons
wearing the Navy department iden-
tification badges get by the cafe-
teria doors.

The Navy was the third building
in the vicinity of the Army to clamp
down on cafeteria visitors. Both
the Federal Reserve (just across the
street from the Munitions build-
ing) and Department of Interior
have put "employees only" signs over
their eateries during certain
hours.

What the Army will do to appease
its midday hunger still is being con-
sidered. Some of the hired help
suggests an issue of lunch boxes.

Short Shots

Raleigh May 12 — Shift in the
vice-chairmanship of the Board of
Conservation and Development was
more than the substitution of one
newspaper man, Sanford Martin,
for another, Josh Horne.

It put in the place a sincere New
Dealer instead of an old-time con-
servative whose known dislike of
the national Democratic adminis-
tration is so intense that Editor and
Publisher, newspaper industry pub-
lication, last year listed Horne's or-
gan, the Rocky Mount Telegram,
as for Willie (though this was lat-
ter formally denied by Mr. Horne).

Martin, a very close personal
friend of Governor J. M. Broughton
is ranking member of the board in
point of service and it was quite a
surprise when Horne was chosen

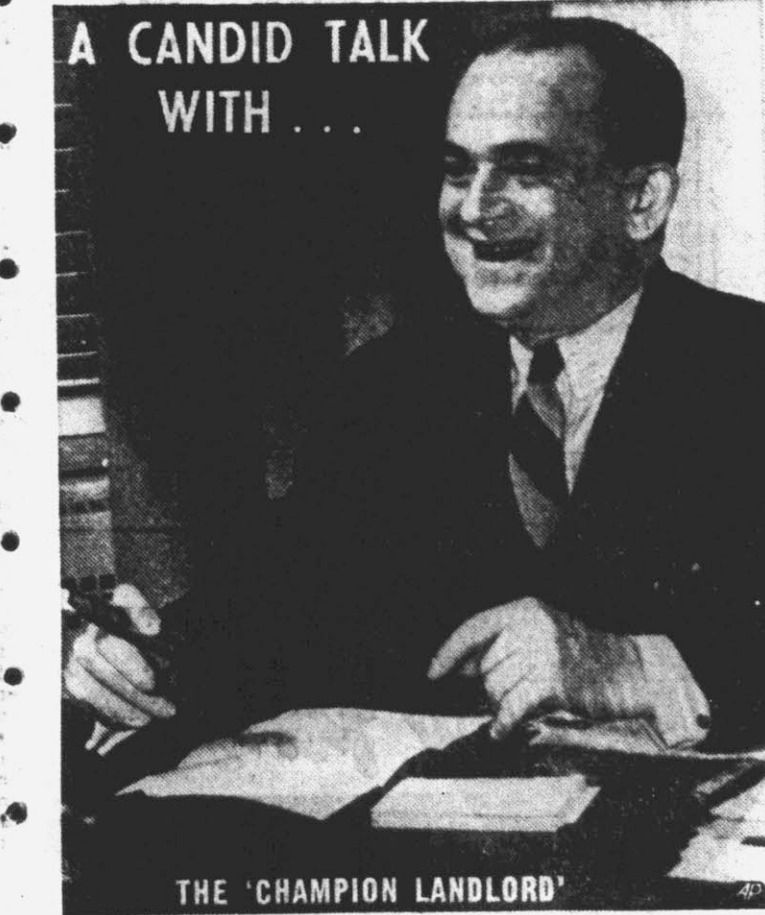

Raleigh, May 11.—Employment is at its highest level in many years in North Carolina, but it is apparent that the state faces a general shortage in farm labor, according to an analysis of the employment situation made by the North Carolina State Employment Service.

The service also reports that a number of voluntary wage increases have been made by employers in many lines of industry, while on the whole employer-worker relations appear to be excellent. The State Department of Labor has not yet prepared its statistical review of wages and hours for April, but Commissioner Forrest Shuford said that from his own department's observations he is agreed that labor relations are now very satisfactory in the state.

Reports to the Employment service indicated that apprehension has lessened that there will be an inadequate supply of labor, although there is no question that numerous textile plants would put on third shifts if it were not for a shortage of workers. On the other hand these plants seem to be meeting delivery dates.

In the foundry and machine plants work is being slowed up by inability to get delivery of raw materials in more instances than by any worker shortage.

Opening of the strawberry season, however, show very clearly the prospects of a general shortage in farm labor. There is every indication that the shortage of pickers will be acute and according to the employment service's farm placement supervisor many farmers have already lost thousands of dollars in berries because of the inadequate labor supply.

All signs point to a near-record, if not a record crop, with a drastic reduction in the number of available pickers.

The picker shortage has already sent the pay for picking up from a cent and a half per basket to two cents, and even this increase has not prevented a number of more or less migrant workers from going to the eastern Virginia areas where the pay is two and a half or three cents a basket.

The defense industries have absorbed many workers who usually help in the berry harvest.

To meet the picker shortage the employment service has organized a recruiting program and has sent representatives into more than 100 small towns and communities in an effort to enlist workers — but with decidedly meager results. Where formerly these recruiters were able to bring in several truck loads of workers, only four or five persons are being found available this year.

In contrast to the scarcity of the farm workers — berry pickers being the chief category wanted right now — is the surplus of construction workers in most Tar Heel areas. Completion of defense cantonments in the east has released a large number of workers in this class, but it is evident that a large number of these workers, many of them semi-skilled workers with an agricultural background, will not accept work on the farms—hoping that they will be restored to the much more remunerative defense construction pay rolls on the projects now getting under way in Onslow county.

The employment service reports a stronger demand for domestic and clerical workers in April than in March. Highway construction is making strong demands for heavy road machine operators.

In the eyes of the employment officials the most dreaded long-range effect of the existing farm labor shortage is its after-effects. Many large farmers are welcoming the chance to get rid of a large part of their hired help and tenant, replacing them with power equipment.

This means that when defense jobs run out, there will be no farm jobs to fall back upon.

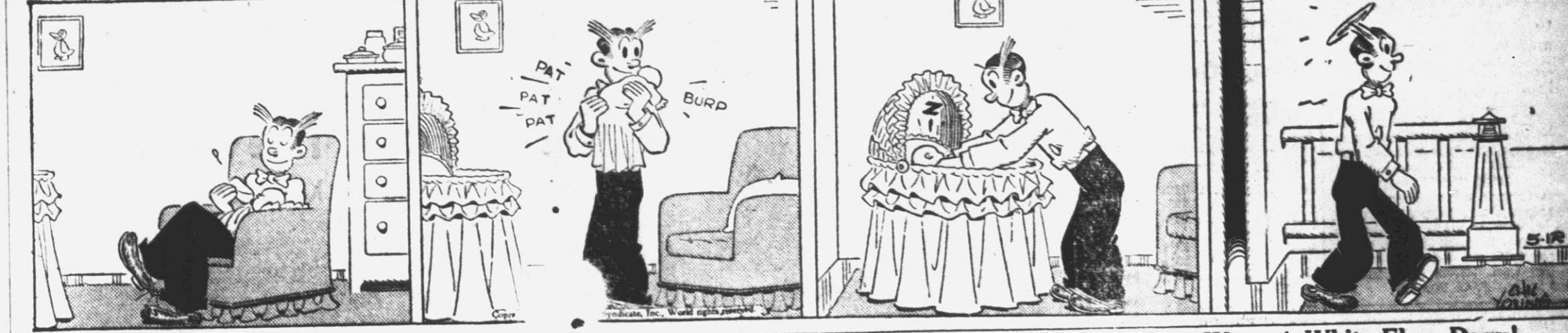

5,000 Expected At No Fireworks Seen In Committee Meet

Raleigh, May 12 — Some 5,000 farmers, from all parts of the two Carolinas, will converge on Raleigh tomorrow morning to attend the annual joint membership meeting of the North Carolina Cotton Growers Cooperative association and Farmers Cooperative Exchange, with Secretary of Agriculture Claude Wickard playing the role of principal speaker.

It will be the secretary's first major address in North Carolina since he was elevated to cabinet status last August. His remarks are thus expected to be significant in indicating the trend in store for the South's big cash crops, hardest hit by the war in Europe.

He will head a distinguished group scheduled for places on the program, which begins promptly at 10 o'clock in the Memorial auditorium. Other headliners include Governor J. Melville Broughton, Dean W. J. Harrelson of State College, Congressman Harold D. Cooley, Director I. O. Schaub of the State College Extension Service, Commissioner of Agriculture W. Kerr Scott, Editor Clarence Poe of the Progressive Farmer and M. G. Mann, general manager of the sponsor organization.

Mann, as usual, will give detailed reports on the operations of the associations, covering the past fiscal year, during which the Cotton Growers and the FCX handled approximately ten million dollars worth of farm products and farm supplies.

Organized six years ago, the FCX has now 24 branch warehouses throughout the Carolinas and 3,000 dealer-agents. The Cotton Association, which is now in its 19th year, marketed some 100,000 bales of cotton for farmers of the state during the past year.

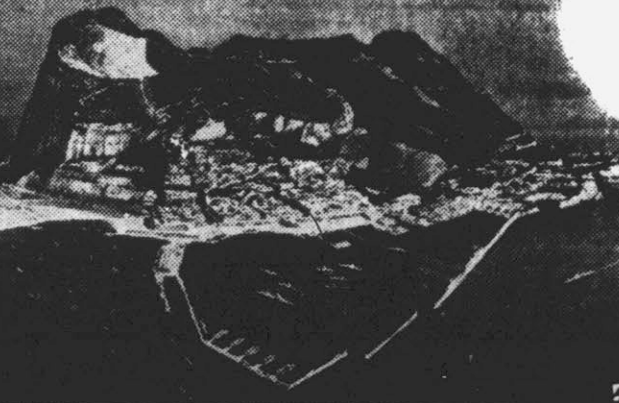
