

NAZIS REPORT CRETE CAPITAL OCCUPIED

Roosevelt Address Hailed By British; Studied By Axis

POLICY FIXED BY PRESIDENT

United States Committed To Policy Of Resisting Any Nazi Infringement On the Freedom Of Seas; Chief Executive Also Proclaims Unlimited State Of Emergency In Momentous Fireside Chat

(By The Associated Press) President Roosevelt's fireside chat, committing the United States to a policy of resisting any German effort to gain control of the seas, was cheered today in London and other British commonwealth capitals and studied grimly in Rome and Berlin.

Early reaction to the speech and the proclamation by Roosevelt of a state of unlimited emergency varied thus around the world:

London—The Evening Standard said the speech "amounted to an iron pact between Allies." Authoritative circles said Prime Minister Churchill might make an official statement later in the day. Crowds which gathered in London hotels before dawn to hear the speech cheered during the broadcast.

Rome—Fascist circles said the address virtually put the United States at war with Germany and Italy.

Berlin—Informed sources said many of Roosevelt's points had been answered in advance by Grand Admiral Erich Raeder, who, in an interview three days ago, branded a possible American convoy system as "an open act of war" and described the patrol system as "aggressive."

Tokyo—The Tokyo stock market boomed, apparently indicating a general belief in financial circles that the speech would upset Japanese-American trade relations. Canberra, Australia—Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies called the speech great, noble and momentous and said it was certain to bring "tremendous courage" to the British.

Ottawa—Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King said "Germany will have to draw her own conclusions as to what may be involved through an attempt by force to frustrate delivery from America of munitions and food to Britain."

Mexico City—The Mexican press regarded the speech as the first actual step toward active combat. A government spokesman said it was "a transcendent act that only President Avila Camacho or Foreign Minister Padilla could comment on."

SPEAKERS FOR ETC SECURED

College Finals Program Scheduled for Next Week-End

The Reverend S. L. Blanton, pastor of the First Baptist church of Wilmington, and Edgar G. Doudna, educator, author, and lecturer, who is at present secretary of the Board of Regents of Normal schools of Wisconsin, will be the speakers at East Carolina Teachers College commencement next week-end. Mr. Blanton will deliver the sermon on Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, and Mr. Doudna, the address on Monday morning at 10:30.

Mr. Blanton is a native of Ruthersford county. He is a graduate of Wake Forest, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and the Andover Newton Theological school. Before coming to his present work in Wilmington, he had held pastorates in Boston, New Haven and Louisville. He has the reputation of being an eloquent speaker.

Mr. Doudna also is known as a stimulating speaker. Having served as a teacher, a school principal, and a superintendent in the public schools of his state, as head of the English department of a Wisconsin teachers' college, and in various offices in both state and national educational associations, he is a man of wide experience as an educator. He is an extension lecturer of the University of Wisconsin, and author of "Our Wisconsin."

Mr. Doudna is a graduate of the State Normal school of Plattsburgh, Wisconsin, and holds the degree of Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin and M.A. from Lawrence college.

He will speak on Monday morning before the graduating exercises, when nearly 200 will receive diplomas, 160 who are graduates this term, 11 who completed their work in March and 20 in December.

Dry Weather, Windy Days, Cool Nights Have Effect

Dry weather, windy days and cool nights have had a bad effect on the tobacco crop, according to the outlook on the crop just issued by R. C. Rankin, supervisor of the Greenville market.

"Eastern Carolina has had very little rain during the past two weeks," the outlook statement declared. "Fairly good showers fell over the greater part of the belt May 17 and light showers fell in widely scattered sections on May 23," it continued.

The dry weather, windy days and cool nights have left the tobacco in the field wind-beaten and a little parched, causing many plants to die and necessitating more than a normal amount of replanting. The combination also has slowed up the growth and brought signs of hardening, but the condition is worse in the western portion of the belt, it was pointed out.

"Despite unfavorable seasons, the majority of the growers report the condition of their tobacco as ranging from fair to good. Plants are well rooted, dry seeking moisture, and the crop is in position to grow rapidly when the needed rains do come. Some of the first tobacco planted has been worked over and looks very good; and in practically every instance growers say the tobacco set out during the first ten days or so of May, comprising the big part of the crop, is in much better condition than the tobacco planted after the time mentioned."

"Except in a few instances there has been no more than the usual amount of damage from cut and wire worms, however, in several sections hail which came with the rain of May 17 did severe damage. Reports say several hundred acres in the vicinity of Wilson was badly damaged, and in Speights Bridge Township, Greene County, 1-3 to 1-2 total damage was inflicted on a number of crops. Pactolus Township in Pitt also had a little hail with this rain, but only slight damage was reported, and this from the sand and windstorm which preceded the rain on hail."

REP. RAYBURN PRAISES TALK

Speaker of the House Joined By Democrats And Proponents Of All-Out Aid, But Republicans And Isolationists Critical Of Address

Washington, May 28.—(AP)—Democrats and proponents of all-out aid to the democracies praised President Roosevelt's pronouncement on American foreign policy today, but Republicans and non-interventionists generally were critical.

Speaker Rayburn of the House termed the speech "very forceful and clear" and added it would be "very satisfying and encouraging not only to the people in the Western Hemisphere, but to the Democratic peoples throughout the earth."

Alf M. Landon, Republican nominee for President in 1936, countered with the comment "it is the end of Democratic government in the United States, temporarily at least."

Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) foe of the administration's foreign policy, described the President's speech as a "virtual declaration of war."

"The President talks about cold, hard facts and fear," Wheeler said while in Indianapolis for an address. "yet no man in America has tried more to create fear in the minds of the people than has the President since 1933. We are not prepared to fight on foreign soil. We can not land an expeditionary force in Europe."

Like many of his Democratic colleagues, Senator Ellender (D-La.) thought it "courageous," and predicted it would spell the end of strikes.

Somewhat in contrast, Senator Taft (R-Ohio) asserted the President "did not declare any policy which the country has not been pursuing since passage of the lend-lease bill. The declaration of an unlimited national emergency has no legal effect whatever. The President has no statutory or constitutional authority to declare such an emergency."

NAVY TO REFUSE UNION DEMAND

AFL Business Agent, Under Sharp Questioning, Says Union Would Have To Bow To Government

Washington, May 28.—(AP)—Harry S. Hook, AFL union business agent, testified under sharp questioning today that if President Roosevelt demanded it he would recommend that striking machinists go back to work in the San Francisco bay shipyards.

Hook appeared before the Senate Defense Investigating Committee after Senator Connally (D-Tex.) had asserted that the government was going to step in if production were not resumed.

Later, under persuasive questioning by Senator Mead (D-N.Y.), Hook agreed to submit the committee's views to the local lodge, that the men return to work and arbitrate their differences with employers.

When Hugh Fulton, committee counsel, insisted on knowing what Hook's recommendation to the union would be, the witness said he would ask that they follow arbitration suggestions made by the committee.

When the witness said the machinists union would not be willing to resume work for \$1.12 an hour, time and a half for overtime and waive a closed shop, Connally angrily told Hook that the navy had informed the committee it would not permit the payment of double pay for overtime, one of the union's demands.

Hook said that if that was the government's attitude the union would have to bow to its wishes.

Paris, May 28.—(AP)—Germany and Italy have relaxed armistice regulations to allow France to build up a continental air force for "defense of her empire," it was disclosed today.

The disclosure was made in connection with a visit by Chief of State Marshal Petain, to group French bombardment, reconnaissance and pursuit planes at the Ainain base near Chartres, France, in unoccupied territory.

Pendulum Again Swings Toward Axis In Africa

Salum Back In Hands Of Italians And Germans

Berlin, May 28.—(AP)—Axis forces in North Africa have captured Halfaya pass, on Egyptian soil southeast of Salum, the German high command said today.

The road eastward to Sidi Barrani, which was the Italian high water mark in the first Axis drive into Egypt, runs through Halfaya pass, between the Mediterranean coast and an inland escarpment.

The communique said both German and Italian troops carried out the attack and captured nine cannons, seven tanks, several other armored vehicles and other equipment.

"The enemy suffered severe, bloody losses and lost a number of prisoners," it added. "Our own losses were small. Destroyer planes attacked troop camps and concentrations of motor vehicles in the Salum region."

British sources indicated that Salum, Egyptian outpost on the Libyan frontier, again may have been recaptured by the Axis forces. Halfaya pass, known to the British soldiers as "hellfire pass" because of the ferocity of the desert fighting that has raged over it, leads back from Salum.

Say Efforts Flee Island Frustrated

London Admits Defenders Have Retired to New Positions; Declare Fall Of City Would Not Be Serious, But Acknowledges Occupation Of Suda Bay Area Would Be Major Setback

Berlin, May 28.—(AP)—British resistance on Crete has been smashed, Nazi forces have occupied the island's capital, Canea, and an attempted British flight by sea has been frustrated by a German air attack, the Nazi high command declared today.

Retreating defenders of the island, both British and Greek, suffered heavy losses under pursuit by German mountain troops and unrelenting air bombardments, the communique said.

Dive-bomber attacks were credited with having sunk four merchantmen, totalling 5,400 tons in Suda bay, the British naval base on the Mediterranean island, and damaging two others.

Operations, "in close cooperation between mountain troops, paratroopers and air-borne troops, is making good progress," the communique declared.

"German mountain troops, despite the difficulty of terrain and conditions, yesterday broke the stubborn resistance of British forces and insurgent bands," it said.

"In audacious attacks, the enemy was thrown out of its positions, the capital, Canea, was taken and enemy forces were being pushed south of Suda bay."

German bombers "forced British fleet units to fight" south of Crete, the communique said, and scored direct bomb hits on a heavy cruiser and a destroyer and set a tanker afire.

Aerial transports, although shutting back and forth from the European mainland with a stream of reinforcements, joined in the battle over the island, it said.

The German announcement came on the ninth day of fighting for possession of the eastern Mediterranean island where King George II, shifted the Greek government when the Axis armies conquered the Greek mainland.

Although further details were lacking, German sources said it was becoming evident that Nazi paratroopers, constantly reinforced by other air-borne troops, gradually have worn down their admittedly hard-fighting opponents.

London, May 28.—(AP)—British forces defending Canea have retired to new positions, but there is no confirmation of the German assertion that the city itself has been captured, informed British sources said today.

It was asserted that the fall of Canea, capital of Crete, in itself would not be serious, but if the Germans crossed the nearby narrow peninsula, dominating Suda Bay, main British base on the island, this would be an important setback for the British.

"Let me become an old woman again," Anne begged. "It is the safest disguise."

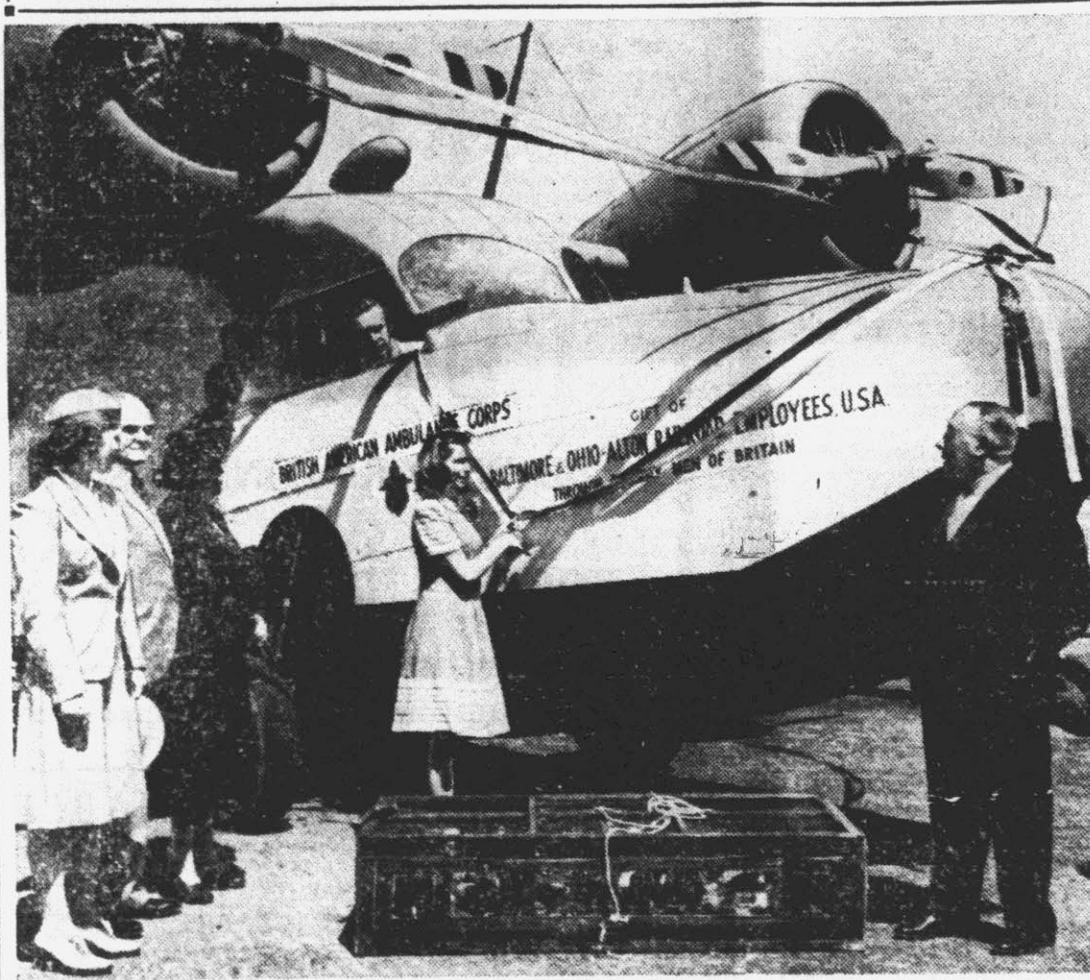

"I must be filled with joy if my feet are on the right road," said Margaret MacDonald. And so must we all say, if our daily way of life is mastered by the power of some good purpose.

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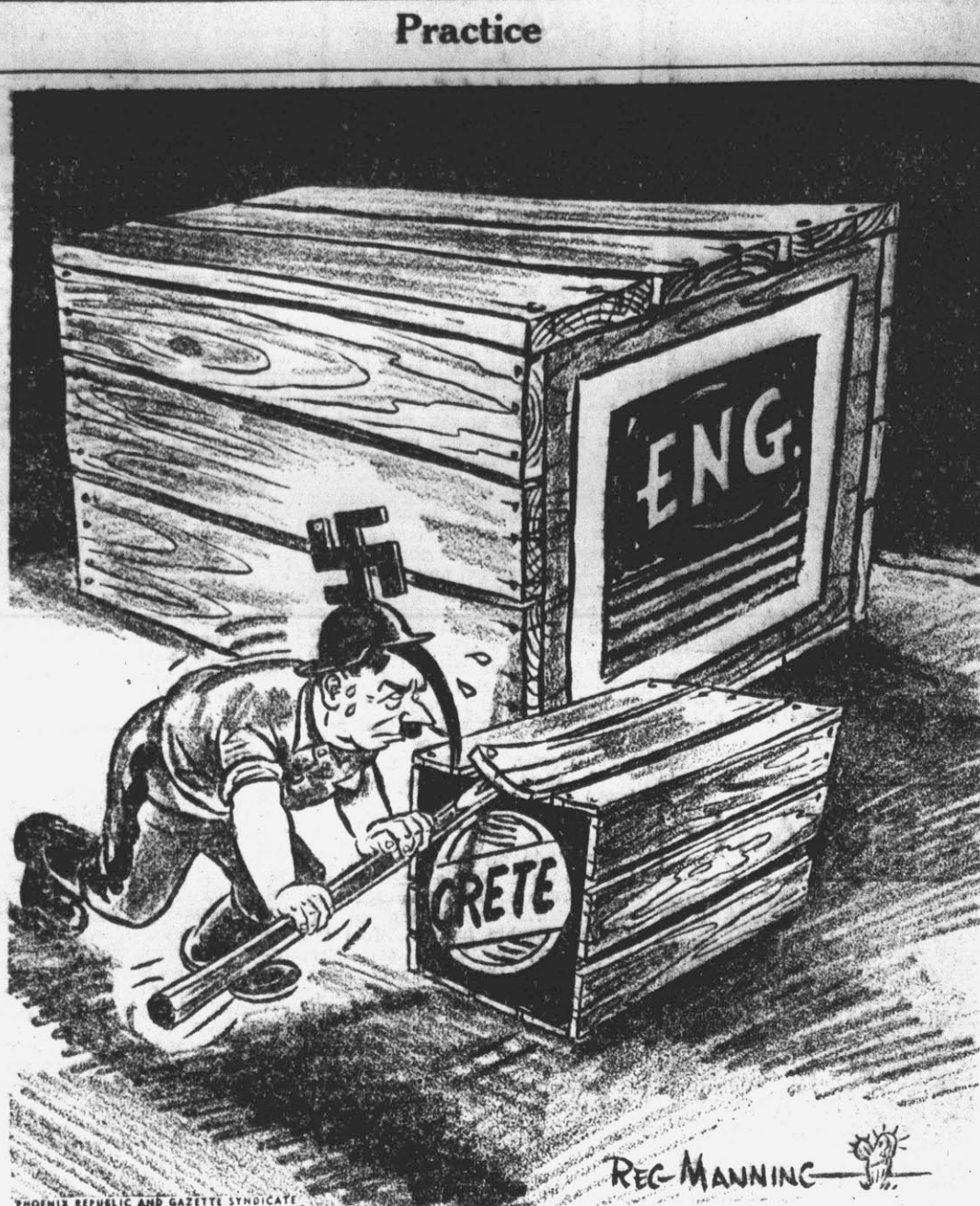
THERE IS NO OTHER WAY

President Roosevelt in his address to the nation and the world last night left no room for conjecture as to where this country stands and what are its intentions toward preserving our rights and liberties in a world gone mad with aggression. While there are some who feel that Mr. Roosevelt's pronouncements have brought us closer to war, as a matter of fact, his address was but a statement of conditions as they exist, and while these conditions were not of our own choosing, it is up to us to take our stand to protect ourselves and those things for which we stand.

America has never been an aggressor nation and never will be, but at the same time neither has America ever run from a fight when its interests were attacked or threatened, and if it is necessary to fight now to protect our interests there is no question as to what our actions will be.

In our opinion, Mr. Roosevelt hit the nail squarely on the head. He could not have said less and stood true to American ideals and it was unnecessary to say more than that we are determined to protect these ideals if, when and wherever they might be attacked.

Now that we have had this definite statement of policy by the official head of our land, every American, regardless of race or creed,



has his or her part to play in seeing to it that we set aside any personal differences and present a united front in a common cause.

Washington Daybook

By Jack Stinnett

First of two articles on law enforcement and national defense.

Washington—Working for two years so quietly that only a few hints leaked out, Federal Bureau of Investigation Director J. Edgar Hoover has completed his "FBI Law Enforcement Officers Mobilization Plan for National Defense."

Hoover emphasizes it is not "a national police force." It actually is a far more widely distributed law enforcement agency than the national government could hope to maintain alone. It ties nearly 4,300 co-operating police agencies in towns, counties and states into a network coordinated by the FBI.

This means that countless thousands of police officers, sheriffs and their deputies, detectives and government agents now are working with FBI methods and under FBI guidance, to clear the entire defense setup of saboteurs, spies and fifth columnists.

It means that the FBI's 17,000,000 fingerprint cards, its technical laboratory with more than 100 crime scientists, its knowledge of modern sabotage methods learned on the ground in countries now at war, and its vast reservoir of criminal information will be available to all these agencies in their concerted efforts against enemies of our defense plans and plants.

On President's Order
Back in September, 1939, President Roosevelt asked the FBI to take charge of all investigation "relating to espionage, sabotage, and violation of the neutrality regulations."

"This task," said the President, "must be conducted in a comprehensive and effective manner on a national basis, and all information must be sifted out and correlated."

Using this order as his springboard, Director Hoover and aides went to work. The plan they evolved is simple.

Through its fingerprint assembling system, its Uniform Crime Reports, a quarterly survey of crime throughout the nation; its National Police School (a concentrated "college" of criminology here in Washington which has graduated 553 members of police agencies and sent them back to their cities or states to teach FBI methods); and its criminological laboratory (which handles about 5,000 cases a year for police agencies—free of charge)—the FBI already was in contact with thousands of police agencies.

The FBI has 54 bureaus in the United States. Using these as nuclei for the greater network, state or sectional conferences were set up attended by officials from the police agencies who signified willingness to cooperate.

Take An Oath
The first thing these police officials must do is take an oath, which without calling for any allegiance which would interfere with their obligations locally, ends on this note: "I will constantly strive to cooperate in the safeguarding of our internal security and in the defense of the nation."

This is "the tie that binds" and in the first quarter of 1941 it bound 8,357 police officials (and consequently the forces working under them) into the FBI's mobilization plan.

As an example of how these conferences blanket a state, California may be cited. Quarterly conferences

have been held in San Francisco, Palo Alto, Stockton, Martinez, Sacramento, Napa, Oakland, Redding, San Rafael, Watsonville, Eureka, San Diego, El Centro, Fresno, Bakersfield, Los Angeles, Riverside, San Bernardino and Santa Barbara. That is coverage.

Short Shots

Raleigh, May 28.—One out of every seven persons who lost their driving license between May 17 and 23 was a boy in his teens, according to reports of the Highway Safety Division.

During this week revocations dropped rather sharply from the record week which preceded it, the figures being 167 against 205; but even so the mark was still slightly above the average week. The revocations brought the total since North Carolina adopted a revocations law to 34,795.

Age of 128 revokees was listed and 18 were shown to be 19 or younger. One 17-year-old boy was listed with two offenses of drunken driving. Only one woman was among those to lose the right to drive. She was a 34-year-old married Charlotte woman.

Harking back to the recent heated Raleigh city election, a politician of wide experience remarked that Commissioner of Public Safety Robert C. Powell was opposed by one of the most unusual "bloes" he had ever seen participating in an election.

"This group was composed of the prominent 'drunks' Bob had thrown

out of Raleigh hotels during the many years he was a hotel official," he said.

He wasn't joking, either, as he cited the names and connections of several well-known Raleigh figures he claimed were included in the roster of "tossed outs."

Discussion of possible changes in the routing of U. S. No. 1 north of Raleigh is quite common hereabouts; but a recent "bull session" on this subject produced one of the frankest avowals on record.

Participating in the talk was Will Yarborough, one-time junior law partner of Governor Broughton and now one of the principal okayers of applicants for state jobs.

"What will Henderson have to say about changing No. 1?" asked a member of the group.

To which Yarborough replied substantially thus:

"Henderson and Vance county didn't vote for Broughton in the primary. They don't deserve any road."

The North Carolina State Employment Service is so certain there is going to be a tremendous demand for labor that it is advising all employers to list with the service, if possible, their labor needs as long as six months in advance.

"North Carolina is just beginning to feel the effects of a tightening labor market," said Chairman Chas. G. Powell. "Other states have felt it so keenly that several out-of-state employers with defense contracts are asking us to recruit workers for them. This may be necessary for defense purposes, but our service wants to use North Carolina workers wherever possible. During the past six months defense construction has utilized the skilled construction workers of the state, and shipyards, bases and now camps will continue to call for both skilled and unskilled construction workers."

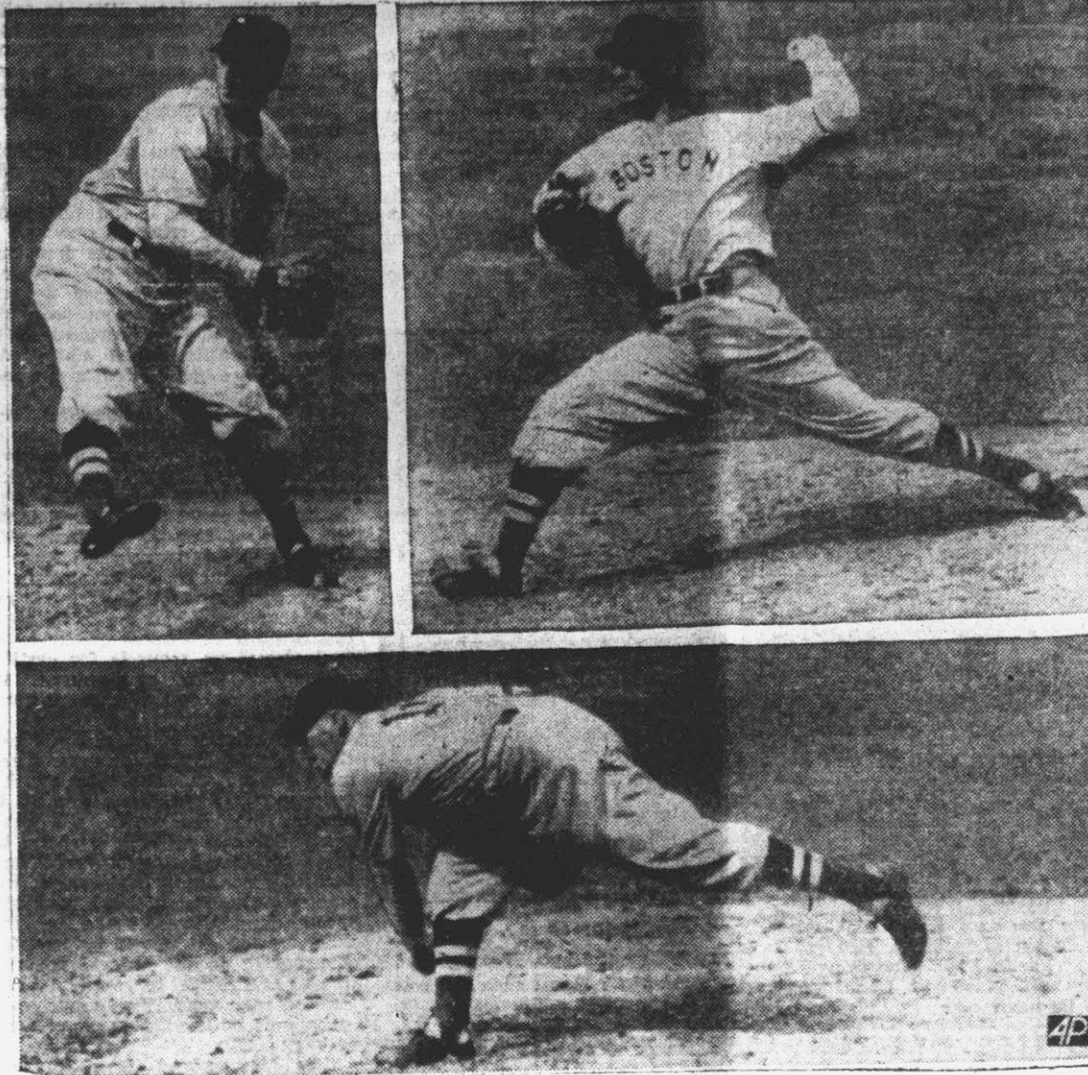

Prints Exhibited At Local Gallery

The Greenville WPA Art Gallery is showing an exhibit of Stencil Prints illustrating subjects that have a real interest for children. These prints show the process of stenciling, which is a very old art but one that has been popular with modern artists. A set of plates made by the Ohio WPA art project show the necessary materials and the stencils themselves, cut from a prepared board which has been oiled to make it tough and durable.

The artist who designs stencils must plan his design carefully in order to convey the picture and yet to form a structure strong enough to resist the wear and tear of executing the process. Holes are cut in the stencil board and the paint is applied over these holes to form the design. The stencil may easily be torn or warped, so it requires careful work.

The finished product has a charm that cannot be gotten in any other way and the ingenious artist can work out many different techniques with the brush stroke.
This exhibit will appeal especially to children since nursery rhymes are used as a theme for most of the prints. "The Little Pig That Went To Market" and "The Little Pig Cried All The Way Home" are very amusing. "The Organ Grinder" with his monkey and the prancing horses will delight the children. "The Cow That Jumped Over the Moon," "Little Boy Blue," "The Fairy Shoe Maker," "Snow White" and many other subjects are all charmingly developed by the Ohio artists in these prints.

This exhibit will be shown until June 19. The art gallery is located on the second floor of the Sheppard Memorial Library. The hours are 2 to 6 each day except Sundays. The gallery is closed on Sundays. The public is invited to visit all exhibits free of charge.

N. Y. Stock Market

New York, May 28.—(AP)—Aircraft, rail and farm implement shares moved upward out of the rut of an otherwise irregular market today under the impetus of President Roosevelt's declaration of national policy.
The assorted improvements came late in the day after strikingly meagre dealings, giving the whole a firm undertone. Transactions totaled about 250,000 shares.

Bonds Occasioned By Over-Spending

The Greenville city administration is making arrangements to take care of over-spending on past improvement programs by issuing \$25,000 in refunding bonds.
Expenditures of recent programs exceeded estimates and funds available by approximately \$50,000. Receipts from the sale of the old city hall property took care of about half of this amount, but the other over-spent figures remain on the city's financial statement and the administration will issue the \$25,000 refunding bonds to take care of these overdrifts.

No vote is necessary on the fire truck and equipment issue of \$15,000 since the additions are classified as necessary expenditures.

Local Pool Opens Saturday at 9 A.M.

The Municipal swimming pool will open for the 1941 summer season Saturday morning at 9 o'clock with H. A. McDougle again as manager. He will be aided by an able and efficient corps of employees.
Miss Helen Foley again will serve as cashier and Clifton Evans will return as one of the life guards. George Lautares has been secured as a second guard and also will put on the Red Cross life-saving course during the summer. Both Lautares and Evans will give swimming lessons.

Miss Betty Tyson has been secured as supervisor of the baby pool and also will instruct the smaller children in swimming.

The pool will open daily from 9 until 12 and from 2 until 9 and on Sundays from 3 to 6.

Fire Alarm Set-Up Will Be Improved

Other improvements to the Greenville fire department will be made in addition to the purchase of the new \$10,000 aerial truck. It was disclosed today by city officials.
Twenty-five new alarm boxes will be erected throughout the city and the system will be put on six circuits, whereas only two circuits are in use at the present time. Now when one line goes out of order half the city is without a fire alarm system and such a situation is regarded as a serious threat in case of a fire during the time when a circuit is out.

Other equipment also is being purchased and the city is borrowing approximately \$5,000 more than the purchase price of the truck to take care of the new equipment.

It also is planned to add two full-time firemen if funds are available when the new budget is made up.

Inspectors Visit City And College

Major L. S. Stranathan and Lieut. W. G. Prince, who were here yesterday inspecting the city-county airport for the possible establishment of an army training field, visited the city and college and were luncheon guests at the college at the invitation of President L. R. Meadows.
The two officers expressed themselves as being greatly pleased both with the city and the college. They were accompanied on the tour by Dr. Meadows, Mayor B. B. Suggs and W. T. Kyzer, executive secretary of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce. Mayor Suggs and Mr. Kyzer also joined the army officers and Dr. Meadows for luncheon at the college.
Before leaving here for Montgomery, Ala., the visitors declared they had been favorably impressed by the city, and especially by the college.

CONCERN FELT OVER DROUGHT

Current Dry Spell Is Unprecedented In Many Years

By HENRY AVERILL

Raleigh, May 28.—The current drought, almost unprecedented in recent years, is giving the state department of agriculture great concern.

So great, in fact, that it has sent into the field to make a thorough survey of conditions in the truck crop area; though it is, of course, conceded that the weather is something about which nothing can be affirmatively accomplished. It will not rain until it gets ready to and not all the surveys and investigations in the world can hurry it up.

Nevertheless it is desired to learn just what the situation is.

As matters stand the department's crop reports are almost worthless before they can be released.

"For instance, we had a fine report showing that the snap bean crop would be about the best on record," said Louis H. Wilson, publications chief, "but almost before it could be issued there were later reports of drought damage which made this report completely out of date and worthless."

J. J. Morgan of the department's statistical division, and H. G. Brown have been sent on the current survey. They will travel principally over the eastern section where truck crops are most abundant.

Clinic On Monday Is Well Attended

It was disclosed at the local Health department today that the maternal and infant welfare clinics held in Greenville Monday and Tuesday of this week were largely attended. There were 98 mothers and 24 babies.

The clinic on Tuesday was so large it was necessary to employ an additional clinician.
Transportation for many mothers in the county is furnished by the Greenville Service League from the early fall through the spring. The League not assuming this responsibility during the summer due to the fact that the League disbanded for the summer.

The Parent-Teacher Association of Paeletts, through its president, Mrs. George Cherry, assists in transportation of patients from that section.

The health officer, Dr. Ennett, expressed the hope that a certain number of individual women with cars who desire to help in this important piece of health and welfare work would offer their services for transportation of these clinic patients during the summer. He stated that unless such voluntary service could be secured, there would probably be many mothers denied the use of the clinic during the summer. Anyone interested in helping these poor mothers should call the Health Department, number 3225.

Tree Is Transferred To Building In Week

Camp Davis, May 28.—They used lumber so fast in building the anti-aircraft camp here from just a wide place along the road to a military city of 20,000 population in five months that lumber went from tree to building in a week.
There were 45,000,000 feet of lumber used in the camp. All Southern pine except for 250,000 feet of fir brought in from the Pacific coast. The fir was used as structural timber. The pine, most of it cut from forests near the camp site was seasoned in kilns.

DEFENSE WORK NOT ALL GRAVY

Fact Emphasized By Wilmington's Assembly Call

By HENRY AVERILL

Raleigh, May 28.—Request for Wilmington and New Hanover county for a special session of North Carolina's General Assembly emphasizes that the money coming into the state for defense projects isn't all gravy and that many grave problems have been raised by Uncle Sam's all-out efforts to get ready for any emergency.

The folks from down by the sea are particularly anxious, it seems, to be given some authority to grapple with the problem posed by an overflowing population brought to them by the shipyards at Wilmington, the soldiers at Camp Davis, the marines at the Onslow base and the general flossam and jetsam which always tags along on the fringe of boom construction.

Housing problems, police problems, tax problems and the like have been added in great number; and will be added in the future as the defense projects expand.

Large bites of taxable land have been removed from the lists of many eastern counties—in some instances as much as twenty per cent of the total county valuation. This naturally lowers the county's ability to meet its burden of the many activities of government, and these activities have to be materially increased in order to afford recreation and health protection for the military and for other defense workers.

It is perfectly evident that 60,000 to 100,000 new residents (and that many have been added to the population of the eastern counties affected by the Fort Bragg, the Camp Davis, the marine base and the shipyard projects) are bound to raise serious questions of adequate housing, schooling, health and welfare resources.

Not only that, but when the construction projects are finally completed it isn't at all unlikely that one or more communities are going to find themselves stuck with thousands of workers, skilled and unskilled, that are going to cause a great big headache, or maybe an epidemic of headaches.

New Hanover had already had to prepare to issue \$500,000 of bonds for school improvements and enlargement.

To transport the huge amount of lumber needed for constructing the nearly 1,000 buildings, 1,500 railroad cars were used to bring in 35,000,000 feet. The remaining 10,000,000 feet was transported by truck.

largement. There is before Congress two bills which should eventually take care of this situation in large part by appropriation of federal funds; but the congressional wheels like those of the gods, grind exceedingly slow and there's no telling when this relief will be available.

In many places the so-called "homes" of defense workers are hovels of the sorriest sort. In Wilmington hundreds are living in a jam-packed trailer camp in wheeled "homes" provided by the government.

In at least seven eastern counties where defense projects are under way there have been steadily increasing demands in the welfare departments for relief of one sort or another. Increased rents for transient workers, lack of sufficient quarters properly to care for the influx of labor, coupled with the problems raised in providing sufficient recreational and educational facilities are being cited as the reasons for this increase.

The Onslow, Cumberland and New Hanover welfare superintendents have not reported an employment problem, but from Onslow come warnings that something must be done to assist the 50 or 60 families (out of a total of about 200) which will be displaced June 1 by the marine base construction.

Cumberland and New Hanover report they have had fewer calls for distribution of surplus commodities and almost no requests for certification to WPA employment. In these respects the defense projects have been helpful.

On the other hand almost one-third of Onslow's land has been removed from the tax lists by the government reservations and it is obvious that the county will have considerably less funds to spend in the future for improving social and economic conditions. Of course, increased valuation of land near the reservations should make up for much of the cut caused by transfer of property to the federal government, and local taxes should be boosted very materially by businesses boomed by the thousands of added population.

The Cumberland, New Hanover and Onslow welfare heads have requested and will receive child welfare workers from the state board of charities and public welfare to aid in handling the heavily-increased child welfare problem. New Hanover reports an added 6,000 in permanent population as the result of the shipyards, while from Cumberland it is reported that the Fort Bragg expansion has added at least 5,000 to the county's 60,000 population.

The possibility of need for child welfare workers in Craven, Pasquotank and Pamlico is recognized. Pasquotank has been allotted a blimp base which will be constructed soon.

U. S. Convoy Issue To Be Cleared Up

Washington, May 28.—(AP)—President Roosevelt will hold a press conference late this afternoon at which he expected to clear up the question of convoys.

Stephen Early, presidential secretary, was advised by reporters that the chief executive's speech that night in which he committed the United States unreservedly to a policy of active resistance to all German efforts to gain control of the seas left some confusion around the convoy issue. Early replied:

"I think he will clear that up this afternoon and I would rather he would do it."

New York, May 28.—(AP)—Award of contracts for the construction of two gigantic pipelines to supply all the deep south with gasoline and natural gas—probably before the end of the year—was announced today by Ford, Bacon and Davis, Inc., consulting engineers.

The gasoline pipeline, to connect refineries in Louisiana with Gretna, N. C., and to supply all the army camps and industrial centers in between, will cost about \$15,000,000 and will be one of the largest lines in the world, about equal in size to the famous Iraq crude oil line.
